## New Record Texas Oil Flow Set

### 23 Producing Days Decried For October

AUSTIN—(AP)—A record-smashing oil allowable of 3,268,813 barrels daily in October was ordered Friday by The Texas Railroad Commission.

This was up 4,344 barrels daily over the current peak allowable.

The record increase in permissive production was brought about by allowing general state-wide production on 23 days of the 31-day month, and giving East Texas 18 producing days.

Currently, there are 22 general state-wide producing days for the 30-day month, with the big East Texas field on 19 days.

Major purchasers of Texas crude voted an October net ranging from 20 to 23 days at Friday's state-wide production hearing preceding the commission session.

Stinchfield, Sun and Gulf Oil Companies all asked the highest figure. Magnolia, Stanolind and Humble wanted 22, but Humble added that it could use 23.

Railroad Commissioner Ernest C. Thompson told the hearing the commission did not want to be accused of creating a shortage with Winter need for heating oils coming up.

He also noted decreases in above ground stocks in recent weeks. East Texas on 19 days.

The big East Texas pool was cut back to 18 days after the weighted average bottomhole pressure dropped 2.84 pounds a square inch from August 1 to September 1. The September reading was 1,015.23 pounds.

H. P. Nichols, Tulsa, told the commission the East Texas situation was not alarming but could become serious. He asked the cut to 18 days which he said represented a daily reduction of about 13,000 barrels.

Under the October order, Panhandle and East Texas fields will be on 18 days, 14 West Texas fields connected to the Phillips Goldsmith Gasoline Plant will be on 17 days, Ficton Field will have six days and Fort Chabourne will remain shut down.

The state-wide oil hearing was scheduled October 17 in Austin, Alton, Texas.

### Mid-Summer Heat Again Grips Texas

Texas temperatures jumped back to summer levels Thursday as showers over Central Texas subsided.

They ranged from 104 at Priddy to a low maximum of 86 at Galveston, where cooling sea breezes swept the island resort. Children and Wichita Falls reported 103 degrees and Del Rio, on the Mexican border, reported an even 100.

### Driver Fined For Terminal Runway Trip

A 62-year-old Terminal resident was fined \$200 Friday morning in Corporation Court when he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving his automobile 10 days ago on one of the main runways at Midland Air Terminal.

The charges were filed against the man after an American Airlines plane, with 30 passengers and crew members, had to pull quickly out of its landing glide to prevent hitting the automobile.

John R. Culver, the driver's attorney, told Mayor Perry Pickett, the acting city judge, his client did not realize the seriousness of his act and asked for leniency.

Captain E. B. Mouser, pilot of the airplane, told Pickett he did not see the automobile until it had pulled out from the YFW Hall at the south side of the Air Terminal and on to the No. 4 runway.

He said he had to turn on full power and dive sharply to gain flying speed to pull over the automobile.

"It was too close for comfort," he added.

Pickett, in lecturing the defendant on the seriousness of the situation, levied the maximum fine.

### Sapot Denied Bond In Alice Shooting

ALICE—(AP)—Mario Sapot, known as El Turko, was refused bond Thursday and bound over for grand jury action in the political slaying of Jake (Buddy) Floyd, Jr.

Nago Alanis, Alice attorney also charged in the shooting, already had been refused bond in a hearing Wednesday.

### Bombers Sear Red Targets As Ground Fighting Blazes

SEOUL, KOREA—(AP)—Superforts Friday seared Communist targets on Korea's east coast with 300 tons of fire bombs in their first daylight raid in almost a year.

Thirty-three B-29's from Japan and Okinawa made the blinding attack on Red installations near the port of Hungnam.

Along the battlefield, UN soldiers fought grimly to break a new Chinese foothold on Old Baldy in one of four bloody sieges.

The U. S. Eighth Army said a battalion of screaming Reds—about 300 men—stormed the crest of Old Baldy Thursday night, signaling a long-expected Communist attempt to recapture the Western Front hill.

To the west, northwest of Yonshon, two Chinese companies "attacked from all sides" and overran an Allied outpost hill, the Eighth Army said.

At the same time as their assault on Old Baldy, the Communists staged a diversionary attack on Pork Chop Ridge, a few thousand yards to the west. Allied troops hurled the Reds back after four hours of bitter fighting. Red artillery and mortar fire raked both hills west of Choron.

On the Central Front, the Reds made two fierce but futile attempts to recapture South Korean positions on Finger Ridge.

### Caudle Puts Finger On Slack In Tax Fraud Case Dismissals

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Lamar Caudle testified Friday that Ellis N. Slack, central figure in a controversy over a St. Louis grand jury's investigation of tax scandals, once was sent to Nashville to get some tax indictments dismissed.

He said Slack also made a trip to Milwaukee on a big tax case in which ex-Senator Scott Lucas of Illinois was the defense attorney. Lucas had taken up with then Attorney General J. Howard McGrath the question of getting a dismissal of an indictment against a client, Caudle said.

Caudle, fired by President Truman last November as an assistant attorney general, was in the witness chair for the second day before a House judiciary subcommittee investigating the Justice Department.

Caudle told about Slack's visits to Nashville and Milwaukee after first saying there had been "too many runaways grand juries"—meaning juries which went further with indictments than the Justice Department considered proper.

