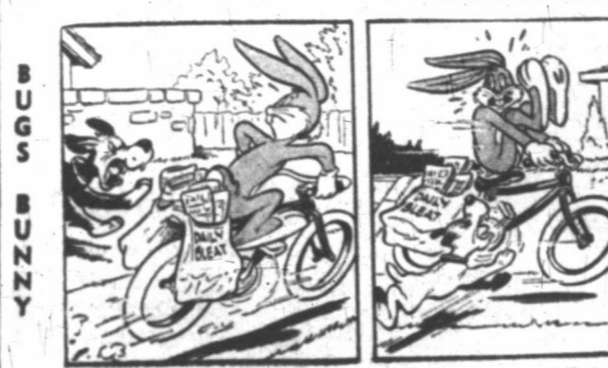
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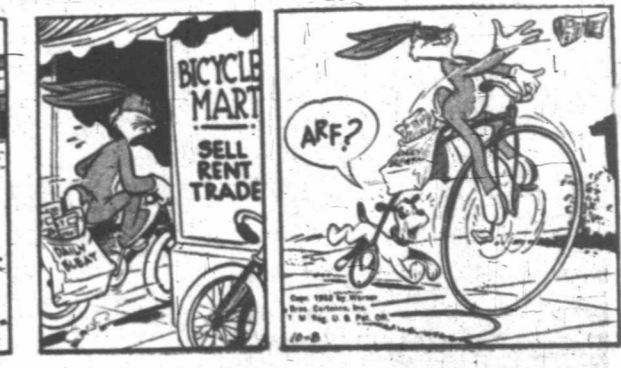

An understanding of atomic energy begins with the atom, smallest unit of any element. Like a solar system, the atom is mostly empty space. In its center is a nucleus, or "sun," composed of tiny particles called protons and neutrons. The number of protons determines the element's chemical nature.

Around the nucleus revolve electrically negative particles called electrons which counterbalance the positive charge of the protons. Neutrons, which are electrically neutral, can, under certain conditions, become protons. Similarly, a proton can lose its positive charge and become a neutron.

It is the tremendous cosmic force that holds the protons and neutrons together that we call atomic, or more correctly, nuclear energy. It is this same force that some scientists believe holds the entire material universe together.

20-YEAR-OLDS DUE FOR DRAFT

Men who have reached their 20th birthday anniversary may now be inducted into the armed forces, Mrs. Nell Roberts, secretary of the Midland draft board, said Wednesday in announcing her November quota.

Twenty men from this area will be inducted on November 16, and another 20 will go for physical tests on the same day. The previous minimum age for induction was 21.

Those sent for physical examination only must be 19 years and 11 months old at least, except in the case of delinquents and volunteers.

Ike, Adlai Campaigners Vie For More Colorful Fair Sites

Big grins and slight chuckles took over usually serious Texas politics Tuesday, at a single-a-minute pace. But it still was politics.

Take the scene at the State Fair of Texas. A pretty blonde in the Stevenson-Sparkman Democratic booth, busy sorting literature to hand out, had time to say a cheery "good morning" to passersby.

"She apparently didn't know what was about to happen across the boulevard."

When the fair opened Saturday, the Democrats had a fair-sized white booth with large placards and a neon sign telling Texans to vote for Adlai Stevenson and his running mate, John Sparkman.

GOP Turquoise

Across the wide street, the Republicans—or Democrats helping them—had a turquoise-painted Eisenhower-Nixon booth, a bit smaller. That was too much for the GOP.

Tuesday morning they finished work on a new booth with windows on all sides and painted red, white and blue. Big billboards went up, and Republicans launched a huge silver balloon with "Ike" printed on it. But still no blonde.

In Houston, Eisenhower-Supporter John Blaffer had let his enthusiasm for the Republican candidate get him in a slight jam.

Blaffer, an oil man, ordered some confetti to throw on a parade planned for Eisenhower next Tuesday when he is in Houston for a speech. But because of a tight schedule, the parade has been cancelled.

