**Midland Prospector
Gets Gas, Oil, Water
In Strawn Section**

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Ida Mae Oldham, North-East of Midland County wildcat, 10 miles east of the city of Midland found gas, oil and salt water in a drillem test of the Strawn (Pennsylvanian).

The test covered the interval at 10,225-311 feet. The tool was open two hours and 45 minutes. Gas surfaced in five minutes.

The gas volume was estimated to be at the rate of 350,000 cubic feet per day.

Recovery was 3,460 feet of 41-gravity clean oil, 420 feet of heavy gas and slightly oil cut drilling mud and 180 feet of salt water.

Has Deepened

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was between 1,405 pounds and 1,980 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure, after 15 minutes was 4,000 pounds.

The prospector has deepened to 10,340 feet in lime and now is circulating and conditioning the hole.

Top of the Strawn is at 10,220 feet. Elevation is 3,894 feet.

Location is 680 feet from north and west lines of section 38, block 37, T-1-S, R-4-P survey. It is three miles southeast of Paul (Germania), and two miles north-northwest of the nearest Spraberry production in the Germana sector of the Spraberry Trend Area.

**Potential Scheduled
For Texaco Opener
In W-C Upton Area**

Potential test was slated within the next two days on the Texas Company No. 1 Herbert Josephine Graf, Strawn gas and oil discovery in West-Central Upton County.

The new field opener is making oil and gas from section at 9,828 to 9,843 feet through perforations in casing.

Last production tests reported are as follows: flowed 105 barrels of oil through choke ranging from 47.64 to 49.64-inch in two hours.

Flowed 35 barrels of oil in one hour through a one-half-inch choke, with gas at the rate of 16,890,000 cubic feet daily. Casing pressure was 2,125 and tubing pressure 1,542 pounds. Flowed one hour and 45 minutes through a 26.64-inch choke and made 47 barrels of oil and gas at the rate of 13,050,000 cubic feet daily with casing pressure 2,268 and tubing pressure 1,838 pounds.

Other Flows

Flowed one hour and 45 minutes through a 20.64-inch choke and made 40 barrels of oil and gas at the rate of 8,915,000 cubic feet daily with casing pressure 2,475 and tubing pressure 2,159 pounds. Flowed two hours through a 16.64-inch choke and made 21.39 barrels of oil and gas at the rate of 5,610,000 cubic feet daily with casing pressure 2,688 and tubing pressure 2,415 pounds.

Gravity of the oil is 58.8 degrees. Total recovery during eight and one-half hours of flowing was 248 barrels of oil. Testing continued.

Location is 680 feet from south and west lines of section 102, block D, CSD&RNGO survey.

**Buffalo Gets Water
Below Pay Zone In
SW Upton Prospect**

Buffalo Oil Company No. 1 King Rameh Oil & Lignite Company field, Southwest Upton County wildcat which had developed a good show of oil and gas in a drillem test in the Wichita-Albany zone of the Permian at 4,517-4,972 feet, ran into salty, sulphur water in the interval at 4,970-5,090 feet.

That section was drillem tested for three hours. Recovery was 2,500 feet of oil and gas cut salty, sulphur water.

The project now is making hole below 5,319 feet. It is contracted to 5,560 feet.

Location is 660 feet from southeast and 1,979 feet from northeast lines of section 24, block 25, H&TC survey. It is five miles northwest of McCamey and slightly more than one mile south of the old, shallow McCamey field.

Truce Talks Recessed To June 1

**Atomic Annie
Belches First
Nuclear Shell**

LAS VEGAS, NEV.—(P)—The first firing of an atomic shell from the United States' 280-millimeter cannon came off brilliantly Monday, signaling the beginning of a new era in artillery warfare.

The nuclear shell burst 500 feet above a target of tall trees, railroad cars and military equipment on Frenchman Flat, 65 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

The long awaited shot from "Atomic Annie" apparently proved artillery experts' contention that the huge gun can handle nuclear as well as conventional ammunition.

Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson, observing the blast from a distance of less than eight miles, commented: "It was extremely interesting and I am pleased with its success."

The shell burst produced a bright low fireball that lit up the gray peaks of the spotted range, firing the flat, exactly at 7:30 a.m. Texas time. It was seen clearly in Las Vegas but was not felt or heard.

It dazzled observers in a plane flying over Indian Springs about 23 miles away but no shock or sound was received by the passengers. Including this reporter. AP photographer Harold Filian and pilot Woodrow McIntosh.

Cloud Rises Swiftly

The atomic cloud rose very swiftly to a height of 10,000 feet in little more than a minute. When it reached a height of from 20,000 to 25,000 feet it was supposed to be pierced by two QP-80 jet drones flying test missions, but that phase of the test was canceled due to unfavorable surface winds at nearby Indian Springs Air Force Base.

The fireball lasted perhaps eight seconds. The blast seemed to kick up less dirt than many previous atomic explosions at Nevada Proving Grounds. This was perhaps because the comparatively high burst for a medium power weapon.

The customary column and mushroom formed quickly and a brisk wind soon stretched the cloud in a zig-zag fashion across the sky.

By Remote Control

An intensely trained crew of nine men of the 52nd Field Artillery Group, Fort Sill, Okla., loaded the atomic gun, then retired to a safe distance for the firing, by remote control from the control point 10 miles away.

The Atomic Energy Commission, confirming in its usual announcement of a test that it was an atomic shell, said the distance from gun to target was between six and seven miles.

Approximately 50 aircraft participated in the test, including 12 B-36's from the Strategic Air Command's Carwell Base, Fort Worth. These were for crew indoctrination purposes.

The target area represented a typical enemy back-of-the-line installation. In a grove of 80 trees, which survived the May 7 atomic blast, stood a 45-ton locomotive, 15 boxcars, tanks, planes, guns and several types of military housing, from fortification to tents. Various types of Army clothing also were subjected to the blast, as were rabbits, mice and pigs in pens.

**Secrecy Veil
Thrown About
Monday Meet**

PANMUNJOM —(P)—Korean truce parleys resumed Monday amid tight secrecy and then recessed until June 1—apparently because top-level decision on the critical prisoner exchange issue is needed.

Presumably the United Nations Command presented a new proposal at the outset of Monday's session, which ended an eight-day, Allied-requested recess.

The South Korean truce delegate, Maj. Gen. Choi Duk Shin, did not attend the session.

A reliable South Korean source said Choi refused to go because he could not accept part of the new proposal, but an Allied spokesman said Choi was on the telephone and missed the helicopter from Allied headquarters at Munsan.

It was the first time a South Korean truce delegate has missed a session.

The South Korean government has spoken out sharply against any agreement that doesn't unify North and South Korea and against letting a neutral commission take charge of North Korean prisoners who refuse to return to Communism.

Clark, Rhee Confer

The last Allied proposal made public would have freed the Korean prisoners immediately after an armistice, but the Reds objected. There has been speculation the Allies would concede this point in the new proposal.

As the negotiations were in session, Gen. Mark Clark, UN Far East commander, met with South Korean President Syngman Rhee in Seoul. There was no announcement from their two-hour meeting.

The truce meeting itself was a secrecy-veiled affair.

UN interpreters could be seen through the windows of the crude conference hut apparently reading a long statement.

Washington sources had said a possible new approach would be offered on the last major barrier to an armistice—what to do about 48,500 Communist prisoners refusing to return to Red rule.

There was no inkling as to whether such a plan had been offered but—if so—the Communist delegation probably would have asked a long recess to refer the matter to higher authority.