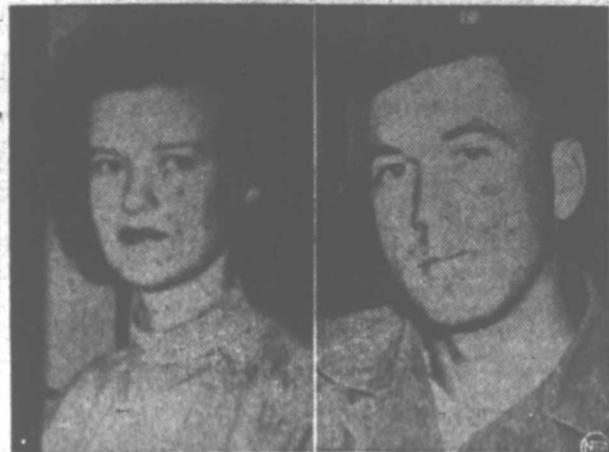
High spots of Caudle's almost six hours of testimony Thursday included:

1. That groups of conscientious objectors to military service used a White House aide to obtain conferences with him which "caused me a lot of trouble."

2. That he was subjected to "a lot of pressure" on tax evasion cases involving prominent citizens of Mobile, Ala. and, eventually, the case was taken out of his hands.

3. That the Kansas City vote fraud case of 1946 was taken from his responsibility when he was chief of the criminal division.

4. That he was one of the officials who recommended against an all-out FBI investigation of the Missouri vote fraud scandal before thieves blasted open a courthouse safe and stole ballot boxes and other evidence impounded by a grand jury; and

### Living Costs Soar To New All-Time High

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The government reported Friday that living costs reached another new high in mid-August, the third straight month they have set a new record.

The index prepared by the Bureau of Labor statistics rose to 191.1 per cent of the 1925-26 average. This is 13.3 per cent above the pre-Korean period and three per cent above a year ago.

Slight increases between mid-July and mid-August in the cost of food and most other major consumer items were responsible for the new increase. The prices for apparel decreased slightly. Home furnishings remained unchanged.

Wage Boosts Follow

On the basis of the new mid-August figures, about one and a half million workers will get wage increases.

These include more than 1,400,000 railroad workers who will get a two-cent hourly pay boost due to the net change in living costs over the last three-month period. Almost 200,000 Northern textile workers and a number of other labor groups also are due to benefit from quarterly pay adjustments based on the index rise.

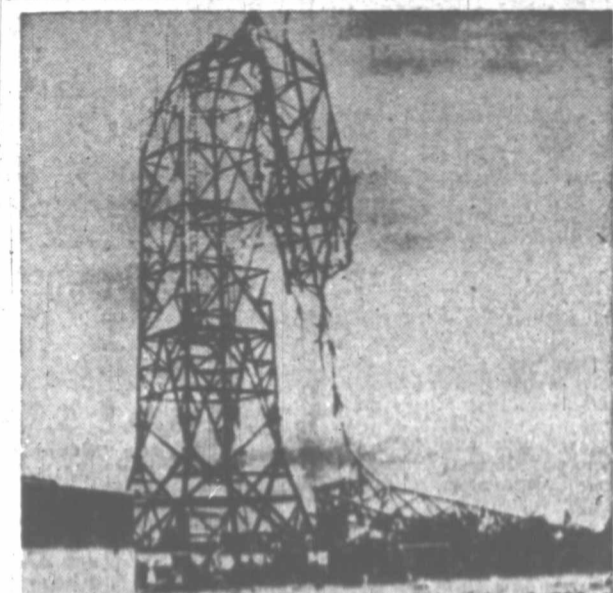
Their contracts, as in the case of the railroad workers, are geared so that wage rates are adjusted quarterly according to index figures.

### Baptists Disclose Closing Of Church By Catholic Italy

ROME—(AP)—The Baptists announced Friday that one of their churches in Catholic Italy was closed by police a month ago, before the September crackdown on the American-led Protestant Church of Christ.

Both the Baptists and the Church of Christ are appealing the closure, ordered by the Ministry of Interior under a law dating back to Italy's Fascist era, which requires a church to have government recognition.

The closure a month ago of the Baptist church at little Miglianico on the Adriatic Coast opposite Rome was disclosed by Dr. Manfredi Rocci, executive secretary of the Baptist Church in Italy.

## Ike Hangs 'Honest Man' Tag On Nixon

ABOARD THE EISENHOWER SPECIAL—(AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower defended Senator Richard M. Nixon of California Friday as an "honest man" in the political furor over the disclosure concerning Nixon's non-official California expense account.

James Hagerty, Eisenhower's press secretary, called newsmen aboard the campaign special train together as the train approached Nebraska City to read them this statement:

"I have long admired and applauded Senator Nixon's American faith, and his determination to drive Communist sympathizers from offices of public trust.

"There has recently been leveled against him a charge of unethical practices. I believe Dick Nixon to be an honest man. I am confident that he will place all the facts before the American people fairly and squarely.

"I intend to talk with him at the earliest time we can reach each other by telephone."

Previously, in a stop at Plattsmouth, Neb., the stern-faced general had ignored the Nixon incident in addressing a train-side crowd of about 500 persons.

The Nixon disclosures Thursday night had cast a pall over the campaign train as it rolled south through Nebraska. There was no doubt many of the general's associates regarded the matter as a serious political setback.

One of his advisers who asked not to be quoted by name, told reporters he regarded the political implications as "murder."

### Daniel Promises Probe Of Alleged Starr Vote Frauds

AUSTIN—(AP)—Attorney General Price Daniel Friday promised his office would "cooperate fully" in investigation of alleged Starr County election frauds.

Two Starr County citizens Thursday asked him to investigate the July 26 Democratic primary in the South Texas county.

Daniel Friday advised District Attorney Homer Dean of Alice that his office would cooperate as required by the new Texas Election Code.

Daniel assigned Assistant Attorney General Willis Gresham to the case.

An affidavit filed Thursday with Daniel alleged frauds within the county involving races for district judge and district attorney of the 79th Judicial District and for state representatives of the 79th District, comprising Starr, Brooks, Jim Wells, Duval and Jim Hogg Counties.

