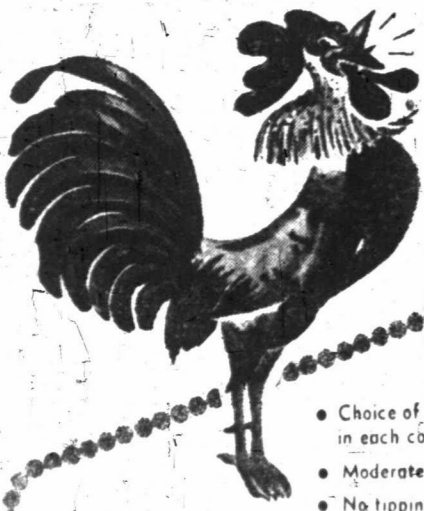

AUSTIN—(P)—Texas teachers stand a good chance of getting pay raises if the 53rd Legislature can find the money to foot the bill. That's the general opinion of state senators and representatives interviewed by The Associated Press on what they consider the most important or controversial problems the

Legislature will have to deal with beginning January 13. The lawmakers said provision for higher teacher salaries is the fourth most vital issue facing them and the problem is directly related to taxation—the No. 1 task. High-way financing and water conservation were the other matters rated ahead of teacher pay.

Cattle Men Fined \$5,250 For Aiding Border Violations

EL PASO—(P)—An El Paso farmer and an Ysleta cattle buyer paid off \$5,250 in federal court fines here Friday after pleading guilty to charges of receiving and concealing Mexican cattle driven across the Rio Grande.

The two also got 15-month suspended sentences and two years probation each when they refused to tell the source of the cattle.

Martin C. Lettunich, 30, prominent farmer in the Lower El Paso Valley, was fined \$1,800 on each of three counts. A. Campbell also lost his truck, valued at \$800, which was confiscated by the government.

The two were charged with receiving and concealing 38 steers driven across the Rio Grande to the Lettunich farm.

State To Seek Life Sentence For Negro Accused In Knifing

DALLAS—(P)—A life prison term will be sought for Ernest McNeil, 31, negro ex-convict who Thursday night slashed and stabbed a prominent Dallas physician's wife.

Mrs. Harold T. Nesbit was reported in fair condition Saturday night with deep cuts on her legs, arms and body. McNeil, in a signed statement, said he attacked Mrs. Nesbit with a butcher knife following an argument with her husband over money.

District Attorney Henry Wade said he would seek a life sentence for McNeil after using two prior felony convictions against the negro yardman as a basis for habitual criminal indictments.

Conviction of a third felony on such an indictment would mean an automatic life sentence. Wade said the negro had served sentences for forgery and theft over \$50 in the last six years. McNeil was sent up from Lubbock on each of the previous charges.

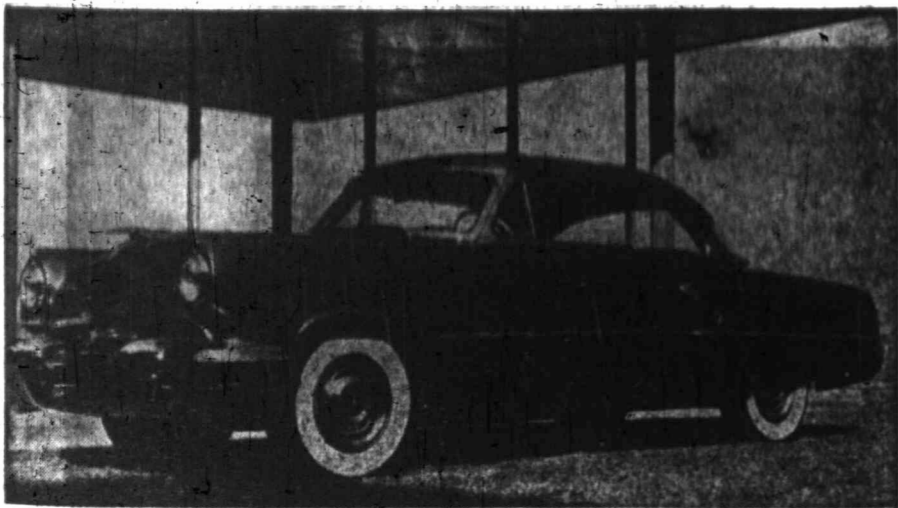

Erskine Motors To Display Lincoln Models For 1953

America's most completely powered car, the Lincoln for 1953, will be introduced to the public Tuesday in the showrooms of Erskine Motors, 120 South Baird Street, here.

Featuring a 205 horsepower engine—the most powerful ever offered in a modern production automobile—the new Lincoln Cosmopolitan and Capri models also will have power brakes, power steering and a powered four-way front seat adjustment as optional choices. An advanced design four-barrel carburetor, 6 redesigned intake manifold, larger intake valves, a new combustion shape, a straight-through exhaust system and an improved air cleaner have been adopted in the Lincoln overhead valve, V-8 engine to give it the added power. This new induction system with its resultant better "breathing" results in increased acceleration and higher top speed. A speed of 80 mph can be attained in 12 seconds from a standing start, and 80 mph in 22 seconds.

Exterior changes have been made in the new models to further emphasize their smart, modern lines. A new gold "V" ornament has been created for the front of the grill, and the same theme is used to add a jeweled touch for side ornamentation.

Sims Has It Good On Korean Front, But Cat Would Help

Pvt. Charles Sims, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Sims, 5108 West Kentucky, never had it so good, to hear him tell it.

Last week his parents received a letter from their son on the front line in Korea and for two pages he describes the fighting that is going on around him.

Then comes the postscript: "You ought to envy me. I don't pay income tax and I get free candy, soap, paper and 45 bucks extra a month. No sweat."

Scrawled in pencil, the letter was written while Sims was serving with the 223rd Infantry Regiment.

"They Don't Hit Much" "The Chinese," he wrote, "are 700 yards in front of us now. It's keen here. We live in little sandbag-and-log bunkers built on the opposite slope of the hill.

"Our tanks are shelling the Chinks now and some jets are bombing them."

"I'm sitting in the doorway writing and listening to the neat explosions. They drop mortar rounds on us all day long but don't hit anything much. One boy was wounded yesterday but got bad. We wear armored vests and helmets all day and night."

"I don't think we are supposed to sleep, though. We pull guard at our position all night and work and pull guard all day."

"Every day I take my rifle and fire 10 or 20 rounds at the Chink trenches to harass them. They are shelling us now; a 76 just hit close by."

"I went on patrol last night and stayed out between our lines and theirs for four hours trying to catch a prisoner. All we did was nearly freeze to death."

"From here you can see Heartbreak Ridge, Sandbag Castle and a few other hills you read about. They keep searchlights on them all night so we can see the Chinks if they attack."

"Last night we could hear them singing, yelling and blowing bugles. Sometimes they play records for us over loudspeakers and they yell at us, too."

"I had better stop now and go eat supper. Be sure and send me my little hunting knife, a whetstone and a can opener and some rat poison. We have a few mice living here. What we need is a cat."

"Well, I guess that is all for now. Write soon and don't worry about me. It's not as bad as it sounds."

Auto Bank Teller Unit Opens Monday

The First National Bank records another FIRST in Midland at 9 a.m. Monday when it opens two Auto Bank teller windows for the convenience of its customers.

Located at the corner of Wall and Baird Streets, the Auto Bank teller windows incorporate the latest features in banking safety and convenience.

John P. Butler, president of the First National Bank, said the new protective equipment in the teller's window makes them burglar-

proof. Bullet-proof glass and steel reinforced walls protect the cashiers from attack. Bank clerks in the windows are sealed off completely from outside contact.

