**Ellenburger Oiler Inhaled At Test In Reagan Sector**

The Texas Company No. 1-AC State, wildcat in South-Central Reagan County, indicated possibilities of becoming a discovery from the Ellenburger on a drillstem test from 9,455 to 9,496 feet.

On the test, tool was open three hours. Gas surfaced in 19 minutes at the rate of 45,000 cubic feet daily. Recovery was 600 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud, which was 50 per cent 42.7-gravity oil. Five gallons of distillate were recovered from the gas flow. No formation water developed.

Operator was pulling tool after taking a one-hour drillstem test from 9,496 to 9,561 feet. No gas or oil surfaced on the test.

Ellenburger was topped at 9,275 feet, elevation 2,899 feet. Location is 1,980 feet from north and 600 feet from west line of section 9, block 11, University Lands survey and three miles northwest of Big Lake.

**Texas Gulf Sets Pipe In No. 1 Headlee; Is To Make More Hole**

Texas Gulf Producing Company No. 1 C. V. Headlee, Central-East Ector County wildcat, only a short distance west of the Midland County line is bottomed at 13,106 feet in the Ellenburger and has a string of 5 1/2-inch casing cemented at total depth.

Operator expects to leave the project standing until after the holidays. Then the plug on the pipe will be drilled out and more of the Ellenburger section will be cut. Total depth of No. 1 Headlee had originally been reported at 13,108 feet. Electric logs corrected to make it 13,106 feet.

Tentative top of the Ellenburger was picked from samples to be at 13,090 feet. The electric logs corrected that point to make it 13,076 feet.

Derrick floor elevation is 2,914 feet. The section of the Ellenburger so far drilled in this wildcat has not logged any appreciable shows of petroleum.

wildcat encountered some shows of possible production in the Pennsylvanian, the Devonian and the Fusseiman.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 8, block 41, T-2-S, T&P survey. It is three and three-quarter miles east and slightly north of Odessa.

**Development Of Tidelands Urged**

**UN Quits After All-Night Tiff With Bickering Reds**

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.—(AP)—A weary United Nations Assembly early Monday turned down a bitter Russian demand for condemnation of the United States for the alleged mass murder of Red prisoners on Pongmang Island in Korea. Immediately after—at 4:45 a.m.—the Assembly adjourned until February 24, after the inauguration of U. S. President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Red-eyed after a tense all-night debate, Assembly delegates voted 45 "nays" to five Soviet bloc "yeas" against the Russian proposal. Ten members of the Arab-Asian bloc abstained. The other three in that

group—Iraq, Lebanon and Thailand—voted against the Soviet move. The Soviet bloc gained no support outside of its own tight little group for the resolution, which was denounced by U. S. Delegate Ernest A. Gross as a "sickening" and "shabby midnight propaganda stunt." Gross, replying to charges launched at midnight Saturday by Soviet Delegate Andrei A. Gromyko said the riot on December 14 in which 87 persons were killed was engineered to help the Kremlin cover up the fact that "the aggressors and their sponsors have rejected peace in Korea." He said the guards fired at the rioting Reds

to quell them and to avoid greater casualties. Gross referred to the blunt rejection by the Communists of the Indian peace plan approved by the General Assembly December 3 by a vote of 54 to 5 (Soviet bloc) with Nationalist China abstaining. "The Soviet government," Gross said, "may now recognize the mistake it made in so brutally rejecting the Indian resolution for peace in Korea and in so contemptuously flouting the will of the United Nations."

'Guinea Pigs' Selwyn Lloyd, British minister of state; Henri Hoppenot, France; Selim Sarper, Turkey; Alexis Kyrrou, Greece; David Johnson, Canada, and Leslie K. Munro, New Zealand—whose countries have troops fighting in Korea—assured Gross they were standing with him in indignant repudiation of the Soviet tactics and allegations. Lloyd said it "is a matter of bitter regret on the eve of Christmas to have this poisonous propaganda injected here." He expressed confidence in the UN Command in Korea.

Gromyko charged that in May, 1951, the U. S. shipped 1,400 Chinese and North Korean prisoners to the U. S. to serve as "guinea pigs in atom experiments;" that on May 10, 1952, American hangmen gouged out the eyes of 18 prisoners, and that on May 30, 1952, the U. S. burned 800 prisoners alive in flame-thrower experiments.

Hoppenot, answering for the West, said the guinea pig charge was "odious." Lloyd, in his turn on the rostrum, referred to a statement by Mrs. Gertrude Sekanlova, the Czech delegate, that the UN Command destroyed the "modest effects" the prisoners kept in their huts.

The British minister reminded the Assembly that he had visited the camps himself and had noticed that among the "modest effects" were such things as sharp spears, guns with knives and other weapons. The debate alternated among Soviet satellites and members of the Western or neutral camps until the speakers were talked out, utterly weary.

**15 Die, 370 Hurt By Japanese Blast**

NAGOYA, JAPAN.—(AP)—A thundering blast of exploding hydrogen leveled a chemical fertilizer plant Monday, killing at least 15 workers. Police, still digging through the ruins, said five persons were missing and 370 injured, 70 critically.

Their search for bodies dropped their figures from earlier reports of 30 killed and 550 injured. The explosion shook the city like the B-29 raids of World War II. It stripped the concrete away from the steel framework of the new building and sent it hurtling through the air.

Poison fumes from the released chemicals forced police, firemen and U. S. Air Force volunteer workers to don gas masks. The violent blast ripped apart the main works of the Toa Synthetic Chemical Company, one of Japan's major producers of chemical fertilizer.

Homes and stores in a radius of several blocks were damaged badly. Damage \$14,000,000. The explosion demolished the new ferro-concrete building that housed part of the factory's ammonium sulphate plant. Damage was estimated at 14 million dollars.

The company's president, Ikoma Nonaka, said the whole factory system probably would have to be closed. There was no fire of any proportions, however, Nagoya firemen said.

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**Record Mails Fail To Disrupt Postal Operation In City**

This is a Christmas of contradictions for Postmaster N. C. Oates. "Even though this has been our biggest Post Office Christmas, mailing procedure has been the smoothest," he pointed out. Twenty-five per cent less help has been required because of the new parcel post annex. And there were three record-breaking household deliveries Sunday.

Many persons, Oates said Monday, aren't picking up their parcels. He reminds the public that windows will be closed and that there will be no mail and parcel deliveries Christmas Day, except for special delivery and perishable goods. Oates reports a steady daily decrease in Christmas mail this week—a little earlier than usual. There were 103,000 outgoing letters last Tuesday. On Wednesday, 101,000 outgoing letters were received. Only 55,000 outgoing letters were mailed Saturday.

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**Six Texans Known Dead In Air Crash**

By The Associated Press. The casualty list of history's worst air disaster show that a number of Texans were killed while enroute home for Christmas. With less than half of the 86 victims identified, the list showed the names of six Texans.

Four Texans were known to have escaped when the huge C-124 Globemaster transport crashed early Saturday at Moses Lake, Wash. It was headed first for Texas—Kelly Air Force Base, San Antonio—with its load of servicemen on holiday leave.

With the list far from complete the Texans known dead were: A. C. Francisco E. Loy, 300 South 27th Street, McAllen. A. C. Allen C. Carson, Schreiner Institute, Kerrville. A. C. David Martinez, 1625 Durango, San Antonio.

A. C. James Perre Guidry, 1728 11th Street, Port Arthur. Second Lt. Artie Lee Laird, 446 Funston Place, San Antonio. A. C. Paul Kenneth Donahoe, Route 1, Box 839, LaPorte. Larson Air Force Base officials at Moses Lake said they would add the names of more victims identified from time to time.

One Former Reporter Laird, 23, was a former reporter for the Corpus Christi Call Times. He was the son of Mrs. L. L. Laird of Tomball, Harris County.

It was feared Laird was dead or missing before the first casualty list was announced. Harold Eubanks, Houston, a former classmate of Laird at Sam Houston State College, said the lieutenant sent word to his wife in San Antonio that he would be homebound on a C-124 Globemaster leaving Moses Lake early Saturday. **High Winds Return To Harass Midland**

The Midland Empire had pleasant, shopping weather Monday morning but late afternoon was expected to bring a decided change. CAA records at Midland Air Terminal point to "blowing sand and 20-mile winds with gusts up to 30 miles an hour" for late Monday.

The north-to-northwest wind had gained 15 miles an hour by noon. Sand-laden winds had whipped Midland Sunday afternoon as winter came in officially and violently on a driving storm of snow, sleet and freezing rain across the Great Plains. The spell brought spotted rain showers over Texas Monday. West Texas points reported no moisture.

Midland measured wind gusts up to 50 miles an hour, El Paso 44 and Lubbock 45. Some East Texas areas had heavy fog. Only sections of the nation with fair weather were the Southwest and the Gulf States.

Four to nine inches of snow fell in parts of Nebraska and Kansas and lesser amounts through Iowa, Northwestern Missouri and the Dakotas. Winds of 35 to 50 miles an hour velocity whipped the snow into drifts Monday.

Outside the snow areas on the plains, king created traffic and communications hazards. East-Central Iowa reported communications lines were breaking faster than they could be repaired and the state had about 300 long distance circuits out of service.

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**Board Seeks Use Of Areas As Stockpiles**

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—The National Security Resources Board (NSRB) recommended Monday that Congress enact legislation to promote development of oil and gas reserves in submerged coastal lands.

Proposing that some of the areas beneath the marginal seas be set aside as an "underground stockpile" for use in event of war, the board called for a study to determine the best ways of encouraging Tidelands exploration by private individuals and companies.

