Texas Demos For Ike Rap Sam Rayburn

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas Democrats for Eisenhower said Monday Speaker Sam Rayburn has put political obligations "to the Truman crowd above loyalty to Texas."

Claud H. Gilmer of Rocksprings, chairman of the Eisenhower Democrats, said Rayburn has "pointedly ignored the instructions of the Texas Democratic convention, which called upon Democratic nominees to support Eisenhower."

Gilmer's written statement was issued coincidentally with the opening of state headquarters of the Democrats for Eisenhower movement.

"Mr. Rayburn has publicly threatened, Texas members of Congress with reprisals unless they ignore the mandate of the Democratic Party of Texas. They must join in the program to continue the Fair Deal another four years or incur the wrath of Mr. Rayburn and Mr. Truman. It is regrettable that the speaker find it necessary to whip his colleagues into line in such a manner."

Area 'Bootlegging Ring' Probe Starts

AUSTIN — (AP) — Charges that bribery and corruption kept a multi-million dollar West Texas bootlegging syndicate in business came under the exploring eye of the House Crime Investigating Committee here Monday.

The investigators subpoenaed records of West Texas wholesale and retail liquor dealers and banks and asked the state liquor control board to produce personnel files and other documents.

Odessa wholesale liquor dealers under subpoena Monday were the Badger-Herring Sales and Drug Company; Glazer's Wholesale Drug Company; McKesson-Robbins, Inc.; Southwestern Drug Corporation.

The individuals under subpoena: Tom Roden, W. F. Roden, T. O. Roden, C. W. Coyle, F. C. Young, G. W. Wood, all of Odessa; Olen Cole and John J. McCowan of Big Spring; A. W. Ellington of San Angelo. Crime committee records listed them as connected with Pinkie's Liquor Stores.

Also, Hubert Odum of Odessa, listed as connected with Cecil's Liquor Stores. Monday the committee also listed these additional witnesses:

SEOUL, KOREA — (AP) — Allied troops, advancing behind a curtain of tank fire, Monday recaptured an Eastern Front hill after 18 hours of continuous fighting.

The UN troops had lost the peak, northeast of the Punchbowl, to a North Korean battalion in a pre-dawn battle that marked a shift of Red pressure from the Western Front to the East.

Nixon To Air Expense Fund Tale Tuesday

Senator Richard Nixon interrupted his campaign tour Monday to prepare a report to the nation on the \$18,000 gift controversy. And Adlai Stevenson once again urged repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act.

Nixon announced his change in campaign plans at a hastily-assembled news conference in Portland, Ore. He said his nationwide address will be given at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday (CST), that it will originate in Los Angeles and last a half-hour. He said it will be carried on television by NBC and on radio by CBS and Mutual.

Stevenson Makes His In a speech prepared for the AFL convention in New York, the Democratic nominee raked Dwight Eisenhower for saying Stevenson favored compulsory arbitration in labor disputes.

Referring to a statement to that effect by Eisenhower before the same AFL convention, Stevenson declared: "If he wrote what he said, he had not read what I said."

Meanwhile, the Eisenhower whistle-stop train chugged on through the Midwest with the Nixon affair still front and center.

Eisenhower, the Republican presidential candidate, and Nixon, his vice presidential running mate, conferred by telephone Sunday night for the first time since the story of the \$18,000 contributions broke Thursday.

Eisenhower's press chief, James Hagerty, told reporters only that the general and Nixon spoke 15 minutes. He would not say when Eisenhower would decide whether to keep Nixon on the ticket with him.

No Idea Of Quitting Nixon's announcement that he would make a radio-television report Tuesday night and that he would resume his campaigning after that seemed to indicate that he has no intention of bowing out of the race.

Although Nixon said, he is breaking off his Western campaign tour, he added: "I shall resume the tour the day after the broadcast is made."

A reporter asked if that meant he was staying on the GOP ticket—a question raised in the political furor surrounding disclosure of the \$18,000 fund donated by 76 Californians for Nixon's senatorial expenses.

