Brownell went before the Senate Interior Committee, which is considering bills aimed at giving the coastal states title to the coastal regions, often miscalled Tidelands.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.—(AP)—The non-Soviet world still waited Monday for an inkling of the Kremlin's answer to U. S. charges that Russia is responsible for the war in Korea as Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky let delegates of two satellite nations speak in his stead in the UN Assembly's 60-nation Political Committee.

Senators Sparkman (D-Ala.), the 1952 Democratic vice presidential nominee, cautioned against calls by some Republicans for a tougher talking resolution and by others for repudiation of the agreements. Going too far would risk Democratic support for the resolution, Sparkman said, adding:

"If we want to continue to fuss about Yalta and the agreements there, let's do it among ourselves. But let's not bring that into a resolution that is solely a propaganda weapon against Russia."

Sparkman said that, if lawmakers go on indicating they believe the agreements are not valid because they never were submitted to Congress, the Russians might try to clamp another blockade on Berlin.

But, it won't last much longer. "They'll be leaving in a few days," explained Prosty Barnett, the manager of the Scharbauer, who has adopted a philosophical attitude toward the ornithological spectacles.

"They usually arrive in December, hang around until the first of March and then vanish as quickly as they come."

"We've tried to get rid of them. But it looks like a hopeless task. One year we even put rubber snakes on the window sills to scare them away but they only proved an added attraction and the birds crowded in that much closer."

They squeak incessantly through the night, lulling to sleep the guests at the Hotel Scharbauer and the Crawford Hotel.

In the late dusk, they make life uncertain for the unwary strolling along the 100 block of West Wall Street.

And the things they do to the automobiles parked along the street can bring joy only to the hearts of

limbs in the trees on the Midland County Courthouse lawn.

In those dark days, nobody dared walk around the courthouse without an umbrella, the starlings and crowbirds being what they are.

But the little birds find a more understanding soul in Mrs. John Galley, 1610 West Holloway Street, who is something of an amateur ornithologist along with her husband, a spoliator for the Shell Oil Company.

"They serve a very useful purpose," explained Mrs. Galley, sympathetically.

Little Life Savers

"Besides being pest-eaters they also are insect eaters. If it weren't for such birds, the insects would destroy all the vegetation in the world in no time flat."

The starlings, she continued, were brought to the United States from

England and in recent years have multiplied rapidly.

They are a little larger than the crowbirds, and have black bodies, speckled with little iridescent spots.

The birds are preparatory by nature and it is only natural that they huddle together alongside the hotel buildings.

"At night," said Mrs. Galley, "they bask in the heat absorbed by the buildings during the day. We can't feel the heat but the birds are very sensitive and are able to get enough warmth to keep comfortable."

She confirmed that the birds probably would be leaving any day, now.

"They will head north or east to their nesting grounds," she said.

"They will breed and raise their young and, next year, when winter rolls around, they'll be back to show their little children the wonders of Midland."

HOLLYWOOD—(P)—Joan Crawford Monday aimed this curt message at Marilyn Monroe: Stop believing your publicity.
 This curvaceous blonde has been the subject of a hot controversy during the last fortnight. Women's clubs have protested about the nature of her publicity and the advertising photos for her pictures. When I addressed the Women's Club of Hollywood a week ago, the members were eager to know what the producers were doing to curb Miss Monroe.
 Adding fuel to the fire were reports that her latest picture, the first with which she could demonstrate her box-office pull, was doing disappointing business. Then there was her much-publicized appearance at the Photoplay awards at

dinner.
 Miss Monroe showed up in a zippier metallic gown into which she had to be sewn. When she stepped up to get her award as the outstanding new personality on the screen, she put on a hip-swung display that brought the house down.
Industry Shudders
 "It was like a burlesque show," said the horrified Miss Crawford, who was present at the affair. "The audience yelled and shouted, and Jerry Lewis got up on the table and whistled. But those of us in the industry just shuddered."
 "Certainly her picture isn't doing business, and I'll tell you why. Sex plays a tremendously important part in every person's life. People are interested with it, intrigued with it. But they don't like to see it flaunted in their faces."
 "Kids don't like her. Sex plays a growingly important part in their lives, too, and they don't like to see it exploited."
 "And don't forget the women. They're the ones who pick out the movie entertainment for the family."

They won't pick anything that won't be suitable for their husbands and children."
Publicity Gets Out of Hand
 The durable Miss Crawford, who has lasted longer than any film star in history, said the Monroe buildup was clever and well planned. It was the work of master exploiters, she remarked, but it got out of hand.
 "The publicity has gone too far," she said. "And apparently Miss Monroe is making the mistake of believing her publicity. Someone should make her see the light. She should be told that the public likes provocative feminine personalities; but it also likes to know that underneath it all the actresses are ladies."
 The Crawford comments were read to Miss Monroe and she was asked if she cared to say anything about them. Miss Monroe started to make a statement and then changed her mind and replied: "No comment."