Tunnel To Bank
The customer and the teller communicate by means of a loudspeaker system built into the windows. An automatic tray manipulated by the cashier picks up the deposits and returns deposit slips to the customer when transactions are completed. There is no way to enter the cash-

ier's window from the street. A steel and concrete tunnel 440 feet long extends from the Auto Bank to The First National's main banking rooms at the corner of Main and Wall Streets.

The tunnel will be used only by bank employees or tellers going to and from work. It leads to The First National Bank basement and main vaults. The tunnel was open for public inspection last Sunday when hundreds of Midlanders were conducted through it.

Midland motorists can make bank deposits or withdrawals and also receive change at the Auto Bank teller windows without leaving their cars. Space is available to accommodate three cars off the street in each window driveway. Adjacent to the windows is a First National Bank Parking lot where customers may park free of charge while visiting the main bank.

Each Auto Bank teller window is air-conditioned mechanically and heated electrically to provide protection for the tellers in any kind of weather.

Russian Action Jars Indian Faith In Soviet Intentions

NEW DELHI, INDIA.—(AP)—The brusque Soviet rejection of India's Korean resolution now before the UN apparently has shaken severely many Indians' faith in Russia as a firm proponent of world peace. Some Indians have applied such terms as "rude" and "insulting" to Soviet Foreign Minister Vishinsky's turn-down of the Indian formula for ending the deadlock over Korean prisoners. The indignation among Indian officials, journalists and students of international affairs has appeared uniformly strong. Most of this seemed as much a result of the blunt manner in which Vishinsky spoke both for Russian and Communist China as of the rejection itself. A government foreign affairs spokesman, however, said Saturday that India was not abandoning hope that China will reverse its announced decision and support the Indian resolution.

Houston Home Fire Claims Victim No. 2

HOUSTON.—(AP)—A seven-year-old Houston boy died Saturday afternoon before funeral services for his mother. Both were injured fatally in a fire which destroyed their home early Wednesday. Richard Yeager, one of three sons, injured in the fire, died at mid-morning. Services for the mother, Mrs. Donald Yeager, 40, proceeded on schedule. Mrs. Yeager died Wednesday night. She was a niece of the Most Rev. George Leach, Catholic bishop at Harrisburg, Pa. Donald W. Yeager, 40, and two other sons, Donald, 14, and Robert Lee, eight, are recovering from burns and shock. Yeager still is hospitalized. Mrs. Yeager and the sons were rescued by firemen after the father smashed a door and called for help.

Snow, Sleet, Rain, Drab Skies Extend All Across Nation

Snow, rain, sleet and laden skies extended across most of the nation Saturday as temperatures remained below normal in almost all sections.

A wide area of precipitation extended from the Mississippi River westward to the central sections of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. The precipitation was mostly in the form of snow in Kansas and Missouri with rain in Texas and Louisiana and a mixture of snow, sleet and freezing rain in Arkansas and Eastern Oklahoma.

Arkansas had its first snow of the year, Dardanelle, in the north central area, got three and one-half inches of snow and Fort Smith, three inches. Forty-nine miles of U. S. Highway 71, which cuts the state north to south, was reopened Saturday after being blocked by snow and ice. A rain and drizzle belt extended from the Gulf states into parts of Florida. It was cloudy in the Atlantic states. The nation's coldest spots were in the Rocky Mountain region. It was 10 below at Salt Lake City, minus 10 at Butte, Mont., and six below at North Platte, Neb.

Two Murder Charges In Mexico May Face Extradition Dodger

MEXICO CITY.—(AP)—George Ochoa, the former Laredo, Texas, customs broker who has defied the United States in its efforts to extradite him, may face two charges of murder in Mexico. The charges would be the same ones for which Texas and U. S. officials tried for years to get Ochoa back in the States—the pistol slaying of two men in a Laredo hotel. The attorney general's office said Friday that a Mexican charged with a crime in another country may be tried in Mexico if he returns to this country. Telesforo Ocampo, Ochoa's attorney, said he was studying this angle, but declined to give an opinion concerning it. Ochoa recently won a Supreme Court injunction suit against his extradition to Texas to stand trial for the killings.

But he is still in jail pending official notification of the court action which must reach him via the Foreign Office and the office of the attorney general.

Texans Plan Special Train To Inaugural

LUBBOCK.—(AP)—The Republican organization and Democrats for Eisenhower in the South Plains are negotiating arrangements for a special train from Lubbock to the Eisenhower Inaugural in Washington, D. C., January 20. The tentative schedule calls for the special to leave Lubbock January 17, returning here January 23, according to information released by Al O. Curry, Republican county chairman.

WACO.—(AP)—Earl Hankamer, Houston oil man, was elected chairman of the planning committee for the Greater Baylor University campaign to raise 50 million dollars in 10 years for Baylor units at Waco, Dallas and Houston.

Fort Worth Airman Dies; Toll In Air Crash Rises To 37

TACOMA, Wash.—(AP)—Bobby R. Wilson, Fort Worth, died in a hospital Saturday of injuries suffered in Friday's crash of a military air transport service plane near here.

His death left only two survivors and brought the fatality list to 37. Wilson suffered multiple skull fractures and burns. The only crew member not killed outright, Wilson was based at Great Falls, Mont. McChord Air Force Base officers said condition of the two survivors still was critical Saturday. They are Curtis Redd, Fairfax, S. C., and Joseph M. Lacovitti, eight, Bridgeport, Pa., whose parents, two brothers and a sister died in the crash. The Lacovitti boy was listed as slightly improved; Redd as "barely holding his own."

Morse said he wanted the Republicans to have full responsibility for the government under President-elect Eisenhower. He added in a formal statement that while he will help his former party organize the Senate in January—and thus put the Republicans in control of the legislative program and committee chairmanships—he will not take part in caucuses of either party.

The infection in his left leg spread, however, and he returned to the Evangelical Hospital where, he alleged, his good right leg was amputated at mid-thigh July 15. Later Tews' left leg was amputated at Mount Sinai Hospital.

When Hughes was asked whether the Korean trip was his personal idea, he smiled and turned away for a moment. Then he said "a lot of people worked on the speeches and I worked on a lot of speeches."

In his new duties he will be concerned with the preparation of speeches and reports to the President.

In setting a work schedule for Saturday and Sunday, Eisenhower broke a rule he has made to try to keep his weekends free of appointments and conferences. He has scheduled a conference Saturday with five men. They are his brother, Milton, president of Pennsylvania State College; Arthur Vandenberg, Jr., his designated White House secretary; former Assistant Secretary of State Nelson Rockefeller; Dr. Robert Johnson, president of Temple University; and Dr. Arthur E. Flemming, president of Ohio Wesleyan University.

Book On 'Midland Country' Planned By J. Evetts Haley

Plans to write a book about "the Midland Country" were announced Saturday afternoon by J. Evetts Haley, distinguished author, educator, historian and lecturer, who was guest of honor at an autograph party at The Book Stall.

A former Midlander, Haley was in the city to autograph copies of his newest book, "Fort Concho," which won him this year's Sumnerfield Roberts \$1,000 award for the best book on the spirit of the Texas Republic and its influence.

"If I ever write anything else, it will be a book about the Midland Country—and then I'm going to run," the genial author remarked. Having lived in the Midland area from 1905 to 1925 and punched cattle

on a number of ranches operated by pioneer ranchers, Haley may be expected to use such material of a personal nature in the forthcoming volume.

Haley was vague as to when he actually will begin penning the volume on "the Midland Country," as he is busier than the proverbial bee making personal appearances in connection with his latest volume, serving as professor of English at Texas Technological College in Lubbock, and seeing after his two ranches in the Panhandle and Oklahoma.