"That means," Nixon replied, "I intend to continue the tour."

Newspapers Look Askance At Adlai's Sources Of Money

CHICAGO — (AP) — Newspapers Monday began inquiring into handling of campaign funds in behalf of Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, Democratic presidential candidate.

The Chicago Daily News, under a headline saying "Adlai's Aides 'Put Bite' On 1,000 Firms," said "Gov. Stevenson's aides kept a list of more than 1,000 business corporations and state suppliers who were solicited for campaign and expense funds."

"The Chicago Tribune, under a heading 'Stevenson uses fund raised for governor race,' said Sunday that 'money raised in Illinois as a personal fund' for Governor Stevenson in his bid for a second term as governor now is being used to pay for his campaign for the presidency, it was admitted Sunday night."

Stevenson was campaigning in New York and was not available immediately for comment.

Tripplehorn To Dig Clear Fork Wildcat In W-C Andrews

Tripplehorn Oil Company of Fort Worth is to drill a 1,500-foot wildcat in West-Central Andrews County to try for production in the Clear Fork-Permian lime.

The project is to be Tripplehorn No. 1 J. W. Gowen. It is 330 feet from south and west lines of the north-west quarter of section 15, block A-42, pal survey.

The exploration is eight miles southwest of the town of Andrews. An Old Shallow Producer

The project is an old shallow producer from pay in the upper Permian above 4,700 feet. It is on the east side of the Furman-Mascho (San Andrews) field.

There is no production from the Clear Fork anywhere in the vicinity of the Tripplehorn No. 1 Gowen. The opening operation is to be started by October 5. Rotary tools will be used.

Lyle Gets Show Of Gas, Oil In Strawn At Sutton Wildcat

W. M. Lyle of Midland found a good show of gas and some oil in the top of the Strawn-Pennsylvanian lime, in his No. 1 G. C. Allison, Northeast Sutton County wildcat.

The shows came in a drillstem test at 8,013-60 feet. Length of the test was not reported. Gas surfaced in seven minutes. The gas volume was estimated to have been at the rate of one million cubic feet per day.

No Signs of Water Recovery, when the drill pipe was pulled, was 385 feet of oil and gas out drilling mud. There were no signs of formation water.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was 225 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure was 1,985 pounds. Length of the shut-in was not reported.

Operator was to drill 80 feet deeper and then run another drillstem test.

Northeast of Sonora The wildcat is 15 miles northeast of Sonora and five miles south of the two-well Allison gas field which is currently shut-in.

Location is 600 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 90, block 3, TW2N2G survey.

Three Dry Holes Are Reported In Gaines Sectors

Three wildcat failures have been reported in Gaines County.

Union Oil Company of California No. 1 Dunbar, located in the southwest portion of the county, was abandoned in the Wichita on total depth of 7,204 feet.

Estimated top of that formation is at 7,250 feet, elevation 3,563 feet. Operator found no shows in the Wichita worth testing. Last drillstem test was in the Clear Fork at 7,078-1,117 feet. Tool was open one hour. Recovery was 940-foot water blanket and 96 feet of slightly oil and gas-out mud.

Location was 600 feet from north and 2,925 feet from east lines of section 25, block A-12, pal survey. Hancock Failure

The Hancock Oil Company abandoned No. 1 E. O. Nelson in South-Central Gaines County. It was drilled to total depth of 6,149 feet in the Clear Fork. No drillstem test was taken in that formation which was stopped at 6,130 feet, elevation 3,364 feet.

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 W. C. Hicks, Southeast Gaines County wildcat, has been plugged and abandoned for the second time. Ellenburger Bottom

Originally drilled to 13,271 feet, in the Ellenburger where it failed to make a producer, it was re-entered and drilled out to 11,417 feet. Casing was set and the Pennsylvania was tested extensively through perforations. Commercial production failed to develop.

