Midland Ranks Seventh In Building Over Texas

Midland, with its record-breaking \$22,000,000 construction during 1952, ranked seventh in the state in total amount of building permits.

The Texas Business Review reported Saturday that Midland was exceeded only by Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Austin and Amarillo in new construction during the year.

Houston reported \$112,911,806 worth of permits and Dallas \$84,884,248, while Fort Worth, with 10 times Midland's population, reported only \$44,944,000 worth of construction to rank third.

Trailing behind Midland were such cities as Corpus Christi, Lubbock, Wichita Falls, El Paso, Waco, Abilene, Beaumont and San Angelo.

Here is the way first 20 leaders in 1952 building permits rank: Houston \$112,911,806, Dallas \$84,884,248, Fort Worth \$44,944,538, San Antonio \$39,603,731, Austin \$27,281,960, Amarillo \$24,277,731, Midland \$22,004,250, Corpus Christi \$20,874,903, Lubbock \$20,242,215, Wichita Falls \$15,254,693, Odessa \$13,398,805, El Paso \$13,113,112, Waco \$12,178,308, Abilene \$7,883,270, Beaumont \$7,383,170, Big Spring \$5,763,650, Longview \$5,709,962, San Angelo \$5,587,818, Tyler \$4,656,509 and Texas City \$4,392,595.

Interchurch Group Organizes To Seek End Of Corruption

NEW YORK —(P)— "Depart from evil and do good: seek peace and pursue it."—34th Psalm.

These Biblical words well might sum up the aim of an unusual, interfaith movement, organized Friday, to arouse through religious teachings a sense of civil responsibility toward stamping out crime and corruption in the world's largest city.

Protestant, Jewish, Catholic and Greek Orthodox leaders gathered under the chairmanship of the Rt. Rev. Horace W. B. Donegan, bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of New York.

"Only on the firm foundation of moral law can free society endure, and only through the continuous exercise of conscientious responsibility can free men retain their freedom," Bishop Donegan said.

Lay persons "with no axe to grind" must be aroused to the evils exposed by various investigative groups, the bishop said.

Lutherans Purchase Site For New Church In Midland

The Evangelical Lutheran Church, which plans the organization of a congregation in Midland, has purchased a plot of ground at Mariana and Michigan Streets, just off the Andrews highway, as a site for its parsonage and church building.

The Rev. Earl H. Peterson, pastor of the Oak Cliff Lutheran Church of Dallas and who will come to Midland as pastor of the new church, acted as agent for the church in purchasing the property from Mr. and Mrs. Clint Vaughn.

Mr. Peterson said plans are complete and construction of the new parsonage will be started the latter part of this week. The parsonage will be an eight-room dwelling with carpet. It will be of brick exterior, with the exception of the front, which will be paneled.

Overall Plans in Making
An architectural firm, Mr. Peterson said, now is working on overall plans for developing the property, and the first unit of the church plant will be started as soon as the house is completed.

The church building will be of contemporary style.

Adolph Anderson has established residence here to assist in building the new church edifices. He and Mrs. Anderson, formerly of Dallas and Alexandria, Minn., are residing at 2405 West College Street.

Mr. Peterson and his family will move to Midland as soon as his successor is named at Dallas and when the parsonage here is completed.

Mr. Peterson recently dedicated a new parsonage at the Oak Cliff church and last Sunday, on the fifth anniversary of that congregation, he unveiled a sketch for a new church building. The church has 400 members.

Thirty New Churches
The Evangelical Lutheran Church, according to Mr. Peterson, has a new parsonage and a site for a church in Arlington. Site for a second church in Houston was purchased recently.

Thirty new fields, including Midland, are expected to be opened this year, representing an expenditure of almost \$1,800,000.

The church has a unique home mission plan which has enabled it to establish a new church every 18 days for the last nine years, Mr. Peterson stated.

Bishop Dedicates Children Building

Bishop William C. Martin of Dallas officially will dedicate the Children's Building of the First Methodist Church Sunday.

He will speak at the 10:50 a.m. worship service Sunday.

