Storm Center Aims Straight At Charleston

slammed into the South Carolina Coast Saturday night. Power lines were ripped out in the areas of the blow and there was no estimate of the initial damages.

The Atlanta Weather Bureau said its Savannah observer reported the eye of the hurricane moving inland over Beaufort at 10:20 p.m. Beaufort is about 70 miles southwest of Charleston. Power lines were down and it could not be reached by telephone.

Power lines also were going down at Charleston,

where 60-mile-an-hour winds were reported.

Highest winds reported at Beaufort were 70 miles an hour before the lull. The hurricane appeared to be proceed-ing in a northeasterly direction towards Charleston, traveling about 14 miles an hour and gradually decreasing in intensity. Heavy rains whipped through the entire Southern coastal area of the state.

As the storm came nearer Charleston, winds increased to 65-75 miles an hour. The Weather Bureau here said it expected the winds

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

Dr. Wyvell has her headquarters in a well-equipped clinic at 307 North M Street, conveniently located for speedy access to the Midland Memorial Hospital, where she may be called at any hour of the day or night for consultation. The well-designed building was constructed according to her own specifications, and it has more than a dozen rooms available for her patients, including those for examinations, an isolation room, laboratory, and even her own living quarters within the confines of the building. She is assisted by a staff of four personsa secretary, full time nurse and two others who handle anything from cooking to preparing the children for examinations. An interesting feature of her office is that she has 13 telephones scattered about the arious rooms

A typical day in the life of Dr. Wyvell starts at 7:30 a.m. She doesn't bother to eat breakfast; in fact, she eats only one meal a day, at noon usually, although she does not recommend this practice for others. From 7:30 to 9 a.m., she makes her house calls and hospital rounds, returning to her office for the balance of the day, unless she is called out again on an emergecy, which may happen at any time.