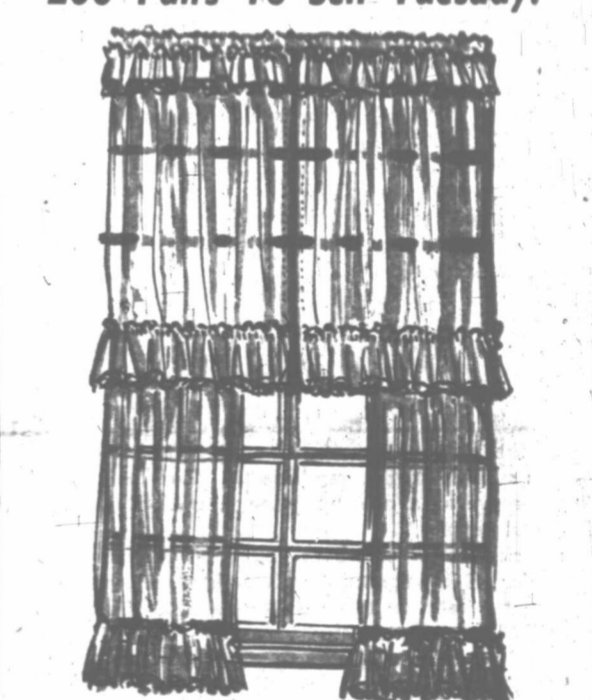

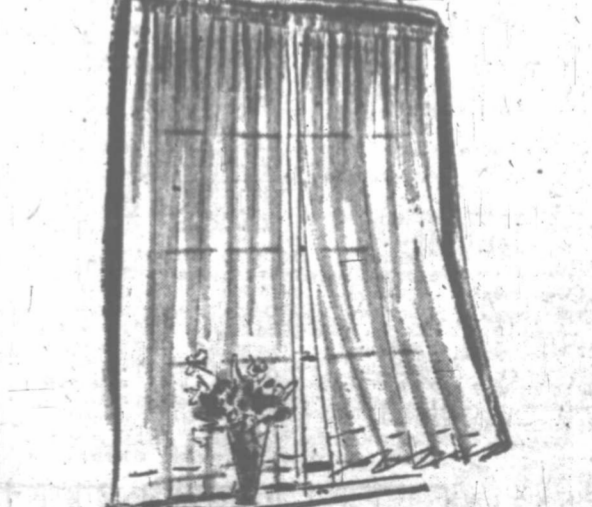

NATO'S Record Warns Reds

The career of NATO has been beset by differences among the Western nations, by setbacks, downward revisions of goals, confusions and dire predictions of final failure.

But despite all, the organization was effectively put in being and latest reports indicate it is not far from achieving the reasonable goals set for it last Winter at Lisbon.

U. S. officials at the Pentagon say the objective of 4,000 combat-ready aircraft by December 31 will be missed by only five or six per cent.

The aim of 50 land divisions, 25 fit for combat and 25 in reserve, will be "comfortably close" to fulfillment.

These figures are somewhat tentative. The complete and exact state of readiness achieved this year will not be known until NATO holds a meeting December 15 to set fresh goals for 1953 and 1954.

Pentagon officers declare NATO commanders are happy both over the quality of their troops and the kind and amounts of their equipment.

The intention was and is to deter the Soviet Union from aggression by creating a force which, in combination with our atomic potential, would be of sufficient stature to convince the Reds that any invasion would be ruinous for them.

If the 1952 goals are even roughly approved, this constitutes substantial accomplishment. The record of 1952 should serve as a healthy guide to NATO planning for 1953 and beyond.

It should serve also to notify the Kremlin that the West, for all its intra-family differences, is capable of doing what it sets out to do.

