HOW ABOUT THOSE CHIEFTAINS!!! What a season the Friona High School football team is having. Here it is the 12th week, and as Yogi Berra used to say, "It ain't over 'til it's over!"

This year's FHS team has really been fun to watch play, and to cover from a newsman's standpoint. The members of the team are as fine a group of young men as you'll ever find. They're a courteous, hard-working group which has advanced to their current position mainly through hard work and determination.

"A lot of folks counted us out after we lost to Littlefield, but the kids buckled down. They were determined to beat Tulia, and they did," says Coach Tommy Moss.

This year's team doesn't have a super-star. They all just have to work together to get the job done.

This is the 25th season for this writer to cover FHS football, and we've never seen a team with this much balance. On offense, there are four players who have scored between 45 and 74 points.

Running the ball, three members of the Chieftain backfield have averaged between 5.1 and 7.0 yards per carry. On over 450 carries, this trio (Phillips, Williams and Echols) are averaging right at six yards per carry and have scored 32 touchdowns.

Opponents can't key on any one of these, without opening it up for one of the other two.

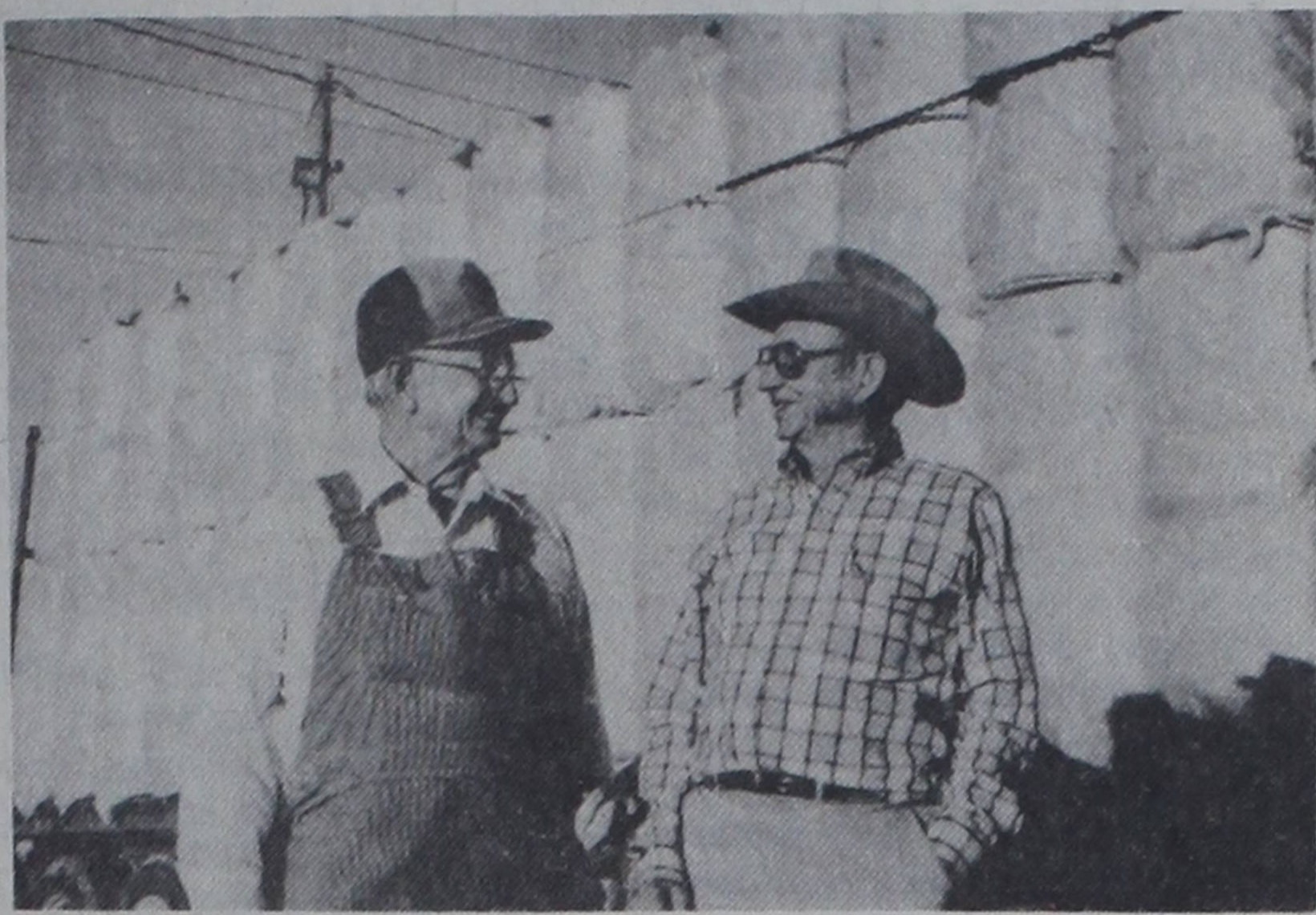
Defense is also one of the team's strong points. One of the two touchdowns against Perryton was scored by the defense. Shy Burney, who had the interception runback, has swiped 17 enemy passes during the last two seasons.

And in the kicking department, when the team gets beyond the 50 yard line, they expect that Sam Montoya could get a field goal, and with a 51-yarder to his credit and a near miss from 61 yards, they're right.

Trivia Department: The Amarillo Globe-News has staffed four Chieftain games, in which they are 4-0 on the year. The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal has covered two games, both of which the team lost. We offered to pay the Amarillo reporter's way to Brownfield, and also tried to find a polite way to ask Lubbock to let us call them the results.

More trivia: Head coach of Kermit is Randy Hicks, whose father, M.W. Hicks is a former Friona businessman. The elder Hicks owned and operated Hicks Plumbing, Heating and Air Conditioning here for a number of years. Randy was an all-state runningback in high school at Seminole.

Kermit hasn't always been in such a far-flung district. We understand that school officials there estimate that it takes 15,000 miles to travel for extra-curricular (including UIL) events.

Murder Suspect Is Nabbed In Florida

Rene Garcia was arrested Thursday morning, November 13 in Immokalee, Florida on a Parmer County warrant charge, capital murder, aggravated assault, aggravated kidnapping and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

He was also arrested on State of Texas warrant charged with violation of parole and a federal warrant, charged with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

Garcia was arrested following an anonymous tip to authorities.

Ida Sotelo, the 17-year-old girl he abducted at gun point, was still with him and unharmed.

Garcia has signed a waiver and arrangements have been made to transport him back to Parmer County within a week or ten days.

