



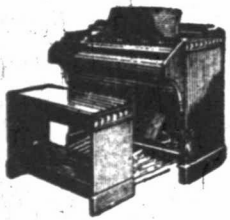

# Sex Parties In Uninhibited Housing Unit Anger Judge

HOUSTON — An aroused judge, veteran of the Texas bench, continued to insist Wednesday that this city's largest federal housing project was an unfit place to rear children.

District Judge Roy F. Campbell cited 3,028 police cases which he said had occurred since 1943 at San Felipe Courts.

He listed sex parties involving minors among the cases and referred to all of them as "criminal." Many actually were misdemeanors.

Included in the list he sent in a sharply-worded letter to E. A. Eversberg, Houston Housing Authority director, were murder, criminal assault on children, aggravated assault, burglary, felony theft, child delinquency, prostitution and possession of narcotics.

Eversberg said he didn't intend to take the judge's remarks "lying down." But he added he would have no details comment until he received the letter.

Judge Campbell released copies to reporters before Eversberg received it.

Residents of the big housing project, after tough talk at a mass meeting, recently asked the judge to retract statements that the place was an unfit one for children.

"So far as I am concerned," Campbell wrote, "the remark was true and I neither apologize nor retract it."

"What greater insult could anyone heap upon a father living in San Felipe courts than this?" he said in his letter.

"Grossly Ignorant" Saying that Eversberg threatened to take the matter up with Washington officials if he failed to retract his statement, Campbell wrote: "From your information, permit me to say that I have no fear of Washington."

"If you think Washington has any authority over a state district judge, you are grossly ignorant. If you were bluffing, I will relieve you of the task. I shall report it to Washington myself."

The judge said his list of cases was compiled from records of the police department, crime prevention bureau, county probation department, the sheriff's office, and the police morals division.

The 67-year-old judge had made the original statement about the project while hearing a divorce and child custody case in November.

He also took exception to a notice he said the Housing Authority recently posted at San Felipe. Campbell said the notice states that illegitimate motherhood, after Thursday, will be cause for immediate eviction.

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## Sweetwater Pilot Interred Near Spot Of Dramatic Crash

SWEETWATER — Ollie William Cox, 23, was interred Wednesday on his Double Heart Ranch near the spot where he flew his plane into the ground in a fatal Sunday crash.

Meanwhile, complete solution as to why Cox crashed remained a mystery.

He told pleading friends via ground-plane radio, "If you had done what I did, what would you do? You wouldn't land, x x x If I come down I'll lose my wife—lose all my friends—I'll lose everything."

Otto Beinhauer, Sweetwater airport employee, told a Fort Worth Star-Telegram reporter that a pretty, brown-haired young woman in a loose fitting coat waited anxiously at the airport until Cox crashed.

"When I told her," Beinhauer said, "she broke down crying." He insisted the woman was not Cox's wife whom he said he knows well. Other airport employees said they noticed no such woman.

Justice of the Peace M. C. Manroe, meanwhile, stuck to his original verdict of accidental plane crash death in the case. "How do we know," he asked, "that the man didn't change his mind 10 seconds before he hit the ground?"

## Odessa's Death Termed Accident

EDINBURG, IND. — Coroner Walker Maguire said Tuesday he would return an accidental death verdict in the fatal shooting of a sergeant from Odessa, Texas.

The victim, Sgt. Clyde W. Rose, 30, a cook at Camp Atterbury, was shot to death Saturday night. Witnesses said the gun went off while Mrs. Rose, a 22-year-old German war bride, was examining it.

## Pipe Line Junction Ordered At Perryton

WASHINGTON — The Power Commission Tuesday ordered Northern Natural Gas Company to connect its pipe line system with lines near Perryton, Texas, for deliveries of natural gas on an emergency basis.

The lines will be connected with those of the Public Service Corporation of Texas, Fort Worth.



## Six Texans Injured In Arkansas Mishap

FORT SMITH, ARK. — At least six Texans were among the 26 injured in the collision of a passenger and freight train seven miles south of here Tuesday.

