Prison Chief Tells How Fanatic Reds Defied Direct Gunfire In Escape Effort

PONGAM ISLAND, SOUTH KOREA—(AP)—American soldiers Tuesday told in vivid detail how U. S. and South Korean guards shot and bayoneted to death 84 Communist prisoners of war in quelling an attempted mass breakout by 4,500 fanatical Reds Sunday.

A grim force of 300 guards conquered the mutinous thousands in 55 frenzied minutes with machine guns, rifles, carbines and bayonets. Americans and three South Koreans as well as 118 prisoners were injured.

The captives, locked arm-in-arm and fanatically roaring the choruses of Communist songs, ignored volleys after volleys of close-range fire. They lifted their dead and wounded as they fell.

After the battle, the guards had to loosen the arms of many of the prisoners before they could drag them from the stockade.

The once-defiant Reds were cowed completely by 1:25 p.m. Sunday. Newsmen Tuesday toured the island and entered the compound where most of the captives died.

Tension Eases

Guards made the prisoners, many of them limping and wearing bandages, file into another stockade before the correspondents entered.

Col. George P. Miller, Columbia, boss of the island's 9,200 North Korean captives, said he regretted the deaths but added sternly: "They brought it on themselves."

They tested our strength and lost," He said the tension which was mounting on the island before Sunday's outbreak had vanished.

Miller said, "Had I not taken the action, I would have had one-half the prisoners loose on the island and we would have lost many more lives. The barbed wire cannot hold determined prisoners."

Miller said he was tipped on the planned outbreak largely by two notes scribbled by prisoners.

One note was left at a gate and picked up by a guard. The other was seized from a prisoner as he tried to escape the paper outlining the escape plan.

Oil Executive Buys FDR 'Dream House'

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y. —(AP)—Oil executive Phillip S. Potter has purchased President Franklin D. Roosevelt's "dream house," Top Hill Cottage, overlooking the Hudson.

The late President, who designed the one-story house himself, used it as a retreat. It is about five miles from the Roosevelt estate at Hyde Park, N. Y.

Potter, a resident of Poughkeepsie and executive of the California Oil Company, said he and his family will move in as soon as the house is decorated.

The price was not disclosed as the sale by Elliott Roosevelt was announced Monday.

Prisoners in Compound "Fer" burst out with Communist songs. That was the starting signal for the outbreak. Five neighboring stockades quickly joined the chorus.

Miller rushed to the scene, shouted "stop." But the Reds kept singing. They locked arms and jumped three-deep in front of their barracks.

Miller ordered one platoon—about 40 men—of the U. S. Ninth Military Police Service Company and one platoon of South Korean soldiers into the compound. Another ROK platoon surrounded the stockade outside the barbed wire.

Miller again yelled "stop."

Stones Thrown

The Reds answered with a hail of stones, thrown down from a terrace at the guards about 20 feet below.

A narrow flight of stairs led up to the terrace from each side. Miller told newsmen:

"It would have been suicide if I had ordered my troops to go up there and break up the body of prisoners."

The colonel said the noise was "tremendous—it is impossible to convey to you the state of frenzy."

He said the eyes of the prisoners were glazed they were so hypnotized by the singing.

Miller said the wind was blowing so hard "tear gas would have been useless. They would have kicked the gas grenades back at our troops."

The colonel ordered all men with shotguns to fire one volley into the ranks of the POWs.

Rifles Ineffective

"It had no effect," the island commander declared. "The wounded kept right on singing—and the others lifted the wounded as they fell."

Miller quickly ordered one volley from the rifles and carbines.

The front rank of prisoners went down. The captives behind them again yanked up the slumping dead and wounded. The roaring songs went on.

At nearby "Baker" compound, other rioting prisoners jammed into the courtyard.

Miller said, "They were about ready to force the gates or fences." On the colonel's orders, South Koreans opened fire with a light machinegun from a tower overlooking the compound.

The hall of bullets ripped into the prisoners and many fell.

Break It Up

The planned escape was broken. Guards with bared bayonets rushed into "Baker" compound and flushed the fanatic Reds from their huts.

