Frankel Sets Site For 6,500-Foot Test In Coke

Frank Frankel of Houston is to start operations at once at his No. 1 Methodist Orphans Home of Waco, which is to be a 6,500-foot wildcat test into the Ellenburger in Central Coke County.

It is two miles southwest of the town of Robert Lee and 467 feet from north and west lines of section 4, Jose Deloche survey.

Harry Bass Drilling Company of Dallas has the rotary contract. Material for the rig is now being moved in.

The wildcat is to be drilled as a result of a deal worked up by J. H. (Jerry) Bartley and R. R. (Dick) Crawford, Midland independent operators.

They secured a spread of leases in the Central Coke County region for the drilling of a deep wildcat.

Bartley and Crawford turned the deal to drill and they retained an interest.

Texas Gulf Finds More Oil And Gas Shows In NE Ector

Texas Gulf Producing Company was drilling below 11,826 in Devonian lime and chert after finding more shows of oil and gas on a drillstem test in No. 1 Headlet, wildcat in Northeast Ector County.

The last drillstem test was taken 11,715 to 11,787 feet. Tool was open three hours. A 990-foot water blanket was used. Gas surfaced in 32 minutes at the rate of 271,000 cubic feet daily. It decreased to 223,000 cubic feet daily by the end of the test period.

Recovery was heavily gas-cut muddy water blanket and 1,080 feet of heavily gas-cut and slightly oil-cut drilling fluid. Open flowing bottomhole pressure was from 800 to 980 pounds. Shut-in pressure after 45 minutes was 5,260 pounds.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 8, block 41, T-2-S, T&P survey.

Buffalo Schedules Deep Wildcat In NW Lea Sector

Buffalo Oil Company No. 1 Neal is to be drilled as a 10,500-foot wildcat in Northwest Lea County, N. M.

The prospector was staked 680 feet from north and east lines of section 14-11-32e.

Operations are to start at once.

Skelly Oil Company staked site for another project in the Lovington (Abo) field. It is No. 2-S State, 990 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of section 35-16-30e. It is in Central-East, Lea County. It is to go to 8,500 feet.

Amerada Petroleum Corporation spotted No. 1 L. E. Stevens in the Saunders field of Central-West Lea County. It is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 33-14-33e. It will go to 10,000 feet.

Shell Oil Company No. 2-A State is to be drilled as an 11,600-foot wildcat in the Echols field of North-Central Lea County. Operator staked site 990 feet from south and 2,310 feet from east lines of section 2-11s-37e.

Hudspeth Wildcat Is Barren Through Ellenburger Zone

General Crude Oil Company No. 1 Merrell and Voyles, Central-North Hudspeth County wildcat had reached 4,595 feet in lime and is making more hole.

This prospector has not yet encountered any shows of oil or gas.

Location is at the center of the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 8, block 69, T&P survey. It is six miles southwest of Dell City and 65 miles east of El Paso.

Top of the Yessid is at 1,190 feet which is on a datum of 2,676 feet above sea level. On that maker it is 23 feet low to the Jones No. 1. It is a deep dry hole, four and one-half miles to the south.

That failure had some extremely good shows of oil and gas in the Devonian and in the Ellenburger but neither section could be completed for commercial production.

General Crude No. 1 Merrell and Voyles topped the Pow Wow conglomerate at 2,100 feet, which is a plus 1,766 feet, and 313' low to the Jones No. 1. Mowry.

High To Failure

Top of the Devonian is at 2,470 feet, which is plus 1,396 feet and 330 feet high to the Jones No. 1. Mowry. Top of the Ellenburger is at 3,655 feet, which is on a datum of plus 223 feet. That is 320 feet high to the Jones No. 1. Mowry.

The General Crude No. 1 Mowry took a drillstem test in the Devonian at 2,681-2,735 feet. The tool was (Continued On Page Two)

Blackout To Hide Ike In Korea

Glynn Rogers, 28, Is Shot To Death By Fellow Worker

Glynn Rogers, 28-year-old bulldozer operator, was shot and wounded fatally Wednesday night during an argument in a trailer court here with a fellow worker on a highway construction project.

Charged Thursday morning with murder before Justice of the Peace L. C. Stephenson was Dillard Leon (Johnny) Melton, 27-year-old powder monkey on a construction project one mile south of Stanton. Bond was set at \$5,000.

Rogers died a few minutes after he was shot in Melton's trailer house at South Lamesa Road and East Pennsylvania Street.

Melton surrendered to police officers and a short time later, made a statement admitting the shooting.

"He threatened to whip me and when he drew back a whisky bottle I pulled my gun out from under the pillow and fired it once," Melton told Texas Ranger John Wood, Deputy Sheriff F. S. Buchalaw and Detective Lt. Dick Hemingway.

Collapses At Car

Rogers, who lived at Trailer City on the Rankin Highway with his wife and three children, ran from the trailer and collapsed as he entered his automobile, in which his wife, Mary, was sitting.

A Newbie W. Ellis Chapel ambulance rushed him to a hospital, where he was pronounced dead upon arrival.

Billy Charles Cargill, 21-year-old oil field worker and Melton's brother-in-law, was being held as a material witness.

Cargill told officers Rogers had come to his trailer, near Melton's, and offered everyone a drink from a bottle of whisky.

Melton, Cargill said, and Rogers became involved in an argument and Melton finally left and went to his trailer.

Rogers continued talking in loud and vulgar language, Cargill continued, and finally the two of them went to Melton's trailer.

German-Made Pistol

Melton said he was sitting on his bed, drinking a cup of coffee, when Rogers entered and sat down beside him. He said Rogers continued talking in a loud and threatening manner.

He said Rogers lifted the whisky bottle, as if to hit him, and he pulled out the German-made pistol and fired once.

Rogers, a native of Wortham, had lived in this area four years.

