THE U.S. CONSTITUTION'S 22nd amendment has been much in discussion in recent months. That is the one which limits a president to two terms.

The amendment was brought about after Franklin D. Roosevelt was elected to four terms. Republicans pushed the issue through, as a guard against having "another Roosevelt" situation.

In politics, however, things don't always turn out the way they were intended. This year, some Republicans are wanting to repeal the amendment, so that President Reagan could seek a third term.

The amendment was ratified in 1951, some six years after Roosevelt's death. The first irony of the amendment, as far as Republicans were concerned, was that it prevented their popular president, Dwight D. Eisenhower, from seeking a third term. Many experts figure that if Eisenhower had been eligible to run, he would have gained a third term.

President Reagan has mentioned the Constitutional change, but has spoken of it in terms of working for the amendment's repeal once he leaves office. Some think that broaching the subject is mainly designed to delay the inevitable moment when he has to take on the role of a "lame duck" president.

Would President Reagan seek a third term if it were possible? The jury is still out on this question, and those close to the president say that first lady Nancy has indicated she doesn't want to share her husband with the country for more than eight years.

In order to get the 22nd Amendment repealed in time for it to affect the 1988 presidential race, it would take a whirlwind campaign. However, those favoring the move point out that the passage of the 26th amendment in 1971 (giving 18-year-olds the right to vote) was approved by the necessary 38 states in less than 120 days.

While it's true that there are senators who have been in office 40 years, it's not certain if Americans would be willing to give a presidential administration such an opportunity.

Maybe we need to strike a compromise, such as creating a six-year presidential term (and someone has suggested, with no provision for re-election). That might cut down somewhat on having to campaign while in office.

It is regrettable that as soon as a president is re-elected, the talk immediately turns to who will be his party's nominee in the next presidential election. But that's just politics, and whatever the rules, eventually you'd have this situation.

"What's sauce for the goose should be sauce for the gander," someone once said. The Republicans of the late 1940s and early 1950s, who pushed to get the 22nd amendment ratified, sure didn't think that some of their followers would be working to throw it out.

However, if it can be construed dangerous for a Democratic administration to perpetuate itself in office, looks from here like it should work the same way for the Republicans.

The Chieftains and Olton's Mustangs will renew an old rivalry next Friday, as non-district football play continues.

The Mustangs have been missing from Friona's schedule for the past four years, and for many years in the past have served as a district opponent. The game is at Olton, beginning at 8 p.m.

Olton is one of the teams on the schedule holding an all-time lead over the Chieftains, but Coach Tommy Moss is 1-0 in his only face-off with the Ponies.

55 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 11, 1931
The 1931-32 term of school opened in Friona Monday morning, under the direction of a most competent corps of teachers, numbering 19 in all. Supt. George A. Heath reports an enrollment for the first day of 517.

O.E. Massie, one of Friona's progressive and thrifty farmers, living some eight miles southeast of town, had eight sows who during their last farrow brought forth 120 fine pigs, an average of 15 to the sow.

50 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 11, 1936
Born to Mr. and Mrs. S. Abdullah, at their home in Friona Sunday morning, twin daughters, weighing five and one-half and six and one-half pounds. Twin daughters were also reported born to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Naples of the Lakeview Community on the same day. Word was also received at the Star office that twin daughters were born to Mr. and Mrs. Buck Chiles.

45 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 12, 1941
The Friona Cardinals dived a double-header with the Amarillo Pinkney Packers, played on the local diamond Sunday, winning the first game by a score of 6-2, and losing the second, 1-0. Wright Williams pitched a two-hit game in the nightcap, only to lose, with the only run scoring on an error.

Miss Staley of Springfield, Mo., and a joint owner of what is known as the "Staley Sisters" farm, adjoining the city on the West, visited the city last week.

40 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 6, 1946
The marble games that had been in progress among the smaller boys on the vacant lots south of Plains Hardware, have been forsaken by the boys on account of the opening of school. Whether this breaking up of the games was optional on the part of the boys, or rather obligatory on the part of the parents, is a question.

35 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 6, 1951
School began in Friona this

week. Some added confusion was evident, due to the lack of space brought about by the loss of the high school building last spring by fire. Classes are meeting in makeshift locations, until such times as the annex is completed. The annex will house high school students this year, and in future years, will be used as a cafeteria. A total of 525 students enrolled on the first day of school.

