Spraberry Oil Flow Gauged In NE Dawson

Cities Service Oil Company No. 1-B J. B. Leverett, wildcat and indicated discovery from the Spraberry in Northeast Dawson County, flowed 150 barrels of oil, natural, in 25 hours on first production test.

Production came through perforations in casing at 7,690-7,726 feet. Operators were preparing to fracture the formation through that set of perforations.

Drilled to total depth of 11,900 feet in the Ellenburger, where salt water was found, the project was plugged back to 7,740 feet for completion in the Spraberry. A drillstem test in that section, when the project was being drilled, developed flowing oil at the rate of 12 barrels hourly.

The Spraberry was topped at 7,430 feet, datum minus 4,363 feet. Location is 1,990 feet from south and west lines of section 3, block 4, D. L. Cunningham survey.

Phillips Project In Ector Sector Indicates Opener

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1-C Millard, project to test the Ellenburger in the Penwell (multipar) area of Central-South Ector County, has indicated as a discovery the Giorieta.

Operator took a drillstem test in the interval from 5,110 to 5,310 feet. Tool was open 180 minutes. Gas surfaced in four minutes and mud in 45 minutes. Oil surfaced in 55 minutes. It was flowed to pits to clean 65 minutes and then turned to tanks.

During one hour it made 33.1 barrels of oil and 3.74 barrels of salt water and 1.87 barrels of mud.

Gravity of the oil was 36.1 degrees and flowing pressure 1,375 pounds. Shut-in pressure after 15 minutes was 2,125 pounds.

More hole was being made below 5,382 feet.

Pure Will Drill Deep Wildcat In Central Lea Area

Five miles west of the town of Lovington and in Central Lea County, N. M., The Pure Oil Company spotted location for a 14,000-foot wildcat.

It will be drilled as No. 1-B State-Lea.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 10-16-35E. Operations are to start at once.

Humble Gets 45 BOPH In Devonian A-Y&A Project

Humble Oil & Refining Company has developed a strong prospect for commercial production from the Devonian at its No. 32 Yarborough & Allen, dated Ellenburger exploration on the southwest side of the Yarborough & Allen field in Southwest Ector County.

Other wells in that region have shown possibilities of producing from the Devonian. However none of those shows have been of the magnitude of that developed in the Humble No. 32 Yarborough & Allen.

Up to now no effort has been made to complete any of the wells in that region from the Devonian.

Humble No. 32 Yarborough & Allen took a drillstem test in the Devonian at 8,318-87 feet. The tool was open three hours. Gas surfaced in 15 minutes.

No fluid came to the surface while the tester was open. Recovery was 7,500 feet of pipe line oil and 1.5 feet of drilling mud. There were no shows of formation water.

Operator representatives calculate that the 7,500 feet of oil represented a fluid fill up in the pipe of 45 barrels of oil per hour.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was from 175 pounds to 725 (Continued On Page 12)

Fog Curtain Again Provides Unexpected Terminal Guests

Old Man Weather, operating with thundershowers behind a curtain of fog in the eastern section of the state, sent another 60 unexpected guests to Midland Air Terminal Wednesday night.

They were the passengers on three flights of American Airlines planes, which had to skip scheduled landings at Dallas or Fort Worth and slip in to the Midland airport instead.

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It was the second night of such operations and Woody Campbell, American Airlines agent in Midland, was busy half the night finding accommodations for the stranded passengers in hotels and tourist courts.

Front Clears Thursday

"The front cleared away in a hurry, though," Campbell reported Thursday, "and we were able to clear all our passengers out of here by 8:30 this morning."

One of the flights was a DC-6 out of New York and bound for Dallas. It came on to Midland instead, as did a Convair flight originating from Boston.

An east bound flight, scheduled to stop in Dallas, unloaded its Dallas passengers in Midland, instead, and flew direct to Memphis.

One scheduled flight to Nashville, via Fort Worth, was cancelled.

Pioneer Air Lines reported one westbound flight out of Dallas was delayed one hour Thursday morning.

by the weather but operations were back to normal by 11 a.m.

Midland and the rest of West Texas had fair skies as the front slipped across Texas and into Louisiana.

Fog still lay heavy from the Louisiana border to Tyler and Longview. West of those points, ceilings began to lift over fog-locked airports.

Violent Thunderstorm

The front had shrouded the eastern half of Texas with mist and drizzle for three days. It's tail had whipped up a violent windstorm in the Huntsville area as it began dragging across the Texas-Louisiana border Wednesday night.

The U. S. Weather Bureau said early Thursday thundershowers east of a line drawn through Corpus Christi, Lufkin and Shreveport, La., might become "locally severe."

The only Texas thundershowers reported at mid-morning were at Orange and Beaumont. Tyler's airport still was fogged in.

West Texas skies were fair. Temperatures ranged from 27 at El Paso to 66 at Brownsville.

