Spraberry Shows Logged At Tester In N-C Upton Area

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-B Windham, Pennsylvania wildcat in North-Central Upton County, was bottomed at 8,523 feet in the Spraberry taking a drillstem test. Operator cored the section from 8,472 to 8,523 feet. Recovery was 50 feet of sand and shale with good oil shows in the sand. This wildcat is 35 miles south of the city of Midland and seven miles east of the Pegasus (multipay) field. Drillate is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 17, block 39, T-3-S, T&P survey.

Oil Flow Gauged At Wildcat In NW Ector Area

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 721 Goldsmith, wildcat in Northwest Ector County, flowed oil on a drillstem test taken from 5,065 to 5,090 feet. Tool was open nine and one-half hours. Gas surfaced in 15 minutes and oil in seven hours. During the next 30 minutes it flowed 11 barrels of oil. The flow died at the end of the 30 minutes and was dead the last two hours of the test. Operator reversed out nine and one-half barrels of clean oil. No formation water developed. More hole was being made below 5,090 feet. Location is 660 feet from north and 2,008 feet from east lines of section 4, block 44, T-1-S, T&P survey. It is two and one-quarter miles north of the Goldsmith (Ellenburger) field.

Plymouth Gets Good Shows At Hallanan Stepout In Midland

Plymouth Oil Company No. 1-B H. S. (Sherwood) Foster, Central-West Midland County exploration, three miles northwest of Warfield and 12 1/2 miles southwest of the city of Midland, has found promising shows of oil in the Strawn line of the Pennsylvania. The shows came in a core at 10,582-617 feet. Recovery was 35 feet of crystalline lime. On that core 19 feet was porous and heavily oil stained and bleeding gas. The other 16 feet was dense lime with no appreciable shows of oil or gas. Pulling Another Core Operator then cut a core at 10,617-652 feet. That specimen was being pulled at last report. It is expected that a drillstem test will be run in a short time to check the shows which have been logged. This development is one location north of Plymouth No. 1-A Foster, discovery of the Hallanan (Strawn) field. The top of the Strawn pay in the No. 1-B Foster is approximately flat with the top of the pay in the field. Location is 1,980 feet from north and west lines of section 11, block 41, T-2-S, T&P survey.

Three wildcat operations and stepouts to two new fields have been reported for West Texas areas. Elmer Quinn and George Adams of Odessa will drill No. 1 Jacoby as a 4,006-foot Tubb Sand wildcat in North Pecos County. Drillate is 990 feet from north and 2,310 feet from east lines of section 34, block 2, H&C survey, and 11 1/2 miles southeast of Imperial. O. D. Alsbrook of Dallas will drill No. 1 Coline Oil Corporation as a 4,000-foot wildcat in Northeast Garza County. Drillate is 330 feet from south and east lines of section 93, block H, D&W survey and 16 miles northeast of Seminole. Hunt Oil Company of Dallas will drill No. 3 W. A. Sloan as a 7,000-foot wildcat in Southwest Fisher County three miles southwest of the

VA Will Retain 19 Hospital Sites Marked For Sale

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Veterans Administration said Friday the government has now decided to hang on to 19 sites for proposed VA hospitals until the new Republican Administration has a chance to review the veterans' medical program. This is a reversal of the VA announcement last month that it was turning the sites over to the General Services Administration (GSA) for disposal as surplus because Congress allows the authorization for construction of the hospitals to die June 30.

Final Sewage Plant Payment Authorized

Final payment of \$13,679 on the city's new sewage plant was authorized Thursday afternoon by the City Council. The payment was authorized as City Manager W. H. Oswald reported the job of constructing the \$300,000 facility southeast of the city had been completed by the M. and N. Construction Company. The plant was designed to serve a population of 50,000 persons, and additional units can be built as needed.

