Humble Will Drill Ellenburger Tester In Crosby Region

Humble Oil & Refining Company set site for No. 1 R. N. Irvin and wife, deep Ellenburger wildcat in Northwest Crosby County.

Operator staked location 660 feet from south and west lines of section 889, block C-3, ELARR survey and six miles northwest of Ralls.

The Ellenburger test is scheduled for a 10,000-foot recovery with operations starting at once.

Drill site is nine miles north of Lorenzo.

Midlanders Will Dig Shallow Exploration In SE Garza Sector

Harris & Walton of Midland staked location for a shallow cable tool wildcat in Southeast Garza County.

The test will be dug as No. 1 Jessie P. Crump.

Location is 2,310 feet from south and west lines of section 38, block 6, H&GN survey and two miles southwest of the town of Justiceburg.

It is slated for a 2,600-foot bottom.

Oil, Gas Shows Are Developed On DST In Terrell

Interesting shows of oil and gas have been developed on a drillstem test of a lime section, possibly Devonian, at Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Blackstone, wildcat in Central-North Terrell County.

Test was taken in the section from 12,201 to 12,263 feet. Tool was open 60 minutes.

Recovery was the 2,700-foot water blanket used, which was cut with gas and 60 feet of gas-cut mud with a trace of oil. No formation water was present.

More hole was being made below 12,282 feet in lime and shale.

Location is 1,980 feet from south and 3,900 feet from east lines of section 48, block B-2, CCSD&RONG survey.

Sinclair Schedules Shallow Wildcat In Central Crockett

Twelve miles northwest of Ozona and in Central Crockett County, Sinclair Oil & Gas Company will drill No. 2 Holt as a shallow San Andres wildcat.

Drill site is 330 feet from south and west lines of the most easterly southwest corner of section 61, block OP, GC&SF survey.

It is to drill to 1,600 feet.

Operations are to start at once.

Seaboard Completes Ellenburger Opener In Stonewall Area

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware has completed No. 3-A T. A. Upham as a dual producer from the Bond conglomerate and Ellenburger in East-Central Stonewall County.

Operator has asked for discovery allowable rights for the Ellenburger. The Bend is the regular pay of the Boyd field.

From the Ellenburger, the well pumped 66 barrels of 37.1-gravity oil and 181 barrels of water daily through perforations at 6,235-265 feet, after acidizing with 7,000 gallons.

Earlier, it had been completed in the conglomerate to flow 150 barrels of 42.1-gravity oil daily through a 24 1/4-inch choke and perforations from 6,019-6,044 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 567-1.

Mitchell Wildcat Testing Prior To Taking Potential

Robert L. Wood of Midland and associates No. 1 Ross Dixon, southeast Mitchell County discovery is flowing to test and complete from the Strawn sand.

The production is from perforations at 6,234-54 feet. That interval had been fractured with 4,000 gallons. Operators expect to report the official potential on this new field opener early next week.

During 24 hours of flowing through various sized chokes, ranging from a 24 1/4 inch to a 32 1/4 inch, the well made 55.25 barrels of 44 plus gravity oil and no formation water.

Flowing tubing pressure was between 100 pounds and 200 pounds. The well was flowed on an intermitter for 30 minutes during each

Texas May Oil Allowable Hiked

Shivers Raps \$600 Teacher Pay Hike Bill

AUSTIN—(P)—Governor Shivers said Friday he considers Senate passage of a \$600 teachers pay raise bill an "empty gesture."

He said his view was based on the fact no provision was made on how to pay the extra 66 to 75-million-dollar cost such a bill would run up the next two years.

Shivers told a news conference he thought the question of any further spending—including the teacher pay issue—should be put off until the quit over validity of the state's pipe line tax on natural gas is settled.

If the tax finally is upheld, thereby freeing an estimated 45 million dollars for two years, he then would consider calling a special session to allow action on worthy projects, Shivers said.

The governor reiterated the stand he took at the start of the session that teachers could be given some increase in pay, without new taxes.

He said that still could be accomplished by a shifting of various funds to free more money for salary purposes. School people generally have opposed his plan, saying it would require a greater contribution of funds at the local level.

Shivers made no prediction on when the Legislature might adjourn its work. Four weeks ago he had said he thought it could finally adjourn by May 12, the end of the constitutionally suggested 120-day session.

"The stage of the Legislature at this time is one of accomplishment," he said.