The body was to be forwarded Thursday to Wortham for funeral services and interment.

Surviving are the widow; three children, Mary Catherine, Robert Glynn and Ernestine; the parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Rogers of Wortham; a brother, Billy Rogers of Wortham, and three sisters, Mrs. Edna Frances Yuber and Mrs. Eva Miller of Mexia and Idell Cott of Wortham.

Gulf Winds Offer Texas Hope Of Rain

Light southerly winds from the Gulf of Mexico increased the amount of moisture in the air over dry, drought-stricken Texas Thursday and brought renewed hopes of rain.

All that was needed, the Weather Bureau said, was a slow-moving cold front from the north—then, presto, precipitation for seared pastures and suffering crops.

But the weather spokesman warned:

"Too soon to predict anything now. Maybe we can tell by tonight." Meanwhile, all of Texas except the western section continued to warm up slightly Thursday, and three was increasing cloudiness over North Central Texas.

Humidities were increasing slowly in the east, north central and south central areas while West Texas stayed partly cloudy.

Highest temperatures in the state Wednesday ranged from Galveston's low 63-degree maximum to 78 at Childress. Most sections had comfortable afternoon temperatures between 65 and 75 degrees.

Strong winds whipped through West Texas and the Panhandle. Abilene reported a 27-mile-an-hour wind, with gusts up to 34; San Angelo gusts up to 29 and Amarillo gusts up to 25 miles an hour at mid-morning.

Vietminh Rebels Flee After Strike

HANOI, INDOCHINA — (P) — French and Thai soldiers repulsed a series of strong Communist-led Vietminh attacks against two posts 30 miles northeast of the Thai capital of Lal Chau Thursday, killing 50 enemy troops.

The Vietminh used one to three battalions in their attempt to storm the posts at Poy San Kap, but they withdrew under heavy French air bombings.

No special ceremony is scheduled in connection with the turning on of the colorful lights, which are strung across downtown streets, Chamber Manager Delbert Downing said.

Most downtown stores, however, will unveil their Christmas-decorated display windows at the stated hour, Downing added. The windows, he said, will be "something to behold," and all residents of Midland and vicinity are invited to be on hand in downtown Midland Monday night to shop the attractive, gift-laden windows and to join in the festivity of the occasion.

"From then on through Christmas Eve, every day will be a banner Christmas shopping day in Midland," Downing declared.

The street decorations were installed last week by the Texas Electric Service Company for the Retailers Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, of which Henry Murphy is chairman.

Then at 5 p.m. Thursday, December 4, Santa Claus will visit Midland on his annual pre-Christmas Eve trip to West Texas.

A huge parade through the streets of downtown Midland is being arranged by the Midland Junior Chamber of Commerce in honor of the distinguished visitor from the North Pole.

Eight Live Reindeer

Santa Claus will ride in the parade on a sleigh drawn by eight live reindeer. He has advised sponsors he is anxious to see and talk with all West Texas adults and youngsters alike during his brief visit here.

Bud White, chairman of the Jay-Cee's parade committee, said numerous floats will appear in the procession, along with bands from several Midland schools. He invited all business firms and organizations to be represented in the Santa Claus parade.

Midland National Selects Cashier, Elevates Hutcheson

James Grant Byus of Houston was elected cashier of The Midland National Bank at a meeting of its directors Wednesday afternoon.

He succeeds William A. Hutcheson who was promoted to the post of assistant vice president. Foy Brantley, an assistant cashier, also was elevated to an assistant vice presidency.

The election and promotions, effective next Monday, were announced by Jack Wicker, vice president of the financial institution.

Byus, a graduate of Temple High School, was employed by William Cameron & Company in Houston two years before joining the City National Bank of Houston where he was employed until 1941 when he joined the armed forces. He was released from the Air Force in 1946 as a captain, after flying 50 combat missions in the Southwest Pacific Theater.

Following his Air Force duty, Byus served a year as a national bank examiner, headquartered in Dallas. In February, 1947, he was elected cashier of the Heights State Bank of Houston, the position he is resigning to come to Midland.

Eisenhower Plans Listener Role In Meet With Truman

AUGUSTA, GA. — (P) — President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower reportedly will steer clear of any policy commitments to President Truman when they confer at the White House.

Eisenhower associates who asked not to be named said his role at the conference mainly will be that of a listener, although they emphasized that he agrees with the President that the session will amount to a demonstration of American unity.

The White House announced Wednesday the Eisenhower-Truman meeting has been set for 2 p.m. Tuesday.

In proposing the meeting last week the President said it would help achieve an orderly transition from the old Administration to the new. He mentioned a need for discussion of world problems.

Eisenhower replied that he shared Truman's hope "that we may present to the world an American unity in basic issues."

Over the weekend, the President-elect's headquarters put out a statement which said in effect that any pre-inauguration conferences with Truman Administration officials would in no way bind the President-elect as to Republican policy.

The statement was intended to make it clear, the general's associates said, that any policy decisions before inauguration day—January 20—would be the responsibility of the outgoing Administration.

Eisenhower reportedly feels strongly that it would be a mistake for him to deal in any other way at Tuesday's meeting—in either the international or the domestic fields.

Eisenhower, meanwhile, is seeking a cross section of Republican leaders' views on the Korean War situation in advance of his trip to the war zone.

That is one of the major purposes of a series of conferences the general will hold, starting with a session at his vacation retreat here Friday with Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Aides said the President-elect wants to talk over the Korean problem with Dewey, and possibly some Congress members, before he confers with Truman.

Dewey, who will arrive here by plane about noon Friday, visited the Korean battlefield in 1951.

AS KINDLY MIDLANDERS OPEN HEARTS, HOMES— Nine-Year-Old Rodney Boykin Travels To Hobbs, Joins 20-Month-Old Brother

Nine-year-old Rodney Boykin and his tiny brother, Stephen, were safely together again Thursday.

