Campaign News Coverage

Every four years the question arises whether American newspapers give their readers balanced coverage of the presidential campaign. This year, as before, they are charged with favoring the Republicans in their news columns.

Recently a group of 96 U. S. authors accused the American press of offering a distorted picture of the Eisenhower-Stevenson battle to their readers.

Be it noted here that the authors are not saying these papers simply prefer Eisenhower editorially. They assert that various journalistic tricks are used to play him up on the news pages, and play Stevenson down.

Fortunately, in this argument we need not rely on mere guesswork to challenge the authors. For The Associated Press has made its own study of 115 U. S. papers, and concludes that the Democrats, not the Republicans, enjoy a pronounced advantage in volume and display of news coverage in this campaign.

The AP's box score showed that 71 per cent of the papers surveyed gave the Democrats dominant coverage, 32 per cent gave Ike and Stevenson an equal break, and just 21 per cent actually favored Eisenhower in news treatment.

A majority of these papers explicitly prefer Ike for President, yet the evidence indicates they are leaning over backwards to provide fair coverage of the news.

Some critics may contend that only President Truman's entry into the 1952 fray has balanced accounts in many cases, or tipped the scales for the Democrats. A few even suggest that pro-Eisenhower editors deliberately have played up Truman's flying attacks on Ike in hope of discrediting the Democratic cause.

To the latter charge, the question may be countered: "What would be said if the President's assaults were muffled by the press?"

As for the other point, it ought to be remembered that the party in the White House automatically enjoys superior publicity, not only during a campaign but throughout the intervening years.

So when a President is himself a candidate, that fact by itself helps to balance news coverage accounts. And when, as in 1952, he is a sort of added starter in the campaign, he multiplies that advantage. He can't be ignored either as President or as whistle-stopper, and Stevenson can't be ignored as candidate.

The 96 authors have built themselves a poor case. Very possibly what they understand as balanced coverage would really be treatment slanted to favor the man of their own choice.

Words, Charges Fly Faster In Texas Political Slugfest

 The words flew faster and charges followed charge and countercharge as Texas politicians went all-out Friday to take the lead in the race for Texas' 24 important electoral

votes.
 It looked like a nose-and-nose race right down to the wire, Tuesday, November 4, general election day.
 Backers of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential nominee, tried to make capital at the expense of Adlai Stevenson, Democratic standard-bearer, of the "affair Westbrook."

Westbrook, fired as assistant chairman of the Democratic National Committee, left for Hot Springs, Ark., as the flurry caused by his dismissal brought accusations and denials of corruption.
 Denies Influence Used
 The harried, balding little man denied Thursday night that he had used or attempted to use his committee position to influence award of a tungsten contract. He was fired, Democratic National Chairman Stephen Mitchell said, for allegedly helping negotiate a \$9,000,000 government contract while working for the committee.

He charged that the Eisenhower people spent their money on billboards, newspaper, radio and television advertisements, "sandal sheets" and paid campaign workers.
"Turncoats" Criticized
 Striking back at the Republicans and their friends, he criticized "Turncoat Democrats," and the "rich and their bootlickers," and the "rich daily newspapers." He said some papers "distorted their news columns and slapped one-sided editorials on their front pages."

details of the company's contract had already been agreed to by the federal government.
 "It is clear also that I have received no payment whatever under this contract," the statement continued. He said he had no connection with either the government or the Democratic Party when he made his business arrangements with the tungsten company.
Rayburn Bites Back
 While the Westbrook incident occupied most political conversations, there were these other developments on the Texas campaign front:
 1. Speaker Sam Rayburn Thursday night accused Republicans and those he called "former Democrats" of trying to buy votes for Eisenhower in Texas by spending hundreds of thousands of dollars. The Rayburn charge—a transcribed radio address—went out while he made an appearance at a Democratic rally in Marshall.
 2. Gov. Allan Shivers, campaigning vigorously for the Republican nominee, predicted Eisenhower would carry Texas and beat the GOP drums in a prepared-in-advance TV film appearance, a press conference, and at a rally in Harlingen. About 8,500 persons at the Harlingen ball park cheered Shivers when he declared, "Texans are afraid of nothing when it comes to principles."
 3. Wallace Savage, State Democratic Committee chairman, said in Dallas that Speaker Rayburn and other leaders of the Stevenson campaign in Texas have "doled out their loyalty to Harry Truman and Governor Stevenson for patronage and other favors." Savage told a Democrats' for - Eisenhower rally, "The Democrats of Texas are still the Democratic Party of Texas and the Rayburns and McCraws are no longer entitled to our support and respect."

Predictions Made
 Earlier in the day, Rayburn matched Shivers' prediction of an Ike victory with a similar prediction for Stevenson. He made it plain that the state campaign for Stevenson had been Rayburn-directed and said the Westbrook dismissal "would have no bearing on the campaign in Texas."
 Westbrook said he actually helped organize the Portuguese company, Copanhia Atlantica, and was an authorized agent of the firm.
 He said the contract was the most favorable one the U. S. had ever entered into in the strategic materials program.
 Of the campaign, Rayburn's 15-minute radio address said, "We have waged a simple and relatively inexpensive campaign. I doubt if we have spent one-twentieth as much as the opposition."