He said he was pleased with progress on the general program he suggested in his original message to the Legislature. He said worthwhile legislation on the problems of water conservation, election code revision, judicial redistricting, and a state office building construction program stands a good chance of passage.

He indicated regret that "nothing much has been done" on the problem of job classification to equalize pay and provide incentive for state employees.

A bill giving teachers a \$600 raise passed the Senate by recounting voice vote Tuesday, but ran into a snag in the House Thursday. Rules were invoked by Administration leaders to prevent the \$600 pay bill from being shifted from the House Appropriations Committee to one considered more friendly by backers.

Both houses have quit work until Monday.

Ike Picks Chicagoan To Administer GSA

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Eisenhower nominated a Chicago manufacturer, Edmund Mansure, Friday to head the General Services Administration. This is the agency which has charge of government buildings and does a lot of government buying.

Eisenhower also sent to the Senate the nomination of Norman Abrams of Philadelphia to be assistant postmaster general.

CHALLENGES RUSSIA—Speaking before the American Society of Newspaper Editors in Washington, President Eisenhower challenges Russia's new leaders to prove their will for peace by ending the Korean war, lifting the Iron Curtain from satellite countries and joining a world disarmament pact that would outlaw atomic weapons.

Ike's Talk Sets Off World-Wide Peace Offensive

AUGUSTA, Ga.—(P)—President Eisenhower's challenge to Russia on world peace and armament reduction is only the opening round in an all-out "peace offensive."

A White House official, who asked not to be named, told reporters Friday the Administration already has launched "the greatest drive it possibly can" to bring pressure on the Soviet Union to subscribe to an effective plan for world peace.

The President Thursday called on Russia to back its talk of peace with action by (1) agreeing to an immediate armistice in Korea, (2) ending the cold war, (3) cutting world armaments, and (4) putting the savings into a global fund to fight "the brute forces of poverty and need."

Talking to newsmen after Eisenhower returned to his Augusta vacation headquarters, a White House official summed up the President's address this way:

"We laid it on the line. We asked some questions—what, for example, is the Soviet Union ready to do? We are now awaiting the answers." Carefully Planned

The Eisenhower speech was described as a carefully planned "peace offensive" which a White House official said was discussed in advance

House Panel Swings Mean Economy Axe

WASHINGTON—(P)—The House Appropriations Committee ordered a halt Friday to the government's low-cost housing program as it cut deeply into the 1954 budget requests of 23 federal agencies.

Its action, if sustained, also would start getting the government out of the mortgage and housing business by ordering it to dispose of home mortgages it now holds and to refund local housing bonds held by the Public Housing Administration.

By committee arithmetic, 61 per cent or \$721,423,697 was lopped from original Truman budget estimates of \$1,172,444,190 but some Democrats described much of the cut as "phony."

The actual money cut was the largest ever imposed by the committee in the so-called independent offices appropriation bill. It started the GOP economy drive off with a bang.

The bill's total in new money for use during the fiscal year starting next July 1 was \$451,020,493, a reduction of \$642,516,350 from what the same agencies received this year. In most cases it will mean deep personnel cuts.

Largest reductions from amounts requested by former President Truman in January were for the Civil Service Commission and for stockpiling critical and strategic materials.

The Highway Department, he continued, plans to pave and widen Big Spring to a width of 68 feet. Bids will be opened soon, he said, on a contract for building curbs and gutters along the street.

Texaco, Gulf Pledge Lower Crude Imports

SAN ANGELO—(P)—The Texas Railroad Commission Friday set a May oil production allowable of 2,894,299 barrels daily—an increase of 7,175 over the April allowable.

The commission set state-wide production in May at 20 days. The East Texas field will get 18 days, Pantex field 16, Pickton nine, Hawkins 18, Spraberry none, and 14 fields connected to the Phillips-Goldsmith field 20.

New Midland, Lamesa Road Plan Readied

Completion of a direct, paved highway from Midland to Lamesa appeared to be entering its final stage Friday with the announcement that plans, specifications and estimate on the project have been submitted to Austin for "final review and contracting."

R. L. Faltinson, district highway engineer at Pecos, has advised Fred Wemple, who retired recently as a member of the Texas Highway Commission, of the development.

The engineer said contract for the 13.9 miles of highway probably will be let in June.

