Grunewald **Denies Tax** Case Payoff

Henry Grunewald denied Friday he ever received \$60,-000 in cash for purportedly fixing a criminal tax fraud case in 1948. A bundle handed him by a New York attorney was not cash but a package of fish, he told investigators.

A House Ways and Means sub mmittee quizzed the Washington influence man about the quashing of a \$213,000 criminal tax fraud case constitutionally suggested 120-day against a New Yor' meat firm in August of 1948.

Phillip and Louis Berman, partners in the firm, refused Thursday to say whether they ever transmitted the money to Grunewald, 60, through New York attorney Max Halperin and whether they knew part of it went to former Deputy Revenue sioner Daniel Bolich.

The Bermans, Halperin and others have refused to answer questions. Grunewald was asked if he met an all-out "peace offensive." Halperin and an accountant, Milton Hoffman, at the Washington Union indicated "two satchels" of money were delivered to Grunewald.



No Sign Of Patronage Shuffle Is Seen On Treasury's Staff

By PETER EDSON



WASHINGTON-There probably is less excitement at the Treasury Department over the possibility of a po--litical housecleaning than in any government agency in Washington. Secretary George M. Humphrey has given every indication of running his shop there as a continuing business, instead of as a political patronage machine. In this he is setting something

of an example for other new bureaucrats in town.

Only a dozen or so top policy-making officials have been brought into the Treasury by Secretary Humphrey, out of 75 presidential-appointee jobs available. About half of Treasury's 500 lawyers are not under civil service. But the word has gone out that replacements offer no problem, as all positions are satisfactorily filled.
