Dodge To Keep Hands Off Budget

Eisenhower Liaison Man Just Listens

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President-elect Eisenhower's financial representative, Detroit banker Joseph Dodge, met Wednesday with Budget Director Frederick J. Lawton, but told reporters he would not try to influence the size or nature of the budget now being prepared.

At a news conference in Lawton's office, Dodge said he would not agree or disagree with anything he saw in the budget, which covers government spending for the year beginning next July 1.

CIO Moves To Postpone Annual Meet

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—The vice presidents of the CIO Wednesday recommended a postponement of the group's fourteenth annual convention from Monday, November 17, to Monday, December 1, because of the death of CIO President Philip Murray.

The convention had been slated to open next week in Los Angeles. Instead the convention will be held at Atlantic City.

The vice president's recommendation is expected to receive quick approval at a meeting of the CIO Executive Board in Pittsburgh Friday, one day after Murray's funeral. Murray died Sunday in San Francisco while arranging for the convention.

The Executive Board is composed of the nine vice presidents, plus elected representatives from the numerous CIO unions.

Murray's successor will be elected at the convention, but any board suggestion will carry much weight.

Walter B. Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers and one of the possible choices as Murray's successor, arrived in Pittsburgh Tuesday night, but he had nothing to say about seeking the job of union president.

Others prominently mentioned for the post are James B. Carey, 41, president of the electrical workers, and Allan Haywood, 66-year-old CIO executive vice president. Reuther and Carey are vice presidents.

Any one of the other six vice presidents could be considered a possible choice. They are:

Emil Rieve of the textile workers; L. S. Buckmaster of the rubber workers; Joseph A. Beltracchi, communication workers; Michael Quill, transport workers; Frank Rosenblum, clothing workers and O. A. Knight, oil workers.

Asked directly whether his goal would be to obtain tax and spending reductions immediately, Dodge said he could not make forecasts now.

Dodge told a reporter the budget to be presented to Congress will be solely the work of the Truman Administration.

He added, however, that as an observer in discussions which will fix the pattern of the new budget, he assumes he would gain impressions of possible modifications and would relay these impressions to Eisenhower.

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Rodney Boykin, Nine, Starts Walking Unknown Trail Alone As Father Draws 15-Year Sentence

An unhappy, bespectacled nine-year-old youth named Rodney Boykin, a couple of \$20 bills in his pocket, headed alone Wednesday morning along a new and unknown trail.

Tuesday morning he had a father who could teach him manners and help him put on his clothes and take him into a drug store and buy him comic books.

Wednesday morning he had a father who was a convicted murderer and facing a 15-year-old penitentiary sentence for ending with four shots from a revolver the life of a man named Leldon Charles (Treetop) Smith.

It took a 12-man 70th District Court jury less than four hours to make a decision and a few minutes later, 49-year-old Robert Marion Boykin, who almost forgot to attend his own trial, was taken away from his son and placed in the Midland County jail.

"I have been working in Dallas as a bricklayer," Boykin explained earlier, as the jury sat behind closed doors deliberating his fate "and Rodney was staying with me.

"Rodney has been a good boy. He's just the spittin' image of his mother, a beautiful woman.

"But, somehow or other, I got the idea my trial wasn't coming up till later this month.

"Then Sunday afternoon, I called the sheriff's office here and they told me my trial was starting the next morning. We packed what clothes we could and hurried down to catch the train."

Rodney tugged on his daddy's sleeve.

"We made it by only half a minute, didn't we," he said. "You should have seen daddy. He almost ran faster than I did."

Unhappy Experience
Anyway, they made it and by 10 a.m. Monday, Rodney and his father were sitting side-by-side in the courtroom, waiting for the trial to get underway before Judge R. W. (Bob) Hamilton.

The unhappy experience began. First, District Attorney W. O. Shafer objected to having the youth sitting beside the father, intimating it was arranged for no other reason than to affect the jury.

Judge Hamilton upheld the protest, explaining there was nothing else he could do, and Rodney was ordered behind the railing, where he sat some eight feet away from his father.

The drama quickly developed before the little fellow.

He heard Judge Hamilton issue a writ of attachment, requiring that his mother, Ida Boykin, be picked up by officers and required to appear in court as a witness in defense of her husband.

He watched for his mother, who (Continued On Page Seven)

Uncle Vincent Proves GOP Victory Bares Demos' Dirt

CLAY, W. VA.—(AP)—Uncle Vincent Hamrick, 83, looked like a shorn sheep Wednesday. He'd had his first haircut in eight years. A Republican clip, he called it. An "Eisenhower Special."

Uncle Vincent vowed when Governor Dewey lost in 1944 he'd never go to a barber again until the Republicans regained the White House.

So there was quite a ceremony Tuesday in Uncle Vincent's lumber yard office.

Cousin Abner Hamrick, who qualified because in addition to being a barber he also is a Republican, wielded the shears.

Everyone said Uncle Vincent looked 29 years younger.

"Yes, sir," said Uncle Vincent. "My victory took 29 years off my life. 29 years of Democratic misrule. I feel like a new man. I feel like I've been born all over again."

"You're going to have to wash your neck, Uncle Vincent," said Cousin Abner. "It's sort of discolored."

"Democratic dirt," snapped the old man.

Accused Political Slayers Seek Bond

AUSTIN—(AP)—The Court of Criminal Appeals was told Wednesday evidence does not justify the holding of two men without bail in the South Texas political shooting of Jake Floyd, Jr.

The court was asked to set bail in "reasonable amount" both for Nago Alaniz and Mario (El Turko) Sapet, held on murder indictments in the mistaken assassination of Floyd, the son of political leader Jake Floyd, Sr.

Houston Attorney Percy Foreman, representing Alaniz, argued that all evidence indicates Alaniz wanted to prevent the homicide, that if he had ever entered into a conspiracy, he had abandoned it by attempting to warn the elder Floyd.

State's Attorney Spurgeon Bell, Houston, argued that as a matter of law a conspirator cannot abandon his part in a conspiracy without communicating such abandonment to his fellow conspirator.

In behalf of Sapet, Attorney Fred A. Semaan argued there was "absolutely no testimony" sufficient to convict Sapet of any offense.

"The only evidence of any weight is pure hearsay," he said.

District Attorney Homer Dean replied that testimony showed Sapet to be the "finger man," that he had caused the job and furnished the getaway car.

Both defense attorneys argued that evidence was not sufficient in any case to justify the death penalty, the only justification under Texas law for holding a person without bail.

The appeal court took the case under study. No decisions is expected for several weeks.

The defeated Democratic presidential nominee was accompanied by an aide, Carl McGowan, and McGowan's wife, William Wyatt, Stevenson's campaign manager, and his wife were to join the flight at St. Louis.

Stevenson flew in a private plane to the ranch, about 60 miles south of Tucson, to be the guest of an old friend, Richard Jenkins.

Wholesale Food Prices Hold Steady

NEW YORK—(AP)—Wholesale food prices declined exactly balanced out advances this week in the Dun & Bradstreet food index, leaving the index unchanged at the lowest level in 28 months.

At \$6.30 the index was 5.5 per cent below the year-ago level of \$6.67 and lowest since the \$6.28 of July 11, 1950. The highest the index has climbed since the latter date was \$7.31 on Feb. 20, 1951.

Growing City Plans To Add Square Mile, Widen Street

The City of Midland flexed its growing muscles Tuesday night and Wednesday.

At the weekly session of the City Council Tuesday night, the first steps were taken toward adding another square mile or so to the city and the way was cleared for paving and widening West Illinois Street for an additional mile.

And Wednesday, city officials watched the first production of water flow from McMillen Field following the completion of the first well.

Included in the annexation ordinance, which was passed on first reading Tuesday night, was 696 acres scattered on all sides of the city.

Final passage will come up 30 days after official publication of the notice describing the proposed new areas.