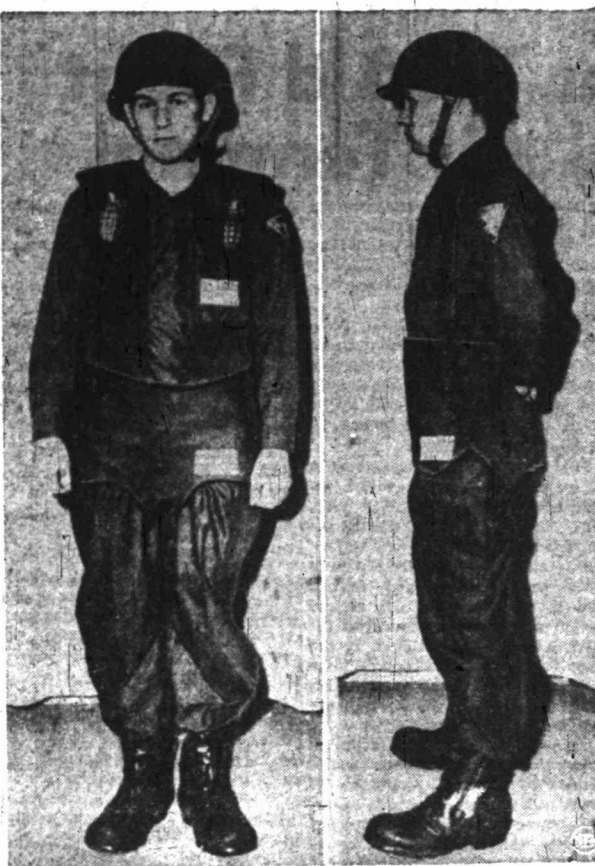
Guards had to pull apart the wounded sprawled on the dirt with arms still locked.

Resistance quickly broke in the other four compounds where little fighting took place.

By 1:25 p.m., order was restored and Colonel Miller said he had regained "uncontested control" of the mutinous captives.

Miller disclosed that four prisoners, badly beaten by their fellow captives, were taken out to compound "Charlie" Monday. This stockade did not join in the rioting.

The incident indicates dissension among some of the prisoners, all of whom have told Allies screening officers they want to be returned to North Korea in the event of an armistice.

Top Loyalty Board Advises Vincent Be Ousted From Job

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The government's top Loyalty Review Board has ruled there is reasonable doubt as to the loyalty of career diplomat John Carter Vincent, but the State Department kept the way open Tuesday to accept or reject its recommendation he be fired.

Some officials speculated that, after discussing the matter with President Truman, probably next weekend, Secretary of State Acheson may decide to reopen the whole case and eventually may reinstate Vincent. Acheson is in Paris and there was no official word to support this theory.

The State Department announced the review board's action Monday night and said it had suspended Vincent and ordered him home from Tangier. He has been minister and diplomatic agent there.

Simultaneously the State Department announced that the Loyalty Review Board had cleared John Paton Davies Jr., another veteran diplomat and like Vincent a controversial figure for several years, of any reasonable doubt as to his loyalty. Davies presently is assigned as deputy director for political affairs with the U. S. High Commission in Germany.

Praise Of Reds

The department, in its announcement of the Loyalty Review Board decision on Vincent, made public a letter to Acheson from Board Chairman Hiram Bingham. Bingham wrote that the board was not called upon to find that Vincent was disloyal, and did not do so.

But, he added, "his conduct in office . . . forces us reluctantly to conclude that there is reasonable doubt as to his loyalty . . ."

Bingham's letter cited what he termed Vincent's "studied praise" of the Chinese Communists in the early 1940's and his "equally studied criticism of the Chiang Kai-shek government." The U. S. was then supporting Chiang Bingham added. And Bingham said, Vincent had "close association with numerous persons who, he had reason to believe, were either Communists or Communist sympathizers."

Disabled Veterans Given Airlift Home For Holiday Season

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Fifty-six servicemen and women—blinded, paralyzed or amputees—are having the GI's dream come true: flying home for Christmas.

It's called Operation Santa Claus by the Military Air Transport Service, carrying out the mission for the sixth straight year.

MATS says the 56 represent all service personnel hospitalized in the United States in the three categories who were qualified, physically able and desirous of going home for 30 days.

Nine are blind, 34 are paraplegics and 13 are amputees. Twenty are being accompanied by medical attendants. Most homeward trips due for completion January 20.

Kansas Gain Hikes Nation's Crude Oil, Condensate Output

TULSA —(AP)—Only five states showed gains, but the nation's daily average crude oil and condensate production during the week ended December 13 increased 98,000 barrels, the Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

The week's total daily average was 6,569,150 barrels, making the Journal's figures on cumulative production this year 2,189,912,525 compared with 2,139,962,400 a year ago.

Kansas, which slumped heavily the previous week because of inclement weather, rebounded with an increase of 91,300 barrels to 317,500. Wyoming was another big gainer, up 18,200 barrels to 215,600.

Nebraska increased 1,000 to 9,800. North Dakota added 800 to 19,500 and Montana was up 500 to 27,300.

With declines were Arkansas, down 400 to 76,850; Louisiana, 250 to 682,150; and New Mexico, 100 to 175,725.

Production was unchanged in Texas, 3,013,525.

