**DeKalb Will Dig Permian Wildcat In Glasscock Area**

DeKalb Agricultural Association Inc. has filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to drill No. 1-1 TXL as a wildcat in Southeast Glasscock County.

The project is to be dug one and one-half miles south of Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware and Texas and Pacific Coal & Oil Company No. 1 Bishop, recently completed Permian discovery.

No. 1-1 TXL is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 23, block 22, T-5-S, R-2-E. It is to go to 6,300 feet.

DeKalb already had asked permission to drill No. 1-J TXL one mile west and one-quarter mile south of the Seaboard and Texas Pacific discovery. It is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 23, block 23, T-5-S, R-2-E.

**Andrews Discovery Gets Ellenburger Water; To Set Pipe**

Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation No. 1-K Faskan, flowing Ellenburger discovery in Southeast Andrews County which produced 161 barrels of 49.8 gravity oil in one and one-half hours, flowing through a five-eighths inch bottom hole choke from pay at 12,516-740 feet, found the water in the Ellenburger.

The water came in a drillstem test at 12,750-775 feet. The tool was open five hours. There was a good blow of air at the surface throughout the five hours.

**Had A Little Gas**

A 2,975-foot water blanket was seen. Recovery was the 2,975-foot water blanket and 8,950 feet of salt water. The bottom 450 feet of the water blanket was cut with gas.

There were no shows of oil. Open flowing bottom hole pressure was from 1,880 pounds to 5,570 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure, after 15 minutes was 8,790 pounds.

Operator is taking electric log surveys and will then set and cement casing at bottom.

**Will Complete**

The section which made the water will be squeezed off with cement. Operator will then perforate the pipe opposite the Ellenburger oil zone and complete the wildcat as a producer.

**Drowning Victims' Bodies Recovered From Texas Lake**

PALESTINE—(AP)—The bodies of a young father and his seven-year-old son were recovered Monday from the waters of Lake Frankston where they had been fishing.

The two were drowned Sunday when a boat carrying five persons aboard overturned. It was believed to have been waterlogged by a passing motorboat. Three women were saved.

The victims are Cecil Allen Campbell, 26, of Palestine, a fireman for the Missouri-Pacific Railroad, and Anthony (Tony) Allen Campbell, seven, a second grade student.

Campbell's wife, an English war bride, clung to the boat and screamed for help. Rescuers saved her and two other women—Mrs. Agnes Scroggins, 52, Campbell's mother, of Palestine, and Mrs. Ethel Holway, 52, of Marquez, a sister-in-law of Mrs. Scroggins.

**General American Slates Stepout To Salt Creek Pool**

General American Oil Company of Texas No. 1 Atkins Unit is to be drilled as a seven-eighths-mile southeast stepout to Pennsylvania reef production in the Salt Creek field of West-Central Kent County.

Location was staked 666.18 feet from the east and 670.83 feet from the south lines of section 114, block G, W-6-NW survey. It is five miles west of Clairmont.

It is slated for a 7,000-foot bottom.

**Sohio Prospector In E-C Upton To Plug Back, Final**

Sohio Petroleum Company was preparing to plug back for re-completion in the Spraberry at No. 1 Bernstein, Ellenburger failure in East-Central Upton County.

The project was drilled to total depth of 12,620 feet in the Ellenburger where it made water.

Last drillstem test was from 12,750 to 12,820 feet.

Tool was open two hours. Recovery was the 3,650-foot water blanket, 5,750 feet of salt water and 370 feet of drilling mud. There were no shows of oil or gas.

No. 1 Bernstein was a Spraberry producer in the Pembrock field before Sohio took it on down to the Ellenburger.

**Cool Front Brushes Tip Of Panhandle**

A cool front brushed the upper portion of Texas Monday as it rolled out of the Western mountains and headed across the Great Plains.

Temperatures, however, were expected to stay warm—in the 80's and 90's—and forecasters doubted that the state would have any real cool weather before October.

Sunday maximum temperatures ranged from 103 at Presidio in the far Big Bend Country to 73 at Dalhart, high in the Panhandle.

It was sunny with a few showers from Dallas, 80 at College Station, Mineral Wells and Fort Worth, and 91 in Waco, Del Rio and Laredo.

Meanwhile, the Hill Country—still hard last week by torrential rains that finally broke the drought in that section—cleared up the mess made by the floodwaters.

Workers found the body of one of the nine persons killed. It was Aureliano Costilla, New Braunfels, who died when a car in which he was riding Wednesday night plunged into Comal Creek.

**Pair Pleads Guilty To Narcotic Charges**

A negro brother and sister were given suspended prison sentences Monday when they pleaded guilty in 70th District Court to charges in connection with the sale of marijuana cigarettes.

The sister, May Ella Mazzy, 21, pleaded guilty before Judge R. W. (Bob) Hamilton to charges of possession of marijuana and a four-year sentence was suspended.

Her brother, 25-year-old Walter Jones, pleaded guilty to a charge of accepting bribes for some marijuana cigarettes. His three-year sentence was suspended.

The two were arrested June 27 in a raid by Midland police.

**Top L-Man Cracks Back At WT Critics**

AUSTIN—(AP)—State Liquor Board Administrator Coke Stevenson, Jr., cracked back Monday at criticism of enforcement activities in the Panhandle and West Texas.

Stevenson said undercover work by board agents produced evidence leading to indictment of seven persons by the Potter County Grand Jury in October, 1951.