Police officers have been

investigating the case since last August 3, when a 25-year-old Muleshoe woman was found dead of a gunshot wound six miles west of Bovina. Christy Sotelo, 25, was found dead at the scene and had been shot in the chest.

Tonya Parkinson, 22, also of Muleshoe, was taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital by Bovina Ambulance after sustaining a gunshot wound to the back.

Sheriff's officers had been searching for the 22-year-old Spanish male in connection with the shootings and murder of Christy Sotelo, as well as the kidnapping of her 17-year-old sister, Ida Sotelo, at gunpoint. Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan said he had talked to Ida Sotelo following the apprehension of Garcia and she appeared to be fine.

Chiefs vs Kermit In Area Playoff

Team Goes By Charter

For the second week in a row, the Friona Chiefs will be taken to their playoff game on a chartered bus, courtesy of the Friona Booster Club.

The T.N.M.&O. charter carried the Chieftains to their game at Amarillo's Dick Bivins Stadium last Friday, and will do likewise this Friday when the team faces Kermit at Brownfield.

Games Are Re-Set

The Friona Squaws' junior varsity and varsity games against Olton, originally scheduled here Friday night, have been re-set for Saturday at 5 and 6:30 p.m. according to Coach Vicki Hatton.

In addition, in a following game, the Bovina boys will play Olton's boys here. Both of these teams were scheduled to have played the Friona Chieftains this week. The Chiefs' basketball season has been put on "hold" by the footballers' success.

Rev. White Resigns

Rev. Daymun White, pastor of Friona's First Baptist, has resigned his position as of the end of this month.

A church-wide lunch will be served at the Church's Fellowship Hall following morning worship services this Sunday to honor the Whites, who will be leaving Friona for Montana.

All members of the church are asked to attend, and to bring a covered dish.

Star Moves Date Up

Once again this week the Friona Star has printed early, to promote the Chieftains' football playoff game. All mail subscribers should receive their paper on Friday.

Next week will be another early week for the Star, win or lose, due to Thanksgiving. The deadline for news and advertising for next week's paper will be noon Wednesday.

Fresh from winning their first playoff game in history, the Friona Chieftains will "break new ground" on Friday when they hook up with the Kermit Yellowjackets in an area playoff game at Brownfield's Cubs Stadium. Game time is 8 p.m.

Although Kermit has a lesser record than the Chiefs at 7-4 for the season, Coach Tommy Moss feels the Yellowjackets are for real.

"We have a chance to win the game. If we'll get out and play our game, we can beat them. If we don't perform, then we'll have to scrap. We need to eliminate our mistakes. We made a bunch of mistakes last week, but were still able to win," Coach Moss says.

The Chieftain coach said that his team came up with the big play when they had to in their win over Perryton. "The kids showed a lot of character, coming back to make the long winning drive."

Kermit, a 7-0 winner over Lubbock Roosevelt in their bi-district game, is a team that relies mostly on defense. Moss said that the Yellowjackets are outstanding on defense, and adequate on offense.

Their backs are small and quick. "They don't have a McKinley," the Chieftain coach quipped, in reference to Perryton's 215-pound running back that gained over 200 yards against the Chiefs.

On offense, Kermit features the option play, from a wishbone formation, with quarterback Abel Carrasco running the option. Carrasco is the team's leading ground-gainer, and according to Moss, the Kermit coaching staff would rather that he be able to keep the ball.

"We're going to have to get to him quick and make him pitch it," Moss said.

Kermit was runnerup in District 4-3A, with a 4-1 record. Their lone district loss was to Crane, 18-2. The Yellowjackets scored easy wins over other district foes Alpine, 35-0, Fabens, 36-6, Greenwood (Midland), 32-6 and Clint, 38-6.

In non-district games, Kermit won over Artesia, N.M., 8-7, and over El Paso Cathedral, 41-0. They lost to Denver City, 35-7, Pecos, 20-14 and Lovington, N.M., 31-7.

Meanwhile, the Chieftains had some anxious hours early in the week when leading rusher Lonnie Phillips missed workouts on Monday and Tuesday.

Phillips suffered a bruised knee in the Perryton game (actually prior to the game), and was taken to a specialist in Amarillo for a check-up. It turned out just to be a bruise. In addition, he developed a stomach virus, and ran a high temperature Tuesday night.

However, Phillips was able to work out with the team on Wednesday, and was hoping to be near full-strength by Friday.

Fullback Jimmy Williams (second leading rusher) added to the drama by slightly pulling a leg muscle toward the end of Tuesday's workout. However, Coach Moss said that Williams was running about full speed on Wednesday.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 13, 1936
 Bob Clements of Albany, who formerly owned the Clements Tailor Shop here, but who a few months ago purchased a larger shop at Albany, was here Tuesday and moved the stock of men's furnishings to his store in Albany. The shop here has been under the management of Roy Clements, and will continue so.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1941
 Announcing an allotment of \$148,000 for the construction of 213 miles of new REA electricity lines in Texas, H.V. Hennen, project supervisor, stated that approximately 50 miles of this new allotment will be placed in Parmer County. When the new construction is completed, approximately 300 miles of REA line will be served through the Parmer sub station.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1946
 Last Friday night in a football game with Tulia, the Chieftains crowned their football queen, Miss Marcia Lutrell of the junior class. The pep squad, dressed in their red and white uniforms, formed a heart on the playing field. The queen and her attendants wore white. The queen was crowned by Dean Hall, captain of the football team. Tulia prevailed in the game by a score of 32-0.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1951
 Survey work was commenced today on the new fire station for Friona, with actual construction to follow immediately. All bids recently were rejected by the city commissioners, and decision was made for the city to construct the building themselves.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1956
 Texas agreed with the nation in returning President Eisenhower to his second term of office in the general election Tuesday, but it was a different story in predominantly-agricultural Parmer County. Here, Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver, the Democratic nominees for the nation's two highest offices, took a clear cut victory. Democrats won

in Friona by a 434-356 margin. Countywide, the count was 1372 votes for Stevenson-Kefauver and 1028 for Eisenhower-Nixon.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1961
 An all-out drive to enroll the 20 additional members necessary before the construction of the Country Club House can begin will commence December 14, according to Andy Hurst, club president.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 10, 1966
 Friona and Parmer County voters turned out in heavy numbers for a non-presidential voting year to help return Senator John Tower to Washington and to favor Congressman-elect Bob Price. City and county voters gave both of the Republican candidates a surprisingly heavy majority. Seven of the eight precincts voted for the two candidates. In Friona, Tower out-pulled Waggoner Carr, 446-226, and won the county vote, 1084-651. Price's margins were 476-179 in Friona and 1161-569 county-wide over Democrat Dee Miller.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1971
 The procedure for purchasing right of way and making other necessary adjustments preliminary to the beginning of construction on the overpass for Highway 214 was discussed and outlined by right of way officials from the Texas Highway Department with city and county officials here last Thursday. The highway officials turned over to the City of Friona six tracts of land which have been approved by the State Highway Department for participation on the 50-50 right of way purchase, and two for the county.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1976
 Clay Bandy moved to a commanding five point lead in the race for grand prize in the Friona Star's football contest, coming up with a score of 16 for last week to

tally 158 for the cumulative ten week total.