What To Do?

Now Oil Man Blaffer has his confetti—a whole truckload—and no place to throw it.

On a downtown Dallas street, a Stevenson backer was telling an "undecided" voter why he should "stay with the Democrats."

Allies Cancel Talks, Put Armistice Issue Squarely Up To Reds

MUNSAN, KOREA—(P)—The Allies Wednesday indefinitely postponed Korean armistice negotiations and bluntly told the Reds the next move was up to them.

The dramatic action was taken on "higher authority," Gen. Mark Clark's headquarters said without elaboration.

The postponement was taken until the Communists either accept an Allied proposal for settling the stalemate over prisoner of war exchange or make "a constructive proposal of their own."

What may prove to be the final break in the talks started 15 months ago, resulted from a deadlock in the knotty problem of prisoner of war exchange, last unsolved item on the agenda.

Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison senior Allied negotiator, said the Allies would return to the truce site any time the Reds were ready to accept one of three alternate Allied plans for settling the POW question or were willing to make "a constructive proposal" in writing.

MORE ALGER HISSES—Nixon Says Adlai Won't Oust Reds

ABOARD NIXON TRAIN—(P)—Senator Richard M. Nixon said Tuesday night, President Truman and Secretary of State Dean Acheson "are trying to destroy the reputation and standing of a great American, Dwight D. Eisenhower, regardless of its cost to the prestige of America."

Speaking to a Republican rally at Canton, Ohio, the Republican vice presidential nominee said, "They now blame Eisenhower for everything, for high prices, for tremendous losses to the Communists—even for Korea."

The California senator, on the first leg of a two-day whistle stop tour of Ohio, said, "In the order of importance the Democratic lineup now reads: Truman, Acheson and Stevenson," and added:

"Stevenson's failure to disavow these dishonest attacks against General Eisenhower by Truman and Acheson has spelled his defeat."

Nixon said it is essential to maintain a sound national economy in order to beat world communism.

"I charge that the record of Truman and Acheson—as well as that of Acheson's former assistant, Adlai Stevenson—gives the American people no hope for safety at home from the sinister threat of communism. If we continue this team in office for another four years, there will be more Alger Hisses, more atomic spies, more crises."

The election of Eisenhower, the senator said, will be the signal for the general to rid the government of Communists "and the people who put them there."

At Canton, Nixon addressed a near-capacity crowd in the 6,000-seat Memorial Hall. A police-estimated crowd of 750 greeted the senator on his arrival at the railroad station.

Earlier, Nixon gave rear-platform talks at Coshocton, Steubenville, Dennison, Newark and Zanesville. Fire Chief Walt Weaver estimated 6,000 persons surrounded Nixon's train platform at Coshocton.

On his swing through the state's Eastern coal-mining area, Nixon said the way to defeat communism "without a war is to win the battle going on for the minds and hearts of the people. It's a spiritual and moral offensive. You've got to get the crooks out of Washington. Eisenhower will restore sound morals."

John Rust, Bill West, WT Pioneers, Die In San Angelo

SAN ANGELO—(P)—Two West Texas pioneers, each 90 years old, died here Tuesday.

They were John Y. Rust, Sr., founder of the San Angelo Telephone Company, and William E. Rust (Bill) West, Crockett County ranchman and banker.

Rust, who retired from active management in 1948, brought the telephone company here in 1899. It grew from 75 customers to 11,000 telephones.

West divided his extensive ranch holdings among his children in 1936 and became chairman of the board of directors of the Osoma National Bank. Some 25 years ago he had 107 sections and 3,000 cattle.

West came to West Texas from Navarro County in the 1870's. Rust was born in Virginia and came to Texas when he was 19. He was the father of Mayor Armistead Rust of San Angelo.

75 More Jets Slate Pacific Hop Thursday

HONOLULU—(P)—Seventy-five F-84G Thunderjets will leave Hickam Field Thursday on the second leg of their mass trans-Pacific flight from California to Japan.