30 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 6, 1956
Enrollment in Friona's bulging public school system crept close to the 900 mark Wednesday morning, as a total of 893 students filed into the buildings for the second day of classes.

The Baxter Addition was annexed to the city by the Friona city commissioners Tuesday night. Developed by Oscar Baxter, the addition includes a two-block area in the western part of town.

25 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 7, 1961
Joe W. Jones, Parmer County Agricultural Agent for the past 11 1/2 years, last week submitted his resignation to the Parmer County Commissioners Court. Jones plans to join the Security State Bank in Farwell.

A sudden blaze raced across five alleys in the Friona Lanes Sunday morning at 3:05 a.m., causing an estimated \$8,500 in damage, most due to smoke.

20 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 8, 1966
Thirty contestants had been entered in the 1966 Friona Maize Queen Contest, just one short of the all-time record.

Entries in the Maize Queen Contest are up to 24 in the Queen Contest, while the Little Miss entry list is up to eight.

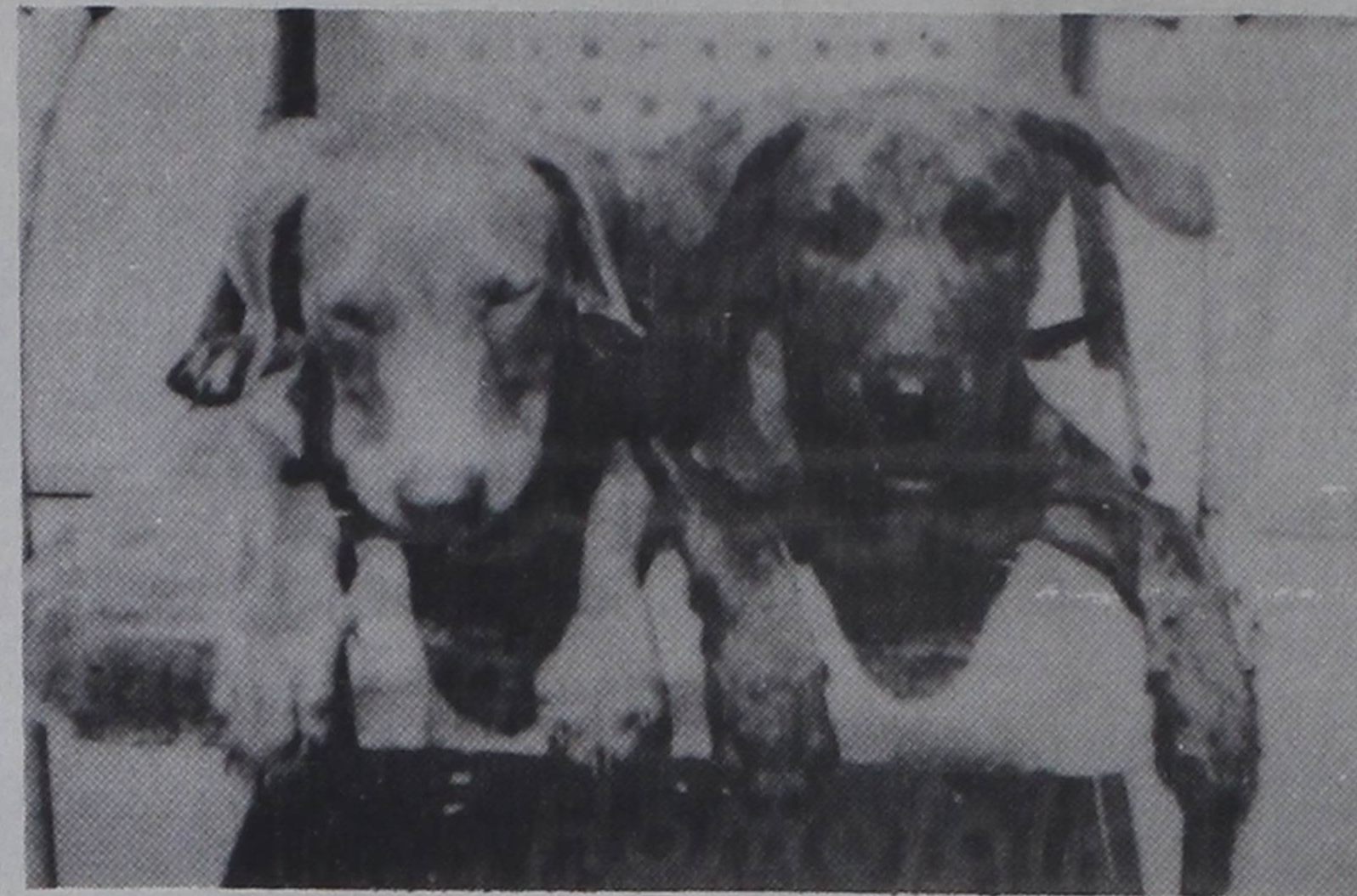

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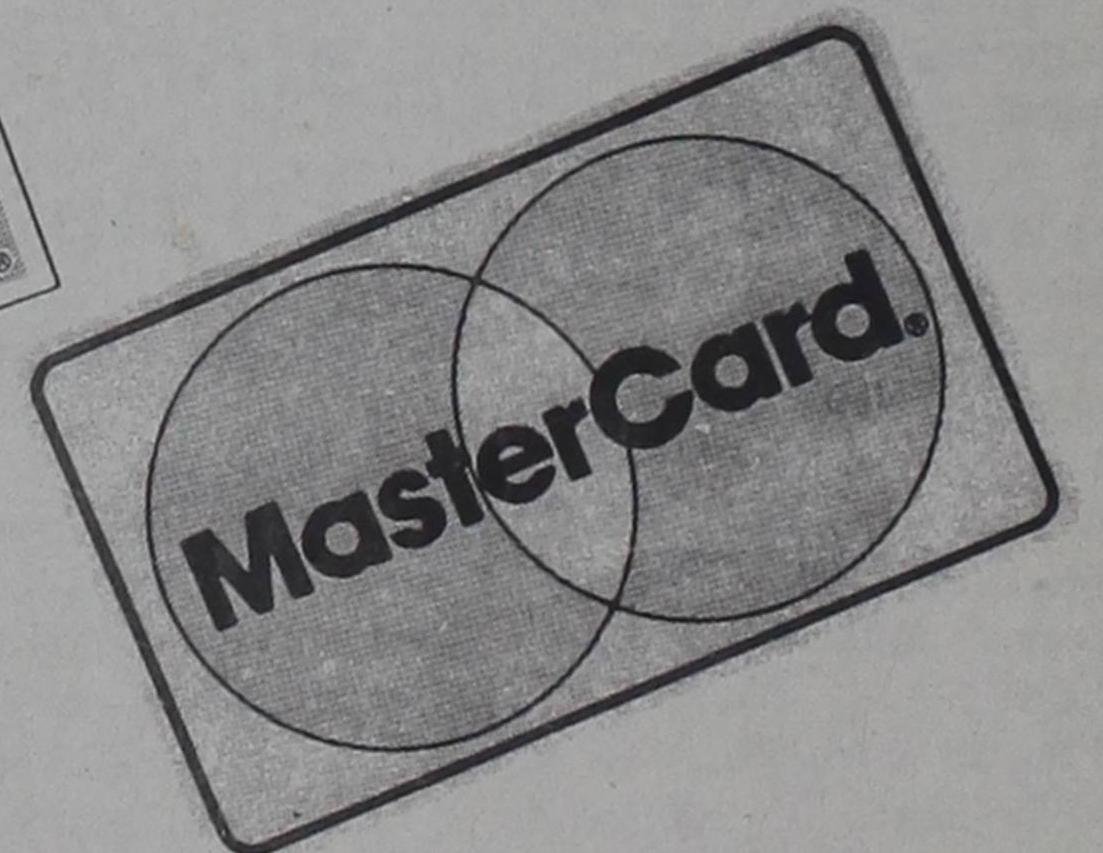

Local Delegates Attend 'Congress'

Resolutions concerning farm prices, moratoriums on farm foreclosures, tax incentives for sustainable agricultural practices and soil/water conservation, conservation and the protection of the environment, special land reform measures, importing and exporting farm products, rural community services and public education on agricultural issues were approved by the general assembly of the United Farmer and Rancher Congress Saturday, September 13 in St. Louis.

