Rowan Scheduled To Drill Wildcat In Runnels Area

Rowan Oil Company No. 1 Lee Parks is to be drilled as a South-Central Runnels County wildcat. It is to be dug 467 feet from north and east lines of the Parks 105-acre tract in the Joseph Warner survey No. 418, abstract 930. It is slated for a 5,500-foot bottom.

It is about five miles south of Ballinger and five miles north of Rowena.

Ingram Of Dallas Is To Drill Ellenburger Wildcat In C-N Crane

T. M. Evans of Dallas is to drill his No. 1 Jordan-Ingram as a 10,300-foot wildcat to test the Ellenburger in Central-North Crane County. It will be eight miles south of Penwell and 680 feet from south and east lines of section 12, block 22, plat survey. Operations are to begin at once.

The prospector is offset to the north and east by shallow producers on the south side of the Jordan field from upper Permian pay above 4,000 feet.

Ingram's wildcat is to be drilled on a lease he secured in a farmout deal with Stanolind Oil & Gas Company.

ARC Is To Test Deep Zones At Nolley Area Wildcat In Andrews

American Republics Corporation is to drill a deep wildcat in Central-North Andrews County. It is to dig through the Pennsylvanian and the Mississippian and is may go into the Devonian.

The exploration will be American Republics Corporation No. 2 H. H. and others. It is to be drilled at the town of Andrews, about 10 miles south and 1,000 feet from east lines of labor 2, league 314, Gaines County Land survey.

The project was originally started to dig to 10,400 feet, to test the Wolfcamp-Permian pay of the Nolley field. It has reached 10,320 feet in lime and shale and is making more holes.

Has Wolfcamp Oil
It has shown for a small producer in the Wolfcamp. However, operator has decided to carry it on down to test the lower formations.

An amended application has been filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting a permit to go to a possible bottom of 12,500 feet. Operator representatives say the primary purpose of the deepening is to drill through the Pennsylvanian, the Mississippian and the Devonian.

Rail Board Sets Spraberry Hearing In Austin Tuesday

The Railroad Commission of Texas will hold a hearing on the waste of approximately 250,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily in the Spraberry Trend Area field in Austin Tuesday.

The Spraberry Trend Area operators will be asked to show cause why casinghead gas now being flared in the Trend should not be conserved and why the area should not be shut in to conserve the gas.

Production of gas in the Spraberry, is approximately 10,000,000 cubic feet monthly. The flaring of 250,000,000 cubic feet daily has brought about the hearing in Austin.

Spraberry operators and royalty owners met recently in Midland and decided to oppose the possible shut-in measure.

Discovery Offset In SE Hockley Is Plugged, Abandoned

Honolulu Oil Corporation and Signal Oil & Gas Company No. 2 Matthews, northeast offset to a Pennsylvanian discovery in Southeast Hockley County, has been plugged and abandoned on total depth of 8,400 feet.

The project developed shows oil, but could not be completed as a commercial producer.

Location was 525 feet from north and 1,305 feet from west-lines of labor 11, league 13, Howard County School Land survey.

Alaniz, Sapet Win Separate Trials In Brownwood Court

BROWNWOOD—(AP)—The defense won separate trials Monday for two men accused of furnishing "arms and aid" to an unknown killer who shot down Jacob S. (Buddy) Floyd, Jr., in what was termed a bungled South Texas political assassination.

Mario (El Turco) Sapet, San Antonio tavern owner and former deputy sheriff under long-time South Texas political figure George B. Parr, will be tried first.

Charged with murder in the sensational slaying with Sapet is Nago Alaniz, dapper Alice lawyer.

The case, here on a change of venue, opened in District Judge A. O. Newman's court at 9 a.m. Newman granted the motion for severance and ordered separate trials during trial preliminaries.

Young Floyd, 22-year-old University of Texas student and son of an influential South Texas political leader, was shot down the night of

last September 8 by a gunman hiding in the shadows of the Floyd family garage in Alice.

As proceedings got underway the state called names of 50 witnesses—one of them the victim's father, Jacob S. Floyd, Sr. Three hundred witnesses have been called for jury selection, expected to start later Monday.

Crowds of spectators milled around the courthouse. Seven Texas rangers are also here.

Sapet has been held in Brown County jail here without bond since December 27. Alaniz, who had been free on bond, arrived Sunday.

