

Drouth Spurs Move To Keep STOP SIGNS MUST REDUCE Feed In Trench-Type Silos

Texas' prolonged drouth taught economy of conserving surplus feedtle. Absence of sufficient moisture last three years left many farmers no alternative to buying expensive feed in order to carry their herds through the Winter months. Coupled with a declinig market for beef animals this proved a costly undertaking. A number, however. sensing the trend planted sorghums suitable for feed and stored them for silage. Those having this re-serve readily Wintered their stock at nominal cost.

Early reports from county agricultural agents indicate farmers from East Texas to the Panhandle already are astir to grapple with the problem of assembling feed against possible recurrence of deficient grazing this Fall. The concensus favors the trench type silo as the best method of preserving feed. Its origin is obscure but it came into wider use in Texas than

were in service but with more adequate grazing in succeeding years many were not used. But rapid revival is suggested in plans of Donley County farmers to fill 150 of these containers this year with mixtures of honey drip cane. Atlas sorgo, hegari and johnson grass, and to double the number next year. Three of these farmers report carrying their stock on silage last Winter for the equivalent of \$20 a







Tank Dust' Feared **Lung Trouble Cause**

TEMPLE -(P)- Huge clouds of dust raised by maneuvering Army tanks may be responsible for the prevalence of two lung diseases in the Fort Hood area.

The diseases are coccidioidomycosis and histoplasmosis, fungus diseases of the lungs sometimes mistaken for tuberculosis

U. S. Public Health Service officers and members of the Bell County Health Unit staff are testing school chilrden in the Fort Hood area for presence of the disease. State Health department and Bell County Tuberculosis Association are cooperating.

Prevalence of the diseases in the

Fort Hood area already has caused some concern among army medical men, said Dr. Harry Frey, director of the Bell County Health Unit.

"Three fungae (causing the disease) are soil-born organisms," Dr. Frey explained, "and the huge dust clouds caused by tank maneuvers can reasonably be expected to drift over the area, bearing the diseases.

It often is said that the basis for good health in later life is laid dur-ing childhood. With this I agree phatically, and nowhere is it more important than in the care of the feet. The person who hobbles around in middle age with flat feet, bunions or other foot difficulties, often can trace the source to mistakes in shoeing during the earlier years of

Often special exercises are good as children). Walking in socks or stockings around a rug on the outer edge of the feet strengthens the arches, ankles and legs. Trying to pick up the edge of a rug, a pencil or marbles with the toes, also is a good exercise. Doing such exercises as these for a few minutes each
