## Stepout To Weddell In SW Sterling Area Flows Oil On DST

Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 5-A Sugg, southwest stepout to production in the Sterling County side of the Weddell portion of the Spraberry Trend Area, is preparing to run pipe and complete from open hole in the lower spraberry.

### Test Of Strength

Six Months One Year

What Congress now proceeds to do about tax reduction may provide the first really important test of strength between the lawmakers and President Eisenhower.

The President's message was clear and positive on the issue-no tax cuts until expenses have been trimmed. Just as plain, however, is the wording of a tax bill by Representative Reed, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. His measure would slice income taxes by 11 per cent starting this July 1.

Reed has said since the Eisenhower message that he sees no conflict between his proposal and the President's objectives. He plans to go ahead rapidly with the tax-cut bill, apparently on the assumption that by the time it gets through Congress-if it does-government expenditures will have been reduced conveniently to eliminate the prospect of deficit even at a lower level of income.

This seems a pretty glib assumption on Reed's part. On the basis of present revenues and the outlays called for by ex-President Truman before he left office, we face a deficit of close to \$10,000,000 for the fiscal year which starts in July.

To cut \$10,000,000,000 off the budget is no mean task. Obviously it cannot be done without paring both defense and foreign aid spending, an operation that calls for the most delicate handling of the knife.
