Baseball Teams In Playoffs

Friona's Kids, Inc. All-Stars were competing in district tournaments this week, with Friona hosting the Mustang Tourney, while the Bronco stars were competing in Hereford.

Thursday's action in the Mustang tournament found Friona facing Hereford at 6:30 and Muleshoe vs Bovina at 8:15 p.m.

The two losing teams will square off Friday at 6:30 p.m., with the winners meeting Friday at 8:15 p.m.

The winner of Friday night's pairing of winning teams gets a berth in Saturday's finals at 8:15. If the loser of that game is a first-time loser, game seven will be played Monday, July 23 at 7 p.m.

Admission of \$1 for adults and 50¢ for children 12 or younger will be charged.

The Bronco League all-stars played host Hereford on Monday. They lost a heart-breaker, 3-2 the first day. Reyes Valdez hit a two-run home run in the fourth inning.

Friona tried to rally in the ninth inning, but Casey Renner's foul pop was turned into a double play.

Friona came back to beat Muleshoe, 12-0 in their second-round game Wednesday.

The Bronco all-stars were facing Hereford again Thursday night, and if they win, will meet the host team again on Friday.

Winners of the district tournaments will participate in a sectional tournament in Amarillo.

Samarron To Compete In Russia

Richard Samarron, a 1988 graduate of Friona High School, is rated first in the world for his age division in powerlifting.

Samarron, who won state and national accolades while competing in power-lifting on the high school level, would like to defend his title in the sport, but therein lies the problem.

The 1990 world championship tournament will be held in Russia next November. It will cost approximately \$2500 for Samarron to make the trip to compete.

A fund has been established at Friona State Bank entitled "Power-Lifting Fund," for those in the community that would like to help send Samarron to the meet.

At the present time, power-lifting is not an olympic sport, but the organizers of the sport are working to get it sanctioned, hopefully by the 1992 Olympics.

"When Richard walks into a power-lifting competition, the contestants just swarm him. You'd think he was Elvis," says Martin Mercado, a friend and fellow power-lifter.

Samarron will need to have his entry in by September in order to compete in Russia.

Area Receives Some Moisture

The Friona area received the most moisture it had recorded on one day in a five-month period last Sunday afternoon.

The measurement in Friona was .64 inch. The rain came after it appeared that the city had missed out on a shower, and then came in about a 30-minute period. The accompanying electrical storm caused a power outage that lasted about an hour.

The moisture measurement was the most since a total of 1.16 inches were logged in Friona last February 20.

The rain was not all that general. A sizeable area around Friona got around a half-inch of moisture, but reports were that as much as two inches received north of Friona, with some hail damage.

However, Eugene Bandy, who farms southeast of Friona, said he received only a tenth of rain.

Added to the .17 inch received locally last Friday, the month's total now stands at .82 inches.

Forecasts are calling for another chance of rain for the area this weekend, and residents are keeping their fingers crossed.

Excel Plants Cut Lost-Time Injuries

Officials of Excel Corporation this week told employees at its plant here and another in Plainview that they are pleased with the progress made on bringing the costs for lost-time accidents under control.

"We have seen major strides in our employees and management personnel working together to overcome a major problem," said Bill Fielding, president of Excel. "Friona and Plainview have shown major improvements in lost-time injuries as well as reducing lost-time days. We need to continue to make this type of dramatic progress in our safety program results," he added.

In April, Excel officials had indicated that the cost of workers' compensation claims in the two Texas plants threatened the economic viability of the operations. At that time, they challenged employees and managers to develop initiatives that would reduce workers' compensation costs in Texas, which they said were more than 4.5 times higher than for all of Excel's other major packing plants.

Company officials said Excel devoted more than \$13 million to workers' comp costs for the fiscal year ended May 31, 1989.

Since the April meetings with employees, the company sought employee and community involvement in helping eliminate false or excessive claims, notified the state workers' comp commission that it was withdrawing from the system effective June 11, and instituted a new occupational temporary-disability plan for employees that is funded by the company.

Fielding this week thanked all employees for their commitment to working to make both operations successful and said the company will continue to monitor progress being made.

"It is our intent and desire to remain competitive in all areas of operations. We are optimistic in regards to the results and improvements that we have seen and expect to see continued improvements in all areas of operations," he concluded.

City's Sales Tax Check In Increase

The City of Friona received a check for \$6,913.49 as its share of the sales tax rebate from the state comptroller this month.

