THIS WEEK, YE EDITOR decided to appoint himself spokesperson for the entire community, and say a big THANK YOU and CONGRATULATIONS to the Friona Chieftains, for their outstanding football season.

What a pleasure it has been to follow this team. You have given your fans more thrills this season than any they can ever remember.

For one thing, you gave them a chance to watch not one but two outstanding playoff games. And as everyone who saw the game knows, you should have won the Kermit game, 13-12, and still be in the playoff bracket.

Your outstanding play and never-say-die attitude have been a source of pride for your followers.

In fact, your success this fall has helped members of the community forget about the bad economy, and the problems they face from day to day--the depressed situation in agriculture, and whatever else may have been plaguing local residents.

For the past 12 weeks, we have been able to forget about all of these problems at least one day and night a week (more than that for some of us who live and eat football), while we have discussed and debated your chances against the particular week's opponent.

If not before then, at least since the big win over Tulia, the football team has been the main item of discussion at coffee breaks, or anywhere-two or more fans were gathered together.

We have savored your successes along with you. You have had some really great performances, including the exciting win over Pampa in the Homecoming game, the great "have to" win over Tulia, the first-ever bi-district win over Perryton, and the area playoff game against Kermit.

In this latter game, we suffered along with you. It was a real heart-breaker for your fans as well as yourselves, because we knew you deserved to win. But you each gave it your best shot, and that's all you can ask.

Archie Echols said something that bears repeating. He said, "When you get in the playoffs, it's sort of a bad situation, because unless you're the one team that goes all the way and wins state, your season has to end with a loss. And you're more apt to remember that loss than all of the good things that happened along the way."

We need to emphasize and remember the good things, and good times we had along with this bunch of young men, because they far outnumber this one loss.

WE REMEMBER this week the comment by Joe Harris of the Harris Rating System, after Coach Tommy Moss sent in his pre-season survey. The coaches were asked to rate their teams versus their district opponents.

Coach Moss stated on his questionnaire that he thought the Chieftains could beat either Littlefield or Tulia and make the playoffs.

In his first report, Harris quoted Coach Moss' prediction, and added: "What's old Tommy been smoking, anyway?"

From this vantage point, it looks as though Coach Moss had his team, and its chances in district sized up about right. We haven't seen a retraction from Mr. Harris, so we thought we'd print one.

Jayn Looper Takes Lead In Contest

Jayn Looper tallied a score of 19 for the 12th week of the Friona Star's football contest, to move into first place in the overall contest standings.

Danny Stevens had a score of 17, and Charlie Morgan had a 16, to move into a tie for second place in the standings with scores of 188.

Pheasant Population Down For '86 Season

The pheasant season for 1986 will be held from December 13-28, but according to game officials, hunters may be in for a tougher time of getting their birds than usual.

Jack Patterson, spokesman for the Parmer County Game Assn., said that in the Rhea area, the pheasant crop does not look good at all.

"It's the fewest pheasants we've had since we started hunting them," said Patterson, adding that he was at a loss to know the reason why, except that the hatch of new birds in the past two or three years appears to have been much less than normal.

Game warden Chuck Cosper of Hereford indicates that northern Parmer County and Deaf Smith County have a lot less pheasants than normal. On the other hand, Cosper says that southern Parmer County and Castro County may have closer to an average population of pheasants.

Cosper says that the difference in the number of birds is the fact that the southern areas had more rain in the spring, and this appeared to have helped the hatch. The northern areas did not have the spring rain enjoyed by the other sections.

"I'm afraid a lot of people may be disappointed with the pheasant season," Patterson says. "I have 480 acres, and I'll bet you couldn't find three cocks on the whole place," he says.

Patterson said that in some past years it has not been uncommon to see the pheasant hens with numerous small chicks following after them. This year, he said, when you saw the hens, they were more apt to have only three or four chicks in their brood.

The longtime Parmer County game enthusiast told of having a field of irrigated wheat next to his house a couple of years ago. Usually at harvest time, you see bunches of pheasants. But when the wheat was cut, harvesters only counted 16 to 18 hens, two or three

cocks, and didn't see a single young pheasant.

Patterson said he felt that the declining population was due entirely to the bad hatch, and not to over-hunting. "If you have a good hatching season, you'll have plenty of birds," he says.