New Control Tower To Aid Flight Traffic At Midland Air Terminal

Five thousand airplanes take off and land at Midland Air Terminal every month with an enviable safety record, but pretty soon they'll be even safer in the hands of a new traffic cop who stands 78 feet tall. The new Civil Aeronautics Administration (CAA) tower is expected to be in full operation early in 1953 and greatly will facilitate the ever-increasing volume of air traffic in and around Midland. It will be as tall as a nine-story building and a stairway of 101 steps will lead to the top.

An old Army Air Corps tower is the only present facility of traffic control nature, and CAA officials here say it is far less than adequate. It was designed to handle traffic in which all aircraft were equipped with two-way radios. Its insufficient height makes it impractical to locate planes visually.

Difficult Signaling
That was all right for the Army. But many civilian planes are not equipped with radio, and their pilots must depend on visual instructions for landing and take-off instructions. Unless the control chief in the tower can spot the plane quickly—and, in turn, be spotted by the pilot—signals are difficult to relay.

The new control tower will be able to transmit weather and other data to and from airman as well as simple traffic instructions. It will be able to clear the field more adequately and efficiently in event of emergencies.

Most visual communications with craft in the air and on the ground are transmitted by flashes of red or green lights.

High Intensity Light
A beam of red light, directed at the pilot through a powerful "gun," tells him to keep clear of the runway until further notice. A green light tells him he has the right-of-way to take off or land.

Alternately blinking red and green lights instruct the pilot to exercise extreme caution. The beam of light can be seen

by the pilot 10 miles away during the day and 15 miles at night. It is focused within the barrel of the "gun" so the tower operator may signal to an individual plane without confusing other pilots.

Seventeen persons normally handle CAA affairs at Midland Air Terminal. In addition to supplying weather data to pilots on the ground and in the air they handle flight plans and other routine matters.

Country Traffic
Flight plans are filed by each pilot before he takes off. They give his plane's identification number, color, type, his name, planned destination and estimated time of arrival (ETA). Information on the flight plan is wired to the destination airport, and if the pilot has not arrived within a reasonable time after his ETA, a search is initiated. If the pilot changes his destination while enroute, it is his duty to radio his intentions in order to forestall expensive search operations.

A new tower also will include the CAA's weather observation equipment. Observations continue 24 hours a day in order to have up-to-the-minute data for aviators. The weather unit is in direct communication with other stations everywhere and often is able to tell the pilot of exact conditions he will encounter on any proposed flight.

Aid Passing Pilots
"I am over your station at 4,000 feet," the CAA's radio may crackle, "enroute from El Paso to Fort Worth. What altitude should I fly to get the best tailwind?" The CAA radio promptly tells the

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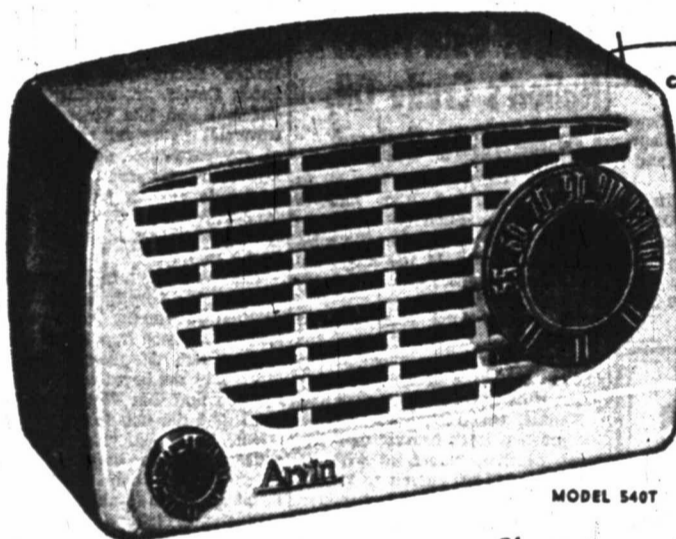

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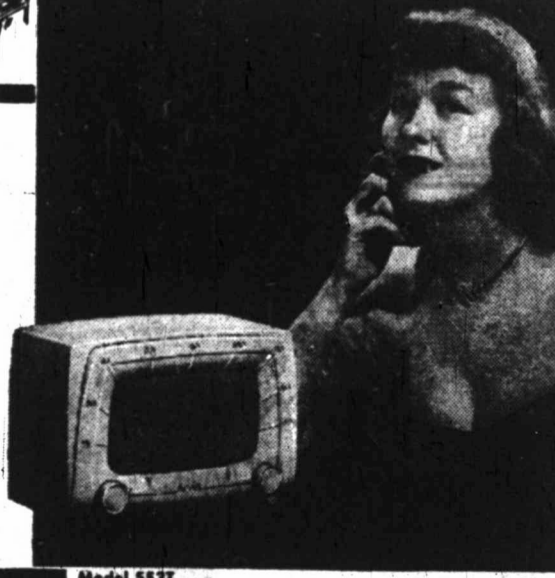