The Congress, a convention of more than 1500 grassroots delegates from all parts of the United States, met for three days to define the severity of the current farm crisis, and develop the resolutions that will be used as a platform for a campaign to modify national farm policy.

"The most important thing to come out of this meeting, in my estimation, is the unity and motivation of these delegates," said Anne Kanten, chair of UFRC. "Some delegates saw this congress as their last chance to save their way of life. We have turned their desperation into personal commitments to fight for the integrity of the family farm and rural life." Kanten is Assistant Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Minnesota.

The program, which opened Thursday evening with the full trappings of a major convention, heard the stories of farmers, ranchers and growers from all sectors of the American agriculture community.

"Whether corn growers or cattle ranchers, rice planters or dairymen, our delegates face the same reality. They are not able to make a living in agriculture," said Toni Kelly, project director for UFRC and a rancher from Deer Lodge, Montana. "American farmers have fed the world, but they are now going hungry, and we have to turn the tide on this national tragedy."

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Jim Hightower addressed the general session Friday, encouraging delegates to rally behind the "Save the Family Farm Act," a new grass-roots farm bill that will be introduced this week in Washington by Senator Tom Harkin (D-I), Rep. Richard Gephard, (D-MO) and other pro-farmer members of Congress. Harkin and Gephard both addressed the assembly on Saturday.

"Passing this bill is the single

most important step that we can take to put profit back into production and to put the family farm back into America's future," Hightower said.

A special audio-visual presentation, "Rural State of the Union," was presented and narrated by entertainer Eddie Albert. Referring to his boyhood on a farm in Minnesota, Albert said, "My dream was to own my own farm. I know what it means to love the land."

Willie Nelson, country music star and Farm Aid organizer, presented a special concert to the delegates, guests and the public Friday evening.

Proceeds from the concert went to a special delegate scholarship fund, which helped defray the travel expenses of those delegates who found the trip to St. Louis a financial hardship.

"The United Farmer and Rancher Congress is the most important thing that Farm Aid has done so far," Nelson said in a press briefing prior to his performance. "We've got to work to get the farmer's message to Washington, and make sure they hear us." Nelson suggested a Farm Aid III might be produced to correspond with debate on farm legislation in 1987.

The more than 1500 delegates to UFRC, elected to the Congress in some 500 regional caucuses conducted in July and August, returned to their constituents with the full text of the resolutions for disbursement in their own communities.

Delegates attending the congress from Parmer and Castro counties were Carl King, Lois Wates and Marie Winders, all of Dimmitt; Doug Higgins of Hart; Milton Dixon of Rhea; Garvin and Janette Thorn, Mike and Johnna Blackburn, all of Friona.

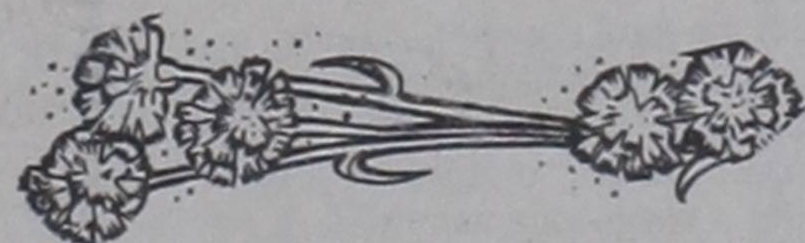

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Chiefs Outplay Idalou But Suffer 9-7 Defeat Here

Closies only count in horseshoes, someone once said (it wasn't Ben Franklin).

So, although the Friona Chieftains came close to scoring on two first half drives, and missed three field goals by "just barely," the team came up short on the scoreboard to Idalou, 9-7, in the team's home opener last Friday at Chieftain Field.

"We were a lot more aggressive than we had been the previous week. But we just made too many mental mistakes," commented Friona head coach Tommy Moss.

The Chieftains outgained the visitors in total yardage, 205-102, but when it came to yardage that counted, the team just couldn't seem to get it.

Friona twice had impressive drives in the first half, only to come up without any points on the board for their efforts. Usually reliable kicker Sam Montoya had some trouble with the stiff southerly breeze on his first half

field goal attempts, barely missing one at each end of the stadium.

The Chieftains drove inside the Idalou 15 on their first possession, but the drive bogged down. After a penalty, the team faced a fourth and 11 from the 19. Montoya's 36-yard kick was just a shade wide, so the game remained scoreless.