The board's views were given in a review of a report prepared last Summer by the President's Materials Policy Commission.

"Federal jurisdiction over these lands has been confirmed by the Supreme Court," the board said, adding that legislation permitting entry is all that is needed to fulfill the commission's recommendation for encouraging exploration there.

"The board makes no reference to the fact that President-elect Eisenhower has promised to support legislation to give the states clear title to the submerged lands for a distance of three miles out from shore. Congress may pass such a measure early next year.

The President's commission, which was headed by William C. Pauley, had recommended the federal government encourage immediate exploration for oil on publicly-owned offshore lands. It recommended that leases to private companies, "whether by the federal government or by the states, contain provisions requiring well spacing or withdrawal rates calculated to increase the normal life of the pools with a view to providing faster withdrawals if ever such action is required to meet the needs of war."

"As the Department of Interior says: 'The dilemma which may have to be resolved is to provide for spacing wells widely enough to achieve an "underground stockpile," but also to provide sufficient incentive to encourage private companies to undertake drilling programs.'

The board then recommended that the President direct the Interior Department to determine the best ways of establishing a strategic reserve of petroleum, taking into account such factors as spacing, contract, drilling and government loans to finance drilling operations against subsequent production.

The board also recommended that the President direct the Interior Department to determine the best ways of establishing a petroleum reserve on oil bearing public lands and of promoting cooperation of the states in maintaining conservation practices that will aid the national defense.

"This presumes either that discoveries will be so extraordinarily successful that they will more than balance the added costs of operation, or it presumes that the operators will be subsidized.

Krist is manager of the Barnes and Company shoe store at 120 North Main Street and when he opened for business Monday, he found a pile of shoes on the floor of his stockroom.

He called police and they discovered burglars had gained entrance to the stockroom through a skylight and had tried in vain to force open the door into the salesroom. "When they couldn't get into the salesroom," explained Krist, "they apparently sat down and tried on quiet a few sizes and styles before finding some that satisfied them."

He said an undetermined number of pairs of men's and women's shoes were missing.

**Two More Major Highway Projects Nearing Construction Stage Here**

Two more major highway widening projects in Midland neared the construction stage Monday, close on the heels of the completion and opening last week of the new Front Street route of U. S. Highway 80.

City Manager W. H. Oswalt said Monday the city is preparing to wind up the acquisition within the next few weeks of right-of-way for the two new projects:

1. The widening and building of curb and gutters on West Wall Street from O Street to the intersection with the new Highway 80 alternate route.

2. The widening of building of curbs and gutters on North Big Spring from Texas Street to George Street, in the Midland Draw.

Both projects have been authorized by the Texas Highway Department and the city manager said he had been notified the state is ready to begin work as soon as the city completes the right-of-way acquisition and necessary engineering on one of them.

Meanwhile, Lt. Roy Merket, head of the police department's traffic division, said the new Front Street route is carrying heavy traffic in such amounts that "it is easy to tell the difference on Wall Street."

"I can't see how Wall Street ever carried the traffic it did," said Lieutenant Merket. "I think there's more traffic right now on Front Street than there was on Wall Street alone last week."

From Texas to Illinois Street, Big Spring Street will be widened from 32 to 65 feet.

"Plans for the new parking garage at Texas and Big Spring," said Oswalt, "called for them to set back their own curb and gutters to the new 65-foot width so that much will be out of the way."

From Illinois to Michigan Street, the roadway will be widened from 41 to 65 feet.

And from Michigan on out to George Street, the present roadway will be widened to 65 feet and curbs and gutters will be constructed.

The entire Big Spring project will cover about 20 blocks.

All of the necessary right-of-way has been acquired and the project will be turned over to the State Highway Department midway in January, Oswalt said, as soon as the city completes the engineering work.

The West Wall Street project covers about 12 blocks and the city manager estimated that about half

of the necessary right-of-way already has been acquired.

"The sooner we can get the rest of it," he said, "the sooner we can turn it over to the state for actual construction."

The Wall Street project will begin at O Street where the roadway will be widened to 65 feet for the one block west to the Andrews Highway.

From the Andrews Highway, the present roadway will be widened to 80 feet. Curbs and gutters will be constructed on both sides.

The two highway entrance routes were authorized several months ago by the state.

The city also is seeking projects calling for the widening and construction of curbs and gutters on the Andrews Highway, the Rankin Highway and Florida Street.

SEOUL—(AP)—U. S. Sabre jet pilots blasted three Communist MIG-15's from North Korean skies the Yalu River Monday. The U. S. Fifth Air Force reported.

One MIG was shot down in a twisting dogfight between two Sabres and two MIG's that raged from 41,000 feet down to 23,000. Two other Red jets were downed in a battle between six Sabres and eight MIG's.

The frozen ground front remained quiet except for a few light jets by Chinese Reds on the central front. Temperatures dropped to a bone-chilling five degrees.

B-29's and B-26's roared through clearing skies Sunday night in attacks against Communist supply and transport targets behind the lines.

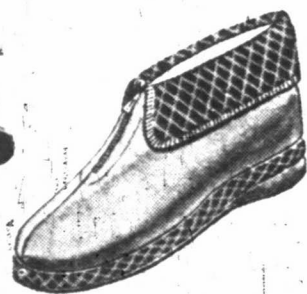

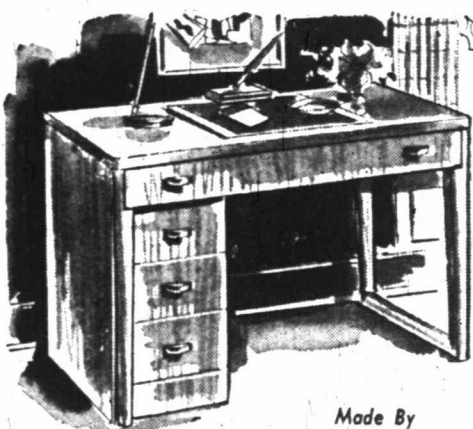

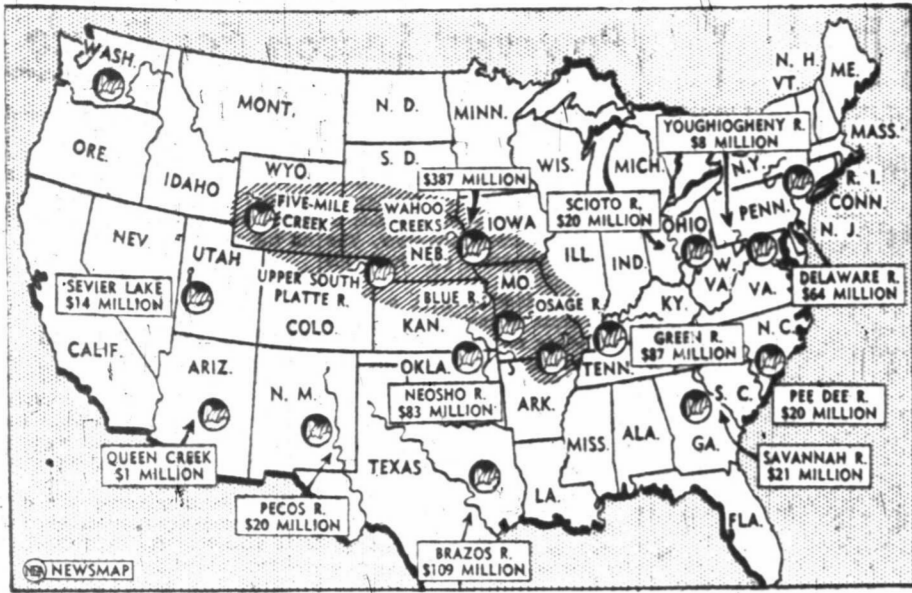

## 'Too Plush' Air Force Bases Draw Ire Of Probers; Kelly Field Cited

By JACK RUTLEDGE

WASHINGTON—(AP)—House investigators, saying many military installations are too plush, suggest the armed forces are capitalizing on the Korean War to wheedle money from Congress for construction that isn't needed.

A House expenditures subcommittee after an investigation of 15 major U. S. bases, said a report released Sunday that it had found evidence of waste, extravagance, "plushness," "unnecessary 'frills' and improper planning.

The report specifically mentioned "over-elaborate construction" it said the watchdog group found at Limestone Air Force Base in Maine, McClellan AFB, Calif., and Kelly AFB Texas.

### Cuba Releases Navy Chieftains Accused Of Plotting Revolt

HAVANA, CUBA—(AP)—The Cuban Navy announced Monday that nine retired officers accused of plotting an armed revolt against President Fulgencio Batista have been released from military prison but still are under house arrest.

The announcement gave no reason for their release but presumably it was to let the men spend Christmas with their families.

The Navy men, including three top commanders, had been dismissed from service soon after Batista overthrew the government of Carlos Prío Socarras last March. They were arrested Saturday night a few hours after police in Mamaroneck, N. Y., seized a store of arms there that they said were to have been used in a "Christmas revolt" in Cuba.

shown "haste and anxiety" to replace usable temporary structures with new buildings, and that inter-service rivalry for new buildings has "overshadowed the desire to get the most defense for the least cost."

"This situation raises the question as to whether the present emergency is being used to obtain additional plant facilities which are nice but not really urgent," the report said.

The subcommittee also suggested that Congress had voted appropriations on the basis of misleading information. Military men, it said, have been describing their needs in "inadequate, inaccurate or misleading" terms.