The charges against the two say they were not present when young Floyd was shot but "furnished arms and aid" to an unknown killer; that they conspired to kill Jake Floyd, Sr., and that by mistake his son was killed.

At the examining trials of the two men, the elder Floyd—a prominent Alice lawyer and political foe of Parr—told of a secret rendezvous with Alaniz while his son lay dying. The father testified that Alaniz told him he and then District Judge Sam O. Reams had been marked for death. He said Alaniz told him that as they talked, someone was waiting in the Floyd's garage to kill him.

Alaniz was arrested in Alice the day after the shooting.

Sapet was arrested in San Antonio.

Tito Pays First Visit To Britain

LONDON—(AP)—President Tito of Yugoslavia stepped ashore Monday to begin a historic visit—the first ever made to Britain by any head of a Communist state. His arrival on British soil had been delayed four hours by a typical British weather phenomenon—fog.

Greeting him at Westminster pier in the shadow of Parliament was the Duke of Edinburgh, Queen Elizabeth's husband; Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden. Tito was attired in a Naval uniform. Smiling broadly, he shook hands all around.

The Duke saluted him and Tito returned the greeting. A guard of honor also presented arms as the Yugoslav national anthem was played. After the welcoming ceremony which lasted about 10 minutes Tito strolled along the Thames embankment with the Duke.

Tito is here for talks with British leaders. The exact nature of the parley never has been disclosed and as deep a veil of secrecy surrounds the purpose of his visit as surrounds his movements while here.

Stern security measures have been taken to protect the Red ruler from any danger at the hands of a possible assassin.

The ship in which he had traveled from Yugoslavia, the Omlas (Seagull), anchored Sunday night

35 miles down the river and was to have cruised up starting at 8:30 a.m. During the foggy delay Tito could be seen from the air pacing the deck impatiently.

As a safety precaution, the scheduled time of his arrival and other events of his visit were kept secret. His stay will include lunch with the Queen at Buckingham Palace, as well as high-level policy talks and a round of dinners.

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Rains Skirt West Texas; Clouds Exit

The rest of Texas was getting a little rain Monday but there was little chance for the Midland area to be included.

The sky was overcast during the morning but the CAA station at Midland Air Terminal said the clouds would begin breaking up by mid-afternoon.

Little change was expected in temperatures after a high of 67 degrees was reported for Sunday and a low of 52 early Monday.

Across most of Texas, however, warm, moist air sucked in from the Gulf of Mexico brought light rain and a heavy cloud blanket.

The heavy clouds were expected to break up by mid-afternoon and then to clear by late evening.

Folk at Fort Worth spoke of the onset of thunder, followed by steady drizzle. Early morning rain also fell at Wichita Falls, Laredo, San Antonio, Tyler and Dallas.

Rain totals during 24 hours ended at 6:30 a.m.: Corpus Christi, 1.6 inch; Lufkin, .18; Laredo, .06; Waco, .08; Wichita Falls, .02; Brownsville, .01.

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Administration Officials Look Closely At Malenkov's Latest Words Of Peace

The world now is entering the Eisenhower era, he said. He expressed the view that Stalin's death, ending his "malignant" influence, would enhance the chances for peace.

Malenkov said Sunday there were no controversial issues with the U. S. or any other nation that could not be settled peacefully.

Experts on Soviet relations suggested that what Malenkov said was in most respects about as vague as anything Stalin ever said about peace during those times when, in view of the American government, he was talking out of both sides of his mouth.

Malenkov mentioned no specific issue for settlement, offered no particular formula and made no commitment on anything. He did go out of his way a little bit, however, to specify that he thought issues between Russia and other countries could be settled.

Experts on Soviet history and conduct said there are persuasive reasons why Malenkov should be talking peace at this time—just as there are persuasive reasons why he might have ordered a tough policy in Germany which resulted in shooting down British and American aircraft last week.

He has clear aims to make, some experts say, by appearing one day belligerent and the next day peaceful. He also makes a clear gain if he can stall off any extra heavy pressures by the Western Powers during the months when he is shaking down his government and consolidating his personal position.

Andrews Sets Tax Election

ANDREWS—County Commissioners have ordered an election for April 11 to determine whether qualified property taxpayers will authorize the county to levy a 30 cent ad valorem tax on each \$100 assessed valuation.