Outdoorsmen have come up with possible reasons for the bad hatch season. Some have mentioned the use of insecticides. However, Patterson points out that in the Rhea area, farmers use much less insecticides than they do

farther south. So, if the chemicals were affecting the pheasants, there should be more of them to the north, instead of vice-versa.

Others think the population may have been adversely affected by the coyotes. Jay Potts told Patterson recently he saw a pack of coyotes with eight animals in the pack.

For whatever reason, hunters may find that getting their bird is somewhat tougher this year.

Limits for the season are two cocks per day and four in possession.

Chieftains Honored On All-District

District 2-3A's two playoff teams, Littlefield and Friona, along with third place Tulia, hogged the all-district team selections, announced this week by the district coaches.

Each of the top three teams in district landed eight spots on the first teams offense and defense, a testimony of the excellent talent on the district contenders. The district's other three teams: Floydada, Dimmitt and Muleshoe, each had one spot each on first team selections.

Pacing the Friona selections were senior tackle Jeff Chaney, runningback/cornerback Lonnie Phillips and kicker/punter Sam Montoya, each of whom were named both to the first team offense and defense.

On defense, the three Chieftains were unanimous choices: Chaney at one of the lineman positions; Phillips at cornerback and Montoya as punter.

Safety Shy Burney, who gathered in seven pass interceptions and paced the team in that category as well as punt returns, and linebacker Rusty Rainey were the other Chieftains named to the first team defense.

A tribute to Friona's excellent defensive play is the fact that the Chieftains led the first-team selections with five spots, to Littlefield's four and Tulia's three.

On offense, runningback Phillips, the district's leading rusher, was tapped for that position as a first-teamer. He was joined by Chaney at a lineman's spot and Montoya as the kicker.

Montoya kicked eight consecutive field goals during the regular season, and added two of two in post-season play.

Another testimony of the abundance of talent is the fact that runningback Jimmy Williams, who finished the season with over 900 yards rushing, had to settle for second-team honors at his position.

Edging Williams out on the first team were Tulia's three-year starter Steven Powell and Littlefield's Steve Lair.

Friona linemen Jerry McDowell and Shane Hand nabbed two of the four lineman spots on the second team offense, and Rainey also made that team as a tight end.

Hand rounded out the top-two team selections by being chosen as second team lineman on defense.

Another indication of the competitiveness for honors is the fact that quarterback Daniel Echols, who guided the team into the playoffs, had to settle for honorable mention in the quarterback race, deferring to upper-classmen Todd Lacey of Tulia (first team) and Littlefield's Mark Ellis (second team).

Ellis edged Echols for the second-team spot by one vote, according to Coach Tommy Moss.

Other Chieftains with honorable mention spots, meaning that they were considered for the all-district team and received votes for their spots, were Tracy Carthel on offense; Will Eddins, joined by Chaney at a lineman's spot and Montoya as the kicker.

The date for Santa's annual visit to Friona has been set for Monday, December 8, according to Kathy Beard, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