"Only one defendant has been tried up to the present time," Stevenson said in a statement issued here Monday. "A Potter County jury gave him a two-year suspended sentence."

"Since October of last year, the board has taken administrative action on the licenses and permits held by the individuals who were indicted by the Potter County grand jury and resulted in cancellation of each and every license and permit held by such individuals, which orders of cancellation have been upheld by the Court of Appeals."

The Potter County Grand Jury sharply criticized enforcement activities of the board in a report issued last week.

**Yenue Change Asked In Grubaugh Trial**

A motion asking that the trial of Oran Lee Grubaugh on a charge of attempting to murder his wife be transferred out of the 70th Judicial District was filed here Monday.

The motion, asserting that it would be impossible to give the 31-year-old construction worker a fair trial here because of newspaper accounts of the shooting, will be heard later in the week by Judge R. W. (Bob) Hamilton.

**ROME—(AP)—**The Italian government Monday ordered all 22 branches of the Protestant Church of Christ in Catholic Italy to remain closed until they are granted official permission to operate.

**DALLAS—(AP)—**A proposal by Continental Trailways bus system to acquire all stock and interests of American Buslines, Inc., in an exchange of stock was announced Monday by the presidents of the two companies.

**NEW ORLEANS—(AP)—**The Coast Guard reported Monday it is searching for Guller Jimmy Demaret's 22-foot cabin cruiser, "Mr. Five Fifts," reported stolen Sunday from a shipyard at Seabrook, Texas.

**WASHINGTON—(AP)—**Award of a \$713,012.50 contract to List and Clark Construction Company, Kansas City, Mo., for channeling the Rio Grande River to provide an increased water supply for the drought-stricken Rio Grande Valley in New Mexico was announced Monday.

**Charges Against 'Third Man' In Valley Slaying Dismissed**

ALICE—(AP)—District Attorney Homer Dean Monday dismissed murder charges against Alfredo Cervantes in the assassination of Jake (Buddy) Floyd, Jr., son of a prominent Alice attorney.

Dean would not say immediately why he dismissed the charges against Cervantes, sought since last Monday when young Floyd, mistaken for his father, was shot fatally.

At the same time, Dean filed new charges against Nago Alania, daughter of young Alfredo Cervantes, and Mirie (M. Turko) Sapet, San Antonio bar owner.

Not Present At Shooting

The new charges specifically said Alania and Sapet were not present at the shooting. But they were charged with aiding and encouraging the unknown triggerman.

The elder Floyd has claimed the bungled plot was politically-inspired—that a group feared he planned to lead a write-in campaign November 4 for Judge Sam Beams, defeated for reelection. Beams for years has been fighting the dominant political group in the Rio Grande Valley, as has the elder Floyd.

The new charges against Sapet and Alania, signed by Sheriff Halsey Wright, say, a "person whose name is unknown to me" shot young Floyd, 21.

The complaints say Alania and Sapet, "did prepare and furnish arms and aid in the attempted assassination of Jacob S. Floyd" and "the person whose name is not known shot and killed Jacob Floyd, Jr."

Further, the new charges said Alania and Sapet unlawfully, "willfully, knowingly and with malice aforethought, advised and commanded and encouraged the said unknown person to kill Floyd, and they did conspire, combine, confederate and enter into a positive agreement with this person whose name is not known."

Torture Charged Rangers

Alania earlier had been charged with murder while Sapet had been charged with assault to murder.

Meanwhile, officials considered allegations by an attorney for Sapet that his client was tortured by Texas Rangers.

The attorney, Freddy Semann of San Antonio, charged in telegrams to Gov. Allan Shivers, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, and Department of Safety Director Homer Garrison that two Rangers "tortured and beat" Sapet Saturday night in Corpus Christi.

Ranger Capt. Alfred Alles, when told the Semann charges, angrily replied, "They're just a bunch of lying SOB's. Nobody's been beaten or tortured by any Texas Ranger. Nobody has been beaten or tortured since this case started."

**Mechem To Address El Paso 'Ike' Dinner**

EL PASO—(AP)—Gov. Edwin L. Mecham of New Mexico will be the principal speaker at the Eisenhower kick-off dinner here Friday night.

Oscar C. Bohlin, in charge of El Paso Eisenhower headquarters, said Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley, Republican candidate for senator in New Mexico, also has been invited to speak.

**AFL Hears T-H Act Blasts, Prepares To Endorse Adlai**

NEW YORK—(AP)—The AFL's seventy-first convention—apparently preparing for a Democratic presidential endorsement—heard a bitter opening attack Monday on the Taft-Hartley Law.

The tenor of the opening speeches led Gov. Thomas E. Dewey to wonder in his welcoming address if the convention isn't "a Democratic clam bake."

AFL President William Green referred to the Republican-sponsored 1947 labor law as the "obnoxious, dirty Taft-Hartley Law."

The convention is expected to endorse Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson for President and one of the very first speakers, Martin E. Lacey, lost no time in firing a course.

Lacey, president of the AFL central trades and labor council, said he didn't see how any trade unionist could support the party behind the Taft-Hartley Law.

Dewey, a chief backer of Republican Candidate Dwight Eisenhower, drew a laugh when he followed Lacey and told the convention: "Mr. Lacey suspects this is a Democratic clam bake."

**Americans Despair Of Efforts To End Iran's Oil Dispute**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—American officials are almost despairing of efforts to end the Anglo-Iranian oil impasse.

Authorities said privately Monday Premier Mohammed Mossadeq has shown no interest in the proposal forwarded by President Truman and Prime Minister Churchill August 29 to get negotiations going again.