A constitutional amendment adopted by the people four years ago authorizing the State Tax Board to discontinue the 30 cent levy and an accompanying piece of legislation gave permission to the county to levy the tax provided qualified voters authorized the levy.

The county court, City Council and Chamber of Commerce road committee, supports the 30 cent ad valorem to raise funds for a butane route and other road and street improvement. However, the legislature limited the commissioners court to three items in expending the funds derived from the tax. They are flood controls and farm to market and lateral roads.

It was agreed in a meeting of the Andrews organizations that an investigation would be given this tax at the end of the five-year period and an opportunity afforded to have it repealed if at that time it was thought the tax was needed.

"The Democratic Party is not going to die," he said. "It's not going to be broken."

Father Watches Trapped Children Die In Home Fire

MEADVILLE, PA.—(AP)—Unable to find a ladder, a father of nine watched helplessly as five of his children, trapped in an upstairs bedroom in their flaming home, burned to death.

Four other children and the wife of Donald McElhany fled to safety through second-floor windows.

McElhany awoke at 4 a.m. Sunday and smelled smoke. He jumped through a window to the ground. Unable to find a ladder he yelled to awaken his family.

His wife, nightclothes aflame, appeared at a window. She collapsed and dropped 10 feet to the ground. Shortly afterward the dwelling exploded in flames. She is in critical condition at Titusville Hospital with extensive burns and shock.

Deputy Coroner C. M. Somme identified the dead as Florence, 18; Barbara, 11; Maxine, 10; Gordon, five, and Sylvia, three.

Benson Says Price Supports Can Reach Checkmate In Marts

WASHINGTON—(AP)—An inflexible program of high government price supports for farm products, Secretary of Agriculture Benson says, carries with it the threat of pricing those products off the market.

"We need some flexibility so there will be adjustments made as between commodities in response to the supply and demand situation," Benson told a House appropriations subcommittee.

"It is possible, I think, to have a support price so high that you may price a product out of the market," Benson was testifying in support of his department's budget requests for the year starting July 1. The subcommittee made his testimony public Sunday night.



A Legend Is Buried

Field Marshal Gerd von Rundstedt, who died in obscurity the other day, was the very prototype of the Prussian German general, the symbol of the militarism that twice within a generation plunged the world into war.

Von Rundstedt loomed large in the pattern of Nazi victories in World War II before the Allies finally turned the tide. His forces attained the first great success of the conflict by enveloping the main Polish armies west of Warsaw in 1939.

Later he commanded the armies which broke into the Low Countries, and through Sudan on into Central France in 1940. Then followed important triumphs on the Russian front in the first great eastern campaign.

Hitler, periodically suspicious of his generals, side-tracked von Rundstedt for a time, but he was in full command of the Nazi defenses when the Allies landed at Normandy in June, 1944. Here he failed and was replaced, only to return for one last effort—the famed Battle of the Bulge in December of that year.

After the war, the Germans, anxious to convince their conquerors that Hitlerism was something they had no power to resist, strove mightily to build a legend that freed them of blame for the war. Part of this legend was that the German generals really opposed the conflict and were unsympathetic to nazism.

The careful students of the facts do not accept this facile explanation. They declare that the evidence indicates the overwhelming majority of generals gave either active or tacit support to the Nazi movement. They add that while some disagreed as to timing and strategy, it cannot be demonstrated that they were genuinely opposed to a German war of conquest.

Von Rundstedt, the perfect Prussian who by every mark of his haughty breed should have held the neurotic, fanatic Hitler in contempt, had the military means to block Hitler's rise to power in the early 1930's. But he did not. He furnished arms to Hitler's street brawlers and strong-arm squads.

When Hitler cast off the last treaty bonds that limited German rearmament, he gave von Rundstedt a high command post in the vastly expanded Nazi army. The Prussian did not refuse it, nor is there any proof he was unhappy about the assignment to lead Nazi forces in assault upon a pitifully weak Poland.

One by one, the German generals of World War II are dying off. With them should be buried forever the dangerous fantasy that they were in any moral way better than the fanatical Nazis they served.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

(Copyright, 1953, By The Bell Syndicate, Inc.) Drew Pearson says: Defense chief reverses self on budget cuts; 40-page catalog costs \$87,000,000; Services sabotage \$4,000,000,000 effort.

