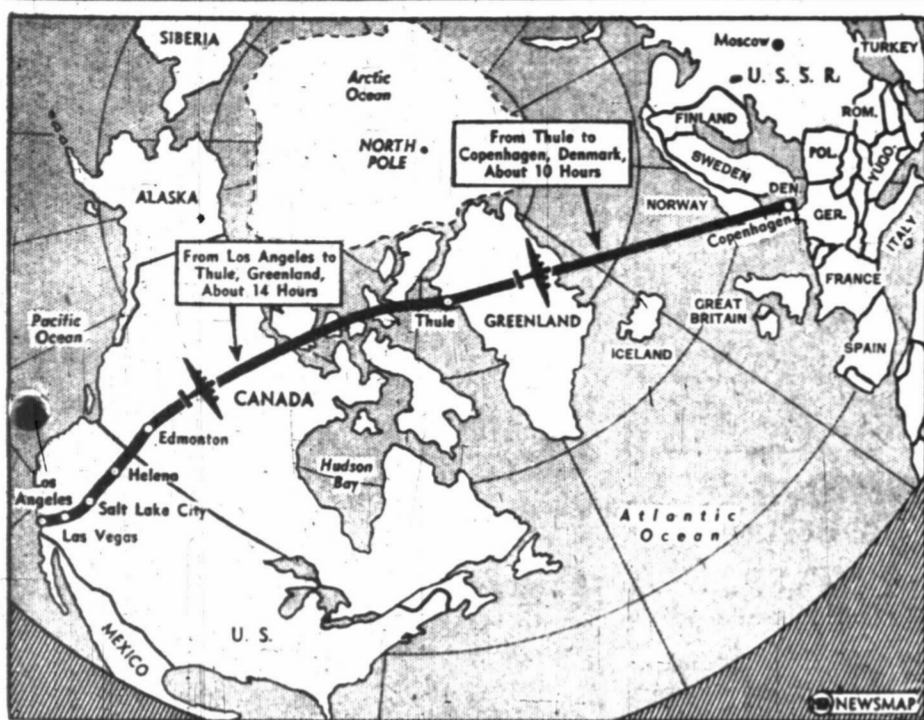


U. S., Britain Split On Korean Peace

Pair Lost In Georgia Swamp 37 Days Rescued By Farmer

JACKSONVILLE, Fla.—(AP)—Thin and gaunt, two young service men were taken to safety Saturday after being lost for 37 days in the sprawling Okefenokee swamplands of South Georgia.
William E. Denham, 17, an apprentice Naval airman, credited "thoughts of mother and God with bringing me out."
Denham became lost October 10 in the desolate bog where wildcats, bears, alligators and snakes abound. Two days later he accidentally met Anderson, who knew his whereabouts at the time.
The next day they rented a boat at a fishing camp and set out. Later they were unable to find their way back to their boat, and from then—October 13—until last Thursday they wandered lost in the 600-square mile morass.
Between them they lost 103 pounds.

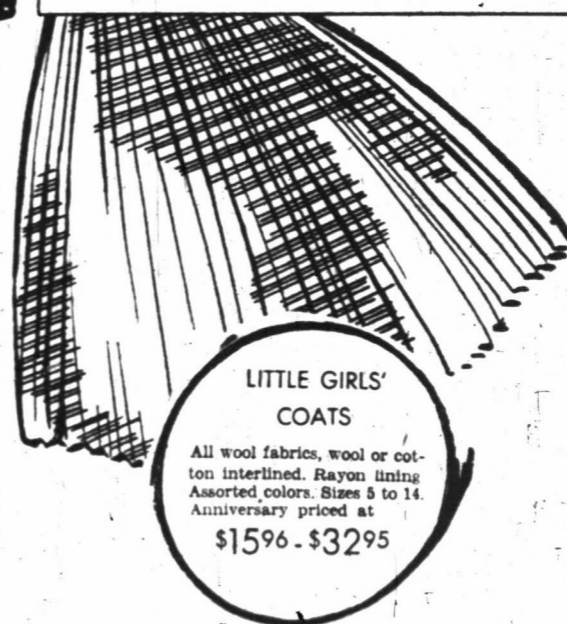

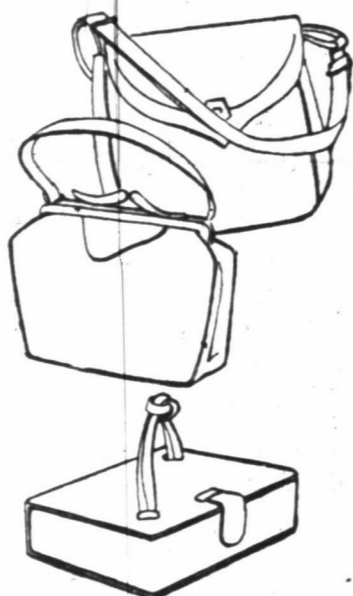

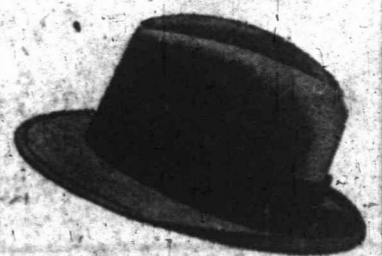

Texas Delegation To Congress Answers Full Catalogue Of Questions In Forum

By CLAYTON HICKERSON FORT WORTH —(AP)—About 1,000 Texans—men, women and college students—knew a little more

about their Congressmen today. And some 13 members of the national House of Representatives in the coming 83rd Congress have a better idea about how the folks back home are thinking.

Fort Worth's second annual Texas Congressional Forum Friday packed the Crystal Ballroom of Hotel Texas and gave to the state—in the words of one Congressman—"a striking example of Democracy in action."

There wasn't a dull minute in the entire three hours, and the crowd—loaded with questions, mostly pertinent—kept the representatives and representatives-to-be on their toes.

Anderson is keynote. After R. B. Anderson of Vernon, Waggoner, estate manager and chairman of the State Board of Education, keyed the meeting by saying the Korean War's honorable conclusion and the future economic security of the nation were the things uppermost in the minds of most people, the show was on.

Ed Gossett, former Congressman from North Texas' 19th Congressional District, shuttled the questions from consultant to Congressman after first deciding whether they were "in bounds."

He ruled out only a few, and answers to questions drew these answers from the Congressmen.

Rep. Frank Ikard, Wichita Falls,—"I haven't seen anybody selling out to pressure groups."

More Farm Roads Rep. O. C. Fisher, San Angelo—"Unification of the armed forces is working better in the field than it is in the Pentagon."

Rep. elect Brady Gentry, Tyler—"I have an idea there will be a lot of us there who think some farm-to-market roads should still be built."

Rep. Walter Rogers, Pampa—"I don't see how I pay my taxes now—and I don't see how you pay yours. But we can't pay back 50-cent dollars with 80-cent dollars. We're looking for miracles."

Rep. Bob Page, Waco—"I don't know that we are going to have a cost-of-living reduction, and I look upon farm parity in the market place as a distinctly stabilizing influence."

Rep. Ken Regan, Midland—"The United Nations has moved far afield from our original objectives."

Rep. Olin E. Teague, Bryan—"I

don't have the fears that some seem to have that the Veterans Administration will be dismembered."

Rep. Omar Burleson, Anson—"There is a gigantic effort being made to effectuate an economic blockade of China."

Rep. Lloyd Bentsen, McAllen—"I think the Chinese Nationalists should be allowed to fight in Korea. And I'm one of those who believe the farmer shouldn't have to have a law degree to hire Mexican labor."

Rep. Wingate Lucas, Grapevine—"I believe we can rest assured that no FEPC legislation will be passed by the 83rd Congress."

Fisher—"As one who favors Universal Military Training, I doubt if any such legislation will be passed in the next few years."

Gentry—"I think money given away to foreign countries should be about the same token nature as the aid we have received in troops in Korea from other nations."

Wilson Plugs Tidelands The other two representatives—elect present, John Doddy of Athens and youthful Jack Brooks of Beaumont, were given chances to express themselves, and Dallas' Rep. J. Frank Wilson spoke briefly on what he thought of state tidelands ownership.

"I feel that the Tidelands will definitely come back to Texas now," Wilson said amid applause from the crowd.

Anderson, in his address said "Every age is a critical one and every governmental decision is important."

"It seems to me," Anderson said, "that high on the list of our order of business is the establishment of a sound, comprehensive foreign policy that will define the objective use to which American leadership

will be put in fields of economy, political science and social structure, and which will define much more emphatically the objectives for which we are agreeable to the commitment of our military forces."

"Pursue Objectives" Anderson drew applause when he said, "Once committed, we should assure our allies and our enemies alike that we will pursue our announced objectives to a successful achievement."

Of economic stability, which he said was one of the high objectives of the American people, Anderson commented, "the obvious course of dollar purchasing power has been toward a persistent decline, x x x Realistically, we cannot set out upon a program to restore the dollar's purchasing power to its pre-war value."

Pressure groups, he added, must never be allowed to drown out the need for budgetary balance.

Turning the forum to the congressmen and their questioners, Anderson ended his talk saying "We are to a large extent dependent upon the ability of our leaders to make clear the facts of x x x economy, security, x x x and world responsibility."

The forum in its first two years of existence has been sponsored by the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce.

Bert E. Godfrey, manager of the Fort Worth chamber, said next year's forum would be held in the city auditorium so the growing audience could be cared for better.

COSTLIER THAN WOODEN NICKLES— Criminologist Warns City Of Bunco Artists' Tricks

Confidence men are eyeing Midland, ready to move in with a variety of "bunco" games and "con" rackets, warned Dr. David Dressler, prominent crime investigator, at the Knife and Fork Club dinner Friday night.

Dr. Dressler told his Midland audience to watch for three signs which identify an attempted con game. The "con" man promise his victim an enormous profit on an investment, an immediate return of money, and a venture that "can't fail." The criminologist said one never should believe in an offer "to get rich quick."

The "deaf mute" racket may be slated to move into Midland in the near future, according to Dr. Dressler. Roving gangs of con operators work cities, handing out cards saying that they are deaf mutes, which also request a generous contribution. The criminologist said no one should feel obligated to help a beggar.

Non-Existent Charities
Americans are donating \$100,000,000 each year to non-existent or worthless charities, reported Dr. Dressler.

Dr. Dressler said he once sent gifts out on the streets of a major city with collection boxes. The con men plainly were marked "Give to the Three-Headed Orphans—This Is a Fake." In spite of this obvious warning, the money poured in.

He told his audience they should consult local organizations such as the Chamber of Commerce or the Police Department to find out if an unknown charity is legitimate.

One of the lowest forms of con rackets is that of the "hearse chaser," who reads the obituary columns of newspapers to find new victims. A COD package with worthless articles in it is then sent to the address of the dead person. A bereaved relative usually will pay a large sum to acquire the package he thinks the deceased member of his family bought.

"Buddy From Korea"
Another, and even worse variation of this racket, is that of the con man who pretends to have known a dead soldier on the Korean battlefield.

The racketeer contacts the parents of the soldier and claims to have the personal effects of their son. Of course, the parents will then pay almost anything to get the supposed belongings of the soldier.

Worthless stock in oil wells, gold or copper mines, and lately uranium mines is flooding the country, said Dr. Dressler. He put Midlanders on guard against buying any kind of stock without investigation.

One "con" man had a nice business for himself not long ago, selling electronic "doodle-bugs" at \$34,000 each. They were supposed to be able to detect water, uranium, oil or almost anything.

But the catch is that the same gadgets can be purchased from army surplus at \$3.50 each, and they don't work.

Millions Are Lost
Dr. Dressler revealed figures that show Americans lose \$7,000,000 on the "bunco" games each day.

The speaker was introduced by A. H. Vineyard, Thornton Hardie, Jr. Introduced new members to the audience, and announcement was made that Jim Watson, Carroll Thomas, and Harry Pryor were retiring as directors of the Club. Roy McKee, P. R. Hargrove and Mrs. Irma Mancill were appointed as a nominating committee for directors.

Election of the new directors will be held on December 9 at the next club session. Cameron Ralston has been scheduled to speak on the "Backstairs of History" at the next meeting.

Lubbock Spins Bulldogs For Unexpected 48-0 Win

Oh, well, maybe—just maybe, understand—we can beat Odessa. That's the only hope there is left.

But it would have been so nice to beat Lubbock. It was the Midland High School homecoming and, to the 11,000 fans who jammed into Memorial Stadium, those defending state champion Lubbock Westerners looked so ripe for an upset.

But the hopeful Bulldogs, who wanted to be giant-killers, were no more effective than a pack of peppy toy terriers yapping at a stranger's heels.

Those methodical Westerners, ominous-looking as they really were in their black-and-white uniforms, just crunched up and down the gridiron Saturday afternoon until they had squeezed seven touchdowns and a 48-0 victory into 49 humiliating minutes of play.

They passed through the air and danced across the ground on offense and stood like stubborn wall on defense.

And the Bulldogs, who went into the game as the leading offensive team of District I-AAAA, wound up with only a net total of seven yards gained through the air and on the ground.

Scorekeepers Frantic
Lubbock, on the other hand, kept the scorekeepers frantic as they picked up 435 yards on the ground and 154 yards in the air for a total net of 578, after deducting the 11 yards in losses they accumulated in some mysterious fashion.