The segment of road extends northeast through Martin County from the intersection of State Highway 349 with Farm-Market Road 87 (Andrews-Big Spring), connecting with the Patricia-Lamesa road. Completion of the project will make State Highway 349 a paved route from Rankin to Lamesa, connecting with U. S. 87 at Lamesa to provide an all-weather route to the Canadian border.

State Highway 349 already is paved from Rankin through Midland to the F-M 87 intersection, and from Patricia to Lamesa.

The paving of the Midland-Lamesa route has been a major project of the Midland Chamber of Commerce many years and officials of the organization Friday were elated at the recent development.

The Martin County Commissioners Court has cooperated in the project through Martin County. James McMorris is the Martin County judge.

The paving project will be financed by the Texas Highway Department.

Austin, McCamey Barbecues Celebrate Pipe Line Completion

AUSTIN—(P)—Odessa's Chuck Wagon Gang, businessmen who like to skip about the country in their private planes, breezed into Austin Friday to serve barbecue to 850 persons.

The gang planned to fly back to McCamey, 50 miles south of Odessa, to serve barbecue to 800 more Saturday.

The two big meals are the Odessa Chamber of Commerce's way of saying "well done" to the Rancho Pipe Line Company on completion of a 457-mile pipe line from McCamey to Garfield, 15 miles southeast of Austin.

The line will be able to carry 210,000 barrels of oil daily, a spokesman for the company said.

Rail Mishap Victim's Condition Unchanged

Cynthia Ann Rudd, seven-year-old Midland negro struck Wednesday by a T&P Railway switch engine near the Lee Street crossing, still was alive at noon Friday, physicians at Western Clinic-Hospital said, but her condition remained grave. She had not regained consciousness.

The little girl suffered a fractured skull, brain hemorrhages, a badly fractured left leg and loss of part of the left foot in the accident.

First Steps Due Sunday On Resuming Truce Talks

MUNBAN, KOREA—(P)—The United Nations and Communists agreed Friday to meet Sunday to discuss resumption of the long-suspended Korean armistice talks.

The UN had told the Reds it was ready to reopen the talks, providing the Reds do no stalling on the overall exchange of prisoners—the last big obstacle to an armistice.

The UN had asked for the meeting Saturday to work out details for starting the new talks. The Reds suggested 11 a.m. Sunday. The UN agreed.

Allied spokesmen said the liaison groups probably would do little more than discuss details of resuming armistice talks.

In a letter turned over to Communist staff officers the Allies proposed that:

Switzerland take custody of prisoners who do not want to return home.

The Reds be given 60 days to persuade them to go home and that Switzerland arrange the "peaceable disposition" of those who still refuse repatriation.

The UN warned that it would break off the negotiations again "unless the meetings of full delegations indicate an acceptable agreement will be reached in a reasonable time."

A Communist news correspondent said a British-American POW convoy was due in the advance Communist base sometime Friday night. He said there were "very few" litter cases.

The first group of sick and wounded prisoners arrived in Kaesong Thursday night. All were South Koreans, the Red spokesman said.

Allied reconnaissance planes have spotted a third convoy of 34 vehicles 55 miles north of Kaesong.

In sharp contrast to the last three days, no Red supply trucks streamed southward over the route of prisoner convoys.

"Not a thing is moving on it right now except the convoy trucks—we couldn't even see an ox cart or people walking on the road," said First Lt. Keith G. McClain of Miami, Ariz.

The Communists have said they will deliver about 50 non-Koreans and 50 Koreans on Monday, the first day of the exchange.

TEHRAN—Premier Mohammed Mossadegh has expressed Iran's regrets over Communist-led attacks against the U. S. Point Four offices in Shiraz, Southwest Iran, and given assurances security forces will prevent further incidents.

The Premier received U. S. Ambassador Loy Henderson and Point Four Director William W. Warner Thursday night. He told them martial law has been declared in Shiraz and order restored.

The American authorities asked for protection and an investigation after 38 Americans, including women and children, took refuge from mobs in an Iranian official's house at Shiraz. 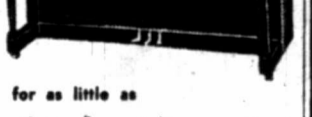

At the same time, the natives of that country will be able to study the American, staying in their midst. Upon return, the Midlander will discuss his observations for groups here.

"We are very impressed by the number of highly qualified persons who have applied this year," Miss Elliott remarked. "It's going to be difficult to choose one from the fifteen."