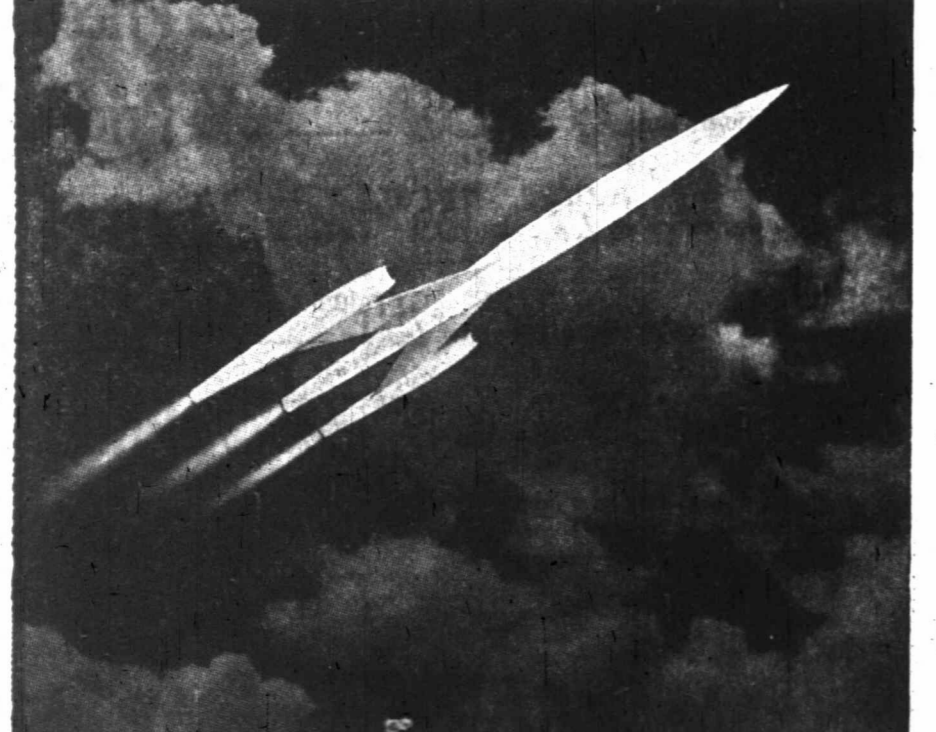
Doomed Man Flies Homeward For Last Yule With Family

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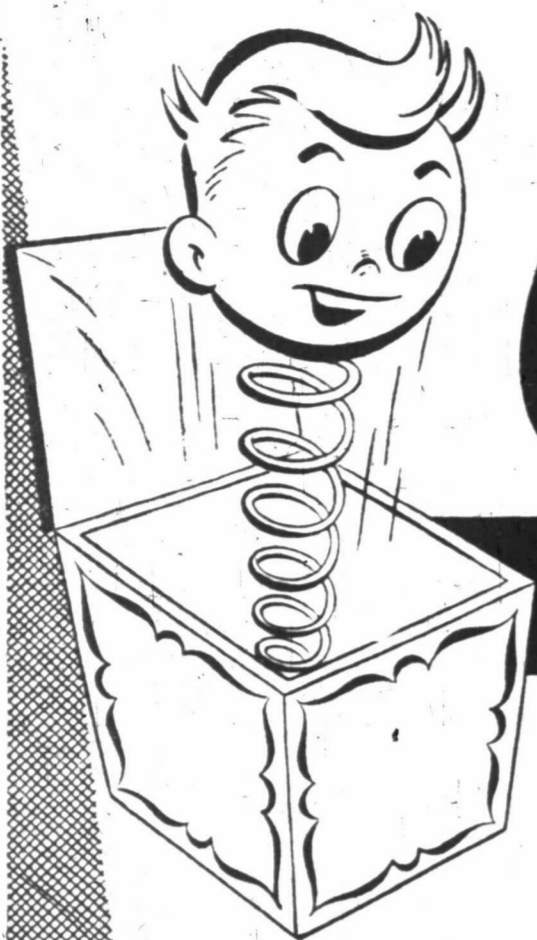

The 84-year-old bishop died in a hospital here Monday night. He had retired after 60 years in the priesthood in 1949 and was succeeded by his coadjutor bishop, The Most Rev. Mariana S. Garriga.

SHOULD THE GENERAL TELL HIS BOSS?—

Most Midlanders Say Mac Should Reveal Peace Plans

Should a general who is fired by a President tell the President how to end a war? Or should the general wait until—in this case—Dwight Eisenhower take office as President? This controversy is raging on Capitol Hill currently, and the man who is acclaimed to have a stop-the-war plan is Douglas MacArthur.