Furthermore, these officials who previously had been counting on "concussions made to Mossadeq" in that proposal, have no new moves in readiness if the situation should go from bad to worse.

**HARRY'S GOING, KERR NOT DUE**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senator Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma, who made an unsuccessful race for the Democratic presidential nomination, told reporters Monday after a call on President Truman:

"It was just a little personal visit between one guy who is going out of the White House and one guy who ain't coming into it."

Kerr is expected to announce his plans to resign as senator in the near future.

**Sees Nothing Funny In War, Nation's Peril**

ABOARD EISENHOWER SPECIAL—(AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower told a mildly responsive crowd at Fort Wayne, Ind., Monday that "I see nothing funny" about the issues of the presidential campaign.

Opening a 12-day, 12-state drive, the Republican presidential nominee said:

"I am in this business (running for office) because I believe America is in peril. There is nothing funny in that."

**Sabre Pilots Destroy Nine Chinese Jets**

SEOUL, KOREA—(AP)—U. S. Sabre jet pilots destroyed at least nine Communist MIG-15's Monday while flying protective cover for Allied fighter-bombers attacking Red targets deep in North Korea, the Air Force announced.

Eight MIG's were shot down, one was maneuvered into crashing, another probably was destroyed and two were damaged in 11 separate battles. Fighting ranged from 30,000 feet down to tree-top level.

The fighter-bombers plastered a Communist industrial complex at Sinuiju, only a few miles from the Manchurian border. Targets included an oxygen plant, an alcohol distillery and a rope factory.

Twelve Sabres were shot down.

More than 80 MIG's roared across the Yalu River from their big base at Anjing in an attempt to protect the sprawling targets. They ran into 104 fifth Sabres and the opposing jets broke off into a series of twisting, turning dogfights.

The U. S. Fifth Air Force said the day's bag of MIG's brought to at least 41 the number destroyed this month. Forty were KO'd by Air Force pilots and one by a carrier-based Marine pilot. If the MIG which was outmaneuvered into crashing is confirmed officially, the total will be 42, within two of the one-month record of 44 racked up last April.

Allied losses, if any, will be reported later in a weekend summary.

# Army Expels Russian Trio From U. S. Zone Of Germany

FRANKFURT, GERMANY.—(AP)—The U. S. Army has taken accreditation cards away from three members of the Soviet military liaison mission here and ordered them out of the American zone. The action retaliates for similar Russian measures last month against three U. S. military men in Potsdam.

U. S. Army headquarters announced Sunday it had forced the three Russians—a lieutenant colonel, a captain and a private—to give up their passes on September 8. Since then, they have remained in their mission compound here.

Three American Army men of the same ranks were arrested by the Russians north of Berlin in August and charged with spying in a restricted area. The Soviets later released the three but demanded their withdrawal from the U. S. mission at Potsdam, in the Soviet zone.

The U. S. Army announced Sunday that its "careful investigation" had proved the espionage allegation unfounded. It did not disclose whether the three men had been re-

# Experts Say New Volcano Declining

SAN DIEGO, CALIF.—(AP)—Scientists back from their first aerial view of the world's newest volcano said Monday the belching mountain on an island off Mexico's West Coast already is on the decline.

Dr. Robert S. Dietz of the Naval Electronics Lab here said the volcano on uninhabited Benedicto Island in Mexico's Revillagigedo group probably had its big blowoff when it started erupting six weeks ago.

While the volcano still belches clouds of smoke and yellow ash every 20 minutes, Dietz said gas odors from the 1,000-foot ash cone indicate the volcano is declining.

# Tyrone Power Wants To Hit Road Rather Than Go Stale

For Erskine Johnson, who is on vacation.

A veteran character actor who has been a part of Hollywood for longer than I, having started his movie career in 1912, stopped by my dressing room while I was making "Mississippi Gambler" for Universal-International.

We talked briefly about my coming road tour in Stephen Vincent Benet's "John Brown's Body" and at last, shaking his head, he muttered:

"I don't understand it. What's happening in Hollywood? Actors were once content to live here the year 'round and make pictures. Now they don't want contracts any more. They go to Europe and make pictures. They go to Broadway and stay for years."

I would like to answer his question here and now.

Mine is not a rebellion against the movie industry, but a reaching toward a fuller and richer career in the most personal sense of experiment and trial as an actor.

It started when I appeared in "Mr. Roberts" on the London stage in 1950 for six months.

Then one day Charles Laughton introduced me to Paul Gregory, whose production of "Don Juan in Hell" had impressed me a few months before—as few theater experiences have. Within a week we were discussing "John Brown's Body."

No Turning Back

It was as if the time had come and there was no turning back. I had been longing to find a new stimulation in my career.

The road-tour aspect appealed to me. I believe that an actor can become as sedentary and stale on the Broadway stage as in Hollywood.

But there is another reason for my decision.

I think that Stephen Vincent Benet's epic poem, which is being arranged for the first time as a theater piece by Laughton, is an important document for Americans in these times.

Benet sings of the American spiritual intangibles which so many of us have forgotten in our fierce pride in our material plenty.

We are not loved universally—even by those who drag aid from us abroad. And perhaps some day I can help them to trust us by appearing throughout the world in "John Brown's Body."

Mossadegh appears to forget that if his government and his economy should crumble, it would not be just the West that would lose. The Iranian people have quite a stake themselves—nothing less than their freedom.