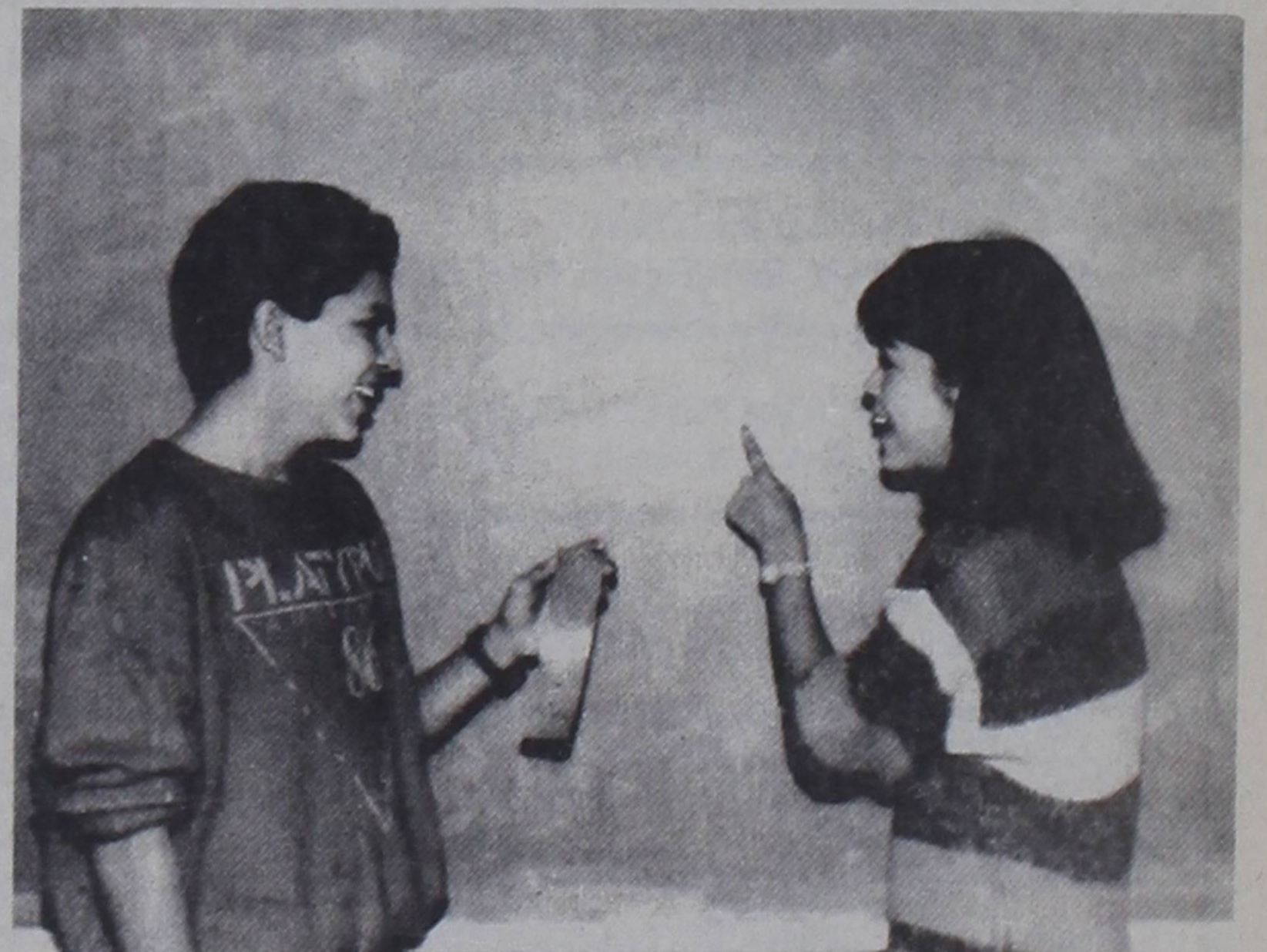

Friona Flashbacks

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1931

O.F. Lange, manager of Rockwell Bros. & Company lumber dealers at this place, received a telegram Tuesday morning informing him of the peaceful passing away of Mr. J.M. Rockwell at an early hour that morning at his home in Houston. Rockwell was president of Rockwell Bros. & Co., which has had business interests in Friona almost from the time of the founding of the town.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 20, 1936

About 16 Friona people took advantage of the Santa Fe Railroad's extremely low round trip rates from the various points in Parmer County to the Centennial grounds at Dallas last week. Two whole days were allowed for visiting the centennial, and the roundtrip fare from Friona was \$4.75.

A few coops of turkeys have arrived on the Friona market within the past ten days.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 21, 1941

The collapse of a large water supply tank at the Blackwell Hardware and Furniture Store Tuesday night caused severe damage to a transformer bank on the lines of the Texas-New Mexico Utilities Co. and shattered some boards on the rear wall of the Rockwell Bros. Lumber shed. The tank and tower, one of the landmarks of Friona, was constructed by Logan Sympton and Fred White some time in the early twenties.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1946

E.L. Price, one of Friona's pioneer barbers, who, some time ago sold his shop here to Ralph Taylor, and has recently been working in a shop at Hereford, has purchased a shop at McLean and has taken charge of it.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl C. Maurer, who flew to Colorado City, Colorado about two weeks ago, to visit their daughters who are attending college there, became snowbound and were forced to remain several days, returned

home the latter part of last week.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1951

A large group of citizens of Precinct 1 met with the County Commissioners Court today for the second time this week, asking the audience to hear the plea for an independent road district to follow the boundaries of the precinct. The proposed district would in no way be detrimental to the county road program, rather enabling state approved construction and releasing the local road funds for additional roadwork in other precincts.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1956

For the first time in several months, Friona has a telephone service man. Since Everett Talley moved away early in the summer, efforts have been made by the Chamber of Commerce to get someone to replace him. Many Friona residents will welcome D.G. McClellan, who moved to Friona from Littlefield last week.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 16, 1961

Funeral services for Samuel J. Green, 34, junior high school teacher and coach, were conducted at the First Baptist Church at 10 a.m. Tuesday. Mr. Green, who moved to Friona from the Three Way community in Bailey County, was in his sixth year of teaching here.

