Church Starts New Building

Groundbreaking ceremony for a new sanctuary for Calvary Baptist Church will be held Sunday at 12 noon, at the conclusion of the regular worship services at the church.

Mr. Earle Webb Construction Co. of Amarillo is General Contractor for the project, which has an estimated cost of \$167,480.

The new building will have 4,059 square feet. It will be built to the south of the church's present facility. It will be on the corner of 15th and Columbia, facing 15th Street.

Rev. Vergil Ichtertz, pastor, says it is hoped that the project will be completed by February 15, 1987. The contractor may be able to start by November 15, if all of the legal work is completed.

DUE TO THE WET weather, most folks who are baseball fans got to watch the League Championship Series last week, and all fans of the Houston Astros agreed that the Astros should be playing this week in the World Series.

The team just couldn't get a break when they needed one in the League Championships. Nolan Ryan, the 39-year-old pitching whiz, pitched his heart out in Game 5 at New York, but a blown call at first by the umpire cost Houston a run, and they eventually lost, 2-1 in 12-innings.

Then, in the sixth game, Bob Knepper pitched one of his best games of the year, only to have some bad luck in the ninth. As everyone knows by now, the team went on to lose, 7-6, in 16 innings--the longest playoff game in history.

"Next year" doesn't always apply to baseball, since last year's World Series opponents didn't even challenge this time around. It's a shame for people like Ryan and another longtime star, Jose Cruz, because this could be their last shot at playing in the World Series.

With their tremendous pitching, most people who follow the Astros agreed that they would have made a strong bid for the World Series.

The controversial play at first, which cost Houston the chance to have the series lead at 3-2, brought up the possibility of using the instant replay cameras for baseball, but Baseball Commissioner Peter Ueberroth says it won't happen, as long as he's in charge.

That's too bad, because in baseball you always have the big argument between the manager and the ump (baseball doesn't have the threat of a 15-yard penalty), that takes up anywhere from five to 15 minutes of time. That would be plenty of time to check the replay from any number of angles.

On the other hand, there are those who argue that we're letting television control our major sports too much as it is. The instant replay in football hasn't been the problem-solver that people thought it would be.

Television already controls such things as what time the games will start. (Witness the fact that the World Series was played in the cold of the East Coast, at night). Now TV has a say in deciding whether or not a guy made a great catch, or whether it was trapped.

Sports have always used a lot of judgment calls, and without them, things just wouldn't be the same. If we go completely electronic, such terms as "Kill the Umpire!" would lose their meaning. You'd have to change it to "Break the Camera!" or something similar.

THERE HAVE BEEN some unusual scores in high school football this year, the latest being Bovina's 6-4 win over Lorenzo last Friday. Lorenzo scored a pair of safeties against the Mustangs, who finally got a scoring drive for the victory margin.

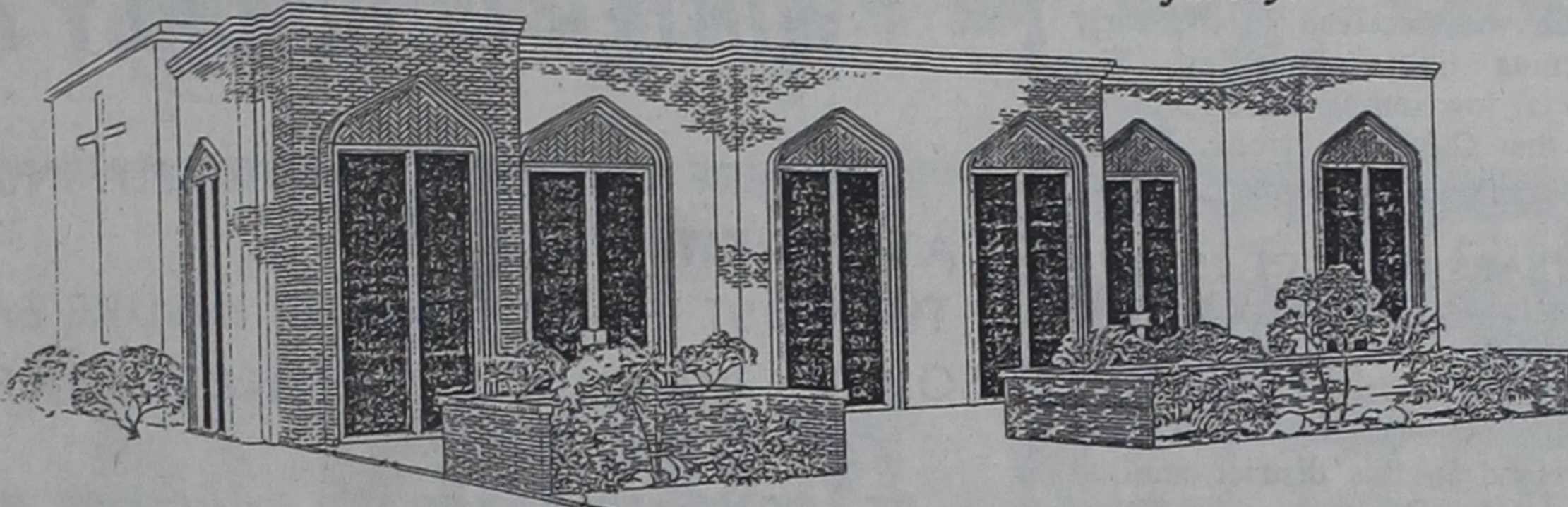
"It would have been a shame to have lost the game 2-0 or 4-0," said Mustang coach Bill Talley. The score was 2-0 in favor of Lorenzo when Bovina scored its only touchdown.