Mossadegh is playing fast and loose with the destiny of his people, not to realize legitimate nationalist aspirations, but to satisfy unreasoning hatreds.

McGranery Seen Losing Post Before Justice Cleanup Ends

WASHINGTON—They're coming to work on time at the Department of Justice now, and showing some interest in their work.

When Judge James Patrick McGranery of Philadelphia first took over as U. S. attorney general less than four months ago, he found that many of the attorneys were reporting for work around 10 o'clock in the morning.

Four months of course is insufficient time in which to clean up completely a government department of 4,500 people, when it has been going down hill six years. This figure of 4,500 takes in only the staff that is supposed to be the government's top law enforcement agency.

It does not include the 14,000 in Federal Bureau of Investigation, 7,000 in Immigration Service, 3,000 in Bureau of Prisons. As more or less independent branches of Department of Justice, they are thus far clear of any of the scandals that have rocked the parent organization.

Best estimates now are that it would take another year and a half to reorganize and restaff the Department of Justice and get it running as it should be run.

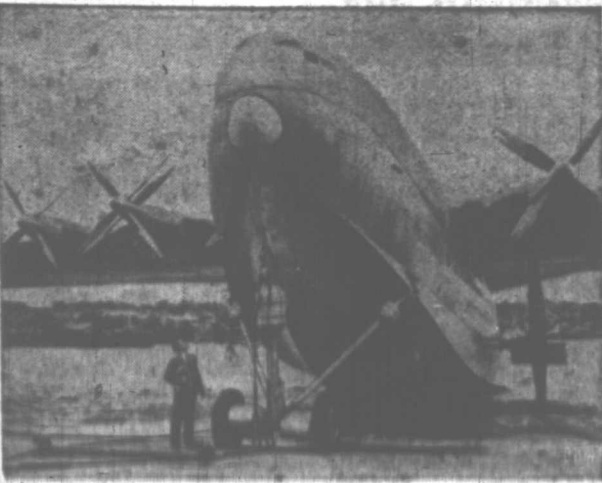

## Mexico City Sinks Into Earth; Engineers Face Costly Problem

**MEXICO CITY**—(AP)—This ancient Aztec capital, third largest city on the continent, is sinking at the rate of 18 inches a year.

The sinking is due to lack of water in the clay subsoil. Paradoxically, the same lack of water is causing the floods which have cost merchants millions of pesos so far this year.

When the Spaniards came, they found Mexico City built on an island in a lake. Gradually the lake was drained and the city spread over its former bed. All the city except a few suburbs is built on the lake bottom.

This is a layer of clay some 300 feet thick. Clay shrinks to about two-thirds of its normal volume when it is dried. For centuries the clay stayed wet.

The temporary cure has been expensive and ineffective. During the dry season, city employees empty the sewers of tons of clay around the manholes. The city has put earthen walls around big ponds where the sewers empty into the drainage canal.

Emergency pumps ordered from the U. S. last spring now lift storm waters into the ponds and then into the canal during dry periods. This has not been enough to halt

lar sinking has done to the drainage and water systems. The water department estimates only two-thirds of the water pumped into the main lines ever reaches the consumer. Leakage from sewers to water lines poses a serious health problem.

The floods are due to two principal causes. The broken lines permit clay to be washed into the pipes and block them. On top of that, the city has sunk below the level of the main drainage canal.

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Emergency pumps ordered from the U. S. last spring now lift storm waters into the ponds and then into the canal during dry periods. This has not been enough to halt

the floods in a city where an inch of rain may fall in 15 minutes.

When the floods started last spring, the government hastily named a board of engineers to draft a long-range plan. The board said the first step should be to build three new deep-level trunk sewers. Work on these has started but water still will have to be pumped up from the sewer outfalls to the main drainage canal.

The board's final report is due this fall.

### Injured Man Refuses Blood Because Of Religious Views

**ALVIN**—(AP)—A critically injured young railroad worker told doctors here he would rather die than accept blood transfusions.

The young man, Leo W. Scott, 24, was bleeding internally, doctors said Sunday night, and added he "just couldn't last long" unless he and his family consented to accept the transfusions.

One doctor quoted Scott as saying "I'd rather die than take the blood of another and go to hell."

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Scott of Austin, said they and their son were members of Jehovah's Witnesses, a religious group. Doctors said the parents and Scott's wife agreed that he must not be given blood, although they had been warned he might die without it.

Scott was injured last Tuesday when his auto struck a bridge near Booth, Texas, while he was driving to work. Besides the internal injuries, doctors said, Scott had a broken leg, a broken pelvis and had developed pneumonia.

Three Alvin doctors and three from Houston are attending the injured man but have promised they will not inject blood without permission of the family.

The Scotts have two young sons, one two years old and the other five weeks old.

To make up for the water shortage, some 9,000 wells were drilled. These brought up the water from the subsoil, drying it and making the surface shrink as the clay contracted.

### Officers Maintain Pennsylvania Vigil For Fugitive Trio

**ALLENTOWN, PA.**—(AP)—Without a single, positive clue for almost 72 hours, police officials clung stubbornly Monday to the belief that three fugitive bank robbers, target of Pennsylvania's greatest manhunt in years, still might be holed up somewhere near this northeastern industrial city.

They acknowledged, however, a growing possibility that the men had slipped away.

State police, FBI men and local officers, all heavily armed, were cautiously on the lookout for the three who have been described officially as "desperate and vicious." Roadblocks and patrols covered main and rural roads over an area hundreds of miles square.