The Children's Building was completed in 1950, during the pastorate of the Rev. Howard H. Hollowell, at a cost of \$150,000. It now provides educational space for about 350 children, who receive their religious instruction from a trained staff of teachers and workers.

Participating in the dedication service with Bishop Martin will be the church pastors, the Rev. R. Luther Kirk and the Rev. H. Weldon McCormick; the Big Spring District superintendent, Dr. Orion W. Carter, and the church's Commission on Education.

Leadership Recognized Recognizing his leadership and work for the Methodist Church and inter-denominational cooperation, Bishop Martin was named president of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. in December.

Since 1948, he has served as Methodist bishop of the Dallas-Port Worth area, which includes the Northwest, Central and North Texas Conferences.

He was elected a bishop in 1938, serving in the Pacific Coast area and the Omaha area before his present assignment. He also has held pastorates in Houston, Fort Arthur, Little Rock and Dallas.

He was one of five Methodist bishops to represent his church at the formation of the World Council of Churches in Amsterdam, in 1951, he presided at the Southwestern Convocation at San Antonio, when plans were laid for the organization of the Texas Council of Churches, now in progress. He is vice president of the Council of Bishops and chairman of the Commission on Evangelism for the Methodist Church.

Houston Hill was contractor for the building to be dedicated by Bishop Martin Sunday. Serving on the building fund committee were Paul L. Davis, chairman; Mrs. Clark Matthews, vice chairman, R. C. Baker, Ben Black, Mrs. W. A. Black.

Building Permits For Year Leap By \$3,000,000 Mark

Midland construction skipped along at its record-breaking pace last week with a hefty chunk of building permits sending the total of the first six weeks of 1953 to more than \$3,000,000.

The week's total brought the 1953 figure to \$3,275,238.

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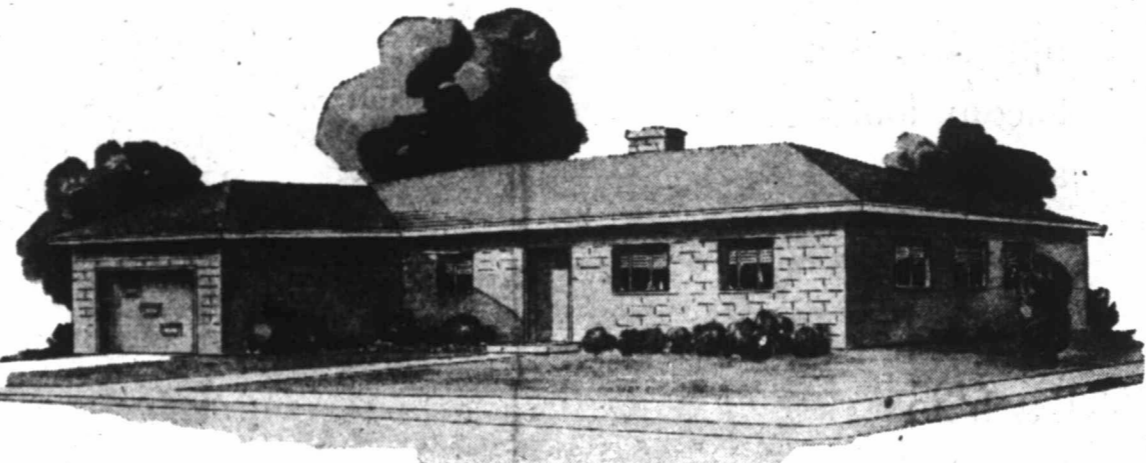

