So went the battlecry of World War II. Sunday, 11 years after the surprise Japanese attack, Americans are still remembering In a statement on the eve of the eleventh anniversary, President Truman remembered-and warned that another surprise attack "can happen again."

"Because of the immense destructive power of the atomic bomb we must maintain vigilance so that our cities and our industries will be less vulnerable to devastating attack," he said.

The President called on Americans to join up as volu

President-Elect Eisenhower also noted the anniversary and said message, released in New York, "Never again must America be weak or unaware."

"Tonight, more than any other time of the year, Americans should remember the stern penalty for failure to be alert and strong because on this night just 11 years ago, too many of us slept too soundly, and at dawn the enemy struck us a crippling blow at Pearl

Phillips Is Planning To Start Operation Of **Employes Thrift Plan**

Phillips Petroleum Company employes received an announcement Saturday from K. S. Adams, chairman, and Paul Endacott, president, that plans were being made to offer a Thrift Plan under which regular savings from their earnings would be supplemented by company contributions.

The announcement said, "The primary objectives of this plan are o encourage and provide a means systematic savings for long nge purposes, and to provide an ncentive opportunity whereby additional contributions may be made to the employe's account by the company.

Subject To Approval

It was pointed out that the proposed plan is subject to approval by the stockholders at the next annual meeting on April 28, 1953, as well as certain governmental agencies. If necessary clearance and approvals are granted, the company hopes to place the plan in effect by July 1, 1953.

Employes participating in the company's retirement income plan are eligible for the new thrift plan and may deposit up to five per cent of their regular wages or salaries. by payroll deductions.

Phillips will make a minimum contribution to each employe's acount in the amount of one dollar each two dollars deposited by he employe. 