It was a foster home in Hobbs, N. M., but at least they were together and that's what their father, convicted murderer Robert Marion Boykin, wanted.

"Rodney showed up here about 2:30 Wednesday afternoon," said a spokesman for the Child Welfare Office in Hobbs.

"We immediately took him to his brother and they are safe now in a foster home here."

But in the aftermath of the tearful separation of Rodney from his father, scores of Midlanders Wednesday offered to provide homes for both the children.

Rodney's plight became known after his father was convicted Tuesday night in 70th District Court of murder in the slaying last March of Leldon Charles (Treetop) Smith.

After the verdict was read, officers led Boykin away to his jail cell and, with \$40 in his pocket, Rodney walked alone from the courthouse.

His attorney, Pete Turner, said the lad went back to the hotel and sleeping in the room he had been sharing with his father since Monday.

His father had left him instructions to go on to Hobbs, N. M., and join his 20-month-old brother, who had been under the care of the Child Welfare Department there.

"Wednesday morning," related Turner, "Mrs. Turner picked Rodney up at the hotel and he spent the morning at our house."

"He said he couldn't stay but had to go on to New Mexico. Mrs. Turner took him to a bus station and he left at 12:05 Wednesday afternoon."

Meanwhile, Midland residents had heard of the plight of the little fellow.

By mid-afternoon, one couple had appeared at the Midland County Courthouse, ready to adopt Rodney or give him a home.

Throughout the afternoon and night, similar requests came to District Judge R. W. (Bob) Hamilton and District Clerk Lucille Johnson.

They could only assure the callers that Rodney would be cared for.

"I got called all last night," reported Sheriff Ed Darnell. "They wanted to help out."

"One man, dressed in khaki, said he didn't have much money but he'd pay to see that those youngsters were taken care of. Others—some were men and wife—wanted to take him in."

"I assured them arrangements had been made with the welfare agency in New Mexico to take care of Rodney when he arrived."

Meanwhile attorneys for Boykin indicated that an appeal would not be made from the 15-year sentence.

Date for the sentencing has not been set.

 Location is 300 feet from south and east lines of the southwest quarter of section 16, block 14, University survey and seven miles northwest of Andrews.
 It is one mile southwest of the recently opened North Shafter Lake (San Andre's) field and one and one-half miles northeast of a Yates sandy lime oil producer in the Shafter Lake gas sector.

Gas Discovery Is Potentialized In NE Tom Green

 Recovery was 23 feet of Canyon sand and 30 feet of shale.
 This wildcat flowed oil on a drillstem test of the Pennsylvanian from 4,178 to 4,193 feet.

LOS ANGELES —(AP)—There's a new sleeping pill on the market that knocks you out, keeps you out for eight hours, and then wakes you up.

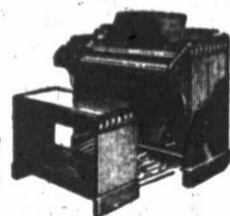

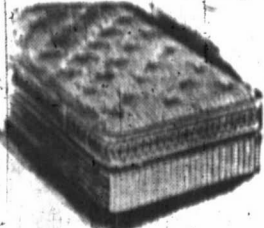

MacArthur Papers Placed In Custody On Order By Army

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Thirty-two packing cases of documents Gen. Douglas MacArthur had brought from Japan and stored in a Brooklyn warehouse have been transferred to Army custody in New York.

Brig. Gen. Frank Dorn, deputy chief of Army information, said Wednesday the transfer took place about two weeks ago and, as far as he knew, was not the result of any political pressure.

Dorn, announcing the transfer, said it followed an agreement worked out "amicably" between MacArthur and Lt. Gen. Willis Crittenden, First Army commander. He said MacArthur still has access to the documents.

The Washington Times-Herald in a copyrighted article said Secretary of the Army Pace had ordered Crittenden to take over the papers.

MacArthur was not reached for immediate comment.

Scientists Converge On 'Red Tide' Area To Combat Outbreak

GALVESTON—(AP)—Seven scientists seeking an answer to a "red tide" which kills fish by the millions were to leave here Thursday for Fort Meyers, Fla., where a new outbreak has been reported.

The scientists, connected with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, were to leave on the motor vessel Alaska, stationed here for Gulf fishery investigations.

Albert Collier, chief of the Gulf fishery investigations, said here he had been informed millions of fish had been killed near Fort Meyers by a tiny organism common to marine life. In 1947 a similar "red tide" killed millions of fish in the Gulf.

Collier said the fish were killed by dinoflagellates—microscopic organisms that in profusion become poisonous to the fish. He said no remedy is known at this time for the condition.

"Dinoflagellates gives the water the amber or red color," Collier said. "When they occur by the millions—as in the case now—fish are killed soon after swimming into the infested water."

Superior Judge William B. McKesson has ordered the boy placed in the care of a married sister who lives in another city.

The widowed mother, Mrs. Bertha Drews, 38, said she bought the fatal weapon as a protection against prowlers.

Terminal Lions Set Dance, Turkey Shoot

The turkey shoot will begin at 2 p.m. at the old caliche pit. The sponsors will furnish rifles and shot-guns.

"We in the banking industry have learned a lot in the last few years," Brenton said in an interview. "We used to wait until calamity hit us before we did something about it. Now we plan ahead. Texas Farm, Ranch Groups Decry Price Control Legislation

Two large Texas associations of ranchers and farmers have passed resolutions condemning present price control regulations of the Defense Production Act.

The actions Wednesday were regarded in some circles as reflecting a growing distaste for price controls throughout Texas.

The associations — The Texas Farm Bureau and The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association—drew their memberships from every section of the state and represent thousands of rural and smalltown citizens.

"We are opposed to price controls," the Texas Farm Bureau said in a resolution passed at San Antonio. "Experience has proved they discourage production rather than result in increased production needed for our nation."