Coch Pat Patterson centered his attack around his fullback, operating from the standard T formation, and Jimmie Welch, who started at that post, and Bill Hallmark, who took over in the second half, performed in an amazing fashion. Together they piled up more than half of Lubbock's gain on the ground while Quarterback Buddy Hill, a sharpshooter who struck the first deadly blow, connected for passes which netted one touchdown, set up one touchdown, set another and gained a total of 112 yards.

Until Hill cut loose, it looked like anybody's ball game. For nine minutes, the Bulldogs and the Westerners probed each other cautiously, with each side picking up one first down but little more.

Then It Happened
Then, with three minutes to go, it happened.

Hill booted a 37-yard punt downfield and Rusty Rutledge gathered it in, only to have it slip through his arms and bound around on the ground until Dickie Lowery fell on it on the Midland 38-yard line. On the next play, Hill slipped calmly back and threw his first pass of the afternoon, a curving beauty which settled into the waiting arms of Mike Brady on the goal-line. Lowery booted the extra point.

But that was only one touchdown and the game was young and the Bulldogs determined.

They came stubbornly back. First, Jesse Hatfield tried a pass which bounced out of the receivers' arms. Then Roy Kinsey circled around his left end for three yards. The ball went to Hatfield and he charged into the line. Only just before he got there, he leaped into the air and fired one at Bill Mims 19 yards away.

It looked like the Bulldogs were catching on fire.

Pass Intercepted
Hatfield tried a run this time and he gained four yards. Again he went back to pass. This time, however, Lubbock was waiting and Harold Teal, a Westerner Guard, intercepted it on his own 41-yard line.

The Westerners rolled again. After Welch and Red Noland had picked up 17 yards and a first down in three plays, Hill went back to pass again and it was completed to Benjie McCollum for 37 yards.

On the next play, John Blocker blasted his way down the middle for 11 yards and a touchdown. A bad pass from center eliminated the possibility of an extra point.

The Bulldogs, thus, trailed 0-13 at halftime but the Midland fans kept their fingers crossed and hoped for a different story in the second half.

Lubbock disillusioned them in a hurry.

Kling, Stevenson Grab Top Spots In Pan-Am Race

CHIHUAHUA, MEXICO—(AP)—Karl Kling's Mercedes Benz and a Lincoln piloted by Chuck Stevenson of Lynwood, Calif., took over the top spots in the Pan-American road race Saturday as the five-day marathon moved swiftly toward the finish Sunday.

Kling, roaring over the level plains from Durango to Parral and from Parral to this city, averaged close to 127 miles an hour and shot into the lead when Giovanni Bracco's Ferrari burned out its clutch. Kling has a 23-minute lead over Hermann Lang of Germany, also driving a Mercedes Benz, in second place.

Stevenson, regaining the lead he held earlier in the 1,934-mile race from Tuxtla Gutierrez to Juarez, held a narrow advantage over Bob Korf of Dayton, as three Lincolns

battled for the top spot in the stock car division. Walter Mants of Los Angeles, who led at the start of the day's two laps, was third.

The race ends Sunday with a 230-mile lap to Juarez, across from El Paso.

Bracco's red Ferrari was running about four minutes ahead of Kling's silver racer when his clutch went bad after 15 miles of the 186-mile afternoon leg. He and co-driver Gino Bronsoni worked frantically on the car for a few minutes, then signalled a patrol plane they would have to drop out.

The mishap left only one Ferrari, driven by Luigi Chinetta in third place, still in the race. The Ferrari's dominated last year with first and second place finishes. Chinetta, who

sped up when he passed Bracco's car, averaged 128 miles per hour on the afternoon lap, but still trailed Kling by almost 40 minutes.

Unofficial times gave Kling an elapsed time of 17 hours, six minutes and 58 seconds against Chinetta's 17:45:56. The disparity apparently left it up to the 24 Mercedes Benz mechanics, who need only keep Kling's car running to set up the sports car division of the race.

The stock car division was still anybody's race with less than a minute separating the first three cars.

Unofficial figures gave Stevenson an elapsed time of 19:15:48, while Korf, moving up from fourth place at the day's start, had 19:16:23 and Mants had 19:16:33.

After a scoreless first period Ohio struck twice in the second session. Barton tossed eight and 28-yard scoring passes to Joslin. On the first one the Bucks moved 27 yards in six plays, and on the second 62 yards in eight plays, following short punts into the wind by Michigan.

Bobby Layne Proves Rarity In Football

DETROIT—(AP)—Bobby Layne is one of pro football's real rarities—a T-formation quarterback who holds onto that ball and runs through the line.

The fiery Texan with the butch-cut blond hair is only 30 yards short of ranking among the leading 10 ball carriers in the National Football League—and this for a fellow who has gained his fame by passing.

It's understandable why Layne has been able to rush for 280 yards 4.5 average per try to rank second among the Lions' 10 offensive backs—he was one of Texas University's greatest running backs.

Layne is one of the few pro quarterbacks who intentionally runs," said Coach Buddy Parker, whose Lions are tied for the lead in the National Conference of the league.

"Otto Graham of Cleveland and Frankie Albert of San Francisco run, for instance, but they usually do it when they're trapped trying to pass," he said.

Layne's rushing yardage is only 20 short of the league's tenth-ranking ball carrier—halfback Emil Sitko of the Cardinals, who has 300.

On one of Layne's favorite plays he heads to the side and has the option of pitching out to one of his backs or keeping the ball. He often holds it and drives through the tackle hole.

As a ball-carrier Layne has gone 280 yards in 62 tries. He ranks second in both respects on the team to right halfback Bob Hoernsche-

meier, who has carried 83 times for 389 yards.

His average gain of 4.5 also is second to Hunchy's 4.7.

As a passer, Layne, who is permitted by Coach Buddy Parker to call his own plays without help from the sidelines, has attempted 178 passes and completed 82 for 1,129 yards.

Delayed Reaction To Strike May Keep Controls On Steel

WASHINGTON —(P)— The word going around in oil industry circles here is that early removal of priority controls over strategic materials is unlikely because of delayed reaction to the Petroleum Administration for Defense (PAD) itself says an acute shortage is developing in steel plate, the kind of steel used for such things as storage tanks and other refinery equipment.

A PAD spokesman said reports have been received that plate fabricators are now getting enough steel to accept only about 40 per cent of the certifications or orders received and that the outlook for the first quarter of 1953 is even worse.

Material For War These manufacturers had considerable supplies on hand while the steel strike was in progress so they did not feel the immediate effect of the mill shutdowns.

Heavy output of artillery shells and rockets reportedly is cutting deeply into stocks of the kind of steel ingots used for oil country tubular goods.

An official of one large oil company says that because of the continued heavy demand for steel, copper and other strategic materials required for the national defense program, there was little demand at a recent American Petroleum Institute meeting in Chicago for lifting priorities controls on them.

IPAA In Fight Unless the next Congress continues them, price controls will expire April 30 and priorities controls June 30.

Although the Independent Petroleum Association of America (IPAA) has waged a vigorous fight for lifting crude price controls, there seems little likelihood this will be done before their expiration date unless Congress shows an unexpected burst of speed and disposes of over-all wage and price controls legislation easily in the near future.

The way things now look, crude oil price controls will not be extended.

Demos' Last Stand There is talk that the house commerce committee may take advantage of the January 3-20 period while the Democrats still are in control of the downtown federal departments and agencies to investigate some Truman Administration policy makers.

Chairman of the group then will be Representative Wolverton (R-N.J.), one of the best informed men in the country on the petroleum industry, aside from the technical end of the business. He could be expected to call in for questioning some of the agency officials who have had to do with the formulation of policies which have drawn complaints from oil and gas men.

The PAD has reminded oil and gas operators that applications for allotments of drill pipe for the second quarter of 1953 must be in the PAD's hands by December 15.

Other major allotments were: Seven major natural gas pipe line construction projects and one major underground storage development have been given priorities assistance for purchase of 140,100 tons of pipe during the quarter. The PAD said total estimated cost of the eight projects is \$323,078,000.

It said 116,400 tons of pipe have been allocated to 450 smaller projects and for maintenance, repair and operations.

Southern Natural Gas Company, Birmingham, Ala., got the largest single allotment, 72,153 tons for its general expansion program already under way and estimated to cost \$77,675,600 when completed in 1954.

Other major allotments were: United Fuel Gas Company, Charleston, W. Va., 6,760 tons to start two underground storage reservoirs, \$8,150,000; Pacific Gas and Electric Company, San Francisco, 13,152 tons for two projects involving looping of its existing pipe line system in California, \$16,891,300; The Texas Company, New Orleans, 11,714 tons for pipe lines to supply natural gas to two industrial customers in Louisiana, \$3,933,000;

El Paso Natural Gas Company, El Paso, 500 tons for looping its existing Texas to California system, \$63,732,960; Texas-Illinois Natural Gas Pipe Line Company, Chicago, 2,231 tons for additions to its system, \$21,940,000; and Tennessee Gas Transmission Company, Houston, \$3,790 tons for looping its existing Texas to New England system, \$130,755,500.

Group Oil Company No. 1 University, one-mile southwest extender to production in the Block 11 (Devonian) field of Southwest Andrews County, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 299.2 barrels of high-gravity oil.

The flow was gauged through a 3 3/8-inch choke and from perforations at 8,160-8,228 feet. Pay was washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

No gas-oil ratio or gravity have been reported.

This extender is 330 feet from south and east lines of section 28, block 11, University Lands survey.

WASHINGTON OIL— National Petroleum Group Becomes Target Of Attack And Praise In Short Life

(Editor's note: The National Petroleum Council, composed of about 100 of the nation's top oil and gas executives, is a unique example of government and industry teamwork. Here for the first time is the story of who's on the council, what they do, and why the council is eyed as the model for a score or more other industry advisory committees. This is the first of a two-part series by a reporter who has covered the council since it was organized less than seven years ago.)

WASHINGTON—During the six and a half years of its life, the National Petroleum Council has been the target of occasional attack and of a wealth of praise.

It has been called a lobby and special interest group and a step toward monopoly; and 10 times as often it has been lauded as the greatest example in Washington of patriotism on the part of a tremendous industry.

"Your work has made this government-industry teamwork outstanding in all of Washington," Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman told members. Top men in the military in particular are enthusiastic. Senator J. W. Fulbright (D-Ark.) says the council "is willing to bend a back to work, but not to bend a knee in subservience to the federal government."

The Facts Speak
And throughout Washington today, there is a strong feeling that the council idea may be the key to the age old problem of how can business and government get along together. Before many months more, the council idea is likely to be tried out by other industries.

Behind this talk, what are the facts? What is the council? Who are its members? What does it do? Does it help petroleum or the government? The answers are on the record for one who cares to go after them. For instance, the council was a bulwark of strength to a jittery government when the Korean war came on so suddenly in mid-1950. The government turned to the council and, almost at once, council committees were estimating military oil demand ahead, and the steel needs of oil and gas in the defense period ahead.

No other industry came close to moving with such speed. As a result the military and civilians got the oil needed; and the industry was first in with its claim for short materials. This helped oil and gas get more drill pipe and line pipe than it might have had.

Founded In 1946
The council—composed of 101 of the nation's leading oil and gas executives—has been giving this kind of service since it was created by executive order of Interior Secretary J. A. Krug at the suggestion of President Truman. The council held its first meeting June 21, 1946, at the Interior Department.

In the organization, the government has regular and frequent access to advice of top executives who earn in the overall five million dollars a year in salaries alone. The talent, of course, could not be bought. If the government were to pay the salaries for the time on council business, alone, the bill would come to \$250,000 a year.

Over a seven-year period, it would approach two million dollars. When the time of oil company staff men working on council committees is figured in, the amount is doubled. Over and beyond that, the council comes up with \$85,000 a year for secretarial and other council expenses, shared by members depending upon size. A few members pay nothing, several pay \$100 a year, some big oil companies pay \$3,000, and the peak goes to \$4,500.

Impressive Statistics
Add to that the expenses of travel for the four annual meetings a year, and the total outlay of council members over the years may come close to five million dollars. Some say ten million is more accurate.

The bare statistics on the work of the council are impressive. Over the years, the group has been asked to make 73 studies, many of them major ones. The council agreed to make 61, but found 13 outside its authority. A total of well over 100 reports resulted. In all, 921 different members have served on council committees, but only 129 of them, the cumulative total of persons who have served on the council, were council members. The rest were oil men, generally in companies of council members. As some persons have been on 10 or more committees, the total committee appointments comes to about 2,500, almost exactly half of them non-members of the council.

The makeup of the council shows, as might be expected with key men in the world's greatest industry, a number of persons of considerable wealth. Some say that at least 30 of the 101 members are worth one or more million dollars. By and large these men earned their money. A notable example is W. Alton Jones, president of Cities Service Company. Regarded as a financial wizard today, he was doing chores for pay at the age of six as janitor at the school he attended in Missouri. On the other hand, some members of the council, relatively poor, have total incomes of less than \$10,000 a year.