Gresham said Dean had advised him a grand jury would be in session in Starr County beginning Monday.

## Adlai Unleashes New Salvos Of Ridicule On Republicans In Gag-Laden Addresses

SPRINGFIELD, MASS.—(AP)—Gov. Adlai Stevenson replied Friday to Republican criticism of his political gibes with a new barrage of quips, taunts, digs and jabs.

He heaped coils of ridicule on the Republicans—but his jokes were designed to prove his basic campaign arguments.

Moving through New England, the Democratic presidential candidate told an audience in a prepared speech at Springfield, that the GOP has not one affirmative campaign issue.

So, he said satirically, they have been hunting one:

"After long, smoke-filled sessions and tense high strategy meetings, the Republican high command has finally decided what the great issue of the campaign is.

"To my considerable surprise, they are now saying that the central issue of our time is humor!"

His GOP presidential opponent, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, recently said a presidential campaign "is no laughing matter," and implied Stevenson is making light of serious matters.

Stevenson said the initials, GOP stand for "Grouchy Old Peasants."

Senator Robert A. Taft—who Stevenson claims has forced Eisenhower into an "abject surrender"—

is the only happy man in the Republican ranks now, the governor said.

"Judging by the pictures, Senator Taft seemed vastly entertained by their recent conversation in New York. I have never seen such a contented smile since the cat swallowed the canary."

Hammering away at that theme, Stevenson said that if the general is elected, "Eisenhower may be in the White House, but Taft will be in the Blair House, and Gov. Thomas Dewey will be in the dog house."

Stevenson's speech here indicated he believes he has stung the Republicans with his incessant derision.

The governor spoke Thursday night at Hartford, Conn., where 2,500 people filled to capacity the Bushnell Auditorium.

There—and he was not joking—he said: "In recent weeks, my distinguished opponent has adopted the singular theory that a candidate for President should support all state and local candidates on his party ticket—good, bad, indifferent or worse, and regardless of their views and records."

His own view, he said is that: "Win or lose, I will not accept the proposition that party regularity is more important than political ethics."

Gas-oil ratio was 1,895-1 and gas volume was 1,800,000 cubic feet per day.

Location is 900 feet from north and west lines of section 14-128-32e and one location west of the discovery well for Devonian production in the field.

### Crockett Prospector Has No Oil Or Gas In Top Of Ellenburger

Humble Oil & Gas Company has entered the Ellenburger at its No. 1 Charles E. Davidson, Jr., Central-East Crockett County wildcard.

This exploration is 14 miles southeast of Ozona and 810 feet from north and 860 feet from east lines of section 5, block F, OCS&F survey.

Unofficial Call

Top of the Ellenburger was tested, according to an unofficial call to be at 9,540 feet. Elevation on the derrick floor is 2,426 feet.

It ran a drillstem test at 9,536-66 feet. The tool was open 45 minutes. Recovery was 32 feet of drilling mud with no shows of oil, gas or water.

The wildcard is drilling deeper. It will continue to make hole until it finds fluid of some sort in the Ellenburger.

### Coronet 2900 Area In NE Howard Is Given New Testers

Two more projects have been started in the recently opened Coronet 2900 field of Northeast Howard County.

One location northwest of Coronet Company No. 1 Brookhaze, discovery well of the field, Coronet will drill No. 2-1 Jones. It is 890 feet from mouth and 330 feet from east lines of section 5, block 28, H&TC survey.

It will drill to 3,000 feet with rotary. Site is two miles east of Vincent.

Standard Oil Company of Texas will drill No. 2-1 Jones as an east offset to a recently completed long north extension to the field. Drill-site has been staked 330 feet from south and 2,310 feet from east lines of section 20, block 20, Lavaca Navigation Company survey. It is 1,320 feet east of Standard No. 1-1 Jones and two miles east of Vincent.

It is slated for a 3,200-foot bottom.

Nixon, Californians Defend \$16,100 'Scholarship' Fund

SACRAMENTO, CALIF. —(P)— The Republican vice presidential candidate, Senator Richard Nixon, Friday repudiated a Democratic charge that he was "morally wrong" in accepting \$16,100 for expenses from wealthy supporters.

Existence of the fund was reported Thursday by Dana C. Smith, wealthy Pasadena, Calif., tax attorney. Smith said he helped raise the fund because the \$2,500 allowed Nixon for expenses by the government was "nothing approaching enough for a senator representing a state as large as California."

Nixon, as senator, receives a \$12,500 annual salary, a \$2,500 expense account, and more than \$50,000 a year to run his office and pay staff salaries and expenses. Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell charged in Washington that Nixon was "morally wrong" and demanded that he resign as GOP running mate to Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Democrats Are Confident

The Democratic Party is brimming with confidence over the election prospects of its presidential nominee, Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois.

First of all, we have to recognize that the Democratic leaders were cocky about the 1952 outlook long before they had a candidate. That mood grew out of these things:

- 1. The conviction, supported by a considerable amount of statistical evidence, that the Democrats are the majority party in the United States.
2. The tremendous advantage accruing to the party nominee from the big block of electoral votes he collects almost automatically from the Solid South.
3. The memory of 1948, when President Truman won election despite defections by the Dixiecrats and Henry Wallace's followers.
4. The condition of national prosperity, a circumstance not usually displeasing to the voters.

Now that they have a candidate, the Democrats are more jubilant than ever. In Stevenson they knew they were getting a man acceptable to all wings of the party.

They felt, too, that they were getting a man salable to the electorate. And all the signs suggest they also were correct about that. Reluctant to be a candidate, Stevenson has made himself a fighting nominee. He is doing everything he can to exploit the divisions within opposition Republican ranks.

