

No Final Decision Before May Is Outlook For Budget Cuts

WASHINGTON-How much money the Elec dministration is going to be able to save the tampayers is question that's still very much up in the air. Action by the House of Representatives' Appropria-

300,000,000 supplemental money bill for 1958, shows clearly the temper of Congress. But old-timers around Washington point out that what the House kills, the Senate sometimes restores.

Furthermore, Rep. Carl Vinson of Georgia, ranking Democrat on the House Armed Services Committee, says that the cuts are meaningless and the money will have to be reappropriated later on. 




