FHS Hosts Muleshoe On Friday

It will be a greatly improved Muleshoe team that visits Friona next Friday for the district opening football game.

Last year, the Mules struggled through a winless, 0-9 season, in which their main goal was scoring a touchdown.

Going into Friday's final non-district game, the Mules were unbeaten, and could bring a 5-0 record to Chieftain Field next Friday.

Granted, Muleshoe's non-district schedule may not have been quite as tough as Friona's, but they have been gaining confidence, and that is a concern for Coach Tommy Moss.

Muleshoe has seven offensive and defensive starters back from 1985. Starters back include tailback Michael Dunham, fullback Sidney Lewis and wingback Todd Bessire.

Scott Bickel, Michael Angeley, Bryant Swint and David Sanders anchor the defensive line, which returned almost intact from last year.

The Chieftains will hope to continue their recent successes against the Mules. Coach Tommy Moss has a personal mark of 3-2 against Muleshoe, but the Mules hold a 20-14-1 edge in the series, which dates back to 1926.

The last four times the teams met at Friona, Muleshoe holds a 3-1 edge. Friona holds a 4-2 edge in the last six games at Muleshoe, so the home field advantage must not mean a lot to these two schools.

Parmer Co. Tax Rate Is Down

The Parmer County Commissioners set a lower tax rate Monday.

The new county rate is .22452 cents, compared to the current .2250. The new road and bridge fund rate is .07045 cents, compared to the current .0707.

Thus, the new overall rate is .29497 cents per \$100 valuation, compared to the current .2957.

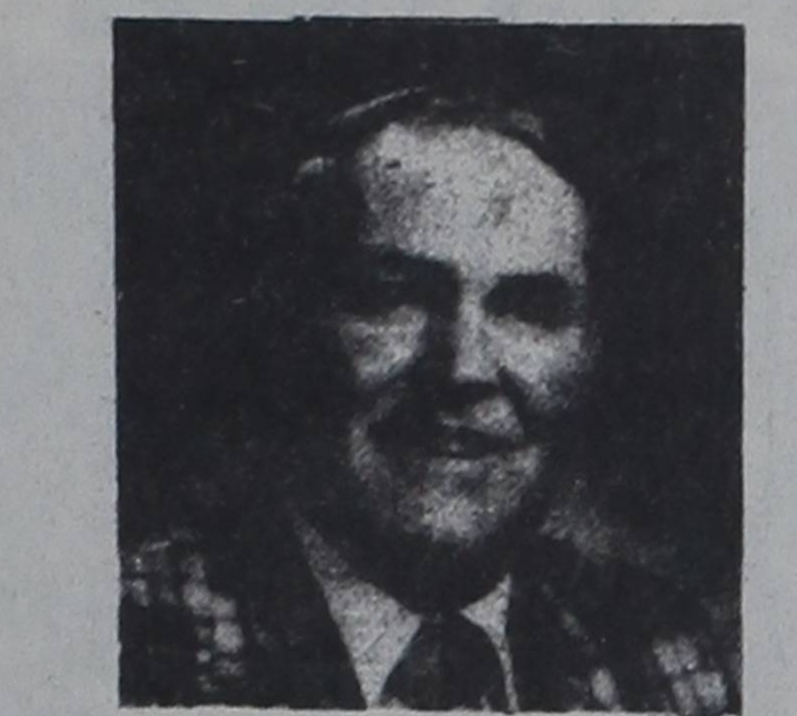

Jarboe Finalist In Competition

Tom B. Jarboe, superintendent of schools at Friona, was one of the five finalists in the state's "Superintendent of the Year" award, which was presented last weekend at San Antonio.

The award was presented at the annual meeting of the Texas Association of School Boards and School Administrators. The winner of the award was from Leander.

Each of the state's more than 1100 school districts had the opportunity of nominating their superintendent for the award. They then competed in an area and regional competition. Jarboe had been the winner of both these rounds, representing the Amarillo region in the competition.

Jarboe has been superintendent at Friona for 12 years. He has been associated with the local school system for 35 years, previously as a teacher, coach, elementary and

junior high principal.

Jarboe is a past president of the Superintendent Section of the Panhandle School Leaders Assn. The Friona Chamber of Commerce selected him as "Teacher of the Year" in 1976 and as "Man of the Year" in 1982.