Galveston Wharves Grain Storage Suit Settled Out Of Court

GALVESTON—(P)—The federal government announced Sunday that a grain shortage suit filed against the Galveston Wharves and 10 railroads had been settled without trial.
 Assistant U. S. Attorney William Eckhardt of Houston said the settlement had been approved by the U. S. Attorney General's office in Washington.
 In 19 separate suits filed almost a year ago the government asked a total of \$110,000 for an alleged shortage of about 2,900 carloads of grain stored by the Commodity Credit Corporation. The petitions said there was a difference of 3,800,000 pounds between weight receipts when the grain was loaded into railroad cars and weight receipts at the Galveston elevators.
 Eckhardt said the settlement called for the city-owned wharves and the railroads to pay \$63,000, of which the wharves would pay three-fourths.

College Outlook Brightens

America's colleges and universities have been ailing financially almost since the end of World War II.

The pinch already has squeezed many small schools out of business, and many more are perilously close to the edge.

Inflation naturally has hiked the cost of everything the school does. Its impact has been magnified by the fact that a lot of the money that comes to the colleges can't be used to pay overhead expenses like coal and light bills and janitor service.

Tuition fees can be used that way, but they cover only part of the burden. And these fees already have been boosted so high in the postwar period they can't be increased much more without discouraging enrollments.

Most schools, big and small, rely chiefly upon endowments and other types of financial grants to provide expanding revenue sources. But, taxes being what they are, the big grants aren't so common any more.

During and since the war, the federal government has helped colleges carry on by granting funds for specific research purposes, ordinarily projects affecting weapons development. But this sort of aid has the same narrow limit upon it.

From time to time experts scanning this gloomy picture have suggested that the one real hope for the colleges is to have business and industry take a greater share of the financial load.

Led by five top industrialists, a nation-wide Council for Financial Aid to Education has been formed to advise both business and education on programs for the latter's support.

In recent years groups of private schools have banded together regionally to seek industrial backing. Altogether some 300 schools in 29 states are participating in such programs.

If the council substantially can accomplish its objectives, the nation's system of higher education may look ahead to a gradually brightening horizon for the first time in the postwar era.

New U. S. Delegates To UN Get Training In Present Session

WASHINGTON—Present plans call for ending the reconvened United Nations General Assembly meeting in New York at the end of March.

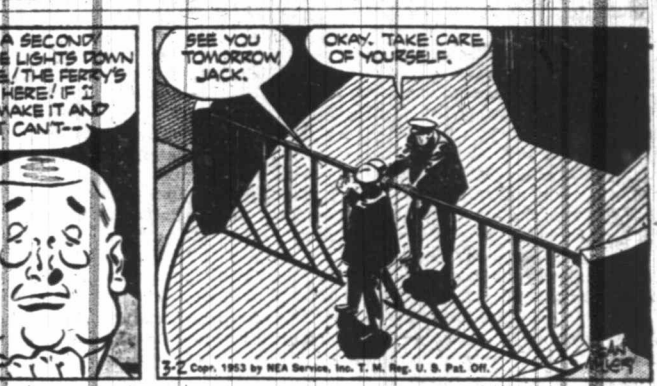

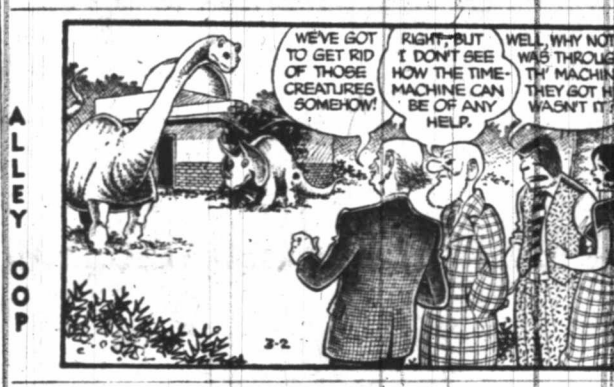

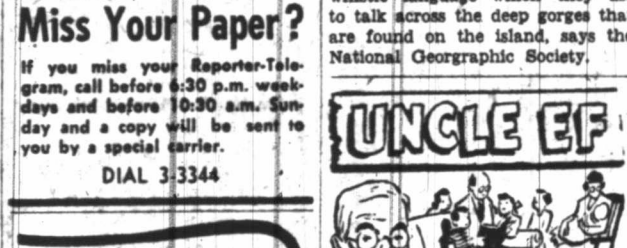

TEXAS' SECOND TOP ACE IN KOREA— King Of MIG Killers Calls Ground Crews Real Heroes

A SABRE JET AIRFIELD IN KOREA—(P)—A 34-year-old Texan is going to keep hunting Communist planes because that's his job. But Col. Royal N. (The King) Baker, America's second ranking jet ace, says he's not going to push his luck to become top ace.