The high winds Wednesday night leveled all buildings on a farm near Huntsville, injured three persons and knocked out all power and telephone communications at Eastham Prison Farm.

Oil Men May Join Hunt For Uranium

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—At the request of the Atomic Energy Commission, the oil industry is developing a plan to hunt for scarce and vital uranium at the same time it looks for oil.

The plan, announced Thursday by Curtis H. Johnson, president of the Society of Exploration Geophysicists, now is being presented to oil companies as a business proposition with potential profits.

The plan is based on this fact: The principal obstacle to discovering new supplies of uranium—the raw material of atomic energy—is the limited range of detection instruments.

"Six inches of earth lying over a uranium deposit cuts in half the chances of its ever being discovered," Johnson said. "And there's only one-thousandth as much chance if there's another four feet of soil on top of the radioactive deposit."

The oil industry has 10,000 scientifically trained men exploring for crude oil. They drill more than 4,000 shallow test holes each day in the U. S. and Canada. The holes average 75 to 100 feet in depth and are used for seismic testing of underground structures.

Under the plan, material excavated from these holes will be tested for radioactivity by special crews, working with seismographic crews.

Morris died Thursday in a Beaumont hospital. He was caught between the exploding unit and another part of the refinery when the blast occurred and his clothes burned from his body.

Nine UN Employees Get Lie Ultimatum To Talk Or Resign

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.—(AP)—Secretary-General Trygve Lie was reported reliably Thursday to have informed nine U. S. members of the UN Secretariat they must answer questions about alleged subversive activities by nightfall or lose their jobs.

The nine persons involved already are under suspension for refusing to tell the McCarran subcommittee whether they are now or ever have been members of the Communist Party.

Informed quarters said Lie's ultimatum went to the nine last Monday. They were told that the Secretary-General's Committee of International Jurists recommended dismissal of American members of the secretariat who refused to answer questions about alleged subversive activities on the constitutional ground that such answers might tend to incriminate them.

Wage Boss Quits As Truman Gives Miners Pay Hike

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman's wage board chairman quit his job Thursday in protest over the President's approval of an extra wage boost for coal miners above and beyond the recommendations of all top defense agency officials.

Archibald Cox, chairman of the Wage Stabilization Board, waited only overnight to resign. He made no formal statement.

The President Wednesday approved the full \$1.90 daily wage increase for John L. Lewis' 375,000 soft coal miners because, he said, he does not want President-elect Eisenhower to have a coal strike crisis on his hands when he takes office.

The move averted an almost certain strike, but it opened the door to a boost in coal prices to consumers.

One WSB member said Truman's decision would have a "terrific and disappointing effect" on unions, which in the past have accepted WSB reductions and now have wage cases pending before the board.

Coal miners themselves—whose basic minimum daily wage is boosted to \$18.25—reportedly were jubilant One top United Mine Workers official at Pittsburgh said the move "undoubtedly averted a strike."

John Busarello, president of UMW District 5, said his men had been getting "tippy" over delays.

Lewis had negotiated the \$1.90 increase with the industry, but the WSB had cut this to \$1.50 on the grounds that any more would "irreparably damage" the stabilization program.

Truman's decision to grant the full \$1.90, announced in the form of a letter to Economic Stabilizer Roger Putnam, said the "probable consequences" of a failure to do so would be a disastrous coal strike which would create a "crisis" for Eisenhower.

Putnam, announcing the President's decision to newsmen, said: "This is not the decision I would have made. It is not the decision I would have recommended."

HOLIDAY BIRD GOES PLEBEIAN

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Turkey may be a once-or-twice-a-year dish to most Americans but the 10 million children benefiting under the government-sponsored school lunch program may get it a dozen times this school year.

The Agriculture Department has bought about 46 million pounds of frozen, ready-to-cook turkey since last August to help support producer prices and is turning the fowl over to the school lunch program.

Officials estimated turkey will be on the school lunch menus at least 12 times this school year.

Bandit Slain, Buddy Jailed As Holdup Attempt Misfires

AMARILLO—(AP)—Potter County officers told Thursday of an attempted hold-up by two youthful hitchhikers that ended in death for one and armed robbery charges against the survivor.

The attempted robbery backfired Wednesday night when the intended victim, Daniel Franco, 39, decided to fight rather than be robbed by two young men he said he picked up at Edgewood, N. M.

The dead man was identified as Roland Marion, 23, Laramie, Wyo. The other would-be robber told officers he is Robert Samuel Franks, 22, Dove, N. J., AWOL from Chamute Field, Ill. District Attorney Hermon Pipkin said armed robbery charges would be filed against Franks immediately.

Franks is a U. S. Corps of Engineers employe, enroute from his former home in San Francisco to Richmond, Va.

Searched At Gunpoint

Potter County sheriff's officers said Marion was killed when hit in the chest by a bullet fired when a pistol in the hand of Franks discharged in a scuffle.