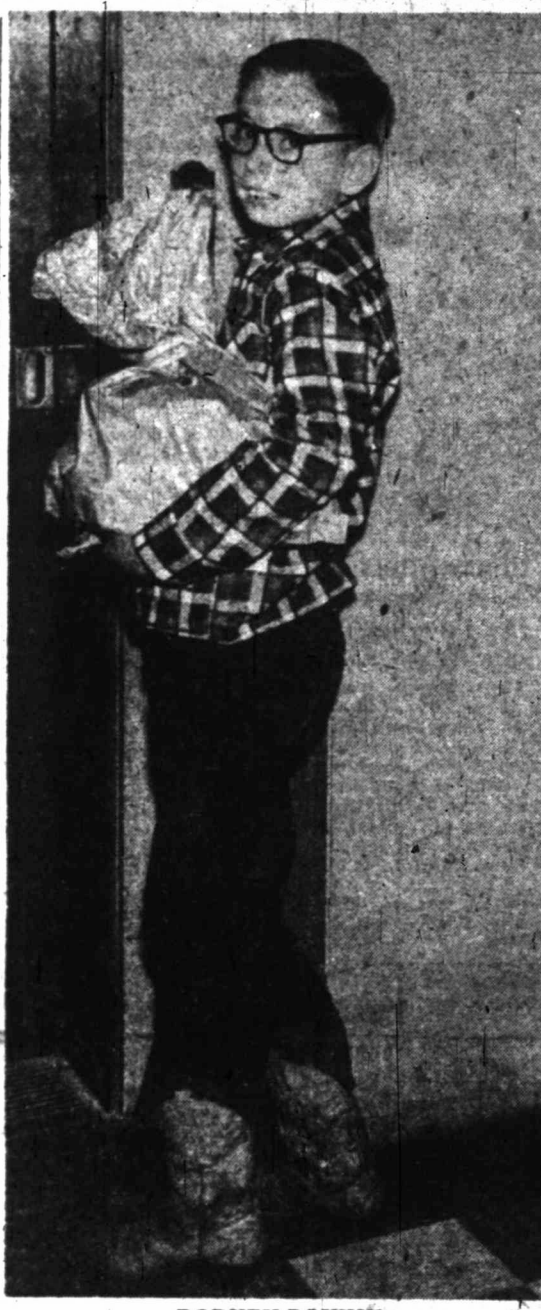

The board had awarded Oil Boykin \$9,080 for a 20-foot strip 800 feet long and John Hughes \$2,000 for a 400-foot-long strip tapering from 40 feet in width at one end to 20 feet at the other.

City Manager W. H. Oswalt reported Wednesday that first production tests at McMillen Field, designed to double the city's water supply by next summer, indicated the wells will produce as much, if not more, than originally anticipated.

Although the tests will not be completed until Wednesday afternoon on the first well, Oswalt said it would produce on a sustained basis between 400 and 500 gallons a minute.

ROK's Recapture Three Key Heights

SEOUL—(AP)—South Korean infantrymen stormed back to recapture three strategic heights on Sniper Ridge and Triangle Hill in long, bloody battles Wednesday.

But they failed to throw Chinese Communists off the Yoke, a mass of tunnels and caves at the northern end of Sniper which has been the key to firm control of the important ridge.

AP Correspondent John Randolph, reporting from the blasting central front, said Republic of Korea (ROK) troops regained all the ground they lost to furious Red artillery-sup-

ported assaults Tuesday night.

That included: Pinpoint Hill, dominant height on Sniper Ridge, retaken by a five-hour infantry assault preceded by an hour-long artillery barrage.

Rocky Point, highest peak on Little Finger Ridge, as well as most of the rest of that ridge.

Jane Russell Hill, on the northeast edge of Triangle, recaptured in a counterattack that began at dawn. Two Red companies—350 men—wrested the twin peaks from the Allies Tuesday night.

Once they had secured the crest of Pinpoint, elements of three ROK regiments drove northward against the Yoke, taking part of it in a blast-them-out, burn-them-out battle against entrenched Reds.

But the South Koreans were forced to withdraw before dark. The Yoke is a virtually impregnable redoubt at night.

High Court Upholds Doswell Conviction

AUSTIN—(AP)—The court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday refused to disturb the conviction and life sentence of wealthy Mrs. Rebecca Doswell in the Dallas pistol slaying of her oil man husband.

Mrs. Doswell's husband, Thomas W. Doswell, was shot in the driveway of the fashionable residential Melrose Hotel Aug. 20, 1951.

Miller Requests Appeal Dismissal

S. M. Miller, Jr., 23-year-old Odessa youth convicted in 70th District Court last June on an armed robbery charge, appeared Wednesday to be headed for a life term in the state penitentiary.

District Clerk Lucille Johnson reported the youth had filed an affidavit asking dismissal of an appeal.

Miller, convicted in the holdup last January of the night manager of the Har-Wil Tourist Motel, has been held in the Midland County jail pending the outcome of the appeal.

Ike Plans Important Round Of Talks Before Korea Trip

AUGUSTA, GA.—(AP)—President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower is planning an important round of conferences with Republican leaders in New York next week before leaving for Korea, aides said Wednesday.

These associates, who asked not to be named, said the conferees may include Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, chairman of the Senate GOP Policy Committee, and Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin, in line to head the Senate Foreign Relations Committee when the Republicans take over control of Congress in January.

Eisenhower, vacationing at the Augusta National Golf Club, plans to head for New York Sunday or Monday.

He will confer the early part of the week at the White House with President Truman, who has invited the general to sit in at a discussion of international and domestic problems facing the new Republican Administration.

Aides of the President-elect said he wants to talk over such matters first with GOP congressional leaders but may switch signals, go to the White House first, and meet with them later in the week.

Wiley, attending the United Nations General Assembly in New York as a U. S. delegate, said Eisenhower has asked him to a meeting two weeks hence for a discussion of American foreign policy.

Eisenhower's press secretary, James C. Hagerty, confirmed here that Eisenhower had extended an invitation to Wiley. But Hagerty hinted the get-together is due next week, rather than the following week.

Jurors Selected In Murder Trial

Selection of a 12-man jury was completed at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday to hear the murder trial of Juan Moreno, 32-year-old Midland construction worker.

Taco Completes Devonian Opener In Andrews Area

The Texas Company No. 1-AB State, has been completed as a discovery from the Devonian in North-east Andrews County.

Operator reported a daily pumping potential of 123 barrels of 41.6-gravity oil and 29 barrels of water. Gas-oil ratio was 18-1.

Production was from perforations opposite the Devonian in five and one-half-inch casing at 12,592-12,614 feet. That set had been treated with 500 gallons of acid.

This new discovery is six miles north and slightly east of the discovery well of the Magutux (Ellenberg) field, and three miles west of the 1-2 State, recently completed Devonian discovery.

Location is 660 feet from west and 1,980 feet from south lines of section 22, block 3, University Lands survey.

C-W Upton Wildcat Will Plug Back To Test Pennsylvania

Gulf Oil Corporation is preparing to plug back for a completion attempt in the Pennsylvania at its No. 2-H McElroy Ranch Company, wildcat in Central-West Upton County.

Drillstem test of the Ellenburger from 14,328 to 14,378 feet recovered 330 feet of drilling mud cut with salty sulphur water and 810 feet of black salty sulphur water.

Hole will be plugged back to approximately 9,901 feet for tests of the Pennsylvania where a drillstem test with packer at 9,835 feet showed oil and gas.

Total depth is 14,378 feet. Location is 2,205 feet from north and 2,178 feet from west lines of section 40, block 42, T-5-S, T&P survey.

It is eight miles northeast of the town of Crane and four miles northwest of the Wilshire (Ellenberg) field. The deep wildcat is two and one-half miles northeast of the opener of the Jigger Y field.

Hamon Project In NW Lea Flows Oil From Wolfcamp Zone

Jake L. Hamon No. 1 Chambers, outcrop to the proven area of the East Caprock (Devonian) field of Northwest Lea County, flowed oil and gas on a drillstem test in the Devonian.