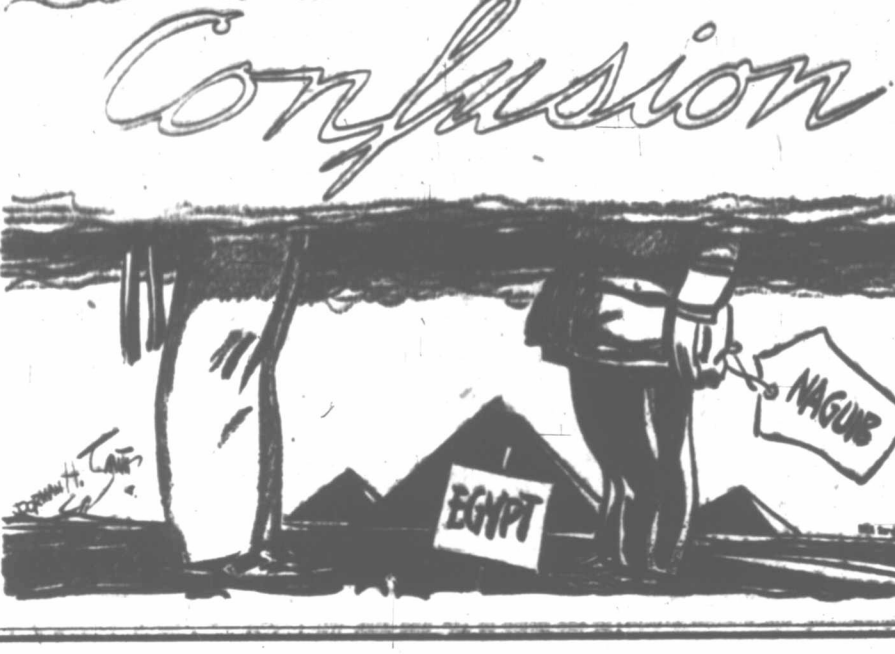

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

Drew Pearson says: News coverage of candidates means digging below the surface; Stevenson has "influence man" on his staff; Eisenhower received favorable tax ruling on book profits.

WASHINGTON—Governor Stevenson complained recently about a one-party press and the fact that 75 per cent of the newspapers are against the Democrats.

When, over a period of years, a column has unscrupled the extracurricular activities of Maj. Gen. Harry Vaughan, the events which helped send John Marston to jail, the income-tax finagling of Internal Revenue official Dan Bolich, the Egyptian cotton leaks which led to the indictment of Clovis Walker, etc., naturally it accumulates into a big stockpile of political ammunition.

However, this is not only a reporter's job but it so happens that my score-sheet contains quite a few Republicans, such as the kick-backs that resulted in jail sentences for Congressman Parnell Thomas of New Jersey and Walter Brum of Ohio; also the lobbying of Senator Owen Brewster which led to his defeat; the \$10,000 Lustron fee of Senator McCarthy and the tax finagling of Senate Republican leader Styles Bridges of New Hampshire.

Covering the news consists not only of reporting what goes on from day to day, but digging up the things below the surface which some people don't want dug up but which the public has a right to know about.

In fulfilling this reporter's obligations, however, I personally shall do my best to be fair to both sides, and do equal digging regarding both parties and candidates.

To this end, here is the result of some digging in the Stevenson entourage which shows one of his men was something of an influence-peddler; also the answer to questions asked by a great many readers regarding General Eisenhower's possible use of influence in paying only a capital-gains tax on his book, "Crusade in Europe."

The man on Stevenson's staff who sold influence is Neal Roach, assistant treasurer of the Democratic National Committee, and now organizer of train and airplane

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

"Please discuss the opening lead in the accompanying hand," requests a Memphis reader. "Does East's double call for a club lead or merely for some thoughtful lead?"

"With a club lead, South can make the slam. If West leads either red suit, however, South is set. West actually led the ten of hearts, and East ruffed. A trump return now led to a set of two tricks.

"As you can see, the double turned out well, but the argument over the hand still rages. Many of our best players say that the double calls for a club opening lead without any ifs, ands or buts. Is this correct?"

Many first-class players follow the principle that a slam double calls for an opening lead in the first side suit bid by the dummy. If you want

some other suit lead, you just don't double; and there's at least an even chance that your partner will guess right.