Baker, 34-year-old father of four children, ends his Korean tour of duty March 27.

The McKinney, Texas, ace has shot down 10 Communist MIG's and one LA-9 and in addition has damaged one MIG. His record is second to that of Maj. George Davis, Jr., of Lubbock, Texas, who was shot down over North Korea a year ago and is listed as missing in action.

Davis destroyed 11 MIG's and

three TU bombers, damaged a MIG and a TU and is credited with probably destroying another MIG.

Baker, as commander of the Fourth Fighter-Interceptor Group, had a tour of duty lasting a year, rather than 100 missions that most Sabre jet pilots fly.

He has completed 122 missions and has asked for and received permission to fly up to 150.

He expects to keep flying every other day until time to go home.

Duty: Kill MIG's

"I'm not going to ease off," Baker said. "If I eased off what could I expect my boys to do? I think the way to be a leader is to lead my boys in combat."

He said he doesn't plan to push himself to equal or better Davis'

record.

"Of course I'd like to become top ace," he said. "My job is to destroy MIG's. But I'd as soon see my men shoot them down."

In World War II Baker flew over 200 missions as a Spitfire and P-47 pilot in Europe.

The name of Baker's plane is

"Angel Face and the Babies," after his wife, Sarah, and his two small sons and two small daughters in McKinney.

The name is painted on the plane in Gothic letters. But Baker hasn't painted more than five red stars under his cockpit—for the first five Communist planes he shot down.

"My wife keeps telling me I'm no hero," he said. "And I know she's right. It's those boys who keep the planes flying who are heroes."

Ike Bows To Protests, Will Lift Ban On Beauty Queens

WASHINGTON—(P)—The White House has bowed to protests and now will welcome beauty queens within its doors—if they are accompanied by their senator or congressman.

At least, that's the story told Monday by an informed person who may not be named. As this source told it—

Since he assumed office January 20, President Eisenhower and his assistants have taken a dim view of the old American custom of having beauty queens pictured with the President.

The President, it was explained, was too busy. And he didn't think much of the idea in the first place.

With Spring just around the corner, the situation was approaching a critical stage. Spring always brings to Washington a bumper crop of queens.

Senators and congressmen always

do the honors when there's a queen around from their state. Her arrival means luncheons, tours of the Capitol and quite often in the past meant a handshake with the President, to accompaniment of clicking cameras.

The lawmakers felt the folks at home sort of expected them to shoot the works. But the White House wasn't cooperative and there was some plain and fancy griping from Congress.

The lawmakers said they were embarrassed because it looked as if they weren't on very good terms with the President.

Nobody said anything about it publicly, but pressure reportedly built up. Now the White House appears to have capitulated.

The latest word to Capitol Hill is that senators and House members can see the President any time an appointment can be fitted in.

And they can bring along anybody they like—including beauty queens.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Navy is developing a corps of atomic bomb-hardened fliers and ordnance experts trained in the high-level and secret schools of nuclear weapon use.

Temple U Suspends Philosophy Teacher

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—Temple University has suspended a professor who refused to testify before the House Un-American Activities Committee. It charged the teacher's action had "deliberately created a doubt" as to his loyalty to America.

Dr. Robert L. Johnson, Temple president, suspended Dr. Barrows Dunham, professor of philosophy, under provisions of a state loyalty law which requires the university to guarantee that no "subversive persons are in its employ."

Dr. Johnson, in a letter to the professor Sunday, said Dunham's refusal to answer questions of the House committee "created a doubt as to your loyalty status."

Dr. Johnson Monday took over as head of the International Information Administration, which operates the Voice of America.

Carry Fake Bombs
The Navy received their training in atomic warfare at the same joint armed forces schools used for Air Force crews. These include the New Mexico installations of the Armed Forces Special Weapons Project (AFSWP).

They use, as do Air Force crews, precise duplicates of atomic bombs complete in all details except the actual nuclear fission charge.

Navy men participate in the joint task forces which conduct the experimental atomic explosions at the Nevada and Eniwetok Proving Grounds.

Ships Carry Bombs
Reports that components for the atomic bomb are carried aboard some of the largest carriers, published last year, have gone without official denial.

The Navy has at least one type of plane, operating from carriers, probably able to tote the same size A-bomb carried in the bays of the biggest land-based, long-range bombers.

The AJ1 Savage is the heaviest of the operational carrier-based planes, with a gross weight of more than 55,000 pounds and powered by two piston engines and a jet. Its range is given as "more than 2,000 miles."