The sheep and goat raisers, ending their annual convention at San Angelo, also hit at the Reciprocal Trade Agreement Act.

"It is wasteful of federal funds," the sheep and goat men said, "to support the price of a product and then allow foreign imports to enter at a figure that impairs the support price."

Potter Jury Frees Suspect On Charge Of Bribing L-Man

AMARILLO—(AP)—T. B. Freeman, former operator of a drive-in cafe in Potter County, was found innocent Wednesday of giving a State Liquor Control Board agent a cash bribe.

Freeman, now a Dublin resident, testified he paid Inspector John L. Dibrell \$50 in September, 1951. He said Dibrell demanded the money as the price of allowing Freeman to remain in business.

The jury was charged to consider if Freeman had given the money under duress.

Wife Strangler Given Life Term

HOUSTON—(AP)—A Criminal District Court jury here deliberated 95 minutes Wednesday to decide to give Daniel Pleas Parker a life sentence for strangling his former wife to death.

"That's fair and just," the 25-year-old Houston railroad switchman muttered after the verdict.

Parker had been charged with murder in the September 15 death of Mrs. Evelyn Allene Parker, whose body was found in her Houston apartment. She had been strangled with an electric fan cord.

No defense witnesses were called and the state used only three.

Deaths Of Texans On Korean Front Near 1,000 Mark

Almost a thousand Texans have died in the Korean War.

The names of five more dead were announced Thursday. They brought to 987 the number killed in action. Another 4,214 have been wounded.

These figures are not complete. They represent an Associated Press compilation of casualty lists released almost daily by the Defense Department. The lists lag considerably behind battle action.

Neither do the figures include Texans who died of wounds in hospitals far from the front lines.

And there's something else the statistics don't—and cannot—show. That is the personal sorrow felt by the next of kin.

Short of World Wars

The toll exceeds that suffered in Texas' battle for independence against Mexico in 1836. Best available figures gave 546 killed in the rebellion against Mexican rule.

Yet Korean casualties fall far short of the number of Texans who fell in the two world wars. In World War I, 2,722 were killed. World War II saw 13,810 deaths.

Increased intensity of the fighting in recent weeks is reflected directly in the casualty lists.

Twenty-two men were reported killed during October, 16 in September and 23 in August. Thus far in November, the toll has reached 17.

More Last Year

That compares with last April, for example, when nine were reported killed in action. In March it was 11.

But casualty lists are not as high as for the same period last year.

In October, 1951—the month the allies opened an offensive on the Western Front—59 Texans were reported killed in action.

Thursday's AP compilation is the first since last February 24. At that time, Texans killed in Korea numbered 835. The wounded totaled 3,569.

PITTSBURGH—P. The late Philip Murray, who won the title of labor's statesman while bringing the CIO to its greatest strength, went to his final resting place Thursday near the soft coal fields where he began his life's work.

The funeral of the CIO president brought labor leaders from every section of the country into the industrial stronghold to pay their final respects to the one-time labor militant who became the friend of U. S. presidents.

About that time, a Western Air Lines pilot radioed that he saw a fiery explosion in the vicinity of Lake West, some 15 miles northwest of Shelton.

Labor Picture Brighter Here

While job placements showed a slight decline for the month of October as compared with September, the overall picture for labor is brighter than it was during the same two months in 1951, J. D. Bechtol, manager of the Midland office of the Texas Employment Commission, reported Thursday.

The job placements in October of this year were 1,030, a total of 17 less than the previous months. The TEC office here, however, only referred 1,516 persons to employers in October as compared with 1,670 in September.

Unemployment compensation claims dropped to 96 in October as compared with 122 in September, Bechtol said.

The TEC manager said that positions are now opening up in the oil fields with increased activity.

Other openings include a male or female accountant with degree, chemical engineer, two civil engineers (one require state license), secretary with land experience, secretary with independent oil company, statistical typist, stenographer for land and scouting departments, draftsman (regular or part-time), bookkeeper, salespeople in insurance, sales girls (experience required), gift wrappers, dry cleaning and laundry workers.

Former Midlander Dies Of Suffocation In Odessa Apartment

ODESSA—Andrew Jackson Basham, 33, of Odessa and formerly of Midland, was found dead about 11:30 a.m. Wednesday in his apartment here.

Authorities believed death to have resulted from carbon monoxide poisoning. Peace Justice Thomas D. Murphy, who returned a verdict of accidental death by suffocation, said gas stoves in a bedroom and bathroom were burning and the windows of the apartment were closed. Basham apparently had turned on the stoves to get warm and then gone back to sleep, Murphy said.

Basham had moved to Odessa two days previously to be employed by a used car firm. He was a veteran of World War II and was a member of American Legion posts in both Midland and Odessa.

Funeral arrangements have been tentatively set with services and interment in Jacksonville, Ill.

Survivors include the widow, who is an employe of Shell Oil Company in Midland; the father, Andrew Jackson Basham, Sr., of Alexander, Ill.; and a sister, who lives in Chicago.

Bleak '53 Prospect Eases Fear Of Grain Crop Surplus

WASHINGTON—Government food officials no longer are fretting over a big reserve of wheat being stored under a federal price support program.

An Agriculture Department report Wednesday drew a dark picture of next year's winter wheat prospects. Because of prolonged dry weather, the outlook for this and other fall-sown grains intended for harvest next year was said to be precarious in many areas.

Thus, unless there is a quick turn in weather conditions the reserve being built up from this year's second largest wheat crop in history would be needed to help meet food and other market demands next year.

The department's semi-final report for the 1952 crop season said production is turning out to be the second largest on record, only 2.5 per cent below the top mark set in 1948. Prospects improved almost one per cent during October, thanks to usually favorable harvesting weather.

