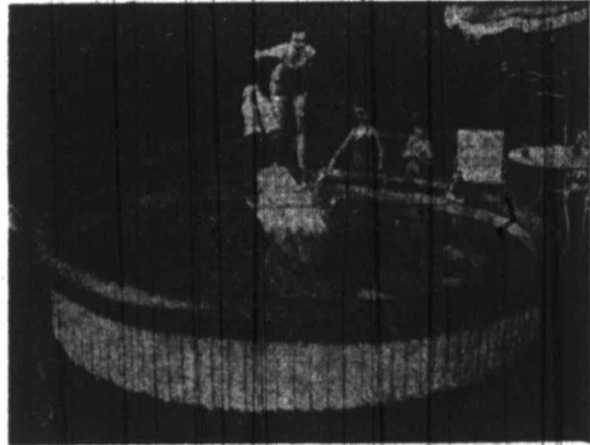

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New 3-D Films Just Too Bad For Falsie, Girdle Wearers

HOLLYWOOD—Friday the 13th is a good time to warn film queens who use falsies to fill out their forms or girdles to hold them in.
Coming days may prove unkindly for you girls, because there's 3-D in your future. And that means only actresses with bona fide figures will get by, says designer Helen Rose.
Hollywood's current craze for new-dimensional films will bring even closer scrutiny by movie goers, Miss Rose observes. Film fans will be able to see the depth of their screen favorites, and the dimensions cannot be faked.
"The 3-D processes accent thinness or stoutness," the designer remarked. "Artificial means of enhancing figures will be virtually impossible; no matter how artful they are, their unnaturalness can generally be detected."
"Skinny girls will no longer be able to pad themselves with falsies. Overweight girls cannot rely on girdles to cover up their excesses at the table. They will have to get themselves in genuine shape for the 3-D camera."
With understandable pride, Miss Rose declared her studio, MGM, is well-equipped for the 3-D onslaught. She pointed to a bevy of beautiful bodies which the lot controls:
Lana Turner—"Her figure was never better than it is in her latest picture. She has slimmed down so that her measurements are the same as when she started in pictures, except for a half-inch added to her bust and a half-inch of her hips."
Ava Gardner—"She has a figure that exudes pure sex. She can wear anything and make it attractive. I saw photos of her in a simple pair of shorts in an African village, and she looks terrific."
Esther Williams—"She is a big girl, but she has learned to carry herself beautifully. Swimming taught her that."
The designer said 3-D will increase her problems.
"For one thing, cleavage will be more of a headache," she said. "Our studio already maintains neckties at a high mark, and 3-D will accentuate cleavage. We'll probably have to go higher."

Punch-Drunk IIA Is A Wreck, But Salvage Still Is Possible

WASHINGTON—An old-timer in the U. S. international information program—whose experience goes back to the old OWI Office of War Information days—recently had this to say about the current Voice of America program:

"For my dough, the only hope now is to burn the joint down and start another." This remark was occasioned by the resignation of Dr. Wilson Compton as administrator of IIA—the International Information Administration.

It has not been revealed before, but when Dr. Compton, a former president of Washington State College, was appointed to this post a year ago, he was the fifty-sixth man to be asked to take the job.

On top of this, an alphabetical bureaucracy was set up in Washington to plan and execute policy. The men on the French desk for instance, couldn't write a script that said anything controversial unless it was first approved by ILO, IFL, IIA and PAA. To you—the usual International Information Administration and the assistant secretary of State for Public Affairs.

It is noteworthy that the Senate Expenditures Investigating Committee has not taken the trouble to call on Erwin D. Canham of Christian Science Monitor, Justin Miller of the National Association of Broadcasters, Phillip D. Reed of General Electric and Dr. Mark A. May, director of the Institute of Human Relations at Yale University.

There is no lack of brains on this advisory commission. Any organization having the benefit of its talent for counsel should be a howling success. Commission Praised IIA.

But while this commission has criticized some IIA and Voice of America operations, the general nature of its comments has been one of praise for "the effectiveness of a world-wide campaign of truth" being waged by the State Department.

For it generally is admitted that the hoarse "Voice" and the not-so-free-press publications and other media programs have some good men on their staffs—some really professional, with expert technical knowledge of what they're doing and real devotion to putting across the American message in the countries they're trying to reach.

Sampson and Willie Gilbert, 18, another negro, are charged with the January 6 slaying in a North-west Houston flower shop. Gilbert is to be tried later.

Testimony was completed shortly before 8 p.m. District Attorney William S. Scott has said he would ask the death penalty for Sampson.