WASHINGTON—Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson went into a complete, although secret reverse last week. After telling a Senate committee he could make no real cuts in the Defense budget, he ordered the Navy to cut by two billions, the Air Force by a quarter billion, and the Army by a quarter billion.

Reason for the reversal was a determined desire on the part of Budget Director Joe Dodge to chop expenses, plus realization that in the armed forces there's the greatest fat. Here is some news which may help Dodge and Wilson. A little over a year ago—Feb. 4, 1952—this column reported in detail how the Army, Navy, Air Force overlapped, duplicated, and competed with each other in buying supplies. In such a relatively simple item as carpenter's squares, for instance, a carpenter's square for the Quartermaster Corps cost 65 cents, for the Navy \$2, for the Army \$1.90, for the Signal Corps \$2.10, for the Army Engineers \$1.48, for the Air Force \$1.40.

Furthermore, even within the Army itself, there is no standardization of carpenter's squares, so that the Army catalogue contained six separate specifications for squares—the Signal Corps', Ordnance's, Transportation's, Engineers', Chemical Warfare's, and Quartermaster Corps'. On top of this, Air Force has to have a seventh number, and the base cost of reprinting Army catalogues to add the Air Force's seventh number is about \$1,500,000.

Last year also, a subcommittee spearheaded by Congressman Carl Vinson of Georgia, and Eddie Hebert of Louisiana performed extensive research on armed services duplication, finally passed a law requiring the Army, Navy, Air Force to compile one catalogue from which they all would order instead of competing against each other through separate catalogues.

That law was passed on July 1, 1952. Since then, the Defense Department has had 300 people working full time in Washington, plus 3,000 people working part time in the field to compile a joint-armed services catalogue. Finally, after spending \$87,000,000, they have produced the first edition—a catalogue on "subsistence" or food—length, 40 pages!

In contrast, the complete purchasing catalogues of the Army, Navy, Air Force fill one room. So, at the rate of \$87,000,000 for 40 pages, it will take billions to complete the entire catalogue.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

In today's hand South's opening bid of two no-trump is not quite a "book" bid. South has only 21 points in high cards, and the opening bid of two no-trump usually shows 22 to 24 points. The strong five-card suit is easily worth the bidding point, however, and the opening bid can therefore not be criticized.

North has an obvious raise to game. With six points in high cards, North expects that the combined holding is roughly 28 to 30 points, which ought to be ample for game but not nearly enough to slam.

When West opens the jack of Spades, South must win the trick at once instead of holding up. South

can then go right after the clubs, by laying down the ace and then continuing with a low club, without fearing the spade suit.

South reasons that if the spades are 5-2, and if East has the king of clubs, East will be able to lead only one spade through South. This will not be sufficient to let West run the suit.

There is never anything to fear, of course, if the spades are 4-3. At worst, South can lose only three spades and one club trick.

As the cards lie, South easily makes his game with four clubs, two hearts, two diamonds, and at least one spade.

There may be a different story to tell if South makes the mistake of refusing the first spade trick. West can then defeat the contract by switching to hearts.

South can win in his own hand and go after the clubs, but West will lead another heart upon taking his king of clubs. South now can win only eight tricks, and when he tries to set up his ninth trick the opponents can take two heart tricks.

They will thus defeat the game with a spade, a club, two hearts, and either a second spade or a diamond.

CARD Sense

Q—The bidding has been: North 1 Heart, East 3 Spades, West 3 Hearts Pass. South hold: Spades K-Q-7-5-3, Hearts Q-J-4, Diamonds 7-5, Clubs K-Q-4. What do you do?

A—Bid five hearts. Your partner's rebid shows 17 to 19 points with a strong heart suit, and you have a count of 13 points in high cards, together with one point extra for the queen of North's bid suit and one point for the doubleton.

The total is probably enough for a slam, but you cannot show an ace and shouldn't bid a Blackwood four no-trump. Your best course is to extend the general slam invitation of five hearts.

Politics May Force Lowering Administration's High Goals

WASHINGTON—The clammy hand of practical politics now is being laid heavily on the squared shoulders of the eager-beavers planners in the Eisenhower Administration.

Comparisons are always odious, but the zeal being displayed by the President's own heads of the executive departments is something like the crusading spirit of the early New Dealers.