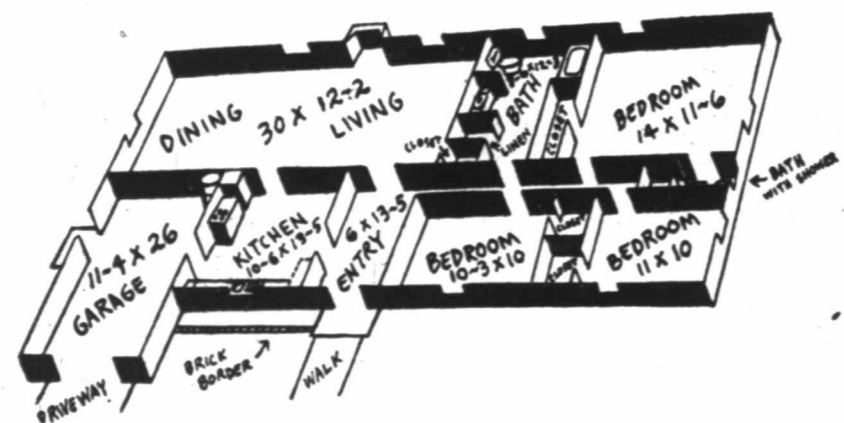

New McCamey Pipe Line System Now Moving Oil

The recently completed McCamey Pipe Line Company's system which provides a crude oil outlet for several oil fields in the Girvin area of Northeast Pecos County is in regular operation.

The system now is moving approximately 2,000 barrels of oil per day from the Brown & Thorp and Kramer (Clear Fork) areas. It will be expanded in the near future to

take oil from other fields in the Girvin region.

The oil is moved from the fields it serves to the Rancho Pipe Line System's tank farm at McCamey. McCamey Pipe Line Company buys the oil in the fields and delivers it to Crown Central Refining Company at the Rancho station in McCamey.

To Gulf Coast
Crown Central is one of the owners of the Rancho system. It will move the oil it is getting from the McCamey Pipe Line Company through the Rancho line to its refineries in the Gulf Coast.

The Rancho line is slated to start regular movements of oil in a few weeks. Until that time the oil being delivered to Crown Central will be tanked at McCamey.

The McCamey Pipe Line's new system consists of 14 miles of 4 1/2-inch main line and 11 miles of gathering systems. The gathering lines are of 3 1/2- and 2-inch pipe.

Jointly Owned
McCamey Pipe Line Company is jointly owned by Brown & Thorp Drilling Company of McCamey and La Gloria Corporation of San Angelo and Corpus Christi. Both those concerns own production and large spreads of undeveloped potential producing leases in the Girvin area.

Brown & Thorp Drilling Company is owned by C. W. Brown, pioneer West Texas businessman and oil operator and his son-in-law, E. W. Thorp, both of McCamey.

H. V. Hardin is manager of the McCamey Pipe Line Company. He was formerly manager of the Comanche Pipe Line Company. He has moved from Monahans, where he had lived while directing Comanche's operations to McCamey.

The new line and its gathering system was built by Midland Contractors, old field construction organization of Midland.

President Chiang Kai-shek's younger son, Wego, who is visiting the United States this month for a special orientation course, is a tough professional soldier who was once a buck private in the German Army.

Maj. Gen. Chiang Wego—to give him his rank and full name—rose the hard way to his present post as commanding general of the Chinese Nationalist Armored Force Command.

A man of tremendous vitality, he is a hard worker and a good mixer. Friends vouch for his sincerity when he says, "I love people."

Young Chiang is tremendously proud of his armored force. He points out that not one ever defected to the Reds on the mainland. Some fought to the last drop of gasoline and the last round of ammunition; then the crews dismounted and fought with tommy guns and pistols.

Wego's units fought their last battle on the mainland at Shanghai, in 1949, then were withdrawn to Formosa for reorganization.

Wego said their spirit never sagged; they knew they would fight the Reds again.

Wego told them to develop still further "the skill and will to kill, especially the will." Today that's the unofficial motto of the armored force.