While Haley was impressed with Midland's rapid growth in recent years, he sadly remarked, "I miss the old-time cowboys stomping the streets."

"I am not one who thinks size is a necessary index for virtue." Describes Area
Haley described this area as "God's own country."

Moving to Midland in 1905 with his parents from Bell County, Haley was graduated from Midland High School in 1920. His parents entered the ranching business at Old Folk's Crossing, north of Pecos, in 1910, but maintained their family home in Midland. After graduation, Haley punched cattle on the Bryant & Elkins Ranch and several others in the area before leaving Midland in 1925 to be connected with the Panhandle Plains Historical Society.

Other books written by Haley include "Life on the Texas Range," "Charles Goodnight, Cowman and Plainsman," "George W. Littlefield, Texan," and "Jeff Milton, A Good Man With A Gun."

FARM, DAIRY AND RANCH NEWS

What started out as a delightfully wet Thanksgiving week in the Midland area fizzled in the face of an extremely cold norther.

Then Friday the moisture returned, and at the time of this writing it was drizzling right along, with the forecast calling for additional rainfall. What it will be doing when this issue hits the street, we do not know, but D&Q is looking for a wet weekend.

G. B. Winters and Jack Leonard have good stands of oaks on Midland Draw on the F. F. Elkin farm east of Midland.

Pope Picks 24 To Complete College Of Cardinals Ranks

VATICAN CITY, ITALY—(AP)—Pope Pius XII Saturday announced the names of 24 new cardinals of the Catholic Church. They will be elevated to the Sacred College in a great consistory to be held January 12.

Only one American appeared on the list of new princes of the church—James Francis McIntyre, archbishop of Los Angeles.

The long-expected consistory will bring the death-depleted ranks of the Sacred College to its full strength of 70.

It will be the first since the great postwar consistory of 1946 in which the pope gave symbolic red hats to 32 prelates in one of the most impressive and splendid ceremonies of the Catholic Church.

A native of New York City, Archbishop McIntyre is 66 years old. He has been head of the Los Angeles archdiocese since 1948.

The list also included the name of Msgr. Aloysius Stepinac, archbishop of Zagreb, who was released conditionally from prison by Yugoslavia's Communist government last year after he had served five years of a 16-year sentence for alleged collaboration with the Nazis during World War II.

From 15 Countries

The new cardinals are from 12 countries. Eleven of them, however, are Italian, bringing the number of Italians in the Sacred College to 27. Non-Italians will number 43.

Two of the new cardinals are from France, two from Spain, and one each from Brazil, Ecuador, Yugoslavia, Ireland, United States, Canada, Poland, Colombia and Germany.

The Canadian prelate honored is Msgr. Paul Emil Leger, archbishop of Montreal.

Theft Ring Loots Oil Leases Of \$100,000 In Pipe, Casing

DALLAS—(AP)—Ranger investigators say a theft ring systematically has looted oil leases in five Texas counties of pipe and casing worth almost \$100,000.

About 75 persons have been questioned in the theft ring, Ranger E. J. Banks said Friday, adding that many of the persons had participated unknowingly in the ring's operations in transportation and disposing of the stolen equipment.

Theft indictments in Coleman County have named four men, both of whom have been charged but not indicted in Erath County.

Sheriff H. F. Fenton of Coleman County identified the Dallas men as William Ernest Fletcher, lounge operator, and George Morgan, a truck driver.

Indictments were returned at Coleman against A. D. Choate, Brownwood, who has been arrested, and a fourth man whose name has not been revealed.

At Dallas, Ranger officials said Ranger George Roach was returning from Erath County with warrants for Morgan and Fletcher.

The two were charged there with the theft of oil pipe valued at around \$3,000 in December of 1951 from a field near Dublin.

Other oil field thefts attributed to the ring took place at Bellville in Austin County late in July or early August, at Crews in Burn County on August 26 and in a Texas County in May, Captain Choate said.

The indictments returned Tuesday in Coleman charge of men with taking four truckloads of oil pipe from near Novice on October 18. The pipe was owned by West States Petroleum Corporation.

Ranger investigators said the pipe had been brought from Mexico and to Dallas, where truckloads were recovered.

Tumor Woman, Down To Mere 124 Pounds, Now Walks Again

GALVESTON—(P)—Mrs. Tomasa Cruz Garcia, from whom doctors cut a 184-pound tumor, is learning to walk again at her new weight of 124 pounds.

The tumor was removed from Mrs. Garcia's abdomen November 13 in a three-hour operation. Dr. Dan Eames, chief resident surgeon at John Sealy Hospital here, said it was an ovarian cyst which had developed within a year.

Doctors said Saturday Mrs. Garcia, 44, may be able to go home to Carlatina, Texas, in a week or 10 days. Because she was weakened by the weight of the tumor, she is being given daily massage and exercise to strengthen her legs. She began walking November 23 and now can take several steps alone, although she is afraid of falling and is unsure of herself.

Abdominal pressure caused by the tumor as it grew has given Mrs. Garcia a "barrel chest," which the doctor described as compensation for the tumor. The lungs didn't have room for enough vertical expansion, so they gradually pushed out the chest. This condition probably will be permanent, he said.

Mrs. Garcia had a 90-inch waist measurement before the operation. She at first thought she might be experiencing her sixth pregnancy. When school opened in September, she was unable to get her children ready for school and later, when a teacher called, her condition was discovered.

Arrangements were made for her to come to John Sealy, and on leaving home, the front door had to be torn down to permit her to pass through it.

She was unable to stand straight and on rising from a sitting position she required the help of about four persons. Because she was too large to fit in a stretcher, she was brought to Galveston in a large easy chair placed in the ambulance.

When asked what she did for clothing before the tumor was removed, Mrs. Garcia said she just bought "yards and yards" of material and sewed it together for dresses.

Honolulu-Signal Have Reef Discovery In Prospect At Wildcat In SE Hockley

A discovery from the Pennsylvanian reef lime is in prospect in Southwest Hockley County on the South Plains of West Texas.

Honolulu Oil Corporation and Signal Oil & Gas Company No. 1 T. H. Matthews, approximately two miles southwest of the Ropes (Pennsylvanian) field, and five miles

northwest of the town of Ropes recovered 2,550 feet of high-gravity clean oil and no water in an eight-hour drillstem test in the top of the reef formation at 9,250-95 feet.

Gas Came To Surface

Gas came to the surface in one hour and 15 minutes. No fluid came to the top while the tester was open.

Recovery was the 1,000-foot water blanket and the 2,550 feet of clean oil. Open flowing bottom hole pressure was between 475 pounds and 1,225 pounds.

Shut-in bottom hole pressure after 15 minutes was 2,300 pounds.

Exact Figures Lacking

Exact gravity and the gas-oil ratio figures for the test at 9,250-95 feet have not been reported.

Following the test where the project recovered the clean oil it cored at 9,295-9,304 feet. Recovery was seven and one-half feet of porous, oil-saturated lime.

Another core has been cut at 9,304-15 feet. That specimen was being pulled at last report. After it is out operators may decide to run another drillstem test.

Top of the Pennsylvanian lime reef is at 9,250 feet. Elevation is 3,401 feet.

Location is 510 feet from south and 2,767 feet from east lines of tract 11, league 13, Howard County School Land survey.

The wildcat is 12 miles southeast of Levelland.

Permian Basin oil companies and oil operators support and benefit from such organizations as the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, the Independent Petroleum Association of America, the General Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, the American Petroleum Institute and other state and national industry organizations.