He is asserting his independence of Truman by word and action, trying thus to cut himself free of ties with Washington corruption. He is talking like a man dependent on no one, daring to tell powerful groups like the American Legion that he will resist excessive demands from them or anyone else.

None of this is by accident. Stevenson believes, and so do many other top Democrats, that the cry "time for a change" perhaps is the biggest barrier to his election. They fear talk that the party has been too long in power. That is why he is stressing to the hilt the idea that he is a new face. As one aide put it, he is trying desperately to avoid making the "old noises" the standard candidate utters on the platform.

No far his luck has been good. He's been a hit wherever he's gone. The platform seems to be his natural habitat. Alarm that he might prove too "intellectual" for mass audiences has faded as he has faced groups like the Legion with humor and ease and carried the day. His nerve in hammering at pressure groups has evoked admiration even from the targets themselves.

Democratic confidence is understandable. General Eisenhower clearly has his work cut out for him. The Democratic house is not going to be blown down with a few light puffs.

WASHINGTON—Ike notes—Despite his intensive campaign, Ike's chances don't look good in Adlai's home state. This is the first time since Abe Lincoln that Illinois has had a chance to put a native son in the White House.

only four heart tricks, however, he would need three spades for his contract. South wanted to take the spade finesse first, since if that lost, West could not continue the clubs.

As it turned out, West won the spade with the queen and now had to find some way of giving his partner the lead in order to have a club return through South's ten. A spade return was obviously hopeless.

A heart return would simply develop declarer's suit for him. West could not afford to lay down the ace of diamonds since that would remove his entry to the long club.

West therefore had to lead the deuce of diamonds in the hope that his partner had the king of diamonds and would play it.

South had followed West's reasoning and saw that West had to do the correct conclusion. His only chance now was that East would make a mistake. Declarer therefore played the eight of diamonds from the dummy.

East timidly played the nine of diamonds hoping that this would somehow save his precious king. South gleefully won with the ten of diamonds and took the heart finesse. East could take the queen of hearts, but now no defense could defeat the contract.

East's correct play, of course, is to put up the king of diamonds like a little man, and to return the five of clubs. Whenever declarer tries to develop the hearts, East will win with the diamond to his partner's ace. The long club then defeat the contract.

Dixie Editors Say Ike's Stand Is Weak On South's Pet Issues

WASHINGTON—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, as the Republican candidate for President, will have to come out much more strongly in favor of states' rights on the Tidelands oil issue, the FEPC and all other civil liberties questions on his next swing into Dixie, if he is to win any electoral votes in the South.

This is the consensus of a score of Southern newspaper editors and political reporters in key cities of a dozen states. They were asked to interpret the reaction of people in their communities to Ike's first flying campaign trip south of the Mason and Dixon line.

This is taken as a guide for the tactics the GOP candidate should follow when he invades Virginia and North Carolina at the end of the month and swings over as far as Texas in October.

With few exceptions, there was general agreement that Ike did himself some good on the first trip. On whether he did himself enough good to carry any Southern states in November there was wide disagreement.

Turned Stone Cold Frederick Sullivan, editor of the Jackson (Miss.) Daily News, pooh-poohs the whole idea that Eisenhower can carry anything in the South.

Southerners of both parties turned out in large numbers to see and hear the general, he admits. But he says "they turned stone cold when the GOP candidate, touching briefly on civil rights, declared 'All men are created equal.' And they went into a deep freeze a few days later when Eisenhower declared he would appoint a negro to his cabinet."

Along the same line, C. P. Lister of the Baton Rouge (La.) State Times and Advocate declares, "Eisenhower faces an almost impossible fight here unless he can show he is a true friend of the South. He will have to bear down on the Tidelands issue and show how it would slow efforts to improve educational opportunities and provide better salaries in all schools."

Want Ike To Get Tougher "Texas wants a fighter," says Editor Walter R. Humphrey of the Fort Worth Press. "His Southern swing showed the first real indication Ike would pitch in to give corruption and extravagance issues the kind of stump treatment they deserve."

"When he comes back," adds Ed Pooley of the El Paso Herald-Post, "he should be tougher than ever and he should hammer on the mess in Washington and the bloody sacrifice in Korea."

In the opinion of Martin Anderson of the Orlando (Fla.) Morning Sentinel, Eisenhower's first Southern tour "amazed" everyone. "Senator George Smathers' endorsement of Stevenson following Ike's tour brought storms of protests from his

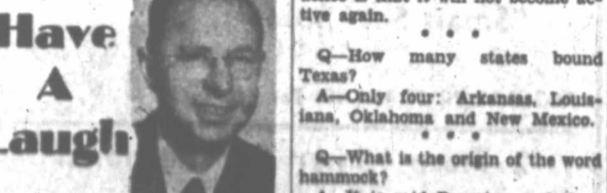

**Slave Labor Policy Charged To Soviets**

**WASHINGTON**—(AP)—With an endorsement from President Truman, the State Department Thursday published a 60-page roundup of evidence that the Communist bloc, is secretly using millions of slave laborers.

On the basis of Soviet documents, testimony of ex-prisoners and other evidence, the department concluded: "The number of slave laborers in the Soviet Union and its satellites runs into the millions and represents the most extreme violation of human rights on the face of the earth today."

President Truman at his news conference called attention to the document and described it as a most interesting and factual expose. He noted it was based on evidence turned up by a fact-finding body of United Nations Economic and Social Council and the International Labor Organization.