Should he submit his plan to President Truman—the man who fired him? Midlanders were asked this question Tuesday. "We are losing more than 200 lives

a week over there," said a service station owner, W. J. Miller, of 801 West Wall Street. "We shouldn't play politics with those boys lives. If MacArthur knows how to end the war, he should spill his information to Truman."

President Told Once
Said a housewife nearby: "But didn't MacArthur already tell Truman how to end the war? Wasn't Mac fired because of that?"

John C. Medford, 300 South Pecos Street, a store manager, and W. H. Dowlen, 1306 West Wall Street, a security investment man, both agreed that both Truman and MacArthur have the best interests of the country in mind—but, said Dowlen, "MacArthur should withhold his plan because Truman doesn't want to admit his mistakes."

City Attorney Len G. McCormick, who served in Korea under General MacArthur, still is in the Reserves and said he couldn't speak too freely, but he declared: "I'm forbidden to make a statement technically, but I have my own opinion of MacArthur—which isn't a good opinion of him."

Truman's Attitude
Said an auditor: "Mr. Truman had ample opportunity to hear MacArthur before—many times before. I think he had been presented with the plan and turned it down."

The auditor's friend, a personnel director, agreed, adding: "MacArthur announced his plans shortly after being dumped. Why should he outdo himself to a man who wouldn't even give him a summary trial? To my mind, wars are fought to win. MacArthur has the right idea."

"Why couldn't MacArthur tell it to both Truman and Eisenhower?" asked Paxton Howard, Jr., of 2200 Harvard Street, a student. "Better results would be gotten that way. This is a matter of unity. Those

who have ideas to end a war should be heard."

One student had a novel statement that wasn't even thought of by others who were interviewed. She is Betty Spurgers, 16, a high school senior, and she said:

Other Students Speak
"MacArthur shouldn't take his plan to either Truman or Eisenhower chiefly. This is a UN declared 'police action.' Therefore, Mac should take his plan to the United Nations because its purpose is world peace. Of course, it would do no harm to speak to Truman and Eisenhower about it—since with their available sources of information, they are in a position to improve upon the plan. But MacArthur is in the center of the controversy. He is between Truman and Ike, and both of these men are horses of different kind."

Declared John Petty, 17, 1005 North Colorado Street, "MacArthur is a soldier and he's still receiving something like \$18,000 a year. He is still, technically, under Truman's command. It's his duty to tell."

But Nancy Kunger, 16, nearby, disagreed with Petty. "Truman always tears down MacArthur—so why should MacArthur tell him?" Commented a teacher: "Of course, Truman should be told. He's still our chief executive, isn't he? After all, a lot of boys are being killed while theyicker."

The survey revealed that plastic toys, more than in the past, are replacing those made of steel.

Military toys aren't selling like they did the last several years either.

hold items are popular this year as gifts due to the new-home influence in Midland.

Methods Of Modern Surgery Do Much For Osteomyelitis

"Since I have had osteomyelitis off and on a great deal of my life," writes C. R. "I should like to know a little about it." This is certainly a reasonable request; anyone who has a chronic disease of this sort is vitally interested in knowing something about it.

Osteomyelitis is a disease of the bones. It results from invasion by germs which destroy the bone and produce pus. This disease has been known for centuries; signs of osteomyelitis have been found in the bones of ancient man, buried for thousands of years.

Until recently treatment has been discouraging and difficult. Severe cases even as late as the sixteenth century were treated by amputation of the limb. All kinds of strange

mixtures were applied to the tissues around the infected bone, including herbs, powders from mummies, egg yolk and crushed body lice.

One of the most interesting forms of treatment has been the use of maggots. Maggots eat only tissue that is dead. Thus, if they are placed in an area containing dead bone and other dead cells, they destroy the dead material and clean up the cavity without harming that part of the bone which is alive and healthy.

When they have completed their job, they can be removed easily. Although an old form of treatment for chronic osteomyelitis, this one still is used occasionally.

The development of modern surgery has done much for the patient with chronic osteomyelitis. It has become possible to clean out and scrape the infected bone, thus permitting healing. Ingenious instruments have been invented to aid in the work of boring into the bone and scraping out infected material.

Drugs, Antibiotics Help

Recently, new methods of attack on osteomyelitis have been developed. These are the drugs of the sulfa group and substances obtained from molds or germs called antibiotics, of which penicillin is the best known example. They have made it possible to save many people with osteomyelitis from months or even years of hospitalization and repeated surgery.

Chronic osteomyelitis has been a long-lasting and serious disease and often is responsible for complications. Although it even now is difficult to cure in an old case of the disease such as O. R.'s, the improved methods of attacking it are truly remarkable.

All stores appeared to be well-stocked, with no apparent indication of shortages in any line of merchandise.