He would not answer reporters' questions and refused comment beyond that in his statement. When he joined the national committee, the statement said, "all essential

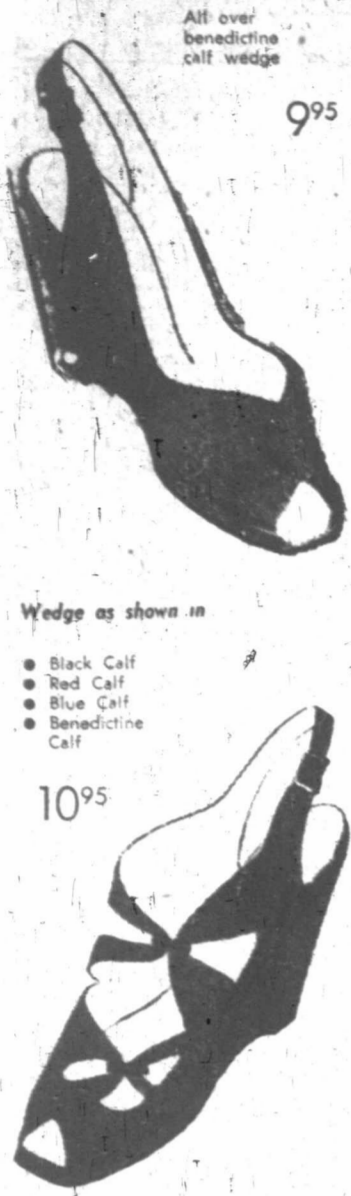

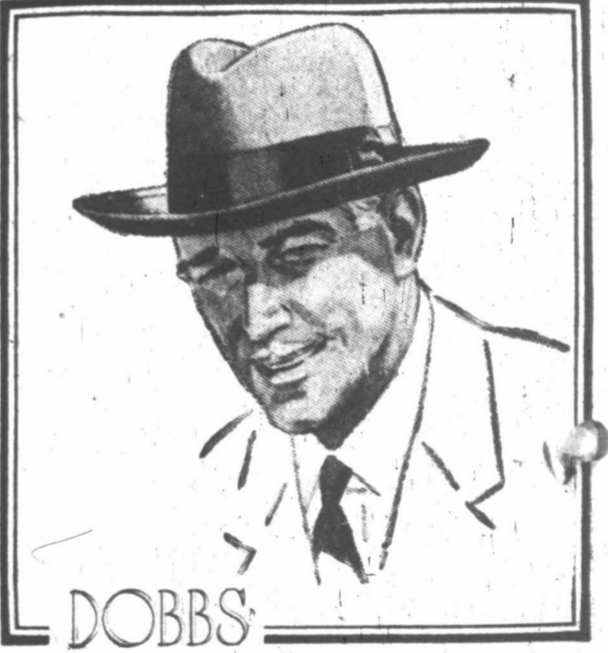

Family In Berlin Struggles Under High Prices, No Jobs

BERLIN — The West Berliner come a long way since war's but his life is not easy. Hans and Gertrud and their three children typify that life. Hans is 32. He is unemployed. Thirty per cent of West Berliners are.

From Hans' life, eight years were dashed by war and a prisoner-of-war existence, a period he might otherwise have utilized, in learning a trade.

His wife Gertrud is 34. Like an American woman, she is industrious and resourceful. Gertrud budgets frugally. She spends one deutsch mark (about 25 cents) per person per day on food. The noon meal is their main meal. Their food budget is like an American having a nickel to spend for breakfast, 15 cents for lunch, 10 cents for dinner.

A large portion of the food allowance is spent in buying fruit for the three children. Peter, 11, the oldest boy, was born in Dresden a few months after his father marched off in a Nazi infantryman's uniform to fight for Hitler's cause in a half a dozen countries — Norway, Finland, Russia, Belgium, Luxembourg, Germany.

For most of his life Peter has been undernourished and underweight. He now is a convalescent camp for a six-week period. Martin, eight, was born in Sagan, Poland, where his mother had to escape the constant bomb-blasting of Berlin, crumbling on all sides of her.

The youngest, Anke, is a chubby four-year-old. She looks healthy and happy, is warm and affectionate with strangers. Hans and Gertrud have an above-average apartment for West Berliners. It is a homey, four and one-half rooms with rugs, sofa, arm chairs, radio and paintings.

They pay 150 DM (\$37.50) for their two-bedroom apartment. They sub-rent one bedroom for 55 DM (\$13.75) which means they pay only 95 DM (\$23.75) a month for rent. On October 1 of this year, the best was turned on in the apartment for the first time since the war. Previous to that, they had used a small stove in the living room, burning coal, wood and old rags.