## Polio Incidence Hits Record High

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Public Health Service reported Thursday that the number of new cases of infantile paralysis in the United States has hit a record high for the fourth straight week. The agency listed 4,088 cases in 47 states—New Mexico was missing—during the week that ended September 15. There were 3,894 new cases the previous week, including 20 from New Mexico. Texas still continues to lead in polio cases reported since January 1, with 8,465, including 141 last week. Next comes Iowa with 3,088, Michigan with 1,996, Illinois with 1,971, Ohio with 1,781, and California with 1,713.

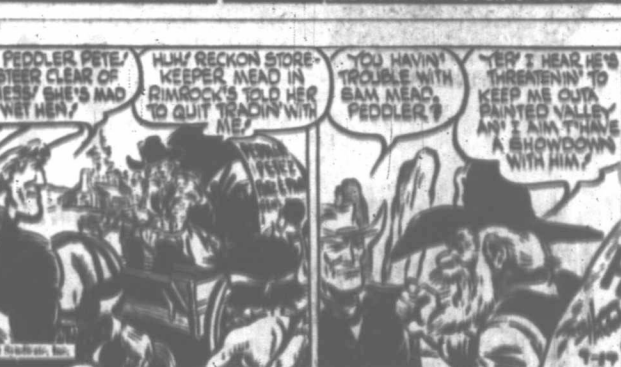
## Gunnery Practice May Disperse Bats

# Byrnes Creates Political Furore By Announcing He'll Vote For Ike

COLUMBIA, S. C.—Gov. James F. Byrnes has cast away Democratic Party affiliations reaching back more than half a century and announced he will support Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for President.

The governor, who served in all three branches of the federal government, made his dramatic announcement at a news conference Thursday.

"He said the most important factor in his decision to vote Republican was that he believes Eisenhower is the man best qualified to 'clean up the mess in Washington' and keep the country out of another world war."

"I shall place loyalty to my country above loyalty to a political party," he declared. "And I shall vote for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower."

State Democratic campaign headquarters here promptly charged that Byrnes "has turned his back on and deserted" South Carolina Democrats.

The announcement was expected to carry considerable weight with South Carolina voters, who gave Byrnes a record endorsement in his 1950 campaign for governor.

Personal Bitterness Charged

But in other quarters it was greeted with reproach. Jonathan Daniels and Averell Harriman—both high-ranking Democrats—blamed Byrnes' desertion of the party on what they called his personal bitterness.

Harriman, foreign aid chief, said, "The President let him Byrnes go as secretary of State 'and he's been bitter ever since. He's now taking

it out on Gov. Stevenson (Gov. Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic nominee)."

Gov. Robert Kennon of Louisiana, who with Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas already has announced his support of Eisenhower, said he felt sure the announcement means "South Carolina, along with Texas and Louisiana can be considered probable Eisenhower states."

Claude O. Vardaman, Alabama state Republican chairman, cheered Byrnes for "taking the high road."

**GOP Leader Cheers**

John A. Pritchett, a Tennessee Republican leader, termed the Byrnes announcement "a certain indication that South Carolina will be found in the Eisenhower camp in November."

Daniels, editor of the Raleigh L. C. News and Observer, was sharply critical. Daniels, formerly press secretary and adviser to Presidents Roosevelt and Truman, asserted: "There is no end to the bitterness of Jimmy Byrnes against Roosevelt. Truman and the party they served. If he couldn't be a Democratic President, he's ready to help make a Republican President."

Although Byrnes' announcement had been expected several days, it still came as a surprise to many party faithful.

Byrnes told the state Democratic convention here August 6 that if he had to vote then it would be for Stevenson.

**Charges Stevenson Shift**

Reading from a 1,500-word pro-

pared text Thursday, Byrnes said Stevenson had shifted his position on what he considered three major campaign issues, all of which had figured in his decision to support Eisenhower.

He said Stevenson first announced he opposed repeal of the Taft-Hartley law, then "on Labor Day changed his position and joined the President in advocating repeal."

Stevenson formerly believed that fair employment practices legislation was a matter for states instead of the federal government, Byrnes said, adding:

"Now candidate Stevenson says . . . he favors compulsory federal legislation" to take effect if a state fails to enforce "an adequate state law."

"No Southern state would enact an FEPC law. Therefore, Mr. Stevenson's compulsory federal law would apply to every Southern state."

The governor also scored Stevenson's recent statement that as president he would use his influence to "encourage Congress" to end unlimited debate in the Senate.

Byrnes said he had hoped Ste-

venson "would dissociate himself from the policies of the present Administration" but "he has not done so."

**"The Great Obligation"**

"Governor Stevenson would not condone corruption. But no matter how honest or ethical he is, he could never clean up what he has called 'the mess in Washington.' He will be under too great an obligation to those responsible for 'the mess.' It will take a man like Eisenhower who is under no political obligation to the President or any other official of the Administration . . ."

"I think General Eisenhower could do more than any living American to bring about an end to the war in Korea and prevent our stumbling into another world war," Byrnes said.

Byrnes left the U. S. Supreme Court to become President Roosevelt's director of economic stabilization and later director of war mobilization and reconversion. At Roosevelt's request, he did not seek the Democratic vice presidential nomination in 1944, when Truman was selected.

Truman appointed Byrnes secretary of State, and he served there from June, 1948, to January, 1947, resigning for reasons of health.

"Some people, when they get prosperous, forget what they used to be like," the Democratic vice presidential candidate told an audience of perhaps a thousand Thursday night in the courthouse square a block from Florida's state capital.

But he said he didn't think Floridians will "forget the terrible conditions" that followed the last time the state broke away from the Democratic column and voted for Herbert Hoover in 1928.

He predicted Florida, and all other Southern states, will cast its electoral votes for him and Gov. Adlai Stevenson.