#### Swanky Barracks

"There have been notable achievements in the expansion of military facilities," the report concluded. "Unfortunately, the directives requiring that the planning and design of construction proceed on the most austere basis which is compatible with the really essential military requirements, have too often received only secondary attention."

The Air Force, the group said, constructs its barracks with hardwood floors, built-in frame closets and drawer space, which it explains as "an inducement to attract personnel to make a career in the Air Force." The subcommittee question-

ed whether such "extras" or "frills" are essential.

As for the new Air Force base at Limestone, the subcommittee said in part:

**Officers' Bathroom**  
"The operations building would compare favorably with the most modern at any private airport. A spacious entrance foyer, with terrazzo floors and a circular stairway to the mezzanine, were in keeping with plush construction throughout the building.

"The bathroom in the BOQ (bachelor officers quarters) had a tile wainscoting six feet high in the lavatory rooms outside of the shower stalls. Portions of the barracks exterior had a brick facing over masonry block which served no functional purpose."

The subcommittee said it found at McClellan Air Force Base that the Global Communications Building had been built at a cost of \$29.55 a square foot, which it said was far above standard but was easily explained "by the visible plushness."

#### Two Texas Bases

At Kelly base, the group said it found "one of the most elaborate

buildings inspected on the trip"—a \$5,500,000 operational and administrative structure for the Air Force security service.

The committee said officers at Carswell Air Force Base at Fort Worth are planning to build a new 200-man dormitory on the basis of a theoretical shortage of space. The committee said the shortage "may not occur."

The report said a "shocking" amount of duplication and waste was found at Kelly, where separate facilities are being constructed for the Air Force Security Service. The committee said it was unable to learn why the domestic defense activities are not coordinated in joint facilities for all three services.

The committee also recommended that the Air Force eliminate the "luxurious features" of Kelly's \$5,500,000 communications building from future blueprints.

Leonard Neil (Pete) Williams, 23, also of Lorenzo, but no relation to the woman killed earlier, died in a two-car collision near Idalou. Three youths from Lubbock, returning from a football game in Dallas, were injured.

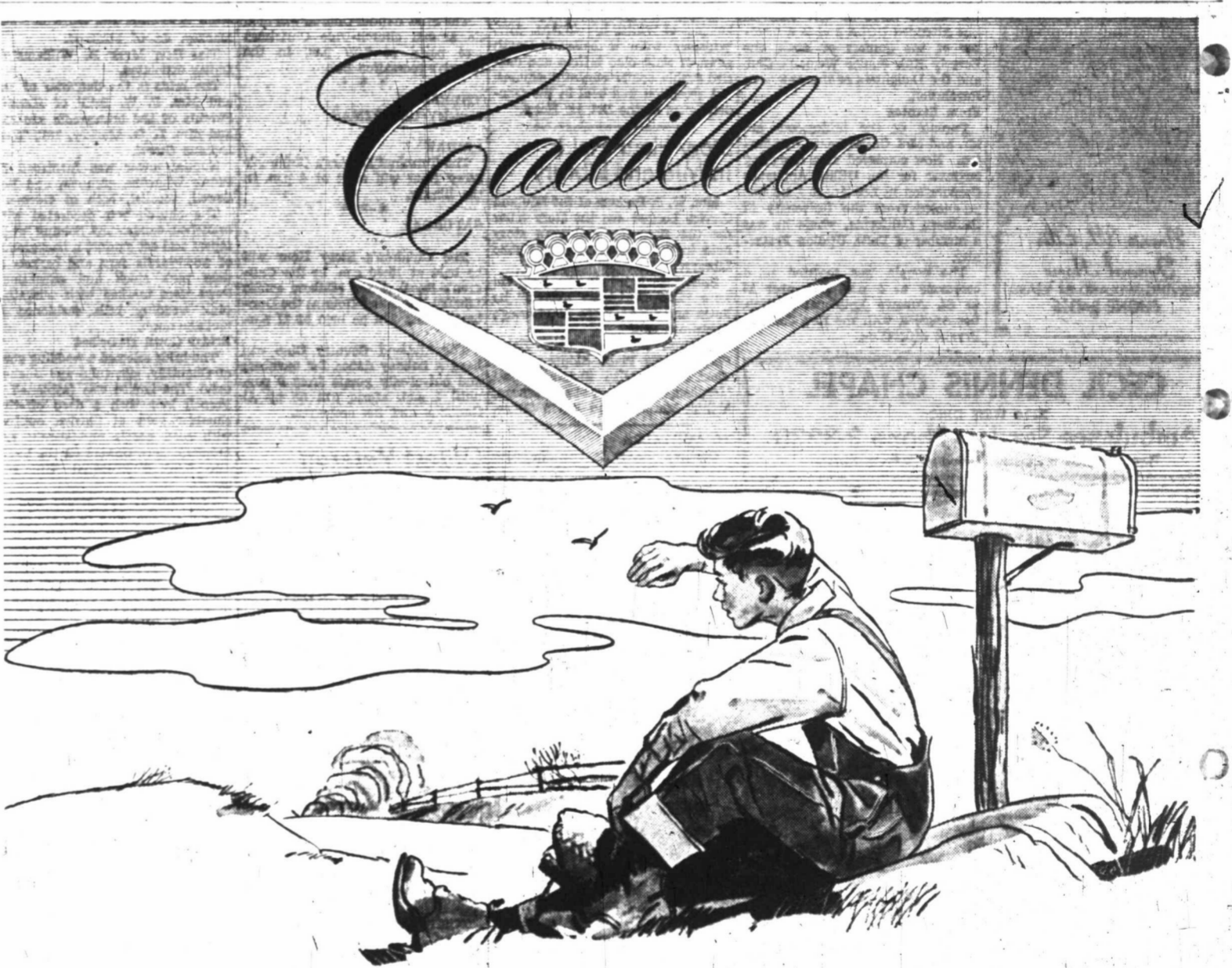

**Missouri City Of 80,000 Shivers In Pre-Yule Chill**

ST. JOSEPH, MO.—(P)—A pre-Christmas chill enveloped this Northwest Missouri city—and for some of its 80,000 residents there

may be at least three more shivering days ahead. That affected about 14,000 out of the 25,000 homes, plus 1,500 businesses.

And brother, the temperatures have been plenty chilly—below freezing most of the time. Monday, the city got sleet and snow, further handicapping the gas company's efforts to restore service.

It took only a few hours to repair the break, but here's the rub:

Every meter in the city must be turned off manually before gas can be sent flowing through the lines again. As a safety measure, the gas company has its own employees or plumbers doing the meter job rather than leaving it to the home owners.

Although gas was back in about 100 homes Sunday night, a company official said the full supply may not be restored for the entire city until at least Christmas.

Those whose houses were heated with gas either bundled up in heavy clothing or moved in friends having oil or coal heating equipment.

You could hardly find an electrical heating appliance in any of the stores. There was a run on them shortly after the break.

One man borrowed a plumber's furnace which burns gasoline and is used to heat lead. He set it up in his living room and found he could keep two rooms warm.

**Charcoal Burner Fails**  
Another man with memories of the old open charcoal braziers filled a dishpan with charcoal and set it afire. But he had forgotten about a flue. And his house filled with gaseous fumes.

To prevent freezing of pipes, some persons let water run through continuously from the faucets.

The fire department answered several alarms at houses where fireplaces or temporary heating devices got out of hand.

Downtown hotels were sold out. The heart of the business district is heated with steam.

The St. Joseph News-Press and the Gazette, evening and morning newspapers, found themselves without typesetting facilities when the gas supply went off. Fifteen of the typesetting machines use gas to melt the metal for type. So containers of bottled gas were obtained as a temporary measure and the newspapers went to press.

The company has recruited men from its branches in other Missouri and Kansas towns to help out on the meters. Many are working 24-hour shifts.

**College Enrollment In Nation Declines**

CINCINNATI.—(P)— Fall enrollment dipped slightly in 830 accredited universities and four-year colleges this year, but the drop was less than anticipated and far less than the 1951 decrease.

This was reported Sunday in the college enrollment survey of Dr. Raymond Walters, president of the University of Cincinnati. He has issued his study results annually since 1919.

Dr. Walters said the 830 colleges reported a total enrollment of 1,293,524 full-time students, a decline of 1.5 per cent from the previous year, and 462,838 part-time students, a decline of 2.8 per cent from 1951.

He added, "The full-time decrease is small when contrasted with the 1951 drop of 11.4 per cent from figures for 1950."

The educator said an unexpected upsurge in freshmen enrollment, coupled with the upper-class girl students remaining in college, was responsible for the continued high enrollment.

**Mrs. Auriol Breaks Own Air Speed Mark**

MARSEILLE, FRANCE.—(P)— Flying a French jet fighter, Mrs. Jacqueline Auriol, daughter-in-law of the French president, broke her own woman's speed record Sunday over a closed 100-kilometer (62.13 mile) course.

Her average time was 534.378 miles an hour. She had made 511.960 miles an hour in May, 1951.

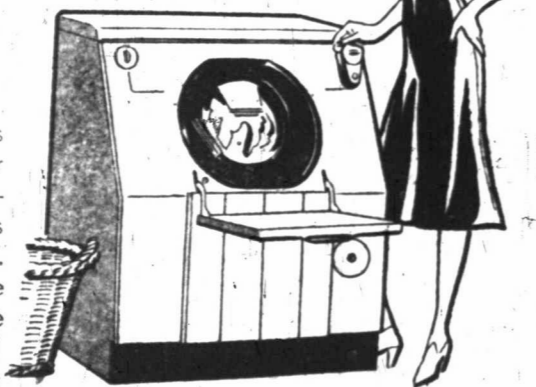

# Two Longshore Union Bosses Jailed On Extortion Charges

NEW YORK —(AP)—A prosecutor's talk of further criminal action in the state waterfront probe followed along the city docks Monday following the arrest of the AFL longshoremen's boss in Lower Manhattan.