Blowing snow and sleet began falling late Monday afternoon and in addition to stopping combines, motor cars, pickups and other vehicles, either stopped or had to proceed at a slow pace.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1966

Official steps were taken the past week, by city and county governments in seeking highway improvements for State Highway 214 south of Friona, and District Highway Engineer, O.L. Crain, indicates that the road will be considered in next year's program for the district. Both bodies submitted resolutions; the city asked that an overpass be constructed across the railroad linking the highway into Grand

Avenue.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 18, 1971

The Hub Exchange (265) of the West Texas Rural Telephone Exchange was converted to Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) on Monday morning of this week, making both the Hub and Parmer exchanges available for "One Plus" dialing. The completion of the Hub system sets the stage for the conversion in Friona, which is scheduled for Saturday, December 4, making all the immediate Friona area on the DDD system.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 21, 1976

A.W. Anthony, Jr. of Friona, was honored Thursday at the first Annual Golden Spread Agri-Business Seminar by being named as the Outstanding High Plains Farmer and-or Rancher for 1976. Anthony is the first High Plains resident to receive the award.

Garvin Thorn of Friona received the American Farmer Degree November 11, at special ceremonies held during the 49th National Convention of the Future Farmers of America in Kansas City, Missouri. He was one of 748 members selected to receive the American Farmer Degree, highest degree of membership in the FFA. As a holder of the American Farmer Degree, he joins a select group representing about one per cent of all FFA members.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1981

Bill Wilshire, manager of Southwestern Public Service Company in Friona, received an award for service at a dinner at the Hilton Inn in Amarillo on November 12.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$96.4 million to 948 Texas cities as their share of the one per cent city sales tax for November. Friona received a payment of \$12,013.41, which compared to last year's figure of \$12,701.36.