This year's farm production—crops and livestock products—will set a new record because the combined output of meat animals,

SEBON, PORTUGAL—(AP)—The tip with foreign travel is that just as you begin to learn something about it you have to start home. I was thinking about this while standing at the airport here, going through the ritual of clearing customs for the homeward trek. I reached in my topcoat pocket and felt something wet. I pulled it out—it was a bright red washcloth. "I didn't know where else to put it," explained my wife, Frances. "And I just hated to throw it away." This experience convinced me that people need a few travel tips—even the best of wives.

I set down here what I have learned:
They Aren't Kidding
 1. Baggage. No matter how often an airplane passenger is limited to 66 pounds of baggage it never will convince a wife that it's not too heavy. For those last-minute extra items a wife can find no other place for a spare paper bag in his pocket—and it always will end up full.

2. Soap and cigarettes. In Europe today it is no longer possible to trade a bar of soap, a piece of chocolate or a package of cigarettes for a genuine \$5,000 diamond ring. Do bring along a few extra bars of soap. Many first class hotels expect you to supply your own. Do, also, bring along a few extra packs of cigarettes as gifts, but don't expect them to overwhelm everybody. There actually are many Europeans who prefer other than American brand cigarettes.

The Black Market
 A black market. The average American tourist feels like he has cheated himself unless he makes a black market deal. It's very simple to make one of those deals. Just go to the nearest travel agency. Before you can get through the door a shady character will sidle up to you and (a) offer to change your money at a profit, (b) offer to sell you a \$15 American fountain pen for \$5

and (c) let you have a rare old family cameo brooch.

By the time you get through the door into the travel agency you will find (a) some of the bills he has given you are counterfeit, (b)

the fountain pen doesn't work, (c) the cameo is a fraud and (d) the shady character has vanished.

Amarillo, Lubbock Hailed As Leading Retail Sales Areas

NEW YORK—(AP)—The richest retail market in the nation as measured in terms of personal and family buying power is the Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk area of Connecticut, the magazine Sales Management said Wednesday. In its annual study of 162 standard metropolitan markets, Sales Management estimated the Bridgeport area's per capita income at \$2,088 and its per family income at \$7,217. Behind Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk in family income but first in the U. S. in per capita and family

sales is the Amarillo, Texas, area, according to the survey. It produced \$1,728 in sales per person and \$5,490 per family last year. The densely-populated New York City-Northern New Jersey area, easily the nation's biggest in terms of overall volume, ranks a poor fifty-third on a per capita sales basis and in sixty-fourth place when rated as to average family sales. Second to Amarillo in per capita and per family sales is Atlantic City, N. J., with \$1,494 and \$4,895, respectively, last year. Lubbock, Texas, is third with 1951 per capita

Denison Booms Ike's Birthplace As U. S. Shrine

DENISON—(AP)—The Denison Herald wants to share President-elect Eisenhower's birthplace with the rest of Texas.

Taking a tip from a Dallas man, V. W. Fuller, who chipped in a dollar in a letter to the newspaper, the Herald offered in a Page One editorial to sponsor a state-wide collection for the proper development of the Eisenhower birthplace as a national shrine.

Fuller wrote: "Why not let the friends of our President-elect have a part in financing the making into a shrine the birthplace of Texas' only son to be elected President of the United States?"

"The school kids would get a great kick out of sending in their pennies and dimes," he added.

"The establishment and maintenance of the Eisenhower home as a public institution," said the Herald editorial, "has been a Denison project thus far. . . Now, however, the project has expanded beyond that scope, both in financing required and in the expression to be represented."

Given To City
Fred Conn, publisher of the newspaper, spearheaded a drive in 1946 which raised money to buy the property on which Eisenhower's birthplace is located near the Katy Railroad Yards here. Given to the city, the shrine has been maintained since that time by civic organizations.

"The idea would be not to put as much stress on big donations as on small contributions from the largest possible number of Texas men, women and children with the view of making the shrine truly representative of the people of the Lone Star State," the editorial concluded.

Lackland AFB Due Improved Hospital Facility Next Year

SAN ANGELO—(AP)—Brig Gen. Wycliffe E. Steele, Lackland Air Force Base commander, announced Thursday preliminary work plans have been approved for a new, multi-million-dollar base hospital.

Officers said ground will be broken within six months if no material or planning hitches develop. They said the hospital will have about 500 beds and probably will be built so that it can later be expanded to 1,000 beds.

A Washington story in the Air Force Times of October 4 said the Lackland hospital would be the largest in an Air Force building program already under way.

The Air Force has allocated 110 million dollars for expansion of its medical facilities.

Lackland already has a 1,000-bed wooden hospital, built in 1941 and 1942. The hospital was cut down to a 100-bed dispensary in early 1950 but has been expanded again since the outbreak of the Korean War. More than 30,000 casualties from Korea have been housed in the hospital wards.

The Air Force said that although the new hospital has been approved, it has no plans to abandon or destroy the old plant.