Red Newsmen Miffed

Communist correspondents, after talking to members of their delegation, said the Allies had requested a new blackout on the session. A similar blackout was imposed in April, 1952, in an effort to iron out differences of the prisoner exchange issue.

Lt. Col. Milton Herr said he did not know if the next meeting also would be secret. He would not say who asked for the secret meetings.

The Red newsmen indicated disapproval of the secret sessions when they first were informed by the Red delegation at Monday morning's meeting. The Red correspondents did not return to Panmunjom from Kaesong for the afternoon secret sessions. The delegates met a total of about two hours, with two recesses.

Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison, senior Allied delegate, did not hold his usual press conference with newsmen after the meeting. He turned aside all questions with "no comment."

**Truck Crash
Kills Midland
Child, Eight**

Jose Sanchez, eight-year-old Midland Latin American youth, was killed instantly Sunday afternoon when the truck in which he was riding overturned one-half mile east of the city.

The child was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Augustine Sanchez, 407 North Terrell Street, and he was killed when apparently thrown from the pickup truck as it overturned.

The driver of the truck, Pablo Alvarez Torres, 26 Stanton, was in serious condition in Midland Memorial Hospital.

State Highway Patrolman Jack Whitson said the truck was headed north on the tank farm road, approximately three-tenths mile south of U. S. Highway 80.

Torres, he said, witnesses reported, started around another vehicle and swerved back into the traffic lane, only to lose control of the pickup.

Torres was treated for concussion, head lacerations and fracture of the right collarbone.

**Rosenbergs Again
Denied Rehearing**

WASHINGTON —(P)—The Supreme Court Monday refused for the third time to grant a hearing to the Rosenbergs. The President, in refusing last February 11 to save the Rosenbergs, termed their death penalty just punishment for a crime which could very well result in the death of many, many thousands of innocent citizens.

**'Copter Crew Picks
Up American Pilot
Under Red Gunfire**

SEOUL —(P)—An Air Force helicopter Monday rescued an American pilot from the Yellow Sea off the west coast of North Korea as Red riflemen on shore tried to pick off both the pilot and the 'copter crew.

Second Lt. John S. Gasking, Alameda, N. C., was 20 miles south of Sinsaju when Red ground fire damaged his P-84 Thunderjet.

His low-level glide barely carried him to the Yellow Sea, where he bailed out, and landed in the water between two sandbars a bare half-mile off the coast.

He was picked up five minutes later by the rescue helicopter which had started for the area as soon as Gasking radioed he was in trouble. The 'copter covered 120 miles from its base to the pickup site.

Helicopter pilots Maj. James L. Blackburn of San Marcos, Texas, and Capt. John W. Caldwell of Homer, Ga., said Red rifle stings from the mainland "were kicking up sprays of water all around" as they landed next to Gasking.

**Pecos Holdup Try
Misfires For Trio**

PECOS—A would-be holdup man and one of his young aides were in the Monahans jail and another teen-aged accomplice in serious condition in a Pecos hospital Tuesday as the result of an attempted robbery, a reckless drive and a near-fatal accident late Saturday.

Charges of attempted robbery with firearms were being readied Tuesday morning against Charles Sission, ex-convict who held the gun in the holdup of Swofford's Cafe, eight miles east of Pecos on Highway 80.

Sission, who was released only Friday from the Arizona State Penitentiary, and two youthful escapees from a California honor farm, got nothing but injury and trouble for their holdup efforts.

They fled from the cafe empty-handed when Mrs. C. E. Swofford turned to summon her husband from the living quarters behind the firm. She had, however, noted the license plates on the bandit's stolen car.

Swofford alerted law officers, grabbed his shotgun and set chase. The desperadoes, however, snared themselves five miles east of the holdup scene.

Racing along the smooth highway, the bandit-driver attempted to pass a slower car on the right side. The rough shoulder threw the stolen car into a time-and-a-half roll.

The driver of the other car saw the accident and stopped to render aid to the injured men. Police officers and Swofford arrived on the scene within minutes after the accident.

Both juveniles, ages 18 and 16, were turned over to the FBI and may face charges of transporting a stolen car from Arizona to Texas plus the escape and attempted hold-up counts.

**High Court Upsets Verdict
Against New Orleans Paper**

WASHINGTON —(P)—The Supreme Court Monday decided, 5-4, the New Orleans Times-Picayune Publishing Company did not violate the Sherman Anti-Trust Act by its advertising sales policy.

The Justice Department, in a civil anti-trust suit brought during the Truman Administration, had charged the company with violating the law by requiring classified and national advertisers to buy space in both its morning and afternoon newspapers.

The department contended this was a "forced" rate method unfair to the New Orleans Item, a competing afternoon paper.

Justice Clark delivered the majority decision adjudicating the case. Justice Burton wrote a dissenting opinion in which Justices Black, Douglas and Minton joined.

The majority thus was composed of Chief Justice Vinson and Justices Reed, Frankfurter and Jackson in addition to Clark.

Clark wrote a 37-page opinion which reviewed the facts and law of the case and then said the record "does not establish the charged violations of the Sherman Act."

But Clark emphasized that the high court was ruling only on the circumstances involved in the Times-Picayune case. He wrote: "We do not determine that unit advertising arrangements are lawful in other circumstances or in other proceedings."

"Our decision adjudicates solely that this record cannot substantiate the government's view of this case. Accordingly the district court's judgment must be reversed."

**State Lawgivers Leave Pay-Raise Bill
To Texas' Voters, Hasten Late Action**

AUSTIN —(P)—The House Monday voted to let the people decide whether they want the Legislature to set a pay raise for the governor, attorney general and other state officers.

The Senate has to approve that idea before it is submitted to the people.

Up for consideration was a proposed constitutional amendment passed by the Senate to raise the salaries.

The House changed that to say that salaries now set in the Constitution shall be considered as minimum, and the Legislature can raise them, including those of the legislators themselves—if the people approve.

The House passed six measures in the first hour of its morning session.

One was enabling legislation for city-county hospital operation in case another proposed constitutional amendment allowing joint city-county hospitals is approved. It applies only to Harris, Dallas, Bexar, Tarrant, El Paso, Jefferson and Galveston counties. It goes back to the Senate for approval of minor changes.

The pressure was on for a fast mop-up of the 83rd Legislature's remaining business.

It has two and a half days to go before the lawmakers go home.

Only the highest priority legislation may be considered in the closing hours, such as bills on final reading and reports of conference committees.

Half a dozen measures of major state-wide importance including the auto inspection and election bills are pending.

But so are many other lesser measures that are highly important to individual legislators. There will be a mad scramble and cut-throat competition to jam bills through before gavel rap the session to an end at noon Wednesday.

There may be some clock-stopping in order to finish "on time." Some legislators have gotten into such a last minute mess that they couldn't adjourn and have had to turn the clocks back to clean up.

Look for a big push to speed five water bills to final enactment in the House. They originally were approved there, but the Senate amended them and the changes must be approved by the House before they can go to the governor.

Administration leaders are expected to grip the water measure every possible push. They were among the bills urged on the session by Governor Shivers.

The election code revision faced stern barriers in the Senate.

As written now, it eliminates cross-filing. Some senators have said they will put up a last-ditch battle against that. They want the Republicans and Democrats to be able to join hands in nominating candidates for state offices, just as they did last Summer.

The House eliminated the cross-filing provision and it seemed unlikely the two branches of the Legislature could get together on those differences.

Also pending in the House is the much-amended auto inspection law. Some of its red tape has been eliminated, and it had a good chance of going through.