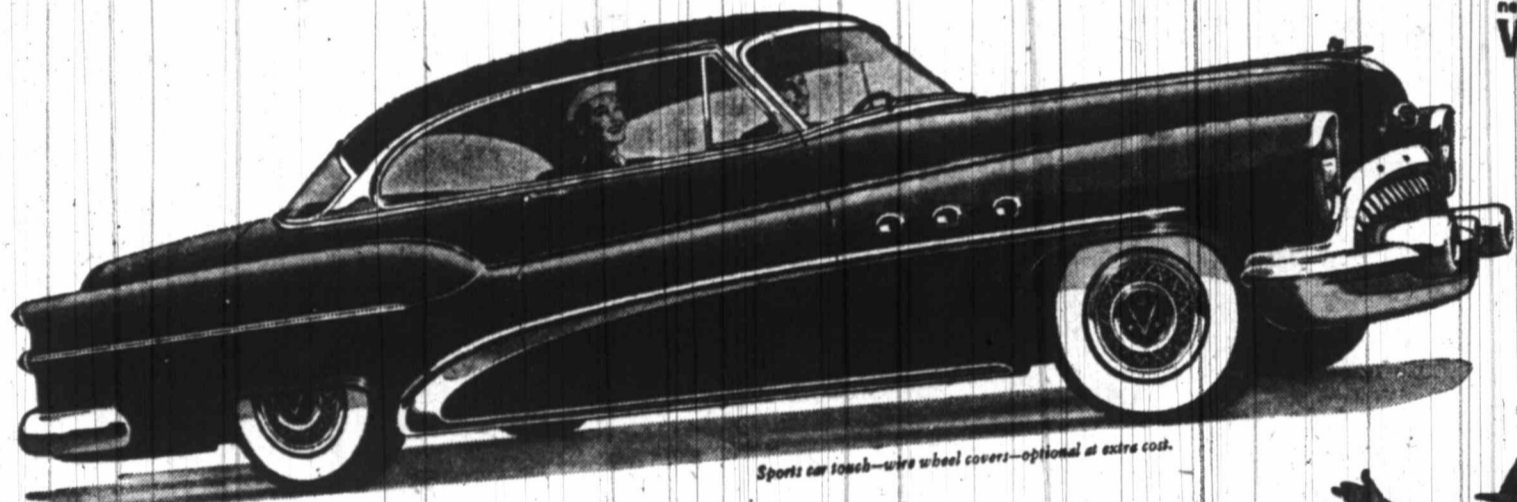

**Eden Tags Reds 'Barbaric,'
 Asks 'Partial War' In Korea**

NEW YORK.—(P)—British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden has denounced as "barbaric" the shooting down of an RAF bomber by a pair of Soviet MIG jets.

Eden, delivering a major speech Thursday night before the Foreign Policy Association, departed from his prepared text to lash out at Russia over Thursday's attack on the British plane, which killed six of the seven crewmen.

Reading text, Eden said the U. S. and Britain stood ready to negotiate with Russia—despite Premier Stalin's death—and that both nations would welcome a similar intention from the Soviets.

Discarding the text momentarily, Eden added:
 "There is nothing of the kind up to the present. On the contrary we have today heard of the

shooting down while on a routine exercise of a Royal Air Force training bomber. . . .

"Deliberate and unprovoked attacks of this kind by what are supposed to be friendly forces can only be called barbaric."

"Thankless" Assignment
 More than 1,800 persons jammed the main ballroom of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel to hear Eden's speech, which also had a nation-wide radio and television audience.

Eden urged the United States to fight only a "partial" war in Korea, which he termed a "thankless" assignment and added:
 "It is one thing for a nation to throw its entire strength into a fight for survival. It is another to conduct a partial war with all kinds of restraint upon your action."

"And yet we know that these restraints must be maintained."

Eden was interrupted with applause when he said that no goods of strategic importance had gone to Red China from British sources in almost two years.

"Since the beginning of the Korean War," he said, "no arms have been sold to Communist China from any British territory."

New Trade Barriers
 "We also are taking further steps to ensure that no ships of any nationality taking strategic cargoes to China shall be bunkered in British ports."

"These measures speak for themselves. They do not represent a new policy. . . ."

The British Cabinet member praised the U. S. for bearing the heaviest burden of the war in Korea.

"The British people are with you as loyal comrades in the world struggle for peace and freedom," he said.