Test was taken in the interval at 8,439-75 feet. Gas surfaced in six minutes at the estimated rate of 2,000,000 cubic feet daily, mud surfaced in 27 minutes and oil in 39 minutes. It flowed 26 barrels of oil the first hour. Gravity of the oil is approximately 50 degrees. No water was flowing out with the oil.

Operator was to flow the well for at least two hours longer, pull the plug and drill ahead.

There are no wells in the East Caprock field being produced from the Wolfcamp.

No. 1 Chambers is one-half mile northeast of production in the field and at the center of the southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section 1-12a-32e.

Eastland Finals New Day Opener In Central Ector

The Eastland Oil Company of Odessa No. 28 J. L. Johnson, Jr., has been completed as a new pay opener in the Donnelly (San Andres) field of Central Ector County.

The new opener was completed from the lower Holt lime of the Permian for a daily pumping potential of 56.24 barrels of 30.3-gravity oil plus four per cent water.

Production is from perforations in five and one-half-inch casing from 7,750 to 5,847 feet. Pay was topped at 5,597 feet and total depth is 5,908 feet. Casing is cemented at 5,908 feet.

Pay was treated with 25,000 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 875-1. Elevation is 3,083 feet. Location is 335 feet from west and 1,556 feet from south lines of section 42, block 43, T&P survey.

Second Jury Convicts Negro On Charge Of Assaulting White Girl By 'Leering'

YANCEYVILLE, N. C.—(P)—A 46-year-old negro awaited sentence Wednesday after his second conviction on a charge of assaulting a white girl by "leering" at her.

An all-white, male Superior Court jury-convicted tenant farmer Mack Ingram of the crime Tuesday. Judge Frank Armstrong planned to sentence him Wednesday. The maximum would be a two-year road term. Ingram, father of nine children, received this sentence on a

Recorder's Court conviction shortly after he was accused by the girl. He appealed the conviction.

Ingram was charged with assaulting Mrs. Willie Jean Boswell Webster, an attractive 17-year-old farm girl in June, 1951. The girl, unmarried then, testified that Ingram "eyed" her from a distance of "about 75 feet."

Under North Carolina law no bodily contact is necessary for conviction of assault. The jury, in hold-

ing Ingram guilty, upheld a state contention that by "leering" at the girl, he frightened her and thus committed assault.

Ingram's attorneys declined to offer testimony in his defense, but at an earlier hearing the defendant denied he had criminal intentions.

Ingram told officers the girl was dressed in a shirt and jeans and "looked like a boy" when he attempted to inquire of her where he could borrow a trailer.

Ingram's attorney said before the trial that they would appeal any conviction to the State Supreme Court.

Mrs. Webster, who married Ernest Webster the day before Ingram was first convicted and who now is the mother of a six-month old baby, told the jury she looked up the word "leer" in a dictionary. She said it meant a "curious look." That definition, she testified, described exactly the manner in which Ingram eyed her as he drove slowly past her with his head out of the window of his car.

Ingram originally was charged with assault with intent to commit rape. The charge was reduced to one of assault on a female when he was brought to trial in Caswell Recorder's Court. After he was convicted and sentenced to two years on the roads, he appealed to the Superior Court. The first Superior Court trial, in November of last year, ended in a mistrial when two of the four negroes on the jury held out for acquittal.

Doolittle Says No Defense Could Stop Russian Attack

TYLER.—(P)—Lt. Gen. James Doolittle says the United States may have the best air defense possible but adds that nothing he knows of would make the country safe from Russian attack.

The World War II commander who bombed Tokyo in a token raid early in the struggle was the principal speaker at an Armistice Day pageant in the Tyler High School auditorium Tuesday night.

"He emphasized that the defense effort now and future planning must be aimed at U. S. bombers and complementary facilities necessary to knock out enemy air bases from which attacks on this country might spring.

through of science into new fields of knowledge" should be used for American defense. Doolittle said, adding that our defenses against A-bomb attack should be stepped up, "including production and continual improvement of anti-aircraft guided-missiles and the radar warning network."

Doolittle, now serving as special civilian assistant on research and development to Air Chief of Staff Hoyt Vandenberg, has retired from the Air Force.

In one of the sharpest warnings of possible air attack in recent months, the famed Tokyo bomber said:

"We must have the best practicable air defense that science can develop in order to minimize our own losses, but we must not unduly jeopardize our offensive capability—our Strategic Air Force—by diverting too great a part of our always limited military budget to defense. x x x We cannot deter an aggressor from starting a war nor win a war if started through defensive strength alone—no matter how much of our substance we spend on it."

"As to air defense," Doolittle said, "General Vandenberg estimated a year or so ago that we could knock down no more than 30 per cent of an enemy bomber force making a determined attack upon this country."

Powdered Skin May Be Grafted, Cover Severe Flesh Burns

ST. LOUIS—(AP)—New skin sprinkled from a salt shaker to cover burns is a project raised Wednesday in a report to the National Academy of Sciences.

The skin would be quick-frozen, dried under a vacuum, then powdered and stored under vacuum. But the skin would remain alive, able to provide a living cover as a first step in skin-grafting over severe burns.

Blood vessels or other human spare parts might also be kept alive, intact, for years by the same freezing and drying.

The possibility is foreseen in success in freeze-drying influenza virus and other tissues, and finding it still alive some time later.

This work was described by Dr. Donald Greiff, professor of biology at St. Louis University. He used a specially-built apparatus to freeze the virus or tissue with dry ice and acetone, and dry it under low pressure to vaporize the liquid. Cooperating in the project are Drs. Henry Pinkerton, Herman Blumenthal and Masahiro Chiga.

John J. Coyle, Texas trustee-director, said a new group of owners is prepared to take over the club.

"There are a few loose ends to be tied down but I think that can be done Friday, perhaps sooner," he said.

Coyle's statement followed two closed sessions of directors and stockholders of the club which is fast running out of money.

Willing To Take Loss

"No names can be announced now," said Coyle. The new ownership will have "the right kind of dough to operate a professional team and they know how to operate on a business-like basis," he added.

"The primary interest of everyone was to keep professional football in Dallas," he said. "The stockholders were willing to take their loss to assure that."

No official figures have been disclosed but one source close to the club has estimated it would lose \$250,000 this season. Others have set the loss at possibly \$150,000.

Coyle at first labeled the incoming owners as "completely new." Under direct questioning, he amended this by saying that "it might be possible for a few of the present stockholders to remain identified with the team." He wouldn't name them.

Schepps Loses Plea At Corpus Christi

Princeton Power Plunger Named AP's Back Of Week

NEW YORK —(AP)—Homer Smith, Princeton's old fashioned power-plunging fullback, was named Associated Press "Back of the Week" today here November 28 in the Pool Bowl football game.

Smith was the top back of last Saturday simply by overpowering Harvard in an awesome display of slam-bang football—a contrast to the slick T-formation quarterbacks and speedy, clever halfbacks who

often gain the headlines without being hit hard more than a handful of times in a game.

Starting from the first time Princeton got the ball, Smith ripped through the Harvard line for four touchdowns and 273 yards, the greatest running performance by a major college back this year.

The five-foot-ten, 188-pound fullback wound up with an average of 10.5 yards—equal to a first down—for every time he carried the ball.

When he wasn't carrying the ball, his bruising blocks paved the way for other Princeton runners to accumulate 489 yards from scrimmage on rushing.

He had to be good last Saturday to overshadow the other stars. These included Billy Vessels of Oklahoma, who scored three touchdowns before the eyes of the nation's TV fans, and Jack Parker of Mississippi State, who had a hand in six touchdowns.

BROWNWOOD —(AP)—Come Friday night, Leonard Fry, a young football machine, is due to complete his third mile in gains for Brownwood High School.

Fry is the rushing, passing, kicking sensation of the Lions, making their greatest bid for schoolboy football glory this season. This young fellow, who runs 100 yards in 10 seconds and uses that blazing

speed to thwart the opposition on the gridiron, is one of the greatest all-around backs in Texas high school circles.