Tito Softpedals American Jazz For Optimistic Music

BELGRADE (AP)—A competent piano player himself, President Tito has pounded out a sharp note for Yugoslavia's musicians.

The new order calls for softpedaling jazz in favor of "optimistic" tunes, reflecting the country's development.

Tito notes the increasing prevalence of modern popular music here—a large part of it imported from America—and takes a dim view of the whole thing.

"We are very angry about this because jazz music does not comply with our character," he says.

"Even countries which are at the highest level of civilization may have a very low culture."
"Music must enoble the hearts and souls of men."
Tito judges music on the basis of its historical development. "It should be different in different periods to reflect elements of those periods."
Yugoslavia's own popular music he says is "bad as a result of the period of slavery and feudalism through which the country has passed."

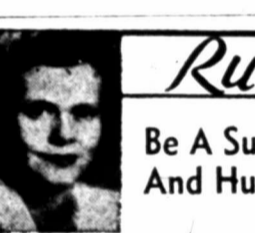

Total Blindness Attitude

The rapid deterioration of British-Egyptian relations over the Suez Canal has startled Western statesmen.

Reliable accounts from Cairo are that Premier Nagiub and other Egyptian leaders are totally preoccupied with just one thing: forcing British troops out of Suez.

Secretary of State Dulles is said to have heard little talk from them about Middle East defense arrangements, and slim appreciation of the canal's strategic value in the free world's defense.

That is exactly why Anglo-Egyptian negotiations on the issue have broken down. The Egyptians insist Britain agree to the withdrawal of its troops first, before any discussion is undertaken on protection of the vital British base at Suez.

The British, however, are unwilling to withdraw until they have assurance the base will be maintained, and made available to the West in the event of war.

Dulles has taken a stand in Cairo substantially like the British, and the Egyptians promptly have hailed this as evidence an American-British "conspiracy" exists.

Apparently the Egyptians have passed beyond the reasoning stage. If they were reasoning, they would see a few things better than they do. For instance:

The British have shown every sign of intent to withdraw their troops once the Suez base is properly secured. So withdrawal itself is not really at issue. Only the timing and conditions are in debate.

Egyptian insistence that no conditions be attached represents a narrow, provincial outlook which cannot be justified by modern statesmen facing the world as it is today. The Suez base is one of the most vital on earth. The Egyptians are behaving as if the transfer of a corner gas station rather than a great military bastion was at stake.

The free world has genuine sympathy for the aspirations of the Egyptians toward greater independence and self-reliance. It can have slight patience, however, with an attitude of total blindness such as the Egyptians are showing toward their wider world responsibilities.

If Russian communism were to invade the Middle East successfully, the independence the Egyptians now seek with single-minded frenzy would vanish with astounding speed.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

By Drew Pearson

Drew Pearson says: Eisenhower himself initiated idea of Bermuda conference; Ike worries over drifting Anglo-American relations; Churchill talks privately with Russian ambassador.

WASHINGTON—It was President Eisenhower himself who decided on the Big Three meeting in Bermuda. The main purpose he had in mind, he confided to friends, was not necessarily a subsequent meeting with Premier Malenkov, but to pull the disjointed policies of the Allies back together.

Eisenhower became convinced that something must be done to heal British-French-American wounds after reading Senator McCarthy's speech blasting ex-Prime Minister Clement Attlee. He began conferring with his advisers immediately thereafter, also exchanged some secret messages with Winston Churchill.

Churchill and Eisenhower have gotten into somewhat the same habit of conferring with each other by telephone or private cable as did FDR and Churchill during the war. And in one of these exchanges, Churchill suggested that he and Ike meet privately without the French.

Naturally this leaked out. Naturally, also, it made the French sore. The British denied that such a conversation ever took place, which only served to make the French surer. However, the State Department insisted all along that the French must participate.

Eisenhower has been deeply worried of late over the way American, British and French friendship was drifting apart. As one who delivered the famous Guildhall Address in London, a milestone in Anglo-American relations, and as one who insisted that no officer who couldn't get along with the British serve in a key post under him, Eisenhower felt especially sensitive on this point.

He also realized that if the Allies did sit down for a Big Four conference with Malenkov, the Russians would be able to split them wide open if policies were not patched up in advance. Big Four Conference?

Although President Eisenhower still is hanging back regarding the proposed Big Four conference with Malenkov, Prime Minister Churchill is doing just the opposite. Despite his 78 years, he has become the eagerest eager beaver on the diplomatic horizon.

Twice he has even talked secretly with the Soviet ambassador in London, Jacob Malik.

Foreign Minister Anthony Eden, who has been ill, has tried to discourage Churchill's irrepressible diplomacy, but to no avail. Eden fears that any talk with Malenkov would, first of all, get nowhere; second, mislead the world; and, third, antagonize President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles.

However, Sir Winston, during Eden's absence, had the Foreign Office contact Ambassador Malik and arrange a personal meeting. At the meeting, Churchill told the Soviet envoy he was sure both he and Eis-

agents are offering oil, tungsten and chrome—the latter two especially hard to get—in exchange for coffee, cocoa and copper.

Meanwhile, India actually has offered to withdraw from the international wheat agreement, under which she would get wheat from the United States, provided Russia will guarantee to ship 1,000,000 bushels of wheat to India each year for the next five years.

Secretary of Defense Wilson's refusal to accept the low British bid on an electrical generator for Chief Joseph Dam has caused particular bitterness in Great Britain and more of a tendency to trade with the Iron Curtain despite critical speeches in the U. S. Senate.

"Trade—not aid," say our Allies, "has got to be a two-way street." Just about every day Dean Acheson's friends ask him for comments on his successor—Secretary of State Dulles. Acheson, however, gives them all the same answer—"I know that job, and I've got nothing but sympathy for anyone who's trying to do it."

President Eisenhower has ordered his yacht, the Williamsburg, put in mothballs to save the taxpayers' money. However, the Navy still is operating another yacht, the Sequoia, for the top brass. It's sometimes used to take influential congressmen on weekend cruises.

When President Eisenhower played golf his Secret Service guards dress up in sport shirts and look like typical amateur duffers. . . The Air Force is stuck with \$3,000,000 worth of New Hampshire land and doesn't know what to do with it, since Secretary of Defense Wilson canceled the strategic Portsmouth-Newton Air Base. . . Moscow now has a network of more than 1,000 transmitters to jam United Nations freedom broadcasts behind the Iron Curtain. This proves more eloquently than words just who is afraid of the truth. . . The Navy is trying to bar all outsiders from the Pacific islands where military bases are located. The ban even would include the trust territories, which we don't actually own. This is the same tight military security that the Japanese used to maintain.

played by Mr. and Mrs. James Dunn, the winners of the Mixed Pair Championship.

When West opened the queen of diamonds, Dunn very properly refused to win the first trick. This was the correct first step in a campaign of keeping East out of the lead.

Dealer could see that he was bound to lose one diamond and one club no matter how he played the cards. He didn't want to touch the spades unless it turned out that the contract could be made in no other way.

West continued the diamonds at the second trick, and dealer took his ace this time. He continued by drawing trumps with the ace and queen of hearts, and next led a low club from dummy. When East naturally played a low club, South finished the ten of clubs.

The club finesse lost to West's jack, but dealer was not a bit disturbed. He had expected to lose a club trick anyway, and he carefully had played the hand in such a way as to lose that trick to West rather than to East.

West returned a club, and Dunn could now take the ace of clubs, and follow with the king of clubs. When the suit broke, dealer could discard a spade on dummy's last club. This limited the spade loss to one trick, thus assuring the game contract.