The check showed a gain of 3.9 per cent over the same time a year earlier, when Friona's check amounted to \$6,656.68.

For the calendar year, the city has now received a total of \$63,069.90, up by 4.39 per cent from the total at the same time in 1989, which came to \$60,417.12.

The July checks statewide showed an increase of almost ten per cent over last July's payments, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock. "That's a comfortable jump from last year's payments, and another indication that our economy continues to grow," Bullock said.

The state's big metropolitan centers, Houston, Dallas and San Antonio, received checks for \$12.3 million, \$7.9 million and \$4.5 million, respectively.

Entries Are Needed For Little Miss

Entries are currently being accepted for the 1990 Friona Little Miss Pageant. Forms are available at the Friona Chamber of Commerce office or from Jiselle Hand at Friona State Bank.

The pageant will be held August 21, and deadline for entering is August 10, it was announced.

Contestants in the pageant must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1990, and not older than six.

Sponsors can be a parent, grandparent, business or other interested person.

If a contestant needs a sponsor, they may contact the Chamber of Commerce and one will be provided.

Entry fee is \$15. No talent act is required in the pageant.

The July checks include taxes collected on May sales and reported in July by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Merchants collect the state and local sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its share and sends cities and counties monthly payments reflecting the local portion of the sales tax.

SPS Holds Discussion With Group

In response to a report this week by the Albuquerque Tribune, Southwestern Public Service Company states its general policy is not to comment on matters such as possible acquisitions or mergers. However, with respect to the article, SPS can confirm holding preliminary discussions with Wheeler Peak Capital Corp., a recently formed New Mexico corporation, regarding a possible friendly acquisition by Wheeler Peak of Public Service Company of New Mexico.

SPS confirms no agreements have been reached.

W.R. Esler, SPS chairman of the board and chief executive officer, said, "We are interested in acquiring certain of the electric utility assets of PNM. Our service territories can be integrated easily, and the acquisition should be of benefit to the ratepayers and stockholders if an agreement can be reached on appropriate terms."

SPS primarily provides electric service to a population of about one million in a 52,000-square-mile area of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and Southwestern Kansas. Corporate headquarters are in Amarillo, Texas.

YE EDITOR HASN'T bragged on his baseball hero, Nolan Ryan, yet this summer. This despite the fact that Ryan last month became the oldest pitcher in major league history (at age 43) to pitch a no-hit game.

Ryan, who is now setting records for the Texas Rangers, turned the trick and also added to another all-time record he held, for the number of no-hitters pitched in a career. The big right-hander made it career no-hitter number six. He has pitched no-hitters in the 1970s, 1980s, and now, the 1990s.

Nolan didn't pick a rinky-dink team to pitch his latest masterpiece against, but did it against the defending World Series champion Oakland Athletics, at the As' home ball park.

The Alvin, Texas, native goes into his scheduled start this Friday against the Tigers at Arlington just two wins shy of the 300-win mark.

The 300-win plateau has been a personal goal for Nolan, who has had the misfortune of pitching virtually his entire career for teams who were not ranked in the upper echelon of their league standings.

In fact, with a 9-4 won-lost record and 122 strikeouts, Ryan at age 43 is right up among the league's leading pitchers.

Ye editor still gets a big kick out of watching Ryan, the all-time strikeout leader, throw strikes past "kids" half his age.

Ryan has struck out 44 guys who won "most valuable player" honors--virtually every one so chosen since he's been pitching. He has also struck out 19 Hall of Fame members, including Hank Aaron, Ernie Banks, Roberto Clemente, Harmon Killebrew, Eddie Mathews, Willie McCovey, Brooks Robinson, Willie Stargell and Carl Yastrzemski.

Of all his strikeout statistics, the one I like is the fact that the native Texan has struck out six father/son teams who made it to the major leagues: Sandy and Roberto Alomar, Bobby and Barry Bonds, Tito and Terry Francona, Ken and Ken Griffey, Dick and Dick Schofield, and Maury and Bump Wills.

His son Reid has a pitching scholarship with the University of Texas. If "Dad" decides to pitch another year or two, they may be another father and son team in the majors, but unlike those named above, playing at the same time.