In his span as the star of the Lions' backfield since 1950, Fry has gained 5,176 yards in 28 games. Thus he needs only 101 yards to finish out three miles. He rolls against Cleburne Friday night and 101 yards would appear easily within his grasp.

He has gained 2,034 yards carrying the ball and passed for 3,156. And he kicks for an average of around 35 yards. He also boots the points after touchdown.

Coach Abe Houston denies that Leonard also sells the tickets and the peanuts. For that matter, he doesn't have to sell the tickets. Brownwood's games; they are gobbled up so quickly no salesmanship is required.

But they say he's already made up his mind—he'll go to Abilene Christian College next fall.

Bradley Says Military Men To Retain Subordinate Role

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Gen. Omar Bradley said Tuesday "we have nothing to fear from military men" dominating the government.

The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, who served with Dwight D. Eisenhower when the President-elect also was a five-star general, made no reference to the latter's election last week.

In an address prepared for the Association of Land Grant Colleges, Bradley said that "when the people of this nation elect their President and the members of their Congress, they are in a sense entrusting to them the power which could suppress or war, freedom or tyranny, democracy or dictatorship—for there is no military cliques."

"But I can say from personal knowledge, and 40 years of experience that we have nothing to fear from military men themselves. Their role in our national life, even in times of war and international tension, is far from dominant.

"In our armed forces, the democratic principle is stronger than in any other country. There are no military cliques."

'New' Demo Party Under Adlai Seen

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senator William Fulbright of Arkansas said Tuesday the Democratic party ought to be rebuilt from the ground up and Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson is the man to head the job.

Fulbright, who served in Stevenson's unsuccessful presidential campaign headquarters, told a reporter he does not go along with suggestions that Stevenson be appointed by President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower to the U. S. United Nations

delegation or asked to take on any other federal job.

"I think Stevenson should maintain an independent status and be ready, perhaps along about March, to begin speaking for the opposition on issues raised by the Republicans," the Arkansas senator said.

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, scheduled to become minority leader in the Republican-controlled Senate, agreed in a separate interview that the defeated Democratic presidential nominee ought to become the party's general spokesman, "Study Philadelphia."

As the result of experiences in the campaign, Fulbright said he believes the Democratic organization in New York and Chicago need rebuilding. He said he thinks Stevenson could learn much about how to do it by studying the organization which turned out a large majority for the Democratic nominee in Philadelphia.

"What we need in the party is young blood, new faces and new ideas," Fulbright declared. "The question is, Who is going to pick these men, encourage them to work in the party organization? I think Stevenson is the man for that job."

The Arkansas senator said he thinks that while there ought to be no Democratic sniping at Eisenhower for political sake, there will be plenty of room for opposition to Republican proposals in the new Congress.

Murder Charge Filed After Colorado City Woman Poisons Four

COLORADO CITY, TEXAS—(AP)—The wife of a Colorado City policeman was under a murder by poison charge Wednesday in the death of her 11-month-old son.

The charge was filed Monday against Mrs. Olivia E. Gunn, wife of Colorado City Patrolman Earl Gunn. It accuses Mrs. Gunn of mixing arsenic with tea October 5, causing the death of her infant son, Thomas Marion Gunn.

The entire Gunn family, Mr. and Mrs. Gunn, a daughter, Earlene, and Thomas, was hospitalized October 8 after the family had been ill several days.

Thomas died shortly after entering the hospital.

Earlene now is described as completely recovered, but her father cannot walk or use his arms and hands. Mrs. Gunn has stiffness in one leg.

District Attorney Eldon Mahon said an autopsy indicated Thomas died of arsenic poisoning.

UN Spotlight Shifts To Africa From Korea Crisis

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.—(AP)—The UN turned its spotlight at least temporarily Wednesday from Korea to the explosive question of South Africa's treatment of non-whites, an issue heightened by violence this week in that member of the British Commonwealth.

As general police statements continued before a plenary session of the General Assembly, the 60-nation Special Political Committee took up Asian-Arab charges that South African Premier Daniel P. Malan's white supremacy program threatens world peace.

South Africa's Chief Delegate G. P. Joste, the first speaker in the debate, repeated his previous warning that his country will not accept UN interference in what it considers a domestic problem. His government has threatened to pull out of the world organization if it attempts any strong action on the issue.

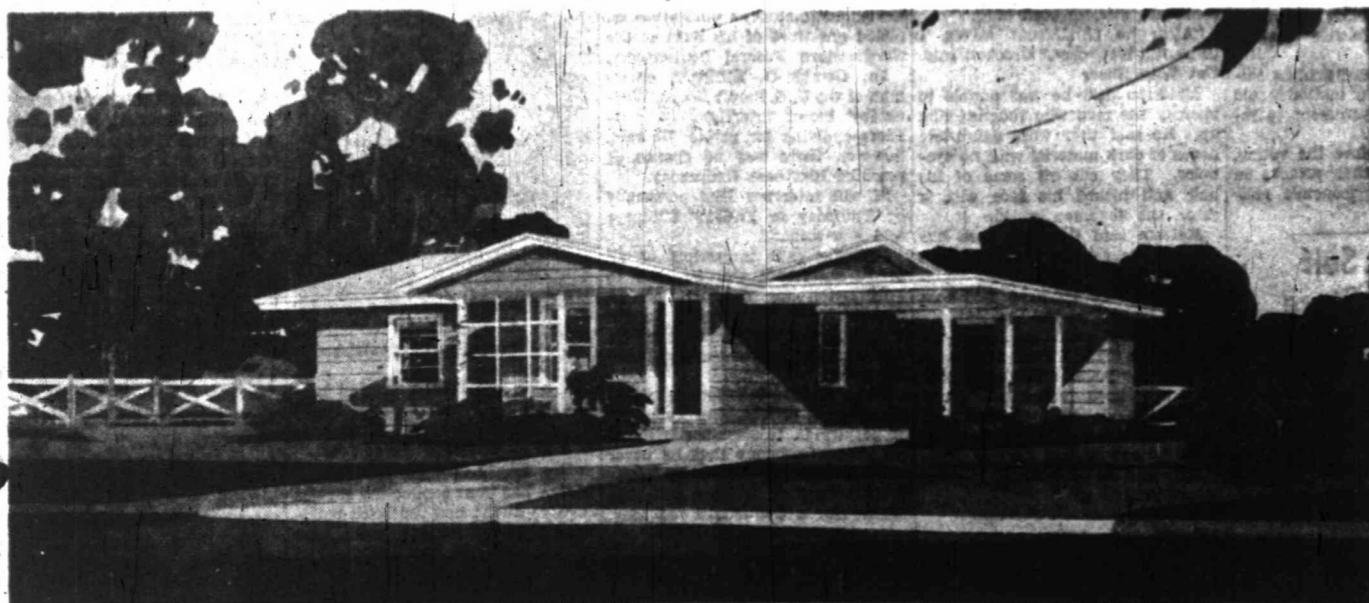

Hooded Men Chase Northern Newsman Out Of Mississippi

TUPELO, MISS.—P.—A 26-year-old newsman and his pretty blonde wife, under constant police guard, prepared to leave here Wednesday a few hours ahead of a 6 p.m. ultimatum set by two hooded men.

Newel Anderson, circulation manager of the Tupelo Journal, decided to return to Fargo in his native North Dakota. He told police the men took him for a wild ride in the country Monday night and roughed him up and that one of the men said he "didn't like Yankees around."

George McLean, publisher of the Journal, said Anderson began getting anonymous telephone calls more than two weeks ago telling him, "we don't like foreigners coming in here and you'd better get out of town."

Anderson and his 21-year-old wife came here October 1 from Grand Forks, N. D., where he had worked on the Grand Forks Herald. They were married there last June.

D. B. Crockett, chief of police in this Northeast Mississippi town of 15,000, said he had some clues but could not disclose them now.