Curtis Murphree brought the first bale of cotton which was ginned at Friona at the Co-op Gin on November 2.

An award certificate went to a Friona resident out of a total of 113 employees honored Tuesday night, November 9, by Southwestern Public Service Company at a service awards dinner in Amarillo for service ranging from five to 35 years.

Joining the quarter-century club with 25 years' service was Billy R. Wilshire who was presented his emblem for service by Berl M. Springer, president and chief operating officer of Southwestern Public Service Company.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 22, 1981
 The Friona Library Board met Thursday afternoon and voted to build a new library building, rather than purchase a building.

The library has been offered the lot behind City Hall and Bi-Wize Drug, which has been used for parking for a number of years, as a gift from Friona State Bank, on which to build a library building.

Since it was to be the last football meeting between Friona and Olton for awhile, the Chieftains decided to make the game a memorable one. Especially senior tailback Nelson Jackson, who was in quest of enough yardage to reach the 1,000-yard plateau for the year. Jackson romped for 189 yards, enough to reach his goal, and scored two touchdowns to lead the Chieftains past the Mustangs, 20-0 in the last game of the 1981 season.

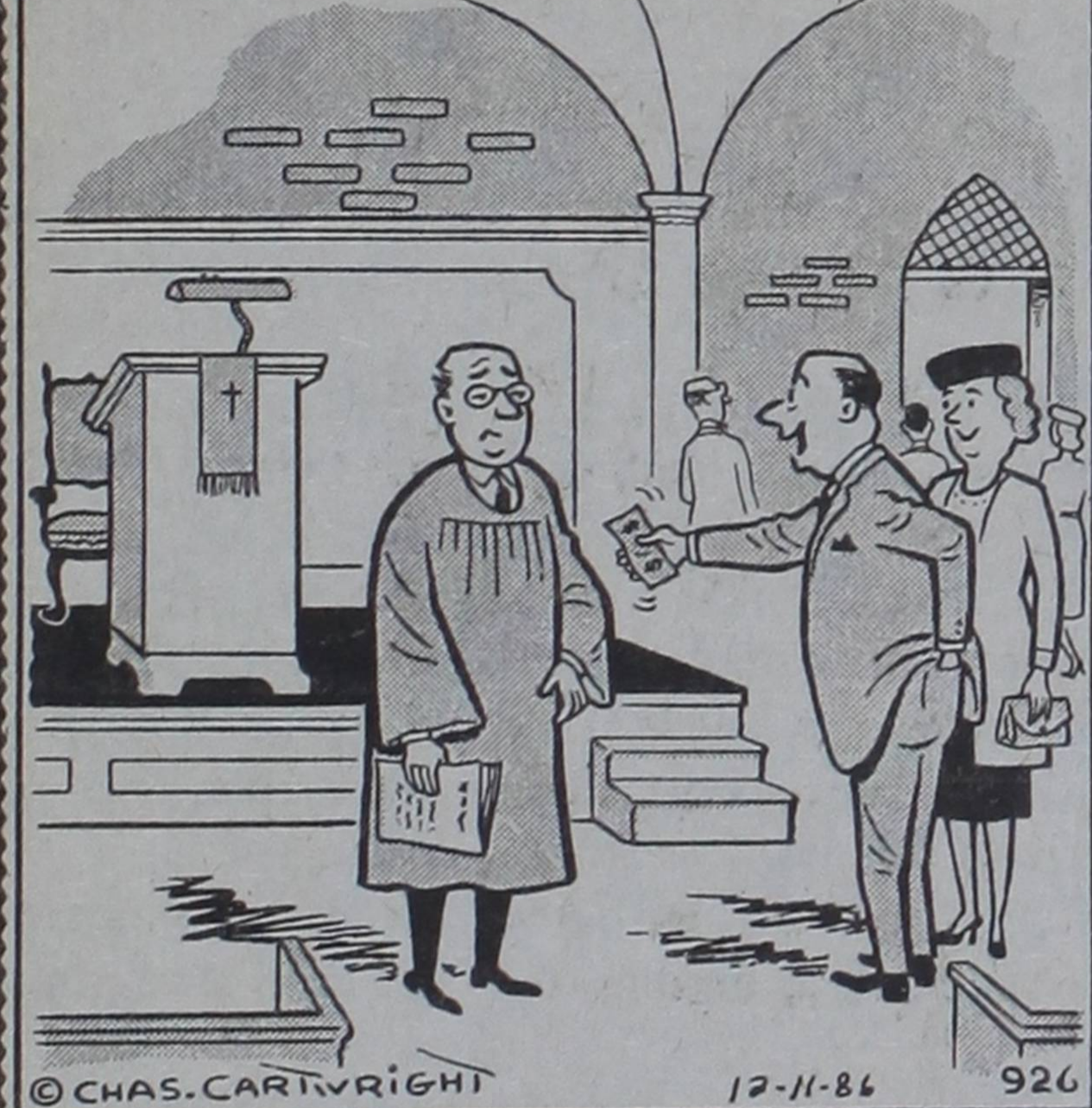

The Revs. J.L. Bass and Pat Riley officiated with burial at the Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery.