Members include the president or other executives of about 30 large oil companies, six natural gas companies, 25 oil and gas trade associations, individual crude oil producers, refiners, pipe liners, distributors, consultants, former government officials, and even leaders of two oil cooperatives. Any hetero-

Cementing Wells Takes Much Training, Special Equipment

DALLAS—(AP)—An amazing and strange assortment of industries thrive because somewhere, at almost any given time, an oil well is being drilled.

Special mud, surveying, logging—and cementing industries.

You probably wouldn't think you need upwards of 1,000 sacks of cement to drill an oil well. Or that you'd pump it down the same pipe you intend to use as a brace to keep the hole from collapsing.

But you do. You need more cement or less cement, depending on

the area where the well is drilled.

To keep oil out of water sands and water out of the oil and to surround the pipe down which the drill is dropped. This is an almost sure cure for any possible cave in.

Countless Details
It doesn't sound too complicated, pumping cement down the pipe as the drill bites into the earth, out the mouth of the pipe and back up its length.

But most of the men who wear the hard top hats and do this are engineering graduates. It's up to them to figure the pumping pressure, the amount of cement and the countless other details that go into the operation. The well drifter has overall supervision—but since he's paying a fancy price for these experts, usually lets them call the tune.

One of the companies that spe-

cialize in oil well cementing is Halliburton, with home office at Duncan, Okla.

Tough To Learn
"You just can't go out and cement a well," says Lee Bortz, veteran of 21 years with the firm and assistant division manager of the Dallas office. "It's a tough job to learn."

"We have two men to each of the trucks, one truck to a job. One is the driver, and he's really an apprentice cement operator. After about two years, he usually becomes a full fledged operator."

"A specially built truck carries everything you need except the cement. That's brought in in bulk and mixed at the well site.

"But the truck carries all the equipment for pumping, measuring and everything else."
No Average Use
There's no "average" amount of cement used. Each well varies.

"In West Texas they use a tremendous amount of cement," Bortz said. "In North and East Texas not so much. Maybe you'll only need 400 or 500 sacks. It all depends on the area—and the well."

Depth of the well is of prime importance, too.

Cement operators work for a guaranteed wage, plus overtime. The companies they work for are hired by drillers on a job basis.

The cement men go to work one or two days after a well is started. And they finish up when the well comes in or closes out a dry hole.

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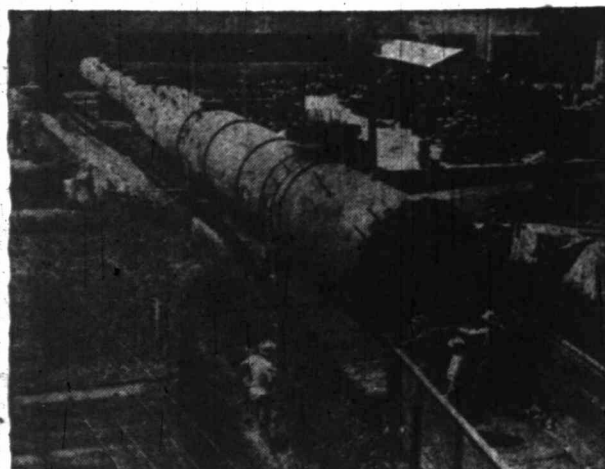

TETC Earnings Show Slight Drop

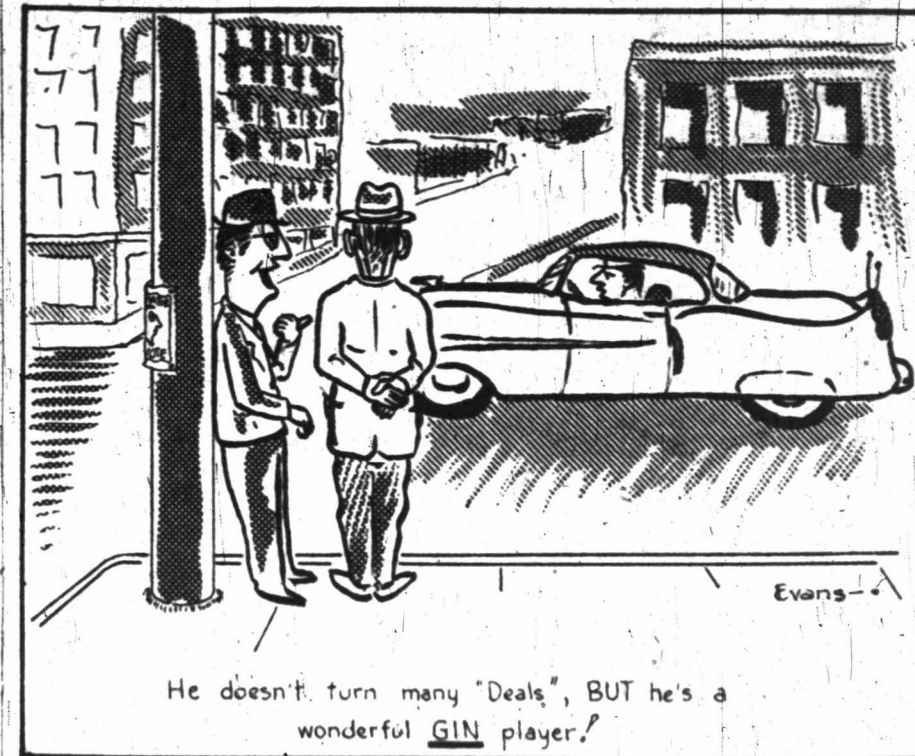

Convicted Bankers Pay Back \$140,544 Gel Lighter Terms

DALLAS.—(AP)—Strawn bankers Judd R. Stuart and Joseph H. Stuart, recently convicted of embezzling \$140,544 from their "family bank," must serve only six months of what originally was an 18-month jail sentence.

Federal Judge T. Whitfield Davidson Friday reduced their sentence after Attorney J. Percival Rice said all losses had been repaid and that the banking brothers had been "punished enough."

Rice brought into court a witness who said the Stuar's uncle, S. J. Stuart, deceased, had given the brothers authority to use cash from his and other Stuart family depositors.

Lt. Col. J. E. Fletcher quoted the deceased Stuart as saying: "I told Joe and J. R. that we would back them and they could use some of our money for good investments—except the stock market."

Some of the bank's present officials also went to bat for the two men, now held in the Tarrant County Jail at Fort Worth.

Rice said the brothers and their families are destitute because of selling all they had to repay the money.

After observing that a bank "like Caesar's wife, must be above reproach," Judge reduced the sentences to six months each for the Stuar's.

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Skelly Officials Visiting Midland District Office

"No area in the United States has more productive horizons in oil than the Permian Basin," said Joseph E. Morero, vice president in charge of exploration for the Skelly Oil Company, Tulsa.

A. L. Cashman, vice president in charge of the land department, added his opinion, stating that the West Texas oil-producing region undoubtedly has "many more possibilities."

The two officials of Skelly came to Midland this week from their Tulsa headquarters to inspect the Midland district office of the oil organization. They were accompanied by W. F. Bailey, the company's division geologist, also from Tulsa. And all three predicted a bright future for the economic prosperity of West Texas.

The purpose of the trip, as Cashman pointed out, was to further liaison between the Tulsa main office and the Midland branch office. The trio make their inspection tours several times a year, visiting various district offices maintained by Skelly. The oil company has 15 branch offices, from Billings, Montana to Corpus Christi, Texas.

Morero went on to say, "The only limit to all well drilling in West Texas is depth, or the "basement" of the oil deposits. It was referring to the granite formations encountered at great depths.

Morero explained that the average situation here, which he characterized as "light" was not due to lack of deposits. He said that most of the oil acreage in West

Texas is already under lease, sometimes giving the impression that there is little possibility of future development.

But he maintained that production activity will continue for years to come in West Texas, although he held that exploratory work out here is not as intensified as before.

Commenting on the local scene, H. H. Kaderli, district land man in the Midland office, said that lack of water is the only limiting problem in Midland's industrial development at present.

But he agreed that Midland was on a sound economic basis, and Allen Ehlers, district geologist of the Midland branch, stated, "The boom is over, paving the way for a stable situation in West Texas."

The Skelly Oil Company is one of the oldest oil organizations in Midland, having come here in 1930. In recent years, it underwent expansion, including construction of a modern office building at 312 North Big Spring Street in January, 1949. Twenty-four employees work in the Midland district office.

A total of 12 projects are being developed in the West Texas and New Mexico area by the Skelly Oil Company at this time. Skelly tests are contracted out for actual drilling operations.

The Midland branch office administers an area extending from the east line of Scurry County in Texas to the west line of Eddy County in New Mexico.

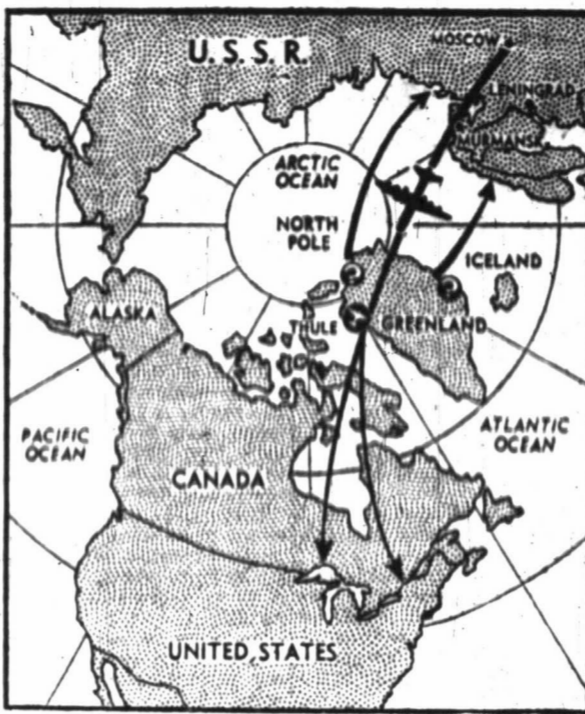

Budget Quarrels Split UNESCO

PARIS—The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) was split wide open Saturday by quarrels over its budget and the admission of Spain to membership.

Jaime Torres Bodet, resigned as director general in protest against UNESCO's failure to vote all the money he asked for spending in the next two years. Two leading members of the Executive Board also quit.

These resignations followed a series of walkouts prompted by the vote last Wednesday to admit Spain whose government is termed a Fascist dictatorship by some member nations. Spain is barred from membership in the United Nations itself.

Torres Bodet, former minister of education in Mexico, had asked UNESCO's Seventh Annual Conference to approve expenditures of \$20,400,000 for 1953 and 1954. The delegates balked Friday, however, and set a ceiling of 18 million dollars. The vote was 29-24, with four absences.

Britain, Sweden and Australia led the fight against the higher budget. Their delegates contended UNESCO's Paris headquarters, which employs a staff of 800 and absorbs about 14 per cent of the budget, is top-heavy and could be pruned. The United States, which pays a third of UNESCO's costs, voted with the majority.

Now a 48-nation agency UNESCO proclaims that its primary job is to teach illiterates of the world to read and write and then evaluate what they learn. Much of its emphasis has been on Southeast Asia.

Torres Bodet was named director general in 1948 for a six-year term, succeeding Dr. Julian Huxley of Britain. The post pays \$18,000 a year, plus \$8,800 in allowances.

Newlyweds Arrested On Burglary Charge

LOS ANGELES—Charges of burglary have delayed the honeymoon of two Texas newlyweds.

Jailed here Friday on charges of burglarizing the Morgan, Texas, Post Office, they gave their names as Billy Mac Walker, 27, and Mrs. Josie Walker, 20.

The bride said they had been married only a few weeks and that her husband had been a used car salesman in Dallas.

Police Capt. James Hamilton said they were arrested and booked on suspicion of burglary at the request of postal inspectors. He added that about 200 money orders were taken from the Morgan Post Office last month.

Some of the money orders have been passed in amounts of \$20 or more, he said.

"It is cold, windy and frozen," he wrote his parents, concerning the trip to Barrow.

"The Arctic Ocean is frozen over near the shore and the ice floes are moving in and piling up. Will soon be frozen clear to the North Pole."

"I saw a herd of about 20 hair seal very close to the shore. . . . The Eskimos hunt them for food and clothing. Sour seal liver is a real treat. Certain places in the snow and ice are a pale blue color that is eerie looking."

"The Will Rogers monument is about 15 or 20 miles from Barrow in the middle of nowhere. It is a rough stone monument with engraving. There is a plaque at the base that was presented by the citizens of Hillsboro, Texas. Why couldn't Midland dedicate one?"

"I had to go out there by weasel. A peculiar mode of travel in a vehicle equipped with tracks. Some of the snow drifts are 10 and 12 feet high. I guess not many Texans get to see that particular monument."

"The village smells of fish. The people all smell like stale cod liver oil. I visited the local hospital and the Eskimos are having tooth trouble since taking to the white man's candy and sweets. The natives have just about quit hunting for a living. The Navy pays very high wages for labor."

Barbed Wire Used To Protect Germans From Russian Guards

BERLIN—British engineers and military police strung 350 yards of barbed wire outside Spandau Jail Saturday to protect nearby German residents from molestation by Soviet prison guards.

The action was taken by order of British Maj. Gen. C. F. C. Coleman after two instances in which the Russian sentries arrested Germans for walking along a footpath leading to a number of garden houses within a stone's throw of the huge prison where Hitler's top lieutenants are serving sentences for war crimes.

