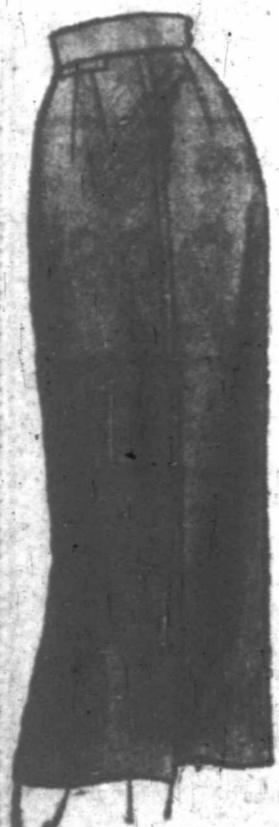

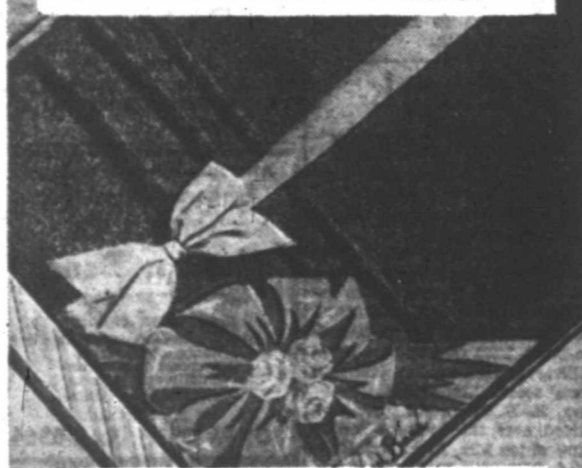

arithmetic, English and history. The groups are kept as small as possible to provide for individual help. The reading groups are limited to 20, the others are slightly larger.

Each student watches his own advancement as he records every day's achievement on a progress chart. When he reaches the point where he no longer needs special help, he transfers to another group. If a child needs help in more than one subject, reading gets priority. However, the decision to enter any group is with the child.

To allow the student an opportunity to explore in varied fields there are groups to learn debating, one for advanced science, and others planned for special work in the shop and home economics laboratory. There has even been a demand by the students for an advanced vocabulary group where they can unravel the mystery of those "ten dollar" words such as "shuddering gloom"—not included in their classes but sometimes in newspapers and on the radio.

GALVESTON (AP)—A Galveston policeman was jailed last night on a charge of raping an 18-year-old negro girl.

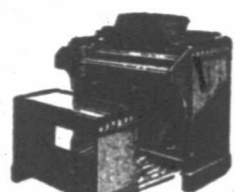
The charge was filed in Justice of the Peace Ralph B. Gustafson's court on her complaint after a report from John Sealy Hospital, where the girl went for examination.

