Mantle's contributions to his club's 4-2 series clincher Tuesday at Ebbets Field were more spectacular than Stengel's. Everyone in the arena saw the "Pheenom" clout the home run and the single in successive innings-the first left-handed, the second right-handedto put victory beyond reach of the Dodgers.