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

60 YEARS AGO--JULY 11, 1930

Mayor J.L. Landrum received notice from the census department last Saturday giving word that the census report showed the present population of Friona to be 730, with only 17 persons out of employment. This falls within estimates, which ranged from 700 to 800. The report shows that Friona's population has almost quadrupled since the 1920 census, which gave it nearly 200. This increase has practically all come within the last five years.

55 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1935

On Monday of last week, Mrs. Ray Springer and Mrs. Oscar Bell, who have been operators at the local telephone central office for the past two years, relinquished their positions, and the city is now being served by two new operators. The new operators are Miss Ruth Staggs and Mrs. Velma Lippard, assistant. Both are from Ropesville, and are experienced operators, genial and courteous in manner.

50 YEARS AGO--JULY 12, 1940

A very sad occurrence took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W.E. Donaho, who live on the A.H. Boatman land a mile and a half south of Hub last Sunday afternoon when their fifteen-month-old son, Kenneth Earl, was found drowned in a stock tank near the house. Efforts were made to restore respiration, without avail, and Mr. Boatman rushed the child to Dr. Stover, but too late to revive the spark of life.

45 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1945

On Saturday of last week, Betty Jean Gore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Milt Gore, came to the Star office with an exploded weather balloon which she had found near her home. It contained radio instruments and had been sent up by the weather bureau at Clovis, to which the balloon and box were returned.

40 YEARS AGO--JULY 7, 1950

Making Friona easily accessible to the vast trade territory lying south between Friona and Muleshoe, the last 12-mile gap in the north-south road ending at Friona has been paved. This strip

has long been a headache for residents south of Hub and in the Lazbuddie area, who wished to trade in Friona or use this direct route to Amarillo and points north.

35 YEARS AGO--JULY 8, 1955

Potato harvest probably will get underway in seriousness next week, local growers and processors predict. Eleven growers this year are producing some 650 acres in the immediate area, the Herman Neff Company reports. Growers are Neff, G.H. Whitaker, Kenneth Neill, Gordon Massey, Earl Lance, Jimmie Jesko, Roy Botkin, Buck Barnett, Kenneth Christian, Lloyd Oswald and Hardy May.

30 YEARS AGO--JULY 7, 1960

A new Baptist Church will officially organize Sunday at the American Legion Hall in Friona. This new church will be organized by those attending the services, which have been held since June 12 in the Legion Hall. The new church has been designated as the Calvary Baptist Church of Friona, and the home church voted last week to deed the new church 3.9 acres of land north of the city limits on which to construct their church.

25 YEARS AGO--JULY 8, 1965

The site of a multi-purpose structure on Running Water Draw has been narrowed to three locations, it was revealed in a joint meeting of the county's steering committee and the county commissioners last week. Next step in the project is to secure engineering reports on the locations.

20 YEARS AGO--JULY 9, 1970

Friona High School will have an Australian girl for its exchange student for the 1970-71 school year, it was announced this week. Janet Wallis from the town of Indooroopilly, Queensland, will arrive in Friona in early August, to make her home with the Carl Schlenker family. Miss Wallis will be the second exchange student from Australia, as the community, along with the E.G. Phipps family, hosted Brenda Hawker during the 1964-65 school term.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 6, 1975

The Friona Star was the winner of a second place award in the "appearance" contest at the 96th annual summer convention of the Texas Press Association last weekend in El Paso. There were 24 newspapers from across the state in Friona's population bracket.

A new business, Lakeside Parts & Machine, opened in Friona on July 1 at the former Panciera Tire Co. location on West Highway 60. Owners of the new parts house are Arlen May, C.H. Veazey and Fred Ferguson.

10 YEARS AGO--JULY 13, 1980

Hal Ratcliff has assumed his duties as Friona High School principal. Longtime principal John R. Cook completed his tenure on June 30.

Friona's preliminary 1980 census count was received from the Amarillo District office of the Census Bureau this week. The number of residents counted so far by the Census Bureau is 3,681. This represents an increase of 18.3 per cent over the 1970 figure of 3,111.

5 YEARS AGO--JULY 14, 1985

Calvary Baptist Church of Friona will be celebrating their 25th anniversary on Sunday, July 14.

Rhea Bradley, resident engineer for the State Department of Highways and Transportation, met with the Commissioner's Court at its June 24 meeting, to discuss the widening of U.S. Highway 60 through Parmer County.

We would like to thank the ladies of First Baptist Church for the beautiful lap robes. It is hard to think about covering up in this weather for most people, but our residents use lap robes year around.