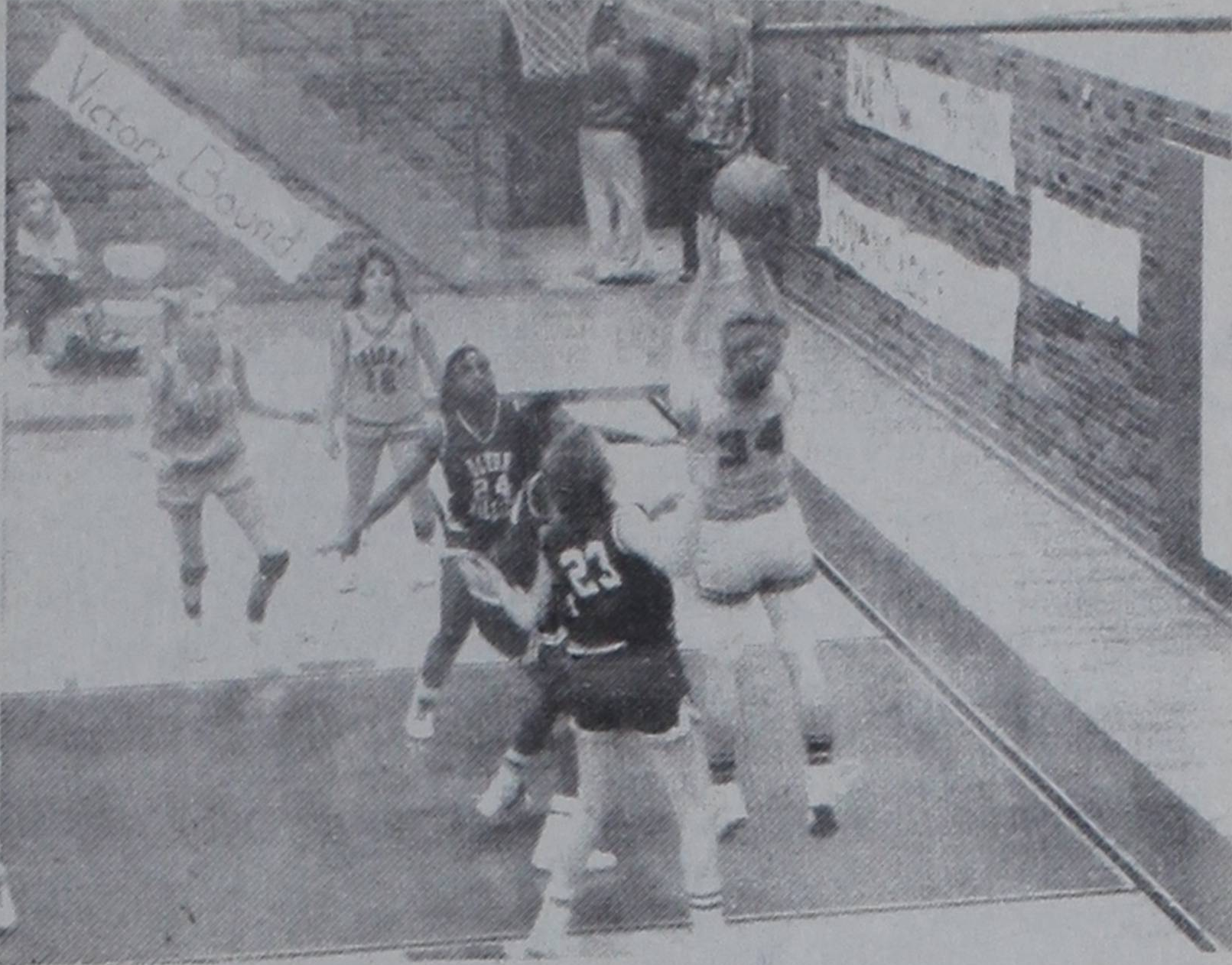

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Chiefs Drop Heartbreaker To Kermit In Final Seconds

The Friona High School Chiefs' best football season in history came to an end with undoubtedly the school's most heart-breaking gridiron loss, in the team's area playoff game at

Brownfield last Friday night. In spite of a super performance, the Chiefs went down to defeat, 15-13, as Kermit kicked a winning field goal with only 33 seconds left on the clock.

With 4:18 left in the game, the Chiefs had made a tremendous defensive stand, holding the Yellowjackets on downs at the midfield stripe and taking over the ball, apparently ready to run out

the clock and preserve a 13-12 win. But one penalty flag against the team, along with another seeming penalty which was never called, put the ball back in Kermit's hands.

After the big defensive play, fullback Jimmy Williams ran 15 yards to the Kermit 35, only to see the run wiped out by a clipping call against the Chiefs. Williams' run would have been the longest run of the game for the Chiefs, and would have been only their second one all night of ten yards or more.

On the next play, the blitzing Yellowjackets appeared to have charged across the line ahead of the snap. Kermit stripped the ball from Williams, and while the Chiefs and their fans looked for the yellow flag in this instance, none was ever thrown.

Kermit took the ball and proceeded to drive 60 yards in 12 plays, setting up the winning field goal.