General Coleman first protested to the Russian authorities about the conduct of the guards, and then without waiting for a reply, decided on the barbed wire method of screening the footpath. Fifty British engineers and 20 military police strung the wire.

Soldiers of all four occupation powers guard the jail, which holds former Deputy Fuehrer Rudolf Hess, Admirals Erich Raeder and Karl Doenitz, banker Walter Funk, munitions expert Albert Speer, diplomat Konstantin von Neurath and Hitler youth leader Baldur von Schirach. They are serving from 10 years to life.

And the job of arranging and staging the big area attraction will continue from now until show time, with members of the Rodeo Committee—John Dublin, Jr., Buster Cole, Frank Cowden, Jr., Clarence Schaubauer, Jr., Courtney Cowden and John Nobles, Jr.—taking the lead in the planning.

The 1952 Rodeo was the most successful in history, and everything possible will be done to make the 1953 event even better.

Marion Flynt was reelected president of Midland Fair for 1953, along with John Dublin, Jr., vice president, and Louis A. Bartha, secretary-treasurer. Congratulations, boys!

Everett Colborn of the Lightning C Ranch at Dublin, Texas, one of the nation's top rodeo producers, will produce Midland Rodeo again next year.

Insect damage to cotton in Texas in 1951 amounted to \$119,714,800, according to the National Cotton Council. This was \$101,388,200 less than in 1950.

George O. Chance, chairman of the Texas state unit of the Cotton Council, released the estimate in connection with announcement of the sixth annual Cotton Insect Conference, which will be held in Memphis, December 10-11.

Cotton pests in Texas in 1951, the report pointed out, claimed 590,720 bales of cotton, valued at \$102,480,920 and 247,840 tons of cottonseed, worth \$17,234,880.

Texas losses for 1950, according to a previous Council estimate, totaled \$221,103,000, estimated value of 948,712 bales of cotton and 398,744 tons of cottonseed.

Estimates for both years are based on production figures compiled by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, USDA.

Vernie Elliott, veteran rodeo producer, and Beutler Brothers, Oklahoma rodeo producers, have joined forces and will present the world's greatest indoor rodeo at Fort Worth's Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, January 30-February 8.

The partnership will be known as Beutler Brothers and Vernie Elliott.

Texas beef cattle breeders will be seeking their fifth grand champion steer award December 2 at the International Livestock Exposition at the Chicago Amphitheater.

A Texas animal last won the grand champion in 1950 when 19-year-old Lloyd Robison, Big Spring, showed "Big Spring Special." The 1,025-pound Hereford sold for an unprecedented \$12 a pound. The previous year, the winner was the Perco 4-H Club's Judge Roy Bean, also a Hereford.

In addition to the money and honor attendant upon winning the championship, the exhibitor this year, for the first time, will be presented the Lord Elgin trophy, created by a watch company in honor of the Earl of Elgin and Kingcardine of Scotland. A Scottish breed of cattle, Aberdeen-Angus, has been the dominant winner over the 50-year-history of the show.

First-year results on a five-year irrigated pasture experiment at Texas Tech give strong indications that a mixture of Bromo grass, alfalfa, and perennial rye stands head and shoulders above three other grass mixtures in beef production.

W. L. Stangel, dean of agriculture at Tech and director of the experiment, said the leading mixture produced 833 pounds of beef per acre in 171 days of grazing ended October 20.

Ten head of grade yearling steers were put on four test plots of irrigated mixed grasses April 30, 1951.

The first plot had a planting mixture of three pounds alfalfa to 20 pounds of Bromo grass; Plot II, three pounds alfalfa and 20 pounds of perennial rye; Plot III, three pounds alfalfa, 10 pounds each of Bromo and perennial rye; and Plot IV, five pounds each of Bromo, perennial rye, orchard grass, and Kentucky fescue, and one-half pound blue panic.

Results Cited
Plot I produced 411 pounds of beef per acre; Plot II, 461 pounds; Plot III, 833 pounds; and Plot IV, 401 pounds. If the cattle had been marketed October 21, Dean Stangel said they would have brought a minimum of \$25 per hundred pounds, which would have given each acre in Plot I a dollar-production of \$102.75; Plot II, \$115.25; Plot III, \$206.25; and Plot IV, \$100.25.

The results obtained during the preceding five years and this year's clearly indicate that grazing of irrigated pastures in this area, where irrigation is available, definitely have a potential in a diversified farm program, which should be encouraged if our area continues to be agriculturally productive," Dean Stangel stated.

Trial plots of about 20 different grasses are being planted by S. L. Parker, superintendent of Resthaven Memorial Park north of Midland, to test their adaptability to local conditions.

The park company has 27 acres of cultivated land, a part of which will be seeded to perennial grasses to reduce blowing of sand onto the cemetery area. Cool-season grasses already planted for observation include Kentucky 31 fescue, Texas wintergrass, smooth brome, and orchard grass. The park has signed a conversation agreement with the Martin-Howard soil conservation district.

Leo Floyd has a cover of small grain on his farm 2 miles west of Midland. It was planted to give protection from wind erosion.

Meivin Wimberly has hand-stripped 25 pounds of buffel grass seed from an irrigated garden plot established near his house this summer. He plans to make additional plantings next year as a part of his program in cooperation with the Martin-Howard soil conservation district. He expects to harvest a few more pounds of seed yet this fall.

Palmer Evans has a small field of grain up on his farm east of Greenwood.

Cattle Hold Top Spot In Midland's Agriculture Scene

Agriculture of Midland County consists of two distinct types—cattle and sheep ranching and general farming, according to County Agent Charles Green.

The greater proportion of the land area in the county is used for cattle and sheep ranching as it is unsuited for any other purpose than grazing, Green said. Cattle ranching, for the main part, is carried on in the northern half of the county.

Production of feeder calves is the main business of the cattlemen, the county agent pointed out. Native grasses in this area furnish good grazing throughout the year, as most of them cure naturally on the ground and furnish good winter forage. Most of the cattle are fed some supplementary protein feed during the winter, depending on the season. During dry seasons when grass is short, a number of cattle are shipped to other sections of the country where grass is more plentiful, Green said.

In the southern part of the county on the lighter, more gravelly soils a number of sheep ranches are operated. Using fine wool ewes and Suffolk or Corriedale rams, sheepmen engage in the production of wool and top quality cross-bred feeder lambs.

Dry land farming is practiced generally, although there are now about 30 irrigation farms in the county. Dry land farming is limited by rainfall, this generally being considered the minimum limit of annual rainfall necessary for farming.

Cotton is the main cash crop produced on some 300 farms ranging from 100 to 640 acres, Green said. Yields are good, but fluctuate according to stored-subsoil moisture and the amount and distribution of seasonal rainfall. In good seasons yields range from one-third to one bale per acre and range downward from one-fifth bale to nothing during prolonged dry seasons.

Other Grains
Crops next in importance to cotton are grain sorghums, the county agent pointed out. The combine-type milos are grown principally although some sorgho, hessari, and kafirs are grown for forage crops. In years when seasonal rainfall comes too late for cotton, much acreage is planted to the 60-day milo varieties which produce 10 to 20 bushels of grain per acre if late season moisture is favorable.

Green said that vegetable, fruit, dairying, poultry, and swine production in Midland County are not important industries, generally being limited to production for home use and occasional local sale.

Dairying, in times of good rainfall has risen to 42 Grade A dairies, but in drouth years when grazing is non-existent and roughage is high, dairymen are forced to sell, Green said. At present, the county only has four Grade A dairies in operation.

Most good cows went for \$11.50 to \$12.50 with a few odds going to \$14. Canner and cutters went for \$8 to \$10.50 and old shells were down to \$6.

Bulls cashed at \$14 to \$16.50 with odd ones up to \$17.25. Stocker steer calves sold for \$18 to \$21.50 with a choice bunch up to \$21. Stocker heifer calves brought \$18 to \$19.

Common, Brahman and mixed breed stocker yearlings, steers and heifers sold for \$10 to \$14.50. There will be no sale on Thanksgiving Day.

Police said he was identified by a friend as Jacob R. Katz.

Identification was made at the morgue after officers matched keys found in his pocket with a parked car found near the scene. Police said no explanation was given by the family for the robbery attempt.

The ice cream executive was slain by a truck guard who had been knocked almost unconscious by a home-made ammonia bomb set off inside the money compartment of the parked armored truck.

Police reported the license to the car was issued to the Reed Ice Cream Company, of which Katz is president. An insurance card found in the car bore the name of J. R. Katz.

The Guarantee Service Company, owner of the armored truck, said the truck carried "a lot of money" but wouldn't say how much.

Repair Jobs Assure More Comfort, Safer

COLLEGE STATION—The recent "cold-snaps" are the forerunner of more severe weather to come. It is just good management, says W. S. Allen, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, to do now the maintenance and repair jobs around the home and farmstead that will make for more comfort and safer living this winter.

Check the floor furnace burners, controls and plumbing before lighting it, says Allen, to make sure there is no escaping gas to cause an explosion. Do the same for gas heaters and vent them if possible. Vents will eliminate the problem of moisture condensing on the walls and furniture. Check the fireplace and chimney for loose mortar or cracks and if repairs are needed, make them before the first fire is started.

Insulation Recommended
Insulation will make the house warmer this winter, cooler next summer and will cut the winter heating bills, says Allen.

If the roof of the home or other farm buildings needs repairing, the job should be done now. Allen points out that nails in metal roofs will become loose in hot weather and may even come out and he suggests a careful check be made on this item. A coat of asphalt roofing cement usually will take care of the leaks in the roof which have resulted from cracks or small holes.

Careful Planning Of Home Laundry Is Recommended

A suitable place for laundry equipment is one of the most pressing needs of the average family.

More than 80 per cent of all homes have washing machines, a recent study shows, but fully half of the nation's home makers have to do the family laundry in an inconvenient space. Wash day, as a result, means working under unsatisfactory conditions.

In planning a new home or remodeling an old one, locate the laundry in a suitable place and design it for more than one use. It can be combined with the kitchen or a large bathroom or a sewing-hobby room. In an older home, consider the possibility of locating it on a back porch or in an old pantry.

Select the floor and wall materials carefully. A waterproof material is a good choice for this steamy area.

Pitch the floor slightly to a central drain. A quick hosing down will then keep a laundry floor clean and bright.

Arrange equipment in the order that it will be used—first a table for sorting (this can be on wheels), then the washing machine, drying equipment, ironer or ironing board.

Install a wall cupboard for the materials needed on wash day. If there is room enough, have a floor-to-ceiling cabinet built in and use

Garages Keep Up With Changing Home Styles

Prospective home builders or buyers should keep in mind that they will need storage space for equipment used in the maintenance of the house and grounds. This can be provided in the garage.

The storage problem virtually was non-existent in the days when homes were built over full basements, but many modern homes have no basements or only partial basements to accommodate heating plants and hot water tanks.

Actually, basement storage space is the most economical in cost per cubic foot. When there is no basement, however, facilities for storage must be provided at ground level.

Designed and constructed with this purpose in mind, the garage makes an excellent utility building in addition to providing a shelter for the automobile.

For uniformity of appearance, the exterior of the garage should match the exterior of the house. This is a rule of design for an attached garage and for any separate garage close enough to the dwelling so that both buildings are seen at the same time.

Color harmony especially is im-

portant. In almost all cases, the roof is the largest single unbroken area of a building and the key factor in its exterior appearance.

The variety of solid and blended colors in which asphalt shingles are made makes this material well-suited for solving color harmony problems. 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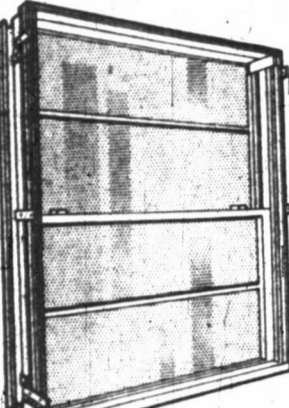
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Old, Peeling Paint Should Be Removed Before Repainting

Before repainting the exterior of his house, the home-owner should understand the technique of handling old paint failures, such as peeling paint.

Considerable areas of the old paint may be peeling, badly blistered or cracked. In such a case, it is possible that all the old paint eventually will deteriorate. Therefore, it should all be removed, for applying new paint will not bind the old paint to the surface, and time and labor will be wasted.

Paint failures, including peeling, may result from many causes, such as inferior quality of paint used; too long intervals between paintings; use of wrong paint on particular surface to be covered and others.

Peeling usually is the result of paint being applied to damp or wet wood, since moisture prevents paint from properly bonding with, or gripping, the surface. Moisture may enter walls through roof leaks; poorly joined corner, windows and doors; or cracks in the siding.

Peeling paint should be scraped from the surface before a new coat is applied, or it will continue to peel, and the new paint will peel off with it, caution Colorizer paint authorities.

There are several methods for complete paint removal. It can be done with a blowtorch (especially if the old coat of peeling paint is thick) or with one of the new electric paint-removing tools. The heat quickly softens the paint so that it can be removed with a wide putty knife or scraping knife. The blowtorch is held in one hand and the scraping knife in the other. The flame passing over the surface causes the paint to bubble and curl, and while softened it is scraped off with the knife. There is no fire danger with an electric tool, but with a blow-torch, caution should be taken.