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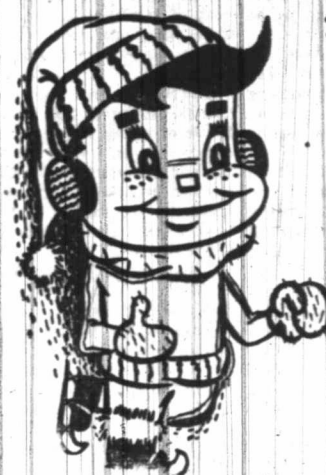
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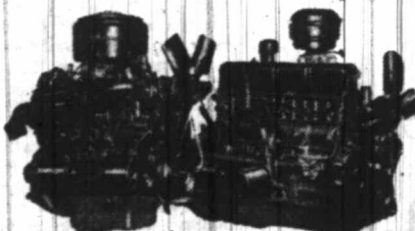
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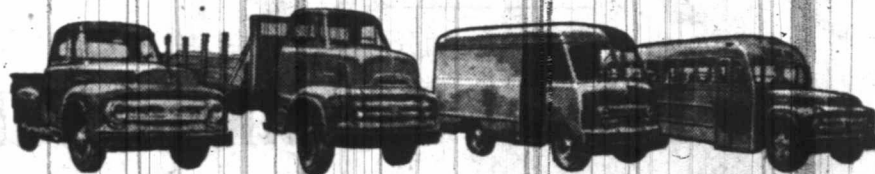
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19 Battlers To Collide Friday Night In Optimist Club Tournament Finale

FIRST CITY, Texas — (VFW Hall)—Nineteen battlers who had luck on their side Thursday night test fist, feat and fate Friday the thirteenth in bidding for championships in the second annual Optimist Club Invitational Boxing Tournament at the VFW Hall.

The final program, beginning at 8 p.m., lists eight crown titles to be won after six winners went unopposed Thursday. Twelve of 13 other scrappers weren't so lucky. They fell Thursday, all by decision, while No. 13 was felled, period.

He was Clinton Noble, a 195-pound Midland High School novice heavyweight who volunteered to be matched with an open heavy in a Friday finale and, to get ready, went into a first bout—an exhibition—Thursday. He was stopped on a first round by Charlie Crites, 170, Midland.

Even as the card Thursday had some rousing bouts, only two sustained knockdowns, and one of those, Rex Maxwell, open division welterweight from Odessa, got back on his feet in the second round to jab out a three-round decision over Spud Green, 143, of Odessa.

Maxwell, 144, outboxed slinger Green in the first round only to be

victimized by a rush in the middle of the second. He caught an over-head right on the chin and proved heady enough, despite the blow, to wink at the Andrews battler while taking the mandatory eight-count. He held off Green in a third-period slugging bee, for his triumph.

That win put Maxwell in the welterweight finals opposite Fred Denard of Monahans, promising one of Friday's best open division battles, of which three are coming up.

Denard, 141, put down Paul Haley, 146, Odessa, by decision, and Pat Morgan, 120, of Midland took a victory over Ruben Munoz, 121, of Odessa in the only other open fight Thursday.

Morgan's win brought on a rhabarb, it came via disqualification of Munoz because of butting. Both fighters were warned in the opening round for the offense and when it continued, Referee Burt Stringer called Munoz the offender in the second round. That halted the fight, but not the argument, which followed the pair into heated words back stage.

In other bouts, Leroy Reeves of Midland gained the novice finals by decisioning Bobby Ellis of An-

draws. His flyweight foe will be either Jack Vining, Andrews, or Tommy Spencer, Midland, who took quarter-final victories.

In the novice featherweight group, James Ball and Travis Runyon, both of Midland, earned the finals with decisions over Midlanders James Rogers and Robbie Kerr, respectively.

One fighter, Fred Wisinger, 131, of Odessa, suffered the only injury. While dropping a decision to newcomer Wayne Cooper of Midland, the more experienced Wisinger suffered a bruised hand and was ordered by the boxing physician to have X-rays for possible bone injury Friday.

Cooper Friday faces Don Evans of Midland who decisioned Boyce McKnight. Among the welterweights, Odessa's Don Brooks beat Midland's Luther Towery, and will face James Kemp, Monahans, who beat Chango Munoz of Odessa. Kemp it was who floored Munoz with a right to the stomach in the second round for the meet's second knockdown.

Of the six unopposed champions, two were Buddy Mote, 106, Odessa, and Chilly Reeves, 115, Midland, who were expected to contend over

the open flyweight title. Reeves, a Golden Gloves champion, tried to run off the two pounds excess but was unable to make the flyweight limit.

Mote thus won the open flyweight crown, Reeves the bantamweight, while Don Curtis and James Adams, both of Odessa, gained the lightweight and middleweight trophies, respectively.

Romlie Kist, 116, Midland, gets the novice bantam crown and Jimmy Dunn, 152, Odessa, the lightweight title without opposition.

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