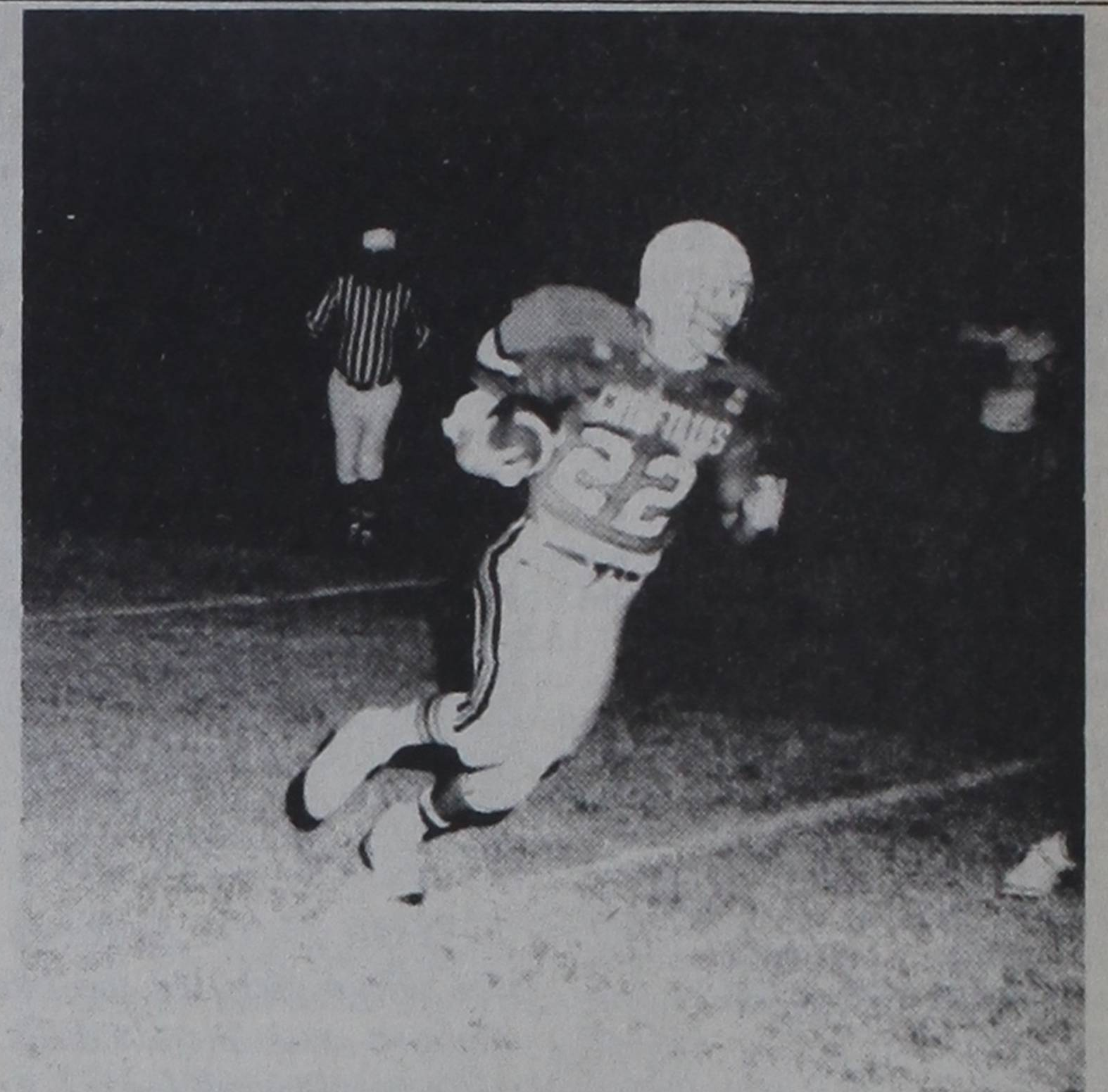
The Chiefs played opportunistic football in the early going, to capture a 10-0 lead, much to the delight of the large delegation of fans which followed them to the playoff game.

Kermit took the opening kickoff, and after making one first down, faced a punting situation. The Yellowjackets' punter got a low snap, and by the time he corralled the ball, a couple of Chief defender tackled him at the Kermit 40 for a loss of 13 yards.

Williams gained five yards, and Phillips, playing after a week of health problems, ran nine yards for the first time he carried, to the Kermit 27.

Quarterback Daniel Echols was thrown for a two yard loss on a keeper play, and after Williams gained seven, Echols dropped back to pass. He saw Mickey Pena streaking for the end zone, and lofted a pass.

If Pena had kept running, it probably would have been a touchdown, but he stopped too soon, and the ball went just over

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his outstretched hands. Carrasco tried to run for two points, but was stopped short of the line by Will Eddins, and Friona held a 10-6 lead. Kermit's score came with only 1:35 left in the half.

The Chiefs took the third quarter kickoff, and as has been the case all season long, could not move on their first offensive series, and had to punt the ball.

Kermit again put on an impressive drive. This one went 72 yards on only ten plays.

Friona held twice after Kermit had first and goal inside the ten, but on third down, the speedy Thompson again burst into the end zone.

The Yellowjackets tried a kick this time, but it went wide, and Kermit had the lead for the first time at 12-10. The score came with 6:06 left in the third quarter.

Friona then answered with one of their most impressive drives of the season.

Facing a need to answer the challenge, the Chiefs did just that.

On a big third down, Echols hit Rainey over the middle on a 22-yard gain to the Friona 42, to keep the drive alive.

A face mask penalty against Kermit gave Friona a first down to the opponents' 40-yard line.