Two possessions later, Idalou's kicker boomed a punt from the vicinity of his own goal line that soared and bounced out of bounds at the Friona 11-yard line, helped somewhat by the south wind. The punt went 77 yards from the scrimmage line.

The kick backed Friona up to its own 12, after they had backed the Wildcats into poor field position at their own 11.

But the Chieftains responded. Jimmy Williams picked up 13 yards on a big third-down carry out to the Friona 27, and two plays later quarterback Daniel Echols hit Lonnie Phillips with a 33-yard

strike to move into Idalou territory at the 38.

Phillips almost broke loose for a score on the play, but the last Wildcat defender tackled the Chieftain speedster.

Phillips gained seven and Williams 11, as the Chieftains advanced the ball. Echols darted six yards on the keeper play, and then Phillips gave Friona a first down at the Idalou 15.

But on second down, Friona was called for holding, moving the ball from the 14 out to the 24, and the Chiefs never could recover. Friona tried a pair of passes which failed, bringing up fourth down.

Montoya was summoned, this time to kick into the breeze. He had plenty of distance on the 41-yard attempt, but again the ball fluttered just wide to the left and the game remained scoreless.

Idalou put together a frantic rally in the last two minutes of the half, driving from the Friona 42 to the three. It took a big defensive play by Albert Trevino to keep the Wildcats out of the end zone.

But Frank Rodriguez booted a 36-yard field goal with three seconds left on the clock to give his team a 3-0 lead at the half.

Idalou took advantage of a turnover shortly after intermission to double its lead. The Wildcats had the ball inside the Friona five, but again the stubborn Chieftains denied them the goal line. Shy Burney tackled the quarterback for a big loss on third down. Another field goal made the score Idalou 6, Friona 0 with 9:46 left in the third quarter.

Idalou managed a third field goal later on, to take a 9-0 lead, before Friona finally broke the scoring ice.

Early in the final period, Friona recovered a fumble. Albert Trevino knocked the ball loose, and Will Eddins recovered for Friona.

On first down, Echols raced 25 yards on a keeper play. Montoya's kick made it a 9-7 game with 9:27 left to play.

The Chieftains had one last shot, when they recovered yet another Idalou bobble with just 20 seconds left in the game, at the Idalou 44 yard line.

Montoya was again summoned, to try a Herculean kick of 61-yards (this time with the breeze). The Chieftain kicker gave it a whale of a try, and again the kick had the distance it needed. Those on the field said the kick could not have been more than a yard or two wide of its mark.

Idalou's star runningback, Paul Wayne Jones, missed most of the game with a hurt ankle, after being popped with a bone-jarring tackle by Chieftain defender Shane Hand early in the game.


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
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Longhorn Roundup

