FREAKISH HAIL HITS IN CRANE

CRANE—Freakish weather at Crane Sunday has had old-timers scratching their heads with puzzlement. A one-inch precipitation had been recorded by Tuesday morning. A downpour Monday night was accompanied by a light hail and low temperatures. In the Community Hall area, hail fell as big as marbles and square in shape, the oldest appearing hailstones oldest could remember in the county's history.

A new, snow-bearing norther was whipping west to east across the state. Soon, the Weather Bureau said, the norther would mingle with the remains of a cold front that had hung stationary in Southeast Texas for two days but now was slipping out of the state. It was this fading front that had brought Texas its first heavy general rains in 30 months.

The snow was heaviest at Borger and Amarillo. All roads leading to Borger were closed by an overnight snowfall of eight inches. The city measured 11 inches Tuesday morning. Workers showed up late all over the city. The airport was closed the third day in a row. The temperature hung at 24 degrees.

Amarillo's 10 inches of snow was a November record. The previous record was eight and one-half inches in 1906 and again in 1923. Many roads were blocked. A trickle of traffic was able to get through on highways leading east and south, but motorists were warned to stay off the highways except in emergencies. Rural schools closed, but Amarillo schools stayed open.

A 27 mile-an-hour wind blew in gusts up to 32 miles an hour at Amarillo, and the mid-morning temperature was 24 degrees. A 10-degree low was predicted Tuesday night. Cars were stuck and workers were late.

Pampa Schools Closed
Five inches or more of snow—high winds made the exact depth uncertain—and a 22-degree temperature closed Pampa schools. All roads were blocked. The airport closed. Dalhart recorded five inches of snow and Perryton two inches. The Weather Bureau said snow was falling.

Oil Operator Held Under \$7,500 Bond On Check Complaint
Carlos D. Donaho, 33-year-old independent oil operator, was being held under \$7,500 bond Tuesday on a charge of felony, winding by worthless check. Donaho, arrested Monday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Guy Fletcher, was deputized before Justice of the Peace L. C. Stephenson and ordered held for action by the Midland County grand jury. He is charged with giving a \$6,690 check to Felix Stonehocker, Midland contractor. The check subsequently was returned, marked "insufficient funds." Authorities said the check had been given in payment for the remodeling of an office building which Donaho had leased in the 300 block of North Colorado Street.

AFL Names New President, Discusses Union With CIO

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor Monday chose 58-year-old George Meany as its new president and made a new bid to the CIO for a merger. Meany was elected unanimously by the AFL's 14-member Executive Council as successor to the late William Green. William F. Schnitzer, 46, Chicago, was selected unanimously to be the AFL's secretary-treasurer, the post vacated by Meany. Green died Friday at the age of 82 after serving as the AFL's chief executive more than a quarter-century. Meany told newsmen the AFL Council also had reactivated a nine-member committee on union with the CIO and had empowered it to invite the rival labor organization to join the new discussions on a merger. Such talks have been conducted. Some indication of the CIO's attitude may come from a meeting of its top officials in Atlantic City Friday. The main business of that meeting will be to discuss naming a new CIO president. The CIO presidency was vacated by the death of the veteran Philip Murray November 9. Deaths of both Murray and Green in quick succession spelled the end of an era in the labor movement. The reins of organized labor are shifting to new hands. Several of the country's biggest individual unions have changed leadership in recent months, as well, paving the way for a new crop of younger union chiefs.

The sudden shifting of the organized labor leadership to younger men has stirred some speculation that new moves to merge the AFL and CIO into a single federation may meet with success. Meany, a former member of the AFL Plumbers Union, was president of the New York State Federation of Labor five years from 1934 to 1939. He has been secretary-treasurer of the AFL since 1940. CIO leaders meeting in New York Monday were reported to be considering Allan S. Haywood, CIO's executive vice president, and Walter Reuther, president of the CIO's million-member United Auto Workers, as possible contenders for Murray's job as CIO president.

Controls End Seen As Woods Resigns

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A quick end to all price and wage controls by order of President Truman was seen as a possibility Tuesday in the wake of two major developments: 1. Senator Maybank (D-SC), chairman of the Senate Banking Committee, said in a broadcast from Charleston Monday night he has information Truman is considering doing away with such controls by executive order before January 3. 2. T. G. E. Woods resigned as price stabilizer. His resignation, peppered with criticism of Congress for providing a controls law which Woods contended favors "special interests," reached Truman Tuesday. "I have information that the President is now considering doing away with price and wage controls," Maybank said when interviewed asked him if he thought the Republicans would do away with such curbs. In replies to other questions, Maybank said this would be done by executive order, and before the Republican-dominated Congress takes over January 3. Woods sent his resignation—effective November 30—to the White House Monday but by a mischievous twist did not reach Truman's desk until the President had left his executive offices for the day and the price chief had held a news conference he was quitting after three months in office. Woods told reporters the present controls law "is weak and must undergo a very serious overhauling by the Congress to take out some of the special-interest amendments and substitute more equality of sacrifice among all elements of the economy." He said: "It seems all I've done since taking the job is to sign orders for price increases and I have not enjoyed the role."

Kremlin's Quick 'No' To Indian Truce Plan Seen As Red Blunder

The timing of Moscow's rejection of India's compromise proposal for a Korean truce may go down in history as a serious Soviet blunder. But the Kremlin probably considered itself forced into the hasty rejection. The Soviet move could have been predicted with confidence—but not the time element. There is no question Moscow dictated the orders hurriedly. Satellite Poland's delegate suddenly called off his plans to speak on the proposal Monday. Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky wanted to speak, and in a hurry. What Vishinsky had to say indicated several things: 1. The USSR is not interested in peace in Korea but simply in talking about it. 2. Moscow did not believe there was a real British-American split over the Indian proposal, but looked upon the differences as a maneuver to force the Soviet hand. Forces Chinese Hand 3. Moscow has tightened the screws on the Communist Chinese and is dictating to Peking on every step of the Korean discussions. The Vishinsky pronouncement illuminates the whole Soviet maneuver which began in the Summer of 1951 with the Moscow proposals purportedly looking toward an armistice. It indicates that, having gambled desperately and unsuccessfully to secure the whole Korean Peninsula for the USSR, the Russians intended to perpetuate a stalemate costing Moscow little and the U. S. a great deal. It could also serve as a constant irritant in the relations among the free nations allied in the defense of South Korea. The surprise came with the haste of Moscow's rejection of India's proposal. This suggests that Moscow suspected the British and Americans of cooking up the appearance of a deep split to maneuver the USSR into an untenable position. But it suggests something more important. Ordinarily, Moscow would have revelled in the prospect of a widening split in British-American relations and would have done all possible to fan it. However, Moscow believed it had to act swiftly. There seems only one answer to this. That is, that the Indians, before going ahead with their proposal, had some sort of green light from the Peiping regime. Possibly, the Communist Chinese actually do want to get out from under the awful cost of the Korean War by any face-saving device available. Vishinsky, thus, apparently has given a firm "no" to Peiping. In so doing, he has depressed and outraged the Indians and other Asians who appeared to have pinned great hopes on the proposal. He also has, healed automatically, the British-American differences brought on by the Indian proposal. There is no quick way of gauging Peiping's disappointment. But the Soviet action may be one more straw on the camel's back.

Korea Rumors Buzz At Ike's Headquarters

NEW YORK—(AP)—President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters buzzed with speculation Tuesday that he may try to spend Thanksgiving Day in Korea with the G.I's.

Owing to a security blackout covering all details of his trip, no official information was available. A number of indications, however, pointed to the possibility that the President-elect was about ready to leave for the war zone. They were: 1. He has made two more key designations. After his inauguration, he will present for confirmation by the Senate Ezra Taft Benson of Salt Lake City, Utah, for secretary of Agriculture. And he will name as his "White House assistant, Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire. 2. Gen. Mark Clark, supreme UN commander in the Far East, has arrived in Seoul, capital of Korea, to supervise preparations for Eisenhower's arrival. 3. The President-elect tapered off in his appointments Tuesday, setting aside most of the day for visits from friends, some relatives, and officers of Columbia University. Eisenhower has announced his resignation as the university's president effective January 19. His schedule Tuesday contrasted sharply with the tightly packed program he has been following since he returned last week to his offices in New York. Monday, he visited the United Nations headquarters, met with the president-elect, Senator Richard M. Nixon, talked with Benson and Adams and held conferences with a number of business and political figures. The only appointments fitting (Continued On Page 4)

Social Gains Come Slowly

NEW YORK—(AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower will be President next year, but in the Social Register he still will be a general of the Army. The Register—Society's blue book—came out Monday with its 1953 edition and failed to note Eisenhower's promotion by the American electorate. The book continued to list him at his New York address and made no mention of the White House, his address after January 20. The top brass probably discussed the forthcoming visit of President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower. Clark toured the front in a light plane Monday, possibly surveying the ground Eisenhower will visit. Temperatures climbed across the battlefield, bringing welcome relief from chilling cold. Russians Release Three Captive G.I's