If the clubs had not broken, dealer would have been in position to lead a spade from dummy in the hope that East held the ace. As it happened, this play would have failed and it was therefore fortunate for dealer that he found another way to make his contract.

If he had allowed East to gain the lead before dummy's last club had been established, East would have led the queen of spades promptly.

Steelworkers' Chief Leads His First Wage-Boost Drive

WASHINGTON—David J. McDonald, new president of the United Steelworkers of America, CIO, takes the spotlight on the labor stage as for the first time he heads the negotiating committee in wage negotiations with U. S. Steel Corporation executives.

The result of these talks may determine whether there will be what amounts to a seventh round of U. S. wage increase since the end of World War II. Big Steel has in general set the pace for this advance. The new steelworkers' president thinks it should continue.

The base wage in steel was 70 cents an hour during the war. It was raised $\$1/4$ cents in January, 1946, and another $\$1/4$ cents in February, 1947. Then came increases of 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents in April, 1947, 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents in July, 1948, and finally, two raises of 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents each in December, 1950, and March, 1952.

The total increase is 65 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents an hour to today's level of $\$1.43 $\frac{1}{2}$. This is only the base, or minimum job, class-one level.$

The average steel wage rate is $\$2.06$ an hour. And the American Iron and Steel Institute has just released figures indicating that with fringe benefits for insurance, pensions, paid vacations, holidays, shift differentials and overtime, the labor cost to the steel industry averages $\$3.38$ an hour.

McDonald makes his headquarters in Pittsburgh, where the present wage negotiations are being held. But recently the steelworkers moved their Washington offices out of the crowded CIO building near the White House, into a big, new air-conditioned building.

He got through two years of high school by age 15 and then went to work in a steel mill. He took some night-school courses in accounting and got a certificate from a school of dramatics.

He still likes the theater and in making speeches or conducting labor negotiations, he isn't above using touches of what might be called dramatic art. After all, Lewis and Murray, before him, never hesitated to ham up the act when given a good cue.

After all, the steelworkers' union now is big business itself. It has 1,250,000 members. Its financial statements show assets of close to $\$11,000,000$.

McDonald doesn't go along with the Walter Reuther idea of fixed annual productivity increases for labor, nor with escalator clauses tied to the cost of living.

"The Lord help labor," he says, "if it ever gets wages tied down to cost of living." He recalls the story of an old mine worker in Pennsylvania who was objecting to what he thought was a sliding-scale clause in a coal contract. "What saps up," he cried out, "must zip down."

McDonald sees little hope of the Republican Congress doing anything about Taft-Hartley Act revision this year. But he has no doubt that if his present negotiations lead to a strike, President Eisenhower will invoke a Taft-Hartley injunction against his union.

Only the wage provisions of the steel labor contract are up for revision this year. But the full contract expires July 1, 1954. And before that time President McDonald wants the steel companies to begin studies on his union's proposals for a guaranteed annual wage.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Charles E. Wilson said he would give the secretary of Defense the job he "darndest whirl" it has ever had.

Wilson said he would give the secretary of Defense the job he "darndest whirl" it has ever had. That was last November when the 62-year-old president of General Motors was picked by the then President-elect Eisenhower for his cabinet.

Things have been whirling ever since, and not always pleasantly, for the white-haired and roundish Wilson who gave up a salary reported to be \$600,000 a year to work in Washington for \$22,500.

Wilson has said frankly he has no political ambitions. Eisenhower picked him because he was one of the great business managers of the country. As head of the Defense Department he would manage a branch of the government which has more dealings with American business than any other.

For him the whirl began early. When he went up to answer the routine questions of the Senate committee which had to pass on his appointment, he startled the senators and the Eisenhower team by frankly talking at giving up his \$2,500,000 worth of holdings in GM, the Defense Department's biggest military contract holder.

Eventually he agreed to shed his stock, but only after much publicity, discussion and some criticism. What seemed puzzling was that Wilson apparently had not informed himself, before leaving Detroit, that this would be required of him before he could become Defense secretary.

Approved at last, he disappeared into the Pentagon where everyone knew what was expected of him: after all the Republican campaign promises of economy it would be up to him to provide the maximum defense at minimum cost.

If there were shrieks inside the Pentagon walls as Wilson's axe landed, he seems to have muffled them. They may come unmuffled if Congress starts poking around. Already an Air Force report, issued upon request of Representative Vory, California Democrat, has expressed differences with Wilson's slash of Air Force funds.

Midland Graduates Urged To Dream Great Dreams

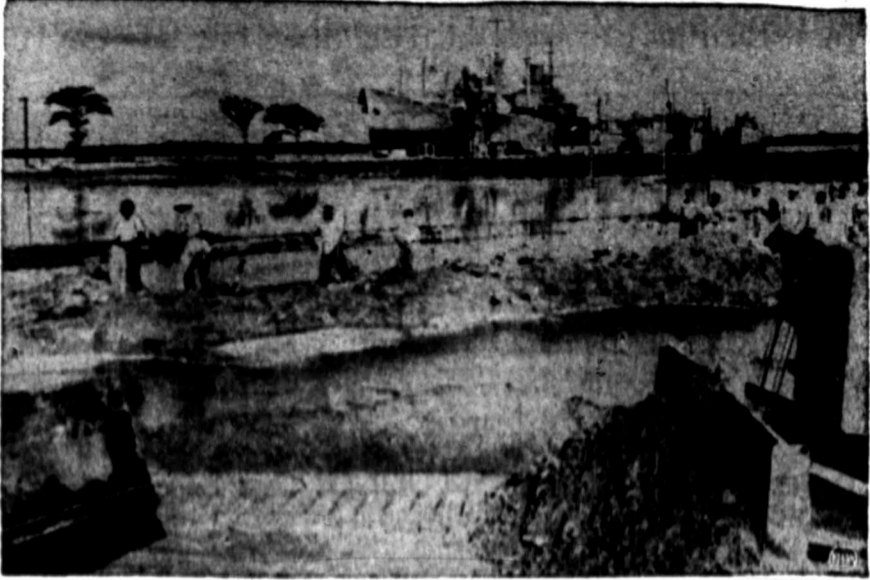
Midland High School graduates were urged Sunday night to "dream great dreams and imagine great things."

Three Flooding Rivers Aim Punch At Louisiana Village

LAKE CHARLES, La.—Three flooding rivers aimed their muddy crests at the Southwest Louisiana Coast Monday, threatening a town of 2,000 and oil fields 40 miles south of here.

This city of 50,000 still was choked with floodwaters of the receding Calcasieu River, which left 15,000 homeless and \$15,000,000 damage here. Health officials were vaccinating for typhoid, but no cases were reported.

While Lake Charles and its submerged Air Force base got ready to mop up, the little town of Cameron, on the coast, braced for a water assault at the mouth of the Calcasieu.

The U. S. Weather Bureau here, in a bulletin warning, predicted water up to three feet in Cameron's streets within 48 hours.

Dangerous waters were forecast to protect their cattle.

Within a radius of 10 miles of Cameron are some 25 oil wells, each protected by its own little levee in the marshes.

Lee Welch, vice president of Vincent and Welch, Inc., a Lake Charles firm which handles oil drilling and production, said, "even if those wells were flooded, they would be damaged very little. Maybe an empty tank or two would float away, but most wells can be shut off quite easily."

Residents Not Worried

The people of Cameron, who live on hunting, fishing and oil, are hardly soured and aren't worried.

Sheriff O. B. Carter said: "Unless this is one for the record, we don't expect too much trouble."