Chamber To Host Economic Summit

In a continuing effort to provide community development, an "Economic Summit" will be held in Friona, Monday, October 27.

As a requirement of Friona's participation in the TEXCEL Readiness Program, Cheryl Pink of the Texas Economic Development Commission, Jonathan Krebbs of Southwestern Public Service Area Development, and Gregg Bogner of Texas A&M Extension Service will make an on-site inspection tour of the city. Their findings as well as recommendations, will then be presented to community leaders.

The "summitt" will begin at 3:30 p.m. in the Community Room of the Friona State Bank. Those in attendance will be the Friona Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, Friona City Council and the Friona School Board of Directors.

The TEXCEL Program is an intensive economic development training program. Instigated by the Chamber of Commerce and funded by the City of Friona, this program will enhance the ongoing development efforts.

Kathy Beard, Executive Director of the local TEXCEL effort

commented, "Friona is indeed fortunate to have been selected to participate in the TEXCEL Readiness Program. With the current economic times every avenue available to enhance local business expansion or the attraction of new industry must be pursued. Bottom line is the creation of new jobs and expansion of the tax base. TEXCEL will certainly provide the expertise to accomplish these goals."

County Is One Of Few With Growth

According to the U.S. Census Department, Parmer County is one of only seven Texas Panhandle counties that showed population growth between the years of 1984 and 1985.

Parmer County joined the counties of Potter, Randall, Armstrong, Moore, Ochiltree and Hansford in bucking the trend among counties in the 98-county Plains region. The region's overall population declined slightly.

Parmer County's rate of gain was .62 per cent. The exact figures were not available as of this writing. Moore County showed the best rate of growth, a 3.2 per cent increase in the one-year period.

Fleming Winner In Grid Predicting

A student at Friona High School, and his principal, were the only two contestants entering the seventh week of the Friona Star's football contest to correctly pick as many as 19 of the contest games.

The student, senior Patches Fleming, edged administrator, Hal Ratcliff, for first place money on the basis of the weekly tie-breaker score.

Fleming picked the Chiefs to beat Littlefield, 21-17, missing the actual score by 24 points. Ratcliff pegged the score at 14-7, which was 27 points off the score.

The top two contestants had nearly identical entries. Both got all the professional games right except for the Atlanta-San Francisco tie game. Also, they both missed the Southern California-California State game.

Both Fleming and Ratcliff had missed Groom-Happy and Morton-Seagraves in the high school ranks, But, while Fleming mis-fired on Plainview-Tascosa, Ratcliff got that one, but missed Indiana-Minnesota.

Only four contestants had scores of 18 for the week, and of that group, Jerry Bentley claimed the weekly third place money (\$5.00) on the tie-breaker. Bentley went with Littlefield, 20-14, missing by just 13 points.

Also picking 18 games were Martha Clements (27 points away),

Koby Rogers and Danny Stevens (both 26 points away).

Fleming's score of 19 gave him the lead in the overall contest standings, with a total of 117 points. Phillip Johnson and Vicky Moss were two of 13 contestants picking 17 games right. They are now tied for second place with scores of 116.