Franks told officers the two men forced him to drive onto a country lane Wednesday night and then searched him at gunpoint.

When he produced only travelers checks, he said, one of the men suggested they drive to another spot where a more thorough search could be made.

About a mile east of Bushland, Texas, on U. S. Highway 66, Franco grabbed at Franks' gun while the latter attempted to drive and hold the weapon at the same time. The

Demo Deficit Is Top Worry Of Party Boss

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Adlai Stevenson said Thursday he and President Truman are in complete agreement not to wage war on Dwight Eisenhower's program simply for party advantage.

And, he told reporters at a White House news conference, the Democratic Party's two major problems are: (1) to wipe out a deficit of more than half a billion dollars and (2) to "serve the public interest."

Stevenson spoke to newsmen after conferring with President Truman at the White House, the Washington residence for which he bid in his unsuccessful campaign for the presidency.

He made no major pronouncements at the news conference, but chatted amiably with reporters who pried him with questions about his political future and that of the Democratic Party.

The Illinois governor did say these things:

1. He has no immediate plans for the future other than to take a long rest and possibly to travel abroad.
2. He knows of no plans for a change in the top leadership of the Democratic National Committee, but it may be necessary to reorganize the committee structure because of the deficit in funds.
3. He added that he expects his hand-picked national chairman, Stephen A. Mitchell, to stay on in the job.

It is up to the Democratic leadership in Congress to serve as "the instrument of being constructive and a wholesome influence in our public life," Stevenson said.

He sidestepped a question of whether he thought there were enough Democrats in Congress sharing his and the President's views to "exert much leadership" in the new Congress.

Stevenson said he didn't want to venture an opinion on that.

"The President and I are in agreement," Stevenson said, "that the party interests must be subordinated to the interests of the country and public welfare." He added:

"We do not intend to try to influence Democrats in Congress to obstruct, delay or in any way imperil the national welfare and the new Administration's program in so far as it is compatible with the views of our party.

"The instrument of being constructive and a wholesome influence in our public life, will, of course, be the Democratic leadership in Congress."

Stevenson said he, President Truman, and other Democrats outside (Continued On Page 12)

Grand Jury Begins Study Of Findings In Lattimore Probe

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A federal grand jury began sifting evidence Thursday in an effort to decide whether to indict the much-investigated Far Eastern expert, Owen Lattimore, on a charge of perjury.

The Justice Department turned over Thursday afternoon a voluminous file on Congressional investigation of Lattimore, who has been described by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) as the chief Soviet spy in the United States.

Lattimore, one-time advisor to the State Department and former consultant to the controversial Institute of Pacific Relations (IPR), is a lecturer at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore; He has denied vigorously the charges made by McCarthy in 1950, charges that set off a flock of Congressional hearings.

Texas Water Panel Perfects Program

AUSTIN—(AP)—Four key subcommittees from Gov. Allan Shivers' State-wide Water Committee met here Thursday to coordinate a program to recommend to the next Legislature.

Chairman of the panels participating are Guy C. Jackson, Anahuac; Victor Bouldin, Houston; J. S. Bridwell, Wichita Falls, and Mason Lockwood, Houston.

The Steering Committee will meet here December 11 to review the program before it goes before another meeting of the full committee and then on to the governor and Legislature.

Police Hunt Young Nephew Of Once-Notorious Bandit

HOUSTON—(AP)—Texas police were hunting Thursday for a nephew of Raymond Hamilton, pistol brandishing, draggart killer of the turbulent 1930's.

The kinsmen of the old desperado who finally died in the state's electric chair was charged Wednesday night with the \$14,668 robbery of a Houston jewelry store.

Homicide Lt. Frank Murray of Houston cautioned police here that the fugitive—Raymond Fairris, 20—"might run wild like his Uncle Ray."

A state-wide broadcast was made for Fairris' arrest with the warning that he is armed with a .32 caliber revolver and "is dangerous."

Charged as Fairris' accomplice was a young woman, Joyce O'Neil. Fairris was paroled September 15 from a Kansas reformatory.

Hamilton was electrocuted for murder in 1935 after a series of

bold robberies and gun battles. He was at one time a lieutenant of equally notorious Clyde Barrow and his moll, Bonnie Parker.

Hamilton was awaiting execution at the time Barrow and his gun-toting, cigar-smoking girlfriend were ambushed and killed by officers. Conjecture at the time was that Hamilton tipped police of Barrow's whereabouts in an effort to win reprieve, but this never was confirmed.

Identified As Robber

Fairris is the son of Hamilton's sister, 34-year-old Mrs. Margie Zegien, who herself is free on appeal bond from a five-year prison sentence for killing her husband, Michael Zegien. She already had been no-billed in Fort Worth for the slaying of a previous husband. She told the court both men were killed with the same gun.