"There is nothing to indicate the fugitives have gotten out of this area," said Arthur Cornelius, agent-in-charge of the Philadelphia FBI office.

The fugitives are Joseph Nolan, 26, and his brother Ballard, 23, both of Harlan County, Ky., and Elmer Schuer, 21, of Chicago. All were serving long terms for bank robbery when they fled the Federal Penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pa., early Wednesday.

Since then they have stolen at least four cars; knifed one man; looted a West Reading, Pa., sporting goods store of six shotguns and a quantity of ammunition; held a family of seven captive for 19 hours while they ate and rested, and obtained \$240 in the holdup of a roadside diner at Hamburg, Pa.

### Search For Father Ends One Day Late For Air Force Man

**TAMPA, FLA.**—(AP)—Sgt. Kenneth E. Micken searched for his father for 10 years and found him a day late—dead in a traffic accident.

The father, 61-year-old Matthew Micken, had been a commercial fisherman in Tampa for 20 years. Sergeant Micken, stationed at MacDill Air Force Base here since February, said he was an ardent sports fisherman and probably had been near his father many times without realizing it.

Micken was killed Friday night. The son read about it in a newspaper, checked with authorities and found the dead man was the father who left his family in Superior, Wis., more than 25 years ago.

### 100 Persons Hurt In Train Collision

**MATTAWA, ONT.**—(AP)—Two Canadian Pacific passenger trains collided head-on in a fog here Sunday night but only two persons, a fireman and an engineer, were injured seriously.

Two others were hurt less seriously and about 100 passengers suffered minor cuts and bruises. Express cars at the head ends of the trains absorbed much of the shock, accounting for the low casualties. No immediate cause was given for the wreck.

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## Eisenhower, Stevenson Say Religion Makes Task Easier

BOSTON—(AP)—Both major candidates for President say they would lean to religion to help them face the responsibilities of the presidency.

The views of Gov. Adlai Stevenson and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower on the importance of religion will appear in the September 21 issue of Episcopal Church News, a weekly published in Richmond, Va.

The statements were released Sunday by Maurice E. Bennett, Jr., publisher of the magazine, while attending the fifty-seventh triennial General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Boston.

Eisenhower's statement said: "This is what I found out about religion: It gives you courage to make the decisions you must make in a crisis, and then the confidence to leave the result to higher power. Only by trust in oneself and trust in God can a man carrying responsibility find repose."

The Stevenson statement said: "The burdens attached to the office of President of the United States are enormous. I know that those responsibilities are so far beyond the limits of human wisdom and strength that, if I am called upon to bear them, I should be utterly dependent on the sustaining power of God as the source of truth and wisdom in the endless hours of uncertainty and anxiety."

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### Bookies In England Favor Adlai, 3 To 1

LONDON—(AP)—Some sections of the British press declared Monday that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, by making his peace with Senator Robert Taft, gravely have imperiled his chances of becoming President.

The betting odds in favor of Gov. Adlai Stevenson, his Democratic opponent, were slashed to 1 to 3—48 from the Stevenson backer to get one wagered against him—by one of London's biggest handbooks. A spokesman said, "We aren't encouraging any more bets on the governor. It was developing into a one-way book."

### WORSHIPPERS DEFY POLICE BAN—

## Church Of Christ Leaders Plan Court Battle In Italy

ROME — (P) — American Church of Christ leaders said Monday they planned court action against a police ban on their Protestant services in this seat of Roman Catholicism.

Cline R. Paden, of Brownfield, Texas, who heads the Rome Church of Christ, said, "We will do whatever is necessary to bring our case before the courts."

Police action against the sect in Italy was climaxed Sunday when worshippers defying the ban were barred by police from the church rooms in a Roman villa.

Later the services were held secretly in the home of a member whose name Paden declined to disclose because it "might hurt him."

Monday, a Church of Christ delegation called on the Italian Ministry of Interior to ask quick and favorable action on an application to hold services in Rome. Paden said the application was submitted last week.

An informed Italian source said the crackdown was due to the group's evangelical activities—about 1,000 conversions since World War II—in Catholic Italy.

Paden protested to the Interior Ministry that the interference with the services violated guarantees in the Italian Constitution of religious liberty, freedom of assembly and freedom of thought. A ministry official replied that the Church of Christ did not have government permission necessary to hold services, a requirement that members of the sect said was enacted during Mussolini's Fascist regime.

The Oklahoma Wranglers and other stars on Arnold's radio and television programs will accompany the celebrated guitarist and singer.

### U. S. Asks To Use Yugoslav Air Bases

BELOGRADE, YUGOSLAVIA — (P) — The United States has asked Premier Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia for greater cooperation in the joint defense of the Southeastern Europe, including the use by American planes of air bases in this country.

From a responsible source, it was learned that Vice Adm. J. H. Casady, commander in chief of the Mediterranean-based sixth fleet, laid the proposition before Tito last week aboard the giant aircraft carrier Coral Sea during his visit to Split.

Casady reportedly offered two informal yet highly important suggestions. He said he would like to see:

1. Yugoslav grant American B-29 the right to operate over this country and to use Yugoslav air bases in order to become better acquainted with the terrain in the event they are called upon for aid in case of war.

2. Participation by the Yugoslav navy in joint maneuvers with units of the American Navy in the Adriatic.

Poker faced, Tito remained non-committal.

After the first two weeks of Fall football action, Tech's prospects for a good team are fair, the coaches reported. They were introduced by Marshall Mason, club president.