The new team is crusading for different objectives, of course, but the spirit and enthusiasm are alike. The Eisenhower assistants want to go places and do things—make the world over.

This is revealed in such programs as the resolution against Communist enslavement, revision of tariffs, extension of reciprocal trade agreements, complete overhaul of the tax system, rearranging of federal-state government relationships, revision of farm policy, reduction of taxes after the budget is balanced.

But against this traffic rush of reform, the hands of the practical politicians in Congress now are being raised. These hands may not signify a complete stop. But they do indicate a go-slow, or at least a detour, operation.

The entire basis for Republican tampering with President Eisenhower's foreign policy resolution against the Russian enslavement of free people can be traced to purely American politics.

All-Important Words Deleted: A lot of Republican senators and congressmen campaigned for repudiation of the Yalta and Potsdam pacts. This action was called for in the Republican platform.

When the Eisenhower resolution was sent to the Congress for approval, its text did not contain the words Yalta or Potsdam. Many Republican congressmen therefore felt let down. They felt they would be going against their campaign promises if those words were not mentioned.

So the somewhat meaningless amendment was cooked up, saying that the resolution neither approved nor disapproved Yalta and Potsdam. This action was called for in the Republican platform.

If the resolution in this form now is dropped by the White House and State Department, the loss will have to be chalked up to the necessities of local politics.

The situation on tax reform and an overhaul of the federal-state relationship are much the same. The Treasury team under Secretary George M. Humphrey seems dedicated to the principle that complete revision of the tax structure is necessary.

They don't hope to achieve it all this year. But they do have it scheduled for next year. And they want no taxes cut till the budget is balanced by reduction of expenditures.

The practical politicians in Congress have other ideas. Prevailing sentiment of the Republican majority there is that taxes are going to be cut and the budget is going to be balanced—this year.

Tax Overhaul Picture: As for a general overhaul of the tax structure, veteran members of the Senate Finance and House Ways and Means Committees say they've heard that one before. Many times. It's a nice thing to talk about, but nothing ever has happened on it since the federal tax laws were codified.






Mishaps, Violence Add 13 Victims To Tornado's Toll

By The Associated Press

Three were killed Sunday in a head-on automobile crash about 70 miles east of Amarillo as the Texas weekend violent deaths since Friday night rose to 13.

The count, lower than usual, did not include the toll of 15 killed in Central West Texas by a tornado early in the afternoon of Friday the Thirteenth.

Five were killed at the I. B. Ashley farm home, where 13 had gathered for a Bible reading hour. Ruth Ashley, 15, died Sunday morning, the fifth member of her family to die. Six were killed at O'Brien and four at Knox City. At least 21 others had serious injuries.

In the Fairbault auto crash, the dead were Lt. and Mrs. Roland E. Michelson, Jr., East Lansing, Mich., and Navy Seaman Ronald Martin Sinkuler, Ozark, Ark. Two children of the Michelsons, Mary Katherine, three, and Timmy, five, suffered injuries that were not believed serious.

The other weekend violent deaths included:

J. F. Rose, 52, Abilene golf course attendant, died Sunday of injuries received Saturday in a truck-crash in Abilene.

Melvin Taylor Johnson, 18, and Mrs. Joe Parker, 33, both of San Antonio, were killed early Sunday five miles east of Staley when the car Johnson was driving overturned on a curve.

Weatherford police were holding a man and a woman for questioning after Louis R. Vaughn, Fort Worth, was shot to death Saturday in a motel at Weatherford.

Lloyd Orville Turner, 33, Brownfield, was killed Saturday night when his car collided with a bus near Lubbock. None of the 16 persons on the Texas-New Mexico Oklahoma bus was injured seriously.

Gregorio Gomez, 28, was shot fatally early Sunday in Seagoville, Dallas County, after he and 17-year-old youth got in an argument at a dance.





'Face Lifting' To Cost \$2,300,800 At Pecos

PECOS—Challenged by a growth unequalled in many Texas towns its size, Pecos is experiencing a "face lifting" process calling for approximately \$2,300,800 worth of construction either nearing completion, under construction or in the planning stage.

This estimate includes the cost of business, school, church, residence, and organization construction in the city. Some have been completed, other work is in process of construction and a good portion is due to begin in the near future.