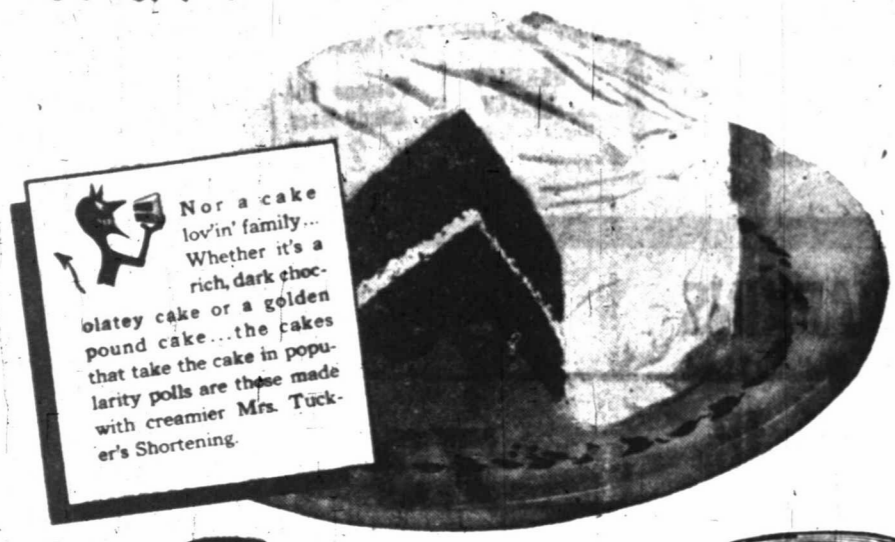

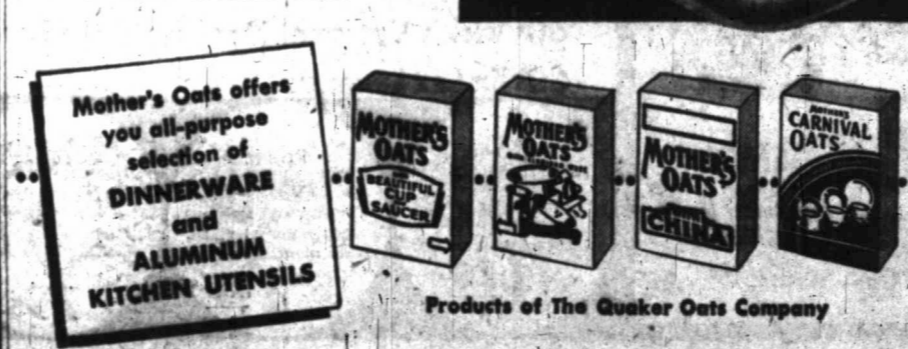

Wartime Uses Get Headlines, But Atomic Energy For Civilians Not Far In Future

The recent talk of push-button warfare and the development of atomic weapons may have given rise to the thought that a "push-button peace" may not be too far distant. But the prospect of a home owner heating and air-conditioning his house, operating the family washing machine and the family car and even mowing the lawn from power supplied by a lump of uranium in his cellar isn't an immediate prospect. Nevertheless, the general peacetime use of atomic power is nearer than he thinks.

The atomic energy field typifies great power and energy which can be used for human good or destruction. Man always has had to make a choice, even when he invented the axe, as to whether to use that axe to build a house or batter out his neighbor's brains.

He Did Both
Man answered the question by using the axe for both. The enormous energy in a block of uranium dramatizes the same problem of

Authority Denies 'Turkens' Can Live

RALEIGH—There isn't any such thing as a cross between a chicken and a turkey, says E. W. Glazener, professor of poultry genetics at North Carolina State College school of agriculture.

What farmers are probably raising when they speak of their "turkens" is the Naked-Neck fowl, known variously as the Transylvanian Naked Neck, Bare Necks and Hackles. The breed has no feathers on most of the neck, and the area of skin lacking feathers becomes loose, thickened and deep red in color at times, he says.

"Attempts to produce such a cross have been made at Kansas State College and at the Agricultural Research Center, Beltsville, Md.," Glazener says. "Experiments there have resulted in the fertilization of some of the eggs, but the embryos died in the early stages of incubation."

Irish Author Avers Students Write Well

DUBLIN, IRELAND—Irish author Frank O'Connor says his recent visit to the United States gave him a feeling that "every American is a born secret-story writer. He visited Harvard and other universities where he gave lectures.

"I had one or two short stories submitted to me by young students that were as good as any new work I've read for years."

choice simply on a larger scale. The present U. S. atomic energy program is largely the stockpiling of fissionable fuels which can be used later either for war explosives or energy production. Basically, nearly everyone working in this field always has in the back of his mind that we are really working to use this atomic fission in all kinds of peacetime applications.

The real source of energy is in the tiny nucleus inside the atom. The problem is to find out more about this nucleus.

To do this, scientists the world over have been building larger and larger atom-smashers, or cyclotrons. We have one of the largest in the world at Columbia University. It's about the size of a banquet hall and weighs 5,000 tons.

Its sole purpose is to make high

speed atomic fragments serve as bullets to bombard other atoms and find out how their nuclei are made. This process has produced over 700 new synthetic kinds of atoms. Nature made only about 280 atom types.

Through the process, other metals can be changed to gold. Unfortunately platinum is the best starting material for this so it is not too successful economically.

However, uses of atomic energy in practical ways outside the research laboratory are constantly opening up. Nuclear power plants for submarines and ships are being developed. The released energy in a one-inch cube block of uranium is enough to drive a ship across the Atlantic and back.

A few months ago, the announcement of the end of the first phase

of the application of uranium power to aircraft propulsion was made, and the first units are being designed by aircraft companies.

Shields Necessary
These developments in transportation are conditioned by the fact that U-235 chain reactions at high power levels give off a large amount of radiation. The nuclear reactors must be surrounded by a number of feet of shielding, which makes such power devices have a minimum weight of perhaps 30 to 50 tons. Because of this, atom-powered automobiles and lawnmowers are some distance in the future.

Atomic power plants to produce electricity and to operate industrial factories are approaching realization. Four industry teams are working on the best design for such atomic power plants, which will not

only be able to produce power, but may also produce appreciably more new atomic fuel than is actually burned.

Cheaper Than Gas
Even now, the production of this atomic power is cheaper than aviation gasoline. U-235 costs perhaps \$10,000 to \$20,000 a pound, but compared to the cost of coal of equivalent energy content, the cost of the energy would be around \$10 per ton and maybe eventually as low as \$3 a ton.

While there may never be an atomic reactor in every cellar, it is certainly probable that when you toggle the switch on your electric toaster the toast will pop up, browned to a turn by power from atomic energy.