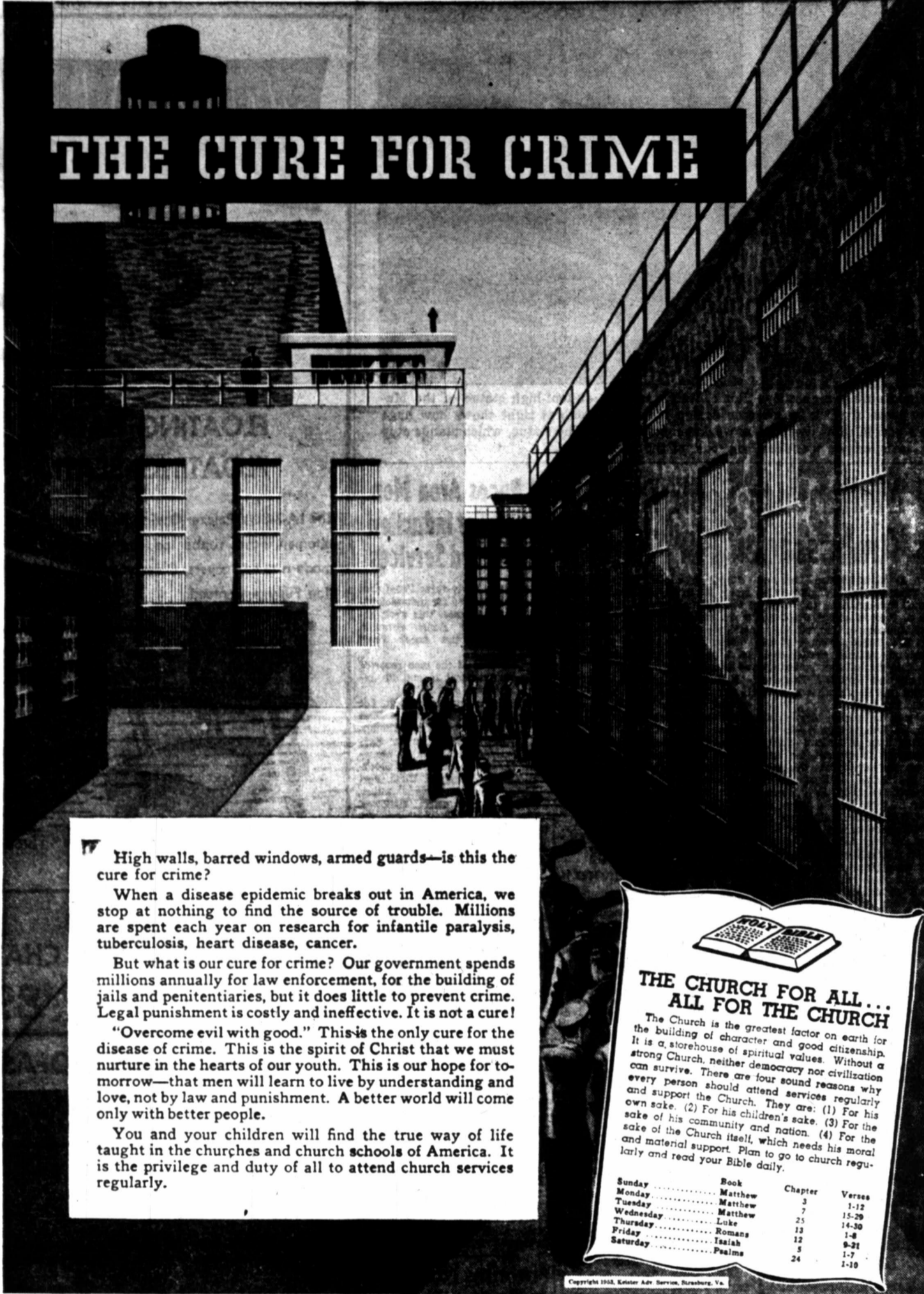

West Europe Takes Heart At Ike's Peace Proposals

LONDON—President Eisenhower's peace program heartened Western Europe Friday. Many expressed doubts of Russia's reaction. But there also was a swelling tide of hope that the new rulers in the Kremlin might use this moment to relax the East-West conflict.

The first Soviet reaction came quickly. Moscow radio complained that Eisenhower had placed the blame for the international situation on Russian policy "though no facts were given to prove this."

West European foreign office journalists noted, however, that the Soviet reaction was mild in tone, by usual Russian standards, and the Kremlin left itself plenty of maneuvering room.