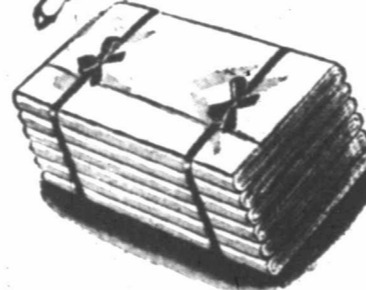

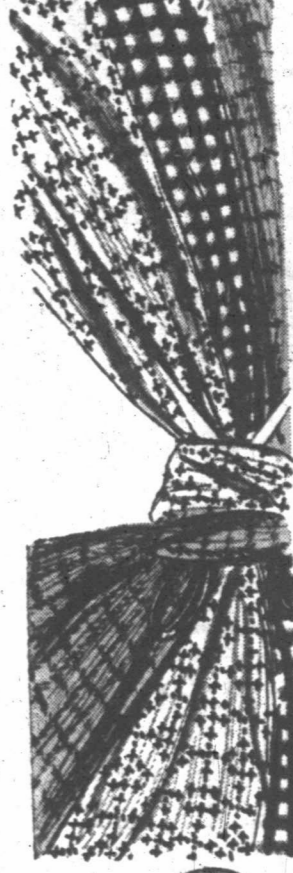

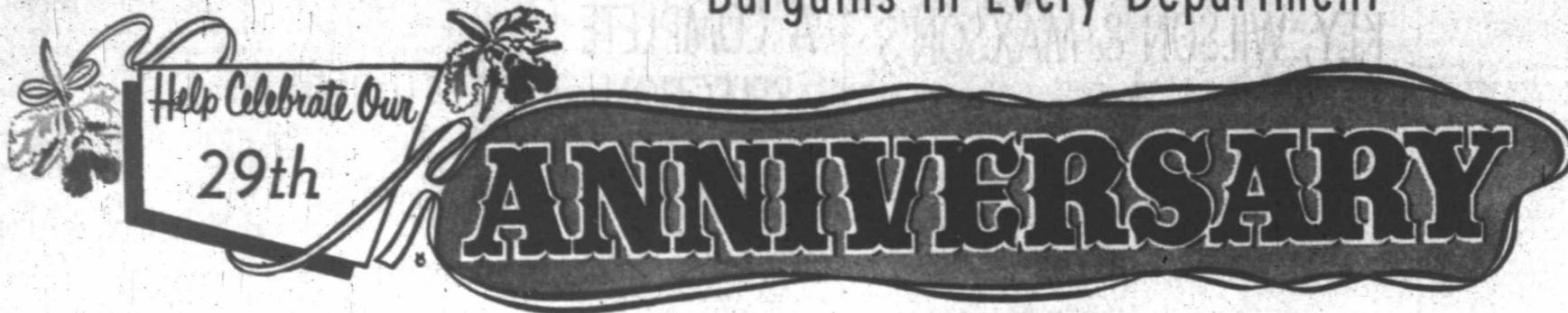

Los Angeles Jurist To Conduct Hearing For Dallas Gambler

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Federal Judge Leon R. Yankwich of Los Angeles will preside over the Nevada removal hearing of Gambler Benny Binion.

Judge Yankwich was named Tuesday after Judge Roger M. Foley, Carson City, Nev., disqualified himself. The hearing was set tentatively for November 13 in Las Vegas, Nev., by Judge Yankwich.

Judge Foley ruled himself out as judge because one of his sons, Joe Foley, is an attorney for Binion, who is wanted in Texas on a gambling indictment.

tried on charges of operating a reputed million-dollar policy wheel syndicate in Dallas County.

Binion recently was allowed to plead no contest in a tax evasion suit. He was given a suspended sentence and fined \$15,000.

Daniel Says Adlai In Error On 10 Tideland Statements

Attorney General price Daniel says Republican Presidential Nominee Dwight Eisenhower would "clean up instead of cover up the mess in Washington."

Daniel, defending his Tideland stand from attack by Adlai Stevenson, said Tuesday night the Democratic presidential nominee's talk on the issue was "erroneous, misleading and an insult to Texas."

The U. S. Senate nominee listed 10 points in which he charged Stevenson erred in his speech last week in Dallas. But the greatest error, Daniel said, was Stevenson's "assumption that only property rights are involved."

"Actually," Daniel continued, "the controversy involves principles of government, of law and of morals that cannot be compromised or ignored."

And the nominee of Republicans and Democrats for U. S. Senator from Texas continued:

**Welfare Said Involved**

"In this controversy we find many of the things about Trumanism which I think should be ended for the future welfare of our state and our nation."

John Roosevelt, son of the late

"We have here one of the best examples of the Truman theory that everything should be centralized in Washington far away from the people themselves. x x x The Texas Tideland grab is an example of the lack of honesty and moral integrity on the part of federal officials who would ignore our annexation agreement and seize our lands."

As Daniel lashed out again for the Republican nominee, there were these other political developments in Texas.

1. An Associated Press political survey showed that Texas' 24 electoral votes were still in the doubtful column and that the undecided voter held the answer in Texas to the "Ike or Adlai" question.

2. Sons of two old political spellbinders headed toward Texas for speeches in behalf of their favorites for the presidency, Russell Long, son of Huey Long, is scheduled to speak in Texarkana Friday in behalf of the Stevenson-Sparkman Democratic ticket. Long is substituting for the ailing Sparkman, who went to bed Tuesday with laryngitis.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt was scheduled to speak the same day at Tyler, Palestine, Marshall, and Lufkin in behalf of the Eisenhower-Nixon Republican team.

3. Senator Nixon, the GOP vice presidential nominee, was to be in Texas for a second time next Monday. Seven cities are on his itinerary this time. On his first Texas visit, early in the campaign, he spoke at Amarillo, Texarkana, Longview, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Midland, and El Paso will see Nixon as he crosses the state.