Ike May Assign Ambassador To Chinese Regime In Exile

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Diplomats speculated Friday that one of President-elect Eisenhower's early diplomatic moves will be to appoint an ambassador to the Chinese Nationalist government on Formosa. The United States has not had an ambassador there since the government fled to the island in 1949. The White House announced Thursday night the resignation of John Leighton Stuart, 76, who has held the post of ambassador to China since 1946 but has not been active since mid-1949. He then came home for consultation, shortly later became ill and has not returned. Stuart, in a resignation letter dated November 22, said he assumed Eisenhower "will wish to have a completely free hand in selecting diplomatic representatives." In view of the oft-expressed Republican concern about U. S. relations with the government on Formosa, it is considered probable that the Eisenhower Administration will send an ambassador there shortly after taking office. Stuart told Truman he had not retired earlier because he had hoped his health would improve and enable him to return. But his doctors have informed him it may be some time before he is again able to travel great distances, he added. More Urgent Than Ever Accepting the resignation with "deep regret," Truman expressed hope that Stuart would devote himself to advancing understanding and friendship between the American and Chinese people. The President described this as "a cause more urgent than ever in these days when the Communist regime at Peking is bending so much energy to the destruction and the fostering of hatred." At the time Stuart came home, it generally was understood the Truman Administration would leave the position in a relatively inactive status indefinitely. Nationalist China's hold on the mainland gave way under Communist military pressure in the closing months of 1949. The Truman Administration then was against any quick recognition of Communist China and withdrawal of recognition from the Nationalists. But it did take the position that the Nationalist regime had been discredited throughout Asia and had lost the support of the people inside China. Subsequent mistreatment of the U. S. diplomats and citizens under Red China rule brought a firm resolve not to recognize the Chinese Communist regime, and the increasing stability of the Chinese Nationalist government on Formosa brought an improvement in relations with the U. S. However, Stuart's prolonged ill health made it impossible to consider his going to Taipei and indications were that officials here were content to be represented there by a minister rather than an ambassador. Eisenhower Steers Clear Of Truman-Mac Wrangle

HONOLULU—(AP)—President-elect Eisenhower, relaxing in bright Hawaiian sunshine from his Korean tour and policy-shaping talks, was steering clear Friday of any fight between President Truman and General MacArthur over a peace plan for Korea. Eisenhower planned to play at least 18 holes of golf Friday on the windswept course alongside the sea at Kaneohe, the Marine Corps air station across Oahu Island from Honolulu. He also planned talks with John Foster Dulles and Gov. Douglas McKay of Oregon. "Ike is not going to get into any quarrel with Truman," one of Eisenhower's close friends said. "He's going to see General MacArthur, as he said he would, to get MacArthur's views on the best way to bring peace to the Far East. He is not going to become involved in any fight over it." "Ike will stand on the sidelines in the Truman-McArthur affair," another associate said. "Truman has said some harsh things about Ike—but it's my guess that he (Eisenhower) won't make a reply." The President virtually closed the door Thursday on proposals for a meeting with Eisenhower and MacArthur. He said he believes such a meeting would serve no useful purpose. Eisenhower played golf Thursday. He got a birdie on one hole, but took a nine on another. He kept his score to himself as he indulged in a half-hour of practice shots afterward. Indications are that the President-elect will leave Saturday afternoon for Travis Air Force Base, Calif. Officials at Travis said he was expected there at 11 p.m. Sunday, two weeks almost to the hour from the time he left Travis on his journey to Korea. Part of Eisenhower's party left Hawaii Thursday night for the U. S. The group included Charles E. Wilson, secretary of Defense; designate; Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff; George M. Humphrey, secretary of the Treasury; designate; Herbert Brownell, next U. S. attorney general; and Gen. Lucius Clay, a close friend and adviser of Eisenhower.

SAN QUENTIN, CALIF.—(AP)—Badman William E. Cook, who two years ago killed an Illinois family of five, was executed Friday in San Quentin Prison for the slaying of a Seattle salesman.

ODESSA—Julian Johnson resigned Friday as head football coach at Odessa High School. He has been offered an administrative position in the schools. Johnson came to Odessa in 1941 and has served two years as head coach.

HOUSTON—(AP)—Capt. Sam Houston III, 60, grandson of Texas' liberator, died Friday in the Veterans Administration Hospital after a long illness.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Edwin A. Locke, Jr., the U. S. ambassador who figured recently in a controversy over aid to the Near East, has submitted his resignation, the State Department said Friday.

NEW DELHI—(AP)—Prime Minister Nehru has been named president of the governing Congress Party, the party announced Friday.