Broken into these different categories, the figure reads: schools, \$1,033,000; churches, \$247,700; businesses, \$176,550; residences, \$808,550; and organization, \$35,000.

An excellent barometer for any town's growth is the school system.

The \$1,033,000 estimate indicates that Pecos is experiencing a tremendous growth. This figure includes approximately \$825,000 worth of work now under construction and \$208,000 planned for the near future.

Supr. Ray Whitley said the larger figure includes the cost of a new six-room negro school almost completed, the 14-room Junior High School nearing completion, four room addition to the high school and the erection of a new Industrial Arts building.

The smaller figure is for two new elementary schools, a \$158,000 structure in Southwest Pecos and a \$50,000 building in North Pecos.

Most of the business construction is presently underway with some small projects having been completed since the first of the year. The largest project on the \$176,550 estimate is a new drive-in theater south of town. A 450-car theater, this project will cost about \$75,000.

An expansion program at Western Chemicals is costing in the neighborhood of \$50,000 and includes the erection of a new 60 by 120 foot warehouse.

Many smaller businesses are in the process of being completed now. Bjornson Plumbing Company is about to move in the new \$4,000 shop nearing completion. Broken down, the other new business construction reads: business, \$1,800; used car office, \$250; Farmers Supply Warehouse, \$2,000; service station, \$4,000; liquor store, \$1,200; Community Public Service sub-station, \$5,000; remodeling store building, \$2,500; garage \$500 and office, \$300.

One other project, the cost of which was not included in the total figure, is an expansion of Agricultural Chemical. The project calls for installation of all new mill equipment, which means more activity and the need of more labor.

Pecos is also watching for construction to begin on a new modern theater by Griffith Amusement Enterprise, Inc. No cost was available. Two new signs are slated for Reeves County by the Western Cottonoil company, according to District Manager Gilbert McGregor. No estimation on costs was available. Site for one sign has been purchased near Saragosa with the other site to be selected yet.

Two buildings, containing four stores are being constructed by Coody-Johnson Insurance south of town. Both buildings are costing approximately \$30,000.

The organization construction listed is the new \$35,000 Masonic Lodge home which is nearing completion. Church construction, which is a heavy item on the total estimation, is confined to four churches. The First Christian church is presently constructing a new educational building, to be valued at approximately \$30,000. The church's total \$100,000 construction figure also contains a remodeling job on the old sanctuary and a new parsonage. Members of West Park Baptist

church are lending a hand on the approximately \$50,000 building program going on. The new building is expected to be completed about September 1. The old building will be converted into Sunday School space. This church is also constructing a new North Side mission at the cost of \$10,000.

Church of Christ members are under way with approximately \$86,200 worth of construction which will include a complete new building and remodeling of the old building.

St. James Baptist church is planning a \$1,500 improvement program.

As any newcomer can attest; houses, apartments and rooms are difficult to find in Pecos, thanks to the approximately 9.6 per cent increase in population since 1950. With a population already estimated at 12,426 (as of Jan. 1, 1953) and more people coming in every day, it is no wonder that individuals and companies alike are investing an estimated \$908,550 in the construction of new homes.

This figure includes some homes that already have been built, others that are under construction and some still in the planning stage.

However, despite the categories listed above, some 119 new houses will landscape the city of Pecos in the near future. And permits are being let on the construction of others daily.

Perhaps the largest project carried out so far has been by the Airline Development Company. This company has constructed 25 houses at the approximate cost of \$200,000.

Eddie Parsons, working through the Pecos Insurance company, is constructing 12 two-bedroom houses at a total cost of about \$80,000. Completion is set for June 1. Parsons also plans to begin immediately on a 50-house project to cost in the vicinity of \$30,000.

Five houses have been constructed by Williams and Sweetman at the approximate cost of \$40,000.

Thirteen individual homes also are under construction at the present time, ranging in price from \$4,000 to \$17,000. These along with four apartments are spotted over town.

In the \$908,550 total is a figure of some \$13,950 which Pecos residents are spending on repairing or adding to their present homes.

These repairs and additions range in price from \$200 to \$2,500.

With the population at its present total and living conditions as crowded as they are, it is reasonable to assume that many more homes and apartments will be constructed this year. As it is, the growth of the West Texas town is visible on every corner by survey stakes, brick and mortar and new structures rising on vacant lots.

