Texan Humiliates Murders

Philip Deane, correspondent of the London Observer now back in England after almost three years as a prisoner of the North Koreans, tells his story with remarkably graphic and human touches.

With the curtain drawn so much of the time, we necessarily have to indulge in a great deal of guessing about the nature of the Communist enemy. Deane has taken us behind the curtain for a series of sharp glimpses that eliminate much of the guesswork.

The Communists he speaks of are not fighters but prison guards and commandants, interrogators, and the like. In their behavior toward correspondents, missionaries, diplomatic personnel and GI's, they displayed an elemental cruelty that often descended into bestiality.

But there is no surprise in that. What does strike you more is the way the Reds labored to devise needless indignities and cruel little ironies (like having an American doctor carry a North Korean medical student's instrument