Police described Fairris as blond, blue-eyed, five feet, seven inches tall and 135 pounds in weight.

Texans Indicted In Shotgun Slaying

GULFPORT, MISS., (AP)—Two Texans are under indictment for murder here in the pre-dawn shotgun slaying of Lonnie Russ, alias Frank (Blackie) Slaven, 46.

The indictments returned Wednesday by a county grand jury named Charlie Archer, 43, Houston, and Jim Holloman, 30, Dallas.

Russ was found lying on the front steps of a tourist court at Mississippi City, about three miles east of Gulfport, August 21.

Holloman with two other persons was arrested several days later in Athens, Ga., and Archer, with his wife, was arrested last month in Phoenix, Ariz.

Archer told Gulfport officers he was an occupant of an automobile when leaving the tourist court shortly before Russ' body was discovered.

Freedom For Tunis Replaces War Issue In UN Debate Arena

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.—(AP)—The UN's Assembly's 60-nation Political Committee, weary from its long debate on Korea, turned Thursday to another bitter dispute—over Tunisian demands for independence.

Winding up consideration for the moment of the Korean problem, the Assembly Wednesday entrusted its president, Lester Pearson of Canada, with the task of sending the overwhelmingly approved Indian peace plan to Red China and North Korea.

Although the delegates couched with it a plea for quick acceptance by the P'nyong and P'iping governments, little hope was held that the two Red nations would okay the proposal to let the UN eventually take over prisoners of war who refuse to go home—sole issue blocking peace talks at Panmunjom. Both governments as well as Russia already have condemned the plan.

The Tunisian question—second item on the Political Committee's agenda—is the first of two moves aimed at French colonial rule by the Asian-Arab bloc on the committee. The second will be a drive supporting independence for Morocco.

Both problems were forced on the agenda over die-hard French opposition and both promise to drag out in bitter wrangling. France has maintained angrily that her administration of both North African protectorates is her own internal business and of no concern of the UN.

The Arab-Asian bloc resolution on Tunisia contends France is ignoring human and political rights in that country. It demands that France restore civil liberties and resume negotiations with Tunisian nationalists under a three-member UN good offices committee.

The debates on Tunisia and Morocco may strain French-American relations. The United States voted to put both questions up for debate, but thus far has given no indication of what its final attitude would be. Britain has said it would support France.

Burglar Absconds With Sinatra Gems

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—Mrs. Nancy Sinatra, divorced wife of singer Frank Sinatra, reported Wednesday night to West Los Angeles police that about \$30,000 worth of her jewels are missing from her home.

She said there was no sign of the house having been entered. She had been away from home for a short time, she said, and the jewels, including a diamond ring, necklace and bracelet, were missing from their customary place in the house when she went to look for them.

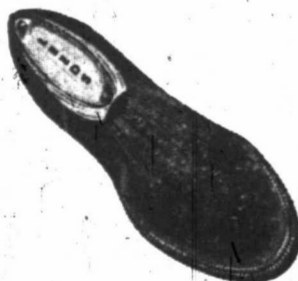

Grandma Tells FBI She'll Rob Two More Banks, Quit

LOS ANGELES—(P)—A letter from Grandma says she plans to rob a couple more banks. The gun-toting old gal figures that will set her soldier son, now in Korea, up in business when he gets home. During the last seven weeks, Grandma had held up three banks and escaped with about \$4,000. An agent of the FBI reported receipt of a letter Wednesday and expressed a view that it's authentic.

He declined to release the text, but said Grandma announced plans to rob two more banks—she didn't say when or where—and then retire from banditry. The FBI agent said many letters have been received in the Grandma case, but all others have been discarded as false. In this one, the writer says she really is a grandma—the tag given her when victims described the gunman as a small, wrinkled old woman.

Casualty Reports Revised To Escape Misleading Phrase

WASHINGTON—(P)—Because people apparently think a casualty is a fatality, the Defense Department says it no longer lists all men killed, wounded or missing in Korea as "casualties." The Pentagon announcement Wednesday said its weekly battle report will continue to show totals for dead, wounded and missing but will not total them up and list them as casualties. Most reporters, however, continued to use the old form in tabulating latest Korean losses, announced Wednesday. Through last Friday, next of kin have been notified of 127,383 American casualties in Korea, an increase of 386 in a week. This total includes 30,004 killed, 94,367 wounded and 13,012 missing.

Jealous Woman Dies Trying To Check On Husband, 77

MANCHESTER, ENGLAND—(P)—Harry and Elizabeth Ainscow, both 77, had been happily married more than 50 years. There were the usual quarrels, of course, for Mrs. Ainscow was a bit jealous, as all women are. The other night the wife had just retired to her bedroom upstairs and Ainscow was waiting to hear the end of a symphony concert on the radio. "Who has come in? I can hear a woman's voice," the wife called from upstairs. The husband, who had risen from his easy chair to go to bed, called back, "No one, dear." A few moments later he heard a thud. At the bottom of the stairs was his wife, dead. At a coroner's inquest, the husband said she must have been

hurrying down to see if there was another woman when she stumbled and fell. "Why she should be so suspicious about such a very old man I cannot understand," said the coroner in giving a verdict of accidental death. "So great was her haste to investigate this 'strange woman's voice that she did not trouble even to put on her slippers." The female voice was that of a woman radio announcer.