Thirty-three of the jets arrived from Travis Air Force Base, Calif., Monday. They joined 42 which made the flight Monday.

The jets were refueled over the Pacific by B-29 tankers.

Grunwald Escapes Contempt Citation

NEW YORK—(P)—Henry W. (The Dutchman) Grunwald's belated testimony before a federal grand jury in Brooklyn has won him dismissal of a government motion that he be cited for criminal contempt.

The contempt motion against the Washington mystery man was dismissed Tuesday by Federal Judge Matthew T. Abruzzo, who acted at the request of the U. S. attorney's office.

Grunwald first was threatened with the contempt motion last August when he failed to answer a subpoena. He blamed his absence on illness.

But since that time he has given testimony at six appearances before the grand jury, which is probing tax corruption.

Lewis Hints Mine Workers Will Not Back Eisenhower

CINCINNATI—(P)—John L. Lewis still hasn't said in so many words whom he favors for the nation's next President but he declared Tuesday he didn't see how anyone could vote for a man "whom Taft may lead around by the collar."

The reference to Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio was taken to mean by 3,000 United Mine Workers delegates that Lewis, their long-time president, does not favor the candidacy of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican presidential candidate.

Taft currently is on a speaking tour in behalf of Eisenhower and Democratic leaders have claimed Taft is bossing the Eisenhower campaign.

Lewis' speech started off the mine workers' convention, which is expected to last at least a week in Senator Taft's home town.

Terming the Ohio senator "the articulate zombie of predatory and oppressive wealth in America," Lewis said:

"I think it is beyond human comprehension that an American with a child to rear and a wife to protect should ever deign to support him, Taft, for public office or any other man whom Taft may lead around with a collar around his neck."

The United Mine workers, as an organization, haven't come out in support of a presidential candidate since they went along with former President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1936. In the last three elections, however, Lewis has supported the Republican nominees.

A financial report submitted to the delegates showed the union had a balance of \$34,032,833.48 on hand as of last June 30. Four years ago it was \$13,184,834.

Heavy Estate Value May Hit \$56,500,000

LOS ANGELES—(P)—William Randolph Hearst's estate has been appraised at \$40,499,214 on the basis of assets listed so far, but attorneys indicated Wednesday that still other assets to be listed will boost the gross value to \$61.2 million dollars.

A previous inventory listed assets at \$16,970,255, mostly in stocks in oil companies and enterprises other than newspapers. The second inventory, filed Tuesday in Superior Court, includes 66,067 shares of non-voting common stock of the Hearst Corporation, valued at \$40,000,000.

The publisher died August 14, 1961, at the age of 88. He left most of his estate to his widow, Mrs. Millicent V. Hearst, their five sons and charitable foundations.

Texas Democrats For Ike To Hold Meeting Thursday

The Texas Democrats for Eisenhower movement gained momentum in Midland Wednesday.

"We plan to adopt the resolution passed at the Amarillo convention in September that said: 'It is the recommendation of the convention that every Democrat in Texas vote and work for the election of Dwight D. Avery said he planned an organization in Midland County that would conduct a "door to door and face to face campaign." We hope to personally contact every voter in Midland County before election.

"We plan to appoint committees and get to work Thursday night," Avery said.

PARIS, FRANCE—France is a nation made up of actors, the worst of which are on the stage. The best of them are running loose around Paris—on the streets and driving taxi-cabs. That's why one doesn't need to understand French to understand a Frenchman. I may not only get an emotional outburst of words, but a little acting demonstration as well. The theatrics you always understand.

This proves beneficial as my French is limited to such sentences as "le crayon est sur la table," and I never quite know when to use a bit of knowledge.

And when my Texas friends ask me about the mouth-watering French cuisine they probably think I've been enjoying. I may be forced to admit I have ordered blindly, not knowing what I'm pointing to, or else dropped to a cowardly omelet "bifttek" routine.

On the menus, words like "salade," "orange" and "chocolat" have turned out to be salad, orange and chocolate, making me feel extremely clever.