The liberal Manchester Guardian said editorially: "The President has been enabled to make this statement of policy by the death of Stalin and the signs—as yet unprecise—that the new Soviet government wishes to see a relaxation of the conflict between East and West."

World-Wide Rule Of Law Without the hope that a relaxation can in fact be achieved the speech would ring somewhat hollow.

The newspaper described Eisenhower's statement as "a great speech because it expresses all that is splendid about the full entry of America into world affairs in the 'hopeful Spring' of 1946—the longing for peace, the genuine and often innocent belief in a world-wide rule of law, the no less genuine desire to help distant and little-known peoples."

The London Star, also liberal, said: "By proposing that armaments should be cut down and the money

saved used to fight 'the brute forces of poverty and need' throughout the world, the President arouses the imaginations of all peoples. Russia, as he made clear, would not be excluded from such aid and reconstruction."

Communist morning newspapers in East Germany ignored Eisenhower's speech. In divided Berlin the Red papers in the Eastern Sector carried not a line about it.

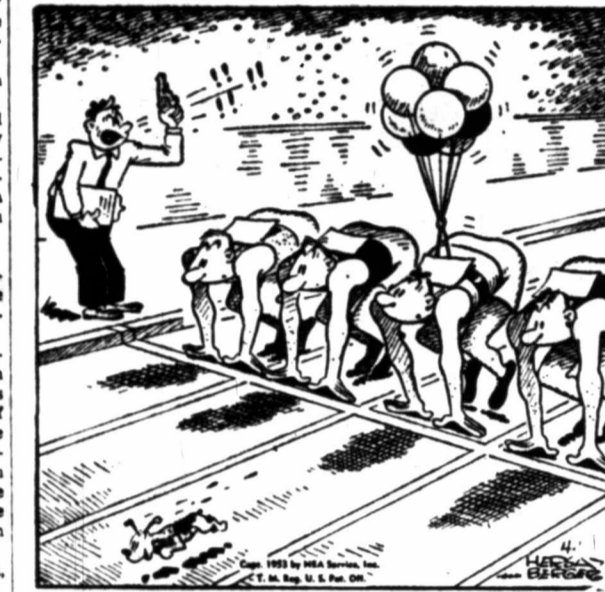
West Berlin newspapers splashed the story over their front pages and hailed the speech in editorials.

Obviously keyed to Moscow's reaction, the official Soviet news agency ADN later distributed a 500-word report on the speech.

Echoing Moscow almost word for word, ADN said Eisenhower's speech was devoted chiefly to justification of U. S. post-war policy "including enforced armament, the formation of the North Atlantic bloc and so forth."

However, ADN made no direct attack either against President Eisenhower personally or against the United States.

McCarthy Pledges More Greek Vessels To Spurn Red Trade

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) announced Friday that operators have pledged to keep 53 more Greek-owned ships out of trade with Communists in the Orient and behind the Iron Curtain.

In a prepared statement, McCarthy said the pledge is similar to a previous one, covering 42 Greek ships, which stirred up a controversy.

Like the first, McCarthy said, the new agreement calls for the owners and agents to "abstain from engaging these ships in trade with Red China, the Soviet controlled ports of the Far East, or Soviet intra-bloc trade anywhere in the world."

The agreements leave all 95 ships free, however, to carry cargoes from the Western Allies to Communist ports in Europe.

McCarthy named these firms and individuals as controlling the 53 vessels involved in his announcement Friday:

Extrammar Panama, S. A., Compania de Vapore, S. A., and Compania Centauro de Vapores, S. A., of Panama.

Aristotle S. Onassis of London; Maris S. Embiricos of Montevideo, Uruguay; Nautilus Shipping Corporation of New York City; Shipping Finance Management Corporation, Ltd., of London; Paine Shipping Company of London, and E. Hadjilias of Athens, Greece.

Boycott Young, No-Hit Spoiler

It's about time the pitchers' union started boycotting Bobby Young. Most average baseball fans probably never paid much attention to Young who plays second base for the St. Louis Browns. He isn't the league's best fielder and he is a far cry from being a great hitter, but the pitchers know him. He's a spoiler.

Young specializes in ruining no hit games, particularly real close no hit games where one hit can make all the difference in the outcome.