Bus Driver Charged In Mexican Disaster
MEXICO CITY—(AP)—A weekend bus accident in which 13 persons were burned to death and 17 others injured seriously has brought the arrest of two bus drivers, accused of racing along a 40-foot embankment.

One of the two buses got out of control Saturday, hurtled over the embankment with its brakes locked and burst into flames when it crashed.

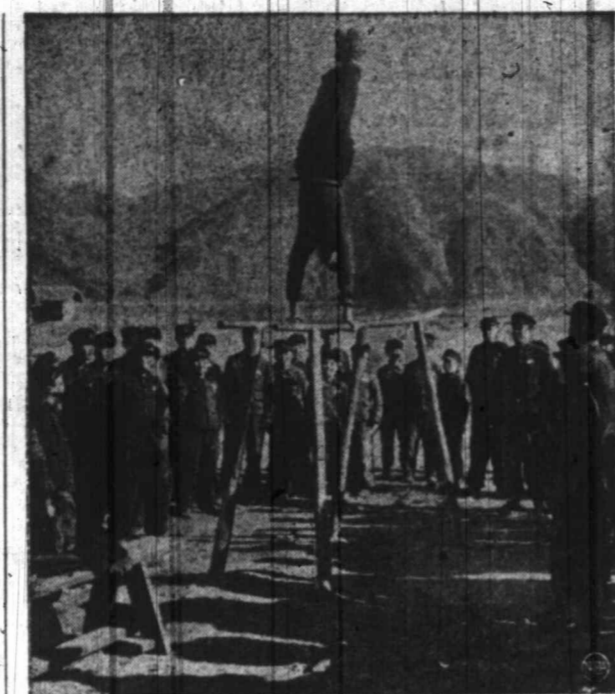

SEND THE BILL TO UNCLE SAM
NEW YORK—(AP)—A New York butter dealer said the government should unload surplus butter now in storehouses by starting "butter bargain days"—giving away a pound for every pound sold.

Fred C. Lowenfels, president of the Hotel Bar Butter Company, telegraphed Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson Sunday that the scheme would help the government clear the warehouses and also would "help put butter back on many consumer tables."

Lowenfels said the government has more than 80 million pounds of surplus butter.

Brooklyn Youths Sail Out On Raft, Return By Cutter
NEW YORK—(AP)—Three Brooklyn teen-age boys found an Army surplus raft Monday, patched it up, set out for a sail—and were blown two miles from shore before someone spotted them.

Eight winds made futile their efforts to control the craft with paddles in lower New York Bay.

A police helicopter hovered over the rubber raft until a police launch and a Coast Guard cutter could reach the boys. They were taken aboard the cutter and returned to Staten Island.

The youths—Lawrence Stanton, 13, William Godare, 15, and James Price, 15—had taken the ferry to Staten Island and found the discarded raft on a beach.

They borrowed tire patches and a pump from a nearby gas station, and then set out on their adventure. It all ended about an hour later.

Taylor Confident Of Allied Victory

SEOUL—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor expressed belief Monday the Communists "sooner or later" will tire of the Korean War and that the Allies "will win no matter how long it takes."

GI's Help Educate Children In Korea

When members of the U. S. 40th Division, fighting in Korea, realized that children in their sector had inadequate schooling facilities, they organized a drive to collect \$10,000 to build the kind of school the underprivileged children deserved. The men showed their enthusiasm, and oversubscribed to the project with a total of \$15,000. Within three months a \$13-foot-long building was constructed, with 10 good-sized classrooms. By extensive appeals for additional funds to be used for equipment, teachers, medical staff and material, the troops finally achieved their goal of creating the type of educational facilities that the youngsters needed.

Taylor, in his first interview since taking command of the Eighth Army two and one-half weeks ago, said he is confident his forces could withstand any Communist offensive in Korea. He added that his troops are in the strongest entrenched positions of any army since World War I.

"We are sitting, waiting, and it may take a long time, but I am confident we will win no matter how long it takes," he said. "The enemy sooner or later will grow tired."

He expressed satisfaction with the Republic of Korea (ROK) troops. He said more ROK units would be added to the Eighth Army as officers became available.

"Like our own Army in the United States, the South Korean Army is top heavy with lieutenant colonels and up, but there is a shortage of the company and platoon leadership type of officer, which we are rapidly developing in the Korean Army," he added.

About two-thirds of the 155-mile battlefield is manned by ROK's.

Post To Publish Lindbergh's Story

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—The Saturday Evening Post is going to publish, in 10 installments starting April 11, the autobiography of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh.

The Lindbergh story, covering the famous flier's life up to June, 1927—eight years after he flew the Atlantic ocean from New York to Paris—will be published in book form by Scribner in the Fall.

Post Editor Ben Hibbs said his magazine would use only 55,000 words of the 180,000 Lindbergh manuscript.

The flier reportedly will receive \$100,000 for the magazine rights.