A chemical paint-remover may be used. This is a non-inflammable, organic solvent-type remover. It may be either liquid or paste. The paste remover usually is appropriate for ordinary jobs. It is usually spread on over the old paint, allowed to remain until it and the softened paint together can be scraped off with a scraper.

Checking and cracking, another commonly encountered paint failure, is avoided by allowing one coat to dry thoroughly before applying the next, say Colorizer paint experts.

Housing Research 'Revolution' Is New Institute Goal

WASHINGTON—What research has done in medicine, chemistry, physics and scores of other sciences to raise American health and living standards may be duplicated soon in the still unexplored field of modern, mid-20th century housing.

The National Association of Home Builders took the first big step toward that goal with the formation of a "Home Builders Research Institute" to coordinate the scattered housing research now under way and to conduct practical field tests on new materials and techniques developed in university and industrial laboratories.

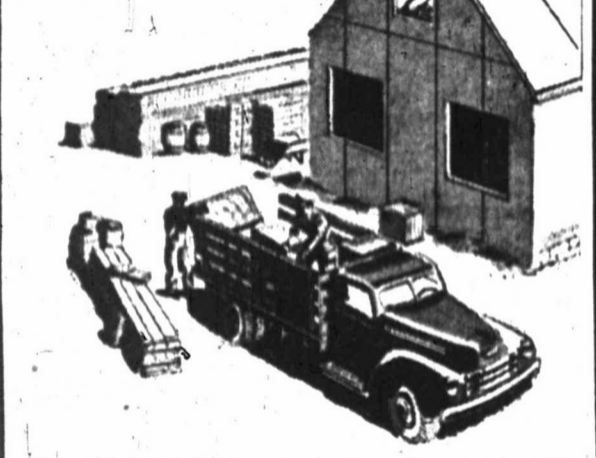
Creation of the new organization is expected to give tremendous impetus to all basic housing research and to speed up the technological revolution which has transformed home building since World War II from a handicraft to a \$12 billion a year mass-production industry.

The Institute charter was approved by the NAHB Board of Directors at its September meeting in Seattle, as an outgrowth of the technical and research activities of the association, whose 25,000 members account for 80 per cent of all residential construction in metropolitan areas of the United States.

Headed by Leonard G. Haeger, technical services director of NAHB, the Institute's activities will be guided by a nine-man board of trustees chosen from among the nation's leading builders.

In addition to its own studies and field trials, the Institute will provide the nation's home builders for the first time with a central clearing house of title information on new developments by governmental and private research organizations. It also will advise those organizations on practical problems faced by the home builders in order to guide their research into the most effective channels.

An Open-Handed Review

No country in the free world may close its eyes to the legitimate nationalist aspirations of subject native peoples, wherever they are.

But that does not mean, as India and other Asiatic and Arab nations suggest, that immediate independence of all colonial ties must be granted wherever loud clamor for native recognition is heard.

Although men caught up in this revolutionary fervor do not like to concede it, independence is not an automatic blessing. Indonesia and African Libya are examples.

Independence as an objective is never to be lost sight of. The colonial powers must do all they can to foster the political and economic development of their colonies.

In his recent presentation to the United Nations, French Foreign Minister Schuman made out a good case for France in this very sphere.

One need not assume French behavior has been perfect, however, to question the wisdom and sense of world responsibility that has led a group of Arab-Asian countries to bring the Tunisian-Moroccan case before the UN.

Nevertheless, since the matter has come to the UN, and since the French have so impressive a case for their basic conduct in Africa, it would seem the sounder course to abandon legalistic arguments about the UN's right to hear the issue.

France and its friends have much to lose by shrinking from such an open-handed review. France and the free world have much to gain by dealing frankly with a problem that lies at the very heart of the struggle against tyrannical communism.

Industrial Research Keeps Eye On Private Atom Power Goals

WASHINGTON—Development of atomic power for private industrial use now is being investigated by the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission in half a dozen different projects.

AEC first authorized private industrial research on atomic power development last April, in a series of four contracts with four teams of two companies each. They were:

- 1. The Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the Bechtel Company, an industrial, engineering and contracting firm of San Francisco.
2. The Commonwealth Edison Company and the Public Service of Northern Illinois, both of Chicago.
3. Monsanto Chemical Company and the Union Electric Company of Missouri, both of St. Louis.
4. Dow Chemical Company and Detroit Edison Company, both of Detroit.

Just recently the Dow Chemical-Detroit Edison contract was modified to bring it in more public utility and manufacturing companies from the Northeastern United States.

In substance, these research projects—with the supposedly best brains of public utility, engineering and chemical companies—have a challenging assignment. It is to see if they can devise new, better and cheaper methods for the production of fissionable materials for government use, with the production of electric power generated by atomic energy as a by-product.

At the present time, in the government-owned plants for the production of uranium and plutonium, vast quantities of coal and steam-generated or hydro-electric power are consumed. The heat generated in separating out the fissionable materials is a waste product that must be dumped.

In the commercial power plants, this heat from the atomic reactors, or piles, would be used to generate steam. The steam would be used to generate electric power. The plutonium or uranium manufactured in the reactor then would be sold to the government. All reactors would be of the breeder type, producing fissionable material faster than it is consumed.

Walker L. Ciesler, president of Detroit Edison, has reported that if purified uranium could be sold to the government at \$56 a pound, private industry would be justified in an initial investment of \$77 per kilowatt, the same as in a conventional steam plant today.

What uranium produced in its own plants now costs the government is kept a military secret. The problem of shielding an atomic power plant to prevent dangerous radiation is formidable. Whereas a conventional steam plant can be located on 100 acres, 1,000 or more acres might be required for an atomic plant.

The Dow Chemical-Detroit Edison project has proposed to meet this problem by locating the generator in the question just answered. You, South, hold: Spades 4, Hearts A-J-10-2, Diamonds 7, Clubs A-J-3-2. What do you do? Answer Monday

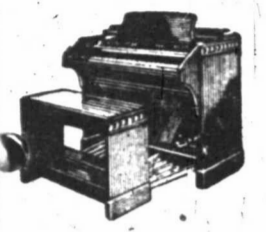

Orchestra Association Sets Saturday Concert

The newly organized Midland Orchestra and Chorus Association will present its first concert—a program of chamber music by Mathys Abas, violinist, and Charlotte Barrier, pianist—at 8 p.m. Saturday in the City-County Auditorium.

Featured in the program will be three major styles of music literature.

The first style is represented by the "Sonata in D Major" (George Frederick Handel) and the "Violin Concerto in A Minor" (Giuseppe Tartini). Both were composed in the latter half of the eighteenth century, but show a strong difference in character. The Handel number, which gives piano and violin parts of equal importance, is strongly polyphonic; almost mathematical, with northern objectivity. The concerto, emphasizing the solo part, is spontaneous, subjective and full of ornamentation.

Shows Nationalism
Second of the music styles is the emphasis on nationalism or folklorism found in the middle of the last

century, when composers pictured their own countries and peoples. Representative are the works of Chopin in Poland, Rimsky-Korsakov

in Russia, Dvorak in Bohemia, Bartok and Kodaly in Hungary and a number of the Spanish composers—Granados, Albeniz, de Falla, Nin

and Turina.
The third style to be included in the Midland concert is the "cyclic style" originated by Cesar Franck, a technique by which a whole movement is built up from a nucleus group of notes. Franck was born in 1822 at Vlaanderen, which was then a party of the Netherlands. He was organist and chorus master of the famous Saint Clothilde cathedral in Paris. Franck's "Sonata in A Major" for violin and piano will be included in the Midland concert.

Abas, who studied violin in the Amsterdam Conservatory under J. de Clerck, played three years in professional orchestras—the Utrecht Municipal Orchestra and the Rotterdam Philharmonic Orchestra. He has participated in performances under many of today's leading conductors, including Charles Munch, Leonard Bernstein and Rafael Kubelick. He came to the United States in July, 1941, to study at the Berkshire Music Center and the University of Illinois. That spring, he played for the Netherlands Society of New York.

Charlotte Barrier, who now is teaching in Lubbock, studied with Eva Browning in Lubbock and Jeanette Gillet in Fort Worth. She was graduated from McGill University, Montreal, Canada.

NEW YORK—The little fur, unlimited by season or the time of day, looms large in fashion. The initial investment is far less than that for a coat and the potential wearability is, naturally, far greater. The lines of this year's small furs are generally rounded and thus easily wrapped. This is true of capes, jackets, scarves and stoles. Stoles often are fitted to the shoulders in a manner that prevents their slipping off. There are many circular sleeves in tiny jackets. And these waist-length wraps are often fitted in at the waist and rounded at the back. A spiral treatment of sleeves looks new for this Fall and creates a continuous line from the shoulder to the cuff. These sleeves can be worn "shed up or down, to the wearer's taste."

The collared stole is another version of the fur that wraps more readily, clinging to the contours of the body. This, like the stole with fitted shoulders, is designed to stay in place without constant clutching. While there are many rounded, waist-length jackets for Fall, there also are many that are hip-length. These are intended for wear over the longer suit-jackets and longer hiplines of some Fall dresses.

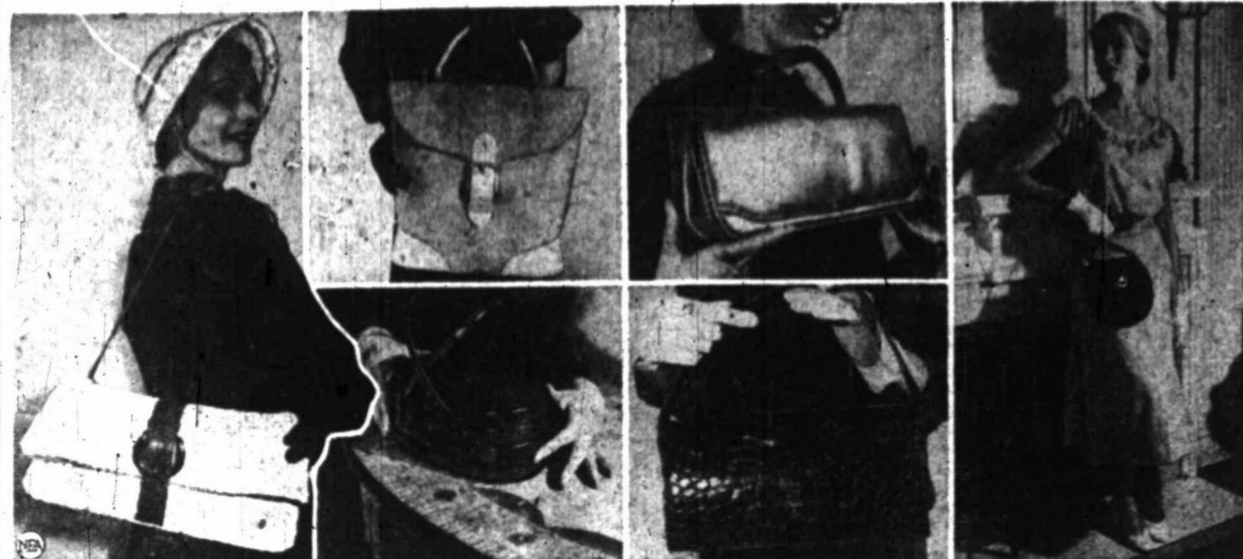
The exhibit will be open to the public from 2:30 until 5:30 p.m. and from 7:30 until 9:30 p.m. Sunday.

NEW YORK—The Old saw that opposites attract is fully and persuasively demonstrated in handbags for Fall and Winter.

New silhouettes in smooth leathers and fabrics provide contrast for rough-textured fabrics. And handbags in fuzzy, furry or loopy materials are for wear with all the smooth fabrics in ready-to-wear fashions.

Just as softness of silhouette keynotes this year's ready-to-wear, so is it important to the new handbags. This softness is achieved through adroit manipulation of fabric or leather. Even the box bag, which gets new emphasis, often has no frame at all and attains a soft look through the sculpture of leather or fabric over sponge rubber. In shape, this box bag comes first but is bigger and roomier than in the past. It is even long and narrow in some designs. The pouch, rated second, is sleek and water-tight. Huge satchels or shoulder bags are the biggest ever, have many pockets and compartments, are no longer just for travel wear. At the other extreme, but very sound fashion, is the clutch in a larger size. Related to this is the envelope or underarm bag for wear with coats that wrap. For the first time, handbags are appearing in such unorthodox but

interesting materials as furred alpaca with a silky nap a half-inch long; cream-colored fleece; polished, marcelled zibeline with mohair; looped boucle tweed in black with contrasting color; pebbly-effect wools; camel's hair mixed with cashmere and jewel-colored corduroys.

Black leads off the color list, followed by the blonde to brown shades. Both ruby and carmine red register strongly. In dressy bags, materials are elegant and rich, eliminating need for trim of any kind. Velvet, cashmere, dull satin, suede or calf may have tiny gold or enamel touches in the way of trim.

Corduroy is notable in the Fall handbag collections because it's important in ready-to-wear. Since they're used for really elegant dresses and coats as well as for casual and sports wear, some of these bags are done elaborately in pinwaite corduroy and in jewel tones.