Stevens' score of 18 shot him into third place, with a score of 118. Jim Beard, Jo Blackwell, R.L. Blakely, Jack Clark and Jackie Morgan are tied for fourth place with scores of 113.

Scores of all the leading contestants can be found elsewhere in this issue.

Only 15 contestants had the foresight to pick the New York Jets to beat previously unbeaten Denver, and it paid off.

Fleming and Ratcliff both picked the Monday night game correctly, and that "made their week." None of the four contestants with scores of 18 picked the Jets, and only three of those picking 17 correctly picked New York. They were Jim Beard, Edward Castillo and Myrtle Melton.

Once again, scores were much below average. Some contestants high in the standings had scores as low as twelve. One contestant managed only a score of seven.

"Exit" Tests October 28-29

On Tuesday and Wednesday, October 28-29, the TEAMS Exit Level test will be given to the 1986-87 juniors at Friona High School.

This test measures basic skills in the areas of math and English language arts. Juniors must pass both sections of the test before receiving a high school diploma. Re-tests will be given in May, 1987.

Future dates for TEAMS testing are February 9-20, Grades 3, 5, 7 and 9; April 6-17, grade 1; and May 4-5, re-test for juniors.

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 16, 1931

Friona now has two attorneys since the locating of Attorney A.D. Smith, formerly of Fort Sumner, New Mexico. Mr. Smith arrived in Friona on Thursday of last week and has established his office in the room of the J.W. Parr building adjoining the Friona Garage building on the east side of Main Street.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 9, 1936

The first bale of cotton for this season to be ginned at the local gin, was brought in Monday afternoon, by R.E. Barnette, of the Black Community. This bale weighed 470 pounds which was ginned out of 1710 pounds of seed cotton. The bale was purchased by the Friona Gin at a price of 12 cents per pound, which was a bounty or premium of one cent per pound, or a total of \$5.00.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 10, 1941

Dr. R.J. McReynolds, local physician and surgeon, now has under construction, a building which when completed, will give Friona and vicinity a clinic or sanatorium equal in quality of equipment to anything of that kind in the plains country. Construction is under the direction of George E. Taylor, local contractor, who is assisted by J.H. Lea, C.L. Rury and Harding will do the stucco work. The building, which is located next door north of Dr. McReynolds's residence, will contain eight rooms and a corridor

through the middle, leading back to the doctor's present office rooms.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 11, 1946

The Friona Woman's Club met in the basement of the Congregational Church Wednesday afternoon to celebrate its 75th birthday. Mrs. Pearl Kinsley and Mrs. J.P. Slack were hostesses to twenty-three members. Mrs. F.N. Welch took the members by picture, to the "Beauty Spots" of America. Mrs. Carl C. Maurer took the members on an imaginary trip to several interesting places in America.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 4, 1951

Friona's new public school addition should be ready for occupancy by November 15, according to contractor G. Williams, who attributed the delay in completing construction to the difficulty in obtaining many necessary materials.

Elevator men, amazed at the influx of harvested grain so early in the season, pointed out this week that more grain had been brought into Friona elevators by October 1, of this year, than at this early date on any other year they could remember. Now the big question seems to be when will harvest hit its peak or will harvest just drag itself out over a long period of weeks without hitting a rush season? Representatives of seven elevators in the county together estimated that approximately 22 million pounds of grain sorghum had already been received in the Black, Friona and Bovina area.

30 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 27, 1956

Friona celebrated her 50th birthday last weekend, and had plenty of help doing it. From every standpoint, the anniversary event was a success, reports Wright Williams, president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the promotion. The only thing which didn't go exactly to suit the celebration boosters was the weather, and in West Texas, as they agree, it's hard to ever find any justice in complaining about

that.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1961

The Friona City Council read five applications for city manager position Monday and interviewed two applicants Tuesday in successive meetings. No final decision was made as to who will be selected for the office soon to be vacated by Albert Field. Council members chose to delay final action for a few days pending a possible reply from an advertisement in a professional publication.

20 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 29, 1966

Ben J. Ladnicky, landscape architect with the Texas Highway Department, will be the principal speaker at the regular meeting of Modern Study Club next Tuesday. Ladnicky's appearance is in connection with the club's "beautification" program, which it has decided to concentrate particularly on roadways in the area, and roadside parks in particular.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 10, 1976

An earlier than usual freeze hit the Friona area on Friday morning, climaxing a week of cold, disagreeable weather. The front left .12 inch of moisture, which was received in the early morning hours Thursday. The official low temperature recorded by the City of Friona Friday morning was 27 degrees.