"After he (Anderson) leaves, I think it'll blow over," Crockett said.

Cut With Razor

Anderson said he was unable to identify the men who roughed him up. He said they wore gauze-like hoods of dark material with no eyes. They cut off some of his hair and nicked his face with a razor, the newsman added.

McLean said the cuts were like deep scratches and that the men also slapped him around.

Mayor G. F. Maynard said that he was puzzled by the incident.

"The young man lives across the street from me and from all reports he is a fine young fellow and came here with good recommendations," Maynard said. "We can't understand why he should be singled out. "It is not typical of our community and we don't stand for that sort of prejudice."

Churchill's Tories Beat Labor Attack

LONDON.—P.—Prime Minister Churchill's Conservative government easily won its first test of strength in the Parliament session Tuesday night, beating down an opposition "no confidence" motion, 313 to 279.

Under British tradition, Commons approval of the motion would have forced the government to resign.

During debate before the voting, Laborites centered their attacks on the government's economic policies.

Texas Kills Self In Crowded Store

HOUSTON.—P.—Hoy Woods Miller, 24, Tuesday shot himself to death in a crowded department store where his wife was working as a clerk.

Mrs. Miller was just 15 feet away from her estranged husband when she heard the shot, turned, saw him and fainted. The couple had three children. Mrs. Miller said they separated a week ago.

Hiss became eligible for parole on November 21 when he will have completed one-third of his term at the Northeast Federal Penitentiary.

Dr. George O. Killinger, chairman of the U. S. Parole Board, Wednesday began interviews of prisoners applying for parole. He said, however, there was no chance of reaching Hiss' case Wednesday.

"I will interview Hiss personally by Thursday or Friday," Killinger told a newsmen.

Killinger said transcripts of all parole interviews will be sent to Washington for consideration by the full five-member board. To win a parole, the application must be approved by three of the five board members.

Hiss, 47-year-old former State Department official, was convicted of perjury in 1950 on the basis of his sworn testimony that he never gave government secrets to Whittaker Chambers, admitted one-time courier for a Communist spy ring.

Midland Airman's Honeymoon Waits One Year, But Happier Day Is Near

TOUL, FRANCE—The honeymoon for Lt. Forrest C. Wilson of Midland was delayed for one year, but in a week's time the Air Force officer will be on his way back to Texas and the belated honeymoon with his wife.

"I was married on Nov. 17, 1951," Lieutenant Wilson told me over a soupbowl full of coffee (there is a shortage of cups here) in the mess hall at Toul, France.

Before he had the honeymoon trip with the former Louise Motyl of Midland, he was called up for a 17-month tour of duty. The recall was illegal, and Wilson says, "Blessed heavens, they admitted it was illegal."

When he arrives back in Midland, and Mrs. Wilson will depart for honeymoon trip to Mexico City and Acapulco.

The lieutenant met his wife while both were working for Standard Oil Company of Texas in the McClintic Building in Midland.

"We didn't say 10 words to each other for the first few months, but one day I drew up a map and she drafted it. When she brought it to me, I thought: 'I don't have anything to do tonight, it's worth a try.'"

He asked for a date she accepted. "We went to see September Affair," Wilson recalls.

Then he didn't ask her for another date for three weeks. "Later she told me she was sure mad at me for that," he related. After the third date, "We started going steady." After he got his recall, he was sent to Lawson Field, Columbus, Ga.

Two Rows of Diamonds

"I wrote her to look around for a ring, since I couldn't find any at the air base. I told her to take her time and pick out a nice one. Later I thought she took too much time," he laughed. The ring she chose has two rows of diamonds, not just one, he explained.

The lieutenant, unlike all the other boys interviewed at Toul, "has had a pretty good tour of duty."

That is because out of 10 months stationed at Toul, he has spent six of them at Furstfeldbruck in Germany. "The best air base I have seen in all my life," he says.

To get to "Fursty" as the boys call the German field, the Midland officer rides the "Oriental Express."

"I didn't see a single spy, and I didn't like the old train either," he commented.

Wilson has been serving as a photographic interpreter, and more recently as a "research and development" officer.

He says if he doesn't get home by his anniversary—November 17—he will at least "be home for Christmas."

Another Ex-Midlander
Executive officer of the base is Col. Howard J. Withycombe, who received flight training at Randolph and Brooks Fields, and helped open the bases at Midland, Big Spring and Childress.

A tall, handsome officer, Colonel Withycombe said "Living conditions have been fairly rough," but that he thought with a "New PX, NCO club and service club, we can see progress is being made."

Withycombe said "It is the prevalent tendency to blame everything on the French. The French are not responsible for our being here. As far as I can see, the French have been very cooperative."

His secretary is a Texan—the only girl I saw working at Toul. She is Mrs. Lucy Dracy, Brownville native and San Antonio resident for the last six years. She and her husband live in Nancy.

There were other American girls working at Toul. They were single and lived in a hotel in Nancy. The French bothered them so much, demanding to know what kind of an occupation they had which paid them so much they could afford to live in the best hotel that the girls save up their jobs and returned to Germany.

The pay-off, they said, came when a French "Madam" demanded a "cut" from them.

T. Sgt. Max R. Smith, a Fort Worth native, son of Mrs. Ruth Bickel now of Denison, is living with his wife and their two children, Joyce Katherine and Bobby David, five and three, in a Nancy apartment, and getting along fairly well, he told me.

They pay \$60 for their apartment, plus \$20 to \$25 a month for lights and gas.

"Quite Nice Here"

"I wouldn't care for it in the states, but it is considered quite nice here," Sergeant Smith said. He added that his wife did part of

The red Double-Barred Cross is the registered insignia of the National Tuberculosis Association and its 3,000 affiliates, including the Midland County Tuberculosis Association, and it is also the international symbol of the modern campaign against TB, O'Neill said.

Since the early part of this century, the Cross has served as the emblem under which the voluntary associations have fought the spread of TB in communities throughout the nation, a fight largely financed by the American people themselves through their annual purchase of Christmas Seals, he continued.

The designer of the 1952 Christmas Seal is the art director of the New York Tuberculosis and Health Association, Tom Darling, of Amityville, N. Y., who, O'Neill said, was inspired by the symbol of voluntary

concerted action against tuberculosis. The Christmas Seal design features the red Double-Barred Cross with a lighted candle, symbolizing the light of knowledge, against a green background.

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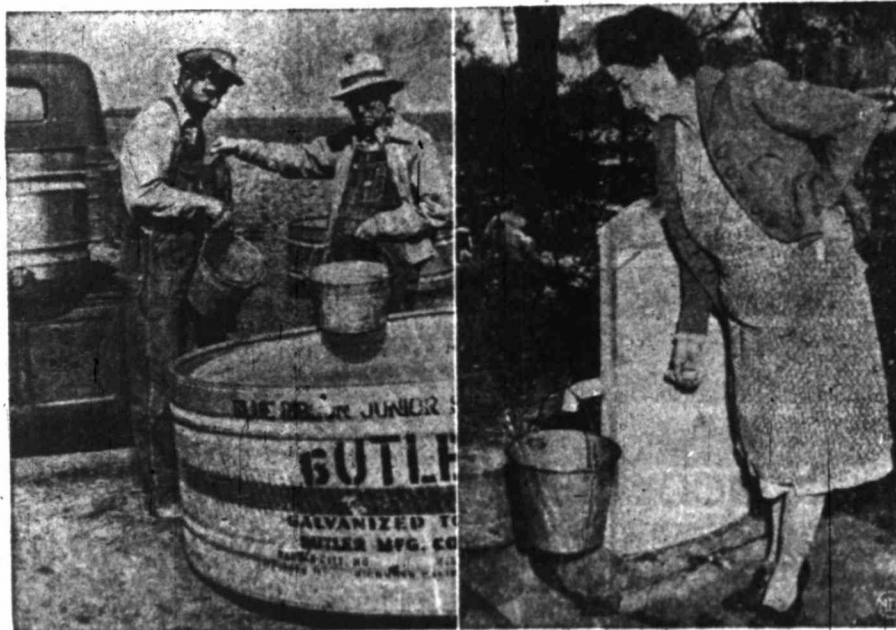
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Long Drought Parches Kansas Fields And Waterholes



DROUGHT PARCHES KANSAS FIELDS AND WATER HOLES—Ground parched until it breaks up into thousands of cracks, a cattle water hole with only a fraction of its normal content—and a sky with no sign of a rain cloud tell the story of the worst drought in Kansas history. This photo was taken between Yates Center and Eureka, but it is typical. Worst hit are six counties in the southeastern part of the state. Farmers have to haul water to livestock, for household uses and for drinking. Trucks containing every type of water-holding device fill the roads. Thousands of beef cattle have been sold off prematurely because there isn't enough feed and water. Fear of fire is a continuous nightmare in small towns without water systems.