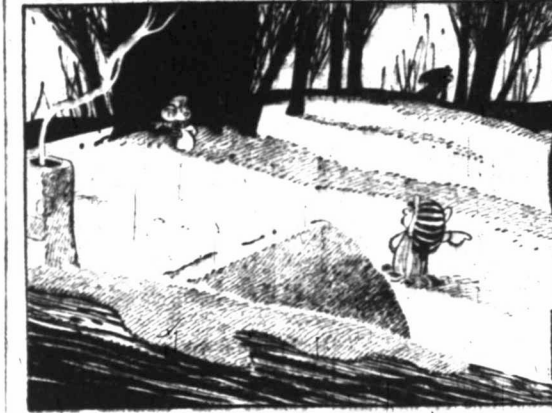

Ike's Organizational Set-Up

From time to time during the presidential campaign, General Eisenhower was criticized because he always had operated as an executive through the military "chain-of-command" system.

Under this arrangement, Eisenhower customarily relied heavily on his chiefs of staff in his periods of most notable service. In World War II, Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, now head of the Central Intelligence Agency, filled that spot for Ike.

Eisenhower's selection of Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire to be his chief assistant in the White House discloses the general's evident intent to repeat the pattern.

It is fair to ask, therefore, whether the prospect of this organizational set-up really is so frightening as some critics of "a military man in the White House" hinted.

The chances are that it is not. The President of the United States is the most overburdened man in the nation, if not the world.

Undoubtedly he has not yet shed all the routine tasks he should to be properly free for his crucial policy-making decisions.

This, obviously, is the very field in which a chief of staff, civilian-style, perhaps can operate so usefully.

Far from being frightening, such an arrangement ought to be welcomed. With one note of caution: If the President's mind is to be big, if he is to think courageously and originally, he cannot depend wholly on tight summaries of the great problems.

Only thus can he bring to his decisions the full benefits of the detachment which is the goal of the sort of improved executive organization heralded by Adams' appointment.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

WASHINGTON — It probably was a mixture of nostalgic and loneliness plus just a bit of personal pique that caused the big furore over MacArthur and Eisenhower, the Truman press conference, and the MacArthur speech that he knew the way out in Korea.

To understand it, you have to go back to the days when a young major occupied a desk in the extreme outer office of the chief of staff in the old State, War and Navy Building in Washington.

The young officer about three offices removed was Maj. Dwight Eisenhower, who wrote brilliant speeches for the chief of staff, but otherwise was completely overshadowed by the vibrant-voiced general who dominated the War Department.

That was in 1932. The years passed. The pendulum of fate swung back and forth to change the positions of these two.

Major Eisenhower went to the Philippines with the general, helped him train the Philippine constabulary, differed with him, was shipped home. Reasons for the friction vary. Some Filipinos say they found the major doing the real planning for Philippine defense.

At any rate, the pendulum of fate, still swinging, put the major, now a general, in command in North Africa, then in Europe. It was up to him to get as many troops, as many supplies as possible.

Three years passed, an election came up, and some Republicans talked about drafting the old general, now in Tokyo. Many Democrats also talked about drafting the young major, now president of a university.

But various publishers, visiting Tokyo, had so buttered up the old general that Gen. Bob Eichelberger, remarked the young major, now a five-star general in Europe: "When you put on the uniform there are certain inhibitions you accept."

A year later, he came home to run for President, despite a warning from the old general in Lansing, Mich., that no military man should serve in the White House.

As the pendulum swung further and as it looked like a close race on November 4, certain friends approached the old general urging him to endorse the young major who once sat in his outer office and who now was running for President.

The ideal book on bridge for beginners shouldn't make the mistake of teaching them all the tricks. May be that's why my friend and associate, Freddie Sheinwald, keeps things simple and light in his brand new "First Book of Bridge," written for teenage boys and girls.

In today's hand, the spade and heart suits are taken from his book. He points out that South can make two spade tricks by leading the hearts from dummy, and this limits South to two heart tricks.

East failed to cover, the queen of hearts would win, and declarer could then continue by finessing the jack of hearts.

U. S. Air Depot In England Too Large For Ordinary Atomic Bomb To Destroy

BURTONWOOD, ENGLAND—(AP)—America's strategic military supply center in Western Europe—Burtonwood Air Depot—is so big that an ordinary atom bomb could not knock it out and it's getting bigger all the time.

Within its 27-mile perimeter Burtonwood stocks more than a quarter of a million different items ranging from canned bomber engines to crated eggs.

This vast arsenal of Western defense, known officially as the U. S. Air Force 59th Air Depot, is one of Uncle Sam's biggest insurance policies. It's also one of his biggest gambles.

Here in this American "city" in the heart of England's industrial Midlands are enough war stores and repair facilities to keep Western forces fighting for several weeks while Atlantic supply lines are being organized.

Burtonwood obviously would be a prime target for enemy attack, but the American Air Force is gambling that British-American air defenses are powerful enough to stop enemy bombers before they could reach it.