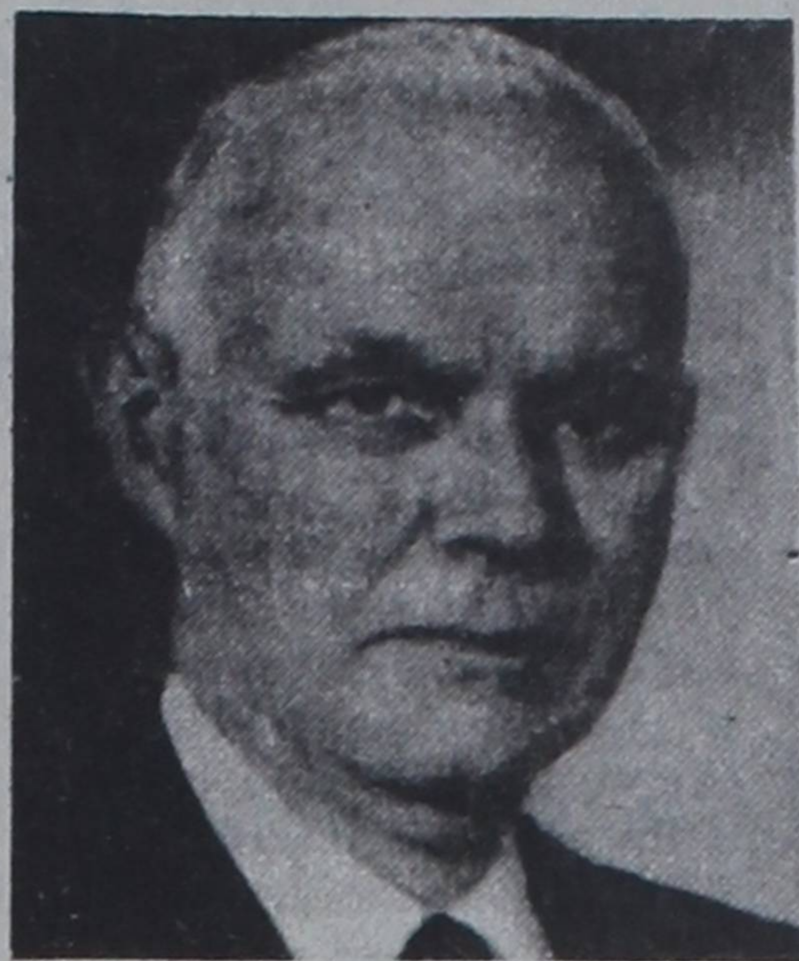
Anderson died Sunday, November 16, 1986 in Clovis. He was born January 17, 1892 in Okolona, Arkansas.

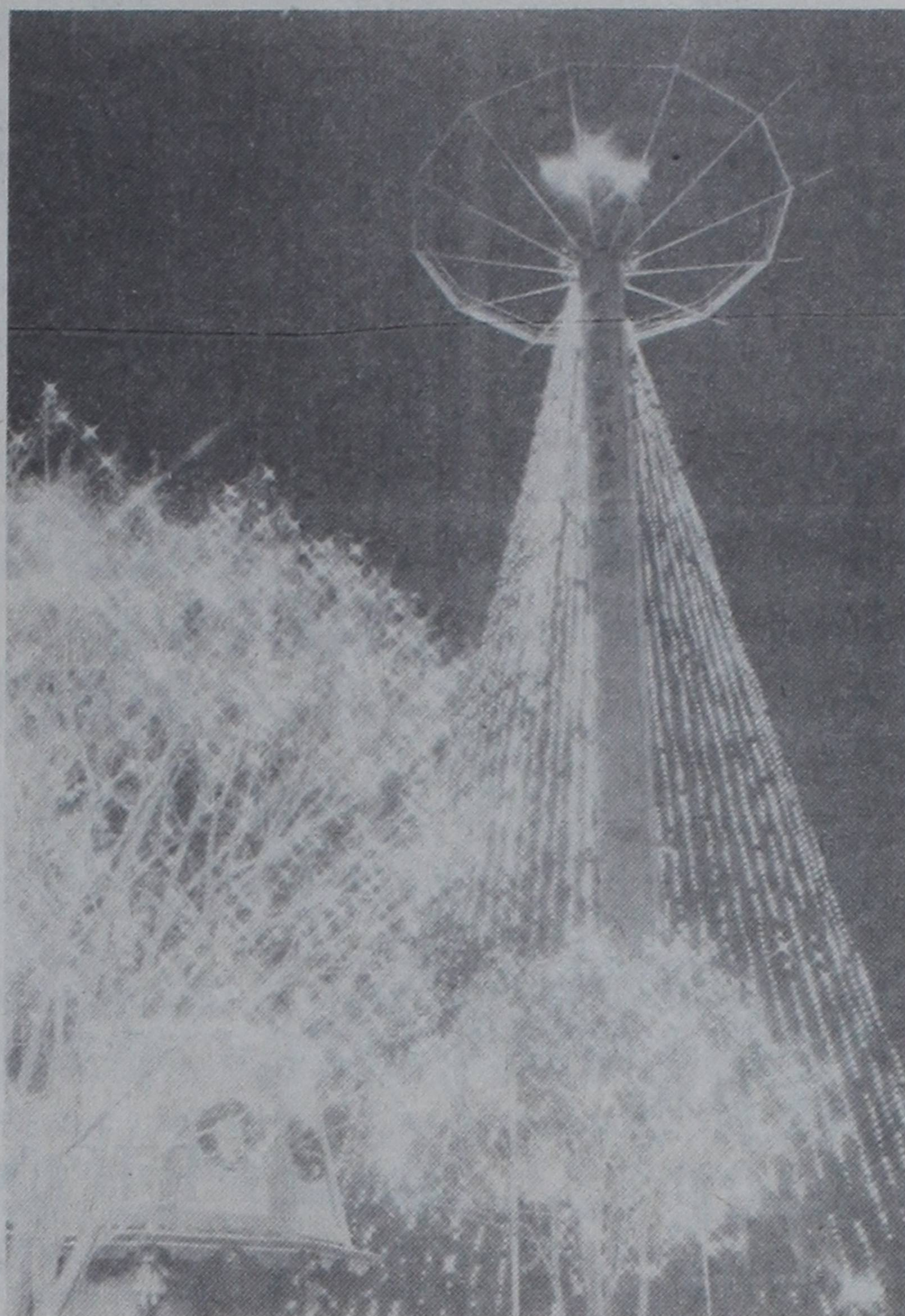

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Chiefs Edge Perryton For Bi-District Win

Friona High School's Chieftains finally broke the playoff "jinx," and they did it in dramatic fashion.

The Chieftains scored a come-from-behind, 14-10 win over the Perryton Rangers last Friday evening at Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo. It was a class 3A bi-district game.

Chieftain teams had made it to the playoffs five times prior to last Friday, and each time they had been turned away. This time it turned out different, but not without some last-quarter heroics that left Chieftain fans in a state of frenzy.

Junior quarterback Daniel Echols outran the Perryton defenders on a two-yard bootleg play around right end with 9:36 left in the game, giving the Chiefs a lead they protected the rest of the way.

Echols' run came on a fourth down play, and it followed an unusual set of circumstances which saw place-kicker Sam Montoya kick a 32-yard field goal that would have tied the score at 10-all, only to see the Chieftains refuse the field goal because Perryton was offside. This gave Friona a first and goal at the ten yard line.