After two days of speaking in Florida, Sparkman planned to fly to Little Rock Friday to attend the Arkansas state Democratic convention.

# Rayburn Promises Texas Drive For Adlai As Daniel Writes New Tidelands Proposal

Texas Democrats who want Adlai Stevenson for President of the United States had a pledge Friday from Speaker Sam Rayburn that every county in the state would be organized for a November victory.

As Rayburn made his pledge for an all-out Democratic drive Thursday, former Attorney General William McCraw denounced two Democrats who say they won't support Stevenson.

**Elsewhere:**

1. Fries Daniel, attorney general and nominee of both Democrats and Republicans for U. S. Senate, said he would introduce a bill to press apart from other states Texas' claim to offshore oil lands.

2. Dr. Louis Buck of New Braunfels, chairman of the Young Republican Federation of Texas, said Senator Richard Nixon, GOP vice presidential nominee, will arrive in Amarillo for a speech September 25 at 6 p.m.

McCraw referred to Gov. Allan Shivers and Daniel as "our presently bewildered and befuddled public officials."

McCraw denounced Shivers and Daniel for their handling of the Tidelands ownership battle, told a Stevenson-Sparkman rally that other state administrations had waged the Tidelands fight and said, "We didn't quit the Democratic Party."

Rayburn's appointment to head the National Democratic nominees'

campaign in politically turbulent Texas was announced by Stephen Mitchell, chairman of the Democratic National Committee in Washington.

Rayburn told the Associated Press, "I think we're going to carry Texas and elect Adlai Stevenson. President. We will set up organizations in every county of the state."

Rayburn's staunch party stand is at odds with the stand taken by Shivers and Daniel who have announced they cannot support the Illinois governor for President because he advocates federal ownership of the Tidelands.

**Shivers Silent**

The September 8 State Democratic Convention at Amarillo, under Shivers control, voted to place Stevenson and Senator John Sparkman of Alabama on the Texas ballot, but they called on Texas Democrats to support the Republican ticket.

At Beaumont, Shivers declined comment when he was told Rayburn had been named to lead the Stevenson "loyalist" forces.

Rayburn said the Democratic nominee definitely would visit Texas during the campaign and said there would be a state-wide rally but he didn't yet know exactly when. He said he would open state headquarters in Dallas Monday with a complete staff.

"I feel all right," he said when asked if he was optimistic about the campaign.

## U. S. Gets New Home For Moscow Embassy

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The United States has signed a lease for a new embassy headquarters building in Moscow in a deal which the State Department says will save the taxpayers \$48,000 a year.

The long-term lease was signed last week for the 10-story Tchaikovsky Building in downtown Moscow. It will serve both as offices for Ambassador George F. Kennan and his staff of more than 100 Americans, and as living quarters for most of the group.

## Danish Girl Sees America; No Trouble Hitching Rides

DENVER—(AP)—A slender, brown-haired Danish girl is spending these fine Fall days hitchhiking through the West on a seeing America tour that already has taken her through more of the United States than many Americans see in a life time.

Anette Brodsgaard, 23, packs 60 pounds of belongings in a rucksack on her back and says she has no trouble getting automobile rides. "Sometimes they make, how you

call, a pass," she said in Denver, "but they treat me with respect when I tell them no go."

Anette left Denver September 10, heading for San Francisco.

She is from Roskilde, a small town near Copenhagen, where her father is a doctor. She declined to give his name.

Anette, who speaks English creditably, worked as a secretary for an export business back home until a year ago when she drew her savings, gathered up her belongings and sailed for New York.

She worked there for an import-firm until last December when she decided on a warmer setting—Florida. Later she moved on to Texas then decided on her hitchhiking tour as the best way of seeing lots of the United States.

By the time she reached Denver, she figured she had covered 8,000 miles, taking in such points as El Paso, Carlsbad, N. M., Oklahoma City, Kansas City, Little Rock, Memphis, Detroit, Chicago, Minneapolis, Omaha, Bismarck, N. D., and Cheyenne, Wyo.

Anette, who has had plenty of time and opportunity to study the American woman, says they "spend too much time on their looks. They want attention and are very spoiled by the men. The women are much skinnier here and dress with more care."

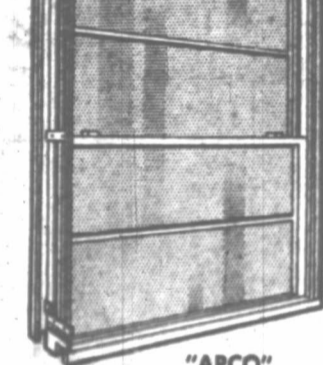

# Navy Sees Bright Future For Guided Missile Craft

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Navy Friday sees in its "pilotless suicide planes" a possible \$300 answer to low-level bombing, a special problem that has been costly in lives in Korea.

That \$300 is the approximate cost given by a Navy representative for converting a \$60,000 obsolete plane—of which the Navy has thousands in magazines—into a needed weapon in the mountainous terrain of Korea.

This, several Navy representatives said in interview, is the reason for Navy enthusiasm over the latest news in air warfare—Navy robot planes, equipped with television eyes and a 2,000 pound bomb, which dived onto North Korean targets.

## Cool Front Sweeps Much Of Continent; South Stays Warm

# Aiken, Ellender Disagree On Grain Shortage Losses

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senator George D. Aiken (R-Vt.) said Friday a Senate probe of shortages in government grains and farm products shows "about 10 million dollars that was stolen."

At the same time Chairman Allen Ellender (D-La.) said in New Orleans that the Senate Agriculture Committee will meet here Tuesday to consider a report on an investigation of the shortages, conducted earlier this year.