Sometimes it is said that the petroleum industry and all other industries have too many organizations. We cannot agree with the statement.

It is our feeling that each of the now existing associations in the petroleum industry serve a useful and necessary purpose.

In calling attention to the fact that West Texas has no regional petroleum association we are not suggesting that the other organizations which are working with the West Texas oil industry are not doing their job.

We think they are. We are simply wondering, if oil operators in other areas find it worthwhile to maintain district associations we are just wondering if it might not be advisable for West Texas oil industry leaders to look into the situation.

We are well acquainted with many of the officers and members of a number of district oil and gas associations in several areas of the United States.

Those men have been supporting those associations with their time and money for many years.

Those men are not dumb. They don't throw away money. They figure they are getting value received for their investments—if they did not so figure they would not support the associations.

The Toolpusher would like to conduct an open forum for the oil industry of West Texas to get expressions from individuals who may have ideas either for or against an oil and gas association for West Texas which would work for the general good of the entire industry of this area—both majors and independents—for the operators, producers, drilling contractors, service concerns and all other branches of the industry in West Texas.

Sun Oil Company No. 1 Harper-Federal, wildcat in section 26-25e-30e and in Southeast Lea County, swabbed 53 barrels of oil and 30 barrels of acid water from perforations at 1,861-11,869 feet and from 11,881-11,889 feet. The section had been acidized with 12,000 gallons.

Flow was gauged during an unreported length of time. Richardson & Bass No. 1 Federal, wildcat in Eddy County, section 27-15-29e, was coring below 4,996 feet after a drillstem test was taken to 4,973 feet. Tool was open one hour and 35 minutes. Recovery was 124 feet of slightly oil and gas-cut mud.

PAD Studies Industry Views On Price, Material Controls

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Petroleum Administration for Defense (PAD) wants to find out how the industry feels about the need for continued control of steel and other materials.

Its own figures indicate that the allocation system may still be needed for some time to come, but it has called a meeting here December 8 of 26 oil and gas trade associations for an expression of opinion.

The question of continued controls—both over materials and over prices—constitutes a major discussion subject among petroleum industry men in the capital.

On the price front, the PAD said it had recommended higher ceilings for West Coast crude oil as a means to increase production. Its recommendation was asked by the Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) which is considering applications for higher rates from the Standard and Union Oil Companies of California.

PAD said the higher ceilings would provide incentives for increased development and for exploratory and secondary recovery operations needed to offset a crude oil shortage in the western area.

And on Capitol Hill, Rep. Wiggie Lucas (D-Texas) said in an interview he saw no need for continuation of any price controls on crude oil. He said he would sponsor legislation to remove the crude oil ceilings even before their scheduled April 30 expiration date. As to the need for control over

supplies of materials, Robert L. Foree, head of the PAD production division, commented:

"There's no doubt some individuals could do better without controls, particularly those with long-standing connections with the big suppliers. We want to find out at this (December 8) meeting, however, how most of the people in the industry feel about it."

Here are some pertinent figures released by the PAD supporting its implied, if unofficial, stand against lifting of materials control until the steel shortage eases:

The Defense Production Administration has allocated only 348,000 tons of steel for fabrication during the first quarter of 1953 into large diameter line pipe, that measuring 18 inches or over.

The figure is far short of the 529,000 tons the PAD had recommended. The allocation for the current quarter was 387,000 tons. For the second quarter of 1953 the PAD has recommended an allocation of 647,000 tons.

The steel shortage situation, it emphasized in the second annual report just issued by the Joint Senate-House Committee on Defense Production.

A section of the report devoted to the PAD summarizes the work of the agency in the past and declares it still must face these three major problems:

1. Insure sufficient materials, particularly steel to permit fulfillment of the essential expansion goals for the oil and gas industries and distribute the goods in accord with the demands of defense and equity among operators.

2. Insure sufficient supplies of petroleum products—especially aviation gasoline, diesel fuel, jet fuel, and Navy special fuel oil, which continue to be in girth supply—to satisfy the needs of the military.

3. Insure production, transportation, and distribution of enough middle distillates—kerosene, home heating oil, and diesel fuel—to the East Coast to prevent a shortage there during the winter months of peak demands.

The National Petroleum Council, headed by Walter S. Hallinan, will convene here Tuesday to hear reports from two committees: One, headed by President L. W. Wescott of the Pure Oil Company, which has studied the above-ground storage situation; the other, headed by President B. B. Jennings of Socomey-Vacuum, reporting the Bunker "C" fuel oil supply picture.

The council will honor out-going Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman at a formal dinner here Monday evening.

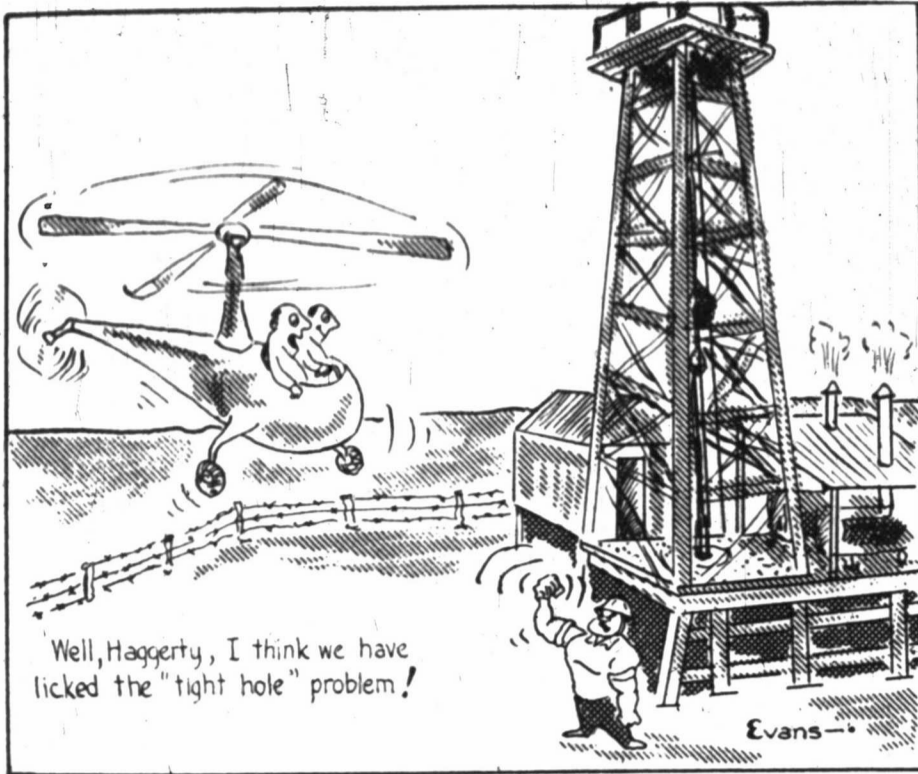

OIIC Study Gives Listing Of Units In Oil Business

NEW YORK—The Oil Industry Information Committee announces that a three-year study has revealed the existence of more than 200,000 oil businesses in the United States.

An actual count, according to the committee, shows there are 44,602 businesses engaged in production, refining, transportation and wholesale distribution of petroleum and petroleum products. The study further reports there are 188,253 service stations, of which 177,923 are single-unit establishments, and are classified as separate businesses. The committee noted that 95 per cent of these service stations are independently owned or operated by local business men.

Stanton K. Smith, of Rockford, Ill., an independent marketer who is the OIIC's national chairman for 1953, declared:

"This study proves that the oil industry is one of the most competitive in the whole world. With so many thousands of businesses and business men competing for supplies and markets, there can be no other conclusion."