Thursday Billy Pierce was baffling the Browns in the Chicago White Sox home opener at Comiskey Park. After six hitless innings Dick Kobos walked to start the St. Louis seventh, but he was cut down trying to steal. Up came Young, a 24 left-handed hitter facing a southpaw pitcher.

Nothing to worry about here thought the chilled gathering of 11,354 who sensed the tension that builds up during a no-hit effort.

Then Young spanked a solid double into right center field to break the spell. Without the thwarted steal it might have been a run.

As it was the White Sox scored without a hit in the bottom of the seventh and Pierce finished up with a 1-0 one-hitter. He had to be that good because his mates got only two singles off Harry Brecheen, the National League veteran who was making his American League debut.

Young pulled the same spilling act last year when he tripped to ruin Bobby Feller's bid for a fourth no-hitter. That time Young scored the only run as Feller and Bobby Cain of the Browns pitched the first double no-hitter in American League history.

The Chicago pitchers' battle was a sharp contrast to most of the other games played Thursday. Pittsburgh and Philadelphia combined for 24 runs in two innings as the Pirates edged the Phils, 14-12. The Boston Red Sox clubbed four Philadelphia pitchers for 19 hits in whipping the Athletics, 11-6. Cleveland outlasted the Detroit Tigers, 11-8. President Eisenhower tossed out the first ball at Washington and then watched the New York Yankees score four runs in the first inning to mar the occasion for the Senators, who finally lost, 6-3. Good pitching did prevail in a night battle between the other Chicago and St. Louis clubs as the Cards whipped the Cubs in St. Louis, 3-0.

The night half of the day-night doubleheader in Washington was called off because of cold weather and rain canceled National League contests in New York between the Giants and Brooklyn and in Cincinnati where Milwaukee was scheduled to play.

Milt Bolling, a rookie shortstop, and third baseman George Kell, one of the few veterans in the Red Sox lineup, each collected a double

and three singles in Boston's first game of the season after being snowed out twice at home. Ken Holcombe in relief of Mel Parnell was the winner with Harry Byrd, last season's rookie of the year, losing his first 1953 start.

Cleveland tried all spring to peddle centerfielder Larry Doby, but the Indians were glad he was on hand at Detroit Thursday. He drove in five runs—two on a towering 400-foot home run and two more with a single that put the Indians ahead to stay in the sixth inning. Mike Garcia, a 22-game winner for Cleveland last year, lasted only four innings with Bob Hooper picking up the victory in relief.

Washington, which like Boston was making its first appearance after rain and snow, collected nine hits off Johnny Sain but wasted a half of opportunities in losing to the Yankees. The President left after two innings because of other business. He didn't miss much.

It's hard to lose a game after you score nine runs in one inning, but that's what the Phils did in Pittsburgh. The Pirates scored a run in the first and the Phils went ahead with two in the fourth. Pittsburgh came back with seven in the fourth to lead, 8-2. Philadelphia responded with nine in the fifth to go back into the lead only to have Pittsburgh score six more in the bottom of the fifth including a three-run homer by Danny O'Connell. The Phils pushed across a final tally in the seventh off Murry Dickson, fifth and winning Pittsburgh pitcher, but still fell two runs short.