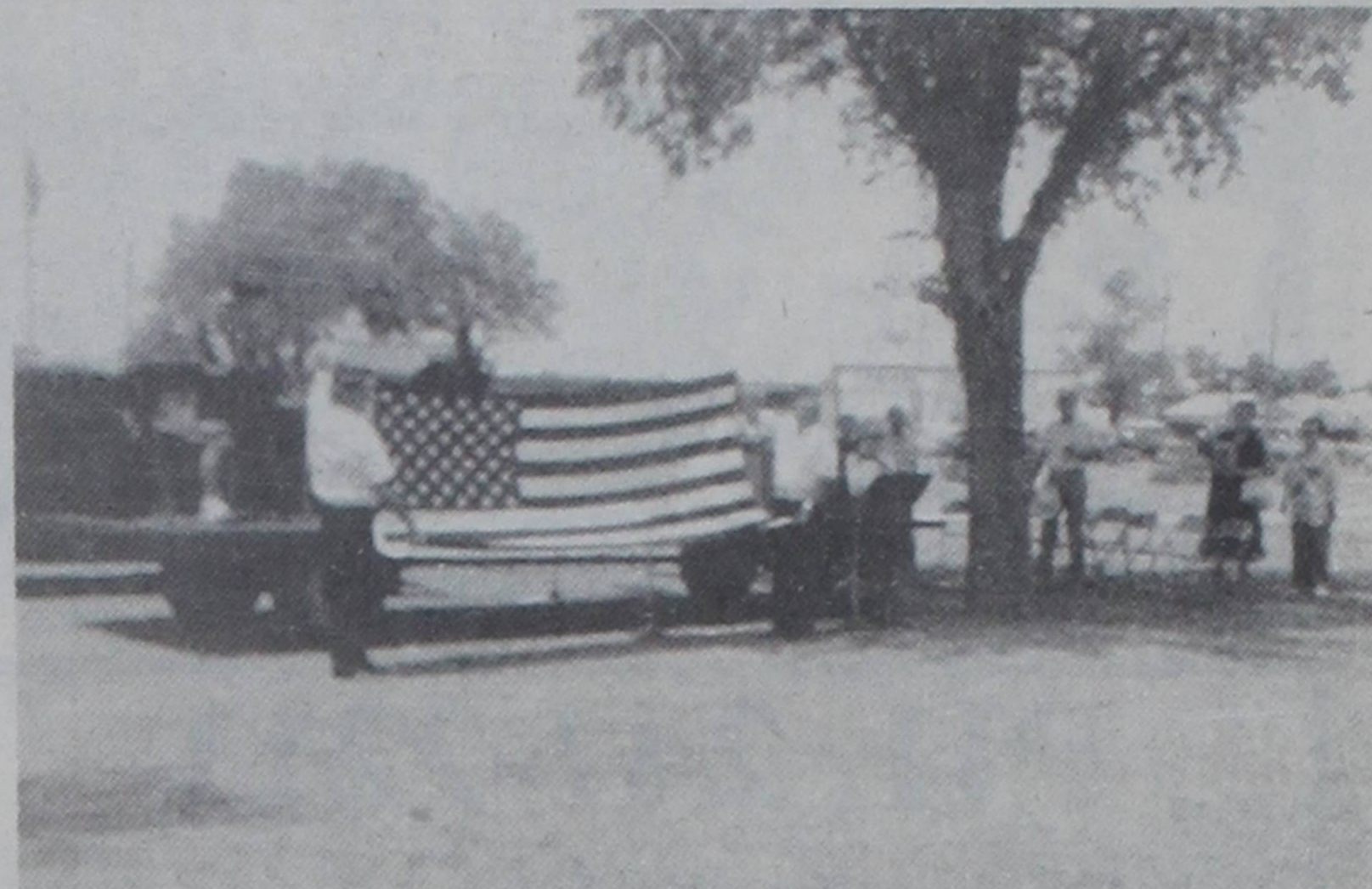
We would like to thank Cindy Simmons for donating combs to our beauty shop. I am sure the volunteers for hair and nail care really appreciate it.