McKay Expects To Be Target Of Brickbats In Washington

The most important St. Louis player involved was Nieman, 25, a rookie sensation with a .289 batting average, 18 homers and 74 runs batted in. The right-handed hitter hit two straight homers against Boston in his major league debut, Sept. 14, 1951.

Bonus Received
Porter, used both as a catcher and outfielder, received a \$65,000 bonus from the Chicago White Sox as a free agent when he entered pro ball. Last season the 19-year-old prospect hit .250 for the Browns after spending most of the season at Memphis and Colorado Springs, two White Sox farms.

The Tigers will have to wait a week or so for Friend, 25, to be discharged from military service. He was the Browns' regular second baseman in 1950, hitting .237 in 119 games.

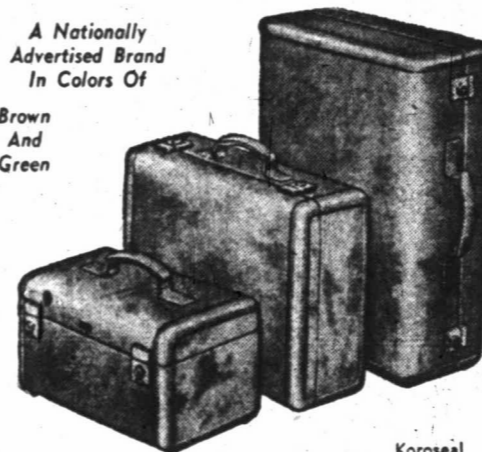

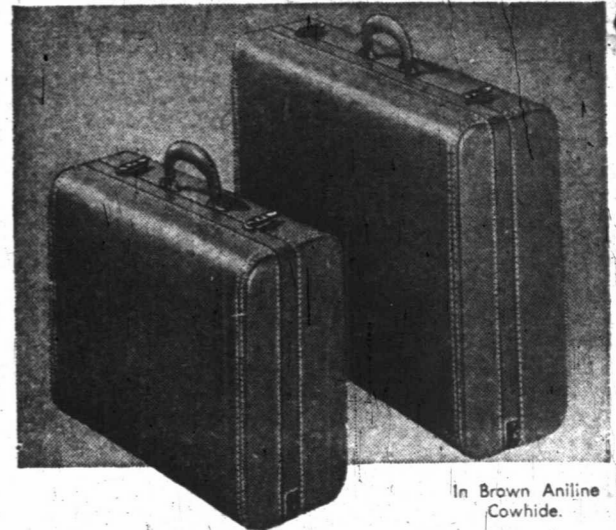

Solons Open Probe To Survey Houston's High Murder Record

HOUSTON—(AP)—The state's House Crime Investigating Committee probably will recommend establishment of a state narcotic bureau during the 1953 Legislature, a representative said Wednesday night.

The committee, meanwhile, opened a two-day closed hearing here Thursday morning.

Rep. Charles Murphy, a Houston attorney, said the committee will be interested in exploring reasons for the high murder rate in Houston but also will investigate juvenile delinquency, gambling, nar-

cotics and vice in general.

Police records here show that 525 persons were murdered in Houston between Jan. 1, 1948, and last November 30. Of the total, 118 were slain in the 11-months period ending November 30.

Murphy, who will serve as temporary chairman of the crime committee, said he expected about 17 witnesses to testify at the closed hearings. Reports will be given newspapermen twice daily, he said, around noon and about 5 p.m.

Blaze Wipes Out Family Of Seven

YOUNGSTOWN, OHIO—(AP)—Firemen Thursday blamed leaking propane gas for a raging fire that flashed through a frame dwelling and wiped out a family of seven.

Assistant Fire Chief Frank Lehnerd said the gas, used for cooking, probably overcame all of the victims before the fire broke out Wednesday night.

Killed were Henry Tochman, 34, a bakery route salesman; his wife Catherine, 32; and their five children, Henry, Jr., 13; Patricia, 10; Carol, eight; Mary Grace, four, and Jo Ann, two.

Their one-story house just northeast of this city was burned to the ground.

Bodies of the father and mother were found in the living room. They were believed to have been watching television when the fire started around 11:15 p.m. Four of

the children were in beds in two bedrooms.

The other child, Mary Grace, was taken alive from the fiery dwelling by a neighbor, but was dead when she arrived at a hospital.