No one was killed. A partial list of the injured included Clayton D. Sutton, Paris, Texas, passenger train porter; L. B. Bell, Paris, Texas; Mrs. M. E. Lawrie, Pharr, Texas, who was enroute to Fort Smith for her husband's funeral; Cpl. Charles H. Mitts, Fort Sam Houston; C. E. Mabrey, Houston.

The trains collided just across the Arkansas state line in Oklahoma.

## Midland To Herald New Year Noisily

One of the gayest, noisiest New Year's Eve in this city's history is indicated for Wednesday night.

In Midland's private homes, in its exclusive haunts, in its veteran clubs and night clubs—Midlanders will usher in the New Year, 1953. Veterans' organizations, like the American Legion, will make merry. Like other veteran organizations, the party will be for members and guests only.

Famous Band Leader Jimmy Dorsey will highlight a party at the Petroleum Club at 525 a'couple. At the Ranchland Hill Country Club, there'll be a New Year's Eve dance for members and guests and a "breakfast" following the dance—a \$3 a'couple.

Only out-of-town guests and members will dance to Jack Free and his Orchestra from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. at the Midland Country Club. Then, at 1 a.m., supper will be served. It used to be called "breakfast," said a spokesman for the club, "but something more than ham and eggs will be served this time."

Confetti, serpentine — the long spoons you tap people with—bubbles, noisemakers, and balloons—all of these will be evident in private homes, too. Perhaps more so than in public, especially with teenagers who intend to celebrate. Declared one holiday spokesman: "Many of the girls who work in the offices of Midland don't even own cars. The same with teenagers. As a result, the girls and kids have arranged to center New Year's Eve around their own homes celebrating in private parties."

Many Midlanders, getting a chance this Christmas, visited former hometowns and relatives and decided to "stay over" for the New Year's holiday.

## 19-Year-Olds Face Draft If Required

WASHINGTON — Selective Service Boards throughout the country are free to draft any 19-year-olds needed to fill quotas.

Selective service headquarters made that clear Tuesday, saying that no further authorization was needed by states which have exhausted the pool of men 20 or older. An official said "several" states—he did not know how many—would have to call 19-year-olds to meet the 53,000-man February quota.

## New County Officials Take Duties Thursday

Three new Midland County officials will begin their terms Thursday, along with other officials who were reelected.

The new officials are Earl Ray, county commissioner from Precinct 1; J. C. Franklin, county commissioner from Precinct 2, and County Surveyor Max Schumann. ## Death For Two Ends Attempt To Force Plane To Red China

TAIPEH, FORMOSA — A bi-engine attempt to steal a passenger plane in flight and force the crew to land in Communist China ended in failure Tuesday—just 15 miles short of the Red mainland.

A heavily armed Chinese, labeled a fugitive by Manila police, shot the pilot and purser of a Philippines Air Line DC-3 in a desperate bid to reach Amoy, a Communist port on the South China Coast.

Chinese Nationalist fighter planes fired across the nose of the airliner and forced it down at Quemoy, a Nationalist island in the Formosa strait, only a few minutes flying time from the Red mainland. Press reports from Quemoy said

the Chinese gunman surrendered meekly when the Filipino co-pilot, only survivor of the three-man crew, taxied the plane to a halt.

Seven passengers were reported safe. They were two Americans, three Chinese and two Filipino women.

Manila said the Chinese were wanted for subversive activities. They will be questioned by Philippine intelligence agents, then turned over to Nationalist officers under an agreement not to permit their return to the Philippines.

Identity of the gunman who seized temporary control of the plane was not reported. Manila police said they think he is Ang Kio-who, alias Lucio Lee. Ang is charged with shooting a Chinese girl in Manila.

The gunman boarded the airliner at Laos, Northern Luzon, Tuesday for a scheduled trip to Appari, 100 miles to the east. He carried two guns and two hand grenades.

After the takeoff he entered the crew's compartment and ordered the pilot to fly to Red China.

The Chinese Central News Agency, reporting from Quemoy, said Nationalist fighter planes fired across the nose of the plane when it neared the Red mainland. Nationalist pilots, blockading the mainland, have orders to attempt to halt any plane heading for Red China.

