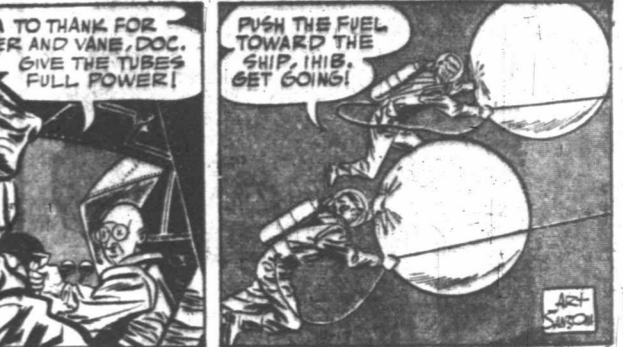

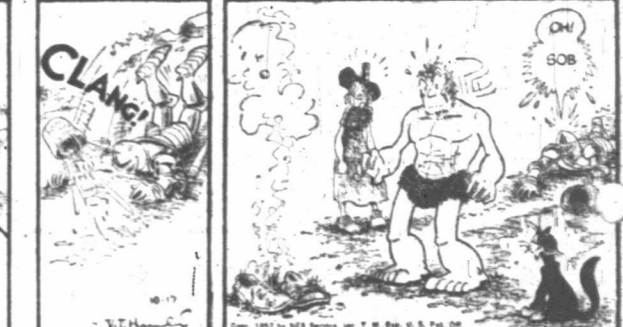

Stalin Keeps All Top Jobs As Soviet Reds Reorganize

MOSCOW—(AP)—The Soviet Communist Party named its new high command Friday and kept Joseph Stalin firmly in all the top jobs. The party's new Central Committee announced election of a Presidium of 25 members and 11 alternates to replace the old Politburo and a 10-man Secretariat to supervise party administration. Stalin was named head of both key groups. Also elected was a new chairman of the Party Council, Committee which has charge of party discipline.

The Presidium is more than twice the size of the old Politburo of 11 members and one alternate. Replacing the Politburo, it will direct the work of the Central Committee between the party's quadrennial full sessions and also will take over the duties of the old Orgburo—the organization bureau—which deal with party organization.

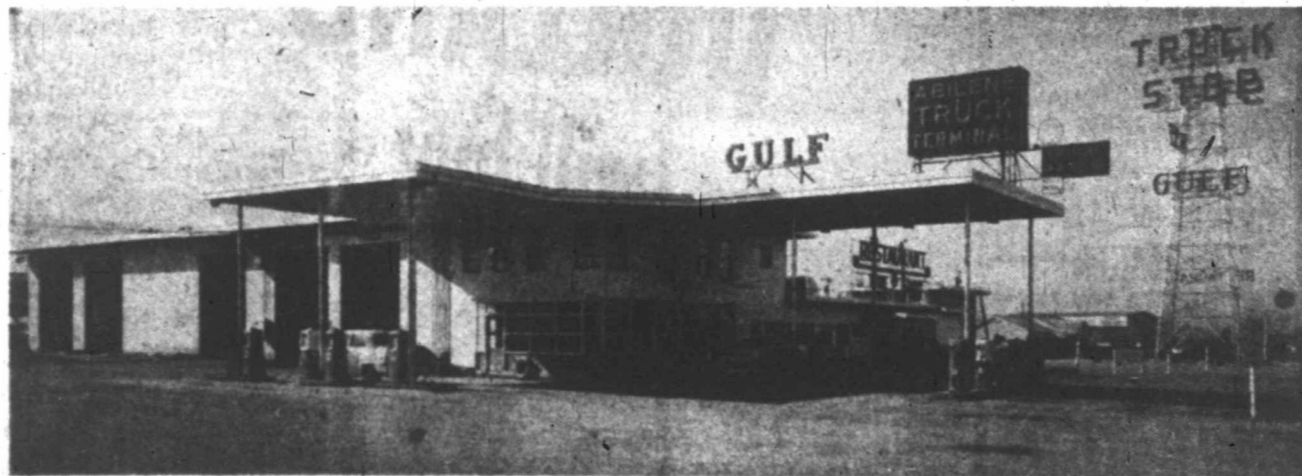

Plymouth Opener In C-W Midland Area Still Flowing Oil

Plymouth Oil Company No. 1 H. S. (Sherwood) Foster, Central-West Midland County discovery from the Strawn-Pennsylvanian lime flowed 299.8 barrels of 47-gravity oil naturally in 24 hours through a one-half-inch tubing choke.
The new field opener still was flowing to test and complete at last report.
Gas-oil ratio during the 24-hour test averaged 1,703-1. Flowing tubing pressure was between 200 pounds 225 pounds. No water was produced from the formation making the oil and gas.