In the case of today's hand, if East belongs to that school of thought he should not double six spades. West will then open a red suit, and the slam will be defeated. It's true that East greatly prefers a heart lead, but he cannot have everything. If he uses the slam double to call for a particular lead, he must expect to run into a hand now and then that would work better with a different convention on opening leads.

Certain other fine players use the slam double not to indicate a particular suit but to forbid the "expected" opening lead and to request a thoughtful choice. For example, if there is only one unbid suit and that is the "expected" lead, the slam double forbids that lead.

If East and West are using that sort of general slam double, West should rarely lead a heart. He expects his partner to ruff, and he leads his longest suit in the hope of finding the ruff.

Note that West would not expect his partner to be short in clubs. North's "slam" club bid is almost surely a cue-bid rather than a real suit. Hence North and South should not have nine clubs between them.

The question of whether East should double in this hand—or of what opening lead the double requests, is therefore a matter of partnership understanding. Either convention works well—provided that your partner knows which one you're using.

DR. JORDAN SAYS

Epilepsy Is Probable Cause Of Frequent Spells Of Convulsions

By EDWIN F. JORDAN, M. D. Written for NEA Service

I should like to quote at some length from a letter recently received from an 18-year-old girl. She writes:

"I am subject to convulsions which began before I was a year old, and right after recovering from polio. I quit having them at the age of seven, but they reappeared when I was about 14.

"At first the spells were 18 months apart; then the intervals between them were as follows: 12 months, nine months, six months, and now they appear three months apart, three days after any event such as holidays, visits to dentists, and moving from one house to another.

"I have had many different opinions as to the cause of these spells, including epilepsy, too much liquid, too much candy, strained eyes, decayed teeth (which have since been removed) and strain from being unable to use my right hand much. Many treatments have been tried, but the convulsions still persist.

"I am never left alone at all, even at home. I have had a very good education and am now in college. I have had a very good job and am now in a very good position. I am very happy and content with my life.

CHERBOURG, FRANCE (AP)—Without political convictions and a firm believer in individualism and liberty, Charlie Chaplin, in high good humor despite a U. S. threat to bar him from returning to America, declared Monday, "I intend to go back to the United States."

**Sweden Reelects Coalitionist Group**

STOCKHOLM, SWEDEN (AP)—Premier Tage Erlander's Socialist-Agrarian coalition government retained control of Sweden's lower parliamentary house Monday but opposition forces took six seats from the government bloc.

The Communists also got a setback in Sunday's parliamentary elections, losing three of their eight seats. Their voting strength dwindled 30 or so percent in their traditional strongholds. The government won 136 of the 230 lower house seats on the basis of preliminary returns.

**Conspiracy Charge Filed On Six Reds**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department announced Monday that six Communist party leaders have been indicted in Detroit on charges of conspiracy to overthrow the U. S. government by force.

The six were among 18 party leaders rounded up by the FBI last Wednesday in a number of cities across the country. A federal grand jury returned the indictment. The Department said that evidence against the 12 other persons taken into custody on the same day now is being presented to other federal grand juries in St. Louis, Mo., and Seattle, Wash.

**Midlander Backs Nixon In Wrangle**

A wire was sent Sunday by Richard Hugston of Midland, Texas Republican executive committeeman from the 29th Senatorial District, to Senator Richard Nixon upholding his actions in accepting funds from private citizens.

The message follows: "On the evidence submitted to date, the open and above-board expense fund raised in California for your fight on communism has been properly used. If the complete evidence is as satisfactory, this typical attempt of the Socialist and Communists to smear one who opposes them will react strongly in your favor." Nixon is the GOP vice presidential nominee.

**Sister Of Three Polio Victims Ill**

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Three children of Mr. and Mrs. Leo B. Linemanston died last week of polio and Sunday Barbara, 13, awoke and told her mother:

"My head aches and my throat hurts." Spinal tests at Milwaukee's South View Isolation Hospital showed Barbara had become the fourth member of the family to be stricken. But it was not determined if the girl had non-paralytic polio or bulbar, the type that killed her brother and two sisters.