Baby Carried Out
Emil Sotkovsky, 27, summoned by Mrs. Ann Sudon, a neighbor who saw the flames, dashed out of his house to carry the one child from the burning home. Clad only in his underwear and without shoes, he raced across an open field, donning his pants on the way.

"The smoke was so dense I couldn't see anything," Sotkovsky said. "So I started to feel around and I felt a baby crib and a baby huddled in a corner. I picked up handed it to Mrs. Sudon.

"I tried to go back into the house, but the fire and smoke kept me out this time."

Midlanders Not Receiving Yuie Seals Urged To Call

Reports on progress of the Christmas Seal sale campaign were made by officials at a meeting of the board of directors of the Midland County Tuberculosis Association Tuesday night.

Joe I. O'Neill, chairman, said a large number of Christmas Seal letters have been returned undelivered in Midland because of an out-of-date address. He pointed out that many Midland residents who did not receive a letter, either have telephoned the tuberculosis association office asking that seals be mailed them, or have purchased seals at the office.

O'Neill urged new residents, and others who may not have received Christmas Seals through the mail, to join in the fight against tuberculosis in Midland by buying and using Christmas Seals. He said seals will be mailed promptly to anyone calling the tuberculosis association office requesting them.

The telephone number is 2-3211. Mrs. Annie Ford was appointed chairman of the school sales program, conducted annually by the association in conjunction with the Christmas Seal sale. Through purchase of attractive little pins in

the likeness of Santa Claus or the TB symbol of the Double-Barred Cross, school children are given the chance to contribute small sums toward the fight against tuberculosis.

A report on the use of film strips in explaining tuberculosis to school children was given by Mrs. Lucy Mashburn, secretary of the TB association and in charge of the health education program sponsored by the association.

Mrs. John Hills was appointed by the board to head the retail sales phase of the current fund-raising drive.

Announcement was made that two new patients from Midland were admitted to the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium during the last week.

Midlanders Avoid Trinkets Made In Communist Nations

Midland variety stores are selling about 15 per cent foreign-made Christmas ornaments, but only a handful of the ornaments are made in a Russian-occupied country, a survey revealed Thursday.

The survey was made after Senator Wiley of Wisconsin charged that "Iron Curtain countries" in one of their most diabolic conspiracies are flooding the United States with Christmas tree ornaments, and the money goes back to buy bullets to kill our sons.

According to the Midland survey, about 15 per cent of the ornaments were marked "made in Germany"

and "made in Japan." What part of Germany—partly controlled by the Communists—was not specified, but store managers were at the opinion that the German products were made in the United States sector.

One novelty store manager said that German products were on market because their ornaments are more detailed and delicately made, and that a United States manufacturer would not afford the time or

cost for such kind of a project. He said the average Japanese product sells for about 10 cents cheaper on every 30-cent product.

Customers Shy Away

Only one major store in Midland is carrying tree ornaments made in Russian-Dominated Poland, and that store has about \$20 worth in its stock. Each ornament sells for 10 cents.

"I don't expect to sell many of them," said the store manager.

"About 50 per cent of the people always pick up an article and if it comes from some foreign country they don't want to buy it—even if you almost give it away."

"My opinion on foreign merchandise—like stuff from Japan and Germany, not from Red nations—is that it would be better for the United States to buy their stuff than donating money to them outright with nothing in return," he reasoned.

Ned H. Dearborn, council president, says that if every American will join this Christmas savings plan before the holidays, a real Christmas bonus—human life—will be paid.

The campaign already has been joined by more than 160 national organizations and by city and state public officials and civic leaders. They are uniting in creating an awareness of the special holiday hazards—attempting to enlist the voluntary cooperation of every American to hold accidents to a minimum this Christmas.

Residents of Midland and other West Texas cities should interest themselves in this savings program to assure a safe and Merry Christmas in our city and section. It is something to think about! It is a wise investment!

The year-end holiday season is the most dangerous period of the year, according to the Safety Council, and accidents annually mar Christmas celebrations in thousands of homes. Traffic accident deaths are almost twice as high on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day as the annual daily average. A total of 351 traffic deaths was reported during the four-day Christmas weekend last year. That figure can and must be reduced this year.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

 Drew Pearson says: Syngman Rhee puts Eisenhower on political hot spot; President-elect will be hailed as liberator; Korean leader continues long battle for country's survival.

WASHINGTON — Politics is not supposed to be on the agenda of General Eisenhower's Korean trip. But the first person he will meet in Korea is glib, cantankerous President Syngman Rhee, hero to millions, despot to a few, and the man who has kept the light of Korean independence burning for half a century.

And President Syngman Rhee has seen to it, well in advance of the President's visit, that he is pit on the political hot spot. For Rhee has told the people of Korea that Eisenhower has come to liberate their country.

Thus any compromise Eisenhower may propose, or anything he does short of a drive into North Korea up to the banks of the Yalu River, leaves disappointment and a serious morale problem in his wake.