He served on the steering committee to secure a nursing home in Friona, and served on Prairie Acres' board for four years. He has served on boards for the Chamber of Commerce, Evening Lions Club, Little League and Fine Arts Council.

Jarboe is a deacon and Bible School teacher at Sixth Street Church of Christ. He and his wife Bettye are parents of two children. Jay is currently a student at the Sunset School of Preaching, Lubbock. Jeanine Powell is a second grade teacher in Amarillo. Tom and Bettye have one granddaughter, Meagen Jarboe.

The Emergency Response System, offered through the Lutheran Social Service of Texas, is an invaluable lifeline for the older adult living alone. The system, which will be installed by volunteers from St. John's Lutheran Church, Lariat, secures vital help in emergencies with the push of a button.

It provides a safer home environment for the older adult who, without around-the-clock security, would need closer supervision or even institutional care. You and your family can live with peace of mind knowing assistance, in any emergency, can be summoned immediately and easily. Clients are continually monitored in the event of heart attack, stroke, falls, robbery or assault.

These response units, which are valued at \$500 each, will be installed at no cost to the client. A monthly service fee of \$21.75 is the only cost to use the service. Through a contract between Lutheran Social Service and the Texas Department of Human Resources, units can be placed in homes meeting their eligibility requirements at a reduced fee.

If a client signals for help, someone calls within seconds to assess the situation. Depending on

ACT Test Dates Are Announced

As the new school year begins, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation are preparing to take the ACT Assessment.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

Most students take the ACT Assessment during junior year or early in senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

High school guidance offices have the information and forms students need to register for the ACT Assessment. ACT also provides free copies of the booklet, "Preparing for the ACT Assessment," which contains information about getting ready for the examination, plus a complete practice test.

The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$10.50. Late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10.00 late handling fee. For 1986-87, ACT has established this test date schedule:

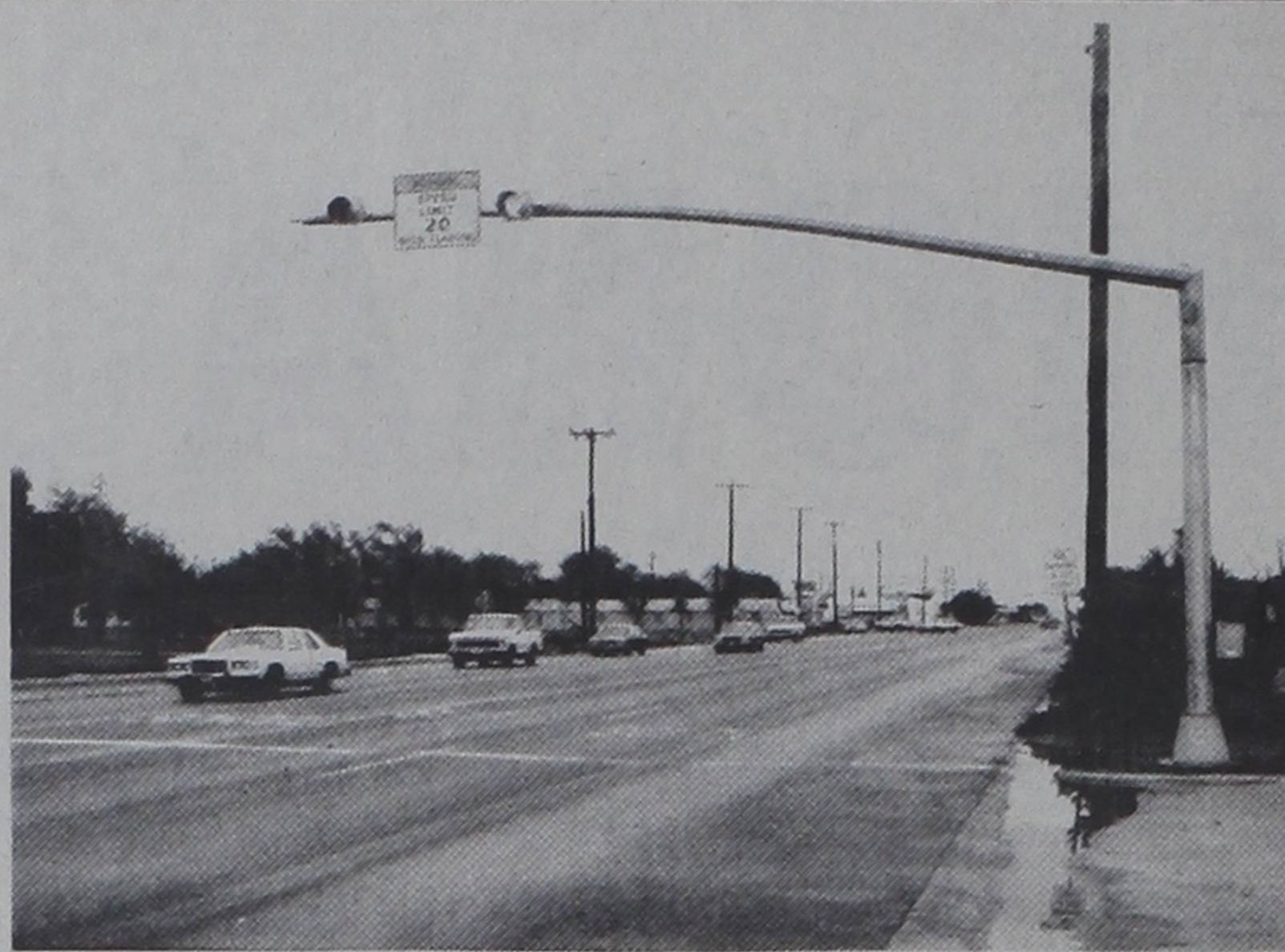

1. October 25, 1986, September 26, 1986, October 14, 1986.
2. December 13, 1986, November 14, 1986, December 2, 1986.
3. February 7, 1987, January 9, 1987, January 27, 1987.
4. April 11, 1987, March 13, 1987, March 31, 1987.
5. June 13, 1987, May 15, 1987, June 2, 1987.

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies and natural sciences. The Assessment also includes a two-part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. It focuses on interests, academic and non-academic accomplishments, and vocational and educational plans and needs.

Colleges use information from the ACT Assessment for academic advising, admissions counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. ACT Assessment reports are sent to students, their high school counselors, and the institutions and agencies the student specifies.

The ACT Assessment is a major service of The American College Testing Program, which has national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa.

Director Is Named For Spelling Bee

Students in all public and parochial schools are invited to participate in the 1987 National Spelling Bee, co-sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University.

The Scripps Howard Newspapers, national sponsors, set the rules and limit participation to a student who will not be older than 16 by the end of the current school year or in a grade higher than the eighth.

Directors in the 46 counties assigned the AGN and WTSU have been named and are responsible for eliminations in their respective counties.

Serving as director for Parmer County will be James Craig, Farwell Elementary School principal, Farwell.

Each county champion must be named by March 14 in order to take part in the 1987 Regional Bee to be held on the WTSU campus on April 11.

The 1987 district champion will go to Washington, D.C. in early June to compete in the National Spelling Bee. The trip, for two, will be provided by the Amarillo Globe-News.

There will be other awards for some of the top district finalists.

Bee coordinator is Gene Parker, director of placement, WTSU.

Most schools use the booklet, "Words of the Champions," containing more than 3,000 total words (an increase of 500 new words). The 1987 issue of this book is priced at only 50 cents each and is available from Jeane Bartlett, Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166.

Orders may be placed by individuals or schools.

Additional information about the Bee is available from the county director, Parker, or Mrs. Bartlett.