From Perforated Section

The production is from perforated section in the Strawn at 10,370-631 feet.

The wildcat had flowed 144.9 barrels of oil in a previous 12-hour test through a one-half-inch tubing choke.

Average gas-oil ratio during that period was 1,830-1. The flowing tubing pressure was between 150 pounds and 200 pounds.

This discovery is 14 miles west of the city of Midland and 1,980 feet from south and west lines of section 11, block 41, T-2-S, T&P survey.

It is two and one-half miles northwest of the nearest completed oil wells in the Parks (Pennsylvanian) field.

Coal Strike Grows; Agency Studies Pay Boost Legality

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A protest strike of 150,000 miners crept through the nation's coal fields and producers pressed for price increases Friday as the Wage Stabilization Board, plagued by dissension, scheduled another attempt to decide the legality of the recent soft coal pay boost.

Price officials said the Office of Price Stabilization was awaiting WSB action before considering officially the many requests received from producers for a ceiling price increase.

Labor members of the WSB, who have rejected a "suggestion" from a labor mediator Roger Putnam

that the WSB postpone its study of the case for several days, were ready to give their approval to the \$1.90-a-day wage boost.

Twice The High

The increase, negotiated by John L. Lewis last month, cannot be paid until the WSB gives its approval because it is almost twice as high as that automatically applicable under WSB cost-of-living regulations.

But labor members of the WSB, which is composed of labor, industry and public members, have argued that other wage rules justify the increase. They say it is neither inflationary or destabilizing.

Industry members, however, firmly reject that thesis. They say they have seen no evidence to indicate the pay raise is within existing ceilings.

Industry, meanwhile, pressed for either a lifting of ceilings, or an increase, with the OPS maintaining a "wait and see" attitude pending outcome of the WSB ruling.

Many industrial plants now are utilizing mirrors to warn firemen in boiler rooms of unnecessary smoke coming from chimneys.

Lodge, Kennedy Vie For Senate Election In 'Big Name' Race

BOSTON—(AP)—Two "magic names" are battling it out in a tight race for the U. S. senatorship from Massachusetts.

On one side is Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., a "blue blood" Harvard graduate, grandson of a senator, and running for the office for the fourth time. He is the Republican candidate.

On the other is Rep. John F. Kennedy, descendant of an Irish immigrant family, also a Harvard graduate, and a son of the former U. S. ambassador to Great Britain, financier Joseph P. Kennedy. Young Kennedy is running on the state-wide ticket for the first time. He's had three terms in Congress as a Democratic representative.

Lodge was co-chairman of the National Committee for Eisenhower in pre-convention days and was one of the chief lieutenants of the convention fight which won the nomination for Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower at Chicago last July.

A week after that convention, young Kennedy set up a committee of Democratic congressmen to work for the nomination of Adlai Stevenson by the Democrats.

Airmen, Navy Destroyers Team Up On Commie Trains

WITH U. S. FIRST MARINE WING, KOREA—(AP)—Two Marine airmen and two Navy destroyers teamed up the other night to wreck four Communist supply trains.

Capt. Thomas S. Moore, 29, Amarillo, Texas, and his radar observer, 1st Sgt. E. Harvey, Jr., 28, Utica, N. Y., spotted the trains 35 miles southeast of Hungnam in Northeast Korea.

"There were about 70 freight cars," Moore said. "We attacked the longest string, about 30 cars, and bombed and strafed until our ordinance was gone."

Going in low, the Marines found they had blown several cars off the tracks and started two fires in the second train. There were several explosions as ammunition blew up.

Moore flew the F1F Tigercat out to sea looking for a ship that could finish the job. He found two Navy destroyers and directed them by radio to a point offshore.

For an hour and a half while the destroyers poured shells into the train, Moore and Sgt. Harvey circled the target, radiating results and correcting aim.

600 Persons Attend Testimonial Dinner For Wright Morrow

HOUSTON—(AP)—More than 600 persons attended a dinner here Thursday night honoring Wright Morrow, recently resigned Democratic national committeeman from Texas.