4. Two other widely known political figures scheduled Texas speeches in behalf of the Stevenson-Sparkman Democratic ticket. U. S. Senator Tom Connally, retiring at the end of the present term, said he would get in his first lick for the Democrats Thursday in Dallas when he speaks before the Democratic Women of Dallas County.

Perle Mesta, ambassador to Luxembourg, scheduled a speech in San Antonio Sunday as part of her campaign for the Democratic ticket.

**Plugs For General**

Daniel said Stevenson joined hands with President Truman on practically every issue "on which I opposed Trumanism in my recent campaign for the U. S. Senate," and continued:

"On the other hand, our own Texas-born Dwight D. Eisenhower has made it clear that he would respect and uphold our annexation agreement and that he would clean up instead of cover up the mess in Washington."

He added that Stevenson leaders in Texas are trying to "scare" Texans into fear of another depression if Administrations are changed.

The attorney general said he was not attempting to suggest how others should vote. He said "loyalty to state and country" impels him to vote for Eisenhower.

"Our prosperity certainly must be false and unsound," Daniel continued, "if it could fade away simply because of a change in Administrations. x x x I am convinced that with its inflation, waste, corruption, high taxes and stalemate war, a continuation of the present Administration will be more likely to bring about economic hardships than a new Administration."

Artillerymen Seek Highest Decoration For Colonel Isbell

WITH SEVENTH DIVISION, KOREA—(AP)—Lt. Col. William H. Isbell, "the old colonel" who died dramatically on Triangle Hill while leading an infantry charge, will be recommended for the Medal of Honor.

U. S. Seventh Division headquarters Wednesday said its artillery section was drafting the citation.

Isbell, of Gambrilla, Md., was called the "old colonel" by young infantrymen, although he was only 45. He had worked his way up the steep slope through intense Chinese Red shellfire to find whether his artillery could be used more effectively.

He found infantrymen pinned down 50 yards short of the crest, walked to the top and called upon them to follow. A Communist dynamite blast killed him.

Odessa Couple Gets Suspended Sentence In Child's Kidnaping

ODESSA—An Odessa couple, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Woods, were given five-year suspended sentences in 70th District Court here Tuesday for the August kidnaping of a nine-year-old Odessa girl.

Both pleaded guilty, and Judge R. W. (Bob) Hamilton said, in giving the suspended sentences, that he was taking into consideration that the couple "meant no harm to the child."

They were charged with kidnaping Eva Lois Phillips, daughter of C. H. Phillips, from her trailer house home on August 13. Eva Lois was found safe in Dallas four days later.

Mrs. R. L. Mathis of Baylor University, Waco, was reelected president of the Women's Missionary Union.

## Ike's Chances In Texas Hinge On 'Silent Voters'

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower has a fighting chance to win Texas' 24 electoral votes and give the South a push toward a real two-party system. But the obstacles strewn in his path are formidable.

President Truman won 70 per cent of the Texas vote in 1948. To chop 21 percentage points off Democratic totals, as Eisenhower must do to triumph this year, is no small enterprise.

The consensus among political experts in this state is that the general already has made important strides toward that end. They believe he still is on the rise. But they also believe that the toughest part of the job lies ahead.

"The glamor and the glitter and the noise are all on the Eisenhower side in this campaign," said one observer. "But thousands upon thousands of Texans are keeping silent. That big silent vote will determine the outcome in Texas."

Democrats' faith in the general's task is somewhat to cut sharply into the hard core of citizens who have been voting Democratic for a lifetime and are reluctant to break the habit.

"With these people voting that way is just like attending their regular church or going to town on Sunday," another expert said. "They don't see any reason to change. Eisenhower leaders have got to try to find one for them, and it won't be easy."

Everyone agrees that Ike has pretty well captured the softer elements in the Texas electorate and is far ahead of Governor Dewey's position of four years ago. His advantages:

1. As a national hero and a native Texan, he has stronger personal appeal.

2. He has the aid of an efficient,

far-flung and well-manned Democratic organization sparked by key lieutenants of Gov. Allan Shivers, whose blessing the general now has.

3. He benefits from a stronger Republican Party led by new men.

4. In the years since 1948, the accumulated resentments of leading Democrats against the northern party leadership have mounted in intensity. Governor Stevenson gave them a new rallying cry when he took a pro-federal stand on the issue whether Texas should govern its Tidelands oil. Ike holds a pro-Texas states' rights view.