Williams gave the team another first down with a hard five-yard run to the 29, and Phillips took a pitchout and dived three yards to the 18 to sustain the drive.

Changing ends of the field, Echols went around right end on a keeper play, and almost broke for the score, being stopped at the Kermit nine.

It looked like the drive would produce a touchdown for sure when Ben Osborn made a nice run on first down from the eight, giving Friona second and goal from the four.

But the illegal procedure call, which officials took delight in calling against the Chiefs at critical points, set the team back to the nine. After a loss by Echols and an incomplete pass, Montoya was again called upon.

The team's kicking star made it ten consecutive kicks without a miss, hitting the all-important kick from 27 yards out. This gave Friona a 13-12 lead with 8:23 left in the game.

The impressive drive had used up 9:31 of clock time, using up parts of two quarters.

Kermit then drove to midfield, where on the big fourth down play Paul Trimmell stopped Carrasco for a yard loss and Friona took over.

That set the stage for the one flag that deprived Williams of a game-clinching run, and the next play when the Chiefstain defender was stripped of the ball after the apparent offsides that was not called.

The winning field goal was not only the only one kicked all season by Kermit—it was also their first attempt all year.

The kick just barely made it over the crossbar—coming from regular extra-point range, but although it might not have been picture-perfect, it was like a dagger in the hearts of the Chiefs and their fans.

A last-ditch passing effort in the final 30 seconds would not click, and the Chiefs, after seemingly having the game tucked away with 4:18 to play, suffered a bitter defeat instead.

Although fans at the game thought Kermit was offsides on the fumble play, Coach Moss said that

after viewing the film, he felt that the "no flag" call was probably right. "At the time, I was like the fans, thinking he was offside, but the more you see it on the film, it looks like a good play."

"We had our chance to win it, and just didn't hang onto it," Moss said. "But the kids did a super job. You just couldn't ask for any more from them," Moss said.

The Chieftain coach said that it was obvious to him that the Kermit coach didn't want to go for the field goal, in light of the bad kicking record their kicker had. "I wanted to call a time out, to make him worry more, but we only had two time outs left, and with 33 seconds on the clock, I figured we needed them after the kick worse," Moss said.

On the unusual play when Kermit intercepted and appeared to have returned the interception for a touchdown, Kermit was called for having 12 men on the field. Friona was also flagged on the play, after one of the Chieftains asked an official if he wasn't clipped on the play.

"Usually, an official won't throw a flag unless a player uses profanity, but this particular time, we were flagged just for asking," said Moss. Observers felt that Friona got more than its share of penalties from that standpoint.

