THIS BEING THE last week of school for the 1985-86 school year, we'll make our annual best wishes to our area's graduating seniors. You are graduating amid somewhat tougher times than usual, but we predict that this year's graduates will make it just fine.

Recently, the Associated Press ran a story which was used by some of the larger daily newspapers, concerning the diversity of names used by Texas high schools for their team mascots. The article pointed out that there are over 1,200 public and private high schools in the state, and 167 different mascots or nicknames.

With all of the diversity, the survey revealed that more than half of the state's 1,200 schools shared nicknames which made up a list of the ten most commonly used names.

The most common list was as follows, with the number of schools in parenthesis: 1. Eagles (103); 2. Bulldogs (84); 3. Tigers (76); 4. Panthers (56); 6. Mustangs (48); 7. Lions (46); 8. Indians (36); 9. Pirates (35) and 10. Hornets (35).

When it comes to unusual names, the state's schools have their share of these, too. Some of them listed in the Associated Press article included:

The Wampus Cat, for Itasca High School, located 60 miles south of Fort Worth. Those connected with the school say the Wampus Cat is a legendary animal, like "Big Foot."

Also, there are the Masonic Home (Fort Worth) Mighty Mites, a nickname which began when the school had some pretty small players (we all could use that one from time to time).

Other unusual names include the Port Lavaca Calhoun Sandcrabs, Taylor Ducks, Brownsville Saint Joseph Bloodhounds, Floydada Whirlwinds, Hutto Hippos, Progreso Red Ants, Trent Gorillas, San Antonio Central Catholic Buttons, Van's Vandals, San Antonio Lanier Voks, the Beaumont South Park Greenies, Mason Punchers, Munday Moguls, Somerville Yeguas, Sundown Roughnecks, Motley County Matadors and the Knippa Purple Rockcrushers.

(We quickly add that we're glad we don't have to use some of these names every week in headlines. Purple Rockcrushers??)

In some cases, a school's choice of mascot is a natural, considering the name of the school or town. These include the Winters Blizzards, Frost Polar Bears, Hamlin Pied Pipers, Shamrock's Irish, Muleshoe's Mules and the Hereford Whitefaces.

(Muleshoe wasn't always known as Mules. It took a tough election to change the school nickname from Yellowjackets).

Other names in our area not mentioned by the AP include such biggies as the Jayton Jaybirds, the Roscoe Plovers, Amarillo Sandies (or Golden Sandstorm), Palo Duro Dons, Lubbock High Westerners, Pampa Harvesters, and Levelland Lobos.

Then, there are the Dumas Demons, Perryton Rangers, Dalhart Wolves, Boys Ranch Roughriders, Brownfield Cubs, Stratford Elks, Spearman Lynx, Stinnett Rattlers, Panhandle Panthers, Memphis Cyclones, White Deer Bucks, Wellington Skyrockets, and Clarendon Bronchos.

Also, the Abernathy Antelopes, Hale Center Owls, Springlake-Earth Wolverines, Ralls Jackrabbits, Nazareth Swifts, Gruver Greyhounds, Miami Warriors, Abernathy Antelopes and Valley Patriots. Those are just the more unusual ones.

Of course, in Parmer County, we have the Mustangs (and Fillies), Chieftains (and Squaws), Steers (and Steerettes) and the Longhorns.

New Boys' Varsity Cage Coach Named

A new varsity boys basketball coach was employed this week by the Friona Independent School District.

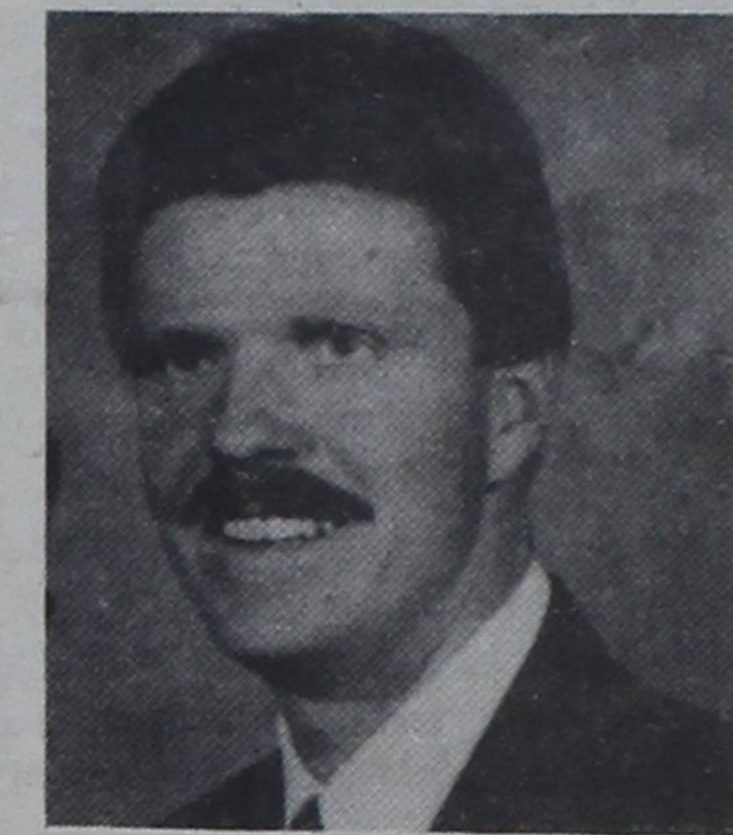
T.J. Parks, 28, who has spent the past five years as head coach at Tatum, N.M., will be the new coach.