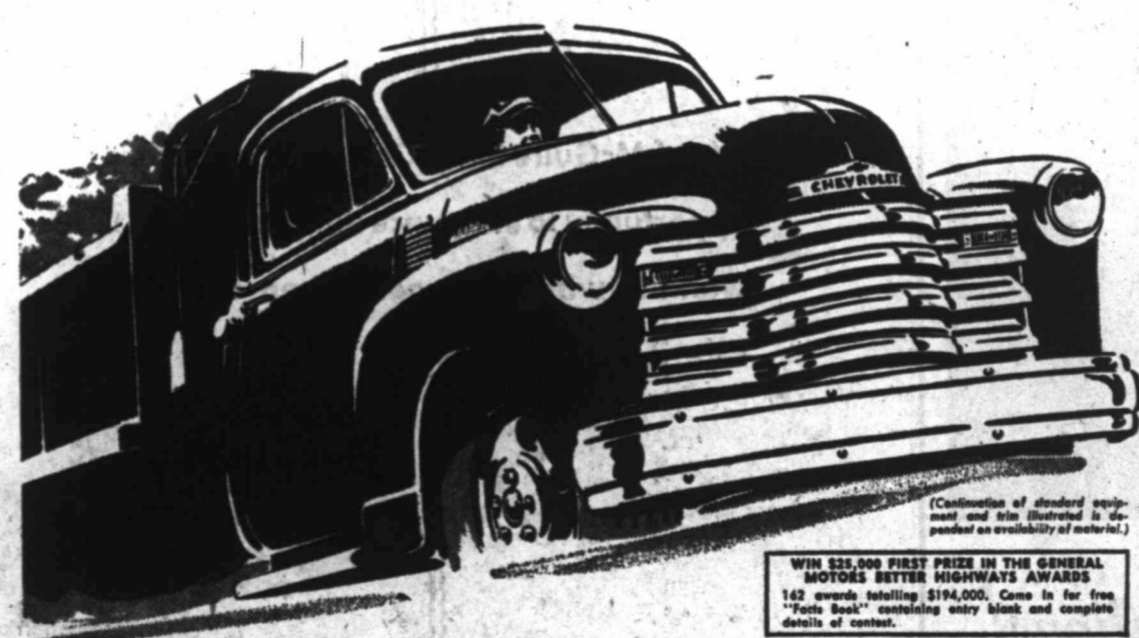
Korean War Films Due

\$78,000 CAA PROJECT AT MIDLAND TERMINAL

Mayor Pickett Directs Traffic As New Tower Service Starts

The time was 2:24 p.m. Friday, Feb. 13, 1953.

The place was in the cozy control room, 101 steps up (no elevator) and 83 feet above the ground, atop the new \$78,000 CAA control tower at the Midland Air Terminal.

It was then and there that Mayor Perry D. Pickett of Midland flicked on a little switch situated on a complicated control panel to inaugurate tower service at one of Texas' largest and busiest and best-equipped municipal airports.

But that was not all the mayor did. He immediately picked up a little microphone from a counter and started talking—directing the take-offs of two private planes headed with Civil Aeronautics Administration, City of Midland and Chamber of Commerce officials.

One of the planes wobbled a bit but Mayor Pickett, still on the mike, got it straightened out satisfactorily as it circled the field.

"Tower to plane . . . Tower to plane . . . runway so-and-so clear . . . wind from such-and-such direction, so-and-so miles per hour . . . all clear, take-off . . . Roger," the mayor said confidently into the microphone, smiling all the while.

"Plane to tower . . . Plane to tower," a voice came back over the loudspeaker in the glassed-in control room. "Signal coming in fine . . . expert instructions . . . sounds like a talented person on the mike . . . Roger."

The mayor grins and starts to give further instructions to the two official planes, when all of a sudden a third plane comes into range from the West, asking instructions for landing.

It requires only a second for the mayor, mike in hand, to be briefed by a tower staffer as to landing procedure, before bringing the plane to the proper runway and on the ground safe and sound.

"Roger," the mayor says.
"Roger," the pilot signals back.
Then His Honor catches sight of the official planes circling the port and immediately starts telling them

where and how to land. Soon they are back on the fine runways at Midland's top-flight airport.

"Roger . . . Roger" then is heard all over again.

The mayor of Midland was having fun, anyway, but he would be too busy, he said, to fill-in for the night shift tower operators.

