CINCINNATI—(AP)—Mrs. Aileen Klierim, for all of her 51 years an ardent Democrat, gave President Truman the brushoff Sunday.

The plant-sized news vendor at Cincinnati's Union Terminal didn't mean to—she just didn't recognize the little gray man who handed her a dollar in payment for a newspaper.

"You won't be able to spend that dollar, ma'am," he told her.

Mrs. Klierim was busy. She peered at the bill and shrugged.

"I'd like to have a mint full of them, if that's what you mean,"

she said, and turned back to her work.

Later she looked at the bill and screamed: "Oh, my God, that wasn't really him!"

But she knew it was. Across one side of the bill was the signature "Harry Truman."

The President's train stopped briefly at Cincinnati. He was on his way to Independence, Mo., for the funeral of Mrs. Truman's mother, Mrs. David W. Wallace.

New Lens Offers Hope To Nation's Near-Blind Persons

BANGOR, MAINE—(AP)—The development of a clear-image lens described as capable of giving vision to about half the estimated 150,000 partially blind persons in the United States was announced Sunday night by Dr. William Feinbloom of Columbia University.

He said the new lenses can be worn like ordinary glasses and described them as actually consisting of two or three lenses set about one-eighth of an inch apart with a total thickness of about seven-sixteenths of an inch.

Dr. Feinbloom told the Main Optometric Association the lens is the first device to remove all the blur optically possible from the eyes of a partially blind person.

Climbers Seek Plane Crashed On Mountain

RIVERSIDE, CALIF.—(AP)—Further attempts were underway Monday to reach the crest of cloud-cloaked Mt. San Geronimo to identify wreckage believed to be that of a missing Air Force transport with 13 men aboard.

The C-47 vanished in the vicinity of the 11,485-foot mountain Monday while enroute from Omaha to March AFB here.

So far attempts to reach the scene have been stopped by wind, thick clouds and sheer cliffs.

Private Services Are Held For Mother Of Mrs. Truman

INDEPENDENCE, MO.—(AP)—The "little White House" here was the scene Monday of funeral services for Mrs. David W. Wallace, 90-year-old mother of the first lady.

President and Mrs. Truman and their daughter, Margaret, were in seclusion at the old-fashioned mansion which was Mrs. Wallace's home from shortly after the Civil War until her son-in-law entered the bigger White House in Washington.

The President arrived Sunday night, told his staff to stay aboard the presidential train until it reached nearby Kansas City. Thereafter the Trumans were at home only to the Truman and Wallace families.

Strict privacy was the rule for the funeral. No flowers were to be sent.

Newspapers and radio stations in the area repeatedly have stressed the President's request for privacy, both at the little White House and at the burial plot in Woodlawn Cemetery in Independence.

Mrs. Wallace, born Madge Gates on Aug. 4, 1862, died last Friday in the White House, one week after a cerebral thrombosis.

Mrs. Truman, who was christened Elizabeth Virginia but was courted by the President-to-be as "Bess," is the oldest of four Wallace children. The others were here—Frank Gates Wallace and George P. Wallace of Independence and Fred Wallace of Albuquerque, N. M.

The President plans to remain here until about 6 p.m. (CST) Tuesday, when he will board the nine-car special for the 24-hour trip to Washington.

COP SURVIVES REAL SHOCKER

OAKLAND, CALIF.—(AP)—A police car—with a policeman inside—was turned into a hotrod in the strictest sense of the word by 2,300 volts of electricity Sunday.

A windstorm threw a broken power line across the automobile. Officer Charles Woodworth, huddled on a cushion, radioed headquarters.

A power company emergency crew was sent to cut the line.

Workmen said the rubber tires saved Woodworth from electrocution.

British Turkey Raiser Makes It Hard On Rustlers

KENILWORTH, ENGLAND.—(AP)—Warning to Christmas turkey rustlers: Steer clear of here.

It is true that Maj. John Hibbert has several hundred beautifully fattened birds wandering around his place.

But to reach them you first have to get through his outer perimeter—a seven-foot-high electric fence regularly patrolled by men with shotguns. Then, four 1,000-pound pedigree bulls just rarin' to get at strangers.

They aren't fussy whether the rustlers have two legs or four. The bulls bellowed so loud at one fox who tried to hustle a tree meal that Reynard fled straight into the high-voltage fence and died on the wire.

Officials Investigate Bermuda Air Crash

HAMILTON, BERMUDA.—(AP)—Cuban government and airline officials opened an investigation Monday into one of the island republic's major air disasters—the crash of a new DC-4 airliner Saturday in which 37 persons died off Bermuda.

Three women and a man who survived the plunge into the sea of the Cubana Airlines plane were reported making satisfactory progress at the King Edward VII Hospital here. Of the dead, 17 bodies had been recovered early Monday.

Twenty victims still were missing. The plane, loaded with Spaniards, Cubans and Mexicans, was homeward bound from Madrid.

Cubana Airlines President Sergio Clark said his company hoped to raise the ill-fated aircraft from its 60-foot depth to find out why it dropped into the ocean about three minutes after an apparently normal takeoff from Kindley Airfield here.

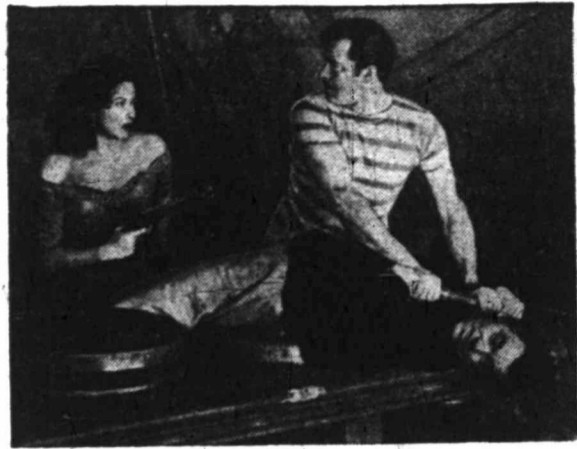