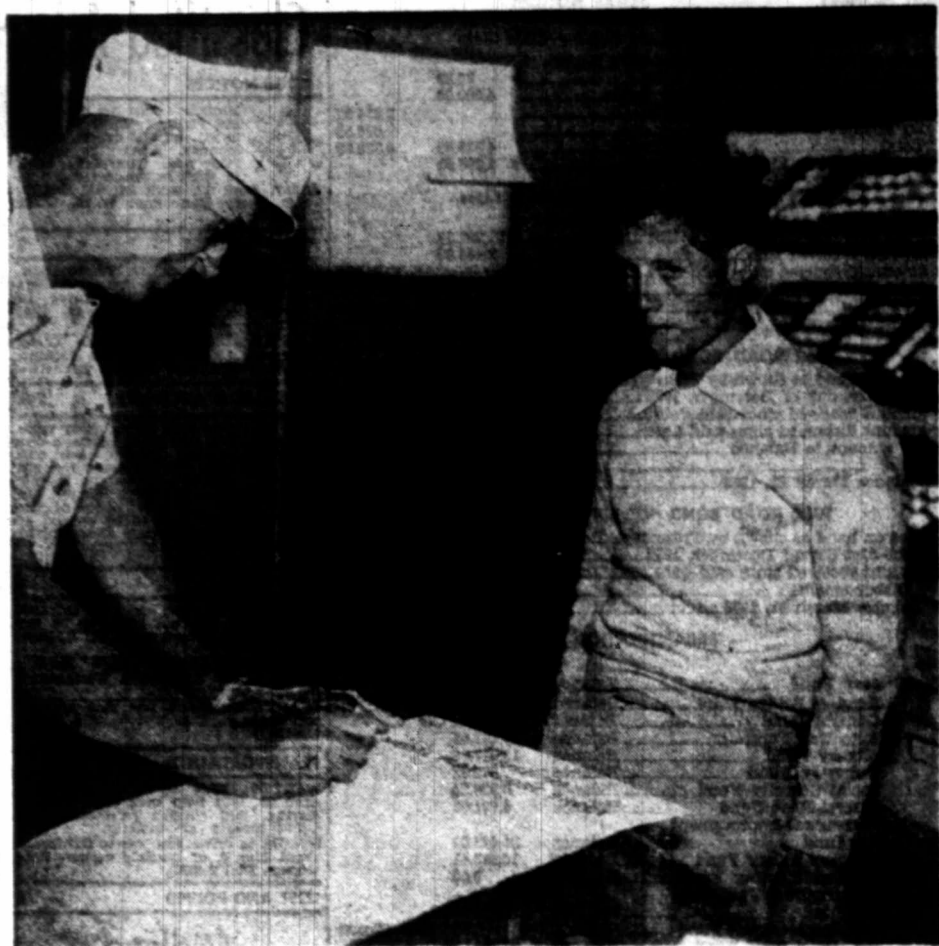

In the next 24 hours the well was flowed through a one-half inch choke for the full period. A total of 47.8 barrels of oil was produced. Flowing tubing pressure was 125 pounds.

The flowing for 30 minutes out of each four hours was continued during this period. The well is still testing. The completion gauge is due to be run shortly.

Kewanee Wildcat In SW Chaves Has No Shows In Test

Kewanee Oil Company No. 1 Four Mile Unit, in the southwest panhandle of Chaves County, New Mexico, failed to develop any shows of petroleum in a drillstem test in the Fusselman line at 6,536-56 feet.

That zone had had some soft drilling and had shown good porosity, fair to good oil stain and an oil odor in the samples.

The tool was open for one hour. Recovery was 30 feet of drilling mud. There were no signs of oil, gas or water. All pressures were zero.

To Core Deeper The prospector is to core 15 feet deeper and will then take another drillstem test.

Top of the Fusselman was called at 6,541 feet on an estimated elevation of 5,180 feet.

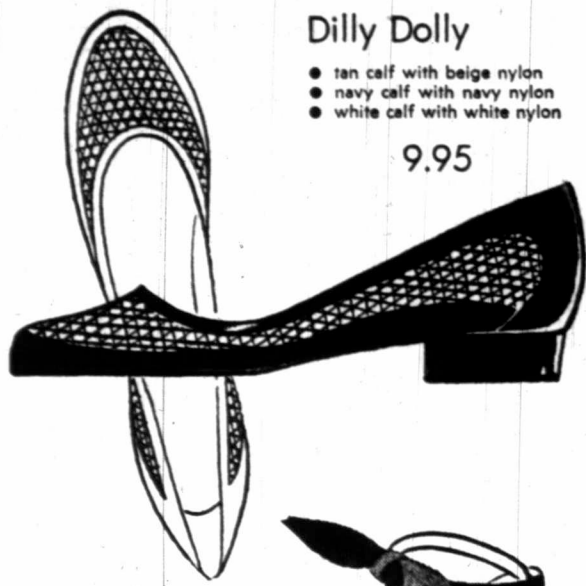

BALTIMORE —(AP)—Johns Hopkins University Thursday night announced that its Walter Hines Page School of International Relations, headed since 1938 by Owen Lattimore, will be abolished at the end of this academic year.

Lattimore is on leave of absence from the university pending disposition of perjury charges against him. The former State Department adviser was indicted by a federal grand jury on charges that he lied when he testified before a congressional committee that he had never aided the Communist cause.

Dr. Detlev W. Bronk, Hopkins president, said the move to abandon the school is only one of a series of steps to simplify Hopkins' academic structure.

Narcotic-Alcohol Education Work Brings Speaker To Midland Schools

A series of movies and lectures on narcotic-alcohol education is being presented in Midland public schools under the sponsorship of the United States D.D.A.