Standing around the control room, observing the mayor in action, were Jack Odle, chief traffic controller of the Midland tower; members of his staff; C. C. Gorsuch, chief facilities operations branch, CAA, Fort Worth; H. G. Townsend, chief program requirements branch, CAA, Fort Worth; Clyde Sharrer, aviation director for the City of Midland; J. D. Church, district airport engineer, CAA, Abilene; Bill Collyns, chairman of the Aeronautics Committee of the Chamber of Commerce; representatives of Continental, Pioneer and American Airlines; Melvin Little, Midland fire chief, and others.

To the northeast, from the control room, one can see the impressive Midland skyline in the distance; to the Southeast, flares in the Midland County oilfields; to the South and West more oilfields and heavy smoke; to the North, expansive prairie lands.

Costly Equipment
One also quite naturally gazes about the room and at the intricate control panel, with lights going on and off, and at the other equipment situated here and there. Sharrer is overheard telling a group of listeners, "All this equipment cost \$150,000 with the CAA footing the entire bill. But of course the City of Midland participated equally in the cost of buying and erecting the tower."

Odle then advises the group that the Civil Aeronautics Administration will staff the huge tower and that its payroll will amount to \$75,000 a year.

Sharrer comes back to say that all air traffic within a five to eight mile range, whether local or through, will be controlled from the tower.

The airline representatives speak up then, stating the tower will be

of material benefit and assistance to the big-airliners landing at Midland's giant airport. It will save both time and money in addition to the safety factor, they advise.

But back to the official planes, which long since have landed and unloaded their official passengers.