He has spent seven years in prison, seven months under constant torture, 41 years in exile, has had a \$300,000 price on his head and probably has fought longer to bring self-government to at least one rocky, isolated portion of the Orient than any other man living today.

Rhee is Exile. I knew Rhee when he lived in Exile in Washington, president of the so-called "Korean Republic" then under the emperor of Japan, and which no one thought ever could be free again—no one, that is except Rhee.

The president in exile, gnarled, aged even then, had come to this country at the age of 27 during the Portsmouth conference which settled the war between Russia and Japan. And, although he was arrested personally by President Theodore Roosevelt, the Russo-Japanese Treaty, when it emerged, contained, as Article I, a provision for turning Korea over to Japan. At that time, we did not consider the rights of small nations important.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

When today's hand was played, South found an easy way to lose his game contract. It was so easy, in fact, that South still doesn't know that he could (and should) have made the game.

Just for the fun of it see if you can discover where South went wrong in the play of today's hand. Who can tell you might hold this type of hand the next time you play bridge.

South won the first trick in dummy with the ace of spades and drew three rounds of trumps. He then led a low club from his hand and ducked completely in the dummy.

East won with the nine of clubs and was unkind enough to return the pack of diamonds. The defender therefore took three diamonds, a club, and a spade, defeating the contract before South could get well started.

Have you spotted South's error? If not, look at the hand closely to find the correct line of play before you read on.

South was on the right track until he played the first card from dummy. Then, unfortunately, he went wrong.

The correct play is to let West lead the first trick with the king of spades. If West shifts to clubs, (the best defense) dummy wins with the king of clubs, and South enters his hand with the ace of hearts in order to lead the jack of spades. West naturally plays the queen of spades, and dummy plays low again!

West leads another club, still trying to get the lead to his partner, and dummy rises to take the trick with the ace of clubs. The ace of spades is now cashed, and South discards his last club. Now declarer can ruff a club with a high trump, draw trumps ending in the dummy, and run two established clubs to discard two low diamonds from his own hand.

The whole idea of the hand is to establish dummy's club, without allowing East to gain the lead. The method is to give West an undesired spade trick in order to rob East of a "natural" club trick. Fair exchange is no robbery.

Forrestal's Briefing Handbook Is Godsend To New President

WASHINGTON—The three-volume, top-secret briefing handbook which President Truman turned over to President-elect Eisenhower is a document unique in American history. Nothing like it ever has existed before.

The most important section summarizes U. S. relations with every country in the world. It attempts to explain past and present U. S. associations with them, plus the goals which the Truman administration, at least, was trying to achieve through those associations.

The man who deserves full credit for the existence of this remarkable section of the handbook is the late secretary of Defense, James Forrestal. He was the first man to be given the new defense job and it fell to him to start building the new department from the ground up.

A brand new concept and organization created in the Defense Act was the National Security Council. Members include the President, key Cabinet officials and the joint chiefs of staff. Big task of the NSC is to coordinate the defense policy of the nation.

At one of its first meetings Forrestal suggested that the council should get from the State Department as soon as possible a country-by-country summary of U. S. foreign policy. He said that with U. S. troops spread all over the world for the first time in its peace-time history this information was necessary for any sensible, long-range, post-war planning.

No Document Like It. Gen. George C. Marshall was secretary of State at that time and promised Forrestal that he would try to locate such a document and give it to the NSC. But Marshall was forced to admit later that nothing like it existed.

Forrestal's project is its tremendous value to Eisenhower right now. In a few hours he will be able to learn what otherwise might have taken him months of study to absorb. It gives him a chance to make concise, intelligent changes in goals, too, if he wants to.

Further proof of its value is the fact that some of the top men in the State and Defense Departments have been assigned to keep it current.

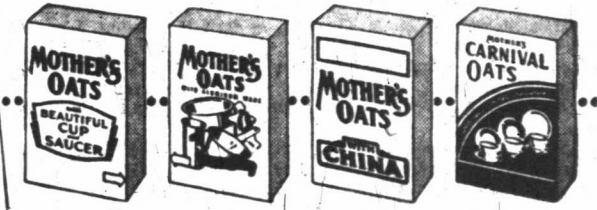

Men At Anchor Market Get Odd Queries, Find Answers

The middle-aged man entered 401

North Fort Worth Street and made a request.

"I want to buy a live 30-pound fish," the man requested. "I have a bet on. Is it true that if you have a bucket on a scale and put 30 pounds of water into it—and then add a 30 pound live fish—the scale will still register only 30 pounds?"

This may be a rare request to Fred E. Arnett and Marvin Holley who own the Anchor Fish Market, but it is all part of their fish business. They operate the biggest wholesale and retail fish business in Midland—but in this case they couldn't locate a 30 pound live fish. "We deal mostly with dead fish," Arnett said Thursday. "We can get you any dead fish you want."