**Orange Police Chief Dies Of Heart Ailment**

ORANGE (AP)—E. L. (Gene) Nancy, 51, Orange police chief, died Monday of a heart ailment. Nancy served as police chief from 1946 to 1950 under mayor Raymond Sanders. He resigned two years ago after a change in administration and was reappointed last month by Orange's new mayor, Sid J. Callavet.

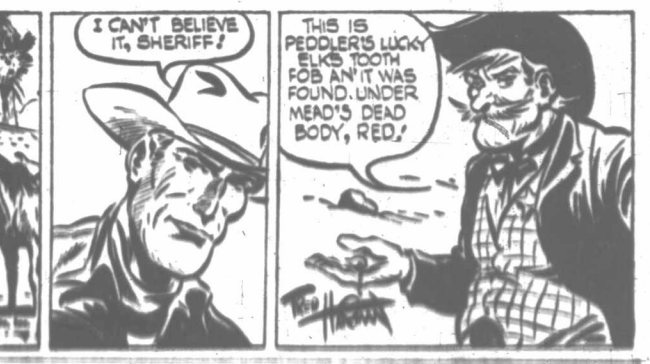

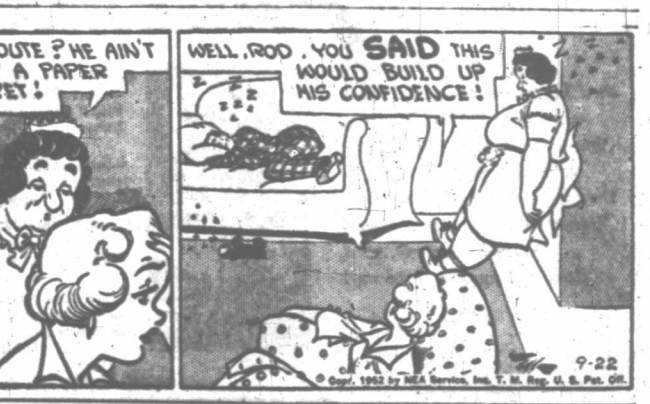

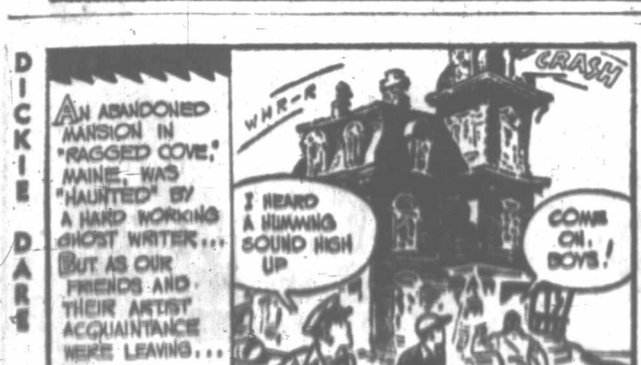

The storied Bums of Flatbush are assured Monday of finishing in no worse than a tie for first place when the curtain falls next Sunday. Manager Charley Dressen's pennant-starved athletes moved to within one victory of clinching the flag Sunday. Joe Black, making his first start of the season, pitched the Dodgers to an 8-2 victory over Boston while the runner-up New York Giants dropped a 6-3 decision to Philadelphia.

The victory boosted Brooklyn's lead over the miracle men of 1951 to six games. Both teams have six games left to play and one Brooklyn triumph or Giant defeat will nullify Brooklyn's first pennant since 1920.

Rice also will be opening the season Saturday night. The Owls get a tough one to start with, too—Texas Tech, which last week clouted West Texas State, 48-7, in a Border Conference game.  
Texas Christian, depressed over its shutout at the hands of Kansas, journeys to Los Angeles to play UCLA. That team opened the season last week with a 13-6 victory over Oregon.  
Houston At Arkansas  
Arkansas plays University of Houston at Fayetteville, furnishing a quick comparison of at least two members of the conference. You can get the comparison two ways—what Texas A&M does against Oklahoma A&M and what Arkansas does against University of Houston.  
Texas demonstrated that it had what it figured would be necessary to win—a good quarterback.