Kansas farmers are facing up to the worst drought in the history of the state. Worst hit are six counties in the southeastern corner. The previous water shortage is the result of a very dry summer and fall. The crucial months of May and June, rainfall was far under normal. So now ponds are dry, streams do not run, wells have gone dry and there is a lack of drinking water everywhere. Farmers have to haul water to livestock, for household uses and for drinking. Trucks containing every type of water-holding device fill many of the roads. Water for cattle is hauled in from the nearest point where it is available and poured by hand into field tanks. Thousands of beef cattle have been sold off prematurely because there isn't enough feed and water. Farmers are "dusting in" their wheat hoping for late fall rains. Housewives use water as sparingly as possible. Many do the family laundry only once in two weeks. Fire is a continuous nightmare for small towns that have no water systems. One fire spread to all homes before trucks could put out the blaze with chemicals. Some towns keep a truck-load of water standing by each night as fire protection. These photos show typical hardships in the drought area.

Also typical of the drought's impact on the domestic front is the picture, right, of Mrs. George Lesco, of Thayer, pumping a bucket of water from her cistern for cooking. The water is hauled from Chanute, 15 miles away, in a 1150-gallon truck. It costs \$4 a load. Many Thayer housewives do the family laundry only once every two weeks because of the water shortage.

(Continued From Page One) view said he and his wife had an apartment in a French home, for which they paid \$30 a month, plus \$15 for utilities every two months. Capt. William F. O'Connell, a graduate of Austin College in Sherman and the University of Texas School of Law, found a 17-room French chateau on a five-acre plot, located 37 miles from the base. He and his wife share the chateau with another family. Winter months at Toul "were terrible, cold, muddy, very sloppy," he recalled. M/Sgt. Bailey Spivey of El Paso said he volunteered for duty, but he thought he was going to Germany. "I've never been in a place like this before. You can't go anywhere for anything and get it—especially if it's a bath," he said. M/Sgt. Sam Johnson of Weatherford, who has been in service 18 years, said "I was in the Pacific during the last war, and we had better recreation and better living conditions there than we have had here." Last Winter Johnson said he was standing in the cold weather waiting in a chow line "when I decided to write my Congressman." He wrote Senator Lyndon Johnston about conditions, and the senator wrote back that he was one of 30 men in the 10th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing who had written him about Toul. Recently, new commanding officers have been sent to Toul, and the boys have more respect for them, especially their new CO—Colonel "Shanty" O'Neill. "He has done more for us in one month than anyone else has the entire time," Sergeant Johnson said. "He gets out and wades in this mud with us," he said admiringly. M/Sgt. Phillip Waters of San Antonio, who was in service for 22 years, said he had been recalled for 21 months—"and sent to Toul." He said, "I may have been in worse places, but I don't know where." Pfc. Homer Peden, Jr., of Marshall said he was unhappy because he had been trained to do a job,

and that he had never gotten to practice his skill. "The government spent \$7,000 on me sending me to school to become a cryptographic technician, and I haven't practiced my MOS (military occupation special) since I've been here." He said he had just been "pulling details," doing odd jobs such as winterizing the tent. **Sunday School Worker** The Texan was studying music at the East Texas Baptist College, Marshall, when he was recalled into service. He is Sunday school superintendent at the Toul Air Base. Only about 15 children come to Sunday school, he said. Sgt. Moses Ardiano said he was attending Texas Western College in El Paso when "I got restless and joined the service." After six months at Toul, he said: "I wish I hadn't gotten so restless!" As chief construction draftsman, air installations office, the sergeant said he made plans and specifications for the pre-fabs, and laid out the sewage and water distribution lines. "The French had laid these out, but they were below our standards," he said. Airman 2/c Loyd Simon, a native of Fair, Texas, and son of Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Simon of Cleburne, is typical of many of the boys when they say they don't date the French girls. Stationed at Toul nine months, he said he has had one date. "What's the use of going with 'em if you don't understand them," he asked.

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PARENTS KILLED ONE YEAR AGO - Prayer Not Answered, But 11 Children Find Happiness

PONTIAC, MICH.—(AP)—The prayer of 16-year-old Jerry Moore has not been answered. And who is it that is not better that way? When his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Murray J. Moore, were killed tragically a year ago in an auto collision, Jerry and his 10 brothers and sisters were lost and bewildered. "Dear God," he said, "please let us stay together. If we had to lose our father and mother, surely the rest of us belong together."

The tragic accident only Jerry, 14-year-old Ann and Tom, 13, are together. New homes have been found for Sharon, 12, Jean, 10, Barbara, eight, Janet, seven, Jim, six, Jeff, five, Shirley, three, and Michael, one. Their new homes are widely spread out in Northville, Mich., Pittsburgh, Pa., and Royal Oak, Mich., and Tom soon will be living with a Royal Oak businessman and his family. Both Jerry and Ann, regarded as

too old to be adopted, are under the watchful and sympathetic eye of Probate Judge Arthur Moore (no relation), and steps for their complete education are being made. Every effort was made after the accident to keep the children together. The probate court first allowed them all to stay in the home newly purchased by their parents in nearby Leonard, in the care of their maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles T. Moss, of Royal Oak. However, when the grandparents' health failed, other arrangements had to be made. The children's paternal grand mother, Mrs. Grace Moore, took over and with the help of alternating house keepers, provided for the youngsters. Time made apparent the necessity of new homes for the children. And all but Jerry, Ann and Tom went into new homes, on a trial basis plan, which has since worked out nicely for all. These three now are with their paternal grandmother in Leonard. There has been no want. The nation responded with donations of more than \$21,000 after the accident. There will be an accounting of the trust fund next March, after which the balance may be used for care of Jerry and Ann. Congress granted to Lafayette a township of land in Florida.