In his five years at Tatum, Parks' teams have posted the best won-loss percentage in the school's history, and made the playoffs the past three years.

His teams for both 1984-85 and 1985-86 had 18-8 records, which are the most wins in a single season at the New Mexico school. His 1983-84 team, which went 17-11, won the regional championship and was the first team in Tatum's history to play in the boys' state basketball tournament.

He first went to Tatum in 1981 as junior high basketball and football coach. He took over the job as high school coach in 1982. He previously spent a year with the Tucumcari, N.M. school system as a teacher and assistant coach.

Parks is a graduate of Tucumcari, N.M. High School, of New Mexico Military Institute, Roswell, and The Citadel. He

received his Bachelor of Science Degree from Eastern New Mexico University in 1981, and his Masters of Education Administration Degree from ENMU in 1986.

The new Friona coach played intercollegiate basketball at NMMI, where he was a two-year starter and co-captain. The NMMI team was ranked 12th nationally at one time. He also played college basketball at The Citadel, which is located at Charleston, S.C.

As a high school player, Parks was first-team all-district and named "Most Valuable Player" of his Tucumcari High School team.

Area Receives Some Excellent Rainfall

The year's best rainfall has been received in the area during the past week, with anywhere from two to three inches reported. Virtually all of the rain has fallen in a slow, shower-type of rain, with every drop being absorbed by the waiting soil.

The official recording in Friona showed .54 inches on Saturday, May 24; another .75 inches Sunday, May 25, and .31 inches Monday, May 26. This was followed by a shower which left .37 inch on Thursday, May 29, for

a weekly total in Friona of 1.97 inches.

Added to the .50 inch of moisture which was received on Saturday, May 10, the total for the month stood at 2.47 inches as of Thursday.

The rainy spell also caused temperatures to drop somewhat. The low fell to 45 degrees three mornings this week, and Thursday's high reached only 64, making for a mild last week of school for Friona school children.

Ms. Hart added, "We have contracted with Radiology Associates of Amarillo to interpret the mammographies, and their reports are expected within a week. Their reports will be combined with the blood pressure and diabetes results information and forwarded to the woman's personal physician. All films will be returned to Parmer County Community Hospital for storage, and easy access for the women."

According to Dr. Spring at the hospital, "Breast cancer continues to be the number two cause of cancer death among women, yet many of the 37,000 deaths attributed to breast cancer each year, can be prevented through breast cancer screening and early detection."

The American Cancer Society recommends that:

*Women between the age of 35-39 have a baseline screening x-ray mammography.

*Women between the ages of 40 and 49 have an x-ray mammography every one to two years.

*And women over 50 have a yearly mammogram. For further information or to schedule an appointment, contact Elda Hart at 247-2754.

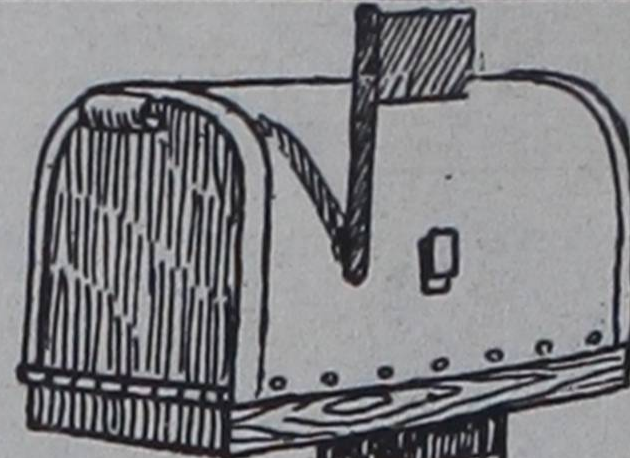
The family suggests memorial contributions be made to the St. Joseph's School in Slaton.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill:

I appreciated your recent editorial on the A.L. Williams organization and MILICO. It was one of the best I've seen.