Trout From Denmark
That must be so, because at the fish market customers see perch and rainbow trout from Denmark ("those fish run too high a price in Colorado"), lobster tails from South Africa at \$1.57 a pound, and salmon and halibut from the Alaskan waters.

"I own an airplane," says Arnett, "and no place is too far for us to locate a fish providing we get paid for it." Arnett says his most frequent trip is to Dallas. "For \$14 worth of gas and oil, I can make the trip cheaper than by auto."

Frog legs, at \$2.25 a pound, are Arnett and Holley's most expensive item. They are imported from Japan. "And to think when we were kids in East Texas, we just took them off a frog for the fun of it," they remember. The largest selling fish in Texas, they state, is the

freshwater catfish. "We are trying to change the people's habits in this respect," states Arnett. "We feel that salt water fish are better buys and even cleaner, and we'd like the public to realize this."

Shipments come in six times a week. Railway Express is used generally. While air freight companies won't take the liability of spoiled fish, the Railway Express does.

Quits Beef Business
"My wife, Pat, laughed when I told her I was quitting the beef business for the fish business," says Arnett. "She thought we'd have to eat all the fish ourselves because we won't sell any. But now we're all fish conscious. We spent our whole two weeks vacation this year fishing in Southern California. My six-year-old daughter caught a crab, got scared stiff and dropped fishing pole and all in the water. I admit I went on the trip to get away from my fish market while."

There are many humorous instances to the fish business—like, for instance, the two bearded fishermen who came into their place of business.

"The two men had spent a considerable sum of money on an out-of-town fishing trip. But they meekly came into our place and asked for eight pounds of catfish so they'd bring home something."

Often wives come into their place and get a few pounds of fish, remarking: "Our husband is off on another one of his fishing trips and I know he'll be fish-hungry when he comes back."

Good Health Food
Arnett, 28, says fish are high in protein and "awful good for people with high blood pressure."

He says the prettiest fish he sells looks like a gold fish—only bigger—and is called a red snapper.

He has a special way of telling whether a lobster is fit to eat. He turns each lobster over on its back. If the lobster goes right side up again, it is good eating.

Arnett's favorite eating is fried oyster and oyster stew. "We handle them alive. You open the shell—which kills them—and then you eat them."

But Arnett's partner had the last word. "This is the cheapest place to catch fish," he advised. "All the bait you need is a little silver."

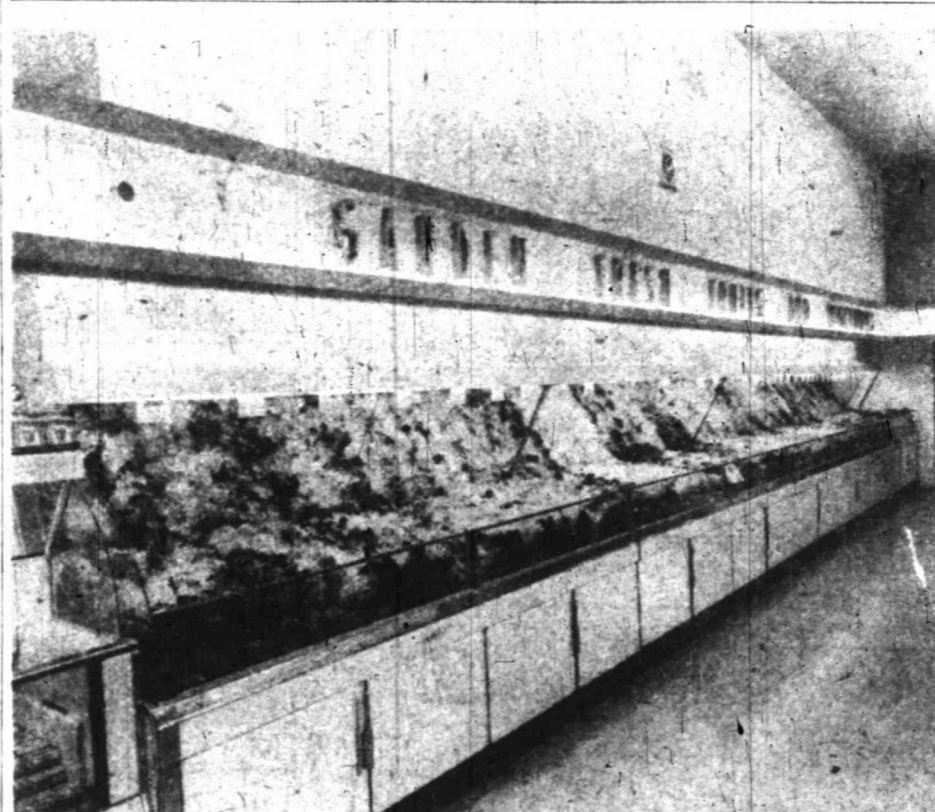