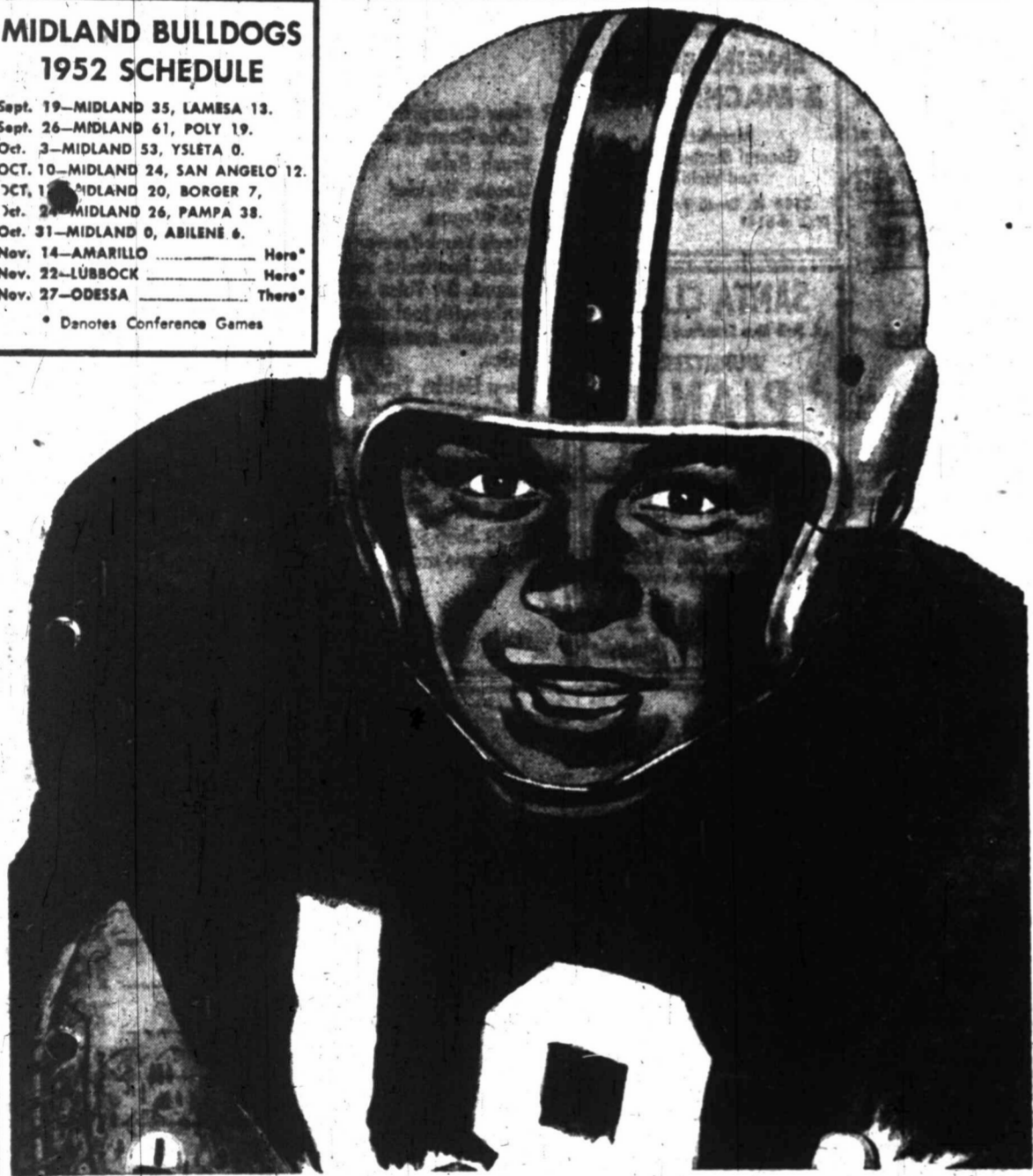

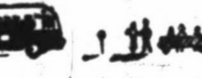

Locations For 56 New Sites Set In WT Area

The MATURE PARENT

'Price Tag' Appreciation Gives Children False Values

By MURIEL LAWRENCE

"Chronicle scolding." I recently wrote in this column, "is indecision, exposing our reluctance to lift from Jimmy the responsibility of putting his bike away—and take it on ourselves."

An alert reader has called me on this statement. Did I mean, she asks, that we should put Jimmy's bike away for him?

No, I wrote a careless sentence. We don't put Jimmy's bike away for him. We may have to help him do it until he gets used to putting it away himself—but Jimmy makes the major physical effort.

What we lift from Jimmy is the decision to put his bike away.

We perform this service of leadership for him because we know that making decisions is harder than executing them. He makes the physical effort; we make the mental one.

We see that the bike is put in the garage because we have been around longer than Jimmy to acquire respect for what produced the bike. We know that it was purchased, not by 66¢ but by his parents' exercise of effort, intelligence and love in a home and an office.

We have high regard for what his bike represents. When he seems to feel that reading his comic is more important than taking proper care of it, we tell him briefly why he is mistaken and say, "Come on, let's get the bike where it belongs at night."

Of course if we think that 66¢ purchased the bike, we may shilly-shally on a clear-cut decision to teach respect for it. The 66¢ is an artificial value. When we try to make it the basis for our appeal to Jimmy, we place ourselves in an artificial position toward him. There can be little solid and stable authority in our attitude.

In the end, indecision to teach children to respect what we give them always is failure to respect ourselves.

We are in trouble if we require appreciation only for money expended, instead of for effort, intelligence and love that earned the money.

Think back. Don't we get awfully tired preaching care of new bikes, coats, and loose-leaf notebooks by reminding children of the price tags that were attached to them?

How frustrated and misunderstood we feel when we hear ourselves complaining, "Oh, you would only learn the value of money!" Can't we see that we're trying to sell respect for an artificial exchange between them and us? Can't we see that we are not doing justice at all to what we have really expended?