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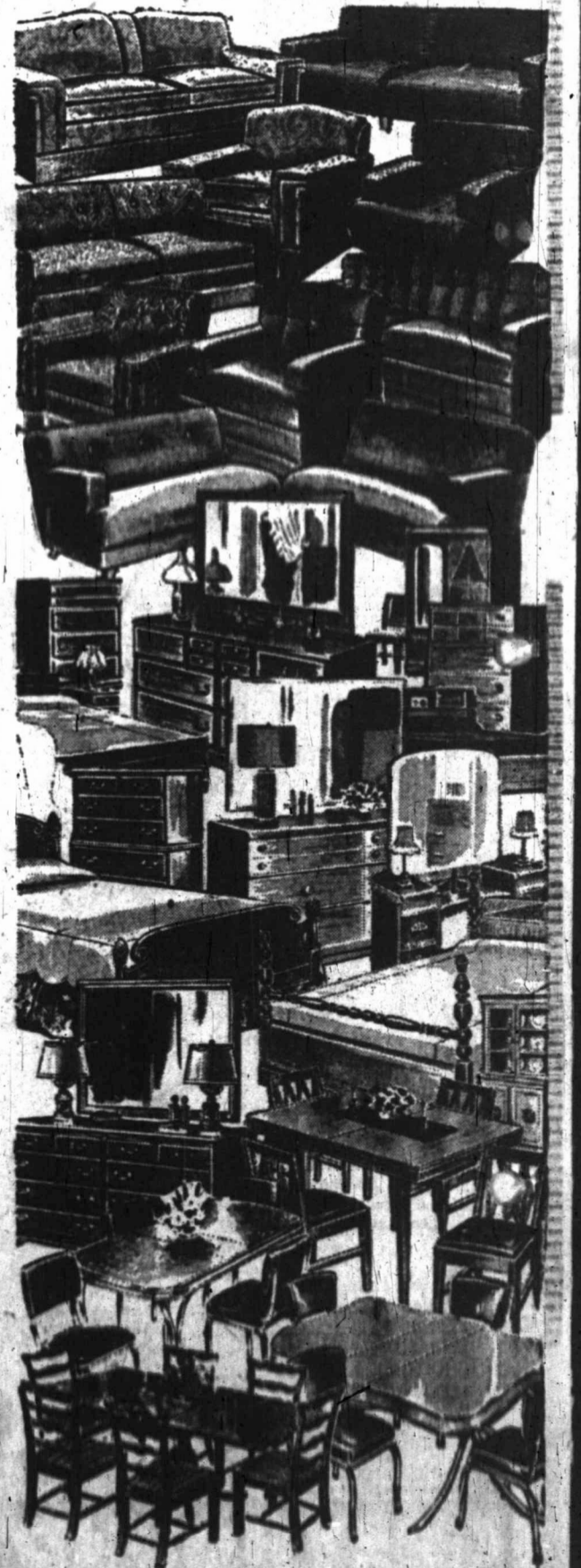

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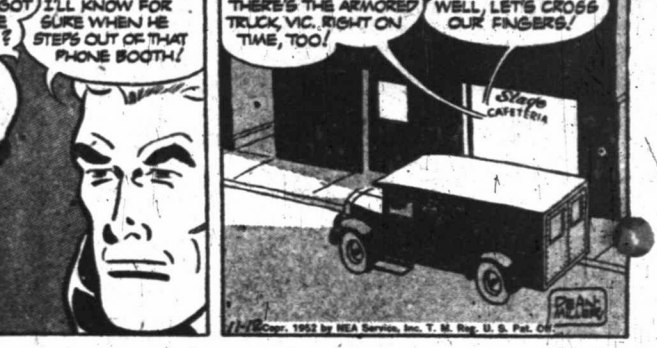

IN CONNECTICUT, IT'S A HEADACHE— Speakeasies Bustle Again Behind Loopholes In Laws

A new post-war type of drinking establishment—the locked-door, after-hour "bottle club"—is giving police in cities all over the nation their toughest time since the speakeasies of the 1920s.

While the speakeasies were clearly illegal during the prohibition era, the new bottle clubs present an entirely new wrinkle: they are strictly "legal" in the sense that there are no laws governing them.

They have flourished in many places—New York and Washington are notable examples—but so far nothing has been done about them unless they actually "sell" liquor. Now the state of Connecticut,

which finds itself plagued by the bottle clubs, is getting ready to crack down.

Show The Way

State Liquor Commissioner John C. Kelley, a former State Police major who makes licensed bars too the mark, says he will ask the 1953 state legislature to place the clubs under his agency's jurisdiction. Legislative leaders have promised prompt action. If Kelley's plan works it may show the way for other states to move in on the clubs.

A bottle club is a regular club in that it has officers and members, each of whom pays around \$10 to join and is given a key to the establishment. In Connecticut, for example, the only license cost is

a \$20 non-stock corporation license from the secretary of the state's office. With that, plus a room, you're in business. Zoning laws don't interfere as in the case of bars.

Members are supposed to furnish their own liquor, which can be kept there with their number plated on. Ginger ale and other set-ups, along with ice, are the only items sold.

Musie Is Free

The club bartender is called the "steward." Juice boxes often are provided but no nickels are required. Charging for such music would mean a license.

Prime attraction for these unorthodox clubs are their "after-hour" activities. While bars and night clubs must close in Connecticut at 1 a.m. weekdays, bottle clubs are just beginning to boom

Dancing Belles From Bali Find U. S. Bathtubs Funny

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Nine young ladies sat in the bathtub, blissfully exploding one of America's more exotic dreams. They were giggling as the water splashed. They had no idea what they were doing to red-blooded men.

These nine doll-sized "Dancers of Bali" are here as representatives of the tops in talent from the South Sea island of Bali. And they are—or should be—what every man means when he says, "Ahhh, the South Seas."

The Balinese belles discovered the bathtub quickly. They love it. It's like being home in Bali and sitting in the river, according to their chaperones, Mr. and Mrs. John Coast.

But there's more than bathtub water to dash on the Balinese dream. There is first and foremost the matter of architecture.

The Balinese beauty is as slim as a shadow and curved like a soda straw. When she's finally out of the tub and dressed in her long light cotton sheath and scarf, she measures 28 at the bust; 25 at the waist and 27 at the hips.

Mis America — the competing dream—is more apt to measure 34 in the bust; 24 in the waist; and 34 in the hips.

Then, of course, there's the noise. The Balinese speak in choppy fragments that sounded like high-pitched radio static. And they giggle when they laugh, or when they talk, or when they bathe.

According to Mr. and Mrs. Coast, the South Pacific beauties are particularly well schooled in looking after their material needs.

"All they want to take back with them," Mrs. Coast said, "are jewels and diamonds."

Lousy Housekeepers

The Balinese, she explained, are taught from the time they are seven years old to look out for them-

selves and be practical about their personal futures.

They want jewelry because it never loses value. But the girls also want money with which to buy rice fields at home. Eating can be a problem in Bali.

Although the dancers smile, it's a set smile adopted years ago when they started to dance. And they never become excited or impressed by anything.

"It is the character of the Balinese people," Mrs. Coast said, "to have no real capacity for enthusiasm."

To top it off, the privileged beauties of Bali—the dancers—are hardly good housekeepers. They are not allowed to expose their sensitive and delicate hands to manual labor. And they are discouraged from any contact or thought about men. They must have completely pure minds, uncontaminated by the world.

★ DR. JORDAN SAYS ★ Similar Diseases Attack Blood Vessels; Unrelated

Mrs. L. asks for a discussion of Raynaud's disease, and Mrs. M. for information concerning Burger's disease. These are considered to be separate disorders, but because they both involve the blood vessels and are similar in certain respects, it is possible to discuss them together in a single column.

In Raynaud's disease, the blood supply to a particular part is not cut off entirely but the blood vessels affected go into spasms and contract, especially when exposed to cold. An emotional upset may act the same way as cold.

Raynaud's disease is most common in the hands and consequently the fingers often turn white when put in cold water or when anything else happens which produces a constriction of the blood vessels.

Exposure to cold, emotional upsets and like factors which bring on the symptoms should be avoided. Tobacco must be prohibited permanently.

The cause is not known and although several good treatments are available there is none which as yet can be considered a sure cure.

In Raynaud's disease, surgery can be useful although amputation is rarely necessary. More often surgery is aimed at the sympathetic nervous system with the purpose of relaxing the spasms in the blood vessels.

A true inflammation of the blood vessels—particularly those in the feet and legs—actually occurs in Burger's disease. After a while the changes produced may cause complete blockage of blood flow through these vessels. The disappearance of the normal pulsation or beats of the blood vessels in the affected limb is characteristic.

The disease is much more common in men than in women. Although the cause is not definitely known, tobacco, infection, ringworm and a chemical poison known as ergot seem to play a part sometimes, at least.

Surgery Often Needed

All patients suffering from Burger's disease cannot be treated alike. The most important items of treatment, however, are absolute avoidance of tobacco, removal of any sources of infection, and a good intake of fluids and salts.

In the more serious cases the use of drugs to prevent coagulation of the blood and some other form of medical management may be useful. Surgery is frequently required. When the blood supply has been cut off to a toe, for example, the entire toe may have to be removed.