And I've also learned why Chi-

nese visitors to America smile so much. I find myself with that continuous grin—a desperate attempt to assist a few utterly ridiculously mispronounced words get across. When this doesn't work, I can always rely on a "Je ne comprends pas" (I don't understand) which is a means of telling the French something they already know.

One Texan, Lt. Col. Clarke Newlon, formerly of Dallas, was telling me of getting stopped by a Paris policeman for a traffic violation. "Je ne comprends pas," he said, in answer to the heated lecture he got.

"That's the trouble with you Americans—you never understand!" the gentleman answered in English, and then repeated the lecture—in English. He understood.

Visiting SHAPE headquarters just a few miles outside Paris, I met General Matthew B. Ridgway and a dozen or so Texas boys stationed at Supreme Headquarters.

The headquarters is like a small Pentagon, and all nationalities of the NATO organization work side by side, as a Frenchman working for an American who is working for a Britisher and so forth. It is like a miniature United Na-

tions, and in its realm, is of course as important as the UN.

Comparing the two Americans who have headed SHAPE—Generals Eisenhower and Ridgway, Americans over here have been heard to say: "Eisenhower is both a diplomat and a great soldier, whereas Ridgway is a great soldier."

When we met General Ridgway, he was making an acceptance speech for a Freedom House award. Actually, the award won't be made until October 8, but his staff wanted to be ready with TV and newsreel shots of his speech. Although I am not permitted to disclose the contents of the talk, in general he spoke of his faith in the NATO purpose and future.

What really interested me, however, was not the speech itself but the fact that officers of lower rank—in the news division of SHAPE—could give orders to such a man as General Ridgway.

"Straighten your tie," said one. "Take off your glasses," suggested Lt. Samuel Goldwyn, Jr. who was pacing about in Hollywood form, a form he probably acquired in Hollywood from his famous father. "Button your pocket," suggested Major Robert Cranston of Fort Worth, Texas—and one of the top men, militarily speaking, in the world, obeyed orders.

It couldn't happen with anyone but Americans.

General Ridgway was very cooperative with all the suggestions except the one from Lieutenant Goldwyn about leaving off his glasses. After trying unsuccessfully to make out the blurred words of his speech he went to read. Ridgway took command: "Look here," he said, "I'm wearing my glasses. I'm not here for the purposes of a beauty contest."

In a chat later, Ridgway was not so serious, asked about the heat wave Texas had during August and the freak tornado which so drastically crippled the Carswell-based B-36s. "We can't afford tornadoes like that one!" he said.

Finding a Texan in Paris is like finding a football argument this time of year in Texas.

To get my pass out to SHAPE, I had to go to Hotel Astoria (one of the fine hotels along the Champs Elysees which is used by Americans for offices) and to the "SHAPE Dispatcher."

Receiving my pass, I ventured: "Know any boys from Texas?" "W-a-a-l," the corporal answered. "I'm from Galveston."

It was Cpl. Clifton E. Cummings, dispatcher, speaking, a boy homesick to see his state and family.

And Paris? "Oh," he answered. "Paris is very amusing and very expensive—nothing to compare with home."

And here's one man, girl, who doesn't think the Parisian femmes so fatal.

"I'll take a girl from Texas any day." Corporal Cummings said he wished some Texas girls would write him. His address: RA 1436214, 23d T Car Co., APO 55, Postmaster, N. Y. He's 30 years old, single, and will be back in Texas in nine months.

At SHAPE headquarters, I asked

the personnel sergeant-major if he knew any boys from Texas.

"I'm from Fort Worth," he said. I was talking with E. D. Mabe, Jr., who was stationed in Germany before Paris. Of the two he prefers Germany, an attitude not uncommon among servicemen as the German people treat the Americans with more deference and respect generally speaking, and even more important to the GI—everything is much cheaper in Germany.