"We had to go for the touchdown," said a happy Tommy Moss following the game. "If the game had ended up in a tie, both teams had three penetrations, but they had us by four first downs," Moss said.

On tie games in high school playoffs, the penetration figure is the first tie-breaker, followed by first downs.

Perryton unleashed their 210-pound stellar tailback, Mike McKinley, on the Chieftains, and he almost proved to be too much for Friona. McKinley gained a staggering 242 yards against the Chieftains on 40 carries, but could manage only one touchdown for all of his yardage.

The Chieftain defense, although it "bent" considerably when McKinley was carrying the ball, never would break, and consistently came up with an

outstanding defensive play, just when the team needed one.

Friona took the opening kickoff, and made an impressive drive after Echols returned the kick from two yards in the end zone out to the 22.

With the Chieftains' three-pronged offensive attack of Williams, Phillips and Echols clicking like a well-oiled machine, the team moved upfield.

Even a holding penalty didn't slow the drive, when Phillips answered with a 14-yard gallop behind excellent blocking.

Williams then uncorked a 14-yard gain of his own, shedding tacklers as he went, moving the ball to the Perryton 26.

At this point, however, the Ranger defense dug in. Echols hit Phillips with a six-yard pass on third down, and the team faced fourth and one from the Perryton 17.

Friona called time out to discuss their strategy. The call was to pass up the field goal and try for the yardage. But Williams was stopped inches short after the measurement, and Perryton took over.

"We felt that if we could get into the end zone and take the lead, it would give us the momentum," Coach Moss explained.

However, by missing out on scoring points on the good drive, this seemed to fire up the Rangers.

Friona had controlled the ball for 5:37 of clock time.

The Rangers took the ball, and kept it for the next six minutes. McKinley sparked the drive, with a 31-yard burst up the middle. A saving tackle by Rod Britting at the Friona 38 saved a touchdown, as Britting forced the Perryton star out of bounds.

Perryton moved to just outside the Friona ten with a new set of downs. Two plays gained five yards, and on third down the quarterback, Derek Holmes, went back to pass. Brent Riethmayer rushed Holmes, whose pass fell incomplete.

That forced the Rangers to go for a field goal, which was good for 23 yards, and Perryton had a 3-0 lead. Only 27 seconds remained in the quarter, as the two opening drives had used up the period.

Friona couldn't gain on its next two possessions, but the Chieftain defense also stiffened. The Chiefs forced a Perryton punt on the Rangers' second possession, and then on their third try, the defense came up with one of those spectacular plays.

Holmes again went for a pass, but he didn't see Shy Burney over the middle. Burney ran in front of the ball, catching it at about the Perryton 35 on the dead run. With the Rangers' momentum going the other way, Burney easily trotted into the end zone, for Friona's first score of the game.

Sam Montoya came out to add the point-after, and Friona had taken a 7-3 lead with 5:30 left in the half.

Perryton answered the challenge. The Rangers went 80 yards in only eight plays. McKinley carried every time except for a 13-yard pass to Damon Whitt. McKinley scored on an outstanding 32-yard run, taking the pitchout from Holmes. He hurdled a couple of prone bodies at about the Friona 15-yard-line, and scampered into the end zone.

The point-after made the score Perryton 10, Friona 7. The Chieftains had enjoyed the lead for only 3:12 of clock time.

Things almost unravelled for the Chieftains on the kickoff when the kicker got a high, spiraling kick that landed in an open zone. Perryton's charging lineman recovered the ball at the Friona 29, and things got scary in a hurry.

But the Chieftain defense again rose to the occasion. McKinley was thrown for a yard loss--his only loss of the night, and on third down, the big tailback took a pitchout and then tried a pass.

McKinley should have stuck with what he does best--running the football. His wobbly pass was