Orange Wins Battle As Swollen Sabine River Waters Recede

ORANGE—The swollen Sabine River began receding Monday from a five-mile emergency levee thrown up by thousands of volunteers.

The levee held against the raging river after some 10,000 citizens and volunteers worked four days and nights piling up 325,000 reinforcing sandbags.

The river went to a height of 7.85 feet late Saturday. The crest was somewhat lower than previous forecasts. There was a little floodwater from seepage.

"The flood is whipped," said Sabine River Authority President John W. Simmons.

Water reached some homes not protected by the levee. Though a major flood was averted, property damage was expected to be heavy.

There were no fatalities.

Orange newspaper J. C. Broening estimated that one-fifth of the city had water in streets, yards or homes. Some persons whose homes in the Brownwood and Cove additions were flooded slightly moved back from temporary haven with relatives and friends. Damage was mainly in soaked floors and ruined furniture.

Abdullah Happy As Samia Agrees To Forego Divorce

CAIRO, EGYPT—Grinning happily, Abdullah (Sheppard) King confirmed Monday he and his belly-dancing wife, Samia Gamal, are reconciled and will continue as man and wife. Samia, also smiling, nodded her approval.

They were reunited in Samia's apartment for the first time since the red-haired Texan arrived in Cairo from Houston last Friday. King has been living in a hotel. Monday he visited his wife for the first time.

He and Samia told a reporter she had agreed to forego her intention of getting a divorce.

"Sheppard is going back to the United States Saturday and I'll stay here for four or five months," Samia said.

Patience Not His Foremost Native Virtue

NEW YORK—It prepared his favorite food for him—sauerkraut and potatoes—all I had to do was warm it up," says Mrs. Jennie Grabowski.

But the 51-year-old mother of five children told police Sunday her husband, Stanley, 59, wanted it ready as soon as he got home Saturday night. Because it wasn't ready, she added he tied her to a cellar beam and then kicked and blackjacked her into unconsciousness.

Grabowski, a construction worker, was held in \$1,500 bail on charges of felonious assault and weapons law violation. Mrs. Grabowski was reported in poor condition at Queens Hospital. They have been married 23 years.

Four Nations Talk Guerrilla Withdrawal From Burmese Areas

BANGKOK—U. S. Ambassador Edwin F. Stanton Monday expressed hope arrangements will be completed this week for withdrawal of 12,000 Chinese Nationalist guerrilla troops from Burma.

Military representatives of the United States, Thailand, Burma and Nationalist China last week began talks on detailed plans for the evacuation through Thailand including surrender of arms.

Stanton told The Associated Press the Burmese and Nationalist Chinese are showing every indication of wanting to settle the touchy problem of the border of Red China as soon as possible.

However, it still is uncertain whether the guerrilla forces under Gen. Li Mi actually will lay down their arms and leave Burma, even though ordered to do so by the Formosa Government. Formosa has said it had little control of the troops, who were driven out of Yunnan Province by the Communists in 1950 and have been training in the Burmese mountains ever since.

The four-power military representatives began a series of hush-hush meetings Friday to carry out the terms of a UN General Assembly resolution calling for the withdrawal.

Fatal Shootings, Drownings Boost State's Violence Toll

Fatal shootings and drownings pushed the toll of Texas violence to at least 18 deaths over the weekend.

An airman was killed north of Denton Sunday when his jet trainer crashed on a farm near Pilot Point. The jet was from James Connally Air Force Base at Waco.

Jeffrey George Boudy, 12, Lake Jackson, Texas, Boy Scout, was found hanged by a woven Scout belt in a closet of his home Saturday. A verdict of accidental death was returned. His parents said the boy was fond of experimenting with knots and ropes.

Carroll Finton, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Finton, Longview, drowned Sunday in a Longview swimming pool.

Robert Penn, 61, and his wife, 41, of Texas City, drowned when their fishing boat overturned Sunday in Galveston Bay.

Lewis Mitchey, Jr., 19, Houston, drowned Sunday when he stepped in a deep hole off the Galveston beach.

A Fort Worth justice of the peace ruled murder and suicide in the shootings Sunday of Robert Lee Smith, 38, and his wife. Whitt Boyd ruled Smith shot himself accidentally after killing his wife, Ruth, 32.

William C. Thurmond, 44, a cleaning plant owner in Dallas, shot himself to death Sunday. Justice of the Peace W. E. Richburg ruled.

A 20-year-old Baytown milk plant worker, Bobby Harold Parson, was killed instantly and his woman passenger injured critically when their car overturned several times Saturday. Mrs. Willie Bell Lee, 41, also of Baytown, suffered internal injuries.

Ernest Lee Hunter, 33, Denton, was electrocuted in a Fort Worth factory Saturday as he moved a large electric fan.

William Eli Donnell, Azle, was killed Saturday when the pickup truck in which he was riding collided with a dump truck in Fort Worth.

James McCandless, 16, was found shot to death Friday night on a Cieburne street. Police said he apparently shot himself accidentally.

June Veselka, 18, Waco, was killed Saturday in a traffic accident southwest of Waco.

Paul Kimbro, 35, farmer, was found shot to death in his pickup near Weatherford Saturday. A pistol lay by his side.

L. D. Stark, 20, Sinton oil field worker, was killed Saturday when he fell from a rig near the Long Mott Community.

Ray Rafor, 34, was shot to death in Dallas Saturday. Officers arrested a 44-year-old man.

R. C. Duckworth, 31, Andrews, was killed Saturday night when his auto overturned near Seminole.

Atomic Energy Begins To Pay Own Way As Nation's Industry Finds Many Uses

NEW YORK—(AP)—Radioactive clouds from "atomic Annie" may frighten some people. But industry is learning to live with the atom—and to harness it to the dollar.

Without waiting for the day when atomic energy may run electric power plants, many companies are saving thousands of dollars by using atomic by-products to perfect new products and new industrial processes. More wonders may be on the way.

New chemical compounds are being found by atomic research, the University of Michigan reports. Radioactive materials have helped farmers get bigger corn and tobacco yields, have helped doctors find and cure such disease as hyperthyroidism.

Pays Own Way

Scientists are now trying to find ways to keep meat from spoiling for months, to make a better tooth paste, to improve livestock feeds, to find new and better insecticides.

It helps scientists to learn what actually happens in the vulcanization of rubber to study the underground flow of oil and perhaps thus extend the known limits of oil fields.

The Eisenhower Administration's decision to cut the atomic budget may not hamper this work too much, as it mostly pays its own way. There are some 1,110 users of radio-isotopes, or radioactive materials, shipped from the Oak Ridge Atomic Plant, which has about 100 different kinds for sale. The Atomic Energy Commission spends less than one per cent of its budget on this phase.

Radioactive materials are produced by sticking any of a number of things from a hunk of gold to plutonium rings into the atomic pile for a time.

Measures Engine Wear

The resulting radioactive piston ring, for example, then gives off small radioactive particles. The piston ring is put into an engine and wear on the ring can be told quickly and cheaply by draining the oil and measuring its activity.

The radioactive particles act as a tracer. With detecting instruments you can "see" what's happening, where the radioactive particles are going and how fast.

Older methods of finding out about wear in an engine or a costly machine tool required dismantling an engine or machinery and weighing the rings and other parts to find out how much had been lost by friction. The radioactive tracer is faster and much cheaper.

At a conference sponsored by the National Industrial Conference Board, petroleum scientists told how one oil company saved \$100,000 by measuring with radioactive beads the circulation of a catalyst in a big cracking unit where gasoline is made, thus avoiding an expensive threatened shutdown.

