

# Europe's Wavering Economy

Red hopes that Western Europe would go broke trying to re-arm, thus driving millions of new recruits into the camps of the revolutionaries, so far have been thwarted. But the picture still isn't rosy.

Trying to produce guns and butter at the same time has been a tough problem for the NATO countries' economic planners. As of right now, however, they are doing much better than might have been expected of them.

Prices in Europe have continued to rise slowly, but most of the Western nations are keeping them in hand. Most wages have been able to keep pace with prices.

John Public still is living at a fair standard in most countries, despite dire predictions. The defense build-up hasn't bettered his lot-it probably has made it a tiny bit worse-but it also hasn't ruined him or sent him running for comfort to the Commies.

The shreat of an economic crack-up still is acute. While anti-inflationary steps have been able to keep the lid on, they also have led to a slowdown in several important fields and many observers are pointing to the prospect of heavy unemployment within a year or so.

Another cause for worry has been a weakening in Europe's overseas trade relations. 



By GAYNOR MADDOX **NEA Food and Markets Editor** Here's a wonderful new steamed pudding from California. It combines chocolate and prunes, and served warm with hard sauce is a flavorful delight.

Steamed Chocolate Prune Pudding (Serves 8 to 10) - One cup cooked prunes, 2 squares unsweetened chocolate, 1/3 cup shortening, 1 cup granulated sugar, 1 egg, 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 tea-spoon salt, 1 cup milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract.

Cut prunes from pits into small pieces. Melt chocolate over hot water and cool slightly. Cream shortening a n d sugar together thoroughly. Add egg and beat well. Blend in melted chocolate. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add to chocolate mixture alternately with milk. Blend in vanilla and prunes

Grease 2-quart mold and sprinkle with sugar. Turn batter into mold and cover closely. Place mold on rack in deep kettle of boiling water, so that water comes half way up sides of mold. Cover kettle and steam 2 hours. Allow to stand 10 minutes.

Invert mold over serving plate to remove pudding. Serve warm with hard sauce.

Note - The pudding may be reheated by steaming over hot water. For something delicious in the ple line, try this redipe: Luscious Frune Pie


(Serves 6-8) Twenty-four marshmallows, 1/2 cup milk, 1 cup cooked prunes, 2 ounces semi-sweet chocolate, 2.3 cup whipping cream, I baked 9-inch graham cracker crumb shell. Combine marshmallows and milk and heat slowly until marshmallows are melted, stirring frequently Cool until slightly thickened. Meanwhile cut prunes from pits into small pieces. Shave chocolate finely with a sharp knife. Whip cream until stiff. Fold cream, prunes and chocolate into thickened marshmallow mixture, and turn into cooled crumb shell. Chill several hours be-