He is survived by twin sons, Wichita F. Sheldon of Wichita Falls, and Thrall L. Sheldon of Electra.



Browns May Get Go-Ahead Vote Monday

TAMPA, FLA.—(AP)—The American League is expected to give Bill Veeck the green light Monday in his efforts to shift the St. Louis Browns franchise to Baltimore.

No solid resistance to either move appeared at Sunday's Executive Council meeting at Belleair, Fla., where Commissioner Ford Frick held a preliminary hearing with officials of the four clubs and leagues involved.

Approval by the American League at Monday's special meeting scheduled for 11 a.m. at Tampa would not bring major league ball to Baltimore officially. It still would require the sanction of the International League, which will meet within the next 48 hours, as well as the scattered officials can get together.

Frick told both Veeck of the Browns and Lou Perini, president of the Braves, they must follow the established rules of procedure in their franchise shifts. He pointed out each move must have the approval of the major and minor leagues concerned.

While raising no objections to the proposed moves before the imminent 1953 season, he indicated he was not too happy about such major transactions at this late date. Frick outlined a "get tough" program that would ban future major league franchise moves into minor league cities except between October 1 and December 1. The Executive Council will recommend such a policy at the joint meetings in July. In the mean time, the Executive Council's decree will be in force. However, it will not affect the Browns and Braves dealings.


Patty Berg Gathers Titleholders Crown

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

Top Brass Briefs Stevenson On War

SEOUL (AP)—Adlai Stevenson received an up-to-the-minute picture of the fighting in Korea from top Allied ground and air commanders Monday after seeing South Korean President Syngman Rhee.

Rhee told Stevenson the Chinese Communist Army in Korea is tired and that a major Allied offensive could break the prolonged stalemate.

Stevenson called on Rhee immediately after his arrival by air from Pusan. On the way from the airfield to the presidential mansion, he received a rousing welcome from thousands of cheering, flag-waving Koreans, most of them school children.

Large banners strung across Seoul's main avenues read "Drive Away Chinese Reds," "Advance North for Unification of Korea" and "Strengthen ROK Forces."

These were the same banners that flew during the three-day visit of General Eisenhower last December.

Stevenson also was greeted with new banners reading: "Welcome Honorable Adlai Stevenson to Korea," and "We Regard Mr. Adlai Stevenson Forever as our Friend."

On his third busy day in Korea, Stevenson also toured a huge Korean Army training base at Kwangju in South Korea, took a close look at the deadly American Sabre jet fighters and met the leading American jet ace, Col. Royal N. Baker of McKinney, Texas.

At an air base near here, Stevenson received a briefing on the MIG-killing tactics of the U. S. Sabres.

Later at Eighth Army headquarters, he was given a briefing on the ground fighting by Lt. Gen. Maxwell Taylor's staff officers.

Tuesday, Stevenson will tour the battlefield.

Tuesday Atom Blast To Test People's Chance Of Survival

ATOM BOMB SITE—(AP)—The little white house on the corner of Elm and Main Streets is due to take a fearful pounding Tuesday. And how it comes through may mean life or death to you in an atomic attack.

Fortunately, this house is not on the corner in your home town but in the middle of sprawling Yucca Flat. There—as 1,000 troops and a group of 30 picked newsmen crouch in foxholes—the two-story frame and concrete structure will be put to a fiery atomic test.

It may or may not withstand the blast from a tower less than a mile and one-half away. A sister structure only 3,500 feet from the tower is expected to be demolished.

It may be a "bomb" to the average man, but Tuesday's test object still is a "device" to Dr. Alvin C. Graves and his fellow scientists. He said neither a shell nor a bomb is being detonated. But the device, whatever its shape, will still pack a punch equivalent to 15,000 tons of TNT.

The troops and front-line newsmen will be dug in two miles south of the tower. The test houses—built to specifications of the average American home for the Federal Civil Defense Administration—lies east of ground zero, Mannequins Family.

If the surrounding area is not too hot, radioactively speaking, newsmen and civil defense officials may be able to find out how the Joneses—a family of mannequins—fared in the more distant house.

There are 19 dummies in the white colonial home—seven of them in two bomb shelters in the basement. The rest are in the living room, dining room and an upstairs bedroom.