The treatment of both these diseases is improving. More and more can be done for them, and research now going forward is likely to lead to further improvement in the future.

NEW LAWS PENDING

With the bottle clubs put under state supervision, it is believed they will die out. For it will and their after-hour, locked door and no 800 license status they have been enjoying.

However, even tougher legislation is being proposed by police groups who want the clubs outlawed for good and it is possible the lawmakers may take that course.

Hartford, which has about eight of these clubs, may get around to the subject sooner. The Common Council strongly is considering requiring health and police licenses of the local clubs as a stopgap measure pending action by the legislature.

BULL-BAITERS

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NO EASY ROAD FOR BOYLE— Peace Returns To Highway Bought With Blood Of GI's

ROME—(AP)—Everyone dreams of a famous street he would like to walk or a hotel he would like to sleep in—from Broadway in New York to the Raffles in Singapore, home of the gin sling.

In wartime there was a period when nobody thought of a hotel, but there was a frustrating highway that was the goal of an army. It was Highway No. 6, a pleasantly meandering macadam road between Naples and Rome.

Mark Clark was trying by brute strength to bust along it from the pleasant vale of sin, Napoli—called by Mussolini "the sewer of Italy"—

to Rome, where Il Duce and the Pope lived as uneasy neighbors.

Salerno Find It Tough

I remember the day two sailors tried serenely to drive from Salerno to Rome along Highway 6—and had to be rescued from their shot up vehicle by a disgusted infantry patrol. In those days the Germans were discouraging patrols by planting plastic mines that, if stepped on, would blow a man's leg off below the knee. If a fellow tripped on one, and fell on another with his hands or face, it was rather worse.

The Germans also sat in rock-covered steel pill boxes from which they could rake Highway 6. This was true both at Cassino and in the

flank posts guarding the push from Anzio. The continuous death of stalemate lasted for weeks.

That stalemate never was broken until after I left Italy, returned home and later went into Normandy.

Read Smooth Again

All during the war—and the years since—I wondered what it would be like to drive along Highway 6 from Salerno through Naples into Rome. I had heard there was a great Allied cemetery at Anzio, that the lowly and abby of Caspino were rebuilt, and the road lay smooth again.

As our plane landed in Rome, my wife, Frances, who can't tell a map of San Francisco from a drawing of a dinosaur, said:

"Now be sure to show me where you were in the war."

But our time was so short I had to decide whether to drive down that lonely Highway 6, where lonely thousands perished, or show her something fresh and new to both of us is exactly the opposite direction—Venice.

And so we saw Venice. I guess I'll always be a coward.

Let others speed in comfort and safety on Highway 6. So many I knew in wartime died to make it free. Why should I finish the journey now that they can never make?

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ART EXPERTS ARE BEWILDERED—

Hundreds Of Masterpieces Are Fakes, Copyist Proves

LUEBECK, GERMANY—An obscure German refugee painter has kicked over the easel for scores of Europe's art experts.

Lothar Malskat, who publicly fooled West German art authorities with his fake medieval church murals, made a clean breast to police.

"Conscience" drove him, he said, to startle art lovers with the disclosure that the murals on St. Mary's Church in Luebeck were not of 1270 A. D. origin but his own 1930 work.

The St. Mary's murals, believed uncovered by war-time bomb damage to the church and then "restored," actually are faces of German movie actresses, friends, and

relatives of the little painter.

What made it worse for art experts and patrons was that the "restoration" at St. Mary's was unveiled in the presence of West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer himself.

They Wanted Names

Malskat, who is 39, says he has produced hundreds of fake "old masters."

"They wanted names," he said. "I gave names to them: Rembrandt, Gauguin, Degas, Corot and others. They should have read 'Malskat.'"

Nervous art gallery men in important European cities are culling their stocks to make sure some of

Malskat's masterful "old masters" are not in their establishments.

Only the referee knows how many he turned out.

The palette was washed clean when Malskat quarreled with his employer, Dietrich Fey, 40. He claims the fake restorations and other phony pieces were done at Fey's order.

Critics Are Fooled

Fey has not answered the charges formally, but his attorney issued a statement saying Malskat lied and that he would be sued for libel.

Of the St. Mary's murals unveiled at the 700th anniversary of the old church, Malskat relates:

"There was nothing left of Mid-

dle Ages paintings on the walls. So I borrowed books and copied portraits of German film actresses, some of friends and relatives, and others from historic pictures—in-cluding one of Genghis Kahn."

Art critics soberly inspected them and pronounced them genuine. But something got under Malskat's skin. He says it was Fey.

"He gave me only scraps of what I earned with my work," Malskat said. "While he was being slapped on the back by Chancellor Adenauer at the church I was sitting in a back room among the laborers, drinking a bottle of beer."

"At first fake reproductions were fun, and it kept me in money too.

Art dealers wanted to see big names.

Jail Fey, Too

"I don't care if I go to jail. I want to see Fey there too, and some of those art dealers who knew perfectly well they were buying fakes cheaply and selling them to foreign collectors for fortunes."

He said that he and Fey also perpetrated a fake restoration in 1937 on a 12th Century painting which German art writers praised as original masterpieces "by our brilliant ancestors."

Malskat comes from Koenigsberg, East Prussia, taken over by the Russians in the last war and renamed Kaliningrad. He says he al-

most was found out back in 1938 when he painted a turkey in a mural. A Hamburg professor pointed out that the arrival of turkeys in Europe from the new world post-dated the paintings by a couple of centuries, but the Nazis wanted to avoid a scandal and invented a story that Vikings brought them over.

"I had seen some scratches on the wall, which looked as if they might have been a turkey and painted it," he explained.

OUT OF DOORS with Field & Stream

Marshall L. Shepherd of Myrtle Beach, S. C., wants to know something about the origin and development of the fish hook. According to Shepherd, the Congressional Library has nothing on the subject, so I'll try to bring you neo-historians up to date.

Double hooks were used before single hooks, but this was long before the appearance of the modern hook as we know it today. No one knows exactly when fish hooks were first used by man, but the first hook-like instrument recorded in history was the gorge.

During the Stone Age the gorge was made of wood, stone, flint, bone or shell. Sharpened at both ends, it was buried lengthwise in the bait. A line was tied around the middle of the gorge and when the fish

wood lashed to the hook near the point. Samples of these crude hooks, but having ivory bars, may be seen in museums among the weapons and fishing equipment gathered from Indian and Eskimo tribes of the Far North in comparatively recent times.

Many unusual types of primitive fish hooks have been unearthed in various parts of the globe. The early Chinese used a different version of the gorge, for instance, a splint of bamboo tied in a flexed or bent position. When the line was pulled, the splint straightened out and jammed in the fish's stomach. Later attempts in other parts of the globe are whale bone, reindeer horn, and wild boar tusk hooks—all polished with some scraping instrument.

In this country, early people used a cactus spine hook, which was tempered with heat and moisture. The Polynesians made hooks of human bone and the primitive Swiss lake dwellers made a bronze gorge with a U-shaped bend in the center for tying on the line.

Even today, in out-of-the-way places, primitive hooks still are in use. In some cases these fish snatchers are more effective than the moderns, because they are designed for highly specialized commercial angling.

When the Chinese made the first steel needles (thirteenth century) the groundwork was laid for commercial hook making. The fish hook industry, large as it is, is carried on principally in only three countries today: Norway, America, which has more recently entered the field, and England, the home of the oldest factories in the fish hook world.

swallowed the bait, a pull on the line crossed the gorge in the fish's stomach so that he couldn't eject it. In a sense you might call this a double hook.

At any rate, the next step was a more positive one, and the primitive angler found that the gorge was more effective when bent up on each side. The time he realized the curved point was superior—it was around 5,000 B. C.—the single hook came into existence.

Shortly afterward—a few thousand years—a barb was added. The barb was simply a sharp piece of