"This same competition is the chief reason why quality and quantity have been rising consistently in the petroleum industry. It also is the consumers' best assurance of reasonable prices because they vote for or against a product or a business every time a purchase is made."

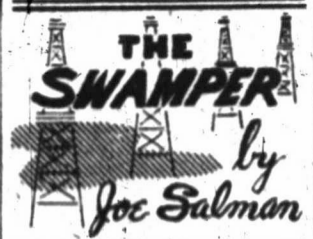
Totals Listed
In addition to the service stations, the OIIC study produced these totals for various segments of the industry:
Petroleum bulk stations and terminals—over 14,000.

Bank car companies—Transportation Division, American Petroleum Institute; barge line companies—U. S. Corps of Engineers Department of the Army; for-hire contract-carriers, tank trucks—National Petroleum Council; bottled gas dealers—Liquefied Petroleum Gas Association.

The study was made under the supervision of the OIIC's planning sub-committee, of which Franklin G. Waltman, public relations director of Sun Oil Company, Philadelphia, is chairman.

Fresh Approach Needed

More and more responsible statesmen and business leaders are coming to realize that the free world is approaching a crossroads in its economic affairs.

When Western Europe was flat on its back after World War II, the United States responded with the Marshall Plan, as it had to if the Communists were to be kept at bay.

The Marshall Plan was designed as a four-year program, to end July 1, 1952. In mid-course the Korean war broke out, however, spurring the great Western defense effort under NATO.

Even had there been no NATO requirements, it is clear that foreign economic aid would have gone on beyond the 1952 deadline originally set.

The question of how long to continue such aid is the problem that brings the West to the crossroads. In the stage when European nations were in fact recovering from paralysis, the wisdom of the plan seemed obvious.

The problem now is different. Europe for the most part is producing well, but it is not earning its way. For one prime reason—it cannot find adequate outlets for the goods it makes.

Before the big war, Western Europe traded with Eastern Europe. The Iron Curtain and the West's own restrictions now keep that commerce to a trickle.

Yet that policy is artificial, a stop-gap that merely puts off the day of reckoning. The U. S. and the whole West need a new policy, a comprehensive economic program that will seek a proper flow of trade among the free countries, for their mutual benefit and strength.

We learn now that the U. S. Council of the International Chamber of Commerce, headed by George A. Sloan, is preparing a series of policy recommendations covering the entire field of American commercial and monetary policy.

The council's efforts will be welcomed. They hardly could be more timely. The coming White House change-over and the rising need for new solutions make this plain.

Autos Take Biggest Chunk Of Midland's Retail Dollar

(Special to The Reporter-Telegram)

NEW YORK—President Truman's call for a study by the Federal Trade Commission to determine how the consumer's dollar is being spent draws attention to the current copyrighted survey by Sales Management, which show that, in Midland, sales of cars and other automotive equipment take the biggest bite out of the retail dollar.

In the city in 1951, in places selling new and used autos and trucks, batteries and accessories, and in outlets handling farm machinery, motorcycles, boats and the like, expenditures were equivalent to \$1,060 per family when divided arithmetically among the population. This represented 25 per cent of

all the money spent in the city's retail stores in the year. It was more than the proportion spent for automotive equipment elsewhere in the United States. The national average was 18 per cent of the retail dollar. In the West South Central States it was 21 per cent and in Texas, also 21 per cent.

Better Earnings

The automotive group of stores in Midland did business in the amount of \$8,067,000 in 1951. This high activity is attributable in the main to better earnings. With larger incomes, people spend more on luxury items. As a result the per family purchases of autos and the like have come to be an index of economic well-being.

Glasscock County Livestock Show Scheduled February 6

GARDEN CITY—A champion and reserve champion calf, as well as an over-all grand and reserve champion lamb, will be selected in the annual Glasscock County Livestock Show, tentatively scheduled for February 6.

Any boy or girl between the ages of 9 to 21 who has enrolled regularly in 4-H Club or vocational agriculture work for his particular project or demonstration may enter.

Baby beaves, fat lambs, breeding sheep or fat pigs may be entered so long as they have been cared for personally by the entrant under supervision of a county agent or vocational agriculture teacher.

Other rules stipulate that feeding and fitting period for the baby beaves shall begin not later than September 1 and for lambs, breeding sheep and fat pigs, not later than December 1.

All calves must have been dropped between Sept. 1, 1951, and Sept. 1, 1952, and the contestants must have owned their calves prior to Sept. 1, 1952, and fed and cared for them since that date.

Dry lot and milk fed calves classes will be provided. Calves entered in the dry lot division must have weaned by November 1.

All lambs in the show must be wether lambs and will compete in fine wool, crossbred and South-downs and Southdown crosses classes. Crossbreds must be a cross between fine wool ewes and Hampshire, Suffolk or Corriedale rams only.

Lambs without two usable permanent teeth will be eligible for fat lamb classes. A sitting committee will sift all unfinished animals.

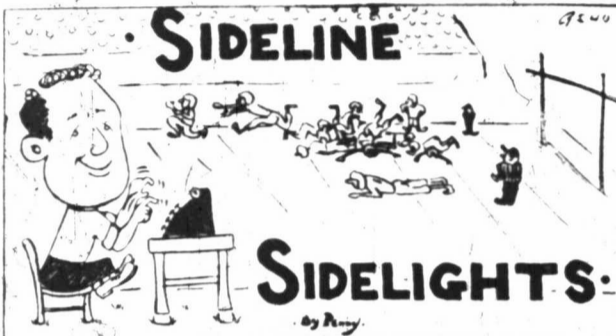

Lawmakers Know Texas Needs New Highways; At Odds On Footing Bill

Editor's Note: To find out the most vital issues facing the 53d Legislature when it meets January 13, Associated Press staff men interviewed state senators and representatives by mail or in person. This is another story analyzing their findings.

By MAC ROY RASOR

AUSTIN—The need for more after main highways may stir up one of the stormiest thunder-and-lightning sessions of the Texas Legislature in recent years, some lawmakers believe.

Two representatives who answered an Associated Press survey on legislative thinking fore-saw a repeat performance of the rural road and tax struggle that locked the last Legislature in bitter stalemate for weeks. Most others rated highway financing high on their list of important and controversial issues to be considered at the session beginning January 13.

Money Question Split
Many of the legislators think the highway job must be undertaken. "It is imperative," said Rep. Tom Cheatham, Cuero.

"There seems to be a definite need," said Senator Jep Fuller, Port Arthur.

When you start talking about how to get the money and how much that sparks began to fly.

There was vigorous comment against a plan advocated by Governor Shivers. He suggested a five-year, 500-million-dollar plan to keep the highway program from stalling. He advocated plugging tax loopholes, raising gasoline and car registration taxes and dedicating all of the state gasoline tax to roads. Now, one cent of the four-cent gasoline tax goes to the public school fund and one cent is split between the highway department and counties.

Tax Opposition Strong
"No \$100,000,000 a year additional," said Rep. Richard S. Stark, Gainesville.

"I vote against any new taxes to finance highways or anything else," said Rep. John L. Crosthwait, Dallas.

"I shall oppose any additional gasoline tax or additional license tax on automobiles," said veteran Rep. S. J. Isacks, El Paso.

"Put the additional taxation on natural gas," Rep. Dolph Briscoe, Uvalde, said.

Rural road advocates indicated they will guard jealously against any knife-work in that department to siphon funds into the primary road program.

Bridge Problem Up
"I hope it will not become a fight between the primary system and the rural system," said Briscoe. "If any attempt is made to cut the present farm-to-market road program, I think it will result in a much more bitter fight than we had during the last session."

Gov. T. Hanson, Mineola, prom-

ised that the "rural boys" will be "ready to fight" should that time come.