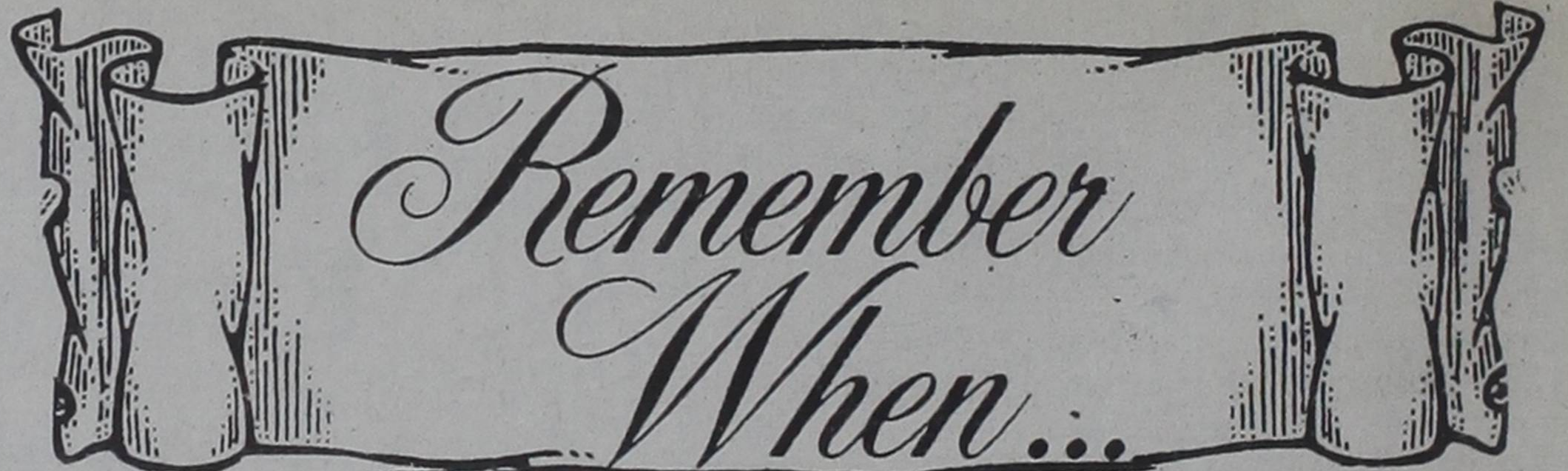

Abeyta got his score on a 74-yard run. He gained 102 yards on only three carries--a 34 yard-per-carry average!

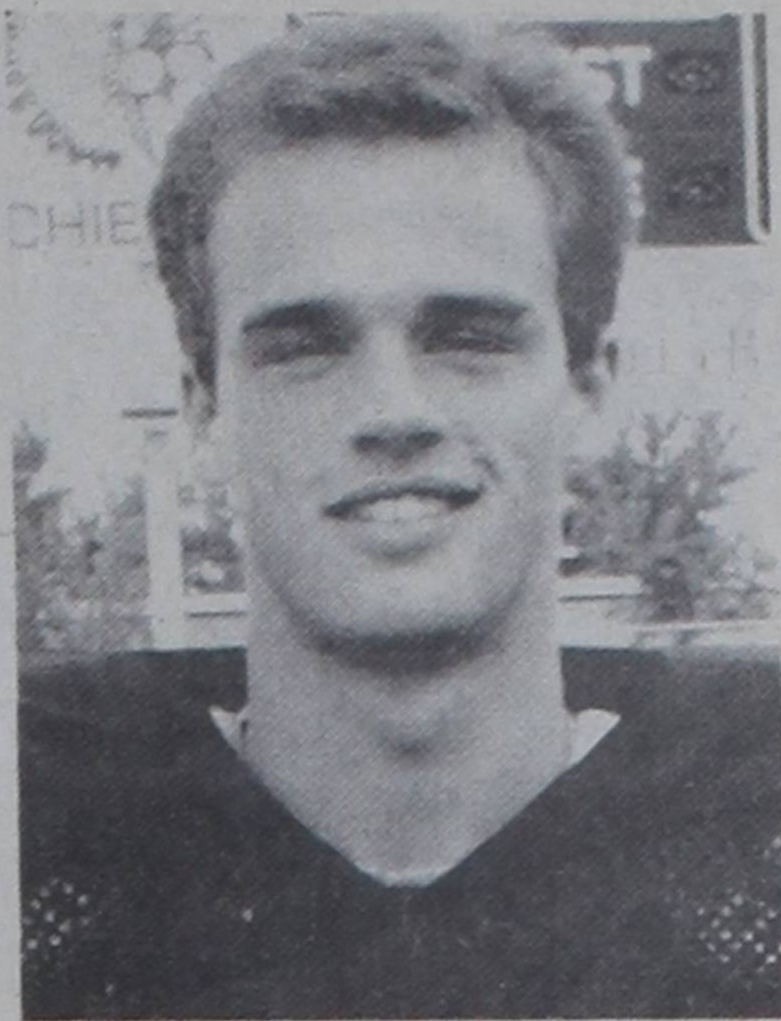

Then, the Braves had to play some defense against the outmanned but game Olton team in the second half. With just three subs on their sideline, Olton's passing got the ball deep in Friona territory twice, but the Braves responded and held the visitors scoreless.