The DC-3 pilot swung around in an effort to land at Quemoy. The gunman killed him, and the co-pilot took over. The purser was killed attempting to overpower the Chinese.

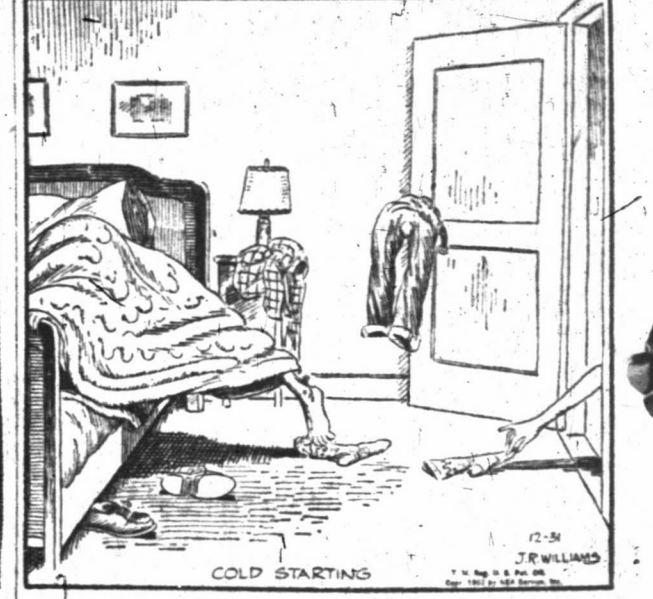

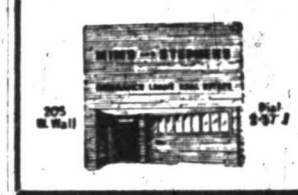

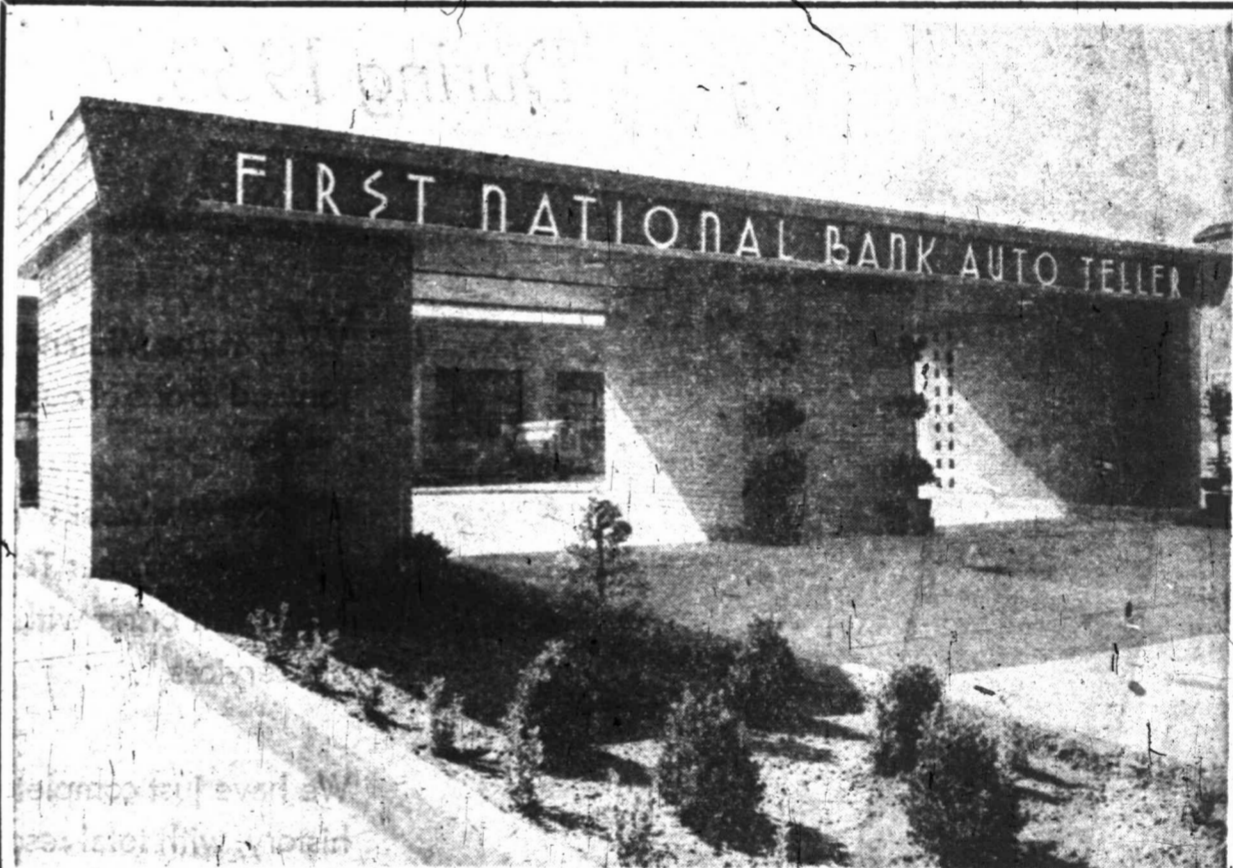

### Physician Doubts 'Doomed' Mother Has Fatal Disease

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—The courageous mother who risked her life to give birth to her fourth boy may not have Hodgkin's disease after all, her physician says.

Mrs. John Garrett, 27, underwent a Caesarean operation last Friday while under treatment for the malady, a usually fatal cancerous condition of the lymphatic system. She withstood the shock of the surgery well and the baby was healthy.

Tuesday, her physician, who wished to remain unidentified, said he found no traces of Hodgkin's disease in Mrs. Garrett. However, he added that additional tests will be made to make sure.

If she does not have the malady, but one of several that have similar symptoms, the Hawthorne housewife has an excellent chance to regain her health, the doctor said.

### Failure Of Bidault Puts France Into '53 Without Government

PARIS—(AP)—France rings out the old year Wednesday in the throes of chronic government crisis which has seen three Cabinets fall in 1952. She will ring in the new year without a premier at her helm.

President Vincent Auriol combed the ranks of political leaders Wednesday in search of a man who could put France's humpy-dumpy government together again.

It fell apart a week ago when Premier Antoine Pinay resigned rather than face certain defeat on his 1953 budget policies.

George Bidault, two-time veteran in the premiership, gave up Tuesday his efforts to get enough support to put him in the office again. He, failed when several leading parties refused to back his demand for wider powers which would end the siege of continuing crisis.