T Jones came into his own as he piloted the Longhorns to their brilliant victory over Louisiana State. Jones scored two touchdowns and passed for one while turning in a top job of generalship.  
Baylor came up with those explosive plays in beating Wake Forest. Each touchdown followed a long pass completion that carried the Bears from deep in their own territory to the other end of the field. C. O. Brocato, a defensive specialist who is earning the reputation of being the greatest man in a clinch in the conference, booted a field goal with only 14 seconds to go to give Baylor its thrilling victory.  
Frog Strategy Backfires  
Ray Graves was the man of the moment in Texas A&M's decision over University of Houston, and Lew Carpenter, the magnificent Arkansas fullback, teamed with Lamar McHan, versatile quarterback, in besting Oklahoma A&M by disappointing margin.

Clinkscale's big game jitters were responsible for Kansas getting off on the winning foot. McKown returned to his old stand and did quite all right but the cause already was lost.

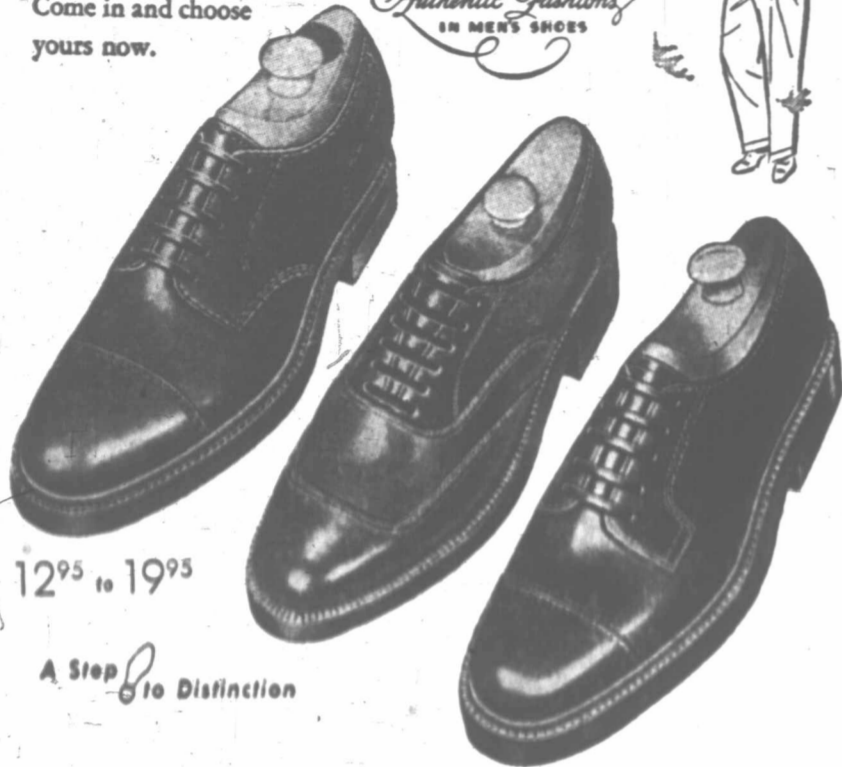

### Powell Buys Interest In Fort Chadbourne Wells From Murray

N. P. Powell of Tyler purchased one-quarter interest in 36 producing wells in the Fort Chadbourne field of Northwest Runnels County from T. W. Murray of San Angelo.  
The deal involved a cash payment of \$1,250,000 and an assignment to Murray of unidentified properties valued at \$250,000.  
Only 34 of the wells are carried on the most recent Railroad Commission of Texas Proration schedule. They have a total allowable of 2,688 barrels of oil daily.