5. To his banner have flocked thousands of women and young people, many business and professional men, a surprising number of civic leaders and groups, a big part of the rising middle class that is fattening on the astounding growth of Texas industry.

Many of these people still are nominally Democrats. But it is an accepted fact that generally they are more conservative than most Republicans and often are far more bitter than the GOP in opposition to the Truman Administration. Moreover, it now has become respectable to vote Republican, and thousands are breaking over all the time.

**Strength In Cities**  
This revolutionary ferment is in the cities, and there Eisenhower must look for much of his strength. He must do well in Dallas, where in one area 365 new factory buildings rose in six years and a man can pay \$335 for a sport coat; in Houston, where a vast new chemical industry piled on top of oil wealth is swelling the populace; in many another center where economic

## Army Plans Action On Colonel, Author Of Book On Korea

**SEATTLE**—(P)—A former chief censor for the Eighth Army in Korea, already on the military grill for his book on the war there, said Tuesday he has been notified he is facing a further investigation and possibly a new charge.

Lt. Col. Melvin B. Voorhees told reporters he is under orders to report to Fort George Meade, Md., late this week. He said the Second Army Command advised him he is to face further inquiry on his action in proceeding with publication of the uncensored book against the orders of a superior officer.

The officer, 50, who has been in the military 10 years, was a Washington state newspaperman 18 years. He was editor of the Tacoma Times when he entered service in World War II.

He said he had been charged, after a Sixth Army hearing at the Presidio in California, with improper action in failure to submit a manuscript for Army review until after it had been sent to the publisher, and with refusal to carry out an order.

Voorhees declared there is no

element of military security involved and "I am fighting this thing because it has become a matter of principle."

He said a brigadier general in the information office at the Pentagon is "the one man" who has been set on blocking his book.

He said the general turned thumbs down on these aspects of the book. What he interpreted as criticism of General MacArthur; for lauding a correspondent as the best in Korea when the brigadier general said he considered him the worst; for criticizing some other members of the press corps in Korea; for what the general considered "an unfriendly attitude" toward Lt. Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway and James Van Fleet, and for "generally violating Army policy and propriety."

# PRIVATE KIM, FIRST CLASS FIGHTING MAN— South Korean GI's Prove Better Than Reds' Finest

By HAL BOYLE  
NEW YORK (AP)—The Allied World has a new battlefield hero today—Private Kim, a first class fighting man.

Kim is known to his United Nations comrades as a "ROK," and he is the GI Joe of the Republic of Korea, where the name Kim is even more common than Smith is in America.

For more than two years, Private Kim has been regarded too lightly, often distrusted as a rabbit in uniform who would throw down his gun and run if the going got rough.

That never was a fair picture of the average South Korean soldier, but there were few to point out the facts about him.

But Private Kim now is telling his own story in the best way he can—with bayonet and hand grenade. Whatever he was two years ago, the terrible fighting on White Horse Mountain has shown that Kim has graduated into one of the world's best infantrymen.

**Key Battle Feature**  
That peak is a key terrain feature dominating the supply road to Seoul, only 50 miles away. And Seoul is to Kim what London is to an Englishman or Paris to the French.

In days and nights of continuous battle fought in mud and cold rain, the vital peak changed hands many times. Every time the outnumbering hordes of Chinese Reds pushed Kim off the top ridge, he stubbornly clawed a bloody path back.

Kim did it on his own while the peoples of the Western World, who have often asked, "Why don't the South Koreans do more to defend their own country?" watched in growing wonder.

These people of the West probably still fail to realize the real significance of the battle for White Horse Mountain. Whether it is finally won or lost it is a kind of Alamo to the new Republic of Korea.

**Psychologically**, Private Kim for centuries has felt inferior to Private Chang of China. He has always been "the little brother" in an Oriental sphere bossed by "the big brother," Private Chang.

But Private Kim now has proved to himself and doubtful world on White Horse peak that, man for man, he is equal to or better than Private Chang—that David still can

take on Goliath. Add Private Kim won't forget it.

The truth is, of course, that Private Kim, whenever he has been properly trained, well officered and given enough weapons, has been a good soldier all along. He is as stubborn as two Irishmen and a mule, he can walk a Chinese boy-legged, and pad along for hours toting a burden that would flatten a Jap.