Red Chinese Push ROK's From Hills

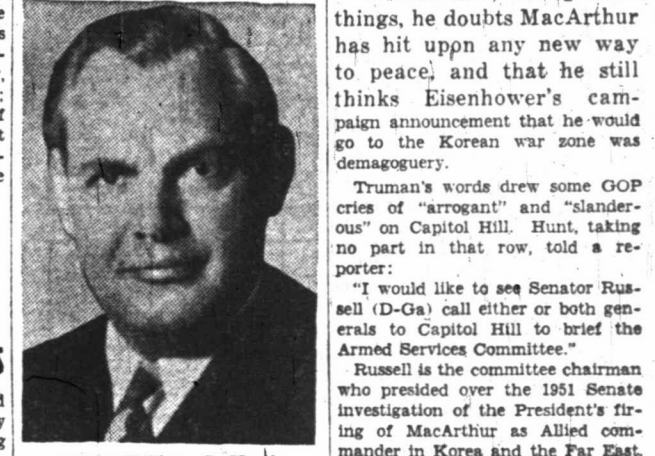
SEOUL—(AP)—About 750 Chinese Red smashed back to the peaks of Big and Little Nori hills on the flaming western front today, only two hours after rugged South Koreans captured the strategic heights in a bloody, hand-to-hand battle. Fiercely fighting Chinese swept up the slopes of the two hills in a two-pronged drive shielded by cover of darkness and a devastating Communist artillery and mortar barrage. The valiant First Republic of Korea Division earlier had seized Big and Little Nori, in the sixth of a series of bloody counterattacks in savage, day-long fighting. The Air Force said its pilots flew about 150 separate missions in the general area of Big and Little Nori. Pilots said they hit a huge supply and troop depot that rocked with five violent explosions. Seven fires were started. Thousands of bursting shells from Allied planes, tanks and artillery scorched the slopes of Nori's two hills. Hundreds of dead and wounded of both sides littered the peaks. Elsewhere, Allied raiders grappled hand-to-hand with Chinese Reds northwest of Munsan on the Western Front. The Allies secured the crest of a hill in bloody, close-range combat after twice being driven back. The United Nations troops later withdrew to their own lines. Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U. S. Eighth Army commander, Friday reported a new South Korean division of about 14,000 men is almost ready for combat duty. He said the unit "could replace an American division on the battlefield."

Quick Called Panel Session Is Suggested

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senator Hunt (D-Wyo) proposed Friday an immediate extraordinary session of the Senate Armed Services Committee to look into Gen. Douglas MacArthur's views on ending the Korean war. President Truman, with some barbed remarks about both MacArthur and President-elect Eisenhower, Thursday rejected a senator's suggestion that he call the two men to the White House to discuss Korea.

Texan Heads Church Group

DENVER—(AP)—Methodist Bishop William C. Martin of Dallas, a strong champion of inter-church cooperation, Friday was nominated for president of the nation's largest religious organization. Bishop Martin was named without opposition to succeed the Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill as head of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. Bishop Sherrill is presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church. The formal election was scheduled at the convention's close late Friday.

CITY TURNS ON NEWEST SIGNAL

Sam Stuart, Famed Rodeo Clown, Dies

FORT WORTH—(AP)—George Byron (Sam) Stuart, 46, former rodeo clown and bull fighter, was found dead Friday in a friend's home. Death resulted from a heart seizure. Stuart became a top hand in bareback bronc and bull riding and in trick riding events.