### Tito Asks Trieste Issue Be Sideline For Other Problems

BELOGRADE, YUGOSLAVIA — (P) — Premier Marshal Tito says Italy and Yugoslavia should put aside their bitter dispute over Trieste until they can approach the question "with more sense."

"Let's cooperate on other questions which are of extreme importance such as assurance against aggression, economic exchanges and the preservation of the peace of the world," Tito said.

He spoke Sunday before an estimated crowd of 200,000 persons who had converged by truck and train on the little Slovene town of Dolnja Toplice to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the formation of a wartime partisan unit there.

The warring claims of both Italy and Yugoslavia to the free territory of Trieste, at the head of the Adriatic, have worried the Western Allies trying to promote cooperation between countries opposed to Soviet aggression.

Tito suggested that, pending a later approach to the Trieste question, Italy and Yugoslavia set up a joint administration for the territory.

Paden said he had been trying for three years, without success, to get official recognition of his church. Supported by Texas

Other Protestant denominations, including Methodists and Baptists, have experienced no such difficulties. The Church of Christ, which operates 22 churches and an orphanage in Italy, is supported largely by contributions from Texas.

Defying the closure order here, Paden opened the doors two hours earlier than usual Sunday in the stone villa he uses for a church, within sight of Vatican City and Roman Catholicism's first church, St. Peter's cathedral.

Two policemen promptly took stations at the stairs leading to the bare second-story meeting room. A red riot jeep and some 30 plainclothesmen backed up the blockade.

An American and an Italian passerby attempting to take pictures of the activity were carried off to a police station and held two hours. Four other Americans, including a reporter; a Canadian, a German and 35 or so Italian worshippers were stopped from entering the church and ordered away.

There was no disorder, however.

### Polio Deaths Rise In Iowa, Nebraska

DES MOINES — (P) — The polio epidemic in Iowa and Nebraska, already the hardest hit states of any in the nation this year, continued to mount Monday.

Iowa counted an all-time high of 106 polio fatalities—36 more than the previous record of 70 in 1949. Nebraska had 56 such deaths and more than 1,200 cases reported.

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## Double-Duty Dyes, Found In Laboratory Mishap, Also Make Fabrics Waterproof

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. — (P) — A laboratory "accident" has led to the development of new, double-duty dyes that make fabrics both water-

repellent and colorful in one process, the American Chemical Society was told Monday.

Dr. Clyde C. DeWitt of Michigan State College said the accidental spilling of a chemical compound designed for quite another use had paved the way for making dyes that increase the water-repellency of wool by 80 times and of cotton by 12 times—without any change in the texture or composition of the materials.

He told the Chemical Society's 123rd national meeting that in methods commonly used today waterproofing is applied after the fabric is dyed, and that most have a shorter lasting waterproof effect than the new dye.

DeWitt declared the dye are not yet available for commercial use, but probably would have first application in awnings, tents and umbrellas. He said they should have application for treating clothing fabrics—with potentialities for increasing their durability—but he declared it may be necessary to modify the composition of present dye cleaning materials in order to clean fabrics colored by these dyes.

Explaining the "accidental" discovery, the chemical engineer told this story:

Five years ago, he and one of his graduate students were working on the refining of copper ore by a so-called "floatation" process in which particles of copper are caused to "float" on the top of a complex chemical mix.

They devised a compound that would produce an oily film around the copper particles and at the same time color them so they could be seen readily.

Some of the special compound spilled on the laboratory floor. It was mopped up with a cloth, coloring it in spots. Later, when the same cloth was used to wipe up some water, it was found that the colored portions of the fabric retained wetting.

DeWitt said the water-repellent qualities of the new compound, will remain in the material as long as the dye—an improvement, he said, over the most current water-proofing agents. He said the latter have to be re-applied each time the fabric is cleaned.

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# Indians, Oilers Open Playoff Series In Odessa Monday

## Ten, Ortega Slated To Take Mound In Last Round Start

The traditional rivals — Midland and Odessa—have reached the meeting place again.

The Indians and Oilers will square off at 8 p.m. Monday at Odessa in the first game of the final round of the Longhorn League Shaugnessy playoffs. The series will continue in Odessa Park at the same hour Tuesday, moving to Indian Park Wednesday night. Three games will be played here, if necessary, and few observers believed Monday the series will conclude with four games. A majority predicted a five or six-game series.

If a fifth game is necessary, it will be played here Saturday night. No game will be scheduled Friday night in order to prevent conflict with the Midland-Lamesa football game at Memorial Stadium.

Both the Tribe and Oilers went into the championship round with

The New York Yankees appear to have their fourth successive pennant wrapped up. The fast-fading Brooklyn Dodgers are ready to be taken but the New York Giants haven't the guns with which to do it.

That was the picture Monday following Sunday's activities which saw the Yankees win "the big one" from the Indians in Cleveland and the Giants miss a grand opportunity to cut deeper into the Dodger lead.

With Southpaw Eddie Lopat and Right-hander Alie Reynolds collaborating in fine style, the Yankees whipped the Indians, 7-1, to increase their American League lead over the Tribe to two and a half games. New York has 11 games left to play and Cleveland 10.

Although shut out, 4-0, by the Cincinnati Reds, the Dodgers were able to retain their three-game Na-

monal League margin over the runner-up Giants when the third-place St. Louis Cardinals drubbed the New Yorkers, 14-4. The Brooks, Giants and Cards each have 12 games left to play. The Cards trail the Dodgers by seven games and the Giants by four.