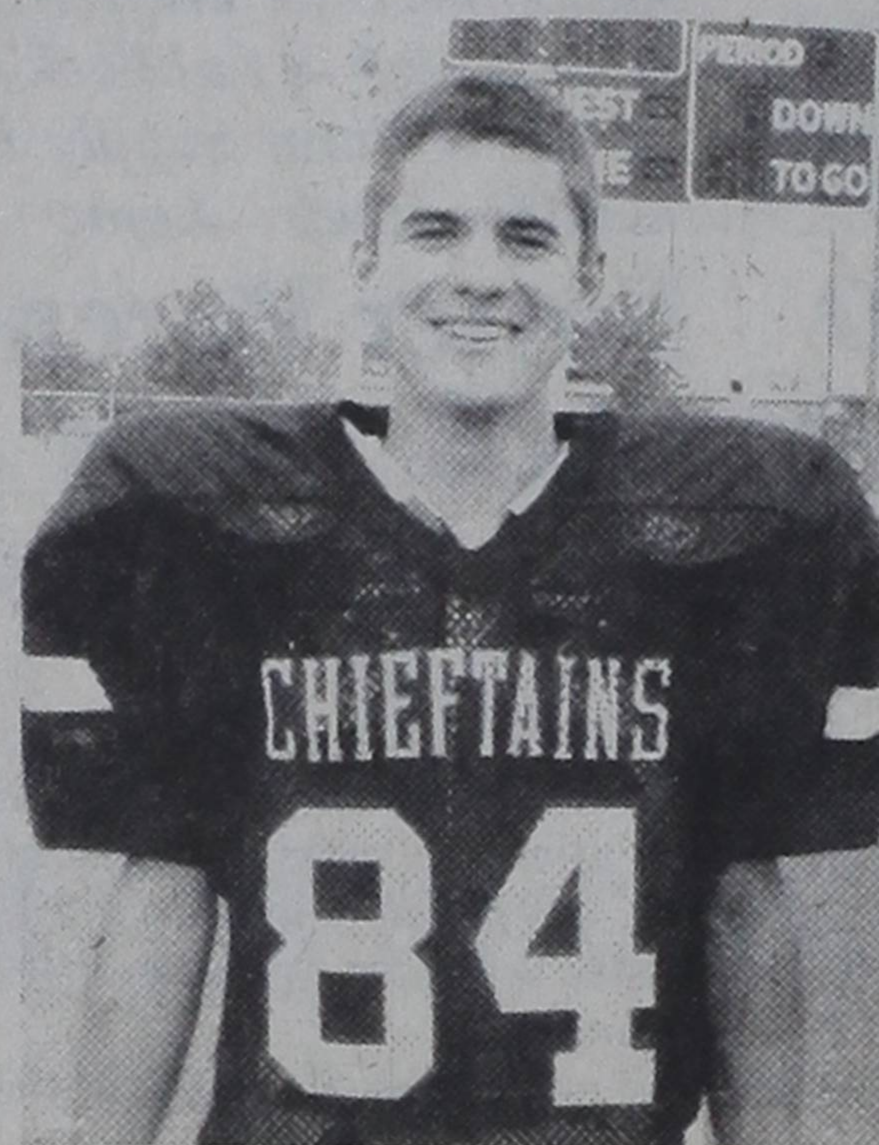

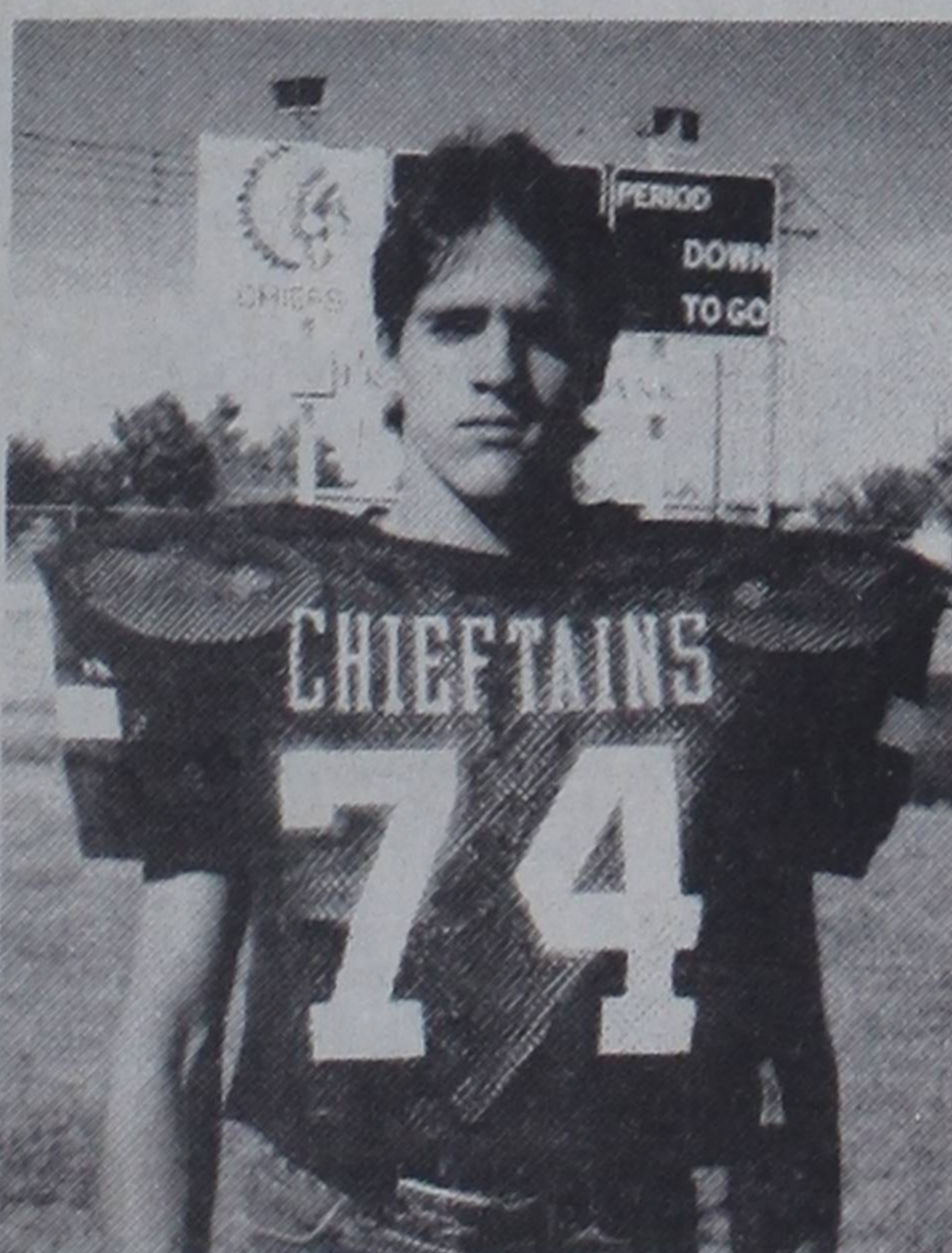
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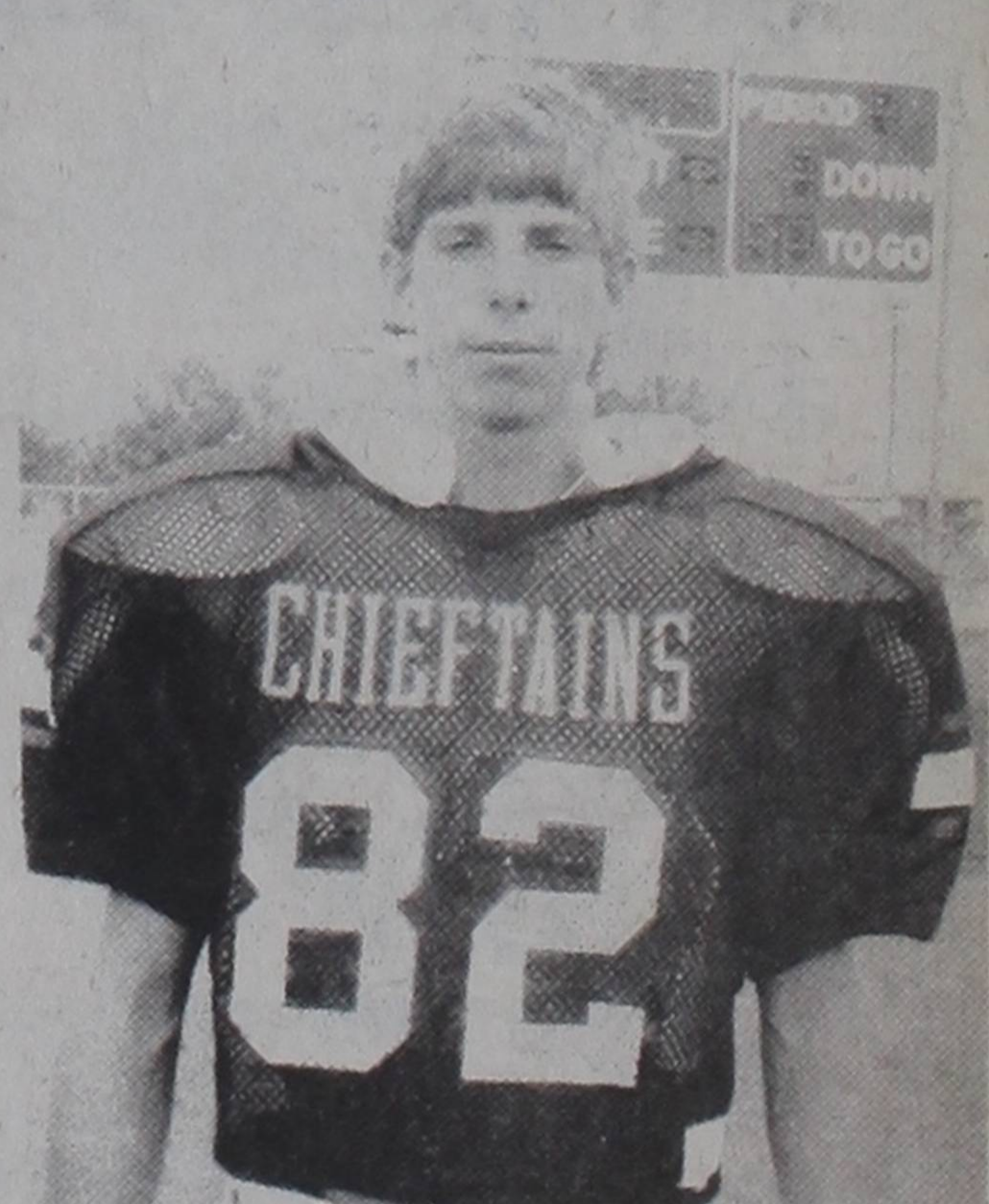