## Draftees Take Written Tests, Have Talks With Psychologist

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Except for scraping of a chair once in a while, and an occasional cough, the room was so quiet you could hear the footsteps of people outside.

In the room 198 draftees were taking the Armed Forces Qualification Test—a mental examination designed to find out whether they could be trained within a reasonable time.

They were sitting in the main building of the Alexandria, Va. induction center at long tables divided into sections by plywood "blinders." I was taking the test too, just to see what it was like to be a draftee.

The test was exactly the same as the one draftees and volunteers have been taking for the last two years and the same—word for word—as those being taken at the 73 other induction centers around the country.

Instructions had been read to us by Lt. Jerry Greenfield, the center's psychologist, at a slow, almost painful pace. He later told me the pace is part of giving the test.

"Even as slow as I go," he said, "I'm sure some of the men miss the whole point of the test."

Three Categories  
The 90 questions, which we had 45 minutes to answer, were of three types.

The first was to test our ability to deal with words. For example, the question would be a simple statement with one word underlined. We would have to pick one of four words similar in meaning to the underlined word.

Second was arithmetic. For example, the question would ask: Jimmy has five apples. How many would he have left if he gave two to his brother Tommy and to his friend Sam? We had our choice of four answers.

The third type was to test our ability to put things together.

Changes Due  
Questions and answers were all drawings. The question drawing might be the pattern of a box as it looks before it's folded together to form the box. Then, from four answer drawings we were to pick the one which looked like the box pattern after it was folded.