BERLIN—(AP)—Three American soldiers picked up by the Russians while rabbit hunting were released Tuesday after two days in Soviet captivity. They said they were questioned sharply about military matters but otherwise "very well treated." The trio was nabbed while hunting on the outskirts of Berlin Sunday. A German girl, Ingeborg Rickens, arrested with them, also was turned loose Tuesday. The soldiers were Cpl. James H. Higgs, Toone, Tenn.; Pvt. Gene W. Addison, Nokomis, Ill., and Pvt. Clifford D. He said only his own resolution calling for an immediate cease-fire followed by a peace conference on prisoner repatriation and all other Korean issues would stop the fighting. U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson, who disagreed with some points of the Menon plan as being too vague, said the United States is "wholly in agreement with the spirit of this resolution." South Korea Muddies UN Truce Picture As Delegates Map Fight On Indian Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.—(AP)—South Korean announced Tuesday it would not accept any truce arranged by the UN against its wishes. President Syngman Rhee's foreign minister indicated his government believes Korea's future is nobody else's business. In a formal statement, Minister of Foreign Affairs Stunt. Pyun said: "The government of the Republic of Korea cannot and will not accept, against its wishes, any arrangement or agreement or resolution in regard to the disposition of what it considers to be its citizens or part of its historical domain, made or reached or adopted without its official and full participation with its unrestricted voice sovereign nations usually exercise in similar matters of the exclusive concern to themselves." South Korea is not a member of the UN nor is it taking part in the truce negotiations at Panmunjom. Phillips Wildcat In Martin Finds Oil In Wolfcamp

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1-C Schar, wildcat in Southwest Martin County, has indicated a possible discovery from the Wolfcamp. A drillstem test was taken in the interval from 9,580 to 9,773 feet. Tool was open two hours. Recovery was 50 feet of free oil, 1,140 feet of slightly oil and gas-cut water blanket and 190 feet of slightly oil and gas-cut mud. Open flowing bottomhole pressure was 130 pounds and shut-in pressure after 15 minutes was 1,960 pounds. The Wolfcamp has not been reported. No. 1-C Schar is 1,320 feet from south and 6,888 feet from west lines of league 324, LaSalle County School Land survey. It is four and one-half miles north of the discovery well of the Glass (Spraberry) field and four miles east of the shallow, Mabee pool. More hole was being made below 9,782 feet.

West Extension Is Finished To Pool In W-C Andrews

Frank and George Frankel of Houston have completed their No. 1-C University as a one and one-half-mile west extension to the recently opened South Shafter Lake (Yates sand) oil area of West-Central Andrews County. It gauged 641 barrels of 38.7-gravity oil per day through a 22.64-inch choke and open hole from 2,916 feet to 3,175 feet. The pay section was treated with 500 gallons of mud acid and 4,500 gallons of regular acid. Gas-oil ratio was 1,146-1. Top of pay is 2,943 feet. Location for the new oiler is 10 miles northwest of the town of Andrews and 1,988 feet from south and 1,982 feet from west lines of section 47, block 13, University survey.

Continental Drilling Deeper After DST In NE Jeff Davis

Continental Oil Company is drilling ahead below 9,287 feet in line after drillstem testing in the Ellenburger on its No. 1 Mrs. L. K. McCutcheon, wildcat in Northeast Jeff Davis County. The drillstem test was taken from 9,245 to 9,270 feet. Tool was open 45 minutes. There was a weak blow of air for seven minutes. Recovery was 100 feet of mud with no show. Top of the Ellenburger was called at 9,245 feet by samples. Elevation is 4,170 feet. Location is 811 feet from west and 1,239 feet from south lines of section 18, block 11, GH&A survey. That makes it 20 miles southeast of Balmorhea.

Angelo Lime Opener Finished In Garza Area

Duncan Drilling Company of Big Spring has completed its No. 1 John A. Davis as a pumping discovery from the San Angelo lime in Central-East Garza County. The well was finished for a daily pumping potential of 22.14 barrels of 39-gravity oil. Production was from open hole between 773 feet, where 3 1/2-in. casing was cemented and the total depth of 2,825 feet. Top of pay was picked at 2,741 feet. The pay zone was acidized with 4,500 gallons. Location of the new opener is 330 feet from north and west lines of the northeast quarter of section 80, block 5, GH&HR survey. That makes it 12 miles east of Post.

SHE'S BACK IN THE MOVIES AGAIN— Mrs. Bergen Tired Of Fame As Charlie McCarthy's Mom

HOLLYWOOD—(AP)—I think in these times a woman likes to feel useful. She doesn't want merely to have everything handed to her by her husband. If her children are in school and she can afford to hire help, it's natural that she wants to get out and do things on her own.

This was the explanation Mrs. Edgar Bergen gave for doing her first film role. Under her professional name, Frances Westcott, she is portraying Mrs. John Jacob Astor in the film about the Titanic disaster.

No Laughing Matter
But Mrs. Bergen admitted there was another reason. She's tired of living under the shadow of that wooden-headed Charlie McCarthy. To her, it's no laughing matter.

"I'm not knocking Charlie, because goodness knows he has helped support the Bergen family in fine style," she said. "But I am a little tired of being referred to as Charlie McCarthy's mother. I want an identity of my own."

Mrs. Bergen explained the extent of her frustration. Recently she joined an entertainment troupe which toured Army camps. She appeared as Frances Westcott, and no

mention was made of her relationship to Messrs. McCarthy and Snerd.

Recalls One Triumph
"But invariably one or more soldiers would come backstage and say something like 'How does it feel to be Charlie McCarthy's mother?'" she sighed.

She recalled with relish her one triumph over the fame of her husband and his dummies. That was when they were in Birmingham, Ala.

"As we stepped off the plane, a reporter from the Birmingham News came up to me and started interviewing me," she related. "Edgar couldn't imagine what was happening until the reporter explained that I was a Birmingham girl and he was more interested in me than Edgar."

Charlie's Own Room
I asked about home life with McCarthy, and Mrs. Bergen explained that Charlie no longer resides with them. He now remains in his suitcase in Bergen's office between performances. The office is handler to the radio studios. Besides, Charlie had to leave the house to make room for the Bergens' daughter Candy.

Previously, McCarthy ruled his own room in the Bergen manse. He

had furniture made to his size and stored his fabulous wardrobe in capacious closets. "If I had as many outfits as Charlie, I'd be the best-dressed woman in the world," observed Mrs. Bergen.

Even though Charlie no longer lives with them, his presence is strongly felt by the Bergens. Bergen himself always talks of Charlie as though he were a real person. The illusion also is felt by his wife.

Candy Not Feared
"Of course, I don't think of him as real, as many of his fans do," she remarked. "But it's a strange thing—although I have seen Edgar perform with Charlie hundreds of times in all parts of the country, I still watch Charlie when he is talking. It just seems natural that the voice is coming from the dummy."

Oddly enough, the only Bergen who isn't taken in at all by the ventriloquism is five-year-old Candy. "I guess it's because she has been around Charlie all her life," said Mrs. Bergen. "But whenever she hears Charlie on the radio, she says, 'That's Daddy doing that.'"

The dead were Robert Claude Hargrove, nine, and Robert Ward Fowler, eight, both of Shreveport. La. Mrs. Robert Hargrove, 32, mother of Robert Claude, was hospitalized with possible arm and leg fractures.

Neither Mrs. Hargrove's husband nor the driver of the truck, Lee Owens Deaton of Rusk, was injured seriously.

It was raining at this East Texas community south of Tyler at the time of the mishap.

The Fowler child was a friend of the Hargrove boy.

Rain Soaks Deep Into Soil; Bonanza For Winter Grains

FORT WORTH —(AP)— Texas rains are "the nearest thing to a drouth-buster in 30 months."

They've fallen slowly, gently, seeping deep into millions of dry and cracked acres of pasture and crop land.

That's the way Louis F. Merrill, regional director of the Soil Conservation Service, looks at the rains that began Saturday, spread over the state the next two days and continued Tuesday.

But he also sees the drouth standing aside and waiting for a chance to crack down again—if no more rain falls in the next month, or if dry winds suck the moisture out of the land in the next few days. He

sees the danger that a freeze in the next 10 days might nip winter grains and legumes sprouted by the rains.

No Runoff
Merrill said his reports still were few, incomplete and the rains to be variable to draw a conclusive picture of the results. He summed up what he knows this way:

"Falling as it has and coming at this time and where the rain amounted to an inch or better, the rap has done tremendous good. And where more than two inches has fallen, it's the nearest thing to a drouth-buster in 30 months."

"That's how long 'the worst drouth by all odds in the state's history' has been with Texas."

"There has been practically no runoff from these rains," Merrill said. "In one area which got five

inches of rain, there was no runoff at all."

"That's very unusual. But the soil was so dry and the rain fell so slowly that the moisture just settled down and stayed."

Penetrated Four Feet
"I wouldn't be surprised if water penetrated three or four feet," he said.

"This is not a drouth-buster, you understand, but it could very well be the prelude to one."

"This will bring up the winter grains and legumes and unless we have a freeze in the next 10 days or so they should make a crop."

"Still," Merrill said, "it will take more rain to replenish the sub-soil moisture and still more to maintain it."

"I'll put it this way: If we get another rain like this, or better yet two of them, falling as slowly, within the next month, it will really do the job."

Soaks In All Soil
Merrill said farmers and ranchers who didn't bother with preparing their soil for water conservation and got caught short were lucky this time.

"The other rains we've had," he said, "penetrated maybe 12 inches in prepared soil. But in other fields, with no preparation, the water sank to an eight inches or so and the rest was runoff."

"But these rains were so slow and steady that conservation measures or lack of them hasn't been so important, and almost all the rain has gone to soil moisture."

"The air has been humid and there's been little evaporation."

"But if a dry wind should blow up in the next few days, then we'd lose a lot of our gains."