To quote Forbes, June 3, 1985, "He (Williams) sends his army of insurance agents into action with war cries of 'go-go-go, kill 'em, recruit, recruit, recruit,' and 'bust the rock (Prudential) to pieces!'" That concept may be acceptable in the locker room, but I can't imagine it being used in the sales meetings of Professional Life Insurance Agents!

"Williams' pitch is simple; it has to be, since he employs mostly amateur salespeople with little financial training. The use of hordes of hungry part-timers is Williams' brilliant marketing innovation." (Forbes June 3, 1985)

With all Williams' criticism of the 1800 plus companies who sell permanent life insurance, where would he be without them? He would not be a multi-millionaire in just 8 short years! His "rag-tag army of 85,000 part time salesmen" (Forbes June 3, 1985) are taught enough to find out how much cash value and dividends are in existing policies. After the policy-holders are convinced that their

present insurance company is "ripping them off" the policies are stripped of all cash values and put into Williams' Mutual Funds. The people are then sold a high priced term insurance policy "which doesn't become competitive until more than 15 years into the policy." (Forbes June 3, 1985).

Contrary to what Williams says, most companies sell term insurance. I have millions of term insurance in force, and highly recommend it where the need is temporary. For long term needs, a whole life policy that will pay up in 6 to 8 years is excellent.