It would take direct hits by two, maybe three ordinary atom bombs to knock Burtonwood out of commission, military sources believe.

The Berlin Airlift

Americans began moving into Burtonwood, a former British Royal Air Force base, in September, 1948. At first, the Americans asked the British for 45,000 square feet of space—about half an ordinary hangar—for 90 days. Then came Russia's squeeze on beleaguered Berlin and the famous Berlin airlift.

Burtonwood suddenly found itself a principal repair center for American and British planes shuttling food and supplies into Berlin. Its shops tore down, repaired and re-assembled 1,800 transport planes in five months.

As the cold war intensified, Burtonwood's 90-day lease was scrapped. The U. S. Air Force began building up the depot on a tremendous scale.

Serves As Furnace

Workmen are now busy on a nine million dollar expansion program calling for a new runway capable of handling America's biggest bombers, and a gigantic warehouse—one of the world's largest.

Burtonwood's Air Force personnel has grown from 1,500 in 1950 to 8,000. In addition, it employs 2,400 British civilians in various office and warehouse jobs.

Burtonwood handles the big stuff—bomber engines, jet assemblies and other plane parts as well as hundreds of smaller military items. These supplies, most of them from the U. S., are funneled to American military installations all over Western Europe and North Africa as they are needed. Other NATO nations also get some of their supplies.

Editor Of Punch Defines Character Through Laughter

NEW YORK—(AP)—Did you ever wonder what makes you laugh at a cartoon or a comic strip while somebody else looks blank?

Kenneth Bird will tell you it's partly the kind of character you are. Bird should know. He is editor of one of the world's most famous humor magazines—Britain's Punch. He is also known to its readers for the drawings signed Fougasse.

"If you laugh at a good timely or humorous drawing or strip, you are one of those who have an intense interest in your fellow man and an affection for him," he said on a recent visit here. "You are able to put yourself in his place. You laugh with him, not at him. In other words, you're interested in the man next door."

"One can learn more about a person and about the people of any country by studying what they laugh at than by studying their politics. You can judge whether they are domestic, whether they are cruel or kind. The subjects they treat in their humor are the subjects closest to their hearts."

Where You Live

But your character is not the only thing that determines what you laugh at. The times and the place you live in have a lot to do with it too.

"Radio and the talks had a tremendous effect on humor," Bird says. "Twenty-five years ago people got all their amusement from the printed word. Illustrations were detailed and captions were long. Papa used to read it out to the family. If they didn't catch it the first time, they could go back over it, till they did."

"With the radio and talks, everything became streamlined. You soak up impressions quickly. Humor must make its point on the wing. In time this had a terrific effect on humorous drawings. Contrast those of 25 years ago with James Thurber's barking seal and you will see what I mean."

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Anti-White Terrorists In Africa Believed Tools Of Red Demagogue

NAIROBI, KENYA—In the East African coffee colony of Kenya, a fanatical anti-white terrorist society, believed to be led by a Moscow-trained African demagogue, is giving Britain its thorniest African problem since the Boer wars.

To a million Kikuyu tribesmen, the Mau Mau society and Jomo Kenyatta are one and the same. They call the black-bearded, silver-tongued Kenyatta the "burning spear," and his name has replaced that of Jesus Christ in the hymnals used in the chain of schools under his control.

His followers swear their allegiance to the Mau Mau by taking seven bites from the living heart of a newly-killed sheep—and promise to sabotage European effort, to kill, to lie, and to steal in the interests of Mau Mau.

Use Witch Doctors
Organized in typical Communist fashion, the Mau Mau's 100,000 or more members are seeking by terrorism to oust Kenya's 40,000 European settlers. Against them, the government is even using witch doctors to administer ancient tribal oaths to counteract the oaths of the Mau Mau.

Also in typical Moscow style, Kenyatta, who is now on trial on charges of aiding the Mau Mau, has been careful never to give public support to the organization. He has even given oblique support to those who condemn the society as a "savage beast and an evil in our midst."

Government laxity and inadequate police intelligence during the post-war years have allowed this society to develop underground to such an extent that a million Africans live in terror.

A crack battalion of British infantry has been flown in, and six battalions of native soldiers (recruited from other tribes) are helping hastily mobilized volunteer police forces protect British and African lives and property.

Kenya's new governor, Sir Evelyn Baring, banker, aristocrat and colonial legislator, may have prevented a threatened massacre of the whites, but he has certainly brought a shimmering political stew to the boil by exposing a native plot to seize power.

The Mau Mau is the extremist wing of a straggling and often subversive political grouping of the Kikuyu tribe which for a generation has been seeking self-government by fair means or foul.

Demand More Land
Kenyatta has stamped Kikuyu-land with a mixture of African superstition and persuasive propaganda to whip up demands for more land for the Kikuyu tribe.