David Caballero gained 82 yards on 12 tries. Torres had 65 yards on 11 carries, and Harvey Sanchez gained 45 yards on five attempts.

Barnett completed four of six passes for 40 yards, for a total offense of 232 yards.

Anthony Padilla had eight tackles to lead the defense. Torres and Lupe Reyes each had seven tackles; Caballero and Sanchez each had five. Ulysses Cooper had two tackles and one interception.

The Braves' season record is 2-0. They hosted Littlefield in their first district game Thursday.

TD pass play from Cody Burney to Jerry Lafuente. Loren Lookingbill dived over for the two points for an 8-0 lead.

After Hereford scored on a long pass for an 8-6 score, Ben Osborn ran 17 yards up the middle in the second quarter. A pass from Burney to Joe Paiz was good for two points and a 16-6 Friona lead.

Ben Osborn rushed 24 times for 135 yards; Cody Bracken gained 55 yards on 15 tries and Cody Burney added 27 yards on five carries. Burney completed four of eight passes for 135 yards. Friona tallied 217 yards rushing, 131 passing, or 348 total yards.

Lafuente caught three passes for 128 yards, and Paiz caught the other pass.

"The team played an excellent game. Osborn played an outstanding game on offense and Louis Dunnam, middle linebacker, played well on offense and defense. Kiley Gibson had a good defensive game and Cody Burney had an excellent passing game," said Coach Lynn Weiland.

The win left the team's record at 1-3. They were playing at Littlefield Thursday in their first district game.

Chieftains Survive Pesky Olton, 27-15

The Friona Chieftains survived a slow start to down the pesky Olton Mustangs, 27-15 in a game at Olton last Friday.

Lonnie Phillips scored a pair of touchdowns, and quarterback Daniel Echols scored once and threw for another TD as Friona improved its season record to 3-1.

Olton shocked the Chiefs with a 47-yard scoring play in the first quarter, and added a two-point conversion on a run by Stan Stroebel for an 8-0 lead.

Daniel Echols returned Olton's kickoff 70 yards to give Friona a good scoring opportunity. However, the team couldn't sustain a drive and Sam Montoya tried a field goal that went wide.

But Friona came back with a scoring drive that bore fruit. Echols hit Phillips with a 14-yard scoring strike, and then ran the two-pointer for an 8-8 tie.

The Chieftains got another scoring drive, capped off when Echols ran 12 yards for the score. The kick for PAT failed, but Friona went to the halftime with a 14-8 lead.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but Friona again cashed in when Lance Gatlin cracked over from three yards out. Sam Montoya's kick made the score 21-8, Friona.

Olton got another TD when Stroebel hit Reyes Garza on a 22-yard play. Garza kicked the point.

Late in the game, Phillips broke loose on a 53-yard scoring run. A try for two points failed, for the final margin of 27-15.

It was a frustrating night for the Chieftains, who had a nice, 75-yard touchdown run by Echols called back by a penalty flag, and another 28-yard run by Gatlin erased by a flag.

On one of Olton's scoring drives, the officials marched off 30 yards in penalties.

"We finally got going--in spite of everything--after a bad start. We weren't quite ready to play when the game started," said Chieftain Coach Tommy Moss.

Phillips gained 137 yards to lead the rushers, averaging 7.6 yards a

carry. Gatlin added 87 yards on only nine tries; Williams had 55 and Echols 54. The Chieftains had 330 yards rushing, averaging seven yards a carry for the game.

Moss said the Chieftain defense did not play with consistency, but played well when it had to.

The win was only the eighth all-time for a Chieftain team over Olton, which holds a 15-8-1 lead in the series that dates back to 1948.

Coach Tommy Moss has a personal 2-0 record against the Mustangs. His Chieftains of 1981 blanked Olton 20-0 in his first year as FHS gridmaster. Don Light is the only other FHS coach to own a winning ledger against the Lamb County team, finishing with a 3-2 personal mark in the series.