"It's a pretty good report and the public is entitled to see it," Aiken said. "I would not change more than a dozen words in it and that would be only for clarification."

Aiken, who previously had complained of not being able to get a look at the report, said he received a copy this week marked "confidential" with a request by Chairman Ellender that the document not be made public or even shown to senators' office assistants.

Aiken said most of the losses were in government grain accumulated under farm price support program and stored by Agriculture Department agencies with private warehouse and elevator operators.

Reagan Blames Operators  
During the public hearings when grain shortages were estimated a about seven million dollars, Secretary of Agriculture Brannan testified that this was not the fault of his subordinates but the private warehouse and elevator operators.

He said the losses were relatively small in a program that involved some 10 billion dollars worth of farm commodities. He predicted recoveries would cut the net or actual loss to less than a million dollars.

Ellender said a review of the report would reflect "quite a bit of criticism on how the matter was handled." He added:

"The recalculation took place with those whom the OCC (Commodity Credit Corporation) had dealt with . . . The private warehouse operators embossed the grain and bulled the market, hoping to sell it at top prices and then make restitution."

"The plan misfired and the warehouse operators were unable to make the grain good."

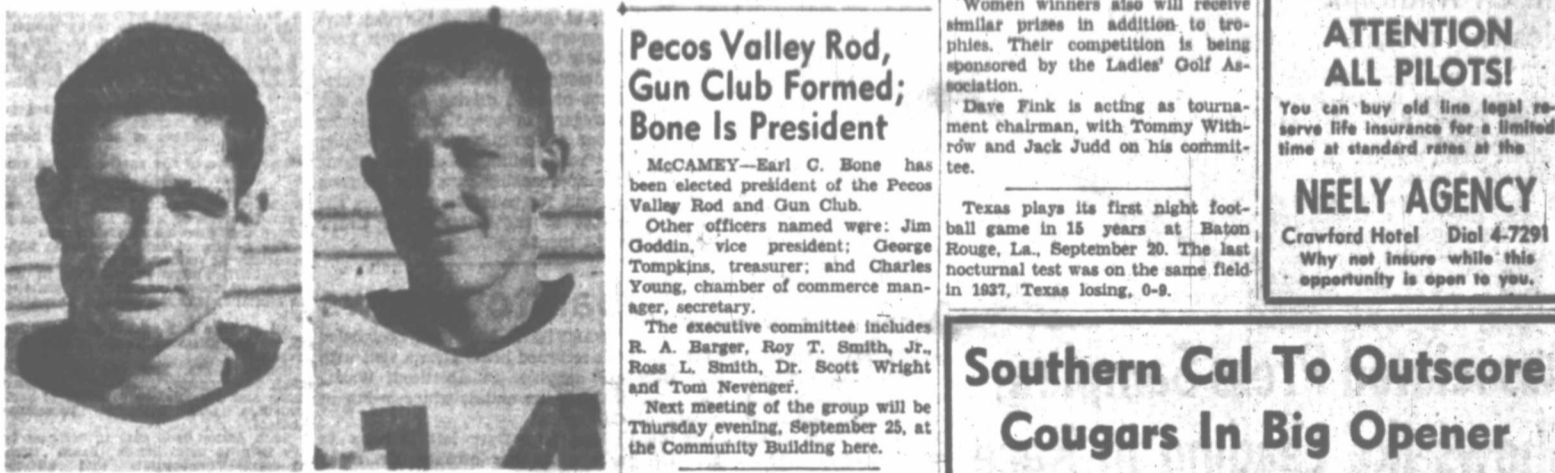
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### Texas Tech Seeking Ninth Border Title In 18-Year Period

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NO HAND IN THE PORK BARREL—

Everybody Getting Richer Except White Collar Clan

By HAL BOYLE
NEW YORK (AP)—Uncle Sam's most neglected nephew today is the white collar man.

In the midst of a still booming national prosperity that is either post-war or pre-war (or perhaps both) the fellow in the frayed white collar is getting mostly crumbs. He eats last.

He is one of the largest classes in America, but who cares what happens to him except himself? He is the forgotten man of politics.

A politician may wag his tail to get organized labor's vote, sit up and beg for the organized farm vote, or wrap himself in the flag to win the organized veteran's vote.

But how long has it been since you remember a statesman rearing up in Congress and announcing: "Well, boys, let's roll out a big pork barrel and help that pore little fellow with the dirty white collar?"

It is said that statistics can be used to prove anything. But no one yet has come up with any statistics to show the white collar man is doing as well as other segments of the population.

This has brought a decline in the prestige of the white collar class, which formerly prided itself on the fact that it rubbed up against wealth but now is learning to its vast sorrow that very little of that wealth rubs off on it.

Once Envious, Now Filled The skilled worker a generation ago often disliked the white collar man and regarded him as a snob. Now he feels the gent with the pale throat harness is not only a snob—but a poor snob at that, and envies him not at all.

The social gulf that difference in attire once made between them has been more than wiped out by the difference in pay, which now sharply favors the guy in the stylish blue overalls.

The plumber, the bricklayer, the machinist used to be a renter and a lunchbox carrier. Today he owns his own home, his own car, and lunches in a restaurant whenever the mood seizes him.

Who now goes to his job "toting a cheese sandwich and an apple in a paper bag? Thousands and thousands of white collar workers. And they go home to a small parlor, bedroom and kitchenette.

No Night Clubbing Who can better afford to take his leisure out now and then for a little night clubbing? The guy in the overalls. But after he dolls up for the evening you can't tell him from a millionaire.

The office clerk, bookkeeper, or bank teller, however, not only lacks the folding green to pick up a night club tab, he has to stay home so his shirt is still clean enough to wear another day.