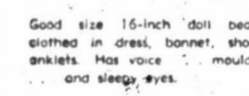

Many Lonely Intellectuals Overlook Nearby Friendships

Writes a California correspondent: "Do you know how a middle-aged woman, suffering under the curse of a mature mind, can meet people of her own kind?" "This letter is not meant to be snobbish; the women of my neighborhood have hearts of gold, but their mental outlook does not go beyond light TV programs, the progress of their gardens and the success of last night's dinner." "I have tried going to church but I have found that big city churches are not friendly. One might as well stand in the foyer of a theater lobby and expect a friendly greeting." "Surely in a city of this size there are lonely people who hanker for some intellectual companionship. A mental hunger can be (and is) as devastating as a physical hunger." There are many people searching, as this woman is, for some kind of intellectual companionship. I know there are, for they frequently write to this column. Both men and women. But most of them are handicapped by several wrong attitudes. One is in turning up their noses at those they feel are their intellectual inferiors. It is often possible to learn more from those whose interests and attitudes are entirely different from your own, than by companionship exclusively with people of your own type. Some of those women whose conversation centers on their garden might teach the lonely woman who wrote the above letter, about the joy to be found in making things grow. Some of the women who seem mainly interested in the success of last night's dinner might open her eyes to the creative fun to be had in really superb cooking. And so on. If it is only mental stimulation that a person can't, at the moment seem to find in friends, it can be found elsewhere in books, in planned study, night courses offered in most cities. Meanwhile, it is wise to cultivate the friendships that are offered and to be willing to share the interests of others instead of always expecting them to share one's own enthusiasms.

School Bond Issue Goes Before Pecos Voters December 6

PECOS — Date for the \$300,000 school bond election to determine whether Pecos school officials will be authorized to proceed with plans for two new elementary school buildings has been set for December 6, announced Supt. Ray Whitley. Members of the board met Thursday morning to authorize the election after a petition bearing 40 or 50 names was submitted. The school bonds were sold this week to the First Southwest Company of Dallas on the assumption that the bond issue will win the voters' approval. Average interest rate was estimated at 3.07 per cent. A combination of four bids was reviewed by the board.

The funds, if approved, will provide buildings for youngsters in the first four grades. One building will be located in North Pecos and the other in Southwest Pecos. An enrollment check this week showed 807 pupils attending the present elementary school, which is designed for only 400 pupils. Next year, school officials are expecting an enrollment of 725 in the elementary school age bracket, Whitley explained. If approved by the property owners, the North Pecos school will provide four classrooms, while the other will provide 10 rooms.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

WASHINGTON—Best-selling book behind the Iron Curtain, believe it or not, is on John Foster Dulles. No. 1 foreign-affairs adviser to General Eisenhower.

The book is a novel called "Arsonite," by Nicolai Spanov and has sold 800,000 copies. It is translated into Hungarian, Czech and Russian and is required reading for Communist workers in the satellite countries—perhaps to prepare them for the appointment of John Foster Dulles as secretary of State.

The story is that of a banker-gambler named John Vandenheim, who is the secret manager of John Foster Dulles. Though the book is in the form of a novel, Dulles' name is used with no camouflage.

Dulles and Vandenheim are given credit for burning the Reichstag, the murder of King Alexander of Yugoslavia, arranging the Anschluss between Hitler and Austria, some parts of the Spanish Civil War. The novel also pictures Vandenheim as putting Dulles in touch with Hermann Goering. Dulles is described as fat, short, with a big head and pumpkin nose—a highly accurate description. His habits are given because he is always nervous. The book is out of the most diabolical pieces of propaganda ever put across behind the Iron Curtain.

Note—Recent Soviet posters have pictured a banker in silk hat and frock coat gathering gold from blood which drips from a Korean woman murdered by American troops. The banker is captioned "Dulles-Harriman."

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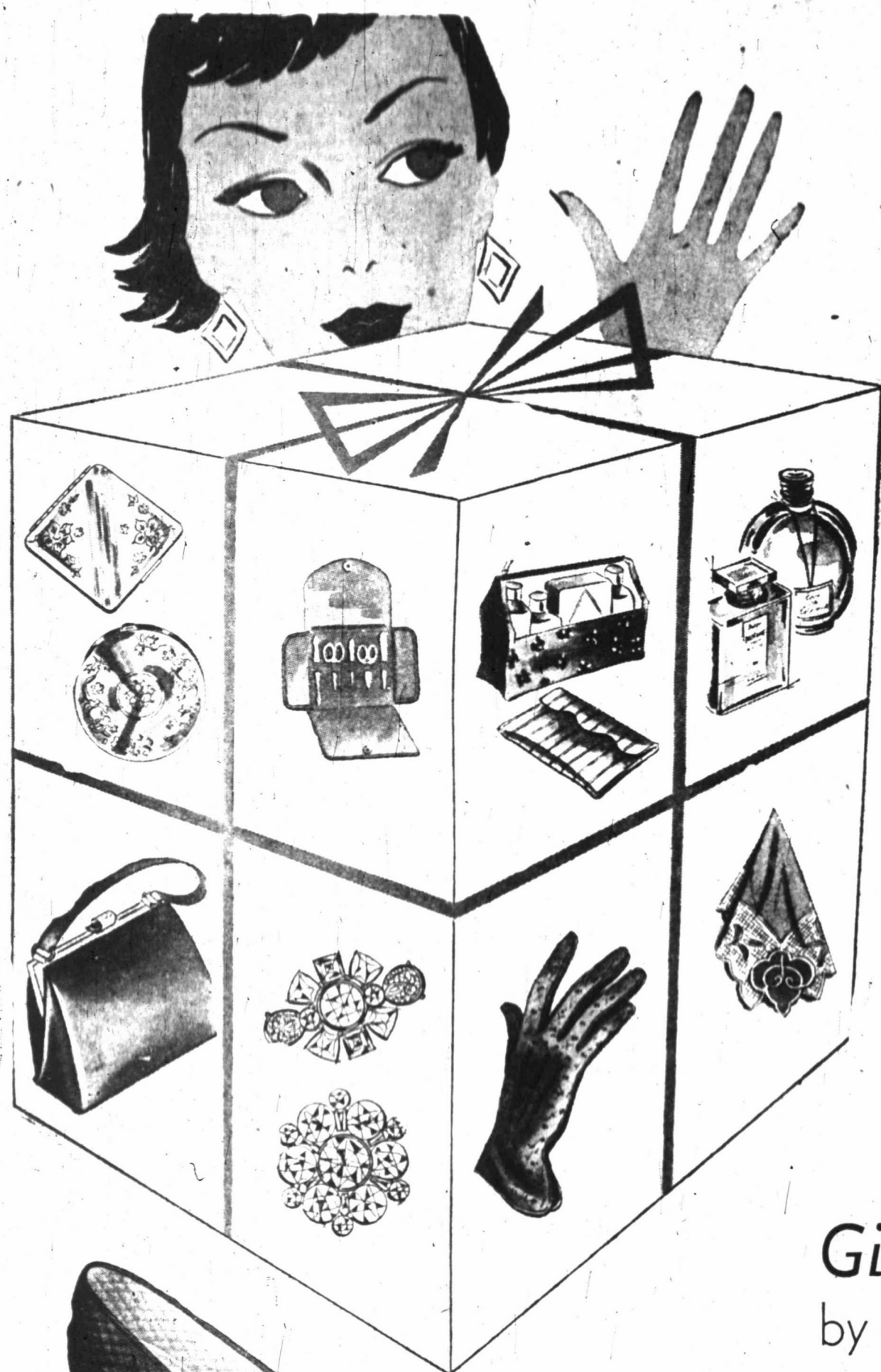
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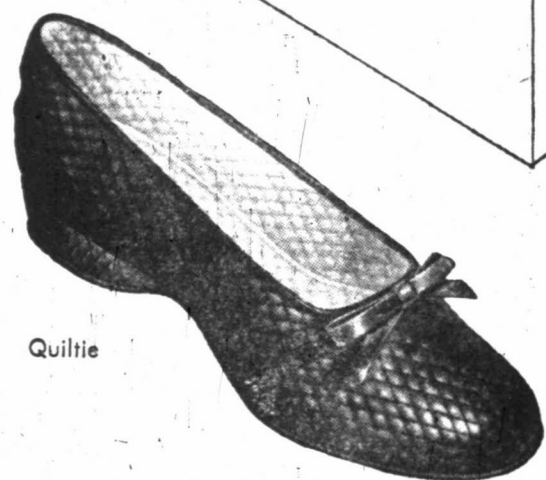

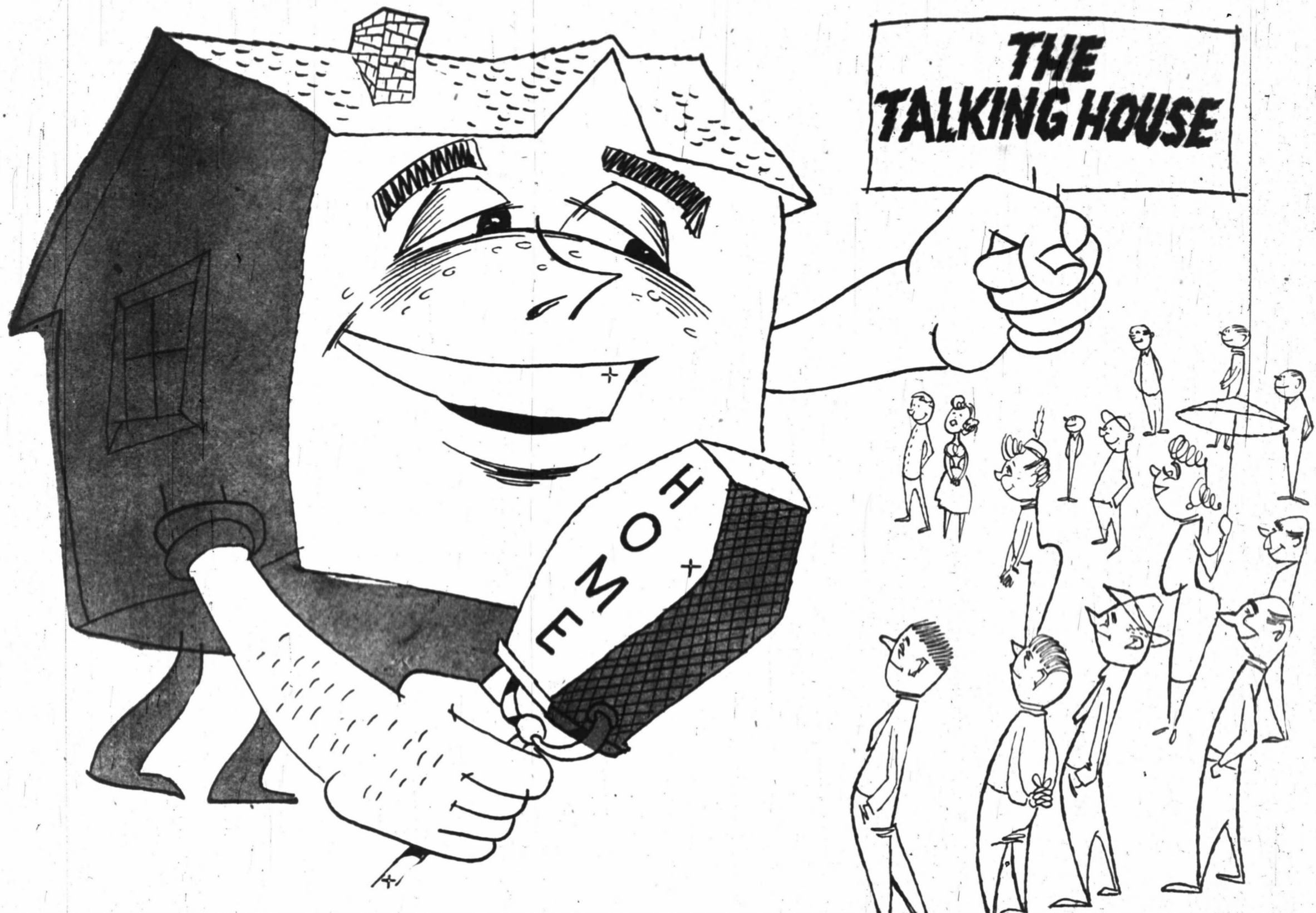

Water Softeners For Homes Are More Than Just Luxury

It's surprising the number of people who consider a water softener as a luxury gadget to appeal to women in the fancy home equipment game. But when engineering research finds that such homely things as the familiar ring in the bathtub and crusts in pipes, water heaters and cooking utensils are costing you hard earned cash, just because of hard water, you begin to wonder.

The University of Illinois Small Homes Council, for instance, found the deposits formed by calcium and magnesium sulphates and bicarbonates—the elements that make water hard—can materially reduce the efficiency of home hot water heaters.

Some authorities say that loss of efficiency can amount to \$1.50 per person per year.

But the consumption of soap is the big item. According to the Cul-

igan Soft Water Institute of Northbrook, Ill., the average family uses about \$27 worth of soap in a year in a soft water area. Where water is very hard—Cherokee, Okla., for example, where it tests 53 grains hard—the same family soap bill runs around \$110 per year.

Water, it seems, is a much more complicated mixture than the simple H₂O we learned about in school.