Senator Gus Strauss, Hallettsville, saw another problem.

"The chairman of the Highway Commission has stated it will cost 250 million dollars to place our bridges in proper shape to take care of the present truck load limit," he noted. "Some adjustments will have

to be made. Certainly, all Texas taxpayers should not be called upon to pay the bill for the benefit of the big truckers."

Officials Cite Need
The Highway Commission has spent months urging an expanded program for the state's major highways. Scores of highway seeking delegations at public hearings have been presented the plea:

"We've got to have more money if your needs and scores of others just as important are to be taken care of."

Chairman E. H. Thornton, Jr., Galveston, foregoes the commission will soon be exclusively in the "repair business" unless more funds are forthcoming both to maintain major highways already built and to build new ones.

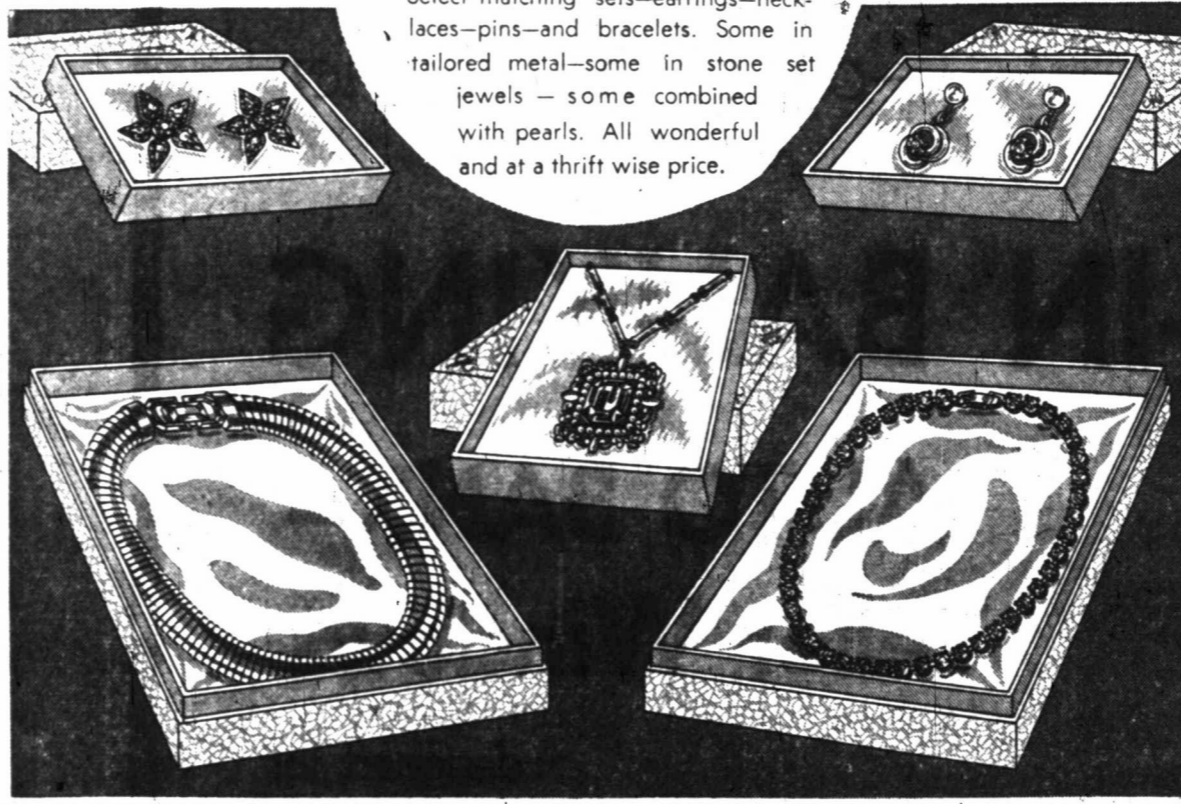

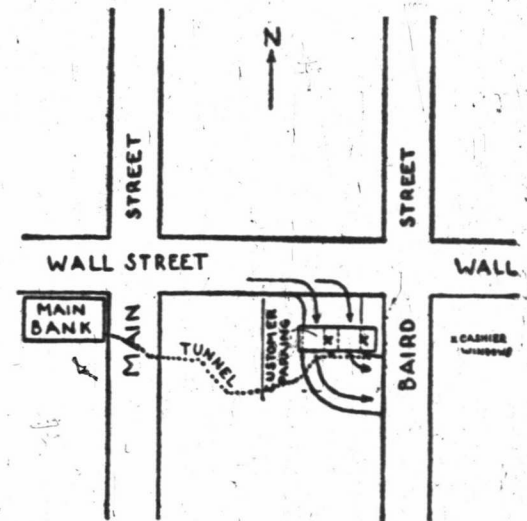

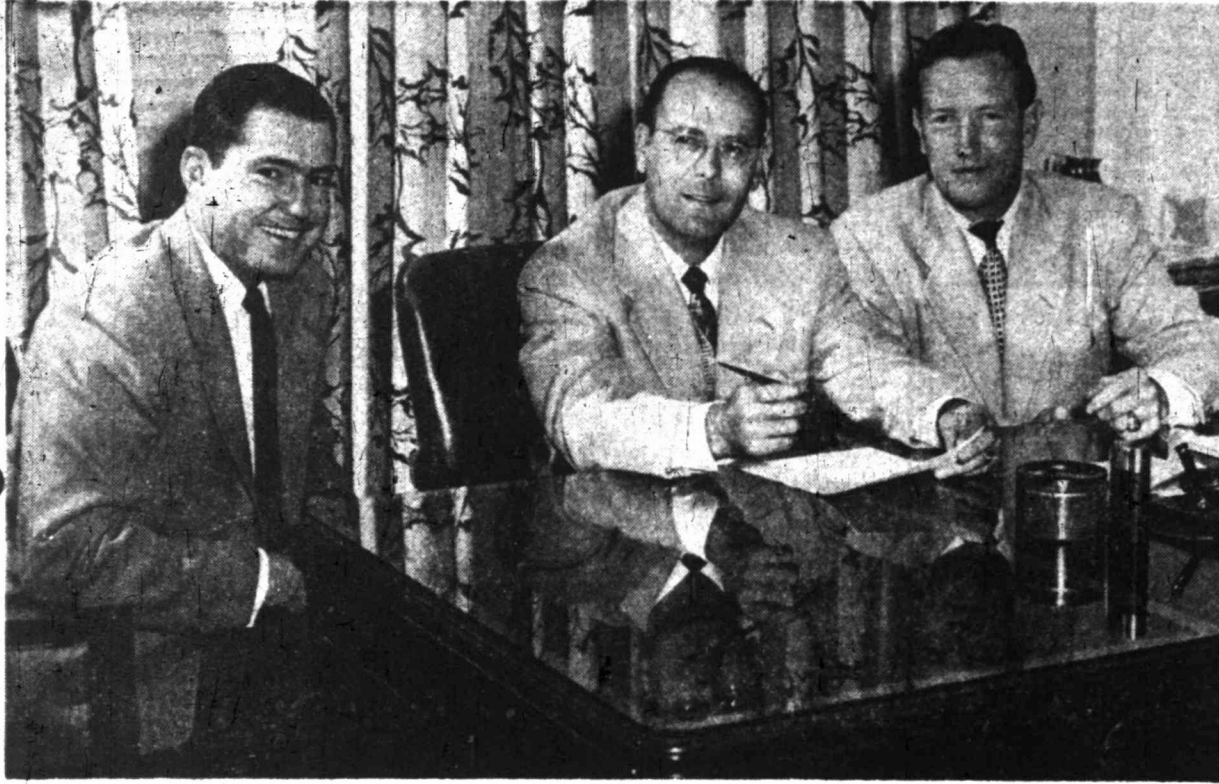

Next time you make doughnuts, add a half-cup of finely chopped pecans to the grated rind of an orange to the batter. Or if your family like their crullers spicy, sift a teaspoon of cinnamon into the dry ingredients.