A cab driver I road with the other day summed up the problem of the white collar worker: "I worked in an office for years and finally got up to \$60 a week. But my wife and I and the kid were starving on that. Then I took to hacking. Now I get fresh air and feel healthier. I can get by on the job with a sports shirt and an old pair of slacks. I work longer hours, but it's a bad week I don't bring home \$60 or better."

"I say to hell with white collar jobs. I'd rather support my wife than a laundry."

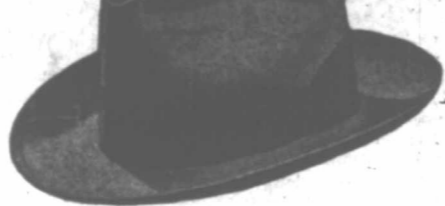

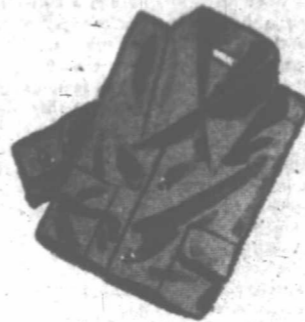

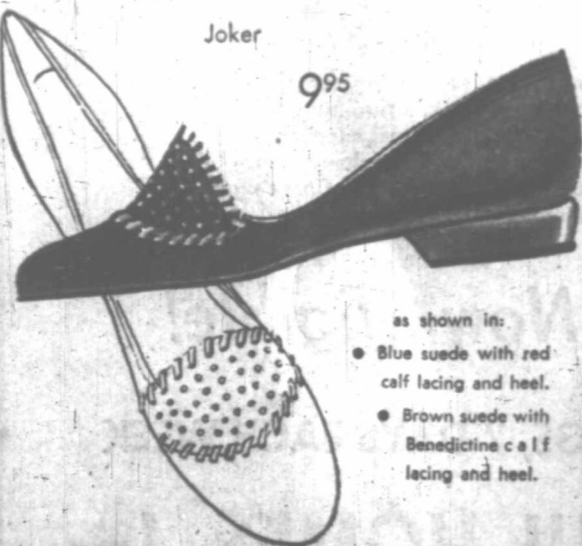

MICHIGAN CITY, IND.—(P)—A baby girl was born Thursday to Mrs. James Lyons in the same hospital where her first baby—a son—disappeared last October 13.

The baby is being kept in the same room with Mrs. Lyons instead of the St. Anthony Hospital nursery from which her infant son, Lawrence, vanished almost a year ago. A nation-wide search revealed no trace of the boy.

### Joe Short, News Secretary To President Truman, Dies

WASHINGTON —(P)— White House Press Secretary Joseph H. Short, 44, died unexpectedly Thursday night at his home in nearby Alexandria, Va.

No immediate cause of death was given. Mrs. Short, the former Beth Campbell, said she heard him fall upstairs, ran up and found his heart had stopped.

Short, a native of Vicksburg, Miss., had been President Truman's press secretary since Dec. 18, 1950. A newsmen since 1925, he succeeded Charles O. Ross, who had collapsed and died at his desk.

The White House said Short became ill last Thursday night and was hospitalized with a virus infection. He returned home Monday to recuperate.

"Joe Short's death," President Truman said in a statement, "is as shocking to me as if he had been a member of my own family."

### Mexico Sets Cattle Export Quota To U. S. At 200,000

MEXICO CITY —(P)— The government Thursday set an export quota of 200,000 head of cattle to be sent to the U. S. during the rest of this year.

The Agriculture Department gave no details of how many cattle each of Mexico's northern states may export.

The movement of the cattle will be the first since an outbreak of foot and mouth disease closed the border in 1946. The quarantine was lifted September 1, but Mexico still had restriction on the export of beef cattle.

The quota was unexpectedly large, since Mexico's normal export of cattle to the U. S. before the quarantine was only 400,000 to 500,000 a year. She now can send about half of that in the remaining quarter of the year. There still will be a lag of 10 days while the Ministry of Nations for export quotas from individual shippers.

Meat Given Priority  
The government said the ministry "will take steps to insure that the meat shall not become scarce in Mexico, that the price shall not rise, and that priority shall be given to fresh or canned meat" rather than live cattle. Mexico has 18 packing plants built during the quaran-

time but has had considerable trouble in selling their product abroad.

The quota system was established last Spring when it was apparent the border would be reopened. Government officials feared that without export restrictions, the high price of meat in the U. S. would attract so many cattle to the U. S. market that Mexico could be left short.

The quota is not expected to have any effect on U. S. prices. It represents less than one per cent of the beef cattle slaughtered annually in the U. S.

### Demo BroadSides Enroute To Voters

WASHINGTON —(P)— Pamphlets and leaflets, dealing with the Democratic party's record and presidential election candidates are on their way Friday to voters throughout the country.

The Democratic National Committee said the campaign material, to be distributed by party headquarters in each state, includes: A pamphlet, in five colors, listing the achievements of Illinois Gov. Adlai Stevenson and Senator John Sparkman of Alabama, nominees for President and vice president, respectively.

Five leaflets which attack the Republicans' voting record in Congress, list the work of Democratic administrations and discuss farm, labor and business issues.

### Father's Caution Futile; Child Dies

PETALUMA, CALIF.—(P)— Manuel F. Perry, Jr., wanted to make sure he didn't run over his little girl.

Before driving his one and one-half ton truck into the garage Thursday, he picked up 18-month-old Joyce Marie and carried her into his house.

As the cattle buyer drove toward the garage, his wife, Marie, screamed. Perry slammed on the brakes too late. He found his daughter under a front wheel, her head crushed. She had run back out while he was starting the truck.