5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 25, 1981

Santa Fe Railroad announced Wednesday that it plans to do away with its freight stations and agents at Friona, Bovina and Hereford in this district, and at seven other Panhandle area cities, in its new regional marketing concept.

The cost of mailing a first-class letter will rise to 20-cents beginning Sunday, November 1 when new postage rates go into effect, Postmaster Richard Wilson reminded customers this week.

The Friona area received a light freeze Friday morning, when the mercury dipped to a low of 31 degrees for a short time.

R. Edelman's Rites Held October 19

Funeral services for Ruth Edelman, 78, were held Sunday, October 19, at 3 p.m. in the Sixth Street Church of Christ with Leon Talley, minister, officiating.

Burial was in the Friona Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Born November 16, 1907, in Turkey, Texas, she married W.L. (Preach) Edelman June 1, 1929 in Lubbock. He preceded her in death January 13, 1981. Mrs. Edelman had been a resident of Friona for the past 49 years.

She taught school in the Friona School system for 30 years, retiring in 1971. She was a member of the Sixth Street Church of Christ, Texas State Teachers Association and Modern Study Club.

Mrs. Edelman died Friday, October 17, in Parmer County Community Hospital.

Survivors include one son, Von Edelman of Friona; one daughter, Jan Rae of McLean, Virginia; one sister, Lota Poss of El Paso; four grandchildren, Lisa Veggeberg, Mark Edelman, Karen Stewart and Brian Edelman; and one great-grandson, Travis Stewart.

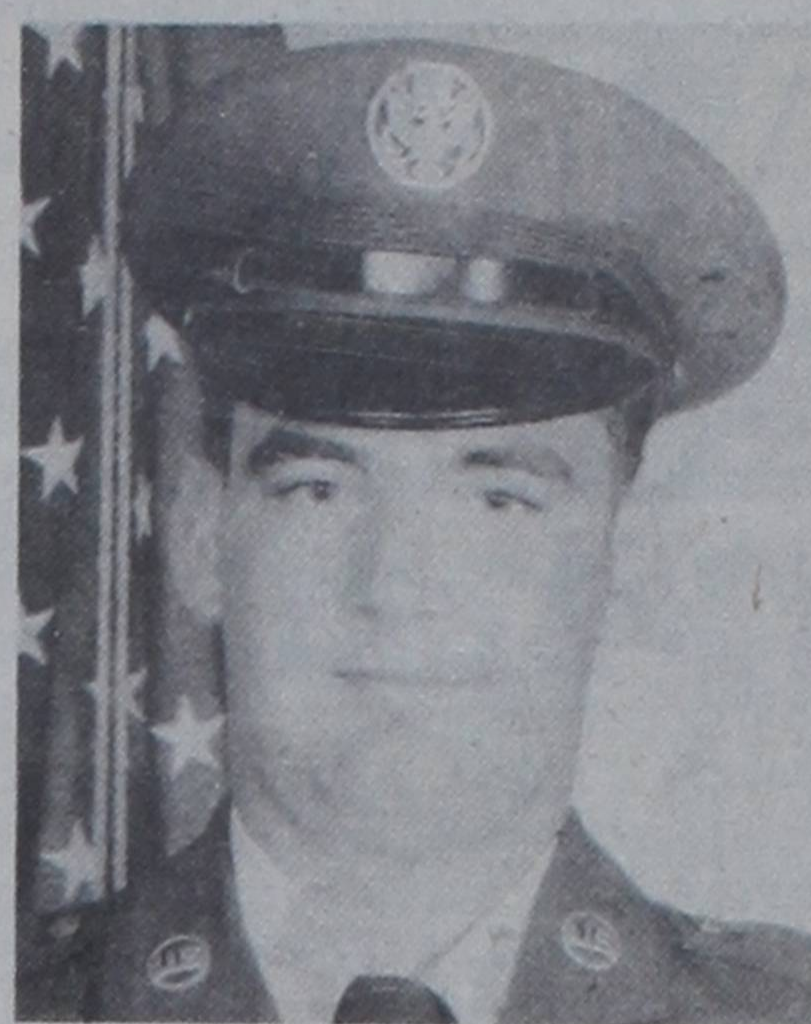

Wheat and feed grain surpluses have mounted while export levels have decreased, creating severe problems for farmers and our agricultural communities. Market demand must increase to put agriculture back on road to prosperity.