picked off by Stephen Thornton at the Friona ten, and he returned it to the 19 yard line with just 1:28 left on the clock.

This wasn't all of the first-half excitement. As if to say to the Rangers "We have that play in our playbook, too," Echols pitched the ball to wingback Burney, who lofted a pass. Just like before, the pass was intercepted, and Perryton had the ball back with 18 seconds left, at the Friona 44.

Burney redeemed himself two plays later when Holmes lofted a long pass toward the end zone with time expiring. The Chieftain defensive star caught the ball at about the goal-line, in front of the would-be receiver, and fell into the end zone for a touchback. Friona got the ball at its own 20, and thanks to Burney's play had again dodged the bullet.

A point of interest is the fact that for his entire season, Holmes had suffered only four interceptions in 88 previous passing attempts.

The Chieftains ruined that record by picking off three passes in one quarter. One of the thefts (Burney's) was turned into Friona's only first-half points, and both of the other two prevented touchdowns.

Burney's return might be termed a 14-point swing, and if the other two prevented two touchdowns, you might say that the Friona interceptions were "worth" 28 points to the team.

The first half had been exciting, but that was not to be all of the big plays, not by a long shot.

Perryton took the second half kickoff and with McKinley romping for gains of 11, 10 and 12 yards, moved steadily down field. It looked to be a sure scoring drive.

However, on a play from the Friona 36, defensive tackle Will Eddins popped the ball out of McKinley's hands, caught it in mid-air, and set out toward the other end of the field. Eddins was tackled after about a 27-yard ramble on his first-ever run with the ball. The Chieftain defender fumbled as he was tackled, but Friona recovered at the Perryton 38, and the Rangers' threat to keep the game's momentum must have at least been staggered.

Friona could have taken the lead

after Eddins' steal, but couldn't convert the break. On fourth down, Echols fired a strike to tight end Rusty Rainey, but Rainey was popped by a Perryton defender, and couldn't hold the ball.

Perryton again initiated a drive. Holmes hit Damon Whitt on a 39-yard play all the way to the Friona 22. McKinley gained five yards in two tries, but the Rangers were hit with a holding penalty, which moved the ball back to the 26.

That forced an incomplete pass on third down, and when Mike Blundell tried his second field goal it was partially blocked by Albert Trevino, to leave the score at 10-7, the same as it had been at halftime.

The Chieftain offense must have fired up. The team again faced a fourth and one from the Perryton 44, but made it this time when Williams' second-effort moved the ball just enough for the first down.

Perryton had helped things along by roughing up Williams on a short pass completion to the sideline, and the Rangers were hit with a 15-yard penalty.

Phillips got his longest run of the night, a 20-yarder, following some good blocks, and moved the ball down to the Perryton 23.

Williams gained one, Echols three and Phillips four. The third quarter expired with the Chiefs facing fourth and two from the Ranger 15.

Montoya was sent in, and kicked a beauty that split the uprights from 32 yards out. This was where the Ranger defense was offside.

Coach Moss surprised many in the press box by taking the penalty instead of the points. But the decision turned out to be the right one.

Echols ran his bootleg play on fourth down, and Montoya's kick gave Friona the lead, 14-10, with 9:36 left in the game.

Perryton picked up three first downs to the Friona 43, but McKinley had the ball knocked loose and the Chiefs recovered.

Friona couldn't move, and Montoya came in to get a vital 49-yard punt that bounced just right for the Chieftains, showing Perryton back to its 18 with 4:21 left to play.

The Rangers converted a fourth down play, and then got the benefit of a close call on a pass

play that the receiver scooped up off the turf as the clock wound down to the 2:31 mark.

Two plays gained eight for McKinley, and on fourth down, quarterback Holmes tried to move outside, but was tackled by the swarming Friona defense for a yard loss, and that was the ball game at the 1:40 mark.

Echols ran 17 yards on the keeper play to help run out the clock.

It's hard to figure that you were outgained by 204 total yards and yet played better defense than the other team. But the Chieftains came up with the play when they had to have it, and Perryton didn't.

The win left the Chieftains' record at 9-2 for the season, a new all-time high for wins in a single season at Friona High School.