Even the several hundred newsmen and civil defense observers at News Nob, seven miles south of the explosion point, are due for shock and heat about equal to that experienced at last Spring's invitational shot. Dr. Graves said the tower height of the detonation—300 feet as compared to 3,500 feet in last year's plane drop—would compensate for the smaller device being used.

Then, too, News Nob is three miles closer to ground zero than it was last April 22.

The pressure will be on the soldiers, for sure. Dr. Graves said the blast will push against the frontlines with an extra pressure of one pound per square inch. The heat rise will be one calorie per square centimeter, enough to give the boys "a slight reddening of the skin—like a good sunburn, nothing more," Graves said.

70 Automobiles, Trucks

Seventy automobiles and trucks are scattered among the Joshua trees within an 8,000-foot radius of the shot tower. There are brand new cars and broken down old mail trucks, like you'd find on almost any Elm Street.

A few contain dummy families on perhaps their last outing.

From all this, civil defense experts may learn which is safer under A-bomb attack, a home or a car.

And the Army—with Col William C. Bullock as exercise director—hopes its maneuver will equip another battalion of GI's to cope with the realities of atomic warfare.

The two-mile (3,500 yards) foxholes are twice as close as last year's positions. The closer trenches are being used because sheep survived in them previously.

The AEC is conducting its usual biomedical studies on various animals placed in bunkers as close as 400 yards to the detonation tower. These animals include dogs, pigs, monkeys, rabbits and mice.

Two Planes Added As Atom Carriers

INDIAN SPRINGS (AP)—The Air Force has added the F-84G Thunderjet fighter-bomber and the B-45 Tornado jet bomber to its roster of A-bomb carrying planes.

The announcement was made Sunday at Indian Springs Air Force Base as the five planes capable of carrying nuclear devices were shown to newsmen and civilian defense officials.

Besides the Republic F-84G and North American's B-45, the Air Force listed the following planes as atomic age mainstays:

The Boeing B-47 Stratojet, a six-engine medium bomber; the Convair B-36 heavy bomber, with six piston engines and four jet engines; and the Boeing B-50 Superfortress, four-engine medium bomber.

'Nerves' Are Partial Cause Of Blood Pressure Problem

"I often have wondered" writes M. C., "what is meant by blood pressure. Mine was taken some time back when the reading was 114/70. At the fair I had it taken again on a dare, and the reading was 110/68. I am 69 years old and in good health."

The blood pressure which M. C. reports is indeed good for a woman of 69. It also may be said the difference between the two is of no significance. However, since there are many people who seem quite vague about what blood pressure is, and what keeps it where it should be, or makes it go up or down, this subject seems well worth a discussion.

Perhaps the best way of doing this is to liken it to other processes with which we are all familiar.

When water runs through a hose it presses on the inside of the tube. How hard it presses depends on how much water is going through it, the force or pressure of the stream at the entrance, the size of the hose, the size of the exit opening, the material of which the hose is composed, and other things.

It is much the same with the blood pressure. The heart is the pump which forces the blood into the hose or blood vessels. When the heart contracts it pumps the blood out and into the arteries and this forces the pressure on the walls of the arteries to go up. When the heart relaxes for a moment the pressure in the arteries drops.

Taylor also revealed that the cannon will not be fired in actual military fashion, but the shell would be touched off by remote control.

WIESBADEN, GERMANY—While some wives of officers stationed in Wiesbaden, must live as much as 300 miles away from their husbands, one warrant officer, Billy Morgan and his wife, have a 22-room house in a village near here.

It's not Warrant Officer Morgan's idea that he have such big living quarters.

He and his wife, Wanda, know how crowded Wiesbaden has become with Americans who cannot find living quarters.

A sergeant friend of Morgans came to Wiesbaden.

"I have known the sergeant for 10 years. He's a good friend of mine," said the warrant officer. "I asked him and his wife to take the top 12-room apartment of our big house. But the billeting office wouldn't let him do it. They said an officer and an enlisted man could not live in the same house."

The Morgans formerly lived in Abilene. Morgan also formerly lived in Paris, Texas, and he claims "half of Sulphur Springs" is related to him. Morgan was in the Philippines two years, and returned home weighing only 98 pounds, but his wife waiting to meet him "knew him and he knew me... and when you love a person nothing else matters."