Texas Cities To Take Tax Woes To 53rd Legislature

AUSTIN—(AP)—Spokesmen for the cities and towns of Texas that can't find money to meet rising costs of local government carried their problem to the upcoming 53rd Legislature Friday. Jim Wright, mayor of Weatherford and president of the League of Texas Municipalities, told the Legislative Council's Local Government Study Committee Texas towns "are caught in a squeeze." "Our costs are mounting steadily, but the state has closed the doors through which we could receive additional income with which to meet them," declared Wright, a former legislator. The solution, he said, is for the Legislature to let Texas towns share in the income from any new tax levied by the state. If county and school districts can receive help from the state, why can't the cities? Wright asked. "We feel that our problem is uniquely deserving of your attention because it concerns five million people," Wright told the subcommittee which will make recommendations to the Legislative Council. The dearth of money to meet rising local government costs, he continued, is a problem of vital and personal concern to two-thirds of the people of Texas "because it governs the amount of money we can raise to provide the scores of municipal services which touch upon every phase of their daily living." 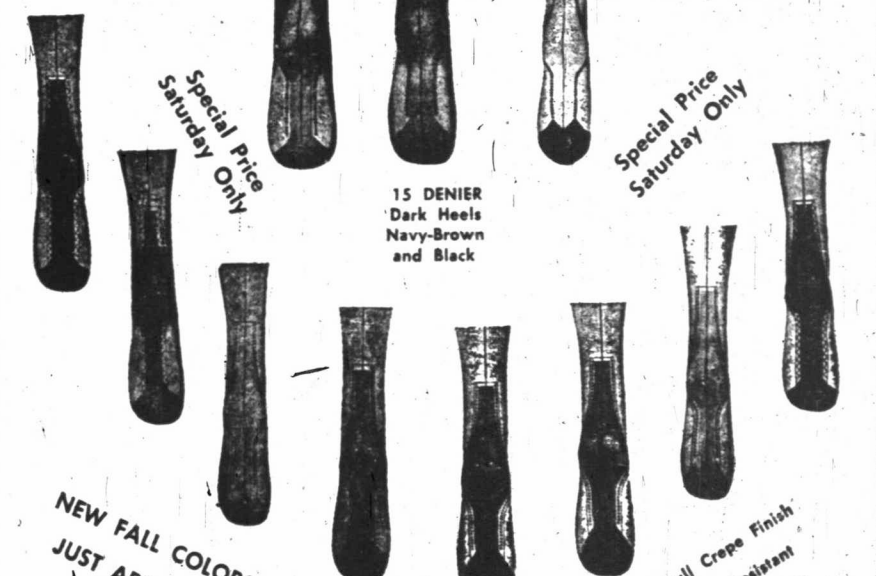

Dynamic Leadership

Not until General Eisenhower has digested thoroughly the many things he learned in Korea will America and the world know what his specific plans are for that battle-land.

But his preliminary conclusions are important. He made plain there will be no U. S. withdrawal from Korean soil so long as the issue stands in doubt.

At the other extreme, he indicated it is his wish to avoid the "grave risk of enlarging the war."

Yet his rejection of either withdrawal or a widening of the conflict does not mean he is resigned to endless stalemate on the present pattern.

Eagerly all Americans and all free men will be waiting to discover what Eisenhower means by those words.

But while they are waiting, they may reflect with satisfaction upon the courage and selfless attention to duty of the man who holds this hope.

Eisenhower in Korea was more than a politician carrying out a campaign pledge. He was, of course, his old military self, appraising the battle scene with eye.

More than that, he was a man teaching himself, under pressure, how to become a statesman.

He was sharply conscious of the danger of casual or irresponsible comment, especially since he will not be President for more than a month.

He covered more than half the width of the fighting front, although he never drew closer to combat zones than three miles.

From the ordinary fighting man up through divisional commanders to the top brass, Eisenhower heard the detailed story of the war.

Almost to the point of forgetting the diplomatic niceties, Eisenhower focused on finding out the facts.

There will be those at home who will say he could have learned as much by a visit to the Pentagon.

For even if the general's trip produced not a single new idea for settling or advancing the war, it would have been justified for the great lift it gave American and UN soldiers struggling in the harsh sub-zero of a third Korean war winter.

Men who understand war, or any other major problem, know there is no substitute for first-hand study, especially if a man can bring an expert's eye to the scene.

By going to Korea, Eisenhower has given top place to the problem that is highest in the minds and hearts of all free men in these days.

Scapegoats For Hire

From long experience with Communist doings, we no longer look at espionage and treason trials and ask, "What has this latest batch of spies been up to?"

In other words, what is it that the Reds are trying to excuse? What do they need a fresh crop of scapegoats for?

The current Czech treason trials, progressing very nicely through a series of neat, orderly, automatic confessions, apparently have their root in the failure of Prime Minister Gottwald's Red government to fulfill promised war orders for the Soviet Union, and in acute food and fuel shortages.

In Communist territory, the wicked persons always are found, or rather, manufactured. By processes of torture we now understand well, men of either high or low station actually are altered in personality until they fit the desired psychological pattern and are willing to utter the exact words of the Communist script.

Want a scapegoat? Just knock on any Red headquarters, door from Bucharest to Moscow, and inquire within.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

Drew Pearson says: Eisenhower taking leaf from FDR's book—plans rests between wear-and-tear sieges of office grind; Mid-Pacific conferences have four major objectives.