An overwhelming majority of agricultural economists agree that the marketing loan is a necessary solution to our huge stockpiles. This concept, while temporary, will encourage us to find new markets for our production, rather than exercising government policies which restrict the ingenuity, innovation and freedom of our farmers. If the government has to temporarily bear the cost if the difference between producer's production costs and the international market price, it is an investment in rural America that we simply must make.

Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng has stated that he is opposed to this type of farm program for wheat and feed grains. USDA's current choice of ag policy, however, is not achieving the relief wheat and corn farmers need. I intend to work to see that grain producers are afforded the same opportunity to make a profit and to compete as cotton farmers have under the 1985 Farm Bill.

I believe that it is indeed possible to have a farm program which gives the farmer a real opportunity to make a profit without undermining the basic principles that are central to agriculture and our nation. Our producers deserve nothing less. My job in Congress is to represent all of the people of the 19th Congressional District, and I will continue to do so to the very best of my ability.

Throughout consideration of the Farm Bill, I supported the marketing loan approach which allows a producer to repay his Commodity Credit Corporation at the world market price. The marketing loan program's success is evident in the substantial increase in cotton sales in the less than one month period the cotton program has been in effect. Producers are realizing a price that is significantly above the loan rate, and together with the provisions of the bill, we will witness increased incomes. Additionally our exports should increase threefold by the end of the 1986 marketing year.

Unlike mandatory production controls, the marketing loan is as fair to small farmers as it is to larger producers. It will not devastate our rural communities, as would the proposal for mandatory production controls now being advocated by some. The marketing loan approach would protect jobs throughout our agricultural community, not destroy those jobs as would the proposal for strict mandatory production controls. It will not ruin the livestock industry and does not violate a farmer's absolute right to decide what and how much he is going to plant on his own farm.

Agriculture is the base upon which much of the strength of the nation is founded. It is even more essential to all of us in West Texas. Yet, even though agriculture is one of our most vital industries, many in the Congress do not fully appreciate the hardships facing farmers.

Farm programs will always be controversial, but we must show responsible, effective leadership to ensure the survival of our farms, agri-business and rural way of life. It is an investment in agriculture we must make.

There is increasing support across the country and in Congress for a marketing loan approach to agricultural programs to be expanded to include wheat, feed grains and soybeans. Grain producers are finding it increasingly more difficult to compete on a level playing field as surpluses continue to mount and export levels continue to decrease. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's policy for wheat and feed grains is obviously not working and we in the House Agriculture Committee will be working to change this farm program during the 100th Congress.

Chiefs Can't Get Going-- 'Cats Win

Going into the Friona-Littlefield game, the Chieftains had hopes of upsetting the state-ranked Wildcats.

But the Wildcats showed that they had good depth, outscoring the Chieftains, 23-3. It was the team's first district loss, and dropped their season record to 5-2.

The Chiefs stayed with the Wildcats in the first half, which ended with Littlefield holding a narrow, 6-3 lead. But a fumble on Friona's first offensive play of the second half let Littlefield capture the game's momentum.

Neither team could mount a drive during the opening stages of the game. Friona got to the Wildcat 45 yard line midway through the period, facing fourth and one, but opted to punt.

Littlefield took over following a short punt into the wind, and set out on the first scoring drive. The 'Cats covered 74 yards in just eight plays, helped out by a 15-yard penalty for a personal foul against the Chiefs. The point-after kick was wide, so Littlefield had a 6-0 lead with just 46 seconds left in the opening quarter.

Friona accepted the challenge. Daniel Echols returned the kickoff to the 23, and then directed a drive. Lonnie Phillips had his best run of the night, a 17-yard gain to midfield. Phillips broke a couple of tackles, and almost went all the way before being brought down from behind.

Echols made nine yards on a quarterback draw, and Jimmy Williams gave the team a first down at the Littlefield 39.

Echols passed to Rod Britting for seven yards to the Littlefield 21, but here the drive bogged down.

The Wildcat defense caught Phillips for a five-yard loss on a sweep attempt, and then stopped Echols for minus two on the keeper play. Friona faced fourth and ten from the Wildcat 28.