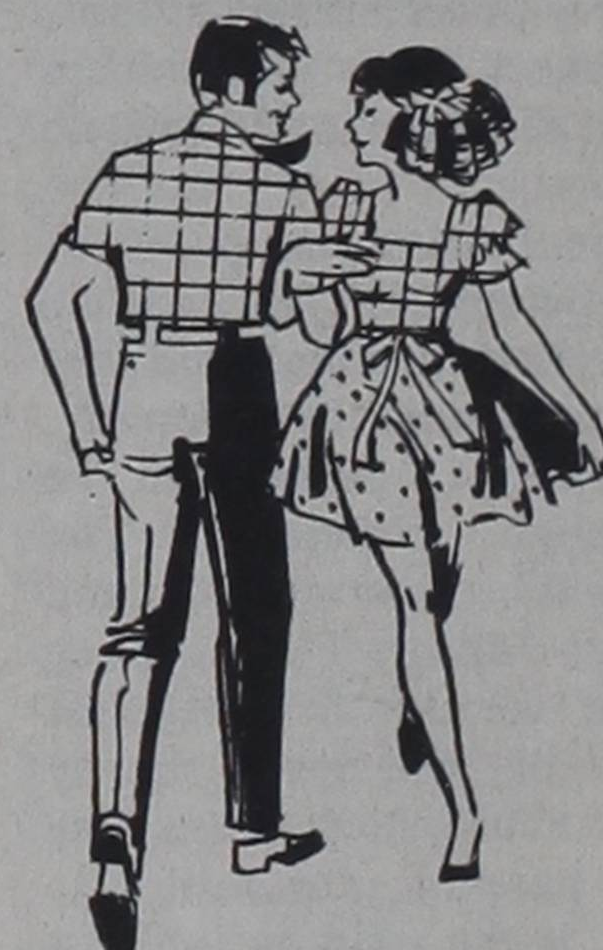

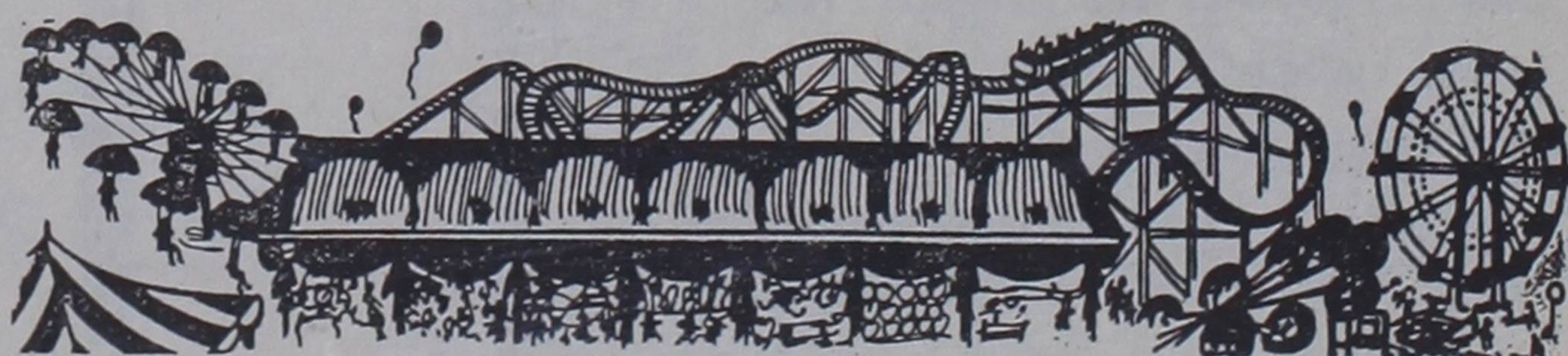

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

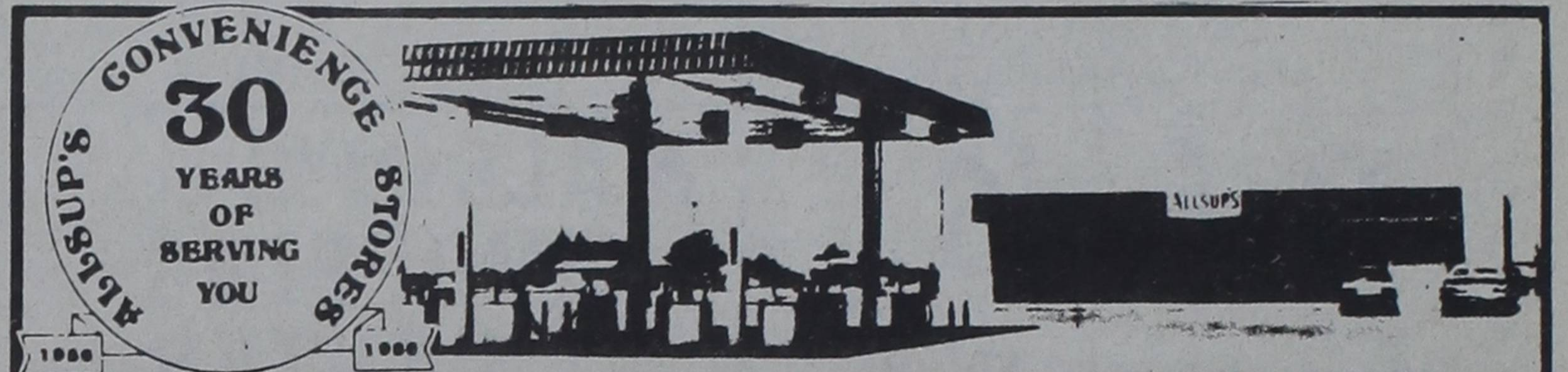