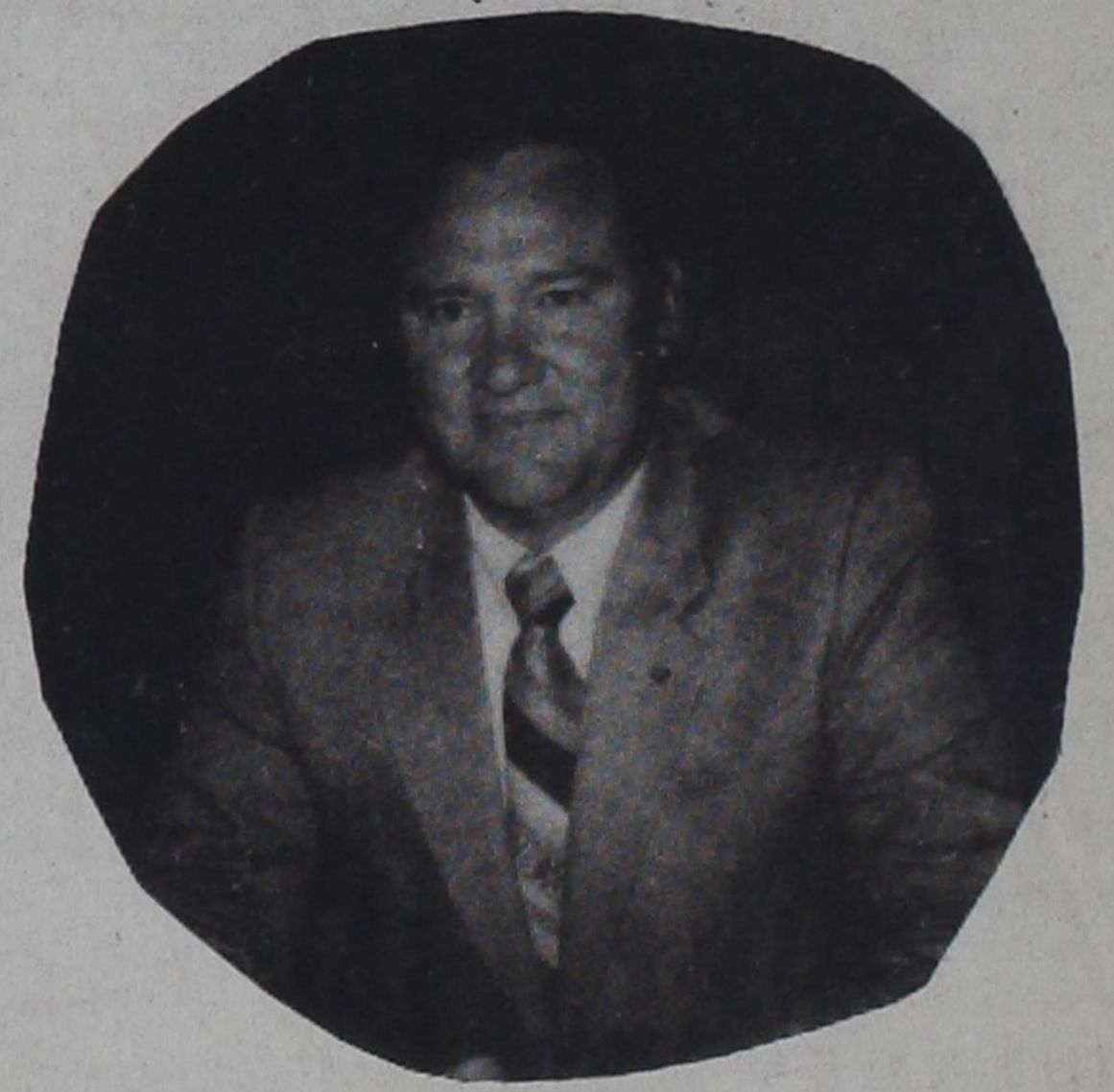

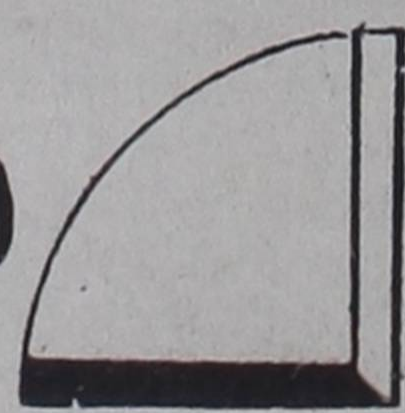

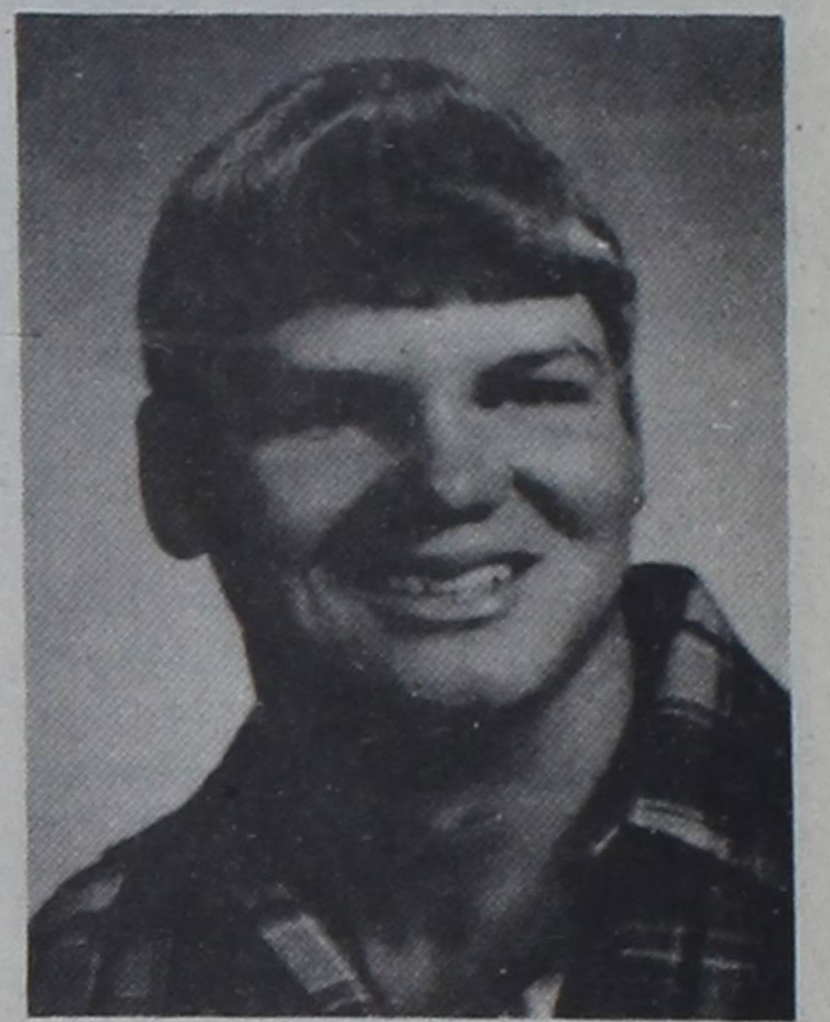

FmHA Offers Assistance

The Farmers Home Administration office in Parmer County will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist," Weldon C. Rainey, County Supervisor, announced this week.

Operation Assist is a new effort by FmHA to help farmers obtain guaranteed operating loans. County supervisors for FmHA will take completed farm credit applications to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will hand carry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," said Mr. Rainey. "We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements, and appraisals. If necessary, we will make a commitment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to the guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 per cent."