### Harriett Project In Tom Green Gets Big Flow Of Gas

A one-half mile southwest outpost to a recently completed Palo Pinto discovery in the Harriett field of North-Central Tom Green County, flowed approximately 20,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily from the Palo Pinto.  
It is L. E. Scherck No. 1 J. W. Johnson.  
The flow was from perforations at 4,340-44 feet. That section was treated with 500 gallons of mud acid. There was a slight amount of distillate in the recovery.  
Originally completed from the Strawn, the well was plugged back to 4,400 feet.

Testing continued.  
Location is 2,490 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of WCRN survey No. 23.

### Turner Wildcat In NE Terrell Plugged

Fred Turner, Jr., No. 1 H. C. Noelke, Jr., wildcat in Northeast Terrell County, has been plugged and abandoned on total depth of 11,067 feet in the Ellenburger where it made water.

It was plugged back to 2,855 feet where shows in the San Andres were tested through perforations at 2,608-23 feet. That set was washed with 500 gallons of mud acid. The section made sulphur water.  
Five and one-half-inch casing was cemented at 2,855 feet.  
Location was 690 feet from south and 654 feet from east lines of section 50, block B-2, CCSD&RONG survey. It was 11 miles southwest of Sheffield.

## Two Escaped Cons, Officer Die In New York Gun Battle

NEW YORK — (AP)—Two escaped convicts were shot to death Sunday in a furious gun battle with police after leaving a trail of terror across part of Pennsylvania into New York City.

A detective was wounded fatally in the hall of a submachine gun and pistol fire.

The third member of a desperado trio was captured unhurt as 21 policemen blasted their way into the apartment where the fugitives were hiding with three negro women.

Joseph Nolen, 28, and his brother Ballard, 22—two gun-crazy bad men from Harlan County, Ky.—died in the roaring five minutes of close-range fire.

Detective Philip Lamonia, 45, shot three times in the chest, died in a hospital a short time later.

Detective Nicholas Cotter, 34, was wounded seriously.

Captured was Elmer Schuer, 31, of Chicago, who broke out of the Lewisburg, Pa., federal prison with the Nolen brothers September 10. They had been serving long terms for bank robbery.

There was an ironic twist to the capture—the trio never intended to come to New York.

After their escape, they wanted to head for Beranston, Pa., but took a wrong road turn in a stolen car. When they found themselves headed for New York, they figured they might as well "lose themselves" in the crowds of the big city," police said.

Schuer told police about the trio's movements.

Schuer admitted, police said, that the trio stole a dozen weapons from a Bronx gun store last Monday and looted a Bronx bank of \$12,670 in a daring daylight holdup the next day.

A vast manhunt had been pressed for the three men since they escaped from Lewisburg. Terrorizing a large section of Pennsylvania, they held a family of seven captive 19 hours while they hid in their home, stole money and at least three cars, and stabbed a private-duty policeman.

Barred in Apartment  
New York police, converging on a seventh-floor apartment in Uptown Manhattan shortly after Saturday midnight on a tip that the fugitives were holed up there, found the place barricaded.

The fugitives were surprised in a tryst with three negro women, all of whom were seized and held as material witnesses. The apartment bore evidence of a drinking bout.

Police said an unidentified sister of one of the women—Arlene Ball, 39—gave the information that led to the desperado's hideout.

A burst of gunfire—including machine gun blasts from at least one of the fugitives—met the police after they broke down a door of the apartment.

The Nolen brothers kept shooting until they fell dead. Schuer, hiding under the bed with a nude woman, fired several times but finally yielded.

**GARDEN CLUB COUNCIL SHOW TO USE OUT-OF-CITY JUDGES**

Although Mrs. Henderson is an accredited flower show judge, it is the council's policy to use out-of-city judges for the event. Their names will not be released before the show.

"I'm not going to shoot. I give up." The mattress was shredded by bullets. The two other women hid in the bathroom during the gunplay.

Schuer was booked on charges of homicide, felonious assault and violation of the Sullivan anti-weapons law.