Tracers For Oil Products

Other oil companies put radioactive tracers between the differ-

ent oil products they run through the same pipe line. Detecting instruments quickly and cheaply tell when the end of one product flows past a given point. Engineers can then shut off the flow or divert the next product to another pipe, or study any mixing of products as they flow.

Tracers help in plastic and synthetic fiber industries control the complicated processes by which they create their products, help to measure very thin plastic film, help to find out how to do chemical processes more cheaply.

Radioactive materials help food manufacturers discover how fast any type of box or bag absorbs moisture, helping to make food keep longer. The tracers can show how fast water soaks into different foods when cooking, helping to develop faster cooking foods.

WE KNEW IT ALL ALONG—

Now Scientists Find Out: Female Superior To Male

When a man comes along and says, flatly, that women are superior to men, it's a fortunate thing that he brings along a silver lining. The man in this case is anthropologist Ashley Montagu, the author of a new book, "The Natural Superiority of Women" (Macmillan). He attempts to prove, scientifically, that the female of the species is better equipped to survive, which is, he says, the essence of superiority.

The whole thing leaves the male under a dark, inferior cloud, but let's consider the silver lining. Since

the ladies are superior, why give them your seat in the bus? Or any public conveyance? He'd Take It "If a young girl got up and gave me a seat," says Montagu, a self-confessed middle-aged man, who looks mighty healthy. "I should most certainly accept." This philosophy, of course, must be practiced with caution. The idea is that the "superior" person should offer his (or her) seat to the less superior, and sex enters in only secondarily. Young women should defer to old men, and young men to old women.

Except for that one bright spot,

the picture for men is pretty bad. Montagu wrote in his book that a female is superior to a male in almost everything but plain, muscular strength. And, even after the book is out, he can't think of anything to soften the situation.

Take It Or Leave It "I very much regret to announce to the world and the universe at large," he says, in his clipped British accents, "that those are the facts."

And what are those facts? Well, in essence, he writes that the average woman is healthier, better balanced emotionally, and, with the exception of mathematical and mechanical reasoning, more measurably intelligent than the average man. Take it or leave it. "And I left something out of the book," says this ivy-covered Benedict Arnold. "I left out the fact that natural selection—the basis of evolution—favors women. The infant mortality rate for females is lower."

'Phony Feminists' Since the book was published, Montagu, on leave from the Rutgers University faculty, has had only favorable response. Even from men. The only objections have come from what he terms "phony feminists"—women who try to compete with men by spicing their attitudes.

If you accept Montagu's theory—and most of his theory is fact, making it pretty tough to reject—what should you do about it? Not that there's much you can do. "Well," says Montagu, "men should provide women with all the respect and affection that they deserve—as human beings, not because they're another sex."

Such As Your Wife Any women? "The average housewife," he says, "must acquaint herself with the facts about herself. She should learn what her capabilities really are."

And couples? Should a man marry a woman older than he, to compensate for her probable longer life? "I hadn't thought about it," he says, "but, off-hand, I'd say definitely yes. Of course, there are exceptions to everything."

And any touchy male can take solace in that fact—there are exceptions to this business about women being naturally superior. Montagu is writing about the average man and woman; any one particular man, such as you, may be superior to any one particular woman, such as your wife. Yippee! Two silver linings!

Fright, Anger Help Patients Recovering From Tuberculosis

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Fright apparently is good medicine for some tubercular people.

Several cases in which a good scare favorably turned the course of treatment for sanitarium patients were reported to the National Tuberculosis Association recently by a group of Seattle physicians.

The frightening episodes were brought on accidentally, but the results were so striking that the doctors now plan to use it scientifically as an experimental means of treatment.

Gland's Role Studied
This strange finding was the result of experiments to determine what part the adrenal gland plays in the role of the disease. The work was done by Dr. Edmund R. Clarke, Dr. Daniel W. Zahn and Dr. Thomas H. Holmes of Firland Sanitarium, Seattle.

The adrenal glands, which are cap-like formations atop the kidneys, produce adrenalin, a hormone which the body uses in large quantities during periods of anger, fright or other forms of mental stress. During calm periods this hor-

mons is produced and utilized at relatively low levels.

The Seattle doctors measured the amount of adrenal activity of 100 patients by chemical tests. They found that it varied widely according to the individuals' mental state.

Patient Gets Angry
People with basically low levels of adrenal activity, they found, appeared to have more serious TB cases than those with high levels. Low adrenal functioning went along with discouragement and apathy. A high rate was accompanied by tenseness, rapid heartbeat, high blood pressure, sweating of the palms and restlessness.

One patient, Dr. Clarke said, was being kept alive by great effort, and a part of the treatment included injections with a hypodermic needle. He became so angered at being jabbed repeatedly with the needle that his adrenal functioning took a big jump. Anger affects the adrenals much the same as fright. The patient now is on the road to recovery and early release from the hospital.

Fright Saves Life
Another patient with low adrenal activity was being prepared for a minor lung operation. His fellow patients kidded him into believing

that the doctors were going to take a whole lung, not just a small part of it. He became so scared that his adrenal activity soared. This "lift" helped him through with flying colors, Dr. Clarke said.

Arousing fright or anger cannot be expected to help in all cases, Dr. Clarke added, because sometimes patients are too far gone for such feelings and their glands do not respond. But these incidents have worked accidentally in so many cases that the idea is worth a clinical tryout, he said.

CANNES—The U. S. sailor now is king of the Riviera. A few years back—before taxes and revolutions—merchants used to giber with glee when the Maharajah of Zanzibar appeared with his favorite wife, who wore a diamond in her left nostril.

Now they do a joyous jig on spotting our Mediterranean fleet, which calls every 30 or 40 days.

Canning Chislers
The sailors spend more than \$2,000,000 yearly to help replace cur-

rency characters like flabby ex-King Farouk.

Last year Egypt's then-employed monarch ran up a \$6,000-daily Cannes hotel bill, including eight three-minute eggs for each breakfast. This season, down to his last three paunches, he's merely a house guest.

The average sailor, being perhaps 18 and as careful with cash as a Panamanian monkey with bananas, spills \$50 on a two-day shore leave. Canning chislers gladly help.

Ladies Called "Seagulls"
Saloons sell beer at 40 cents a watery glass; taxicabs charge 75 cents for a 10-block haul, a cut of "steak" (probably horse), soggy potato chips and wine rejected by the cat bring three bucks.

The kind of ladies called "seagulls" follow the fleet around the Mediterranean lifting wallets.

Perfume peddlers collect dollars to send Sis or honey-bun a two-ounce bottle then mail one half that size.

Steak And Beer
I found one bright spot on the wonderful waterfront at nearby Villefrance—"Mere Germaine"—run by plump, pleasing Mrs. Germaine Brau, known where sailors gather from Norfolk to San Francisco as

"Mother of the Navy," corny as that may be.

Her cafe, French as a shrug, delights the nostrils with steaming fish soup. It's wall is papered with snags of assorted sailors and visiting warships.

Sailors line up to try her filet mignon, thick as your wrist, drink beer and play the wheezing virolo, which has such oldies as "Yes, Sir, She's My Baby."

Small Fry Already
Romance, besides fish soup, is in the air as outside French delightful soak sun wearing bathing suits that could be carried in your hip pocket.

There are only 6,000 citizens in Villefrance but already 40 girls have married swabbies on shore leave since the fleet started calling in 1948. Many more are committed.

This includes most of the original waitresses as well as Mom's daughter, Claire, now Mrs. Thomas Kelly, of New Rochelle, N. Y., owner of two bi-lingual small fry.