Good casserole: Mix diced ham with cooked cauliflower, add a sauce of condensed cream of celery soup thinned with about a half cup of milk. Stir in a half bake in a moderate oven until hot through and bubbly.

Polynesia Islands Doctor Sails Sea In Small Ketch To Enroll At Harvard

MARBLEHEAD, MASS.—(AP)—A part-Polynesian doctor, who sailed 10,000 miles in a 48-foot ketch to begin classes at Harvard University's School of Public Health a month late, describes his voyage as a "holiday."

And classes at Harvard are a part of the "holiday" to Dr. Thomas R. Davis, who piloted himself, his wife Lydia, their two children and a pair of adventurous New Zealanders from Wellington, N. Z., through storms and gales to Boston in 155 days. They started May 31 and landed in Boston November 2.

"Of course by holiday I mean 'vacation,'" Dr. Davis quipped, in broad British accents.

Dr. Davis says he finds the bustle of graduate school "quite a change" from the tropical life of the Cook Islands, where he was chief medical officer until he resigned in May to accept a Harvard fellowship.

Life At Slow Pace
"Life moved at a rather slow pace in the tropics," he says, "for everyone, that is, but me."

Dr. Davis directed the complete

medical service—a surgical clinic, a sanatorium and hospitals—of the Cook Islands, a group of tiny dots of land with some 15,000 to 20,000 persons scattered about the South Pacific near New Zealand.

He left that job partly because of the fellowship, partly because he wanted to study public health methods other than British and partly to test a pet theory regarding the history of his people. His grandmother was a Polynesian princess.

Dr. Davis believes his ancestors, sometime in the dim past, sailed in large canoes to Peru and returned to the islands with a smattering of pre-Columbian Inca culture.

Ken Tiki's Route
This, he believes, is the reason for the similarities noted by anthropologists between island civilization and that of ancient Inca.

Although the trip proved nothing definite, Dr. Davis says, it did show the voyage from west to east to be within the realm of possibility. The other half of the voyage—the east to west journey—was undertaken by the crew of the balsa raft *Kon Tiki* a few years ago.

The doctor says his current plans do not go beyond finishing graduate school and earning a master's degree in tropical medicine and hygiene. "One never knows, you know."

But he hopes to be able to return to the Pacific and "possibly assist in shaping its medical future," as a "labor of love."

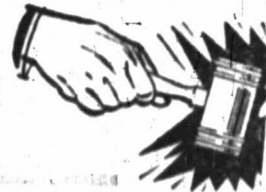

Dr. Lowry was a member of the commission which made an educational survey in six countries of South America during the Summer of 1951 for the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church.

He has written several books, the most recent of which is "The Mind's Adventure."

Cortines To Take Office In Mexico Monday, Promote Nation's Progress

By CHARLES H. GUPTILL

MEXICO CITY—The task of carrying the Mexican Revolution up its next solid step falls Monday on the spare, erect shoulders of Adolfo Ruiz Cortines.

With the tricolored presidential sash the 62-year-old President-elect inherits from Miguel Aleman of extensive powers, infinitely delicate problems and the opportunity to make Mexico the great democratic leader among Latin American countries.

Ruiz Cortines—more familiarly Don Adolfo—comes to power as the leader of the Institutional Revolutionary party, which has dominated Mexican politics since its birth in 1947.

Worked Underground

As a revolutionary, mild Ruiz Cortines more nearly resembles a commercial accountant—which is how he started out in life. His political roots stem from the time when, as a youth, he worked in the underground which successfully plotted the overthrow of Gen. Victoriano Huerta's dictatorship.

His party stands for a program of reforms and improvement of the lot of the common man.

Born in Vera Cruz in 1890, the son of a customs house agent, Ruiz Cortines comes close to being the middle class fulcrum between the illiterate peasant and the guided exploiters of the nation's resources.

Madero Assassinated

He never knew his father, who died when he was three. He interrupted his schooling at 16 to help support his widowed mother and sister. His first employment was as bookkeeper for a Vera Cruz textile merchant.

In 1911, when he was 21, he witnessed the departure into exile from Vera Cruz of old Gen. Porfirio Diaz, who had ruled Mexico for 30 years. Constitutional government returned later under President Francisco I. Madero.

Soon afterwards, Ruiz Cortines came to Mexico City to improve his fortunes. An ardent partisan of Mexico's democratic forms, he suffered bitter disillusionment when Madero was assassinated and General Huerta restored the dictatorship.

Rebellion was not long in breaking out in the provinces. In the capital Ruiz Cortines enlisted in the cause.

During the revolutionary period he became a paymaster in the Constitutional Army. From then grew his reputation as a meticulous fiscal administrator, which is one of his foremost political assets.

After restoration of constitutional government in 1914 Ruiz Cortines continued to serve in various Army administrative posts and then, at the age of 32, entered the civil service in the Department of Statistics. There for 11 years he followed in figures the flowering of the new-born Mexican Republic. Other administrative posts followed.

and, in 1944, he was elected governor of his native state of Vera Cruz.

Aleman Take Office

In many of these years he was the subordinate or associate of a young and dynamic lawyer-politician named Miguel Aleman.

When Aleman was chairman of the campaign which elected Gen. Manuel Avila Camacho to the presidency in 1940, he chose Ruiz Cortines as the campaign treasurer.

After Aleman was elected president in 1946, the ranking Cabinet post of secretary of interior became vacant through death. Ruiz Cortines was then governor of Vera Cruz. Aleman persuaded him to resign to enter the Cabinet.

In 1951, when the party assembled to pick its candidate to succeed Aleman, the President's bias-

ing made Ruiz Cortines the uncontested choice.

In a sense Ruiz Cortines knew that he had no need to work hard to win. The divided opposition, which practically speaking had no issue, was no match for his well organized and generally financed machine.

But the campaign served the candidate as part of his preparation for the presidency. Everywhere he went he studied the problems of the region and accumulated the background he would need to face the problems of the office.

If Ruiz Cortines lacks the buoyant and dominant personality of an Aleman, he has his own special brand of informal dignity. He is equally at home in an intimate group as he is in dealing with high-powered politicians.

His manner is friendly, but reserved. His smile is ready, but not flashy. His face is gaunt, almost cadaverous. His dark eyes invite confidence. His sense of humor verges on the ironic.

He drinks little—occasionally a mint julep, a popular beverage in his native port. He once smoked cigars regularly. Now he puffs cheap black tobacco cigarettes.

In foreign affairs, he can be expected to follow Mexico's policy of loyalty to Western ideals without submission to any outside influence, especially that of the United States.

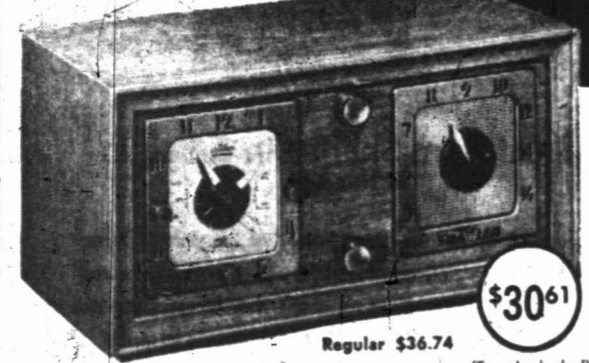

Fluid Lines Mark Coat Designs

NEW YORK—The first fur coats of Fall show a definite relationship to the fluidity of line found in a cloth coat. The fur is, in fact, cut and handled much like cloth, the result being fur fashions of greater elegance and higher fashion than we've seen in the past.