District Attorney Frank S. Hogan is using New York State Crime Commission testimony to help chart his way through the maze of racketeering which cost the seven billion dollar shipping industry here an estimated 350 millions annually.

Hogan sailed into the waterfront rackets temple Sunday with his announcement of the arrest on extortion charges of Michael Clemente, a 44-year-old ex-convict official of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association and often described as the "lord" of downtown Manhattan's docks.

Arrested with Clemente was one of his union associates, Alexander Cosmos, 43, of Rutherford, N. J.

The arrests were the second and third related to the current inquiry by the State Crime Commission, and the fifth and sixth in the last few months as a result of action by a New York County (Manhattan) Grand Jury.

Clemente's arrest stirred the most interest of all, for it was the first move against a man described as a power over a large section of piers in the Port of New York, the world's greatest harbor.

Hogan said Clemente ran a "domain" covering miles of docks on the East River, around the tip of Manhattan, and a short distance up the Hudson River. The prosecutor also said Clemente's friends include "the biggest and the littlest people in the underworld."

A grand jury indictment accused Clemente and Cosmos of extorting \$1,500 from the John W. McGrath Corporation, a stevedoring firm, between July 1 and December 15, by threatening "trouble" if McGrath did not employ a hiring boss of their choosing. Both were charged with extortion, coercion and conspiracy.

During the State Crime Commission's public hearing on the waterfront, Clemente was named in testimony by an official of another stevedoring company as the recipient of \$11,000 to help pay the costs of power in dock areas.

A Baltimore Hotel wedding party for Clemente's daughter in September, 1951. Testimony showed repayment of the money was neither asked nor made.

Grand Jury Extended  
The State Crime Commission recessed its waterfront hearings last Friday until next month.

Hogan, announcing the Clemente and Cosmos arrests, said the grand jury has been extended to March, 1953, and that his office is reviewing public and private testimony before the Crime Commission. The

prosecutor said a search also was being made for as much additional information "as we can get our hands on."

Clemente and Cosmos, who are officials in ILA Local 856, were held in bail of \$10,000 each for arraignment Monday in General Sessions. Conviction on the charges could mean prison sentences of 7 1/2 to 15 years.

Next week, Clemente is scheduled to face trial in federal court on a charge of making false and fraudulent statements in an offer to compromise on an income tax suit.

AMARILLO —(AP)— Joseph O. Holland, 64, partner in a clothing store here since 1919, died Sunday after a heart seizure.

The attack came as he was driving home after an afternoon at his favorite sport, skeet shooting. When Holland slumped over the wheel, the slowly moving car stalled at the side of the street.

Holland won the Tri-State Skeet tournament here in 1937 when he was 69.

AMARILLO MERCHANT, SKEET CHAMPION, DIES

AMARILLO —(AP)— Fire Chief M. F. Schulte of suburban Carnegie credited the 45-year old projectionist of a theater with averting a disaster during a quick-spreading fire which destroyed a three-story building occupied by the Louisa Theater.

More than 200 patrons, mostly children, were attending a matinee Sunday when John Stanton saw smoke curling from the ceiling. He stopped his projection machine, turned on the lights and told the audience:

"There is no reason to be alarmed—just walk out quickly—don't run—and stay out until we're sure everything is all right."

The fire, which caused damage estimated by Schulte at more than \$150,000 swept the building. The top floors were occupied by bowling alleys.

One of Stanton's four children, Robert, eight, was among the theater patrons. His father's first act, after clearing the theater, was to call home for assurance of his son's safety.

Claude L. Dobbins, Oil Operator, Dies

HOUSTON —(AP)— Claude L. Dobbins, independent oil operator in Houston, died Sunday in a Galveston hospital.

Before becoming an independent operator in 1928 he had been general manager of the Gulf Coast Oil Corporation and division manager of the production department of the Atlantic Oil Producing Company.

Funeral services were scheduled here at 4 p.m. Monday.

DR. JORDAN SAYS

Bluish Spots On Skin Call For Careful Search For Purpura

An interesting subject is brought up by D. W. T., who writes: "Please tell me what causes purpura. Is there a cure for this disease?"

First, for the benefit of those readers who have never heard of purpura, this is a condition in which purple patches, usually small, appear on the skin or mucous membranes, resulting from leakage of blood into these areas. It is similar, therefore, to an ordinary bruise and indeed in the presence of purpura, black and blue bruises are likely to appear much more readily.

There are many complicated aspects of purpura; it can develop as a result of a large number of infections, including measles, meningitis, or pneumonia; it can follow administration of drugs in those who are sensitive to certain of them. In many cases it is related to malfunctioning of the spleen. In some the cause cannot be discovered at all.

In a more general way, it may be related to changes in the capillary blood vessels which allow the blood to sweep through more easily than usual, or to changes in the various parts of the blood itself.

Whenever purpura occurs a number of tests must be taken to find out what kind of purpura is present, what treatment offers the best chances of improvement, and what the outlook is for recovery.

If the condition, for example, is the result of an infection which is likely to improve, little may need to be done; if it is the result of taking some drug, perhaps discontinuing the drug alone will be enough.

On the other hand, if it is the kind of purpura resulting from malfunctioning of the spleen, serious consideration will have to be given to removing that organ. In fact, in the splenic kind of purpura removing all of the spleen may be the answer.

Removal Does No Harm

It is a curious fact that the spleen, which lies in the abdominal cavity, and the functions of which are not yet fully understood, can be removed not only without harmful effects, but also with great benefit in a few conditions. Purpura is sometimes one of them.

Although most readers of this column will fortunately never have occasion to become personally concerned about purpura, they should realize that the development of these bluish spots in the mucous membrane or on the skin are signs of something which should involve immediate and careful investigation.

# Runaway Freight Car Kills Woman In Grade Collision

SOUTH PASADENA, CALIF.—(AP)—A runaway freight car killed a woman and critically hurt her husband, police said, in a wild five-mile dash at speeds up to 75 miles an hour on tracks through heavily populated residential districts.

A locomotive chased the refrigerator car, loaded with frozen corn, more than two miles Sunday night but was unable to catch up. Locomotive engineer H. C. Weber sounded a continuous warning blast on his air horn as the careening car dashed through grade crossings.

Starting at Pasadena, the car raced through this community and then into Los Angeles on the main line of the Santa Fe. Finally it rammed into a string of freight cars being switched in the Los Angeles yards. Railway employes escaped injury from flying wreckage.

Police Sgt. J. G. Wiggenhorn said Mrs. Carrie Andrews, 59, of Pasadena was killed and her husband Owen, also 59, critically injured

when the freight car crashed into their auto at a crossing. After the crossing accident, the car jumped on the ties several hundred feet, regained the rails and then picked up speed down grade toward Los Angeles.

Railway officials, who immediately launched an investigation, said the car broke away from a string of cars during switching operations.

# Inventor Of Many U. S. Weapons Dies

DAYTON, OHIO—(AP)—Harvey D. Geyer, retired chief engineer of the Inland Manufacturing Division of General Motors Corporation and who was responsible for improvements in several World War II weapons, died in a hospital here Sunday night.