Rain is next, although by falling through the air it picks up a lot of impurities. Mountain streams and lakes provide water relatively free from organic impurities on which bacteria thrive, but lowland streams and lakes can be highly polluted.

From there on you can find more things in water than a chemist can shake a stick at.

In one relatively soft water area, experts called the water "acid." Some residents complain that it even eats out copper plumbing.

Hence Three Pipes

Have you ever wondered why some people have three faucets on all sinks and lavatories? In hotels the third faucet usually is labeled "ice water" simply because it is slightly cooled. The three-faucet arrangement means that the water is so hard that softeners are used on both the cold and hot water lines. Since many people object to the taste of soft water, the third pipe carries the plain hard water. Also there is no real need to soften the water used by the toilet tank or hose connection. Hence, three pipes.

Hard water often tastes better and it's sometimes healthful with all the minerals it contains. But it's a terror for washing. Its calcium and magnesium ions react with soap to form insoluble curds. That's why women use ammonia, borax, or trisodium phosphate with washing soda to get clothes clean.

So water softeners have become one of the slickest of modern appliances for the home. They save enough soap alone to pay for themselves in short order. They usually work with zeolite, a mineral that extracts the hardness from the water as it filters through. The zeolite exchanges the calcium and magnesium for sodium that works fine with soap.

Rental Service

The softener requires recharging or reconditioning after the zeolite's supply of sodium is used up. Sometimes this is accomplished by adding common salt to the softener. Sometimes an auxiliary brine tank takes care of this.

In the worst hard water areas rental softener service is popular. A replacement unit is periodically installed and the exhausted mineral unit is taken back to the plant for recharging. According to the Culligan Institute, there are more than 700,000 rental softeners in service.

Good Thermostat Makes Good Heating System Even Better

The thermostat is one key to your comfort and unless it's correctly placed and adjusted, the best heating system won't be able to keep you comfortable.

For example, if you've placed your thermostat too near a heat source such as a radiator, fireplace, lamp, sunlit window or television set, this extra heat will cause the thermostat to shut down the furnace before you have properly heated. Or perhaps you have placed it too high or low on the wall.

Five feet, the engineers say, is just the right height for comfortable temperatures.

On the other hand, you'll overheat if your control is installed on a cool outside wall or where drafts, such as those caused by a frequently-opened door, will hit it and cause it to continually call for extra heat.

The engineers even caution against locating the thermostat where there is an excessive amount of foot traffic. The slight breeze created by passing people is enough, they say, to cool it down somewhat.

Since a thermostat is sensitive vicinity, check and see if yours is in the room you use most. If you spend most of your time in the den, a thermostat in the living room obviously won't help much. The best bet is to use two or three thermostats to regulate the areas in the house where you eat, sleep and entertain.

During the past few years, major improvements have been made on all types of gas appliances. With their streamlined appearance, improved automatic controls, and increased efficiencies, they bear little resemblance to the models of just a few years ago. These truly modern gas appliances, such as those in the Talking House, make models of a few years back as out of date as a crystal radio set or a Model "T" Ford.

Take the gas range for instance. About 40 years ago when the first gas ranges were introduced, women thought that the ultimate in cooking had arrived. During the ensuing years, gas range manufacturers and the entire gas industry have worked continuously to bring greater improvements to America's favorite cooking appliance. Today, more than 30 million women cook on gas ranges that would have grandma's eyes popping with their fully automatic features, and their fast, clean, economical cooking.

Modern gas ranges bear seals of approval for cooking perfection and for the consumer's protection. The American Gas Association's Blue

Star Seal of Approval, a blue star in a circle, means that they are built to meet exacting standards of efficiency and operation, durability and safety. These are minimum standards that the gas industry has established, and the Blue Star Seal is a jealously guarded trademark that has protected customers for over twenty-five years.

The other seal, the letters "CP" in a circle, indicates that the gas range on which it appears meets all the requirements of the Blue Star Seal and, in addition, meets high minimum requirements for convenience, performance and economy. The "CP" trademark can be used only on automatic gas ranges manufactured by a member of the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association, whose ranges meet these extra requirements. Not all automatic gas ranges bearing the "CP" seal are like this. To the high "CP" requirements each manufacturer adds individual performance and convenience features developed in his own test kitchens and engineering laboratories. This "CP" trademark is the only unbiased buying guide of its kind in the cooking field.

Some of the minimum requirements for this "CP" seal of approval are:

Automatic lighting of all burners. Matches are a thing of the past. A mere turn of the handle and all burners, top burners, ovens and broilers, light automatically.

Smokeless broilers are efficient over the entire broiling area. There are no hot spots. Fats and greases are drained away from the heat zone to prevent smoking and burning. Spattering is reduced to a minimum and broiler pans and side walls are easy to clean and keep clean.

A popular requirement of automatic ranges built to "CP" standards is the giant top burner which speeds up cooking and saves time. Large utensils can be brought to a boil in a jiffy and boiled meats can be prepared in a jiffy.

All top burners of automatic gas ranges built to "CP" standards must be of the dual or "High-low" type to give every shade of heat from the tiniest pin pricks of flame to speedy full heat instantly. Foods can be brought to a boil quickly and then simmered gently so as to retain the nutritious vitamins and minerals and prevent food shrinkage and waste. This means saving on food and fuel bills.

Among the other "CP" requirements are: Non-tilting racks to prevent food spilling; super-insulation to keep kitchens cooler; automatic heat controls that regulate temperatures down to as low as 250

degrees, reduce food shrinkage up to 20 per cent, and insure exact results every time; and burners that are designed to give maximum efficiency and to save gas.

Many Americans can remember when hot water was heated on old wood or coal burning stoves, and Saturday night baths and wash days were a nightmare of struggling with heavy pans of hot water.

Science has found the solution to this problem and has erased that unpleasant memory and replaced it with a picture of a never-ending supply of really hot water at the turn of the tap, and the automatic gas water heater is responsible.

A typical 30-gallon automatic gas water heater will heat 42 gallons of water an hour through a temperature rise of 60 degrees.

This means the gas water heater can provide an adequate supply of hot water for the average family, including two hours of continuous operation of an automatic clothes washer.

The amount of water which can be drawn from storage without any appreciable drop in temperature is about 80 per cent of the storage capacity, and automatic gas water heaters show a greater recovery speed than any other automatic water heating fuel.

Recent developments show improved models of instantaneous and multicolor heaters. Other improvements are processes giving longer life to inside tanks, and allowing

easier servicing. The almost universal adoption of magnesium rods to reduce the rate of tank corrosion is to be noted in almost every type of gas water heater.

More manufacturers are producing table-size gas water heaters to fit in with kitchen appliances, or to line up with laundry room installations. Of table surface height, they come in 20, 30 and 40-gallon capacity, with automatic controls and quick recovery rate.

In 1926, When Silent Calvin Coolidge was in the White House, scientific research emerged with a mechanism that took a page out of the President's book—it did a lot of work without any clatter.

It was the first gas refrigerator and it performed a modern miracle—a miracle that has never ceased to amaze even the scientifically educated populace—it used heat to make cold.

All refrigerators are cooled by evaporation. The operating principle of the gas refrigerator is a tiny gas flame which distills the refrigerant out of water and sends it back through the pipes to be evaporated. In other words, a flame—a connotation of heat—makes cold. It is completely silent in its operation.

Although its principle remains the same, the gas refrigerator has changed its outer clothing to fit the fashion trends of modern-day food storage.

The 1952 9 1/2-cubic foot gas refrigerator is smaller outside and bigger inside than the 1926 seven-

foot model which took up much more kitchen space.

Twenty-six years ago there was no such produce on the market as frozen foods. The so-called "colder" area of the old refrigerator was confined to ice-making. The 1952 gas refrigerators include a huge frozen food compartment. Some of the larger models hold as much as 70 pounds of frozen foods—meat, poultry, fruits, fish and vegetables—with a convenient separate door opening into the freezer section.

The demand for ice on a hot summer day in 1926 was never quite satisfied, simply because freezing areas weren't big enough, couldn't make ice fast enough. In the new gas refrigerators an improved ice cube section freezes from 56 to 70 cubes. Trays are unloaded with a flip of the finger.

Shelf space is tailor-made for food containers of any capacity. Adjustable shelves can be raised or lowered to seven different levels. For bulky foods like watermelons and roasts, and for tall bottles, some shelves are sectional.

An "odds and ends" basket which sits right up front at hand level holds all those bits and pieces of leftovers—jelly, jars, cheese glasses, salad bottles, and so on. The basket slides out for quick pickup by the housewife.

One of the outstanding features of the modern gas refrigerator is its 10-year warranty. This is twice

as long as the guarantee on any other type of refrigerator and is an added value alongside the economical operation of this modern gas refrigerator.

A housewife used to need at least one fair day a week to dry her laundry in the sun. Now, the gas industry has developed an automatic gas clothes dryer which makes any day or night perfect drying weather.

Time was when homemakers trudged with a heavy basket of clothes, stretched a clothesline, and stooped over dozens of times to hang up clothes. The clothes dryer takes over his long list of heavy chores.

As soon as the washing is done, all laundry can be tossed into the dryer direct from the washer. The automatic timer is switched to the number of minutes of drying time required, and from then on, you don't have to do a thing. Thermostats control the heat and hold the

temperature at the most suitable drying point. At the end of the drying period, the timer automatically switches off.

Clothes can be completely dried for immediately storing or damp dried for ironing. Colorfast clothes can be dried together. Each load in the average washer can be dried as it is washed with the average drying time from 15 to 25 minutes.

Throughout the years, man's progress in home building has been paralleled by his ability to cope with the weather and provide comfort for himself and his family.

Today, we often take heating comfort for granted. When we think of a new home we expect it to include the heating equipment necessary to keep us warm and comfortable. But for the most satisfactory results, the heating system, like many other details in the home, should be carefully planned.

Time At Hand To Photograph Personalized Yule Greetings

AP Newsfeatures

Look at the calendar and you'll realize you should be busy right now working on your personal photographic Christmas cards. If ever a hobby can be put to practical use to spread an individual message ... this is the occasion.

Methods and materials are the same this year as the last few years, despite advances in electronics, television and the selection of a new President. The basic ingredient, as always, is a personal or family photo of good quality and general interest.

It can be a picture already taken—a recent portrait, a vacation memento or some family activity.

Most camera fans, however, rack their brains for a special picture idea with a personal Christmas touch. The majority use perennial Yuletide favorites which retain individualism because the cast of characters are the photographer's alone. A picture of the children hanging Christmas stockings, adjusting tree ornaments or singing carols will always be in style. What can perk it up, however, is dramatic

lighting, unusual angle or the degree of spontaneity which the subjects reveal.

Make Game Of It
When children are involved, it's better to make a game out of any picture project. They seldom like to pose for pictures and are apt to balk at repeating for a second shot. With the lights set and the camera focussed, you're more likely to get cooperation by suggesting: "Let's play Christmas. You pretend to hang up these stockings and I'll pretend I'm making a movie for television ... that was fine; now let's do it again for channel 4 ..."

A good many special pictures can have the Christmas message as part of the composition. Children writing on a blackboard, a title on a movie or television screen, lettering on windows, doors, packages, or in a tabletop set-up are all examples of this.

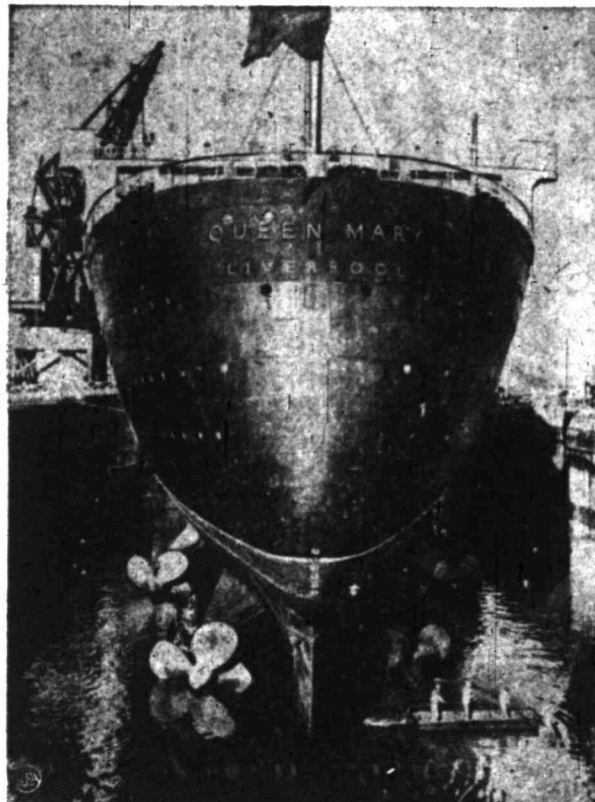
Try Several Plans
With a picture at hand or in mind, there are several methods of handling it depending on the camera fan's available time, darkroom ability and desire to spend or save money. Those who haven't made contact prints or who have no darkroom facilities at all are best off taking their negative to their local camera store. Here a choice of topical designs is available with a space provided in which the personal negative is printed.

It is about half as expensive to process your own cards. Most of the same topical designs are available in negative mask sets. Your negative is taped to the mask and then a contact print produces the complete card.