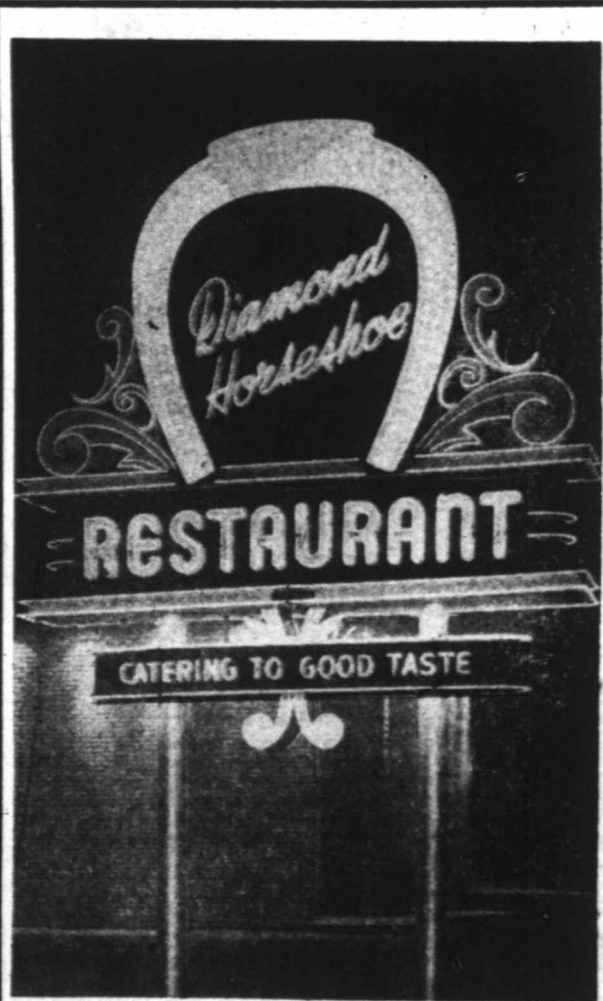

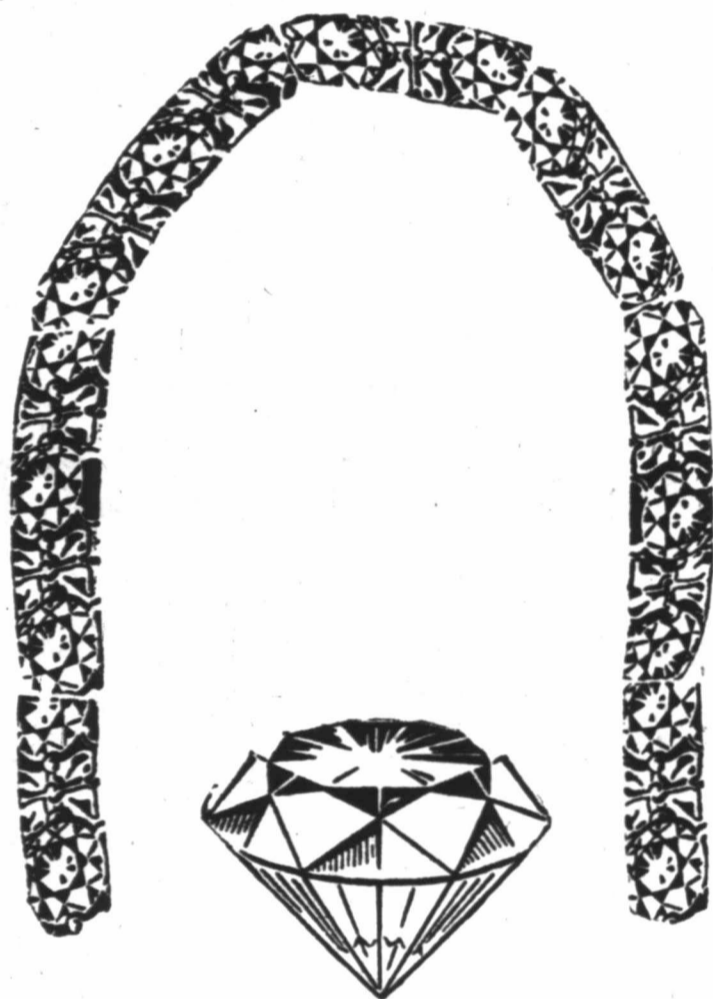

Dirt, Squirt and Quirt

— FARM, DAIRY AND RANCH NEWS —

The market was strong and active on all classes of cattle at the Midland Auction Thursday, with a light run.

Most butcher cattle sold \$1 to \$2 per hundred higher than last week. Most all stocker cattle were from \$1.50 to \$2.50 higher.

Good to choice fat calves and yearlings brought \$20 to \$24.25; medium to good, \$18 to \$20; cull to common, \$14.50 to \$18.

Cows, medium to good, sold for \$13 to \$14.50. Canners and cutters brought \$10.50 to \$13.

Bulls brought \$15 to \$18.

Stocker steer calves brought \$21 to \$24; stocker heifer calves sold for \$20 to \$23; stocker steer yearlings, \$17.50 to \$20.

Mixed breeds, stockers, calves and yearlings went at \$15 to \$18.

That fellow Frank Cowden quoted as saying the rains would come on February 10 was right—the only thing wrong being that he doubtless was talking about the country to the East.

It did rain in Dallas and DSQ and several other Midlanders were on hand in Big D to splash in the moisture which fell off-and-on and slowly over a three-day period.

Among the prominent Midland ranchers we saw in a Dallas hotel lobby were L. E. Tyson, Harvey Conger and Jay Floyd. Conger said he had his slicker with him.

After two or three days of mist and drizzle, the precipitation totaled only about one inch in most places—but even that amount was appreciated by all concerned.

The rainfall, although varying considerably in amounts, appeared to be fairly general from Dallas west

to Abilene, but light and spotted on to Sweetwater and Colorado City. It reportedly showered a bit in Big Spring, but the effects were not noticeable late Wednesday.

The country around Baird, Weatherford and Fort Worth has started to green up a bit in spots as a result of previous moisture.

The moisture still was holding off from Midland Friday noon, but the clouds were heavy and prospects for rain or snow certainly were more promising.

The Texas Farm Bureau will recognize the beauty, charm and vivaciousness of farm and ranch girls this year by sponsoring a state-wide Queen Contest, according to President J. Walter Hammond.

The prize for the winner who will be selected in November at the annual convention in Mineral Wells is an all-expense paid trip to the national convention in December in Chicago. The Farm Bureau also will pay the expense of a matron escort.

The board announced that the contest will be an "honest-to-goodness" Queen Contest and not just a bathing beauty competition. The entrants will be judged on three main points: (1) appearance, (2) poise and (3) personality.

