State Department Shakeup Looms

Living Costs Drop In 'New Series' Index

VOL. XXIV-NO-304

The government reported Friday that living costs dropped two-tenths of one per cent between mid-December and mid-January.

The decline, mainly due to lower retail prices for food and clothing. was reflected in a new consumer price index put out for the first time by the Bureau of Labor Statis-

The new index is designed to re flect consumer price changes more accurately than did the one used previously. It prices more items, covers more cities and brings the calculations up to date on new

consumer buying habits. The new index for mid-January is 113.9.

Involves Contracts The figure means that in mid-January, living costs were 13.9 per cent above the average for the 1947-49 period, which is used as the index base. It is 0.7 per cent above a year ago.

Many labor unions had contracts adjusted upward or downward according to changes in the old in-

A spokesman for General Motors Corporation said the new living cost figures indicated a one cent-anhalf-million of its employes.

He said, however, that because government delay in publishing an 'old series" index, no adjustment in wage rates would be made for the time being.





Satisfactory Press Talk

By and large President Eisenhower acquitted himself well in his first press conference since he took office.

Among some reporters there was grumbling that the President "filibustered" by consuming two-thirds of the conference time with his own statements before opening the meeting to questions.

Part of this fretting reflects a curious notion held by some reporters that they have a vested interest in things as they are. That, in other words, there ought never to be a change in the press conference pattern, or at least no change not dictated by newsmen themselves.

For those without this strange vanity, worry over the President's initial try probably is quite minor. After all, he himself said at the outset that the pattern was experimental and he was open to suggestions.

Basically, there is nothing wrong with an opening statement by the Chief Executive at these conferences, especially if its subject matter clearly anticipates questions sure to be in reporters' minds. Indeed, the plan has the virtue of presenting the President's explanation of issues with greater clarity and organization than likely would develop under random questioning.

Nevertheless, such presentations probably ought to be held to a third of the overall press conference time, so that the reporters have fuller opportunity to shape their lines they clamor so loudly for. The minimum sentence, a one dollar fine, was set by a Munic Court jury. The jury could have fined Pontius up to \$200. The charge was placed against Pontius, 47, last October 27 after he was arrested for interrupting McCarthy's nationwide television broadcast in behalf