Lines range from the narrow and stem-like to the very full. There's a new narrowness at the top of the coat that does away with any feeling of heaviness or bulkiness. This narrow look is frequently achieved through dropped shoulderlines.

The wandering waistline appears in both high and low effects. The spencer cut is used at times for a coat bodice with the low middy line looking best in jackets.

The tulip line, shown in cloth coats, has also been adapted to fur and is done with slim top and low flare.

Sleeves are frequently dramatic. Some of them taper, others are full or pleated, still others are push-up but can be worn down to the wrist as well.

Leopard coat by Leo Ritter (left) has the narrow top, coupled with small shawl collar. Sleeves are fairly full and widely cuffed.

Slim, fitted coat in black broad-tail (right) by this same designer has waist cut with deep V, formed from a double collar. To create skirt fullness, double inverted pleats are used front and back. Sleeves have flaring, gauntlet cuffs.

Texan, Family Live In House Once Used By Chopin, Sand

FONTAINEBLEAU, FRANCE — A major known as a "typical Texan" is living near here in a house where Pianist Chopin once lived. Chopin lived in the house with the women writer—George Sand. The house was pictured, a little bit differently than it is in real life, in the Hollywood production about Chopin, with Cornel Wilde and Merle Oberon.

The Texan, Maj. Jack A. Whitley of Dallas, lives in the house with his wife, the former Mable Earnest Cooper of Colorado City, and their four children Mrs. Whitley is a niece of Mrs. Don Sivals of Midland, and has visited often in the Sivals home.

In addition to being a landmark in the village of Barbizon, which just oozes with artists and landmarks, the former George Sand-Chopin love nest reputedly is a "House of the Phantom," accord-

ing to Barbizon natives. "Several people have moved out because of this," said Mrs. Whitley. "Sometimes you hear rattling sounds, and you go there... and nothing is there," said the strong, six-foot Texan major. "It's something besides mice, we don't know what."

Regardless of a few ghosts around the place, Whitley was glad to have found the home. "You don't know how I searched for a house," he said. "The 'nice homes' in France have high ceilings and are hard to heat, he pointed out. The houses here are easier to heat and are not very nice. "You just have to decide what you want to sacrifice," he said.

Rent—40,000 francs. They pay 40,000 francs (about \$118 a month) for the house, known as L'Ombrage—"The Shade." Trees out front are often painted by the Barbizon painters. Robert Louis Stevenson once lived in the house next door.

That fact doesn't concern Major Whitley, however, nearly as much as a "monster" of a stove he has which devours coal like a toadless Chinese stocking does candy. "It's no trick at all to use a couple of tons of coal a month trying to keep warm in this old house," remarked Whitley.

Coal costs \$45 a ton. Whitley said the average Frenchman could not afford to buy coal like the American, and so the Frenchman "dressed for the cold weather." The major himself wasn't undressed. He had on a heavy tweed suit purchased in England, a red checked flannel shirt a wool sweater and his suit jacket. "The French will buy a sack of coal whereas we buy a ton," he continued.

The Whitley's light bill runs \$20 a month. They have two pianos, one upstairs and one downstairs. They think they might have been used by Chopin.

The Whitleys themselves are not inclined musically. Whitley plays nothing more classical than "Chopsticks."

Proud Of American Stove. Mrs. Whitley, daughter of Mrs. Stewart Cooper of Colorado City and also a niece of Joe Earnest, well-known lawyer in West Texas and former Columbia University professor, is much more proud of her American stove than she is of anything else in the former Chopin home.

"I don't see how the French turn out the food they do with the heating system they have," she remarked.

"Yet," her husband said, "I have never eaten a meal in France that wasn't delicious. The French know how to cook all right."

The Whitleys are famous hosts in Barbizon, known for their "Texas hospitality." One day 26 people came to call.

On such occasions, Mrs. Whitley, assisted by her Dutch maid, "Tricks," turns out American style sandwiches and other tid-bits, and the major drags down his XXX Stetson he keeps on a living room

cabinet, pulls on his cowboy boots (a present from Garland Lasater of Falfurrias) and bangs out something like "Chopsticks" on the Chopin piano.

"No wonder they say your house is haunted," a guest remarked. "Hearing that music, Chopin probably is haunting it!"

Efficient Discipline Mixes Justice With Tenderness

The Nelsons have a cottage near a deep lake. One morning seven-year-old Jimmy became very angry when he was told that he could not go swimming in it without a grown-up to go with him. He argued and teased and when he finally saw that his mother meant what she said, he lost his temper. He kicked the clean white door of his mother's new refrigerator and left great streaks of black on it from his rubber-soled shoes.

Then he ran out of the kitchen and slammed the door behind him. His mother put down her dish-towel and followed him out to the porch. "Come back into the kitchen and clean my icebox," she said. "I want it just as clean as it was when you kicked it."

"I'll leave it alone," said Jimmy. "I'm not going to clean any ice box. I'll just kick it again."

"Then you'll have to clean it again," said his mother. "Hurry up! Into the kitchen with you!"

In the kitchen, Jimmy snatched the cloth his mother offered and began to make angry passes at the black streaks. After watching him for a moment, his mother came over to him and said, "I'll take the two little streaks and you take that big smudge. Let's see who gets finished first."

This is efficient discipline. Why? Because it has fused justice with tenderness.

One of the hardest jobs we have as parents is getting clear on the relation of justice to love. Most of our discipline problems are due to confusion about this relationship.

On one hand, we are constantly told that "unquestioning love" is of prime importance to Jimmy. On the other hand, we are darkly warned of the danger of protecting him from unpleasant consequences of wrong action.

This is bewildering. How on earth can you give "unquestioning love" to a child at the same time you have to punish him?

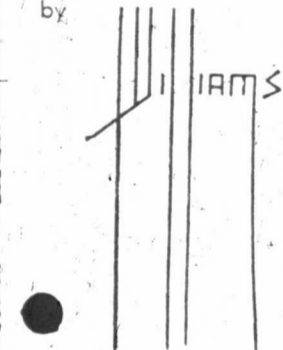
The idea that helped me get straight on this in my own mind was not given to me by a psychiatrist, but by an old lady whom I love.

Once she said to me: "My dear, the garden of Eden is guarded by two angels. One I think of as the representative of justice; the other as the representative of tenderness. Together, they stand guard over love. Without justice, tenderness is weakness. Without tenderness, justice is dictatorial."

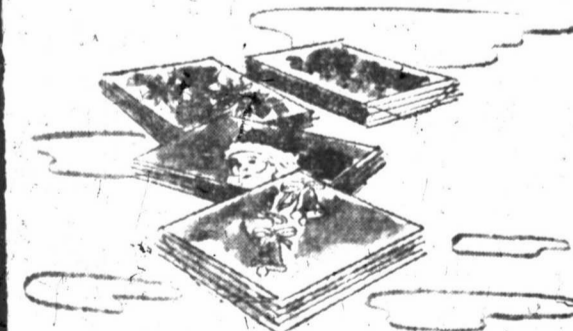
If we can make this idea our own, it will prove of immense support in situations such as Jimmy presented. Justice will force us to say, "Clean up what you have made dirty." Tenderness will enable us to help in the cleaning up of what has been made dirty.

It is this dual role of impersonal judge and loving personal parent that we find so bewildering.