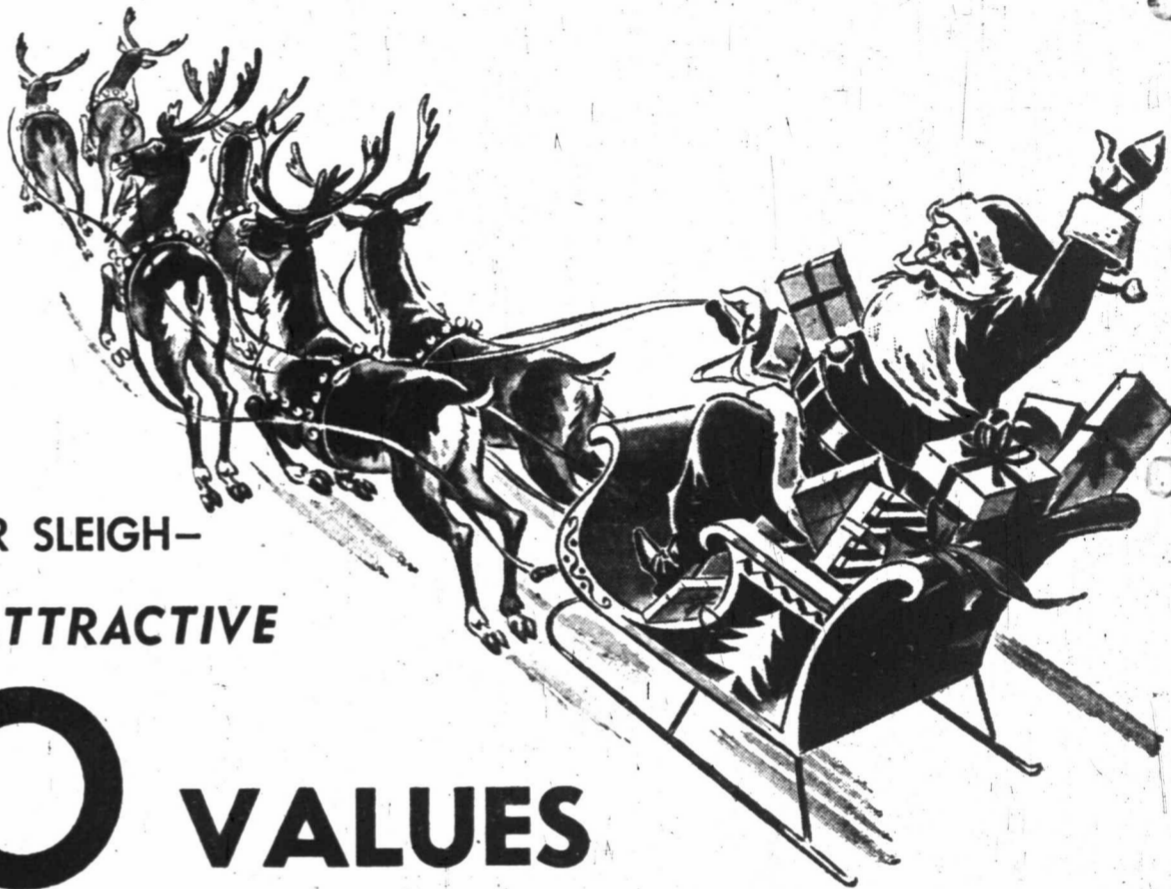

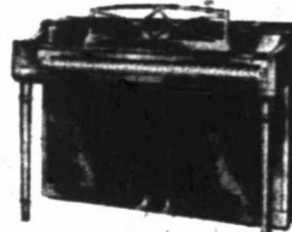

# Wink, Terrell Are Favorites To Capture Schoolboy Titles

## Finals In Classes A, AA To Ring Down '52 Curtain

Terrell plays Youkum at College Station Friday and Wink meets Deer Park at Wink Saturday in the finals of the Texas schoolboy football campaign, with state championships riding on each result.  
Lubbock and Breckenridge packed away the mole skins Monday and dusted off places in their trophy rooms for the emblems of state titles. Lubbock repeated as Class AAAA king Saturday with a 12-7 victory over Baytown. Breckenridge did the same in Class AAA, beating Temple 28-20.  
Terrell and Wink will be favorites to win the Class AA and Class A titles respectively.

Terrell goes after the Class AA crown with an undefeated, untied record. The Tigers meet a Youkum outfit that lost one game—a 21-0 thing in early season. Gonzales, which got nowhere in the state race, did it.  
But there is no way to compare Terrell and Youkum as they did not play mutual opponents and are in different sections of the state. Youkum staged an upset last week in eliminating hitherto undefeated, untied Huntsville, 26-19. Terrell stormed into the finals with a strapping 20-0 victory over unbeaten, untied Stamford.  
Wink Gets Nod  
Wink probably will get the nod over Deer Park in a battle of teams that came from far back to spin some surprising victories in the drive to the finals. Wink lost two of its first three games but rallied to slam into the semifinals with a minimum of trouble. Last week the Wildcats beat out Van, 14-7.  
Deer Park really is a surprise for the finals. This team lost its first two games, one to Cedar Bayou, a team the Deer hurdled last week to get into the finals. Deer Park struggled to a 13-13 tie with favored Cedar Bayou and won the decision on penetrations.  
High Scorers Left  
All four of the teams left in the schoolboy football race have high-scoring records but Wink is the champion of all. The Wildcats have rolled up 504 points in 14 games—an average of 36 a contest.  
Terrell has scored 453 points in 14 games. Youkum has counted 440 and Deer Park has romped to 415. Terrell has the best defensive record. The Tigers have given up only 11 points. They showed their defensive might to advantage in the conquest of Stamford. Only once did the Bulldogs move inside the Terrell 24-yard line.  
Youkum Features Passer  
Terrell runs into one of the finest passers in the state in Bobby Manning of Youkum. He thundered through the air for 211 yards against Huntsville last week, two of his shots being on its touchdowns.  
Wink depends on its fine quarterback, Ken Vinson, to keep its offense rolling, but it was Dan Villalare who scattered to the touchdown that beat Van last week.  
Little Jerry Harris is the ace of a versatile Deer Park offense.

# Reds' Arraignment Asked In Katyn Forest Massacre

WASHINGTON—(AP)— A congressional committee recommended Monday that Russia be arraigned before the International Court on charges of murdering 15,000 Poles during World War II in the Katyn Forest massacre.

In a report to the House, a special committee which investigated the killings in Eastern Russia said also the incoming Congress should undertake an immediate investigation of Communist atrocities against UN troops in Korea.

The committee spent more than a year investigating the disputed blame for the Katyn Forest atrocity.

## Westbrook Seeks Parley With Adlai To Protest Firing

HOT SPRINGS, ARK. —(AP)— Lawrence Westbrook has asked Illinois Gov. Adlai Stevenson for a personal interview to protest Westbrook's dismissal from the Democratic National Committee.

Westbrook, a native of Belton, Texas, was dismissed as assistant chairman of the committee just before the presidential election. At the time he was in Dallas helping Rep. Sam Rayburn in the Stevenson campaign in Texas.

His son, Joe Westbrook, San Antonio, said Sunday his father had asked for the interview and that National Committee chairman Stephen Mitchell had refused a similar request for an investigation of his dismissal.

Westbrook was dismissed for his alleged part in a tungsten contract with Portugal. He said the negotiations were begun before he became a committee member.

# Arrests, Recovery Of Loot End Oakwood Robbery Case

CENTERVILLE —(AP)— Officers Monday considered the Oakwood State Bank robbery last Wednesday as solved.

The bank had back almost all of the \$14,376 taken by two fast moving gunmen in the early morning holdup.

Two merchant seamen were in jail charged with the robbery. Each man made a written statement saying he took part in the holdup.

Sunday night a group of officers dug up \$13,994 that was buried in a smoke house at the home of William T. Davis in Buffalo. With the cash in a five gallon can were a number of bonds and other papers.

The money was turned over to Oakwood bank officials.

Davis and Donald B. Patterson, 24, were charged last Friday with robbery by firearms.

Davis was arrested at the Galveston draft board last Thursday as he was making arrangements which would permit him to ship out again as a merchant seaman.

Takes Lie Test

He denied taking part in the robbery until Saturday night when he was taken to Austin and given a lie detector test. After the test he made a signed statement.

Patterson was arrested Saturday night as he stepped from a train in Greensboro, N. C., his home. FBI agents said he admitted participating in the robbery.

Davis' brother-in-law, C. D. Johnson, of Buffalo, said he drove to Galveston with the two men on the day of the robbery. He said they drove into his yard in Davis' car about 9 a.m. The bank was robbed about 8:35 a.m.

Oakwood is about 16 miles from Buffalo.

DEMING, N. M. James Delbert Veale, 68, Amarrillo, was killed and his wife injured when the car in which they were riding turned over near here Sunday.

Mrs. Veale was treated at a Deming hospital for minor injuries.

## Brother Of Famed Bullfighter Gored

MEXICO CITY—(AP)— Juan Espinosa, a brother of Mexico's famed bullfighter Armillita, was gored dangerously in Sunday's bullfight.

Espinosa was placing the banderillas, the beflagged barbs in the fourth bull as part of the team of Luis Miguel Dominguez, the Spanish bullfighter. He leaped out of the arena after being hooked but doctors reported later he had been gored in the chest and abdomen.

The medical report added that his internal organs were damaged and that "his life is in grave danger."

Y. —(AP)—Police barred the environs of Sing Sing Prison Sunday to a delegation of 716 persons who came here from New York City to demonstrate for clemency for the doomed atom spies, Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. The delegation, which came by an eight-car special train, was sponsored by the Civil Rights Congress. The Congress is listed by the U. S. attorney general's office as subversive and Communist. A demonstration with speeches was staged at the railroad station in the rain. The demonstrators were not allowed to march down the street toward the prison where the Rosenbergs are in the death house, and at no time was the crowd closer to the prison than 2,000 feet.

## French Liner Runs Aground In Storm On Lebanon Coast

BEIRUT, LEBANON —(AP)—The 12,546-ton French passenger liner Champollion, which sailed from Marseille a week ago with 469 persons aboard, ran aground Monday three miles south of Beirut during a storm. She was reported listing about 600 yards off shore with a vertical crack down the middle. A spokesman for the liner's operators in France said the vessel carried 219 passengers and a crew of 250 when she left Marseille. The Champollion stopped at Alexandria, Egypt, and the spokesman said he did not know how many passengers departed there, if any, or how many others boarded the vessel. The harbor master at Haifa, 75 miles south of Beirut, radioed the master of the Champollion asking just what assistance he needed. Israeli civil and naval craft, eager to put out to sea and help, remained in Haifa Harbor until diplomatic negotiations involving Lebanese and French authorities and the UN Armistice Commission were concluded. Rescue Craft Admitted. In midafternoon, the French advised Israel that Lebanon would permit Israeli ships to enter Lebanese waters and help out. A harbor tugboat set out from Haifa at once. By midafternoon, a line was rigged from ship to shore but none of the personnel aboard had been taken off. Camille Chamoun, Lebanon's president, was among the thousands of sightseers who lined the shore. Coast guardsmen, ambulances, police and troops stood by in readiness to help. Battered by high seas as she lay on the sandbar off Sidon, the Champollion's back broke about mid-morning and in addition to about a 20 degree list to port there was a list of about 10 degrees on either side of the split. Earlier, Israeli assistance had been halted for a time.

