"This being an off-year." said Speed, "we naturally don't expect to reach the 14,000 who paid their poll tax last year for the national, county and local election

"But the 1,700 still is far below the approximately 7,000 who paid their poll tax in the last off-year two years ago."

Elections will be held this year to elect a mayor of Midland, three city councilmen and two school board members. In addition, there probably will be at least one bond issue election.

Deadline for paying the poll tax is January 31.



Supplies Were Short

former Army nurse, who went through the horror of Pear Harbor on Dec. 7, 1951, as a civilian nurse, now lives in Midland as an anesthetist employed by the Western Clinic-Hospital. Carmel Dorlan, an attractive

brunette, remembers the Japanese air raid on Pearl Harbor more than a decade ago as clearly as if it had happened yesterday. She was working in the Kapiolani Maternity Hospital, Honolulu, Hawaii, when the attack came. Many of her patients were wives of servicemen killed or injured in the Nipponese sneak raid.

Carmel was asleep when the air assault began. "At first I didn't believe it," she reminisced, "But the radio kept on broadcasting time after time that it was not maneuvers, but the real thing-war." Cares For Wounded

"I joined up like everybody else," she said.