The trouble with the ROK's has been that their 100,000-man force at the outbreak of the war was pawed and mangled by the spearhead of a North Korean Army that attacked with 300,000 men and 300 Russian tanks.

South Korea reacted with a magnificence that has received small recognition. Farm boys were taken out of their rice paddies and thrown into the front lines eight days later. Some clutched strange rifles they had fired only once in their brief training because of the scarcity of bullets. Others marched into battle empty-handed and were told to pick up a weapon from the first man to fall.

**Combat Miracle**  
Often they had to forage off the countryside. There often was no morphine for the badly wounded. Comrades held them as a surgeon operated.

It is a combat miracle that ROK's were able to hold on their front as well as they did for many months of emergency. Yet all the time they had more men in action than any other member of the United Nations, including the U. S.

At the same time, guided by American officers, they forged and trained a new army of several hundred thousand men equipped with American arms.

The key man in that reborn army is Private Kim, now able to fight with the best. His morale is high. He can dogtrot and shuffle 35 miles in a day on his thin rubber shoes and he sings as he marches.

The songs are about two of the oldest dreams in his "Land of the Morning Calm"—victory, and a beautiful field of waving rice, golden in harvest.

Informed by Administration farm aids which have linked their destiny apparently closer to the existing regime. And their numbers have been swollen by the rising Texas labor vote, by negroes and Latin Americans.

Among these groups there is little or no talk of voting for Governor Stevenson. There is little talk of any kind; this is the silent vote. Many men seem reluctant—almost ashamed—to acknowledge that they still may vote their old loyalties.

Speaker Sam Rayburn, helped by Senators Tom Connally and Lyndon Johnson, is doing his utmost to keep this large block safe from opposition. His Stevenson-Sparkman organization is no match for the Eisenhower set-up. But he has threatened bolting Texas congressmen with exile from good committees in Washington and pointedly has reminded oil men of the crucial tax favors granted them by Democratic Congresses.

**Party Comes First**  
Rayburn is preaching loyalty and the benefits of Democratic rule. Eisenhower advocates, stressing "time for a change," are thumping their tried and trusty trio: communism, corruption and Korea.

It's a year of firsts for Texas. No Texas governor ever before went the whole way in bolting the Democrats. And it's the first time in modern memory that both presidential nominees have stumped the state.

Whatever the final outcome, Texas has become a real political battleground. Experts agree that, win or lose, Eisenhower will poll the largest vote ever amassed by a Republican nominee in this state. New political patterns are in the making all over the South, and Texas is in the vanguard of change.

## There Are No Rear Platforms On Planes, But They Give More Range To Candidates

If the big airliners had back platforms and didn't need a 5,000-foot strip of concrete for a stop, they would be the perfect presidential campaign vehicle.

In spite of this deficiency, however, both candidates have decided that the flyin' machine is better than the choo-choo for getting them around the country to the voter.

The best estimate of Democratic travel experts is that Gov. Adlai Stevenson will do about 85 per cent of his traveling in distance, on airplanes, and the rest by car or train. It's estimated that Gen. Dwight Eisenhower will do even less moving by train.

This literally is flying in the face of tradition. No previous presidential candidates have ever taken to the air to this extent.

In 1948, for example, President Truman traveled 22,000 miles by train and only made one hop in his airplane, a flight from Washington to Miami to speak to the American Legion Convention. And the experts are pointing out, the two things which now stand out

about that '48 campaign tour are the two things which the airplane does not have—the back platform and the whistle stop.

### Cheaper To Fly

On the other hand, some argue, the important thing is getting to a lot of places, not how you get there. Flying just means that you get to more of the big cities than the small ones.

The difference in cost between train and air travel is not a factor to the national committees which foot the bill. The method of figuring the cost of a special train is extremely complicated. But, all things considered, it is probably a little cheaper to fly.

The candidate and his helpers, a total of about 30 persons, can move in one four-engine plane. The press, TV and radio people follow in one or two other planes, which they pay for themselves.

**Few Added Costs**  
American Airlines, which has done most of the hauling so far, charges \$2.00 per mile for its big DC-6. That price includes all food, with no charges for stops or for being on the ground over night.