Sam Montoya was summoned to attempt the field goal, and

Montoya's kick split the uprights from 46 yards out. That got Friona on the scoreboard with 5:44 left in the half, and cut the Wildcat lead to 6-3.

Littlefield threatened to score after the field goal, but Stephen Thornton ran down Steve Lair after a 46-yard gain at the Friona 34. On the next play, Shy Burney intercepted a Littlefield pass at the Friona 12, to prevent what appeared to be a sure scoring drive.

Montoya then uncorked a 66-yard punt, this time with the wind, to get the Chiefs out of danger. Halftime found the score unchanged: Littlefield 6, Friona 3.

The Chiefs received the second half kickoff, and Echols returned it from the five to the 26. However, on the first play, tragedy struck, as Williams was hit a mammoth lick and the ball squirted free. Littlefield recovered at the Friona 29.

Five plays later, the Wildcats converted the break into their second touchdown, with Tommy King going over. The PAT made the score 12-3, with 2:15 gone in the quarter.

Three plays gained only five yards for Friona, which had to punt the ball. Littlefield then put together a ten-play drive that ended with a 27-yard field goal that upped the Wildcats' lead to 16-3 with 1:59 left in the period.

Echols got loose on a 17-yard run which saw him almost break free, but he was stopped at the Friona 41. Williams gave the team a first down at the Littlefield 46, but Echols was sacked on second down, and a third-down pass fell incomplete, forcing a punt.

Littlefield drove 80 yards, sparked by a 33-yard run by their quarterback Mark Ellis, for their third touchdown drive. The score came with 6:13 left in the game, and made the margin 23-3.

Friona had the ball two more times, but could not get a scoring drive going. The second time they had the ball, Echols hit Phillips on a 17-yard gain, with Lonnie

making a nice run after the catch. This came with 3:15 to play.

But after a four-yard gain to the Littlefield 45, three passes fell incomplete, and that was the ball game.

"We stayed with them for the first half, but they began finding our weaknesses in the second half. The fumble kind of gave them a spurt," commented Coach Tommy Moss.

The Chiefs were playing without linebackers Albert Trevino and Peter Malouf, and their absence began to be felt as Littlefield took command in the game.

Farmers Warned Of USDA Change

The Food Security Act of 1985 (farm bill) disqualifies you for certain USDA farm programs if you produce crops on highly erodible land without following a conservation plan approved by the local conservation district, or you produce crops on newly converted wetlands. The provisions that apply are commonly known as swampbuster, sodbuster, and conservation compliance.

These are the USDA farm programs for which your eligibility may be in jeopardy: price and income supports, disaster payments, crop insurance, Farmers Home Administration loans, Commodity Credit Corporation storage payments, farm storage facility loans, and other programs under which USDA makes commodity-related payments, including annual payments made under the Conservation Reserve Program.

Swampbuster applies to you if you converted naturally occurring wetlands since December 23, 1985, in order to produce crops. If so, with a few exceptions you are ineligible for the USDA farm programs as long as you continue crop production in the converted wetland area.

Sodbuster applies if you plant crops on highly erodible fields that were not used for crops during the period 1981-85. To retain eligibility for the USDA programs, the highly erodible land you break out must be protected by a conservation system approved by the local conservation district.

Conservation Compliance applies if you continue planting crops on highly erodible cropland. To remain eligible for the USDA farm programs, you must develop and be actively applying a conservation plan for those highly erodible fields by January 1, 1990. You must have the plan fully implemented by January 1, 1995.

You have the option of producing crops on highly erodible fields without a locally approved conservation plan and lose eligibility for the USDA programs. Or, you can produce crops on newly converted wetlands and lose eligibility. Or, you can develop and apply a conservation plan that will reduce soil erosion to a tolerable rate even though you continue producing crops, and retain eligibility. Or, you can bid to enroll highly erodible land in the Conservation Reserve Program.

According to Bill Donham,

District Conservationist in Friona, 24 of the 34 soil mapping units in Parmer County will be considered highly erodible. Most of this land is located around the draws and lake areas. Donham stated, "Several large areas around Farwell and Lariat will probably be affected because of the sandy surface texture of the soil."

About 22 per cent of the land area in Parmer County will be considered highly erodible, but all of that land is not in cropland at the present.

"The important thing is that producers and landowners be made aware of what provisions are in the 1985 Farm Bill and the fact that written comments are being accepted on the interim rules," said Donham.