Addison Wadley, in addressing the Rotary Club last Thursday, commented on what jackrabbits and mesquite beans have meant to this section of West Texas.

"The drier the year, the bigger the mesquite beans and the fatter the jackrabbits," the long-time Midland resident told his listeners.

"Sausage made from three-fourths jackrabbit and one-fourth pork is pretty fair eating, too," Wadley declared.

The 1953 South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show will be held March 18, 17 and 18 at Lubbock.

The general superintendent for the show will be Dave Sherill, Lubbock County agent. L. M. Hargrave, of the Agricultural Education Department at Texas Tech, will be the assistant general superintendent.

Again this year the show will include the Fat Steer, Fat Barrow and Fat Lamb Divisions. Only boys, between the age of 9 and 20 inclusive, who are members of 4-H Clubs or FFA chapters, are eligible to enter animals.

Two more steps in a long-range West Texas-wide program to bring more businessmen into active support of the soil conservation movement will be taken in meetings in Eastland Wednesday and in Sweetwater Thursday.

It is a joint undertaking of local chambers of commerce, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and the Texas Association of Soil Conservation District Supervisors. Launched two months ago, it is to be carried throughout the 132 counties served by the WTCC. J. C. Porter, Wichita Falls, chairman of the WTCC Soil Conservation Com-

mittee, declared that the program will be carried along five years if necessary to make possible closer cooperation between supervisors of all soil districts and their neighbors who are in other businesses.

Porter will preside. Speakers will include Loyal H. Walker, WTCC agriculture and livestock manager; Ralph Schwartz, SCS staff man, Abilene; H. B. Boswell, assistant conservationist of the SCS; John Cole, executive director of the Texas Association of Soil Conservation District Supervisors, and V. C. Marshall, executive director of the State Soil Conservation Board, all of Temple.

Tours of inspection of conservation projects will be held following a brief opening session beginning at 9 a.m.

He was presented a new automobile, too, from friends and business associates for his long years of faithful and loyal service to the livestock industry.

A well-earned and well-deserved recognition for a fine fellow.

The nation's top cowboys will be in San Antonio for the fourth annual livestock exposition and rodeo to compete for more than \$35,000 in rodeo prize money.

Some 200 bronc riders, bulldoggers, and bull riders will compete in the Everett Colborn World's Championship Rodeo February 20-March 1 in six events, including saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling,

wild bull riding, and a wild horse stampede, a new event at the '53 show.

Heading the list of top cowboy names is Harry Tompkins of Dublin, Texas, who was named World's Champion All-Around Cowboy in 1952 by the Rodeo Cowboy's Association. With championship titles in bareback bronc riding and Brahman bull riding, Tompkins now holds three of the eight available titles awarded by the association.

Jim Shoulders of Henryetta, Oklahoma—top contender with Tompkins for all-around honors—also will appear in San Antonio. Shoulders was World's Champion Cowboy in 1949 and captured championships in bareback bronc riding and Brahman bull riding in '50 and '51.

Both Tompkins and Shoulders appear each year at the Midland Rodeo.

The Texas Aberdeen-Angus Breeders' Association held its annual meeting February 4 in Fort Worth. J. V. Hampton, Fort Worth, was elected president; A. C. Chesher, Littlefield, first vice president; and Henry Moore, Eldorado, second vice president.

Texas again leads all other states in the number of Polled Herefords registered in 1952, according to D. W. Chittenden, executive secretary of the American Polled Hereford Association.

There were 72,433 Polled Herefords registered with the recording association during last year, more than any other time in the history of the organization. The total registrations as of Jan. 1, 1953, numbered 669,202. Of this total registration, 95 per cent, or 312,993 entries were made in the 47-year period from 1901 to Jan. 1, 1948. In the last five years, Jan. 1, 1948, to Jan. 1, 1953, 45 per cent, or 286,209 of the total registrations have been made.

In 1948 he entered Syracuse University, where he studied journalism in the School of Liberal Arts. Later he enrolled in the Philadelphia Museum School of Art.