Military members are Adm. John H. Hoover, Marine Maj. Gen. Merritt A. Edison, Air Force Maj. Gen. St. Clair Street and Army Maj. Gen. John B. Anderson, all retired.

French Infantrymen Prepare For All-Out Assault By Vietminh

WITH THE FRENCH FORCES—French Union Infantrymen dug in deeply Tuesday preparing for an all-out attack by Communist-led Vietminh troops on this dusty outpost—key to the mountainous Thai country of Northwest Indochina.

Except for minor patrol clashes, the defense perimeter around this isolated airstrip and barbed wire entanglement 117 miles west of Hanoi was quiet Monday night.

Both sides apparently were grabbing a last breather between Sunday night's initial clash and the decisive battle.

Indications were that the big fight may come Tuesday night.

The Vietminh made their first attempt on the Na San defenses in the brief Sunday battle in which some 3,000 rebel troops were repulsed.

If this bloody clash is any criterion, the Vietminh appear ready to sacrifice thousands of troops in an attempt to throw the French out of that country.

Maxwell To Enter Service Wednesday

DENTON—(AP)—Billy Maxwell, one of the all-time greats of Texas amateur golf, enters military service Wednesday.

He still has a year to go in North Texas State College, where he paced the golf team to three national collegiate titles.

He said he would return to North Texas State to get his degree, when he was discharged from the service.

Maxwell was National Amateur champion in 1951 and has won many other top golf tournaments over the country.

NLRB Takes First Action For Union's False Non-Red File

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The National Labor Relations Board said Tuesday it has imposed its first punishment for filing of a false non-Communist affidavit.

The board said it acted after Anthony Valentino, business manager for Local 80-A, Packinghouse Workers Union (CIO) was convicted of false filing in U. S. district court at Camden, N. J.

The punishments imposed, NLRB announced, were:

1. The local's name was stricken from the list of unions in compliance with the filing requirements of the Labor Management Relations Act. It thus lost the right to NLRB services in representation elections and unfair labor practice cases.

2. Steps were taken to revoke the collective bargaining certifications issued to five local unions representing more than 900 employees in Camden plants.

George Grimm Ranch Offers Pheasant For Thanksgiving

The George Grimm Ranch is only two and one-half acres in size but a lot of Midland Thanksgiving tables will be featuring its product on Thursday.

Grimm doesn't raise cattle on his ranch, but, instead, has a flock of the fattest, little pheasants which ever roamed the plains of West Texas.

They're called ranch-raised pheasants and they're the choicest breed of the ring-neck variety, practically hand-raised on the little tract of land northwest of the city.

Grimm, who lives at 204 Ridgeway Street, is a geophysicist for the Tide Water Associated Oil Company in Midland and he and his wife, Agnes, began raising the birds three years ago.

"I worked in Northern Louisiana before I came here," he explained, "and a friend of mine raised pheasants."

"When I came out here I decided to try it."

He started out with 50 birds but a gang of marauding dogs—or coyotes—practically wiped out his flock within a short time.

But the Grimms started over again and now have a flock of some 400 birds.

"We burn the tendon of one wing when they are small," explained Grimm, "and they are not able to fly away."

The pheasant ranch is licensed by the state and is the only game bird which can be so raised and sold on the market. The Grimms sell them alive or frozen and ready for the pan.

"They're easy to cook," explained Mrs. Grimm, "and we furnish a book of recipes, showing the various ways to prepare them."

Revenue Agents To Pamper Taxpayers' Tempers In '53

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Internal Revenue Bureau has instructed its field offices to make things easier for taxpayers when tax-paying time comes around next year. Outlining a new program to go into effect from January 1 to March 17, Assistant Commissioner of Internal Revenue Justin Winkie told field officers in a letter made public Tuesday that taxpayers must find a "new and improved service" this time.

Winkie emphasized that by tax time an eight-month reorganization of the bureau will have been completed, and taxpayers seeking help with their returns will have "their first real opportunity to observe how reorganization affects them personally."

- Easier To Pay**
1. Tax officials not only expect to give better service but they expect more work. There were some 54 million tax returns last year and the bureau expects from 57 to 58 million this year.
 2. Winkie made these down-to-earth suggestions on how tax offices should help simplify things for taxpayers:
 1. Don't close the door in the face of taxpayers just because official office hours are over.
 2. Man telephones to answer queries in the evenings, during lunch hours and on Saturdays. All offices to stay open until midnight the last night before returns are due.
 3. Use Female Agents.
 3. Put out some chairs and benches for those who have been standing in line and make sure there are chairs for all the aged and infirm.
 4. Monitors should be on hand to question puzzled taxpayers before they join a queue and to divide them into lines for different categories of information, so that no one waits in line only to learn his question is being answered elsewhere.
 5. As nearly as possible, personnel assigned to information booths and as monitors should be "female revenue agents" and they should be rotated frequently to avoid the risk of normal irritation stemming from having to answer similar questions over and over again.

Nation's Crude Oil Production Jumps

SA—(AP)—Daily average domestic crude oil production jumped 16,175 barrels during the week ended November 22 to a record 6,653,300, the Oil and Gas Journal said Tuesday.

The week's output, featuring a 10,800-barrel jump by Kansas to 352,100 brought the Journal's figures on cumulative 1952 production to 2,031,989,425 barrels, compared to 2,009,433,400 barrels a year ago.

Other sizeable gains included Arkansas, up 2,050 barrels to 77,700; Louisiana 1,350 to 677,800; Oklahoma 1,200 to 337,900; New Mexico was down 100 to 173,025.

Production was unchanged in Texas 3,094,975.

POST CARDS ARE CHEAPER

ST. LOUIS—(AP)—Circuit Judge W. C. Mayfield reported an expenditure of just three cents in filing his report of "campaign" expenditures with the circuit clerk in the recent general election.

The money, said Judge Mayfield, purchased a stamp for the letter in which he notified the secretary of State he wished his name on the ballot.

New Iraq Regime Rounds Up Leftist Political Leaders

BAGHDAD IRAQ—(AP)—Iraq's new blood-spattered government rounded up political leaders Tuesday, promised sweeping reforms to placate the mob and threatened curfew violators with heavy jail penalties.

The strategic oil producing country's military premier, Gen. Mahmud Nur Ali, earlier had ordered all political parties dissolved and 12 newspapers shut down. Nur Ali Din was called to office by Regent Abdul Ilah after 11 persons were killed and 50 wounded in weekend riots.

Many politicians fled from the Army and police roundup. At least six already were in jail.

Leftist demands for direct parliamentary method of indirect balloting had caused the former government of Premier Al Umari to resign and tumbled off the violence Saturday and Sunday.

Glasscock Rites Set For Veteran Minister's Widow

GARDEN CITY—(AP)—Funeral services for Mrs. Minnie Heath, about 80, widow of the Rev. J. O. Heath, long-time Glasscock County Baptist minister, are to be held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in the First Baptist Church. Interment will be here beside the grave of her husband.

Mrs. Heath died Sunday at Corpus Christi, where she had been a resident the last 10 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Heath came to Garden City first about 40 years ago. He left for a time and then returned to serve as pastor of the Baptist church 15 years.

Survivors include seven sons.

McAllen Man Heads Texas City Managers

EL PASO—(AP)—William L. Schupp of McAllen has been elected new president of the Texas City Managers Association, and Herbert W. Whitney of Big Spring has been elected vice president.

Also named Monday were four regional directors: N. V. Moss, Amarillo; Jack Broad, Brownwood; W. C. DeCordova, Livingston; and Walter Sedholm, Austin.

C. A. Harell of San Antonio, A. Meredith of Boxer, and V. C. Thompson of Wilaco were appointed to a committee to study retirement systems of Texas cities.

Churchill Shuffles Cabinet Members, Creates New Post

LONDON—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill ran in a flock of substitutes in his Conservative government team Tuesday in an unexpected shift of two present Cabinet ministers and several lesser bureaucrats. He also increased the number of Cabinet ministers from 15 to 16.

The top changes included:

- Lord Salisbury, present secretary of state for Commonwealth relations, to be lord president of the Council, replacing ailing Lord Woolton. Woolton remains in the Cabinet, however. He was given the post of chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, a kind of ministry without portfolio, and the job was raised to Cabinet rank—making him the sixteenth member.
- Lord Swinton, now chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and minister of materials, succeeds Lord Salisbury as Commonwealth relations chief and thus joins the cabinet.
- Lord Woolton's serious illness was believed to be the chief reason for the changes.

San Antonio School Board Faces Double Segregation Suits

SAN ANTONIO—(AP)—Officials of San Antonio public schools and the Community College Tuesday faced two injunction suits seeking to break segregation barriers.

The petitions were filed Monday in two district courts here on behalf of four high school students and four college-age youths.

The suits ask the courts to issue permanent injunctions to keep Supt. Thomas B. Portwood and the San Antonio Board of Education and President J. O. Loftin and trustees of the Union Junior College District from denying the plaintiffs enrollment because of race or color.

Hearings in both cases were set for 9:30 a.m. January 19 by Judge C. K. Quinn.

Harry M. Bellinger, counsel for the plaintiffs, said courses offered at Wheatley High School for Negroes and at St. Philip's College for Negroes "most certainly are not equal."

Texas Woman, 71, Trucks Own Sheep To Chicago Show

CHICAGO—(AP)—A 71-year-old Texas woman, dressed in cowboy attire, arrived in Chicago Monday with 15 Hampshire sheep which she hopes will win a championship at the International Livestock exposition.