"Old rags smell not so good," they commented. unemployment compensation, Hans draws 176 marks per month from the German Government — a sum based on the size of the family. After paying the rent, they have 81 marks (\$20.25) left on which to live. They could not afford the 23.75 per month apartment without help from their families—which they receive each month.

Gertrud says the minimum she can spend in feeding her family adequately is 25 cents per person per day—or 150 marks per month. On the day I visited the family—a Wednesday—this had been their meal:

BREAKFAST — rolls, margarine (average Germans never eat butter as it is too expensive, costing about 90 cents a pound), jam, cheese, milk and coffee. **Substitute Coffee** — The coffee was not real, but a poor substitute made out of rye. Coffee is more of a luxury than butter. It costs Germans about \$4.50 a pound. Coffee in a German restaurant is one of the most expensive beverages one can order, mocha coffee costing, for instance, more than twice as much as a glass of wine.

LUNCH — Baked potatoes, brussels sprouts, two pork cutlets. They have meat twice a week, Sunday noon and one other day. The two cutlets were divided four ways.

DINNER — Bread, cheese, margarine and the remainder of the quart of milk left from breakfast. Gertrud and Hans, just as the vast majority of Germans and Europeans, do not have ice boxes but purchase from a food store only what is needed for one day. Until recently, Hans worked for a German pharmaceutical company. He made the equivalent of \$78 a month.

This is less than an American man working on the same type job in the USA would make in one week. Out of the \$78, he paid \$10.50 in taxes, leaving him a net of \$67.50 a month—less than \$17 a week "take home" pay. Gertrud says to properly clothe her family of five she needs 100 DM, or \$5 per person per month. An American woman could snag a couple of pairs of nylons and spend that much.

Clothing costs as much in Germany as it does in America—despite the vast differences in salaries. **They Shop For Bargains** — Hans and Gertrud shop for bargains. Yet, a pair of shoes cost her 35 marks (\$8.75), hose \$1.45 and a dress, \$15.

Hans escaped without injury from five years of fighting, although he was wounded twice. In 1945, he was taken POW by the Americans. He says he was given "no work and no food." His weight dropped from a 160 to 128 pounds. After the surrender he was turned over to the French, who treated him "pretty rough, too." He was held until 1948.

Meanwhile, Gertrud had returned from Sagan to Berlin and her mother's home. There they suffered the indignities of the Soviet invaders. The maid in her mother's home was raped so many times by so many Russians "I lost the count," Gertrud says. To protect her mother, Gertrud

went to a nearby Lutheran nurses' home and asked if she could hide her mother there. She said she thought the sanction of such a home would be respected. "I learned that quite to the contrary..." her voice trailed off. On April 27, 1945, her mother stepped outside her home. Gertrud watched from the window. Two Russian guards were out front. Her mother spoke to one. The other lifted his rifle and "without reason, or provocation, he killed her," Gertrud related.

In 1946, she moved into their present apartment building. Only the walls were up. She and the children made out the best they could. Today's life of unemployment and high prices may be difficult, but it is a comfortable life compared with those days. One has the feeling after visiting them that Hans and Gertrud—and all of Germany—have come a long way since war's end and that they will some day have a better life.

Of the total, \$1,418,809 went to the account of the Treasury in the Federal Reserve Bank of New York in payment of principal on the \$37,720,000 surplus — property loan made six years ago.

Chinese Produce 'Indian' Tinkets
MOOSE JAW, CANADA — (AP) — A Chinese firm is trying to sell North America native novelties to storekeepers here. In a letter from Hong Kong, the local Chamber of Commerce was advised that K. S. Lau and Company are the manufacturers of all kinds of Indian beaded belts as well as jewelry, moccasins, novelties, etc. The company said it had been handling this line for years, establishing a good name throughout the United States.

Paraplegics Form Company, Make Electronics Devices
FRANKLIN PARK, ILL. — (NEA) — This is one of the most unusual factories in the country. Periodically a bell jangles as a warning to all workers on the assembly line to pause for a few moments. They hitch around in their seats. Maybe massage their thighs. Stretch their arms.

The work benches along the four assembly lines look strange. They're low and all the pneumatic machine control gadgets which you usually see underneath are on top. Instead, beneath the benches there run red-spotted heating pipes.

The name of the firm explains its unusual features. It's the Paraplegics Manufacturing Company. Its products are all kinds of small electronics equipment, built for the big electrical manufacturing companies. It is owned and manned by paraplegics, persons who are paralyzed below the waist. Its founder, Nils S. Josefson, just received the President's Trophy for "the outstanding performance of the year" by a handicapped American.

Josefson, 31, has two young children and is a widower. He was injured on an aircraft carrier in the Pacific, serving as an aviation radio technician. He got the idea for this factory while working from his wheelchair as an instructor of the Commercial Trades Institute of Chicago.

Taxi Driver Fined On Liquor Charges
Joel Hill, 33-year-old Midland taxi driver, was fined \$200 and costs in County Court Thursday for illegal possession of whiskey. Hill entered a plea of guilty.