Hangover Cure
One tray pusher, who parleys no English, met a New Jersey boy who can't even say "Merci" and married him—through an interpreter—on his next Riviera shore leave.

Young males hereabouts tell me they're ready to adopt the Communist slogan—"Yank—Go Home!"—unless President Eisenhower sends over the WAVES.

Mom polices her own joint, and if any type gets stewed she shoves his head under a cold water faucet, then pumps him with onion soup until he can navigate a ganjuplank in a 100-mile hurricane.

Boys Don't Starve
"The shore patrol," she says, "has no business here, except for the midnight shift, which I serve free morning chow."

When the fleet puts to sea, Mom hires a rowboat and cruises alongside. Her chums lower baskets and she hands out loaves of French bread sliced in half and jammed with ham, cheese and other items—just so her boys won't starve.

★ DR. JORDAN SAYS ★ Outlook Is Fairly Bright For Anxiety Neurosis Patients

Some time ago T. W. asked for a discussion of "autonomic unbalance." He wrote, "This is what I have been told I have after having been chronically ill for 25 years. I am 40 now.

"My symptoms are numerous: extreme thinness and inability to gain weight, frequent and violent digestive upsets with vomiting, excessive sweating during warm weather and coldness and trembling during cold weather, lack of body equilibrium, asthma, pronounced neurotic tendencies and nervousness."

This description fits a common disorder which also sometimes is called neurocirculatory asthenia, anxiety neurosis, effort syndrome, neurasthenia, and other labels. It is thought to occur to a greater or lesser degree in about one person out of 20. Although it possesses all these rather alarming names, it is probably not correct to speak of it as a disease.

In addition to the uncomfortable symptoms mentioned by T. W., persons who fall in this category also frequently complain of one or more of the following symptoms: pounding of the heart, easy tiredness, breathlessness, chest pains, sighing, dizziness, faintness, apprehension, headache, weakness, difficulty in sleeping—and a whole list of others.

About three years ago an extremely interesting study of a rather large group of patients who had had such complaints was conducted some 20 years after the diagnosis had been made originally. The results of this survey were most encouraging.

It was found, for one thing, that fewer deaths occurred in this group

of patients than would be expected in a similar group of the same age. In other words, they seem to have a better chance of living than if they did not have these annoying symptoms.

Another interesting finding was that while these symptoms are supposed to be signs of exaggerated anxiety, the patients were not particularly likely to get other diseases which are supposed to be brought on, at least partially, by worry and fear; such as ulcers of the stomach, asthma, and high blood pressure.

Little Disability
It also was concluded from this study that this group of patients was suffering from a chronic disorder which did not interfere seriously with work, social or family life.

Twelve out of 100 recovered; 35 out of 100 had symptoms, but no disability; 38 out of 100 had symptoms with mild disability, and only 15 of 100 had symptoms with moderate or severe interference with their work or living conditions.

With such relatively favorable conclusions concerning the effects, or rather lack of them, from this disorder, it seems safe to conclude that most of those who have these unpleasant symptoms should cease to worry unduly and try to learn to live with their ailments, giving them no more attention than they can help.

GOT ANY CARIBOU TALLOW?— Ice Cream In Every Igloo Keeps Eskimos Up To Date

Just in case you find yourself up above the Arctic Circle some hot afternoon and feel like a dish of ice cream, don't despair. Just find yourself a cloudberry bush.

It seems that you can make ice cream, starting with a few staples that are in everyone's igloo—cloudberries, seal oil and caribou tallow. This tasty recipe comes from A. E. Forsild, the chief botanist of the National Museum of Canada, who writes about the Arctic's edible plants in the Journal of the Arctic Institute of North America.

Parboiled Lichens
You first beat up the caribou tallow to the consistency of whipped cream, then add the seal oil and the juicy pale yellow cloudberry. Quicker than you can say Nanook, you've got ice cream.

Forsild has lots of handy hints for hungry hunters in his piece. Parboiled lichens, for example, Lichens are low-growing, drab things often mistaken for moss. A couple of them bear such taste-utillating tags as "rock tripe" and "reindeer moss."

Seal Blubber, Too
They are full of nutriment, but also most of them contain an acid that is quite liable to make you nauseous. This must be neutralized by parboiling in water with baking soda. Then the lichens are dried and powdered. From this lichen flour you can make jelly, or use it in puddings and soups, or, with some wheat flour added, you can make biscuits.

The Arctic is loaded with all sorts of delicacies. All you have to do is learn how to distinguish a Seabeach Sandwort from a Round-leaved Saxifrage. The former, which grows on beaches, has stems and leaves that may be pickled as "sauerkraut." The latter should be eaten raw—with seal blubber. Delicious.

This process of making a sort of "sauerkraut" from various plants is widespread through the Arctic regions. You pick the best leaves, stems and sometimes even roots and twigs. Then pack them in seal skin.

Model Pleasant, 124, Claimed By Commies

bags and let them sit there for a few weeks. A fermentation takes place and out comes the best preserved Sweet Coltfoot you've ever tasted.

Berries are common through the Arctic, and should you get stuck there without your lunch-box, remember these names:

Black crowberry, a juicy purplish-black fruit, can be eaten when picked. Or you can eat them with a dash of seal blubber. (Also—and keep this under your parka—you can ferment the juice and make a pretty decent wine.)

Cowberry is a variety that makes good jams and jellies. Then there's the Whortleberry, which the natives shun, but while men find appetizing.

Some Arctic vegetation has edible roots, too. The Woolly Fernweeds

root is lemon yellow, and when cooked it's as sweet as a young carrot. And the thin roots of the Masu are equally good, but you have a feud with the bears and meadow mice for them. The Eskimos have dogs, specially trained, which raid mice pantries and bring back the Masu roots.

Eat Them Raw
Also included on the Eskimo businessman's lunch is a Broad-leaved Willow-herb flower. These blossoms are the largest in the Arctic and are a mouth-watering purple color. You eat them raw, as a salad. And you can cook the leaves and wind up with a dish that's something like spinach.

That's a sampling of the free lunch growing in the Arctic. Just pack your knife and fork and mush north.

Sales Are Soaring For Moroccan Cork

RABAT, FRENCH MOROCCO
—Wartime shortages led Morocco to start exploiting the output of its million acres of cork oak trees. Now it's big business and last year \$2,400,000 worth of cork was exported.

Cork is the bark stripped from the trees. It is removed every year, and grows back in the next 12 months. The stripping tends to improve the quality of the cork and the tree may live for 150 years.

Much of the cork is used for local wine and bottling industries and large amounts are sent to France for bottling wines. A special veined variety is used to make the expanding champagne corks. Lower qualities are ground up, and with a binding medium, turned into cork board for commercial uses.

BRUSSELS—(AP)—An international Congress of Religious Theaters will be held in Bruges (Belgium) between August 12 and 17.

General Gruenter First Makes Good As 'Ghost' Before Stepping Into Major Army Role Of Own

WASHINGTON—General Alfred Maximilian Gruenter, who has been named new boss of NATO, is an Army "ghost" who made good. He is one of the very few officers in U. S. Army history to achieve top success without having had a major command of troops in the field. General George Marshall is another one.

There have been many officers with Gruenter's special abilities—keen minds, wizards on staff work, brilliant planners, never forget a detail, size up problems instantly, completely selfless in letting their superiors capitalize on their talents.

With Ike in Texas
But they usually are designed to retire as colonels, or perhaps get one star as they are aged-out. They're too valuable in headquarters to be let out with the troops, where the promotions are made.