## Talks With Business Leaders, Government Experts Occupy Ike

NEW YORK —(AP)—Two business executives discussed international trade programs with Dwight Eisenhower Monday and one said afterwards, "No one in this country has a better grasp of the matter" than the President-elect. Eisenhower conferred at his hotel headquarters with George A. Sloan, New York textile industrialist and chairman of the U. S. Council of the International Chamber of Commerce, and with Warren Lee Pierson, chairman of Trans World Airlines and chairman-elect to succeed Sloan. Others on Eisenhower's calling list Monday were key officials of the new Administration and representatives of "the committee on the present danger." The President-elect took time out from a planned weekend of rest Sunday to confer for two hours at his Columbia University residence with another committee he recently named to study and streamline organization of the executive branch of the government. James C. Hagerly, Eisenhower's press secretary, said the committee made a preliminary report and probably will meet again with the general in advance of his inauguration January 20. Hagerly did not disclose what recommendations the group made. Midlander's Kin Dies In Howard. Cornell Smith, brother of John L. Smith, 219 Rigdon Drive, died Saturday in Big Spring. ## Air Disaster Sets Off Fresh Demands For Safety Checks

MOSES LAKE, WASH. —(AP)—A military investigation of history's worst plane crash was under way Monday as demands rose for a civilian probe of the accident that claimed 86 lives here early Saturday. Civilian officials in and out of the government called for investigations and action to reduce the number of military plane crashes. Saturday's crash, which killed all but 30 of the men aboard the U. S. military's biggest airplane, was the tenth in a recent series which has snuffed out more than 300 lives. Calls began immediately for grounding of military aircraft while safety precautions and plane checks are taken. Senator Richard Russell (D-Ga.) called for an exhaustive investigation. He said it was possible a subcommittee of his Senate Armed Services Committee would take action on the Moses Lake disaster. At Larson Air Force Base, starting point of the flight, the grim and tedious job of identifying the dead continued. The process was slow because many of the victims, were mangled and burned beyond recognition. A study of dental records was being made by identification experts. An Air Force captain with years of experience flying heavy equipment said he thought the plane just couldn't develop enough power to rise from the runway. He was Capt. George Demas of Cleveland, Ohio, and Charleston, S. C. His observations were made first hand—he was one of the passengers who lived through the crash. Kiwanis Club members sang Christmas carols at their weekly luncheon in the Cactus Restaurant Monday. Claude E. Neeley was the leader and Billy Whitehead played the piano. Kelly Bell arranged the program.

## Young Mother Plans Holiday Before Disease Claims Life

LOS ANGELES —(AP)—A Los Angeles mother has decorated the tree and plans to spend a merry Christmas Day with her husband and three young sons. Then she'll go to the hospital for delivery of the fourth baby, that may bring an end to her life. "Death is the least of my worries," smiles Mrs. Jean Garrett, 27. "If I can have my baby, I'll die happy. I'm going to try again this Christmas to forget my troubles and make it a happy time for everyone." For the young mother has known for more than a year that she suffers from an incurable lymphatic ailment known as Hodgkin's disease. After the birth of her third child, Raleigh, 18 months, doctors told her she probably couldn't live through Christmas, 1951. "As you can see, the doctors were wrong. The prayers and the faith of those I love—my husband, my children, my mother, my friends and a thousand strangers—kept me alive." Mrs. Garrett's fourth child will be delivered by Caesarean section. ## SIX-MONTH 'TOUR OF INFERNO'—

### Royal Panel Gives Report On Study Of Divorce Law

LONDON—The Royal Commission on Marriage and Divorce has finished its "conducted tour of the 20th Century Inferno." That's the way one newspaper summed up the Royal Commission's six-month inquiry into the divorce laws of England and Scotland.

It heard testimony from some 90 witnesses, studied letters from more than 2,000 individuals and read 250 briefs filed by official and semi-official bodies. And now the commission, which was appointed by the present government, is expected to recommend many changes in present divorce procedure.

**Marriage At 15**  
Testimony ranged from the dour forebodings of Dr. Geoffrey F. Fisher, Archbishop of Canterbury, who sees the breakdown of modern marriage everywhere.

and him to the "biologic facts" of Marie C. Stopes, who advocates lowering the legal marriage age for girls to 15. "When a woman is biologically capable of bearing a child she should be legally capable of marrying."

One witness demanded that wives should be given one-tenth of their husband's pay, deductible from his paycheck, as "expense" money. Another said husbands should be forgiven just one little infidelity.

**Three-Year Trials**  
Some of the peculiarities of British divorce law, which witnesses wanted changed are:  
A divorce cannot be granted until the married couple has given marriage a three-year fair trial, except in unusual cases.

Refusal without good cause to have children is neither a ground for divorce nor annulment.  
A divorced person cannot marry another or sister of his divorced spouse.

A husband can claim damages from a co-respondent, but a wife is not allowed to collect from the "other woman."

Neither alcoholism nor drug-taking are grounds for divorce, nor is a long-term prison sentence.  
The only grounds for divorce recognized by British law, which was

broadened considerably in 1937, are: adultery, desertion without cause for three years immediately preceding the petition, cruelty, incurable insanity and unnatural practices on the part of the husband.

**'Pretend Adultery'**  
Ninety per cent of the marriages dissolved in Britain are on grounds of adultery and desertion. The law requires adequate proof to back up these accusations.

In a large number of divorce cases the husband is forced against his will to commit adultery—or to pretend to do so—in order to give his wife "grounds." That was the claim of a London University professor, who added that, consequently, both partners lie and perjure themselves in court. He started the Royal Commission with his attack upon the so-called "hotel divorce."

**Strange Bedfellows**  
Mrs. Eirene White, Socialist member of Parliament, and sponsor of divorce reform legislation, says that she has received hundreds of letters from persons who, failing to get a divorce from their mates, have entered into illicit unions with third parties.

"Some of them," Mrs. White told the Commission, "are bringing children into the world. The largest family I know of in these circumstances is the eight children of a London bus driver."

Cruelty (wilful conduct causing danger to health, bodily or mental) accounted for only 12 per cent of the divorce petitions filed in 1951. One explanation: a respondent will contest hotly a charge of cruelty, as it is likely to impair his future matrimonial prospects.

The Commission's hearings did not close without one sideswipe at the American wife.

Canon Hugh C. Warner, of the Church of England, gave the Royal Commission his version of married life in America:

"The modern American wife," the canon declared, "tends to feel she must wake up early in the morning to get her paint and powder on before her husband has awakened. Otherwise, she feels she may not have him by the evening."

## DOG FINDS WALLET

WESTLOCK, CANADA—(P)—When farmer Bert Anderson lost his wallet containing \$300 while haying, he and three other men searched for six hours without success. The Royal Canada Mounted Police dog "Astra" was called in and sniffed out the wallet in half an hour.

## Even Roses Must Follow Party Line

VIENNA—(P)—Hungary's Communist regime doesn't like the names of certain roses—they smell too much of the West.  
The official newspaper Szabad Nep criticized the names of roses in a public park—Lord Rossmore, Lord Charlemont, The Duchess of Sutherland, Lady Ashton, Lady Forst, Golden Ophelia, Pope Plus XII, Maria Theresa.  
The newspaper suggested they be given more "glorious" names, like "May 1, November 7, Red Star, Liberation"—all with Communist significance.

## Loser Pays Off Bet With Racing 'Hound'

DENVER—(P)—When Jack Andersen got a call to pick up a shipment at the railway express office, he figured it probably was some lubricant for his gasoline station. It turned out to be a crate containing a full-size racing greyhound.  
It seems that Andersen, his wife and Clyde O. Means, who owns a kennel of racing dogs, had gone to the Colorado Springs track together last summer. One of Means' dogs, Kay Trump, was running. Andersen offered to wager his Cadillac car against the dog that Kay Trump wouldn't finish in the money. Means accepted, then watched his dog wind up far back.

Andersen forgot the incident until he called at the express company to find Kay Trump. Andersen said he wasn't too happy to add a racing canine to his household and his wife wasn't either.

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# Farmers Do Biggest Production Job In 1952 But Prices Suffer Cutbacks

WASHINGTON (AP)—American agriculture turned in its biggest production job in 1952. The combined output of food and fiber crops and livestock and livestock products was the largest in history. It topped the previous year's production by three per cent. Biggest gains were in meat animals and food grains.

Reflecting a heavy consumer demand for more beef and favorable prices, farmers expanded cattle numbers to a record level. Those numbers now stand at more than 90,000,000 head. This is an increase of more than 13,000,000 head in four years.

A further expansion in cattle is expected in 1953—a year that may see consumer supplies of meat become the largest in any peacetime year.

Farmers harvested the second largest wheat crop and the second largest corn crop in history. These crops served to assure ample supplies and reserves for possible emergencies for at least another 18 months.

**Incomes Lower**  
Produced also were larger than average crops of oats, flaxseed, rice, hay, soybeans, tobacco, fruits and vegetables.

But farm returns did not match farm production. The Agriculture

Department reported farmers received a total net income—income left after paying production costs—of 14,200,000,000. This is about 15 per cent less than the record received in 1947, and virtually the same as the amount received in 1951.

Farmers actually received about three per cent more dollars for their products in 1952 than in 1951. But their production costs were higher. Had farm prices kept pace with increases in prices farmers paid for production materials, their income would, of course, have topped 1951.

**Higher Averages**  
Farm receipts from livestock products were down about three per cent as lower average prices more than offset a three per cent increase in

volume. Returns from crops increased about 12 per cent, mostly because of a nine per cent increase in the volume of sales.

This year's decline in livestock receipts was largely in meat animals, eggs and wool. Dairy receipts were up almost five per cent, mainly because of higher average prices.