In other results, the Philadelphia Phillies swept a twin bill from Pittsburgh, 5-2 and 2-1; Boston's Braves and Chicago's Cubs divided a doubleheader, the Braves winning the opener, 1-0, and the Cubs taking the second game, 3-2 in 10 innings.

Philadelphia's Athletics took two from the St. Louis Browns, 10-5 and 7-1; Washington whipped the Detroit Tigers, 6-2, and Chicago's White Sox nipped the Boston Red Sox, 4-3 in 17 innings.

Casé Paez Fajer Yanks  
Cody Stengel wouldn't call his Yankees "in" and Al Lopez wouldn't call the Indians "out," but the cold facts state plainly that if the Yankees win only six of their re-

maining 11, the Indians must win eight of 10 to tie.

Lopat and Reynolds limited the Indians to nine hits. Lopat was given credit for the victory. Mike Garcia, who hadn't been scored on in 30 innings, gave up four runs in the third inning during a four-hit barrage to be tagged with his tenth defeat. He has won 20.

A pair of rookies with less than a month of major league experience were the culprits in the defeats of the Dodgers and Giants. A grand slam homer by Jim Greenglass, the first homer of his big league career, accounted for all the Cincinnati runs as Herman Wehrner stopped the Dodgers with six hits.

An 11-run explosion in the fifth inning snapped a 2-2 tie and enabled the Cardinals to administer the defeat to Dave Haddix, 26-year-old southpaw on terminal leave from the Army, went the distance for the Cards, permitting only four hits.

Curt Simmons and Russ Meyer each racked up his twelfth win of the year as the Phils came from behind to beat the Pirates twice.

A two-out, ninth-inning homer by Rookie Ed Matthews gave the Braves a first-game victory. Bob Schultz made it a split for the Cubs, helping to win his own game with a run-scoring double in the tenth of the nightcap.

Shanks Comes Through  
The White Sox liked their third-place lead in the American League to a full game over the Athletics when Rocco Kranich singled with the bases loaded in the seventh to score Sam Meier with the winning run against Boston.

The Athletics moved past the Red Sox into fourth place with their two victories over the Browns. Southpaw Bobby Shantz and Alex Kellner pitched the triumphs.

Con Marrero won his eleventh Washington pounded Lester Ted Gray and Hal White for 13 hits. It was the ninety-fourth defeat for the Tigers, the most defeats ever suffered by a Detroit team.

The rule book searchers agreed that Jacome should get the credit. Not a word was raised against the verdict of Scorer Jim Prince. It was just that the baseball curious wanted to know the ruling in such a situation as developed at Indian Park Saturday night.

The fans already had spoken their satisfaction with Eddie's performance. More than \$250 went to the Arizonan in a special offering collected during Saturday night's encounter.

## Official Baseball Guide of 1950

reads on Page 571: "If the starting pitcher is replaced . . . before he has pitched five complete innings when his team is ahead, remains ahead to win, and more than one relief pitcher is used by his team, the scorer shall credit the victory (as among all relieving pitchers) to the pitcher whom the scorer considers to have done the most effective pitching."

There could have been no question about it in the Indian-Bronx game.

## Major College Football Teams To Roar Into Play This Week

NEW YORK—(AP)—Games usually reserved for later in the season lead the 1952 major college football season off to a roaring start this week with 11 of the nation's 20 top-ranked eleven swinging into action.

Eight of the teams which finished among the first 20 in The Associated Press' pre-season poll will play major opponents with defeat jeopardizing their chances of getting a post-season bowl bid.

Headlining the coast-to-coast program is the clash at Columbia, Mo., Saturday between the University of Maryland, ranked second to Michigan State in the pre-season balloting, and Missouri of the Big Seven Conference.

Maryland, rated even more powerful than the outfit which whipped top-ranked Tennessee in the Sugar Bowl last January 1, will carry a winning streak of 12 games into the contest.

For those fans who watch their football on the television screen, the

game of the week will be at Lawrence, Kan., between Texas Christian's Horned Frogs, defending Southwest Conference champions, and the Big Seven powers. TCU was ranked ninth and Kansas seventh in the pre-season poll.

The two leaders were identified as Pak Chung Ja, 25, and Yoon Chul Sung, 24, both graduates of the Seoul Women's Medical College.

The government said Miss Pak received special Communist training in North Korea. She returned to South Korea six months after the war began June 25, 1950, and has been working in a United Nations unit.

The government said Miss Pak and Miss Yoon befriended other South Korean women who had contacts with the UN forces and persuaded them to join the spy ring.

### Three Attorneys To Fight Texas Democrat Battles

**DALLAS**—(P)—Three attorneys, two from Dallas, will defend the "Texas Democratic Party" Tuesday in Austin in a court attempt to have the party's elections and candidates stricken from the November 4 general election ballot.

The hastily-formed party last week filed a list of presidential electors identical with the Texas Republican Party list. A court order was to allow Texans to vote for Republican Dwight Eisenhower for president under a "Democratic Party" label. The regular Democratic Party ballot lists electors for Gov. Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic nominee.

The new party's move was contested by Truman Administration supporters. They obtained a temporary restraining order keeping the "Texas Democratic Party" off the ballot.

The hearing Tuesday is on a permanent order.

Attorneys representing the new party will be Allen Wright one of the party's founders, Dallas; C. C. Renfro, Dallas, and Josh Groves, San Antonio.