Write In Greetings
If you don't want to fuss with a mask, a simple contact print on double weight, deckle edged paper will make a suitable card. The holiday greetings can be hand written in red or green ink to lend the festive touch.

In some cases, the greetings can be carefully added to the picture by hand lettering or by cutting out from another source and pasting down. Then a copy negative is made, correct size, so that additional contact prints will show the combined picture and message. In this case the art work should be done on an enlarged print before copying.

Know The Negative
Be sure to bring your selected negative with you when buying paper for printing at home. With the salesman's help, you'll then get the correct grade of contrast. At the same time, always buy the correct size and number of envelopes to enclose the cards. It is inconvenient, to say the least, to attempt to find the correct size of envelopes after the cards have been printed. There's another advantage. The cards can be addressed and stamped by the rest of the family while you are attending to the creative chore of printing the cards.

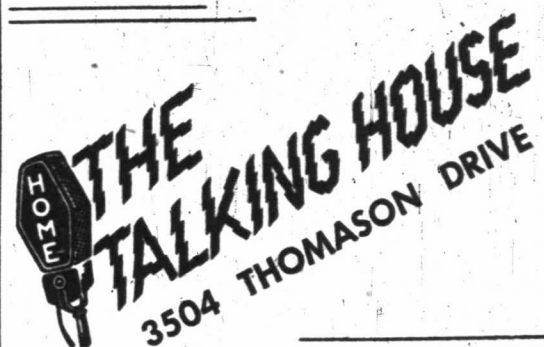

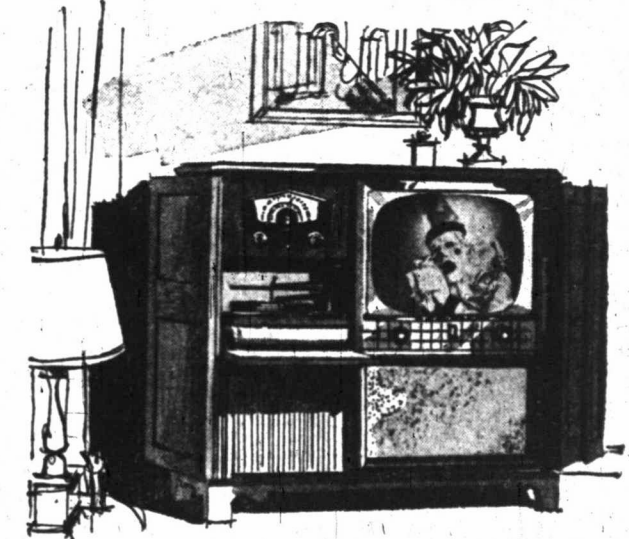

It might include a latex braided-stand clothesline that eliminates the use of clothespins. The looped ends can be fastened over a water faucet, towel rack, door knob, or any other firm anchorage. The line weighs all of one ounce.

Then there is a small plastic washboard that slips over the back of your hand. It is one part of a laundry kit that includes a damp-clothes holder made of plastic cloth.

For washing nylon stockings, send a flesh-colored fine nylon mesh bag with a drawstring. The bag eliminates possible snags or tears when washing nylons or any other filmy or precious item in the lingerie line. It should be swished, with the garments inside, in a bowlful of soap-

Always helpful to the traveling servicewoman is a package containing compressed soft, scented, full-size face cloths in pellet form. When dropped into water they expand to full size within 30 seconds. Cloth can be used indefinitely.

Another ideal gift for feminine recruits is an electric hair dryer. The dryer makes shampoos and hair care easy. It can be held in one hand or placed on a stand or table, leaving both hands free. Furthermore, the dryer can be tilted to any convenient angle.

Christmas Shoppers Find Layaway Plan Is Helpful

Christmas shoppers may become confused at times about it and call it a variety of names, such as "put me back" and "will call," but the fact remains—the "layaway" system of buying on credit is popular. Midland merchants are already experiencing a demand from purchasers who like to reserve their Christmas gifts and pay for them later.

Surprisingly enough, the system is not an outgrowth of shortages of goods during the last war as many believe. It dates back to Revolutionary times as the oldest credit system in America. Open credit did not come into vogue until after the Civil War, and it came into prominence around World War I. But the layaway system goes farther back.

Under the layaway plan, the buyer pays a certain percentage of the purchase price on an article, and it is held for him in the store until the balance due is paid. One Midland store manager reported that his company keeps about 10 per cent of its inventory tied up in layaway goods. Another said that some shoppers use the layaway plan exclusively for credit sales.

Midland retailers like the plan for several reasons. At Christmas time, they are able to reserve or sell out items, and then order new stocks for more sales. Also, they maintain, it gives buyers a chance to select their Christmas gifts when stocks are complete, with an opportunity to pay later. And it is good for consumers who are short on cash.

A survey of Midland stores revealed that the layaway system is already on the upsurge. Retailers said that a heavy layaway business

was done on Dollar Day. And they believe the layaway purchases are already in excess of those made last year at this time. Ready-to-wear, home furnishings, and clothing are popular layaway items.

The layaway plan differs from the open charge account in length of time. Most items charged and taken home from the store must be paid for in 30 days, but goods bought and left at the store under layaway often permit payments to be made for three or four months. One Midland merchant has had cases of layaways left in his store for as long as two years.

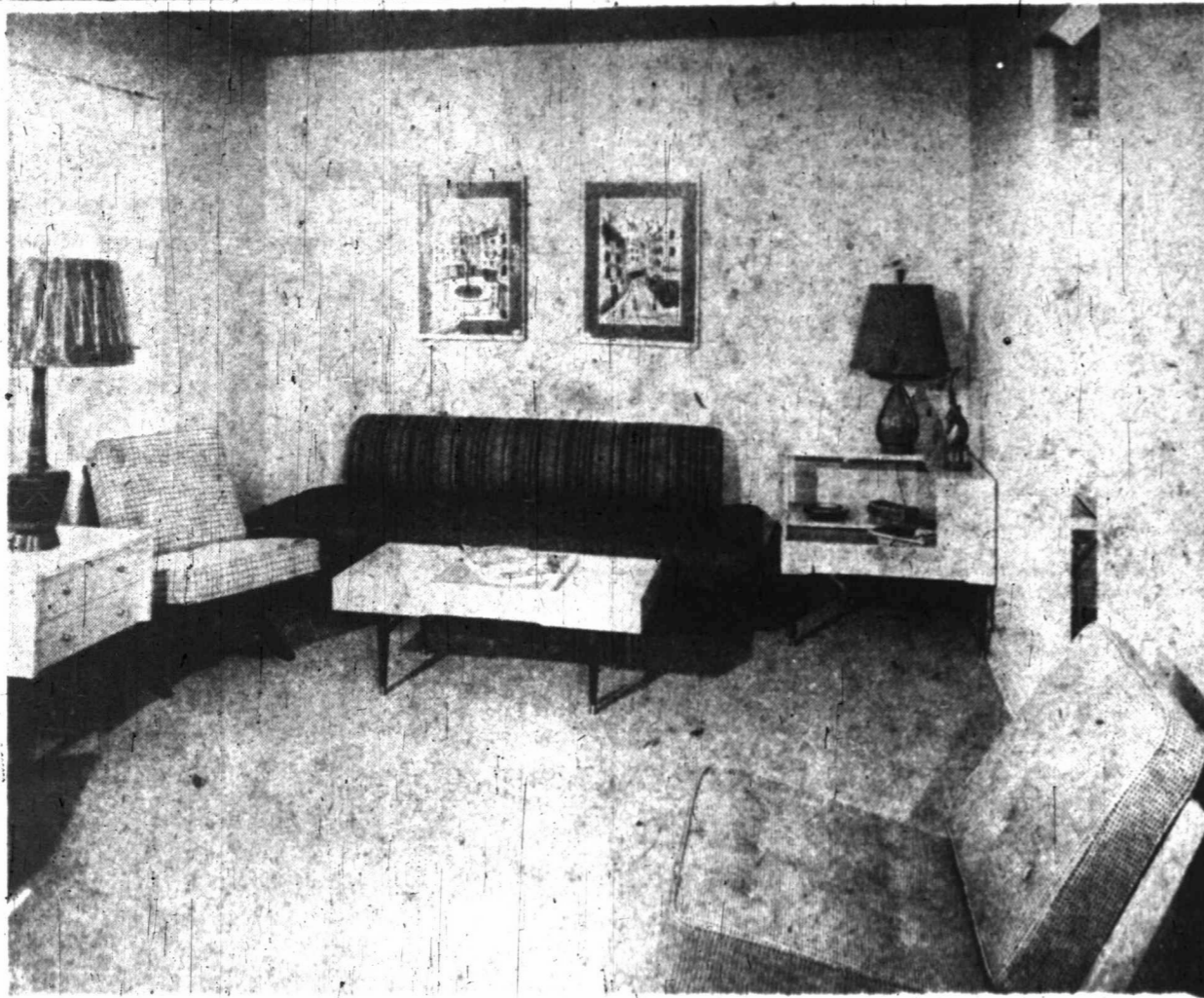

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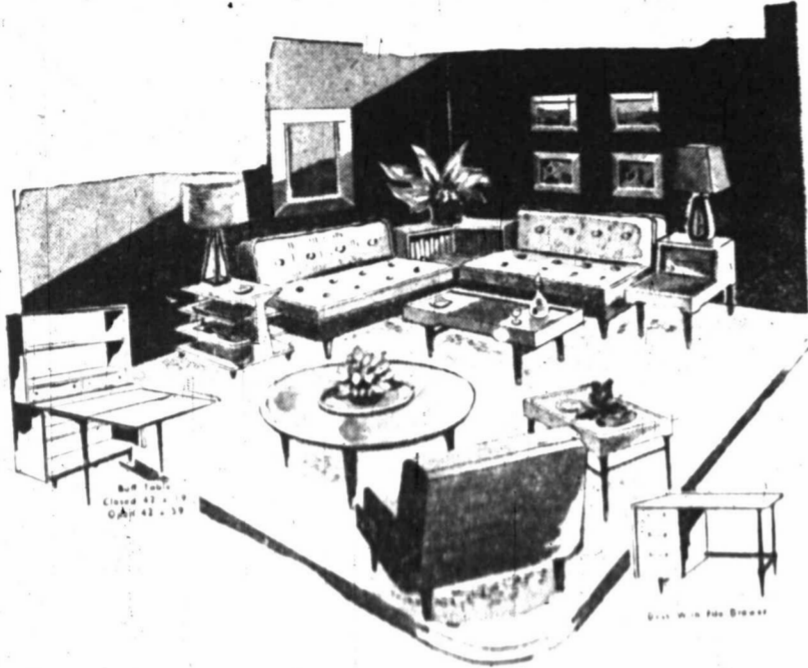

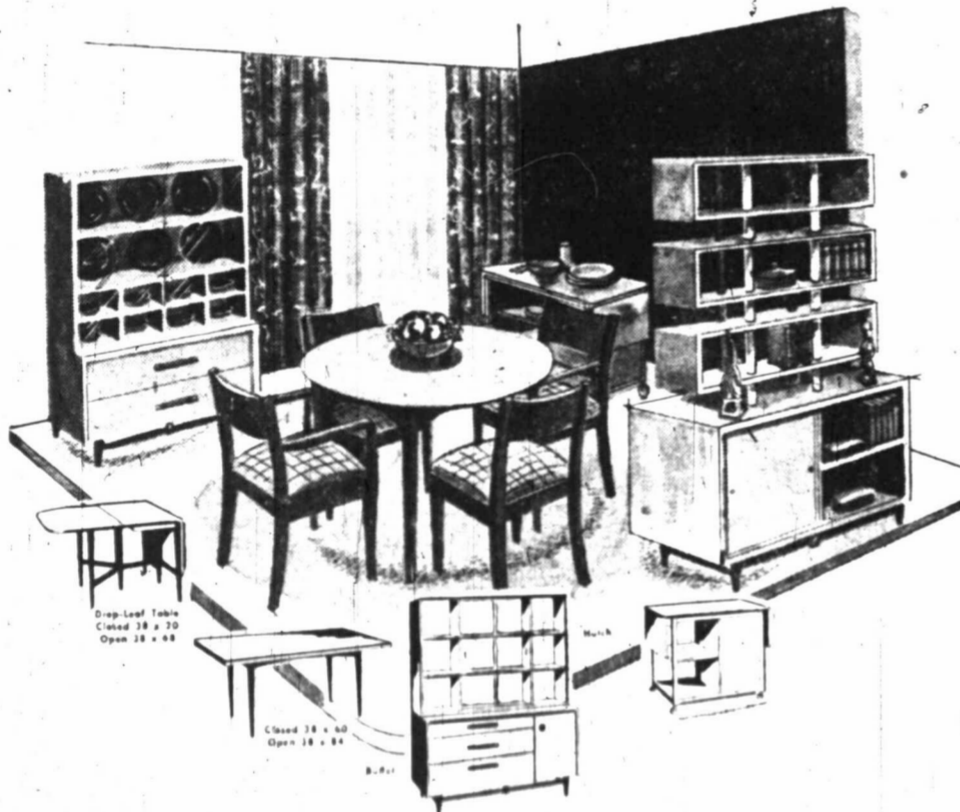