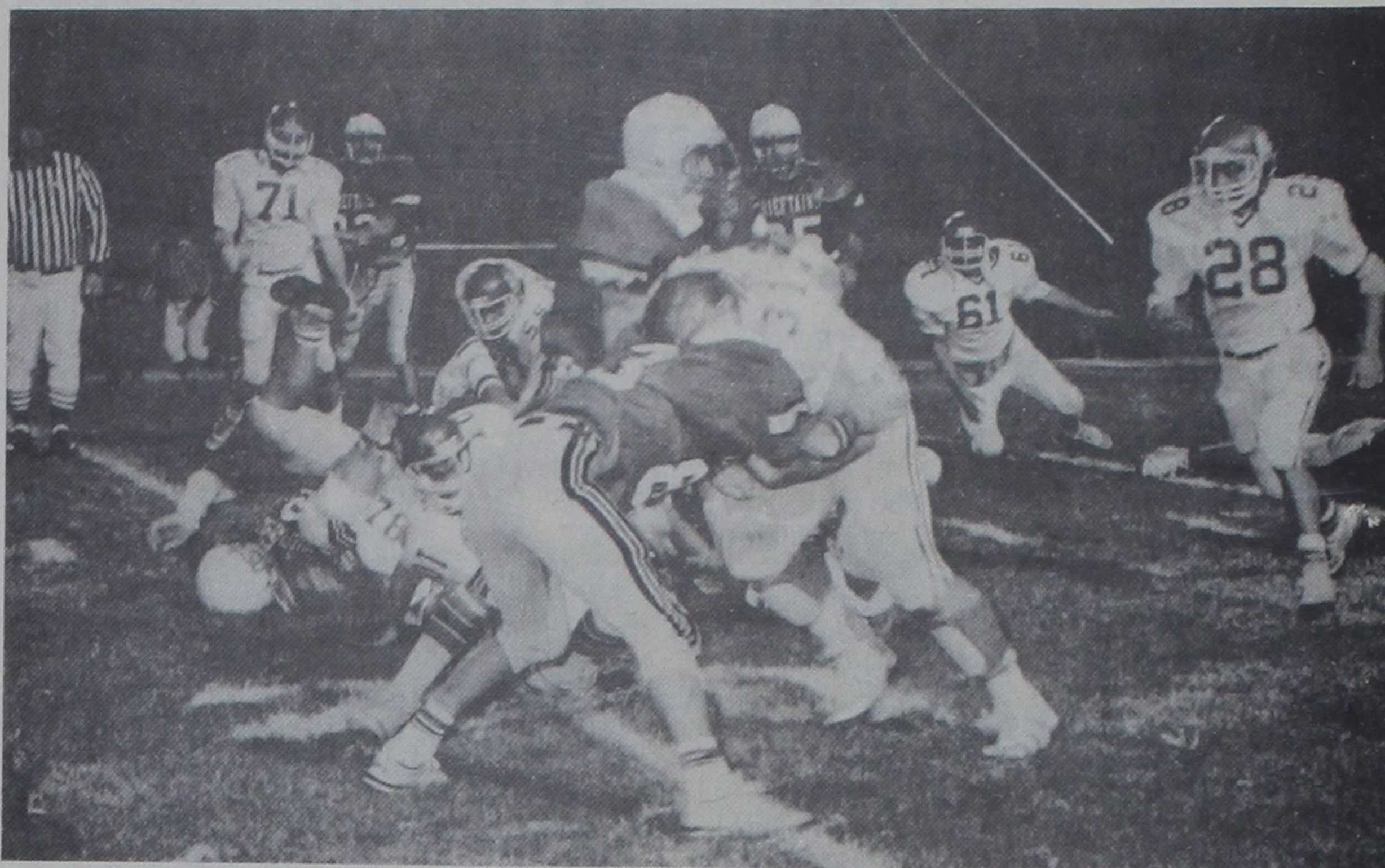

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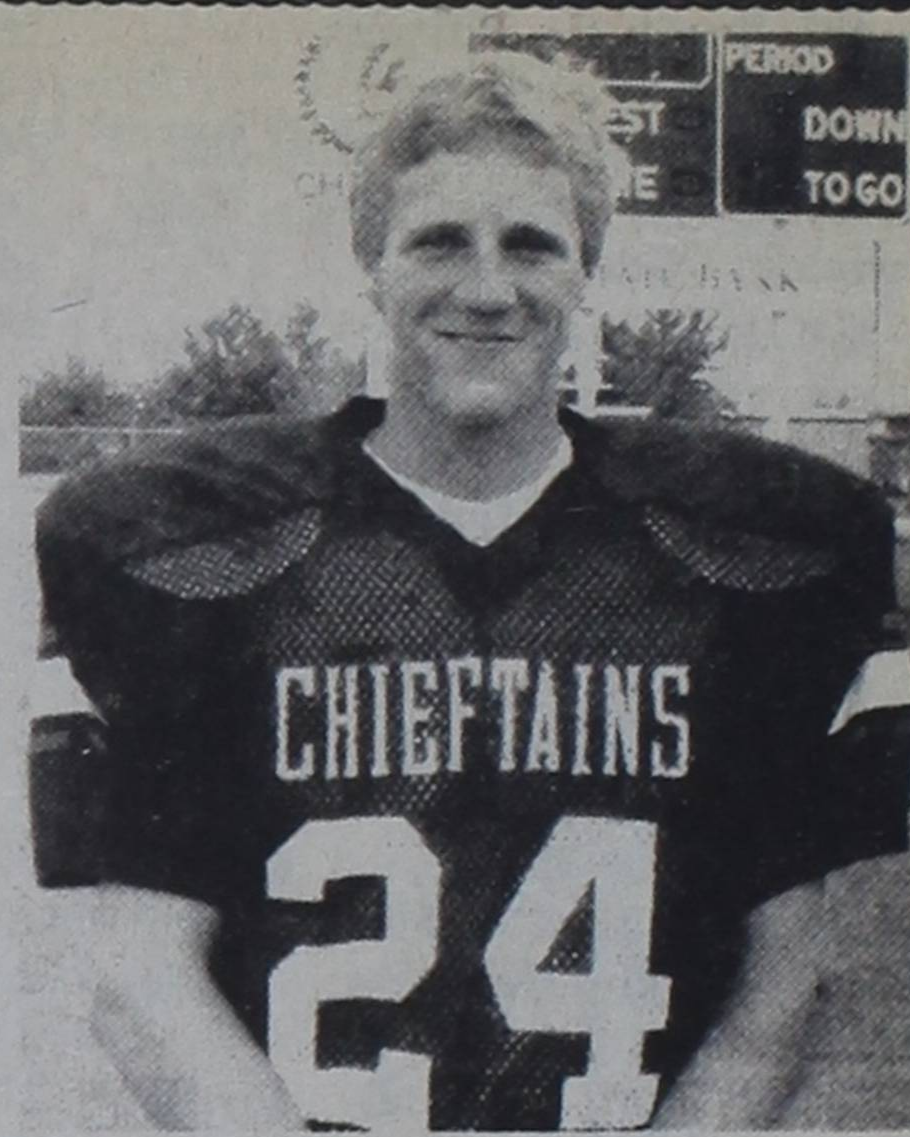

On September 5, 1980, he had a 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against the Tulia Hornets. On September 25, 1981, Jackson sprinted 93 yards on a play from scrimmage to score against the Farwell Steers.

Total yardage for the three runs is 297, or an average of 99 yards per carry. Someone may someday break the kickoff or run from scrimmage record, but it's going to be hard to improve on the 109-yarder or combination of 297 yards.