"Hope to take home a championship," Mrs. Ammie E. Wilson of Plano, Texas, said at the International Amphitheater at the stock yards, where the exposition opens Saturday for eight days.

"Age doesn't mean a thing if you feel good and keep busy," the grey and smiling Mrs. Wilson said. "Rode all the way up here in a truck with my shepherd, Bill Ralston, and the sheep, and I feel fine."

Sheep raising is her hobby. She took it up in 1941 "to keep my mind busy" after the death of her son.

Jap War Criminal Tells Of Executing Provoo's Captain

NEW YORK—(AP)—A Japanese war criminal, testifying at the federal treason trial of John David Provoo, says he will never forget the face of a captive American officer he executed.

The Japanese witness, Seitaro Fujita, was called back for more cross examination Tuesday in the federal court trial of Provoo, charged with war-time treason.

Fujita testified Monday that he and a Japanese officer executed American Capt. Burton C. Thomson, Sweeney City, Iowa, whom Provoo is accused of betraying.

Provoo, 35, and Thomson were captured when Corregidor fell. The government alleges Provoo went over to the Japanese.

Under cross examination, Fujita gravely said through an interpreter: "This is the first time and certainly the last that I ever executed anyone. Therefore, could I possibly ever forget the face of the man I had to execute? I shall never forget that face."

Fujita, serving a 30-year war crime sentence for the slaying of Thomson, said the American officer's execution was ordered after Provoo reported the captain had a "rather rebellious attitude."

The witness said a few days after the execution he gave Provoo the details and that the defendant asserted: "Very well. If there are any more bad men I will tell you about them."

Crash Proves Fatal To Midlander's Kin

FORT WORTH—Mrs. Noble Read, 66, of Coahoma, mother of Sue Read of Midland, died at 3 p.m. Monday in a Cisco hospital, the second victim of a two-car collision near Cisco on U. S. Highway 80 Sunday.

Mrs. Read's husband, also hurt, was removed from the critical list at the hospital Monday.

Survivors include another daughter, three sons, three brothers, and four sisters.

Mayor Charges Telephone Lobby At Municipal Meet

DALLAS—(AP)—The annual convention of the League of Texas Municipalities moved into its second day Tuesday in the wake of charges that Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is lobbying at the meet.

Monday Mayor Harold Schmitzer of Denton accused the 'phone firm of trying to lobby the league into favoring a state-wide commission to regulate utility rates.

"It's the first time I've seen Southwestern Bell people around at one of these meet'gs," Schmitzer told 73 members of the Texas City Managers Association meeting in connection with the league's three-day convale.

"It means they're trying to lobby for a resolution from the league for the State Legislature to set up a state commission to regulate utility rates," Schmitzer added.

His charges were followed by a statement from C. C. Crutchefield of Austin, field consultant for the League, that it's not long until such state commissions "represent the utilities instead of the people."

But W. L. Prehn of Dallas, general manager for Texas of Southwestern Bell, said, "I don't know what he Schmitzer is talking about."

Schmitzer told his audience "everyone of you should oppose any move for a resolution in favor of a state utility commission."

About 225 city officials from over Texas are attending the meeting. Earlier, Mayor Armistead Rust of San Angelo called on the league to ask immediate state authority to control use of water from diminishing underground water tables.

Thirteenth Former Top Czech Commie Confesses Treason

VIENNA—(AP)—Karel Svab, thirteenth former top Communist to confess before a Prague court in the current Czech purge trial, admitted Tuesday that as former deputy security minister he "covered up" for an anti-Moscow conspiracy.

Svab is one of the three non-Jews among the 14 Reds on trial for plotting to overthrow the government of President Klement Gottwald.

Only one defendant—former Deputy Defense Minister Bedrich Reicin—remained to be heard as the trial of former Communist Party boss Rudolf Slansky and his associates neared its end.

Radio Prague said Svab, 48, admitted he "was a member of the 'Titoist type' conspiratorial group led by Slansky."

Western charges that the trial has strong anti-Semitic overtones drew comment from the Communist newspaper Rude Pravo.

The paper indicated Communist organizers of the trial were attempting to prove that all Jewish capitalists were "Zionists, traitors and anti-Semites" while the average Jewish worker was anti-Zionist.

Doomed Atom Spies Continue Court Fight

NEW YORK—(AP)—Atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg get a hearing Wednesday on their motion to have their convictions thrown out.

Federal Judge Edward Weinfeld set the hearing Monday after turning down their request for a stay of execution.

The two are scheduled to die in Sing Sing Prison the week of January 12. They were convicted March 29, 1951, of giving atomic secrets to Russia during World War II.

"It was a shameful exhibition," opined Coach Tugboat Jones. And action of the Bulldogs themselves reflected the same feeling about the miserable showing in the Lubbock game.

The Bulldogs shut themselves off Monday afternoon in another of a series of player meetings. The gridironers were taking stock.

Before the 12,000 fans had filed out of Memorial Stadium Saturday afternoon, the Bulldogs lamented their failure to give all in the 48-0

humiliation. A majority admitted either openly or to themselves all-entirely, they produced little in halting the Westerner stampede.

Quarterback Larry Friday was one of the spokesmen as the uniforms stayed on and the Bulldogs grouped to confess shortcomings. Some sobbed. But the tears didn't wash away repeated mistakes.

Dad's comment Saturday night must not have been too complimentary. The Bulldogs huddled again Sunday in the field house to nurse their pains and think of the 10-year giant in Odessa. They asked to workout and the coaches per-

mitted limbering up exercises.

The up-and-down Bulldogs closed the doors again Monday before reporting to Jones and his aides. They realized Odessa offers the last opportunity for shedding the shackles of "shame"—shame from letting down the coaches, parents, fellow students, and loyal fans last Saturday afternoon.

Bodies Bruised, Too

The Midlanders were not only bruised in spirit but also in body by the fast-breaking Westerners. Nimble-footed Jesse Hatfield hobbled Tuesday from an injured ankle. Linebacker Terry Fuglaar had trouble

ble navigating, too. Whether the stout-hearted little warriors attain full-service status by Thursday remained in doubt Tuesday. Both became defensive demons against Lubbock while larger teammates played tag with the charging char-lots.

Inclement weather hampered training by the Bulldogs who have only Wednesday to prepare for Thursday's encounter with a favored and bitter enemy. Game time is 3 p.m.

The Bronchos hold a season record of seven wins and two defeats. Port Arthur, a South Texas school-boy power, turned back Odessa in the season opener, and Lubbock registered the only district setback by Odessaans. The Westerners scored on a first play pass for a 7 to 0 triumph.

Midland has not won over Odessa in 10 years. But in 20 games, the Bulldogs have notched nine victories compared to 11 for the neighboring city. Midland's last win was by 16 to 14 in 1940. The 20-year series started in 1929.

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Top District 8-AA Scorer Uses Versatility, Not Size

PECOS—You don't have to be big to be the leading scorer in District 8-AA, but if you're not big you have to be mighty fast and shifty.

Halfback Johnny Cook of the Pecos Eagles weighs less than 150 pounds, but he's used every pound this season to amass a total of 19 touchdowns and 114 points.

Foes of the Eagles who boast a 9-1 season record and a co-championship share with Seminole will long remember the spectacular runs by Cook this year.

The fleet flashback is a master of side-stepping, dazzling change of pace, and instant stop-and-go.

He's the same lad who scored only one touchdown in 1951, but this year he found himself on the gridiron and has compiled a 10-game record of 10-6 yards for every time he carried the ball. He toted the pigskin 89 times this season for a total of 940 yards rushing.

Strangely enough, one of Cook's poorest showings came in the Andrews game. Andrews, an 8-AA weak sister this year, held the Pecos speedster to an average of 7.4 yards on each of five carries. His highest per carry average came November 21 against one of the Eagles' toughest opponents, the Monahans Lobos.

Against Monahans, Cook carried nine times for 163 yards, or an average of 18.1 yards per try. In the same game, he scored all three touchdowns in the Pecos 21-9 victory on runs of 64, 62 and 62 yards. He also outkicked the Monahans defenders for an 82-yard touchdown

gallop from scrimmage, but the score was nullified as Pecos drew a clipping penalty.

Cook has actually scored a total of 238 points this year, although four of his touchdowns—all made the hard way—were called back as the Eagles drew penalties. Two of his scores were nullified in the Ozonia game, one in the McCamey game and the other in the Monahans affair.

Against the Seminole Indians, who handed the Eagles their only loss, Cook carried seven times for 44 yards and in addition snagged five of Quarterback Orlando Gutierrez' passes for another 49 yards.

Eleven points behind Cook in District 8-AA scoring is Jackie Sparks of Seminole, who has scored 16 touchdowns and kicked seven extra points for 163 points during season play.

Next in line is Kermit's Don Handlin with 48 points.

"In Southern California, we'll be playing the best West Coast team since the bowl pact was started. We'll be the underdog and rightfully so."

In Los Angeles, Southern Cal Coach Jess Hill said:

"I am very happy with the choice of Wisconsin because from all I've heard they are certainly the strongest team in the Big Ten."

Michigan State Again Tops Poll; Maryland Skids

NEW YORK—(AP)—Michigan State's undefeated football powerhouse, which closed out its season with a whopping 62-13 victory over Marquette Saturday, was voted the nation's No. 1 football team Tuesday for the seventh straight week.