Fortunately, Gruenter's special brilliance, and a piece of luck, enabled him to escape the fate of the average, especially-bright staff officer. His luck was meeting Gen-

eral Eisenhower in 1940, during maneuvers in Texas and Oklahoma. Gruenter was a major then.

When Ike was given the job of planning the North African campaign, he asked for Gruenter's help. As Ike expected, Gruenter performed brilliantly.

Other Ghost
But it lagged him as the perfect ghost—the shadowy, out-of-this-world creature who performs some kind of magic in back offices which transforms the front-office man into a hero.

He played this ghost role for Gen. Mark Clark during the Italian campaign. And when peace came, he was given a super-ghost job in the Pentagon. Named director of the Combined Chiefs of Staff in the newly-created unification set-up, he was called on to be a ghost for the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

In this job, working in enforced anonymity, he had a key part in creating the long-range strategic plans which guide the country's defense forces today. He also helped set up most of the new machinery of unification.

Many times the late James For-

restal, first secretary of defense, and the three members of the Joint Chiefs of Staff said flatly that without Gruenter the whole new defense machine might have stalled. Forrestal once stated:

"It's too bad that the general public will probably never know just how much the genius of Al Gruenter has contributed to the future defenses of the United States."

When Ike took the job of building up the military forces of anti-Communist countries in Europe, he asked Gruenter to be chief of staff. From then on, Gruenter began to shed his ghostly character, emerging for the American public as a dynamic leader and outstanding personality in his own right.

Mean Tennis
The Europeans who began doing business with him recognized the youthful, 51-year-old General for what he really was: a mature, intellectual statesman, with the most desirable qualities of military discipline preserved in his personality. Their respect for him became so great that it spread to the American public.

At the same time his European associates discovered him as a delightful person to know out of the office, with a host of unilitary accomplishments. The best tennis players on the continent came to respect his serve, backhand, and lightning speed on the courts.

The international set quickly rated him as one of the top bridge

players in the world. They were not surprised to learn that he had made \$100 per night being a referee at bridge tournaments in New York.

while he was a junior officer and teaching at West Point.

Stinging Memos
The diplomats and intellectuals, in after-dinner discussions, recognized his views on world affairs as penetrating and profound.

Except for his rigidly-erect posture, Al Gruenter is mostly non-military in mien. He's slight, lean and has an aristocratic face. He grins a lot, laughs heartily and is often pixie-like. He's never less than warm and friendly out of the office, although on the job he can flash quick annoyances with a barbed tongue and stinging memos.

In Army Schools
Although he uses every second of his spare time for reading and studying reports, he's basically a gregarious man. He and his wife love to entertain and go out. They have two grown sons in the Army.

General Gruenter is a devout Catholic. He was born in Platte Center, Neb., the son of a newspaper publisher who was once the campaign manager for William Jennings Bryan. He went to a military school before he went to West Point, where he was graduated fourth in his class.

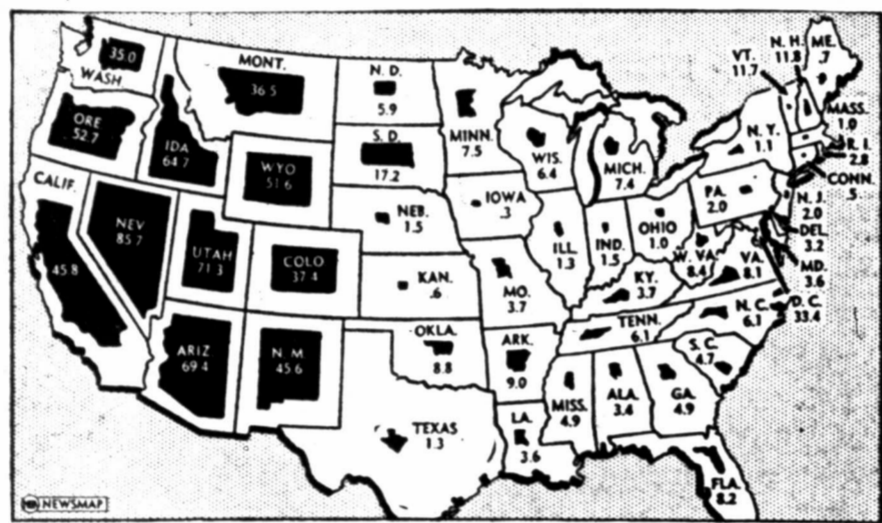
His Army career, from graduation to his first meeting with Ike, was almost all spent attending Army schools or teaching in them.

I gave up on the number of times he told his child to keep his feet where they belonged."

"Did the little boy select his dessert quickly and decisively?" I asked.

My friend smiled at me. "Don't be silly," he said. "He was still torn between strawberry and burnt almond ice cream when I left."

"That's the pay-off, isn't it?" I said. "Nagging corrodes the capacity to decide. The person being nagged is so expectant of doing the wrong thing that he dares not take responsibility for his choice."

He's been made so sure of disapproval of anything he does that he can't even assert his position on strawberry ice cream.

"Why do we nag?" I asked.

My friend is an unusually serene person. He lost a little calm now. He said, "It's momentum. The shove of the old need to prove we're a well-behaved child has been reshaped into a new need to prove that we're parents who know what's what for a child in a restaurant. It's our version of ancestor worship—to kowtow to inherited rules for 'good' behavior whose goodness we never had explained."

"It's the baby obedience of a parent who never once asked his own parent, 'Why is it bad to write on the tablecloth? Why is it good not to wriggle on my chair? Why do you approve of my keeping my feet still?'"

"Poor nagger," I said. "How lovely it would have been if he'd said, 'That chair must be uncomfortable for you, Jimmy. Come over here and sit on the bench beside me.' Or if he'd said, 'Here's my mechanical pencil. Scribble on this paper, son.'"

"He couldn't say that," said my friend, the psychiatrist. "The nagger doesn't see a person. All he sees are marks on tablecloths, litter on floors, unmade beds and wrongs that need to be righted. Kazak Tribesmen Flee Before Reds

NEW DELHI —(P)—During 1951, 375 Kazak tribesmen entered Kashmir after escaping from Communist-occupied Sinkiang Province of China, Indian Deputy Home Minister B. N. Datar says.

Datar says 172 of them have gone to Turkey, and six to Mecca. Twenty-five died, due to exhaustion after trekking across the most inhospitable Himalayan terrain and other causes.

The remaining 172 are still in Kashmir and the government of India is trying to afford facilities if they want to go to any other country for resettlement.

The government so far has spent \$9,030 on these refugees, Datar says.

Soviet Pays Swiss For Seized Property

BERN, SWITZERLAND —(P)—The Soviet Union's European satellites last year paid Switzerland more than \$10,000,000 compensation for Swiss property seized under Communist nationalization measures.

The annual report of the Swiss Political Department disclosed that Romania, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Poland were compensating the former Swiss owners of assets and property nationalized by the Communist governments, in accordance with agreements concluded with the Swiss government.

Swiss citizens whose property was seized in Yugoslavia were also receiving compensation, the report disclosed, but no compensation agreement could be reached with Bulgaria and East Germany.

Princes Are Paid Fabulous Salaries

NEW DELHI —(P)—Three hundred and eleven Indian princes receive an annual privy purse of \$11,263,770. It was announced officially in parliament.

The biggest of them all is the Nizam of Hyderabad, once reputed richest man in the world, who receives an annual privy purse of \$1,050,000 rupees as compensation for the surrender of his private lands.