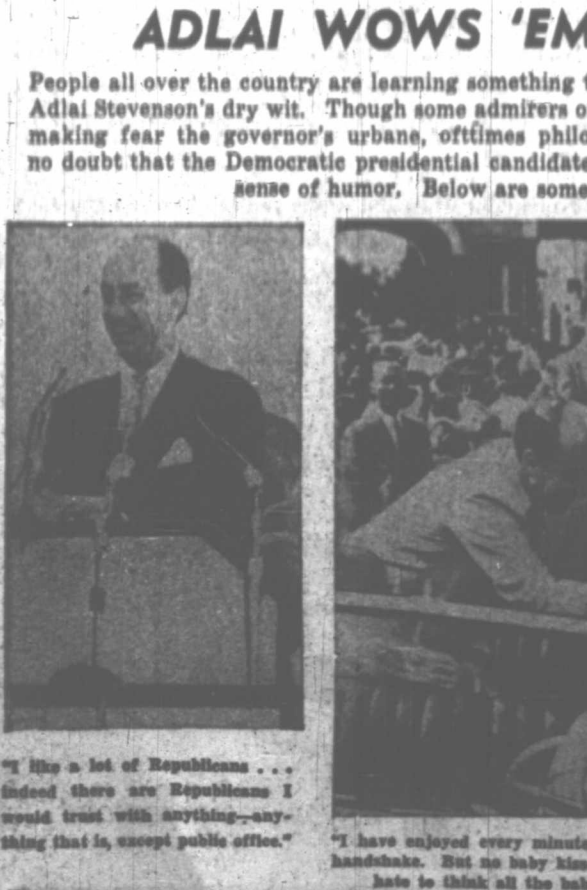

There's one set of roads up in Alaska that the territorial highway commission doesn't have to worry about as far as maintenance is concerned. That's the network of bear highways along and between the salmon creeks.

At just about this time, with the first full runs of salmon darkening the tidal pools and jamming the riffles, the biggest concentration of bruins in the world is tramping up and down those paths, heading most down an inch or two deeper until some of the trails are smooth enough to ride a bicycle over.

The black bear is often an erratic climber, but the brown bear, the coastal grizzly, is something of a serious-minded conformist. When he leaves one rifle to look up another where the dog salmon might be a little fatter, or cut through to the next creek to investigate the humpy situation, the brownie follows a track made by hundreds before him.

Fadding deliberately along with a ponderous disdain for the goings-on of minor critters, there being nothing in the northland save man to threaten him, he plops each paw into the dents printed by the whole family tree of bears that walked that trail before him. The end result is a path pressed smooth along the line of easiest travel. This is no dinky slice across the forest floor such as deer leave, but a broad-gauge road of marching paw dents worn a foot or more into the moss.

Grizzly highways aren't marked by printed signs, but even if old Ursus isn't handy with the lettering brush his road is itself a warning sign. Two of them, in fact, one by any many 300 pound black to scream out of there, and another by any man-critter to keep his eyes open at all turns and intersections lest he bump into half a ton of brownie trucking along in the opposite direction.

The road carries other signs any woodsman can read. A tuft of hair

### Famous 'Old Glory' Claimed In Maryland

**ANNAPOLIS, MD.**—(P)—Maryland claims to own the original "Old Glory."

The flag, thought to be the oldest in existence made in accordance with the June 14, 1777, act of Congress, is on display in the Statehouse. That's the oldest state capital in daily use, and the flag claim rests on a weekly newspaper that claims to be the oldest still published in the country.

The State Department of Information says the first reference to a flag as "Old Glory" appeared in a 1781 issue of the Maryland Gazette reporting the battle of Cowpens, S. C. The term was attributed to William Bachelor, a Baltimore soldier who carried the flag to the head of the Third Maryland Regiment.

The same regimental flag is the one now under glass in the Statehouse. It was carried again by Bachelor's son at the Battle of North Point when the British invaded Maryland in 1814.

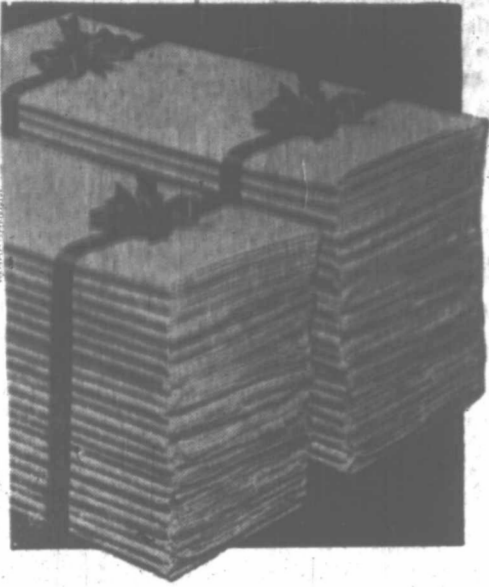

A young Houston girl was shot to death. At least 13 persons died in traffic crashes, and two persons were missing on Lake Frankston, 18 miles north of Palestine.

Joe William Oliver, 80, of Timpeon was killed and four other persons were injured in a two-car collision Sunday at Henderson.

**Dallas Forty-third Victim**  
Tommy Johnson, 50-year-old Dallas negro, was killed when he was struck by an automobile Sunday. He was the forty-third traffic victim of the year in Dallas County.

One man was killed and three injured when their car overturned north of Fremont early Sunday. Humberto Jose Sanchez, 26, of San Antonio, died instantly. His wife was among the injured.