Southern California and Georgia Tech, also unbeaten, were second and third in The Associated Press weekly poll of the nation's sports writers and sportscasters. The tenth and final poll will be conducted next week.

The Weather Bureau said that as the cold front left the Panhandle, snow would cease and skies clear. Clearing and colder weather was predicted Tuesday night for the whole state.

Port Arthur's twisted uprooted trees, felled several power poles, tore off awnings and knocked small buildings awry, but total damage was reported light.

Rain Tapers Off—The only places still reporting rain Tuesday were Texarkana, Houston, Galveston, Beaumont and Lufkin.

The Weather Bureau said the northerly gusty winds would dry out some of the moisture left in the soil by two days of general rain—but not much.

The new cold wave reached to Houston, near the Gulf Coast, by late Tuesday morning, dropping the temperature from 71 degrees to 57 in 10 minutes. A low of 44 was predicted for Houston Tuesday.

Reports of totals from the fading rainfall continued to come in from happy farm centers.

Sherman 4.60 Inches—Sherman reported 4.60 inches since noon Saturday and 2.61 inches in the 24-hour period ended at 7 a. m. Tuesday. A 24-hour total of 1.49 inches fell at Corsicana, which already had received heavy rain. Bonham reported 3.65 inches of rain since Sunday.

Quanah, in Northwest Texas, reported 1.1 inches of rain. A drizzle turned to slushy sleet Tuesday morning.

Marshall added up 1.82 inches of rain in 24 hours, and Midland reported a fall of 75 inch. Electric clearing and colder weather was predicted Tuesday night for the whole state.

The rains piled up past 450 inches in the Dallas area.

Tuesday night temperatures were expected to range from around 40 degrees in South Texas to the 10 predicted for Amarillo.

Lakes Grow—Rangeland and cotton country, timber and heat, city reservoirs and stock tanks—all had been clipped by the vanishing rains.

Lake Dallas, the water-short reservoir for the City of Dallas, gained three inches—a four-day supply—and still was rising although city officials said there was little runoff into the big lake.

In Fort Worth, John I. Taylor of the Corps of Army Engineers said the reservoir behind Whitney Dam—between Hill and Bosque Counties—had risen 3.2 feet by Monday afternoon. More than six inches of rain had fallen in Hill County up to a late hour Monday.

Good rains fell in the Texas "H" Country," the first since the damaging floods of September. Dry Del Rio had 1.4 inch Monday night but hoped for more.

Dies To Fight For Former Committee Post Despite Opposition Of Rayburn

JASPER —P— If Martin Dies is not placed on his old House Committee on Un-American Activities, he may try to form his own investigating group.

He said Monday night the new body would "sweep Socialists, moral perverts and crafters" out of the national government along with Communists.

Dies, a Democrat, said he felt any such new committee would receive

bi-partisan support and that he didn't see how President-Elect Eisenhower "could resist" supporting such a group.

He made his statements to the Associated Press in a telephone interview after saying Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.) didn't think Dies "has any constructive contribution to make to the committee's work."

Ready For Fight

Dies was elected congressman-at-large from Texas after campaigning chiefly on his work in the Un-American Activities group from 1938 to 1945 when he was chairman of the House group.

Walter will be the ranking Democrat on the committee in the 83rd Congress, but Dies angrily said, "If it takes a fight I'm ready for a fight with Mr. Walter and the rest of them."

He added he might try to form the new group if he finds the present committee "isn't cleaning up the mess in Washington," adding he didn't care who cleaned it up just so it's cleaned up.

Dies also said Rep. Sam Rayburn, due to be House minority leader, recently said that he (Rayburn) would do everything he could to oppose Dies' assignment to the investigating committee now existing.

Action Not Surprising

"They're getting awfully scared," the big East Texan said.

Dies called Walter "one of the group of 'pseudo liberals' who fought us all the way" when Dies was heading the investigating committee and said, "It's not surprising he says things like this."

The Congressman-elect said he would want his new committee to investigate anybody suspected of being unfit for governmental service whether elected or appointed.

He said such probes might include "the financial affairs of people who have prospered in government in the last 10 or 12 years."

To Probe Texans

He said that might include some "Texas people who started out to my knowledge 10 or 15 years ago without a dollar and are reputed to be wealthy now." He didn't mention names.

Dies said, "Socialism is the same as Communism in theory."

"Socialists don't believe in our economic system and I think it would be well to enlarge investigations to include Socialists," Dies said.

"I want to fix once and for all the responsibility for our appeasement of the Communists," he added.

"But there are some who don't want the skeletons to be brought out of the closets."

Body Of Monahans Soldier Returned

MONAHANS—The body of 2nd Lt. Howard G. Arlington, son of Homer L. Arlington of Monahans, is among those of 235 Americans who lost their lives as a result of the fighting in Korea, being returned to the United States aboard the Harvard Victory, the Department of Defense has announced.

The ship was expected to arrive at the San Francisco Port of Embarkation Tuesday.

The Air Force announcement did not identify the enemy. Presumably it referred to the Communists.

An Air Force officer said the secret information was contained in films of the souped-up F-86-e jet fighter, which had racked up an 8-1 victory margin over Russian-made MIG-15's in Korean air battles.

Cascio, 34, was a photographic laboratory technician with the 49th Air Base Group.

If convicted, he could be sentenced to life imprisonment. No date or place for his court martial trial has been set.

In Tucson, Ariz., Cascio's 44-year-old wife declared, "Anyone who does anything to undermine his nation deserves whatever happens to him."

"This thing has just made me sick. We never got along. We were divorced once and I foolishly married him again."

India Invites Ike To Visit Country

NEW DELHI, INDIA — (P) — "Strong recommendations" have been sent to U. S. President-elect Eisenhower that he visit India enroute home from Korea, it was learned here Tuesday.

These recommendations, from a high diplomatic level, argued that such a visit would end apprehensions among the Indians that the Republican victory foreshadowed a change in U. S. policy toward this country.

Benson To Encourage Farm Market Growth, Co-Op Idea

WASHINGTON—(P)—The Eisenhower Administration is expected to build its farm aid programs largely around efforts to broaden markets at home and abroad.

This became apparent Tuesday with President-elect Eisenhower's selection of Ezra T. Benson of Salt Lake City to be secretary of Agriculture to succeed Charles F. Brannan, a controversial figure in the Truman official family.

Benson is a trained specialist in agricultural marketing, and as such believes farmers would need less federal aid if they did a better job of marketing their products.

Benson's designation fits into a long-standing Republican contention that farm programs of the Roosevelt-Truman Administrations depended too heavily upon production controls and subsidies to hold up farm prices.

Republicans have promised to continue farm price support programs, but they argue that need for them would be greatly lessened if new markets and outlets for farm

surpluses could be developed.

Benson said in New York Monday he agreed with Eisenhower's farm policy statements and the GOP Party platform on the subject, but he declined to discuss specific programs except to say he favored some price supports.

Eisenhower pulled something of a surprise on farm leaders in selecting Benson, who had not been mentioned prominently for the post.

Benson headed one of the major national organizations—the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives—between 1939 and 1944, but that was at a time when agriculture was faced more with the problem of producing enough for war needs rather than a problem of overproduction.

Four Major Points

He left the cooperative council post in 1944 to become an apostle for the Mormon church.

The new secretary is expected to:

1. Place great emphasis on use of the cooperative idea in attacking farm problems of production and

2. Urge farmers to follow a practice of depending more on local self-help and less on federal aid.
3. Place special emphasis upon measures aimed at showing farmers how to become more efficient producers and marketers.
4. Make greater use of state-controlled agricultural extension services than have his New Deal and "Fair Deal" predecessors.

New Influx Of Soviet Arms Aids Reds Fighting French

WASHINGTON—(AP)—State and Defense Department experts say Russia-made war supplies are pouring into Indochina over a transcontinental Red railway system protected from Allied air attack because it cuts through China.

Officials said this gives new striking power to Communist forces in Indochina, and presents a new threat to Burma and Thailand.

Informants said evidence that the Vietnamese Communists were receiving

Russian supplies was found in a recent raid by French and native defense forces on a Communist supply center.

Allied raiders captured 25 tons of Russian-made mortar shells and four Russian "Molotov" trucks with gasoline engines, among other items.

More Mobile Force

The presence of these two and one-half-ton trucks at the Vietnamese base of operations means that Red forces in Indochina now must be regarded as far more mobile than ever and thus creates a new degree of danger for all Southeast Asia, officials said.

These informants declared that Phu-tho, where the captured war materials were concentrated, is around 400 miles from the Burma border and about 350 miles from the Thai border.

In the past many other types of weapons and ammunition also were captured, including supplies of French, American, British and Japanese manufacture, as well as Chinese materials.

Trucks Pose Enigma

But interest here centered on the four Russian trucks because of their possible strategic significance. The fact that they are in Indochina at all, responsible authorities said, means that the Red railway line and Indochinese supply routes are functioning against all obstacles.

The last link of the rail line from the Chinese supply center of Nanning in Kwangsi Province, China, to Chen-kuan on the China-Indochina border, a distance of 120 miles, was completed in October, 1951. It was estimated to be capable of carrying many thousands of tons per month to Indochinese Red forces.

But Allied leaders figured that any haulage of more than 80 miles from the rail terminal to various Vietminh supply centers would be highly vulnerable to air attack. The French have uncontested use of the air.

Into Red Triangle

When Allied leaders learned that Red supplies were piling up despite repeated air raids, a large-scale reconnaissance in force, complete with artillery and paratroopers, was ordered a few weeks ago to smash the latest Red operation center in the triangle formed by the towns Phu-tho, Tuyen Qiang and Yen Bay.

