His surprise election in 1948 swept away the last vestiges of doubt and humility in Truman, That election should have been no surprise; it was one of the most poorly analyzed in American history. But since it was unforeseen, the President took-and was given-full personal credit for producing the upset.

Thereafter the President was extremely self-assured. He felt vindicated by his popular triumph, felt he had proved his superior talents as a politician.

Truman generally was pretty happy during his second term. But like virtually all his predecessors, he became concerned with his place in history. He wanted the record of his years to read right.