Farm economists say farmers are not likely to receive more from marketings in 1953 than they received in 1952. The domestic demand for farm products probably will be well maintained during the coming year, but some reduction in demand for export seems likely. As a result, prices received by farmers in 1953 may average a little lower.

**Drought Losses**  
The level of economic well-being was not uniform for the various

farming regions. Many producers in Eastern, Southeastern, South Central and Southwestern areas suffered heavy crop losses from a severe early Summer drought. Those losses were reflected in the production of cotton, livestock feed grains, hay and pastures.

As a consequence, many farmers were forced to sell off some of their livestock because of inadequate feed supplies. Others were enabled to keep stock through government help in obtaining feed supplies from more plentiful areas.

**Ample Reserves**  
The spectre of a severe drought in 1953 hung over many of the same areas adversely affected in 1952. Prospects were darkest in the Winter wheat producing area of the Southern Great Plains. Little hope was held for a bumper food grain crop in the new year. But ample reserves will prevent a shortage.

A major development on the national farm front in 1952 was a congressional investigation of shortages of government stored under price support programs. In a number of cases, private storage concerns converted these commodities to their own use and were unable to make good to the government.

**Administration Blamed**  
Critics of the Truman Administration blamed these losses—estimated all the way from about \$1,000,000 to \$10,000,000—on lax administration. Several storage concerns were prosecuted. The government tightened up its storage regulations in a move to prevent future losses.

This year brought few changes in farm legislation and in federal farm programs. The only measure of any importance passed by Congress was one extending high-level farm price supports for basic crops for another two-year period—that is, for the 1953 and 1954 crop.

**Support of Prices**  
Under this measure, the government is required to support producer prices of wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco, rice and peanuts at not less than 90 per cent of parity for the two years. This is the level at

which these crops have been supported in recent years. Parity is a standard for measuring farm prices, declared by law to be equally fair to farmers and those who buy their products.

Meanwhile, the year saw a split wider between the Truman Administration and some farm organizations over government farm policies. The powerful American Farm Bureau Federation and National

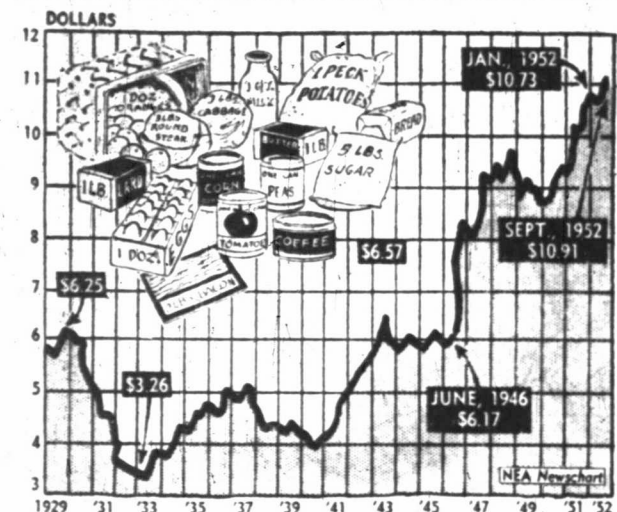
Grange waged a bitter battle against so-called "high" price support policies advocated by President Truman and Secretary of Agriculture Brannan.

**Under U. S. Control**  
The bureau and grange argued that the Administration's policies would soon put farmers under complete domination of bureaucratic agencies.

This issue of conflict over farm

price support levels will be passed on to the Eisenhower Administration to settle. Before 1953, this Administration must decide whether to continue the 90 per cent supports longer or fall back on a so-called "flexible" price support system endorsed by both major parties in 1948.

Of major political importance was action of the Midwestern farm vote in returning to the Republican fold.

## Give Fruit Jells Made At Home

Ever try your hand at making apple-nut-fruit-jell candy? It's a good Christmas-time thought. Fruit jells are a delicious confection. Try gift-wrapping your home-made candy in tinfoil and place it in a toy "choo-choo" train with perky bow that will please the very young—or an attractive basket for the older generation. Here's the recipe:

**Apple-Nut Fruit-Jells**  
(Yield: about 5 dozen gum drops)

One bottle liquid fruit pectin, 1 2 teaspoon soda, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup light corn syrup, 1 2 cup chopped walnuts.

The pectin is made with apple and supplies the apple flavor in the recipe.

Pour liquid fruit pectin into 2 quart saucepan. Stir in soda. (Pectin will foam as soda is added.) Mix sugar and corn syrup in another saucepan.

Place both saucepans over high-heat. Cook both mixtures, stirring alternately, until foam has disappeared from pectin mixture and sugar mixture is boiling rapidly. (This takes about 3 to 5 minutes.)

Pour liquid fruit pectin mixture into a slow, steady stream into boiling sugar mixture, stirring constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute longer.

Remove from heat and add chopped walnuts. Pour immediately in 8 x 8-inch pan. (Or use 8-inch pie pan or round layer pan, or 9 1/2 x 5 1/4 or 10 x 6-inch loaf pans). Let stand at room temperature until mixture is firm and cool (about 3 hours). Cut into 3 1/4-inch squares and roll in confectioners' sugar.

**Note**—If gumdrops are to be stored or packaged, let stand overnight at room temperature before storing to prevent weeping.

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**Beekeepers Improve Quality Of Insects**

SRINAGAR, KASHMIR (AP)—Government officials say the importation of Italian honey bees has improved the local strain.

The development of hybrid types by crossing Kashmir's native bees with queen bees of superior type imported from Italy was so successful that 17 bee colonies including several million insects were bred in one year, officials reported.

Honey production by the new types, bred from the Italian Apis Mellifica species, is said to be far superior to that of the usual Indian types. The Italian-Kashmir honey makers will have their first general showing next year when the All-Indian Beekeepers Conference meets here.

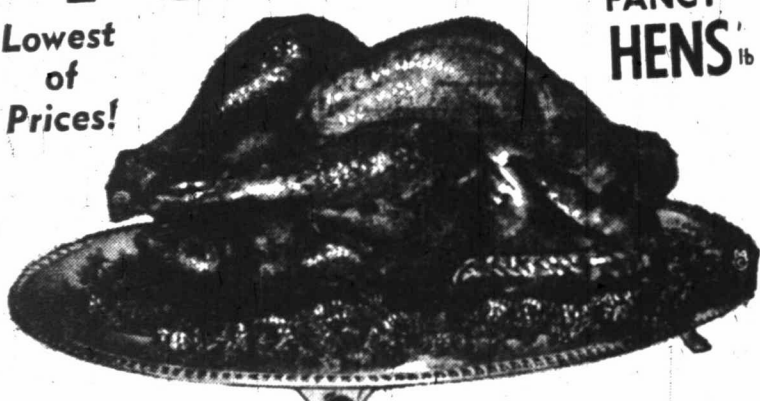

'Budget Trap' Rumored

In Washington the reports persist that President Truman may ask Congress for much less defense money than he requested last year; less, too, than anyone expected him to seek.

This could turn out to be the neatest political trap of the decade for the new Republican Administration.

During the presidential campaign, the Democratic spokesmen declaimed all talk of defense economy by their opponents as cheap tactics. They intimated economy could be achieved only at cost of national safety.

In the meantime, no official in government has announced that the peak of defense activity is about to be reached and passed. Presumably, maximum output is a goal still well ahead of us.

True, expenditures lag substantially behind appropriations, and money voted earlier by Congress could be intended to push production to its peak at some future date; while new appropriations now might forecast a later production drop-off.

But rumor says Truman may recommend a \$12,000,000,000 slash in defense appropriations. That would suggest a pretty sharp decline from any projected peak.

If such deep cuts actually are urged in the President's January budget message, it will be fair to suspect that he is trying consciously to embarrass his successor, General Eisenhower.

Since reductions of that size this year would be totally unrealistic, Eisenhower naturally would have to request higher sums. Then Truman would have the GOP trapped into asking Congress for more money than did their lately departed Democratic cousins. And the Republicans' economy talk would be made to sound quite hollow.

No one really knows, of course, that the President will do this. But in his present bitterness over the November 4 election verdict, he might try.

If the new budget does show these drastic reductions, it ought to be measured carefully in public. First, against the Democrats' own statements that such sweeping slashes were impossible. Second, against the government's previously announced defense production goals.

If it becomes readily apparent those goals cannot be attained without heavier outlays, if it is evident as well that Truman has suggested cuts which would halt the rise in output short of the projected levels, then the President will be shown clearly to have resorted to political trickery.