Other Texans stationed at SHAPE are Lt. Col. John S. Hughes, Fort Worth; Lt. Col. Chester Clifton, San Antonio; Lt. Col. Cecil O. Harris, Bellmead; Lt. Col. Melvin M. Lawson, Cisco; Lt. Col. Paul A. Dresser, Corsicana.

Major Maurice A. Feldt, Lampasas; Capt. Rafael V. Munguia, San Antonio; Capt. Oran S. Coleman, Sandy; CWO-3 Edward S. Mohn, San Antonio; M/Sgt. Earl S. Womack, Naples; SFC Ellis Humphrey, Hockley; Sgt. Joe Raymon, Houston; Sgt. Ivan D. Crowley, Corsicana; Cpl. Harding J. Reese, Fort Worth, and Cpl. Eloise Lucyle Bickers, a WAC, from Dallas.

It was assumed a dozen Americans might clamor for the prize. In the midst of a dead-silence, one lone Scottish officer stood up, and walked off with the radio, for having "I Like Ike" cuff links, which he had to relinquish for his award.

Embarrassed Americans then auctioned off the "Ike" trinkets, with lively bidding.

Mamie Eisenhower heard about it, sent the Scottish officer a new pair of cufflinks, "much nicer than the ones I had," said Major Stuart Chant.

E. M. Taylor, president of the Taylor Publishing Company, in Dallas was so excited in New York getting off on a Paris trip he left

his overcoat at the airport. In Paris, he bought another one. But in Paris, he got excited and left that overcoat, too—somewhere along the way.



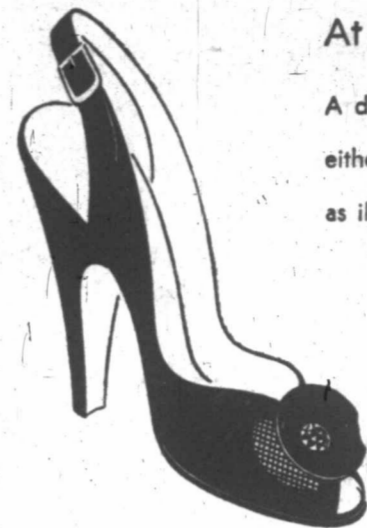

A 220-gallon moonshine still was set up on the sheriff's farm, located about 10 miles northeast of here.

The sheriff and his tenant, Earl West, notified officers here Tuesday the still—one of the largest ever discovered in Larue County, of which Hodgenville is the county seat—had been found in a heavily wooded ravine in a remote section of the farm.

Raiding officers destroyed the steam-operated still, 43 barrels of mash, 500 pounds of corn meal, 200 pounds of sugar, 500 pounds of malt and 13 gallons of moonshine whiskey. No arrests were made.

EL PASO.—(P)—Eight cattlemen and truckers from West Texas were indicted Tuesday by a federal grand jury on charges of conspiring to smuggle cattle into this country from Mexico.

Holvey Williams, assistant U. S. attorney, said 200 head of cattle brought across the Rio Grande have been identified.

The men indicted are Dillard (Dixie) Babb, Wayne Babb, Irving Babb, and Tom E. Grubb, ranchers in the Sierra Blanca area; Leonard Wilkerson, Fred Wilkerson and H. L. Wilkerson, San Angelo truckers, and Joseph T. Marchant, Midland cattle buyer.

According to the indictments, the men took part in the smuggling operation starting Oct. 1, 1951. Cattle were sold in Midland and San Angelo.

Cadet Dies When Trainer Crashes; Officer Injured

SAN ANGELO.—(P)—A Goodfellow Air Force Base cadet was killed and a student officer injured Tuesday when their T-6 trainer crashed near the base.

The plane was making a final approach to the field when it stalled and crashed about one-half mile short of the runway.

Cadet Richard Steele Barnard, 22, of Los Angeles, Calif., was killed. Second Lt. Robert M. Alexander, 25, of Havertown, Pa., had facial cuts but was able to walk from the crash.

Goodfellow officials are investigating the crash. On September 9, two men were killed in a similar training plane crash at almost the same spot.