The bad part of such training is that when we finally do succeed in beating respect for money into their heads, we wish we hadn't. We find we just can't cope with the appreciation we stimulated. We discover we've been teaching greed, not appreciation at all.

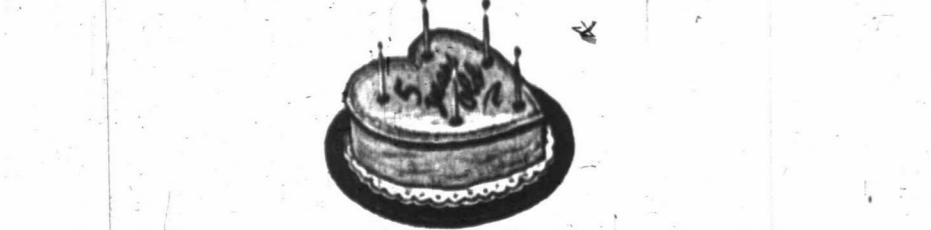

Paper Plates Are Wife Savers



SLIP PAPER PLATES onto candied apple sticks to save your youngsters' clothing, and anything they may touch from smears.

We use a lot of those new paper plates. They cut down dishwashing, give my wife more time—making everyone happier. Good looking, some of them with plastic six-faces for serving hot foods on, they save about 14 1/2 hours a week of work.

For a career woman they would save about 7 1/4 dishwashing hours a week. Now you can understand.

Our husky boy likes candied apples on a stick. His mother makes paper plates. He slips the plate up the apple stick. Lots of fun but no extra dishwashing or sticky clothes.

Candied Apples-On-a-Stick
(Makes 6 apples)
Six medium-sized apples, 6 wood-

Wash and dry apples; insert skewer in stem end of each apple. In a saucepan, combine sugar, corn syrup, water and lemon juice. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture begins to boil. Continue cooking without stirring until mixture reaches hard crack stage (300 degrees F.).

While syrup is cooking, occasionally wipe sugar crystals from sides of saucepan with fork wrapped in a clean, damp cloth. Holding apple by skewer, dip it quickly into hot syrup, covering entirely. Remove and twist to spread syrup evenly. Place upright in rack or on buttered baking sheet to cool.

Don't throw away the liquid from canned vegetables. Add it to condensed soups instead of the water called for. Spinach liquid, for instance, may be added to cream of celery soup.

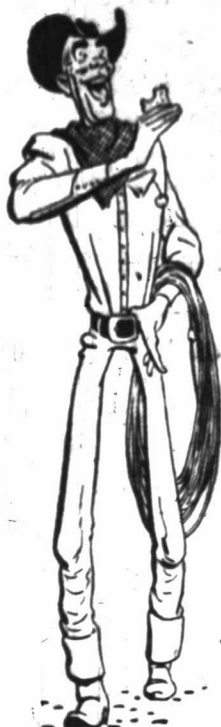

JACOBY ON CANASTA

By OSWALD JACOBY

"Please answer a question about the scoring in a situation that involves red threes," requests a New York City correspondent.

"Our side had put down all four red threes, and we had made several small melds, but we had no canasta at all. One of the opponents went out, and then the argument began about the scoring. We claimed that we were entitled to the bonus of 800 points for our four red threes.

"Our opponents said that the score of 800 should be deducted instead of added, on the theory that red threes count against you unless you have melded a canasta. What's more," they said that our meld also should count against us instead of for us.

"Please tell us who is correct." According to the official rules of the game, you are entitled to score the bonus for your red threes if you put down any meld at all. You don't need a canasta in order to get credit for your red threes. Just your legal initial meld is enough.

Likewise, you don't need a canasta to get credit for the melds that you do make. It is a fundamental rule of all games of the rummy family (to which canasta belong) that you get credit for what you meld and lose points for what you fail to meld.

Let's take a simple example to make sure that this point is clear. Suppose it is the first hand of a game, with both sides needing 90 points for the initial meld. My side puts down all four red threes and an initial meld of exactly 90 points. The opponents then proceed to meld out, catching my side with unmelded cards to the value of 200 points.

My side now gets a bonus of 800 points for the four red threes. We score 90 points for our meld, but then deduct 200 points for the cards that are still in our hands. The net score for our points is therefore minus 110 points. Since we are plus 800 and minus 110, our total score for the entire hand is plus 690 points.

Some groups of players in various parts of the country have adopted their own local rule on this matter. Some players, for example, follow the idea that red threes count against you unless your side has melded a canasta. Some players, likewise follow the idea that your meld counts against you unless you have melded a canasta.

These are not the official rules, but anybody who wishes to follow them has a perfect right to do so. My own opinion is that the official rules are the best, but I would be a poor reporter if I failed to point out that some people prefer to follow their own rules.

American Jumping Ace Retires For Year

NEW YORK—(AP)—The retirement—at least for this year—of the United States international jumping team Wednesday threw a monkey wrench into the big Mexican horse show, scheduled to start in Mexico City on November 29.

Arthur McCashin, Bill Stinkraus and Mrs. Carol Durgand, the United States jumpers, are going home to their families after the Toronto show next week. That move left a wide gap in the international field and Brig. Gen. Alfred G. Tuckerman, president of the National Horse Show, said Tuesday night that the United States would not send a team to Mexico.

Bronze Age Relics Located In Ireland

ROSSLARE HARBOR, IRELAND—(AP)—What may prove to be the largest concentration of late bronze age (800 B. C.) lake dwellings in Europe outside Switzerland has been uncovered at Lough Gara, County Roscommon, Ireland.

So far, 22 of these crannogs, or artificial islands where early men made their homes for safety, have been found. Also brought to light are bronze rings, tools and pots.

The first discovery was made last summer, when the Irish government's scheme for draining Lough Gara had been under way for 10 months. A wooden dugout canoe was found in the River Boyle near the lake outlet. A perforated stone sinker for fishing was also found.