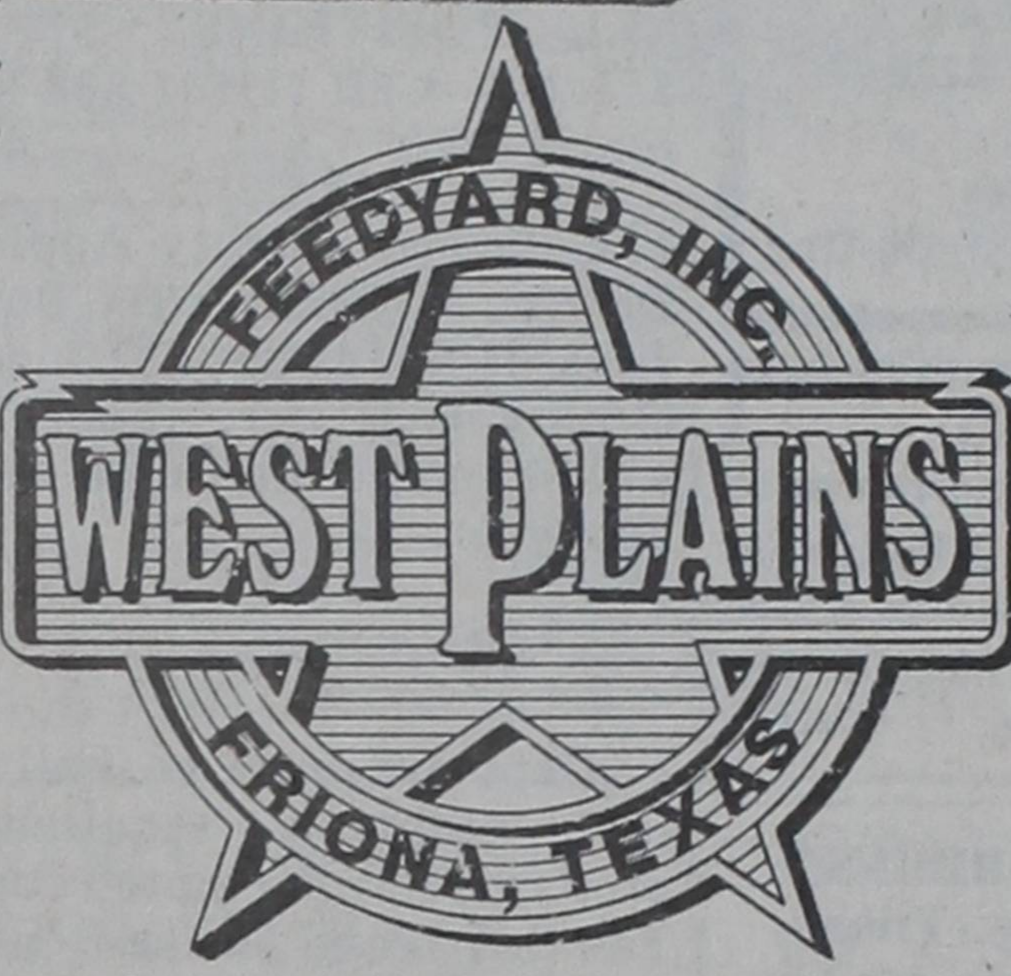

Market Timers Just Sell Subscriptions

A favorite question often posed by investors is, "What's the market going to do?" Other than "fluctuate," the only truthful answer is, "I don't know."

The public, however, invests millions of dollars annually on financial publications and spends hours watching programs that claim to know what the market's going to do. When financial news limits itself to what the market did, fine. When it starts predicting what it will do, beware.

An even bigger mystery are newsletters and services that peddle market timing. They promise to send subscribers a sell letter just before the market drops and a buy letter before it starts up again. You can pay extra to get a telegram so you can beat the crowd to your broker.

Granted, some services have better track records than others, but they all sell subscriptions by bragging about their most recent success. Information about their mistakes, however, is scarce.

For example, a recent article in the Investment Reporter, a professional financial publication, tells the rest of the story on two market-timing services. The service

successfully warned subscribers about the possibility of the October 1987 crash. That was good. But, afterward, they continued to preach doom and gloom. That was bad. While the market recovered its 500-point drop, one service promised an even lower Dow--1500 followed by a drop of 400!

Subscribers to the other market timer are still waiting for their letters advising them to get back into the market. In essence, this timer managed to steer subscribers away from just about everything but Treasury bonds. Meanwhile, the market kept going up.