WASHINGTON—General Eisenhower, who worked with and under Franklin Roosevelt all during World War II, is taking a leaf or two from FDR's book.

Roosevelt not only got away on a cruiser or yacht three or four times a year, but usually took members of his Cabinet with him. It gave him a chance both to rest and consider long-range problems.

Eisenhower also plans frequent rests from the wear and tear of office grind. While at NATO in Paris he tried to spend at least part of every afternoon on the golf course. This, and a fairly rigid diet, kept him in good shape.

Meanwhile, the present mid-Pacific cruiser conferences, according to close advisers, have four objectives:

1. A decision on Korea has to be formulated almost right away. Even though Eisenhower isn't President yet, his general views will be honored by the Truman Administration.

2. Get acquainted with the Cabinet Ike has met only once or twice. They need to get acquainted. Some domestic problems, such as taxes and budget, will be discussed; also Secretary-of-the Interior Douglas McKay is in charge of the Pacific Islands. That's one reason he was invited.

3. Plan some speeches and prepare for some TV appearances—this was the main reason C. D. Jackson of Fortune magazine, head of the campaign speech-writers, and Emmett Hughes, another speech-writer, were sent for. Eisenhower will have to make some TV and radio statements shortly after his arrival back in the U. S.; also has major speeches to think about for the inauguration period.

4. Major Foreign Policy—It's sometimes easier to formulate long-range policy when you are away from it. And Eisenhower now has a chance to debate with his new secretary of State the most important part of our entire foreign policy—the fact that the heart of the Korean war, as the heart of most of our troubles, lies in Moscow.

5. Stevenson told Truman he would like to have a table and chairs, a doll and a nurse kit. My little brother is sixteen months old and he wants a train, a gun and a ball. I hope I haven't asked for too much.

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Texas Highways As Dangerous As Korea; Deaths In Crushed Autos Break Records

Texas, like several other states, daily is losing as many of its citizens to the man-eating traffic orge as the Korean War kills.

On many days, especially during traffic-jammed weekends, the traffic toll exceeds the grim war casualties.

Besides the thousands killed, tens of thousands others are injured. The toll in life and property is staggering, hard to estimate.

For 1952, traffic has killed record numbers in several cities and counties, a survey shows.

Twenty persons lost their lives in mishaps on Corpus Christi streets. The previous all-time high was 16 last year.

In the county more than half a hundred — 51 — died in highway smashups. Another record. The old mark was 39 also set in 1951.

Accidents Increase
Those were just fatal accidents. The total of 2,484 mishaps of all kinds in Corpus Christi to date in 1952 is still another all-time high.

Amarillo City-County traffic fatalities already have equaled last year's. The overall toll is 29 dead — 12 in the city and 17 in the county. That compares with the 1951 total of 15 dead in the city and 14 in the county.

At Wichita Falls they're running about average—a grim average. Seven have died on streets there this year, one less—so far—than last year.

Seventeen highway fatalities had been recorded in Taylor (Abilene) County through Wednesday. That's the greatest number of traffic deaths there since 1950 when 20 died.

San Antonio has exceeded its total for 1951. To date there have been 46 traffic deaths there, one more than last year, Bexar County 1952 deaths total 34.

Houston is experiencing a record number of accidents this year. Yet both city and county death totals lag behind previous records.

Future Of School Segregation Rests With Top Tribunal

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The future of racial segregation in public schools now rests with the Supreme Court.

The bitterly disputed question which the court must answer: Do separate school systems for white and negro students violate the Constitution?

Arguments ended Thursday. It may be several months before the court gives its answer. When it comes it will either reaffirm or overturn an 1896 decision which established the "separate but equal" doctrine that segregation is constitutional if equal facilities are provided for both races.

In five different cases, the highest tribunal is being asked to knock out that doctrine and hold that segregation itself is unconstitutional.

Not so, replied attorneys representing Negro litigants, most of them under sponsorship of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). Amendment Cited

They insisted during the three days of argument that the Constitution, particularly the equal protection clause of the Fourteenth Amendment, makes it unlawful for states to require white and negro children to attend separate schools.

In two of the cases—those from Kansas and the District of Columbia—no issue was raised as to the equality of negro schools. In the three other cases it figured, but only because it had been an issue in the lower courts.

But lawyers for the negro litigants contended there can be no equality in educational opportunity so long as there is segregation.