It was regarded as a highly successful operation when results were analyzed and captured material totaled up a week ago.

Officials here professed to be pleased by the maneuver as they were distressed by the evidence it provided of the flow of Russian supplies all the way across Central Asia, Siberia and China to Indochina.

"The visit by the larger group may mean that Shreveport plans to pattern some of its proposed new school buildings after our new buildings," Monroe stated.

He said arrangements will be made to entertain the visitors while they are in Midland.

Midland Baptists To Attend Lubbock Training Convention

The largest church meeting of its kind in the world opens Thursday at Lubbock, when the Baptist Training Union Convention of Texas meets in a three-day meeting.

The Rev. Vernon Yearby of Midland's First Baptist Church will play a part in the important Baptist gathering. He has been named as a member of the nominating committee for new officers in 1953.

Hotels in Lubbock already are filled up with reservations from people planning to attend the meeting, and 2,000 private homes have been made available to handle the influx of Baptists for the convention.

Also attending from the First Baptist Church will be J. Q. Woodard, general director of the church's local training union; and three associates, Joe Harris, Ann Upham, and Mrs. Lloyd Waldron.

Other speakers include Camie Jay of the Andros Islands, the Rev. Ray Rosell, Broadway Baptist Church, Fort Worth, and Dr. T. L. Holcomb, executive secretary of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

A large part of the three-day meeting will concern planning of Baptist Training Union work for the first three months of 1953.

The Calvary Baptist Church in Midland will be unable to send an official delegation to the BTU session in Lubbock, due to the planned revival meeting that will be held here at the same time.

Several other Baptist Churches contacted in Midland reported that they would not be represented officially at the gathering of Baptists in Lubbock.

But an estimated 30 to 40 Baptists from Midland are planning to attend the Baptist Convention.

The convention dates back to 1890 when the first session was held. Now in its sixty-second year, it ranks as one of the oldest church conventions in Texas.

Fort Worth is expected to make a strong bid at the Lubbock meeting for its selection as the site for the 1953 session. The convention had its most recent Fort Worth meeting in 1941.

Officers at the Baptist Convention in Lubbock include the Rev. Sterling Price, Abilene, convention president; Sam Allen, Plainview, music director; and the Rev. T. C. Gardner, Dallas, state director.

The Baptist Training Union has 298,412 members in churches affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Texas, a gain of 24,307 over last year.

There are approximately 700,000 daily Bible readers enlisted in the BTU program.

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA—(AP)—Because he was giving an oyster supper for the chairman of the licensing court, Graham Ward went to the trouble of having some special oysters flown in from a coast town 60 miles away.

While eating Ward felt something hard in his mouth. Sure enough it was a pearl, a quarter-inch in diameter which experts later assessed as being of considerable value.

Although the regular schedule for the Pony Express took 10 days from St. Joseph, Mo., to the Pacific Coast, the record run was made in seven days and 17 hours.

WACO—(AP)—Lt. (jg) Robert Stockwell of East Aurora, N. Y., was five feet 11 inches tall before he was injured critically in a bus wreck August 4. Now he's five feet and 10 and his knees are out of line.

Stockwell, a Naval Reserve pilot, is a survivor of a collision of two Greyhound buses in which 28 persons were killed. He was burned critically; his left thigh and lower right leg were broken.

Doctors discovered the broken thigh would make Stockwell's left leg an inch and a half shorter. They made up the difference at the other break, shortening his right leg an inch and a half below the knee.

Now Stockwell's legs are the same length—but his knees are uneven. He is still in a hospital here.

"I don't look so hot in a swimming suit," he said. "But the doctors say I won't limp either. And I can always charge a quarter for people to look at my knees."

Orderly Transfer Of Reins

On June 2, President Truman pinned a medal on General Eisenhower as the general doffed his uniform to enter the political lists.

Truman, stung by steady criticism, lashed out violently. He drew the campaign down to the lowest level in many years.

Since then, however, the President has regained his sense of responsibility. He is bent on assuring an orderly transition from his administration to Eisenhower's on January 20.

Fortunately for the nation, President-elect Eisenhower likewise is determined that no personal rancor shall affect the security and well being of the American people. He, too, is eager to achieve a smooth transfer of authority.

In that spirit, the two men met at the White House in an historic session. It was historic because in previous critical periods—most recently in the great depression—there was no such cooperative attitude.

The free world and the Communist lands alike should take full note of this event, and the cooperative arrangements that developed out of it.

Before the two men met, Eisenhower had made clear his cooperation could be only for informational purposes, since legally he has no power to act as President until January.

The recent flurry of accidents on the famed New Jersey Turnpike has caused the customary shaking of heads among those who styled this highway a "dream road."

The pike is a smooth, black ribbon for 118 miles, unbroken by stoplights, grade crossings and frequent roadside entry points.

It seems almost incredible that in two days there could have been 60 passenger cars involved in a series of accidents.

Actually, the surprise ought not to be so great. No road in this world is safe against the human factor.

In this instance, dozens of motorists were driving in thick fog—and driving too fast for conditions of visibility.

While public officials, highway engineers, safety specialists and others point with mounting alarm to increased motor traffic and increased traffic fatalities, no really comprehensive solutions are being formulated.

Billions are being spent yearly to improve and add to the nation's highway system. But we are not even keeping up.

The motor makers are, of course, aware that if matters don't get better soon, the appeal of the automobile as a device for getting places may fade.

NEW YORK—(NEA)—From the outside, Harry Newman's taxi cab has nothing to distinguish it from thousands of others roaming the streets of New York.

But once you settle yourself in the seat, you soon find that Harry's hack has all the elements of a traveling tearoom and first aid station. If you look a bit tired, perhaps from a hangover, Harry is quick to offer an aspirin. If you're warm and thirsty, there's an ample supply of cold soft drinks. If you're cold and thirsty, you have a choice of coffee, tea and hot chocolate, complete with sugar and cream.

Also on hand are cigarettes, bandages and eyewash. All are free for the asking.

Harry explains that he likes to have his fares feel at home. He's been stocking his comfort supplies for two years now, ever since he caught a cold and began to chew

cough drops. Every time a passenger turned up who also had a cold, the genial cabbie would offer him one of the cough drops.

"I got a lot of nice comments about it," he recalls. "So the next Summer I began to carry iced tea in a gallon thermos jug. People got a big kick out of the idea and so did I. When the weather got too cool for iced tea, I put hot water in the thermos jug for making coffee, tea and chocolate."

The thermos jug was replaced last Summer by a small ice box. The box rests beside Harry on the front seat, just under the meter.

Donates Blood
In hot weather, he kept the box filled with four or five cases of soda. At least two cases were used up daily.

AP Newsfeatures

Your personal Christmas cards can be conversation pieces—if you make them yourself.

One interesting idea is the photograph. It is a simple and easy method of presenting your own artistic talent to those you wish to greet.

Here's how it is done:

Arrange paper cut-outs or objects representing the Christmas card design you want on a piece of special photographic printing paper (Vellite). Expose the design-plus-printing-paper to strong light. Remove the overlay design, develop and dry the photographic print—and there is your photograph in dramatic black and white, ready for mounting on gay red or green drawing paper.

You don't have to be a photographer expert to create a successful photograph. The paper can be bought in 25-sheet packages with instructions. If the paper is removed from its lightproof envelope one sheet at a time, you can arrange your Christmas card design on it in ordinary room light.

When you plan your design remember these pointers:

An opaque paper cut-out design like a Christmas tree or a snowman or a big star or snowflake will work out especially well because the cut-out can be laid flat in direct contact with the paper. The part of the design which keeps the light from striking the paper fill then turn out pure white in your photograph and the cut-out part will be deep black. An actual object like a sprig of holly or a small candle can be used providing the object lies flat enough so that its basic outline will be transferred to the paper.

Spell Out Greetings
Small alphabet letters arranged in anagram fashion to spell out "Merry Christmas" or "Greetings" or "Noel" are also a part of the design to be reproduced in your photograph. You can buy sets of the letters at your dime store or just cut the ones you need from a magazine, making sure they match each other in size and style.

You may want to include your name or a silhouette of yourself as a personal note. For speedy production it is best to keep the design simple.

A short-cut in making the overlay design could be achieved by making an easy-to-use stencil by gluing your cut-outs and letters onto a piece of transparent cellulose sheeting the same size as your card. This way you won't need to arrange the design over again for each photograph.

After the design or stencil is set on the paper, you are ready to turn on a strong light to expose

the paper and transfer the design. This light should be held about 18 inches directly above the center of your card. Turn on the light and count out a ten-second exposure—"one chimpanzee, two chimpanzees, three chimpanzees..." and so on up to ten chimpanzees. This is just about the right timing. Snap off the light and the sheet of paper is ready for a dip in developer to bring out the exposed photograph in black and white. (If you use a No. 1 photoflood lamp as your strong light, exposure time may be reduced to four seconds.)

Buy Tri-Chem Pack

The materials needed for developer are available in a tiny tri-chem pack. Small pans for the solution and newspapers to place under them as protection for floor or table are needed. Bath tub or sink will serve for final washing of each newly-developed photograph. Expose another sheet of paper with the design overlay to make the next photograph while you are washing one.