All students in Midland High School viewed the movie "Alcohol in the Human Body" this week and heard lectures on the subjects of narcotics and alcohol by W. A. (Bill) Martin, public education consultant for the U.D.A.

Showings of the film and more lectures are scheduled in Midland junior high schools next week, Martin said.

Martin presented the following conclusions of the Department of Narcotic Control education of the U.D.A.:

Alcohol is not a stimulant. Rather it is a depressant which depresses the higher functions of the mind which ordinarily keep people within socially acceptable patterns of behavior, thereby freeing them from these restraints.

Tests For Drunkenness

Alcohol reaches the brain within as little as five minutes after drinking.

Marijuana smoking affects all who try it.

Alcohol is a very important chemical in industry.

Chemical tests for intoxication are reliable. Their reliability has been thoroughly established by competent research. Four body fluids may be used in determining the blood-alcohol ratio—breath, blood, urine and spinal fluid.

The driver who has had only a few drinks is more likely to have an accident than is the driver who is drunk, because he thinks he is in full possession of his senses.

Become Alcoholics

Heroin is not used by physicians and is considered one of the most extensively habit-forming drugs at the present time.

Dieticians do not classify alcohol as a food because it does not behave as a food in the body.

Scientists cannot accurately predict who will become alcoholics. Leaving alcohol alone is the only one certain way to avoid alcoholism. This is a decision the individual must make for himself. He alone must answer the question: Are the alleged "benefits" derived from drinking worth the one-in-fifteen risk of becoming alcoholic?

There is much connection between narcotics and crime since a user, during the phase of his addiction when his inhibitions are gone and his assurance of himself is increased, before his control and his will is entirely gone, is well fitted to promote and perform criminal acts. Users are forced into the underworld corruption to obtain their illicit product. They are forced to crime to obtain money. They must associate with criminals, racketeers, peddlers and other addicts, and consequently their life is interwoven definitely with the underworld.

Moderate Drinking

Less than one per cent of alcohol in the blood stream will be fatal. From five-tenths to eight-tenths is considered the death range. Some will die with five tenths, others six tenths and some will go as high as eight-tenths before death occurs.

No one is known to have had as much as one per cent of alcohol in the blood stream and lived.

Drinking in moderation involves risk mainly of two types: the drinker may lose control of his drinking and become alcoholic, and he may suffer violent bodily harm resulting from the impairment of his faculties.

Drinkers are not responsible only to themselves. This can be proved in many ways, particularly in the case of a drunk driver involved in an accident which might injure or kill members of his family or other persons.

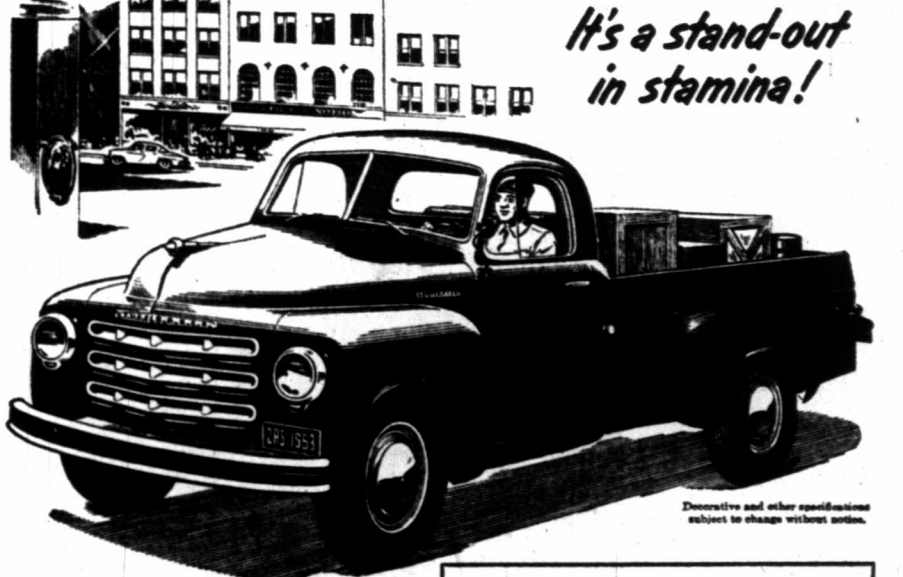