Texas Girl Freed Of Slaying Charge

TUSCALOOSA, ALA.—(AP)—Pretty Leigh Skidmore, 22-year-old carhop from Texas, was acquitted Thursday night of taking part in a holdup slaying.

Three men were convicted and given life sentences in the slaying. Miss Skidmore was cleared of robbery and murder charges by a circuit court jury. She had been accused of acting as a lookout while an elderly storekeeper, Odys Gurganus, was robbed near Berry, Ala., last August.

When Gurganus resisted the robbery, he was shot and killed.

Houston Toll High
This year's traffic death tolls in Houston to date are 62 in the county and 68 in the city.

Harrison County's 1952 traffic toll is 10 dead thus far in 1952. Fifteen persons died in county accidents last year.

This is the picture in Fort Worth: 94 killed to date in 1952 in the county, 19 in the city. At this time last year it was 84 in the county and 11 in the city.

The picture is brighter at Austin. That city has had only seven traffic deaths this year, which will be the lowest since 1933 if no more fatalities occur by year's end.

On Dallas' clogged streets 39 persons have died in traffic deaths this year—eight fewer than last year. Fifty-six have been killed in Dallas County, three fewer than in 1951.

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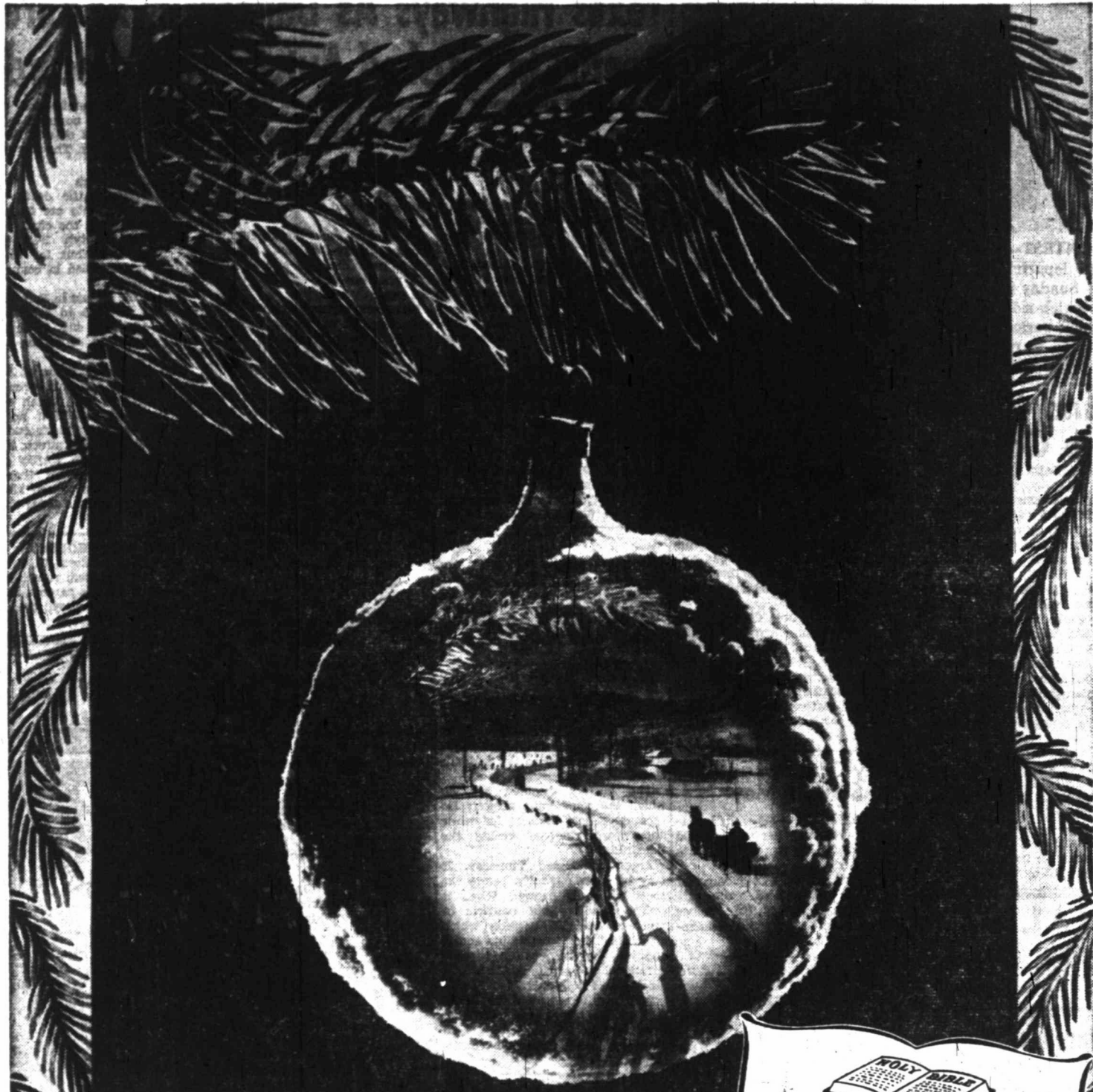