Some six years ago, when Kenyatta returned from Moscow, the Kikuyu tribe was protesting to the Kenya government about soil conservation. Their bad husbandry had destroyed the land on which they had lived for generations.

Western medicine and Western justice had increased the birth rate and prevented the tribal wars with their neighbors. They wanted lebensraum.

Strangled In Public
Frustrated by the lack of government action, the Mau Mau society was formed plighting young men of the tribe never to rest until the Kikuyu had all the land they wanted

and the Wazungu (Europeans) were evicted from this part of Africa.

The initiation fee was two dollars, and to swell the coffers of the society men, women and children were press-ganged into membership. It was a black, evil snowball gathering impetus through fear and intimidation.

The police fought a losing battle because they were unable to obtain evidence. Police informers were murdered with impunity and police witnesses were strangled in public, their necks looped with rope as teams of Mau Mau pulled at each end.

Severe Heads, Limbs
There was death by the panga, the two-foot-long bladed knife the tribesmen carry. There was death by slow drowning. An unprecedented crime wave swept Nairobi. As fast as Europeans and Asians bought guns to protect themselves, their families and their property, gangs of Kikuyu thugs set out to steal the weapons and thus arm the Mau Mau.

There is evidence that an armed and desperate Mau Mau army is in existence, waiting for the day when the military and police are withdrawn.

Just recently a gang of Mau Mau caught a loyal headman. They summoned the local natives to watch while one by one, the Mau Mau slashed at their victim with razor-sharp pangas. When he collapsed, the Mau Mau decapitated him, cut off his arms and legs and left the body for hyenas or the police, whoever arrived first.

Family Burned Alive
Equally typical was the raid on European farms in which 300 head of prime stock were slashed with pangas, swords and spears and left to die; the wife of a European post office official who was stabbed 25 times in her home on the outskirts of Nairobi; the wife and two chil-

dren of an African policeman who were burned alive in their hut.

The Mau Mau derives a lot from Russia. There are four centers, each with a controller who is responsible for the organization of cells in his own area. The centers approve large-scale operations, but individual cells are encouraged to plan their own exploits.

Power In The Outlands
Any man with enough personality can start his own cell. He is encouraged to do so, with the additional incentive that he keeps one-third of all funds accruing either in initiation fees or loot; the remainder is forwarded to the central office.

Although government action has restored confidence to some extent and loyal chiefs have now formed Mau Mau resistance groups, the Mau Mau still wields terrible power in the more remote areas.

202 Texans May Die In Holiday Violence

AUSTIN—(P)—The Christmas season holds violent deaths for 202 persons in Texas, the Department of Public Safety predicted Monday.

Department Chief Statistician N. K. Woerner estimated that death toll for the 10-day period from 12:01 a.m. December 23 to midnight January 1.

The prediction includes 105 traffic fatalities, 55 miscellaneous deaths such as fires, drownings, and explosions, and 42 victims of suicides and homicides.

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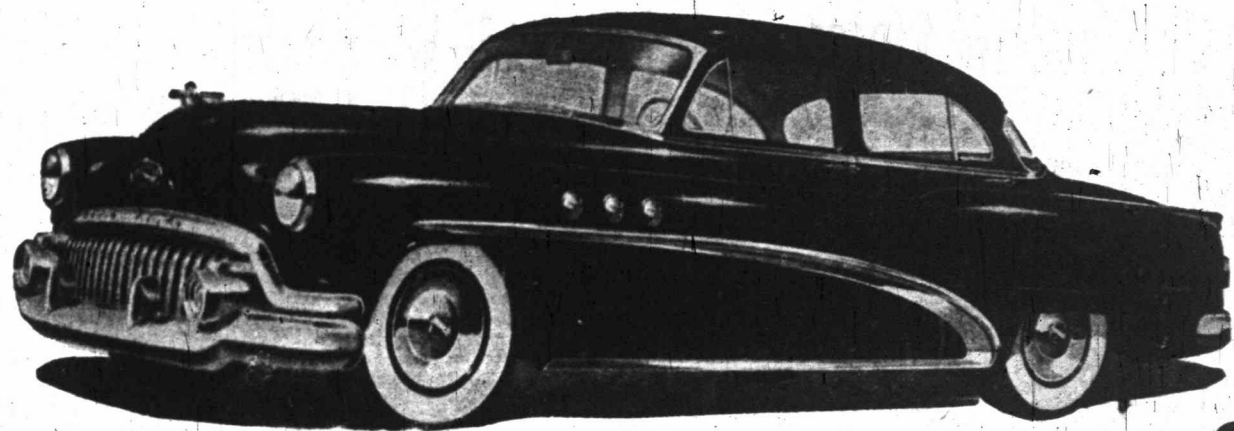