The cost per mile on a special train is four and one-half cents per person. But that is figured on the basis of a minimum of 125 persons on the train. On top of this, passengers must pay additional for

Pullman accommodations, food and tips.

The special Pullman car which a candidate usually rides in costs a minimum of \$92 per day. There are still more charges for switching, air conditioning, and stopping for any length of time which requires special sanitary arrangements.

**Physical Comfort**  
The one charge which you have on the plane and not on the train is for a hotel room. Practically all of the airlines will be used by the candidates and press some time during the campaign, although American has the cheapest rate.

United charges \$2.25 a mile for its standard DC-6 and \$2.50 a mile for its bigger DC-6B. Eastern is most expensive, with a cost of \$2.95 per mile for its big Constellations.

Aside from cost, an argument rages among veteran newsmen and politicians who have accompanied previous campaigns, as to which mode of travel does most damage to body and soul.

There are those who claim that the hotel and shower each night during a plane tour, outweigh the advantages of train travel. But the other side holds that early morning rising, usually necessary to get to the plane, is a barbaric practice which you don't follow on the train.

# Actors Argue Pros, Cons Of Taking Political Sides

HOLLYWOOD —(P)— Just two more weeks and we'll have something to talk about besides politics. But until the nation goes to the polls, everyone will still be hashing over candidates and issues far into the night. Hollywood is no different from any other community. People aren't talking about TV, box office and Jane Russell. All you hear is: "Did you see Adlai last night?" or "What did you think of Ike's speech?"

Since actors can talk about little else these days, I followed the trend when I visited the "Forever Female" set. I found myself standing between Paul Douglas, who is campaigning for Stevenson, and William Holden, who has taken no public stand. So I pitted the pair against each other.

Although they remained friendly, both Douglas and Holden expressed strong views about actors' getting into politics.

Holden said he hadn't loaned his name to either campaign and didn't intend to.

**Unsavory Causes**  
"I don't think a film actor has any business antagonizing any segment of the motion picture public," he remarked. "In the past, actors have become associated with unsavory causes, and that has been bad for themselves and the industry. I don't at all mean that either the Democratic or Republican campaigns is unsavory."

"But the fact remains that people on both sides feel very strongly. An actor makes a mistake to risk censure from either side."

Douglas countered that he saw no reason for actors to abstain from politics.

"I say there are limits to the campaigning which an actor should do," he commented. "I have narrated a film short for the Democrats and have been making some appearances at rallies. I think I am entitled to do so as a citizen."

"Yes, I suppose I might alienate some Republican members of the movie audience. But I'm not worried about alienating Republican motion picture producers."

**Respects Privacy**  
Said Holden: "I am a member of that dying breed of people who think they are entitled to a private life. Oh, I don't mean myself as an actor. I expect to have my professional life scrutinized by the public. But as a citizen, I expect some privacy. And that includes my political opinions."

"I think there is a dangerous movement to destroy one's private conscience. For one thing, I think it is shocking that a candidate for office must reveal his income tax. This sort of thing could continue until we have what George Orwell described in '1984': complete thought control."

There are undoubtedly some readers of this column who should never look at it. These are the ones with active imaginations and worrying dispositions who think they have every disease which is discussed.

Some can read about their bodies and the diseases which might affect them without being bothered, but those who are in constant fear and worry about getting sick cause themselves a great deal of distress and do not accomplish anything worthwhile.

One should not forget that nature is a great healer. Most people who become sick, even with serious conditions, recover entirely. Others who fall ill progress to a stage where the disease from which they suffered has been conquered, even though some bad effects may remain.

Still others may even incur serious effects such as the loss of a limb from disease or injury and yet be able to resume reasonably active and useful lives.

There is another thing which people should remember when reading about the many diseases and injuries which afflict mankind. That is, even though people could get a great many diseases they never do.

The chances are that the average person will encounter only a few of the serious conditions described in the books and recovery from these will take place, thanks to nature and medical or surgical treatments.

The constant fear that one might catch plague, cholera, yellow fever, tuberculosis, or whatnot, is far worse than the actual danger to which we are exposed. The people who always are anxious are worse off than those who use reasonable precautions and then take their chances without undue worry.