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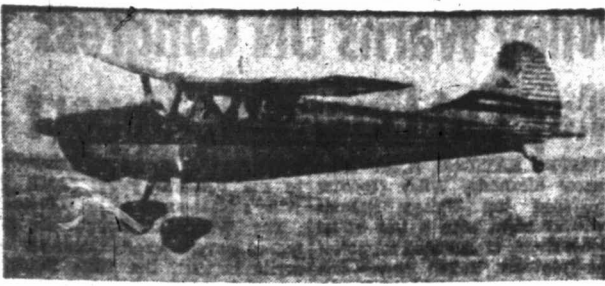

Uncle Sam Runs Out Of Hay, And Money To Buy It With

"The government has run out of hay and money both, and applications made after November 7 for federal aid hay will not be filled," Charles Champion, Midland County Production Marketing Association secretary, said Friday.

The PMA secretary said that all deposits made at the time of applications would be refunded to Midland County ranchers.

Delivery is supposed to be made on some 230 tons of hay that was applied for by county ranchers before the November 7 date, Champion said. A total of 257 tons already has been delivered in the federal program he said.

With the government hay, bundled as a filler and purchase of other food commodities, county ranchers are expected to make the winter in good shape with their cattle, the PMA secretary said.

Nation's Drift From Tenets Of Church Cited By Council

DENVER — Leaders of 30 Protestant churches Friday reaffirmed traditional separation of church and state but asked their 35 million members to live by Christian principles and halt a drift of American government from religious tenets.

They called for more religious education in schools and colleges but said parochial schools should receive no government aid. They demanded a halt to religious and racial discrimination. They encouraged church members to seek political office as a way to halt corruption.

Enforcement Of Auto Responsibility Laws Supported On Appeal

SAN ANTONIO — The Fourth Court of Civil Appeals upheld the State Department of Public Safety Thursday in enforcing the Motor Vehicle Owner Responsibility Law.

The court reversed a county court decision which held that D. C. Gillespie, San Antonio, was not responsible for an accident involving his 15-year-old son, James D.

In an opinion written by Associate Justice Jack Pope the appellate court declared that, with certain exceptions, the owner of a motor vehicle is responsible for damage or injury caused by the vehicle, even while it is being driven by another person.

The county court also stayed execution of an order suspending the father's drivers license and directing him to surrender his title certificate and license plates.

"The law is inapplicable to an owner of a motor vehicle if at the time of the accident the vehicle was being operated without his permission, express or implied," the appellate opinion said. "The trial court said that the son had the father's permission and the department, in obedience to the act, had no choice other than suspension."

"A country divided against itself cannot stand," Short said. "Unless Korea is reunited, you're going to have continual trouble in all of Asia."

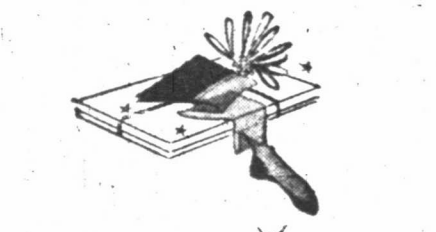

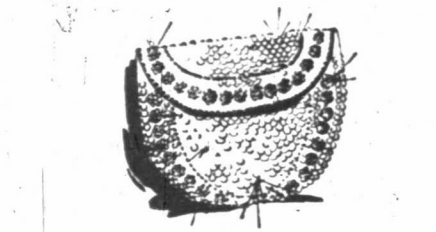

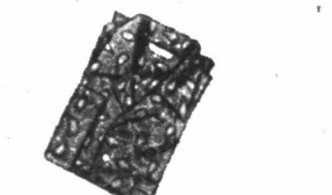

The telecast marked the first time a stage production of any kind had been sent out on a closed TV circuit for paying audiences. Such circuits, however, have been used for championship boxing bouts.