Thanks to the advice to get out, those subscribers were fortunate in avoiding the crash, but they missed the entire recovery. In addition, they had commissions to pay and probably a healthy tax bite on their capital gains.

If you haven't already guessed, the point is that there is no accurate way to predict whether the stock market will go up or down--just when you think you have it figured out, you wind up zigging when you should have zagged.

Long-term investors don't buy stocks, they buy companies. The stock market is just a place where the transaction is conducted.

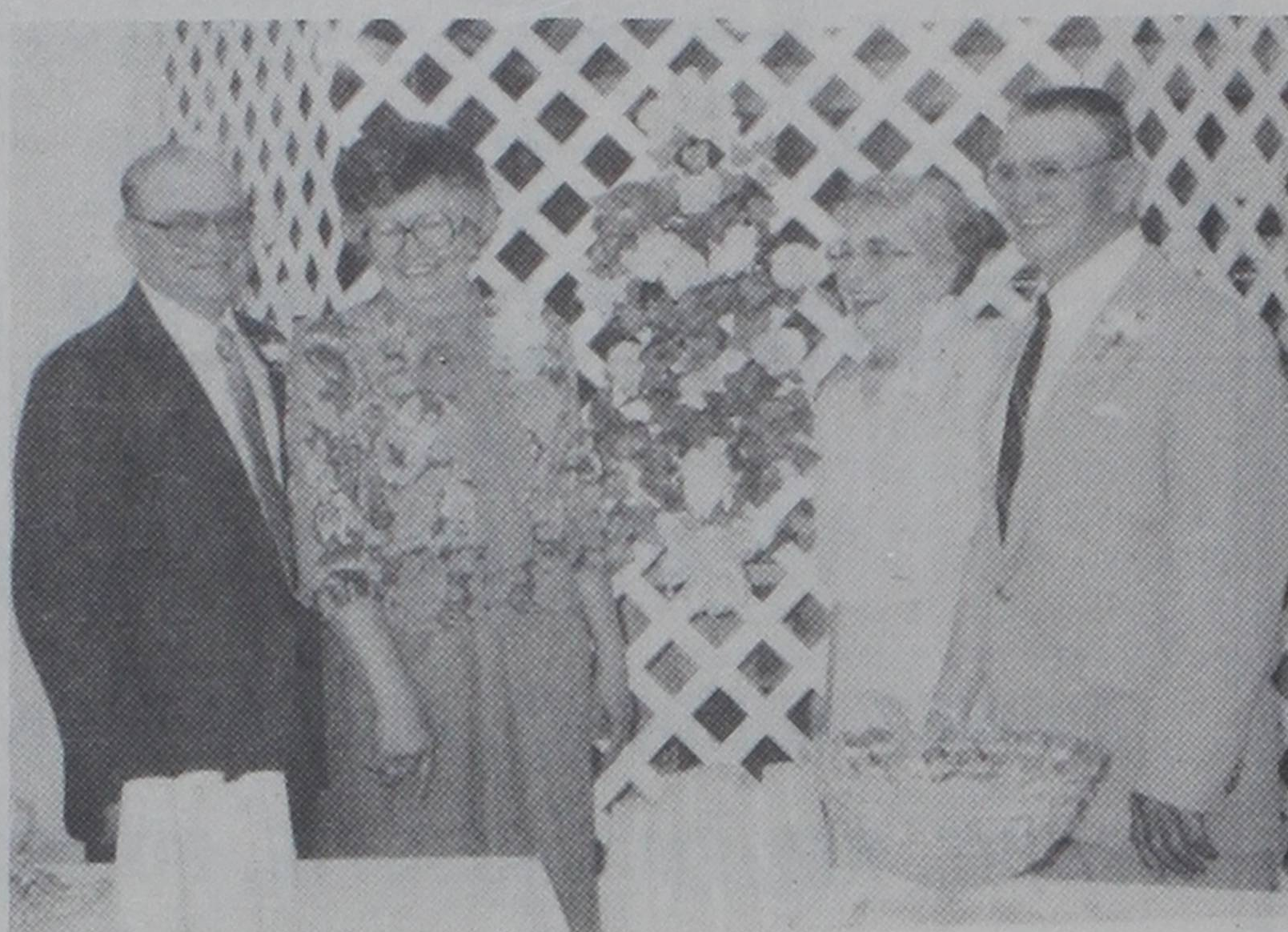