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program. County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of the paper work done beforehand by FmHA.

Borrowers and lenders interested in an FmHA guaranteed loan should contact the FmHA county office.

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Area Students Named To Honor Lists

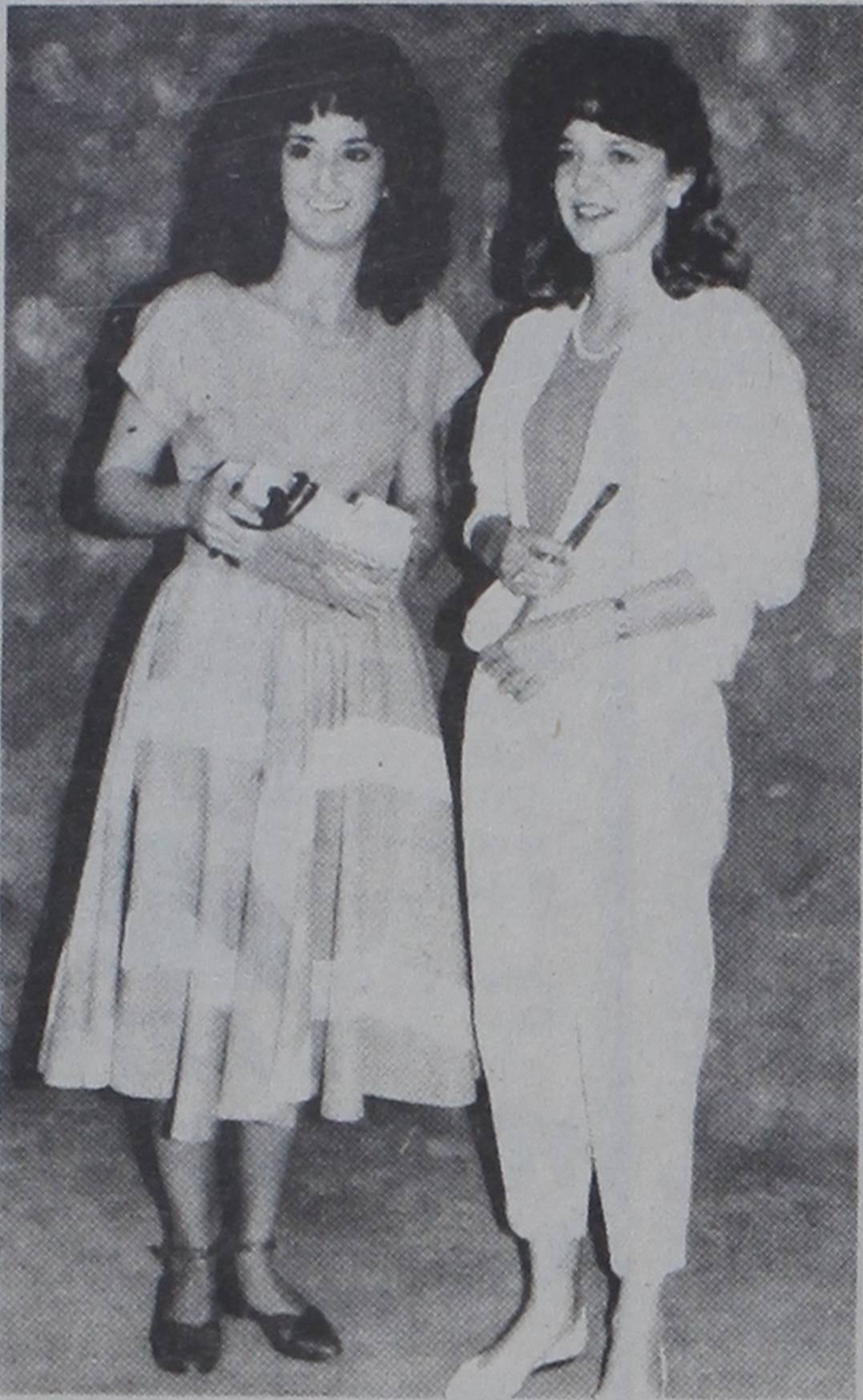
Three students from Friona are among 406 students named to the President's and Dean's Honor Lists for the spring 1986 semester at South Plains College, Levelland.

Also a reminder that bicycles are required to have a white light on the front of the bike that is visible at least 500 feet, and a red reflector on the rear of the bike that is visible for 50 to 300 feet, if the bike is on the streets after dark. Bicyclists are required to obey all the traffic laws and traffic signs that apply to a motor vehicle.

Beginning immediately, the officers will begin issuing citations in accordance with the State law, on seat belt violations. Up until this time, the Department has issued mostly warnings.