It's a good idea to let the photographs dry overnight before mounting them with rubber cement to the card folders or backing-with-border you cut from Yuletide-colored drawing paper. Tuck the finished cards inside a heavy book to make the mounting secure and eliminate any curling or wrinkling. Dress up your photograph with decorative cord or ribbon, if you like. JACOBY ON BRIDGE

When today's hand was played in a recent rubber bridge game, declarer looked like a bridge expert right up until he played the first card from dummy. After that he looked like a man who had just tossed away an unbeatable game.

West opened the king of clubs, and declarer made the mistake of— I probably don't have to tell you. You've undoubtedly seen the right play and the wrong play (only two are possible). If you haven't thought about it, give it a moment or two now before you read on.

Declarer made the mistake of playing dummy's ace of clubs at once. He then drew two rounds of trumps, cashed the ace of diamonds, and finessed the diamonds around to West's queen. West could see only one way to defeat the contract, and he tried for it without hesitation. He led a low club instead of trying to cash his queen.

This play is not as difficult as it looks, inasmuch as East had signalled at the first trick by playing his jack of clubs. East was able to

win this second round of clubs with the nine. After his spade return defeated the contract.

South should have seen without any difficulty that the contract depended on keeping East out of the lead. The correct play was to let West hold the first trick with his king of clubs. After that, the contract cannot be defeated.

If West continues with another club, dummy wins, and declarer draws trumps. The diamond finesse is taken towards West for reasons of safety, and West takes the second defensive trick with the queen of diamonds.

Now, however, he cannot get the lead to his partner, and therefore cannot win two spade tricks. If West leads spades, South must win a trick with the king, and if West leads anything but spades, declarer can easily discard one of his losing clubs on dummy's extra diamond.

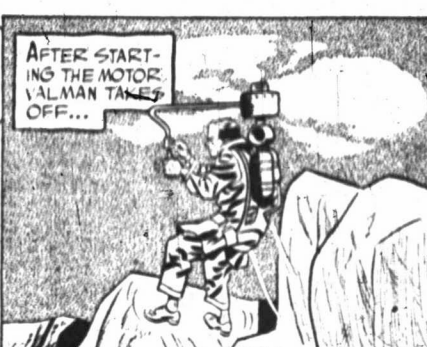

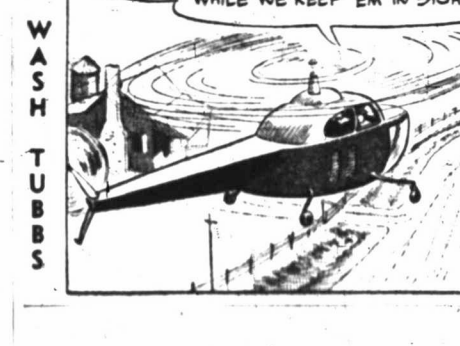

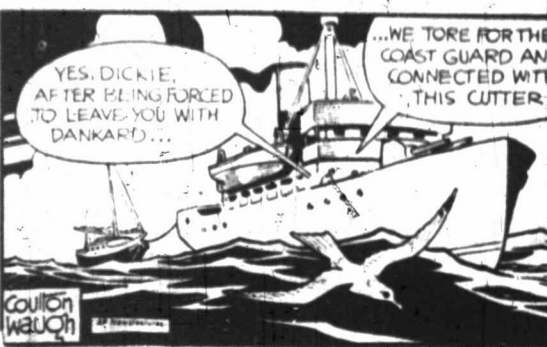

Noses Reconstructed For War-Scarred Vets

Los Angeles —(AP)—Veterans who have deformed noses due to wartime injuries can get a "new look" with the aid of tantalum mesh, a fine metallic screen, which can be implanted within the nose to take the place of macerated nasal bone, says a surgeon at the University of California school of medicine.

Dr. Joel Pressman also says that a small sheet of tantalum may be used rather than the mesh. The fibrous tissue tends to form a firm basis for the shape of the nose so that the metal sheet may later be removed.

Great Britain To Honor U. S. Heroes; Names Requested

The London, England, Times is interested in obtaining the names of the next-of-kin of the 28,000 Americans who, stationed in Great Britain or operating from British bases, gave their lives in World War II.

The next-of-kin are requested to write the London newspaper in order that they may be presented a special publication prepared by The Times as part of a British memorial to the war dead.

The volume tells the story of the creation of the American Memorial Chapel which is being erected in honor of the American war dead at St. Paul's Cathedral in London; lists the war-time life and customs of American service men and women among the British people, and includes the text of an address made by General Eisenhower in London a month after V-E Day.

Col. J. J. Astor, chairman of The Times, in a letter to The Reporter-Telegram, asks for the following information:

1. The name of the relative who died while serving in the U. S. Forces based upon Britain.
2. The name or title of the unit in which he or she served.
3. The writer's name and full address and the relationship to the dead person.

Free Of Cost

The information, written on a post-card, should be sent to: Col. the Hon. J. J. Astor, The Times, London, Inc., 45 East 51st Street, New York 22, N. Y. The messages then will be sent from New York to London by air, and copies of the book will be forwarded direct, free of all cost, to the applicant.

Colonel Astor wrote that the name of the individual man or woman among the 28,000 is inscribed in gold letters on the front cover of each copy.

A Roll of Honor bearing the names of the war dead was presented General Eisenhower at a service of dedication in London last Independence Day. The Honor Roll will be kept in the American Memorial Chapel.

Iritis Demands Prompt Care, For Vision May Be At Stake

Iritis is a serious eye disease. Its principal symptoms consist of pain, watering of the eyes, excessive sensitivity to bright light, and if long continued, interference with vision. The pain is likely to be severe and worse at night. Touching or pressing the eyeball usually is excruciatingly painful.

When iritis begins suddenly the symptoms are likely to be worse than in the chronic variety, but recovery usually comes more rapidly—perhaps in a few weeks. When proper treatment is begun early the iritis often clears up completely, but complications and the possibility of chronic inflammation are dangerous possibilities.

Iritis sometimes is associated with rheumatism, diabetes, tuberculosis, syphilis, or injury. It is most important that the cause of the iritis be discovered whenever possible.

The disease or condition producing the inflammation of the iris must be treated as well as the eye itself. The search for infection elsewhere in the body must be carried out painstakingly and thoroughly. But sometimes no cause whatever

can be found. The eye itself requires highly skilled treatment, including the use of drugs, heat applied locally, rest and protection from light. Sometimes a method called foreign protein therapy has been found helpful in iritis.

This consists in injecting some protein substance (boiled milk is an example) which produces a reaction of the body, usually with fever. This seems to stimulate resistance and often has a favorable effect on the iritis.

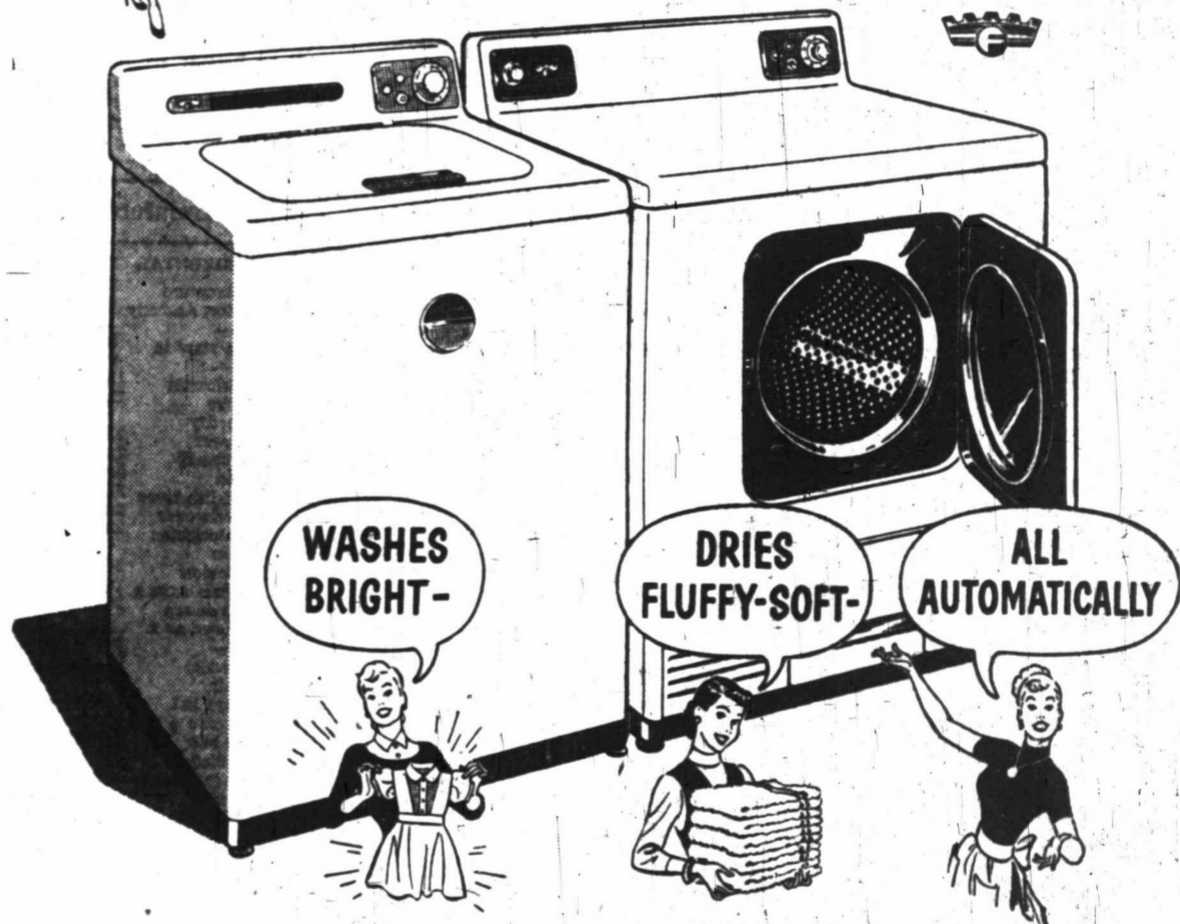
As in most other inflammatory diseases of the eye (but not such things as cataracts, simple glaucoma, and the like), ACTH or cortisone are often extremely useful.