It was during this period that Levin became interested in new

A Freer National Economy

With all wage controls and many price curbs removed, President Eisenhower has begun what he hopes will be an orderly transition to a freer national economy. He believes the balance of natural market forces is sufficiently good to prevent any strong new inflationary currents.

This feeling is founded on two factors. One is his conviction that "the character of our people resists artificial and arbitrary controls of any kind." The other is his belief that direct controls deal with the symptoms rather than the causes of inflation, and hence are only partially effective.

Eisenhower believes with them that to control inflation you must have federal credit and monetary policies which keep the money supply in check and do not allow it to outdistance the available supply of goods.

WASHINGTON—The most impossible job in the world is to make a Russian Communist change his mind. This simple fact of life is what underlies much of the criticism of the U. S. international information program—otherwise known as the Voice of America and its related propaganda services.

WASHINGTON—The Russians are supposed to be spending the equivalent of \$1,500,000,000 a year on foreign propaganda, as compared to less than \$100,000,000 for the U. S. They run 1,000 jamming operations to prevent the Voice of America from penetrating the Iron Curtain.

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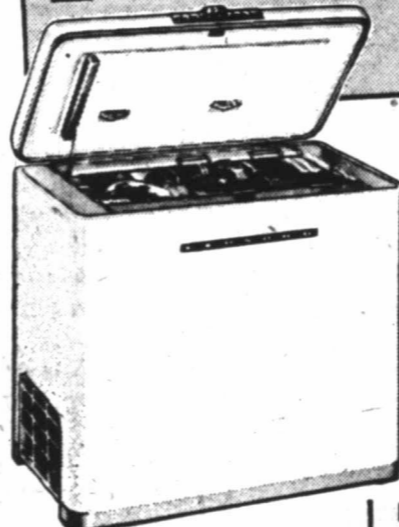

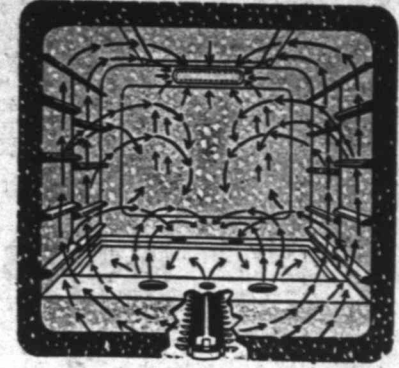

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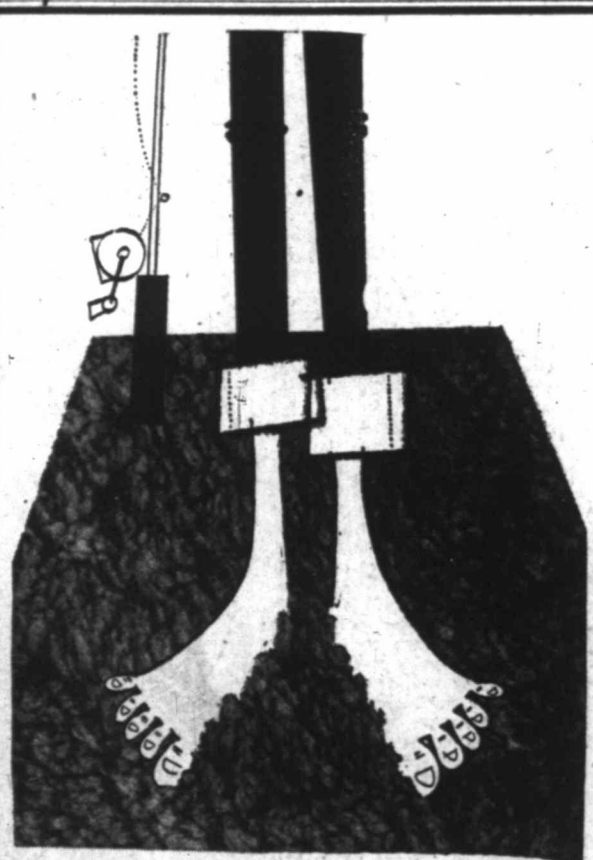
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