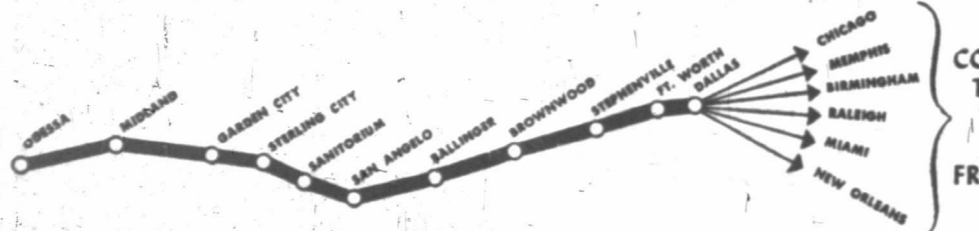

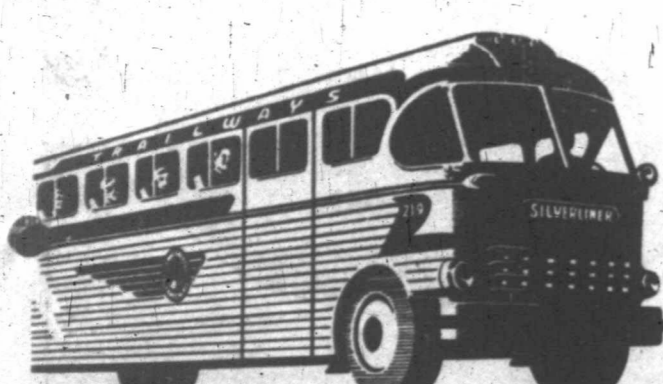

**Printing Trade Needs Help But Trained Men Are Scarce**

**DALLAS**—(P)—There's nothing wrong with a woman being a printer.

"Except she has to get her hands dirty."

A pretty red manicuring job would not last very long back where the newspaper ink flows.

But somebody has to print the newspaper, print the labels on that bottle of pills you're taking, print those bills you get every month—yes, even print the checks on which scribble to pay those bills.

And the men are falling down. Every year 1,500 printers either retire or die. And every year only 1,000 new printers are being trained.

"There's nothing wrong with training a girl or woman to be a printer," said Ray Abel, Director of the Southwest School of Printing. "A woman really is better on the keyboard of a linotype—same reason she makes a better typist than a man."

"Only thing—she doesn't want to get her hands dirty. She doesn't want to learn the maintenance of her machine and get up and fix it when something goes wrong."

Abel is right. Too many things—malls and clectricy-clickings on a linotype machine for a bobby pin mechanic to do much good.

"And girls usually think of a job as a stopgap between high school

and marriage," Abel went on. "The printing trade is not like that. It takes too long to train a person and too long to develop any proficiency for printing to be just a stopgap."

Abel can't single out women alone for censure there.

He admits that the training and getting the experience are what discourages the boys.

The Southwest School of Printing is a sprawling one-story brick building on a block-square campus in southwest Dallas. It needs 40 students to be self-sustaining. It has 18.

The newspaper publishers and the men who run the printing busi-

nesses make up the deficit with their own contributions.

It's a 30-year-old non-profit school, one of three of its kind in the United States. The others are in New York and Nashville, Tenn.

Pat Taggart, business manager of the Waco News-Tribune is president of the Dallas school. E. M. (Ted) Dealey, publisher of the Dallas Morning News is vice-president; Frank C. Erwin, member of a Dallas printing firm, secretary-treasurer, and Will C. Grant, of Dallas, executive vice president.

Twenty-one newspapermen and commercial printers are on the Board of Directors. The Texas Daily Newspapers As-

sociation, meeting in Galveston last Summer, endorsed a plan to hold meetings in various towns to try to get boys interested in learning the printing trade. They also voted to sponsor a continuous basis.

It costs \$60 a month tuition for 16 months, plus room and board to go to the school.

**Diploma Required**

The basic course take 16 months, but specialized, shorter course are given also. The only requirement is a high school diploma, but exceptions have been made there.

A new group is started every four months. The next group starts October 6. Hand composition is first on the schedule—learning how

to set type by hand, learning that pte to a printer is a mess of jumbled type, that a galley is a column of type. Next is press work, where the boys learn how to roll'em off of all different kinds of presses. Then comes the job of learning to run a linotype—and maintaining it, too.

This new-fangled printing equipment hasn't eliminated the printer.

"We don't see any lessening of the need for printers, regardless of new and radical changes," Taggart said. "We have bigger newspapers and we haven't matched the demand."