When anything goes wrong with the eyes, diagnosis and treatment should not be delayed too long, as the risk of permanent damage to these vital organs is great. It is not possible for a patient to tell what kind of eye trouble he has from the symptoms alone and therefore nothing should stand in the way of seeking expert advice promptly. In iritis, as in other eye diseases, the vision itself may be at stake.

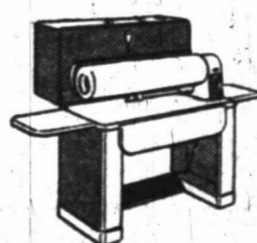

Some young friends of my daughter took me to the movies the other day.

The one we saw recounted the adventures of several girl employees of a department store who wanted better chances to meet rich men. To solve this problem, they pooled their salaries and rented an empty mansion whose drawing room they furnished with B picture elegance.

Upstairs, in one bedroom, they slept on empty cots. But the rich young men they succeeded in courting didn't know this, of course. Thus these heroines generated great suspense for the audience by their fear that the boy friends would discover what liars they were.

Even more was suspense generated when one of the girls had the bad taste to fall in love with a poor young man who was working in the basement of the department store. In a stirring climax, the poor young

man turned out to be the son and heir of the department store owner.

My daughter's friends saw nothing odd about this movie. How many other youngsters across the land suffered and triumphed with its moral morons, I don't know.

All I know is that the censors who frown so virtuously upon exposure of the human thigh in movies seemed to see nothing offensive, nothing immoral in the picture's frank suggestion that love and happiness can be hijacked by lies and deception.

All I know is that children will eat doped candy if it comes in familiar wrappings—and that while we check what goes into the stomach, we pay no attention at all to what goes into the mind.

The movie was widely advertised. The other Sunday, on the back page of my newspaper, I came upon an item that will not be widely advertised.

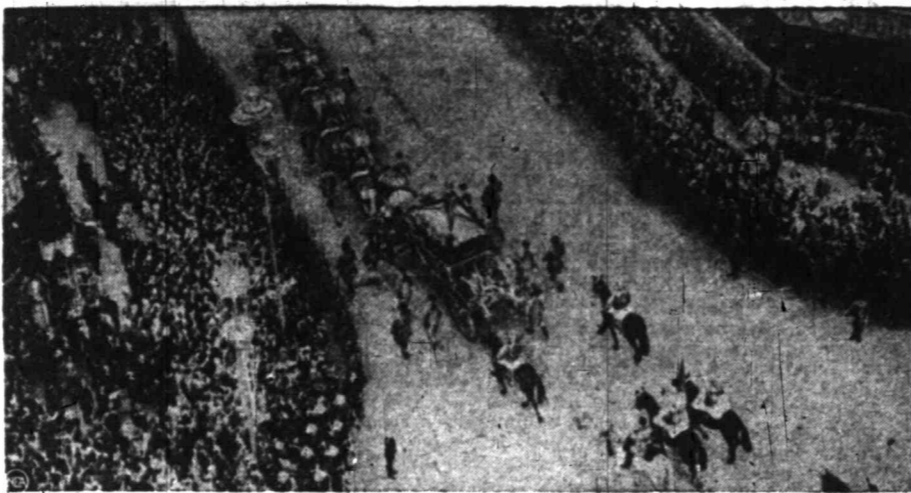
In H. Professor Lowell S. Trowbridge of Boston University's Department of Human Relations said the girls are marrying earlier because they don't like work. He said, "The life of a young married woman as presented by women's magazine fiction is a bad influence on girls. They see only a dazzling future in sweet suburbia. Their attitude is 'what's he got to offer me?' instead of 'how can I be a good wife to him?'"

LONDON—Thousands of people in England already are busy preparing for what will be recorded next June in their country's history as the most splendid coronation of all times.

The crowning of a sovereign is always a sensational event. But this time every man, woman and child in Britain is taking a deep-felt, affectionate interest in it because the Queen is a young woman whom they have followed since her birth and the first Queen to be crowned since Victoria.

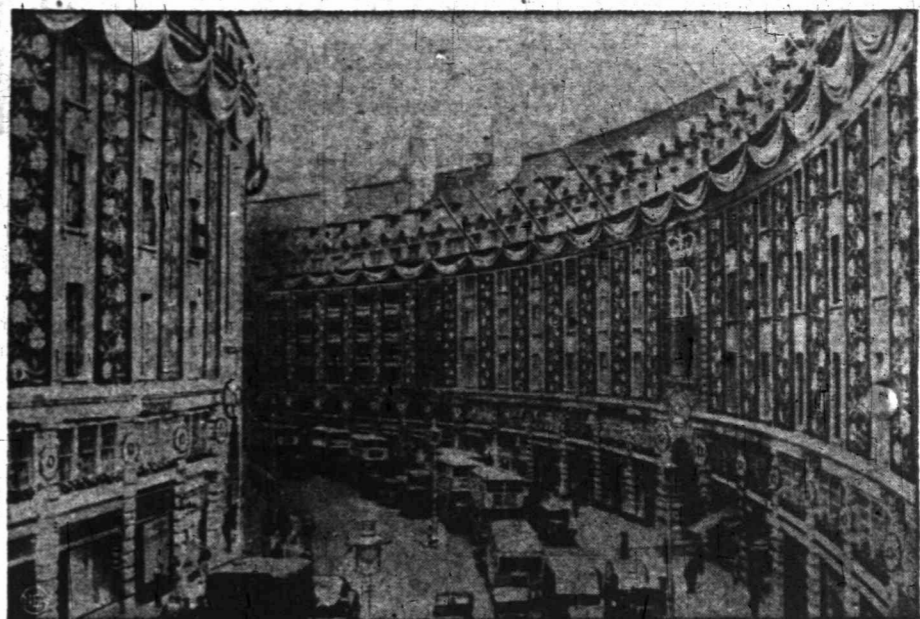
Elizabeth II is beloved of her people because she has convinced them that she is not only beautiful but courageous and deeply conscious of her duties, in spite of her youth.

Furthermore, she is the daughter of a sovereign who died at his task, the wife of a prince charming and the mother of two beautiful children.

The robes of state which the Queen will wear when she is crowned on June 2 will be the most fabulous yet seen in Westminster Abbey.

Fifty thousand silkworms have provided the yarn for the 20 yards of the richest silk velvet known as the "Queen's Purple" which will fashion her trailing robe and the satin for the gown she will wear beneath it.

Both will be all-British and both will be executed with the most gorgeous embroidery ever executed by the Royal School of Needlework and representing the Royal Insignia.



London's "Golden Mile," Regent Street, takes on a regal air as coronation for Queen Elizabeth II draws nearer. Specially designed, illuminated roses will appear above the doorways. Building fronts are decorated with vertical drapes, featuring floral design based on the rose, and a red and white valance extends along the cornice line of each building. Pillars bear the royal cipher, "ER" surmounted by a crown. Price tag for the decorations—\$100,000.

The raw silk has been produced on Zoe, Lady Hart Dyke's silk farm at Lullingstone in Kent. Started 20 years ago, the farm supplied bolts of silk for the coronation robes of George VI and the Queen Mother.

Big worry of middle-aged Miss Lilly Lee, who will soon go to work at the Warner mills at Braintree, Essex, is that "my knife doesn't slip." Her job is hand-weaving the 20 yards of velvet for the Queen's coronation robe. So just in case of mishap, Mrs. Hilda Calver will weave a duplicate length of 20 yards. Both are skilled craftsmen in the hand-weaving of silk velvet.

The silk has to be looped over a slatted wire and cut by hand. The two women cannot produce more than 18 inches a day, so it will take three months to complete the yardage. A director of the mills says "their task will be one of the utmost responsibility. The knife has only to slip once and the whole thing is ruined."

Dress And Jewels

Nobody knows what style dress the Queen will elect to wear under her purple robes. It must necessarily be a formal evening gown with a deep décolleté to permit of the ceremony of Anointing and also to set off the magnificent crown jewels she will wear.

It is presumed that Royal Dressmaker Norman Harnell will be entrusted with the making of the

coronation robes.

According to the office of the Earl Marshal the Duke of Norfolk it has as yet not been decided what headdress the Queen will wear to the coronation. If she follows the example of her father, she would wear a Cap of State of purple velvet edged with ermine.

Special Holy Oil

Nine youths of noble birth will be appointed to carry the Queen's train. Four peeresses have to be chosen to hold a pall of cloth of gold over the Queen when she is anointed with the Holy Oil.

This precious oil usually is made in sufficient quantities to last several coronations. But the reserve supply was destroyed by bombs during the war and the Queen's chemists have been commanded to make more.

It is a fragrant oil distilled from orange flowers, roses, cinnamon, musk, jasmine, flowers of benzoin, civet and ambergris. The formula dates back to the 17th Century.