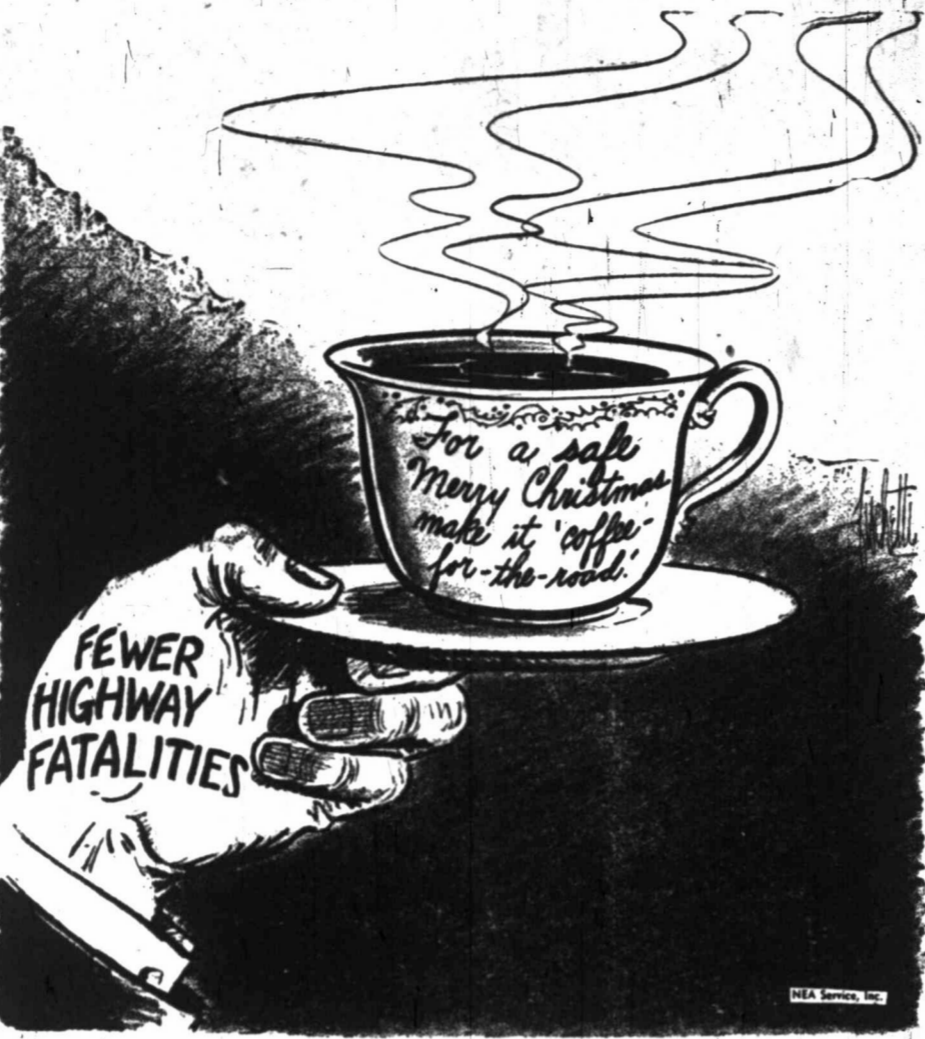
Truman ought to think twice before employing a device that would make it exceedingly difficult for his party to engage in honorable debate on the vital economy issue.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

Drew Pearson says: Taft sweet-talked his way back into Eisenhower's graces; Many GOP senators rebelled against Taft, after his Durkin blast; Eisenhower senators not consulted.

WASHINGTON—The manner in which Senator Bob Taft talked himself back into the good graces of Eisenhower forces and the Senate leadership is not only an amazing political feat, but indicates that both wings of the Republican Party are anxious to avoid a row.

Until exactly one week ago, Taft no longer was "Mr. Big" of the Senate. He was "Mr. Little." His spurs had been trimmed. No longer did he rule the Senate roost.

But on a Sunday afternoon, one week ago, Taft talked himself back into the No. 1 spot.

The talk was with Senator Frank Carlson of Kansas, top congressional mediator for Eisenhower, who became convinced that Taft would play ball on the Eisenhower team. Later, Carlson sold this idea to the President-elect.

The complete inside story of the backstage moves and countermoves by Republican leaders gives some idea of the keel of senatorial dynamite Ike will be sitting on, but also indicates that no Republican senator yet is ready to explode the keg. Here is what happened.

Taft's Early Deal Ordinarily, and before his blast at Secretary-designate of Labor Durkin, Taft had it all worked out to be Senate Republican leader. He had gone to astute young Senator Knowland of California and offered him the Republican policy chairmanship. If Knowland in turn would support Taft as Senate majority leader, Knowland agreed.

And it also was agreed that general Gene Millikin of Colorado would become GOP conference chairman, leaving Senator Styles Bridges of New Hampshire in the lofty, honorary post of president pro tem.

Once all this was set, however, Taft fired his blast against the Durkin appointment, and thereafter the Capitol dome seemed to be falling on Bob's head. Immediately he began to find out who his real friends were.

About 20 GOP senators ran to Bridges of New Hampshire urging him to become majority leader. Some of these 20 Republicans were old Taft supporters, but they decided it wasn't good politics either way.

But Taft gave the Kansas such an earnest sales talk that Carlson changed his mind.

Taft assured that he would cooperate, said he was just as anxious to make the new Republican Administration a success as anyone was; claimed he wanted to do his utmost to maintain party harmony.

His blast against Durkin's appointment, Taft contended, had been misrepresented by the press.

Finally he said that he would ask for very little from the Eisenhower Administration, but the one thing he wanted was to be majority leader of the Senate.

Eisenhower Senators Shunned Impressed, Carlson went to New York, told Eisenhower he felt Taft should be the majority leader, that it was better to have him playing ball on the inside than throwing rocks from the outside.

The last thing Eisenhower wants is to get in wrong with Republican senators by interfering with their prerogatives, so he readily agreed.

One interesting aspect of the backstage by-play is that the original Eisenhower senators—except for Carlson—were not consulted. Senators like Irving Ives of New York, who carried his state half a million votes ahead of Eisenhower; and Cooper of Kentucky, who carried his state while Eisenhower lost it, were not asked for their opinion.

They, together with men like Saltonstall and Duff of Pennsylvania, were among the earliest Eisenhower backers. And while they ran ahead of the ticket, most Taft senators, like Cain, Kern and Ecton, were either defeated or ran far behind Eisenhower.

Some of the original backers felt it was the job of the Senate majority leader to carry out the policies of the President which the people obviously voted to support, not the policies of that wing of the party which was defeated.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By OSWALD JACOBY

Monday's bridge lesson day, and as usual I will discuss bidding according to the point-count method, so that beginners and average players can see how the experts bid.

There are 10 points in each suit, and 40 points in the entire deck. You and your partner usually need 26 points to make a game; 33 points for a small slam; 37 for a grand slam.

In today's hand the bidding lesson is furnished by North's jump to four spades. This shows very strong trump support (usually five or more trumps) in a hand with distributional strength but not more than eight points in high cards.

The object of such a bid is partly to get a makeable contract and partly to prevent the opponents from entering the auction.

In this case East is effectively shut out. East cannot afford to bid five clubs singlehanded, but he

might have been tempted to enter the auction if he had been given a cheaper chance. At five clubs East would be set only one trick, a paying sacrifice.

There is a good lesson likewise in the play of the cards. When West opens the jack of clubs, declarer must not ruff in the dummy. Instead dummy must discard a low heart.

East wins with the ace of clubs and returns a heart, which South wins with the ace. Declarer draws one round of trumps, cashes the king of hearts, and leads the ten of hearts through West. When West plays low (his best play), declarer simply discards a diamond from the dummy.

When a play succeeds, the contract is home, for declarer can't lose only two diamond tricks. Even if the cards are so placed that East can win the third round of hearts with the queen, declarer still makes the contract.

East is then endplayed, since a diamond return gives dummy a diamond trick while a club return gives declarer a ruff and a discard.

Declarer loses his contract if he ruffs the first club trick in the dummy. He eventually will lose a heart trick to West, and then a shift to diamonds will give the defender three diamond tricks.

New Budget Scheme Impresses Ike's Savings-Minded Advisers

By DOUGLAS LARSEN

WASHINGTON—A brand new idea for achieving huge savings in the cost of government has excited the interest of some of President-elect Eisenhower's key advisers.

They are saying it might be Ike's golden chance to deliver on his campaign promises of greater federal economy.

Estimates of the potential savings involved run into hundreds of millions annually. Perhaps more than a billion.

It's actually a deceptively simple administrative device used by practically every private business in the U. S. Every public administration expert who has heard it has expressed amazement that somebody hasn't come up with the plan before for the federal service.

Simply stated, the plan is to give every government supervisor—at every level his own working budget, with adequate inducement not only to live up to it, but to cut it. The details for working the plan out in practice are not considered difficult.

At present it is estimated that only about five per cent of the approximately 100,000 supervisors in federal service who have authority to spend money have their own budgets.

For the rest there is practically no incentive to cut costs. In many cases there are even rewards for extravagance.

Provides Incentive To Save One of those keenly interested in the idea is Senator Frank Carlson (R-Kan.), one of Ike's closest advisers during the campaign, who will be chairman of the important Senate Post Office and Civil Service Committee. He says:

"This could be the answer—the real answer—to government economy. It could be the thing which will give government a workable substitute for the profit motive which has made U. S. industry so efficient."

Others who show similar enthusiasm for the idea include members of the former Hoover Commission, a former federal budget director and present U. S. Civil Service Commission officials.

Father of the idea is John Cramer, columnist on federal employment affairs for the Washington Daily News and other papers. He says:

"In the last analysis, we'll get true economy in government only if we make saving the day-to-day business of every employee who has the power to spend—and that means every supervisor. A budget for the supervisor would put him on notice that saving is an important, major part of his job, just like it is for every boss, foreman or supervisor in private industry."

Under the mild supervision of France since the end of World War II, the Saar has prospered as she never did under Germany. The coal mines, operating at full speed, employ almost a quarter of the nation's million inhabitants.

But the coal miner and his housewife are not interested in politics. They work hard at their own labor. Almost everyone works a 48-hour week. Offices and mines open at 7 a.m. and close at 6 p.m.

The political unrest is stirred by a small national segment. Most of the pro-German parties are controlled from outside the Saar borders. But whatever grievances the Saarlander has against France he will admit that his standard of living is higher now than it ever has been.

Now, however, one thing is certain: a quarter of a million people in the Saar are dissatisfied with the dilemma they must face—either France or Germany.