The Metropolitan Opera Maintenance Fund will benefit from the video returns, of which no immediate estimate was available.

There was a sprinkling of mink in some movie houses but the bulk of the TV viewers wore their, week-day clothes and a few brought the children. Popcorn was banned in many of the film palaces.

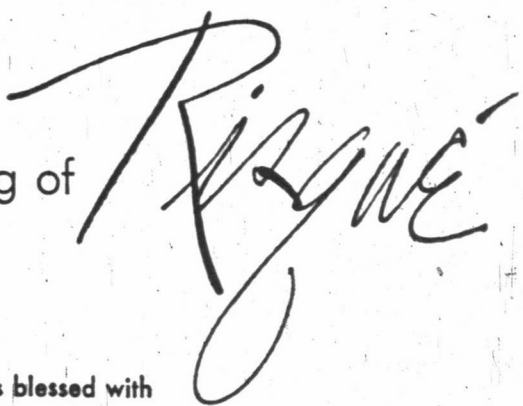

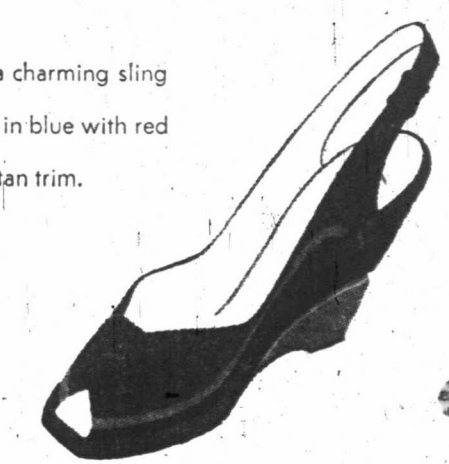

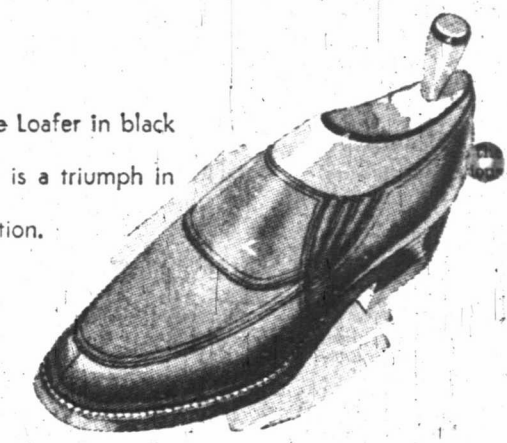

Atomic Subs May Conquer Polar Ice

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The leagues of thick polar sea ice which stand between the northern rims of the Western Hemisphere and Eurasia may be no barrier to the atomic submarines the U. S. now is building.

That was made evident Friday by replies from the Navy to questions about the nuclear engine submarines it is developing—submersibles in which the crew as well as the boat can remain deep down for days, weeks or possibly months.

The northern approach to the mainlands of Russia and Canada, for example, had always been closed by the great areas of frozen seas or unyielding pack ice through which no craft could force its way—until the advent of long range planes.

But an article written for Collier's magazine by Rear Adm. Homer Wallin, chief of the Bureau of Ships, spoke cryptically of the ability of atomic submarines to launch guided missiles with atomic warheads and then slide silently

beneath the waves "or ice" to reappear at another point to launch another attack.

Longer Submerged Periods
A reporter who asked Navy officials about this was told: "It is possible" for even conventional submarines to operate under ice. Since a conventional submarine's submerged endurance is limited by its batteries, and it must have air for operating its engines to recharge its batteries, it has a limited endurance for under ice operation.

"The Nautilus (first of the atomic powered boats to be started), which will be independent of the earth's atmosphere, will, therefore, be able to operate under ice for longer periods of time. It makes no difference whether the ice is solid or mushy as long as there is

sufficient depth of water beneath the ice to permit submarine operation."

The Arctic Sea apparently has plenty of water beneath the ice, except possibly for some areas near land masses. Recent soundings have shown 14,000 feet of water at the North Pole.

\$103,000 In Midland Cotton Placed For Government Loan