After Thursday, the form is being changed some. The new test will run 50 minutes. A "tools functions" test will be added. It's designed to test a man's mechanical ability, experience and background.

### TIMED SWAT DOES TRICK

LONDON—(AP)—A British child psychologist says just one spanking may be enough to put any child on the straight and narrow.

Dr. E. R. Matthews told the Conference of Education Associations Tuesday night that a talented smacker waits for the right moment to get that wallop home—"the moment when the child pits his whole self against all authority."

"Then give it a good, hard smack and you may give it a proper sense of moral responsibility for the rest of its life."

### Spellman Ends Yule Visit With Soldiers

TOKYO—(AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman returned to Japan Tuesday night from a nine-day tour of Korea and his second successive Christmas at the front with UN soldiers.

The Roman Catholic prelate will celebrate New Year's mass at the Yokohama Chapel Center.

He is scheduled to leave Saturday for the United States by way of Rome.

## Armed Forces To Take More Of Industry's Gross Output

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The armed forces, fighting a limited war and in limited mobilization, now are using about 15 per cent of the gross national product and next year will take an estimated 17 per cent.

But if the situation doesn't worsen, if there is no new or bigger war, the chances are the burden will be no heavier than is measured by that 17 per cent figure. Indeed, it probably will begin to lessen, although slowly, after next Summer.

At the peak of World War II production effort, the military's "take" of the gross national product—the total of all goods and services of the nation—was about 45 per cent.

## GOP Has Trouble Learning What Political Plums To Pick

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Some Republican congressmen complained bitterly Wednesday they have been unable to get a complete, authentic list of government jobs available for deserving Republicans.

After 20 years of Democratic presidencies and Administrations, these Republicans say they are having a tough time even learning what jobs are open to political patronage.

Several who didn't want to be quoted by name said the new Republican Congress, as one of its first steps, should pass a resolution directing the Civil Service Commission to supply a list of the thousands of government jobs that may be filled through political patronage.

Senator Dworshak (R-Idaho) told a reporter:

"So far it seems that everything has been done to confuse the situation and make it appear that except for a very few top-level jobs, everything is covered by civil service."

Many Low-Paid  
The Civil Service Commission said December 1 that 170,382 jobs were open to political replacement and said many of these were low-paid. The federal payroll is slightly over 2,500,000.

A check of several Republican senators disclosed that not one had been able to get what he regarded as a complete list of government jobs where Democrats could be ousted and Republicans installed.

It is known that officials of the Republican National Committee have been attempting to assemble such a list. The task has been assigned to Rep. Albert Cole (R-Kan.), who was defeated for reelection.

### Churchill Embarks For United States, Eisenhower Parley

SOUTHAMPTON, ENGLAND—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill sailed Wednesday on the liner Queen Mary for talks with President-elect Eisenhower on Korea and other world problems.

The 78-year-old British leader, who also is scheduled to call on President Truman later before he takes a two-week holiday in Jamaica, was accompanied by Mrs. Churchill.

The huge liner, which left port here at 10:15 a.m. is due in New York January 5.

Shortly before his departure from London, the Prime Minister spent two hours discussing with Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden the British proposals on Anglo-American problems he will lay before Eisenhower next week.

Informed sources said these points fall into four main categories, with Korea and Soviet Prime Minister Stalin's Christmas Eve statement of willingness to talk to Eisenhower well to the fore.

The other two deal with Britain's desire to join in the recently signed Pacific Defense Pact between Australia, New Zealand and the United States and her wish for close consultations before the U. S. undertakes any new strategy in the Far East that might involve either Britain or France in heavier commitments.

### Sawyer Puts Down Baseball In Favor Of Private Business

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—Eddie Sawyer, fired last June as manager of the Philadelphia Phillies, announced Tuesday he was quitting baseball in favor of private business.

Sawyer, popular former Ithaca, N. Y. college professor, who directed the Phillies to the 1950 National League pennant, was removed in mid-season this year as manager and given a job in the club's front office. He was succeeded by Steve O'Neill.