Among the dinner guests were every shade and hue of Republican and Democrat. No party lines were observed.

Gov. Allan Shivers, former Gov. W. P. Hobby, J. W. Evans, and Chief Justice John E. Hickman of the Texas Supreme Court made talks praising the white-haired Morrow.

"If we weld together all the virtues of good citizenship," Governor Shivers said, "we arrive at the people we would like to call our neighbors and friends. Wright Morrow is such a person."

"We can say truthfully that he is a man who has carried out the heritage and principles of those pioneers who founded our nation and our state," the governor said.

"Too often, he said, men are given to false values of wealth, social position and political position. He said none are lasting."

"But an accumulation of friends is a lasting thing, something far beyond material possessions. Wright Morrow has those friends. He has been a good neighbor, a good father, a kind and loving husband and a good citizen."

Mexico Bank Seeks Cattle Exports Cut

MEXICO CITY—(AP)—The expected annual export of half a million head of cattle to the U. S. will upset price structure within Mexico, a bank study has predicted.

Banco Nacional de Mexico, the country's largest private bank, urged in its study Thursday that exports be limited to 200,000 head a year, with quotas for each state to make for even distribution.

Cattle exports were renewed a month and a half ago when foot and mouth disease officially was declared wiped out in Mexico.

The bank study pointed out that the price of hides to the important animal leather industry already increased 15 per cent. It warned that a sharp advance in meat prices is to be expected.

Five Pilots Sight Explosion In Sky

NEW ORLEANS—(AP)—The airways traffic control of the U. S. Department of Commerce here said five airline pilots early Friday sighted what the pilots described as a "meteorite which seemed to explode at a very high altitude."

The time was given as 4:10 a.m. The airways traffic authorities said the reports came from the Tennessee Valley, through Arkansas, Texas and from Lafayette, Baton Rouge and LaPlace, La.

These sources said they had no reports of an airplane crash at McNeill, Miss., in the southwestern part of that state. Most of the male residents of that hamlet had driven to an isolated community, Sonos Chapel, three miles northwest of McNeill, on reports that an airplane had exploded in the air at 4:11 a.m.

Safer Human Surgery Aided By Using Mechanical Heart

DETROIT—(AP)—A successful mechanical heart, to give human hearts a holiday, was announced Friday.

For 50 minutes, the amazing little machine pumped a man's blood through his body.

Rumbling like a quiet washing machine, it by-passed the left side of his heart. It detoured the blood coming from his lungs, and pulsed it back into his arteries.

Empty of blood, with no work to do, the still-beating heart was opened to repair a faulty valve.

The man, 41, and not identified, is alive and well today, three months after the historic operation July 3.

With part or all the heart emptied, surgeons can better remove bullets or other objects, repair valves or dangerously bulging weak spots in heart walls, take out tumors, plug holes in the heart's dividing walls. The spare hearts might someday help save people whose own hearts stop.

The human success was announced in the Journal of the American

Medical Association by Dr. F. D. Dorrill, Dr. Edward Hill and Dr. Robert A. Gerlach of Harper Hospital here. General Motors engineers helped develop the mechanical heart, and are working on the artificial lung for humans. The research was supported by the Michigan Heart Association.

This is how the mechanical heart helped the patient: The surgeons opened his chest. A tube was pushed into the pulmonary artery, which brings blood from the lungs. Part of the left auricle was clamped off.

The machine sucked the blood from his auricle, then pumped it back through another tube inserted into the man's aorta—the great main artery coming from the ventricle. For almost an hour no blood was going through the left side of his heart.

For 14 minutes of this time, the surgeons had his heart open, operating on the valve to make it close normally. They sewed up the heart, later disconnected the machine.

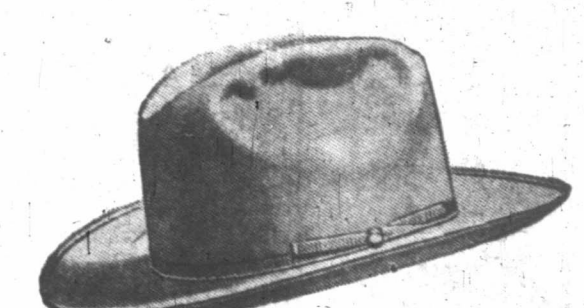