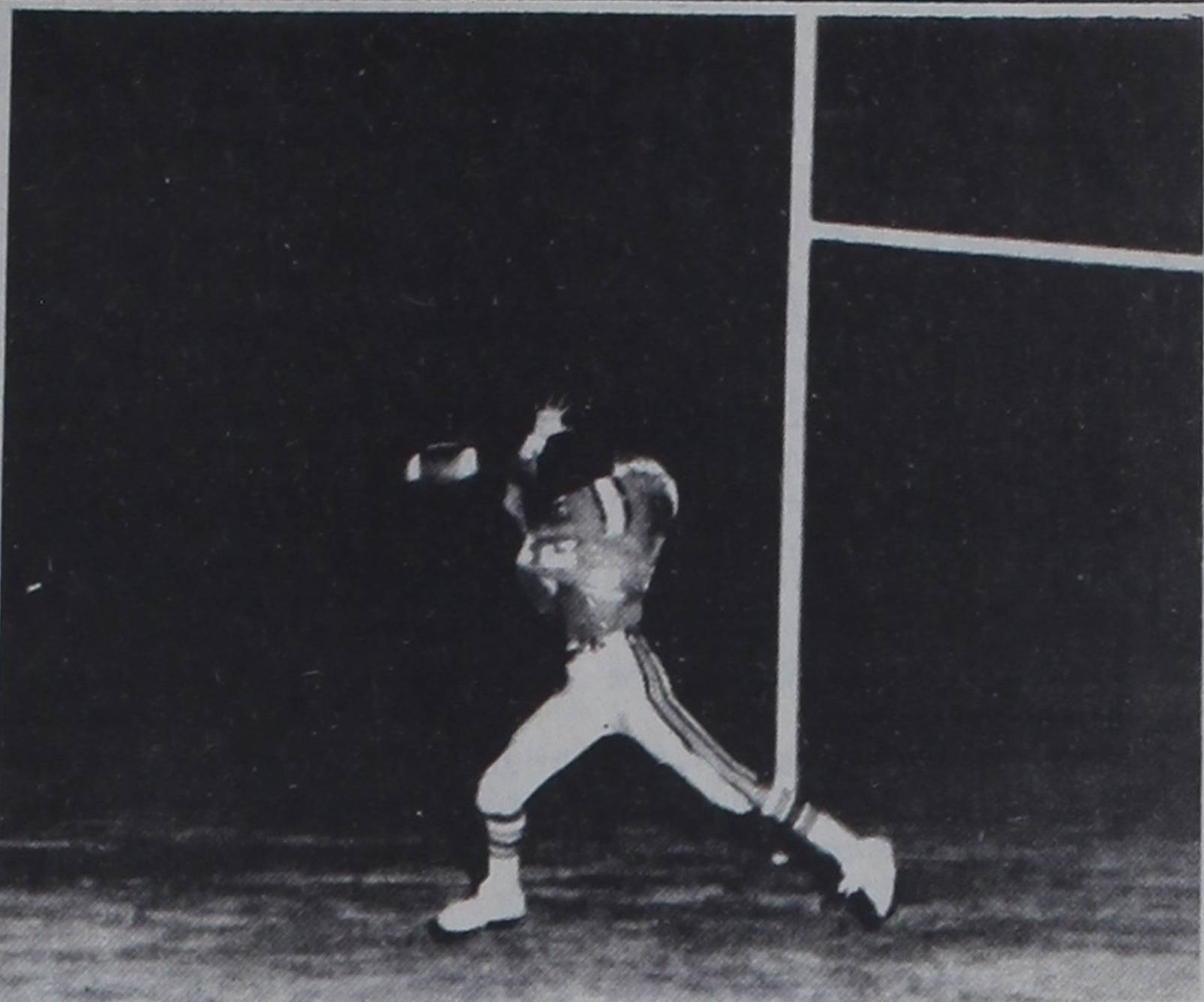
Moss praised the Chieftains for their great comeback drive that spanned most of the third quarter and into the fourth quarter.

"And we almost came back again," he said, pointing out that Lonnie Phillips was wide open on one of the late pass tries, and the ball was just barely out of his reach.

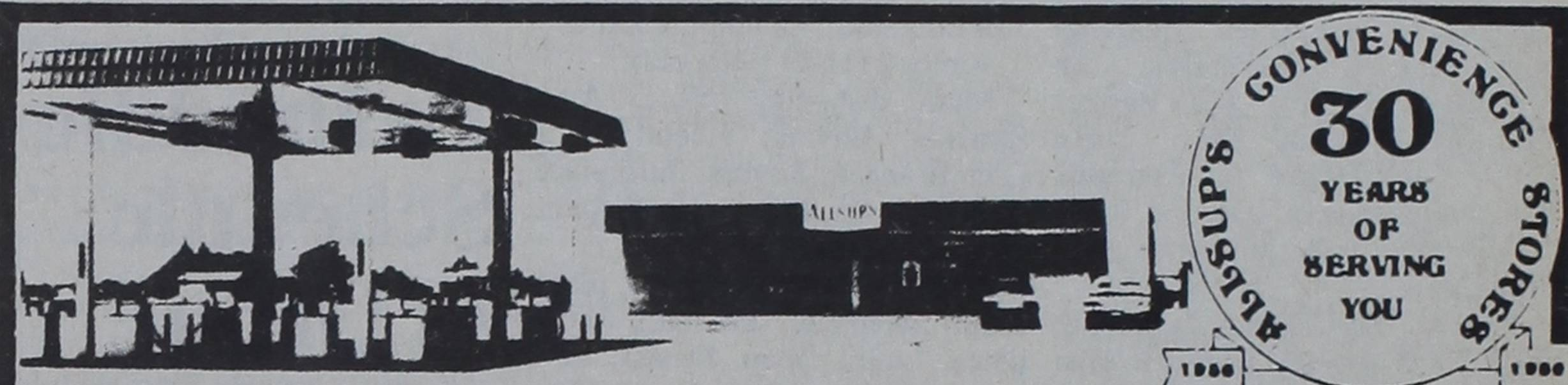

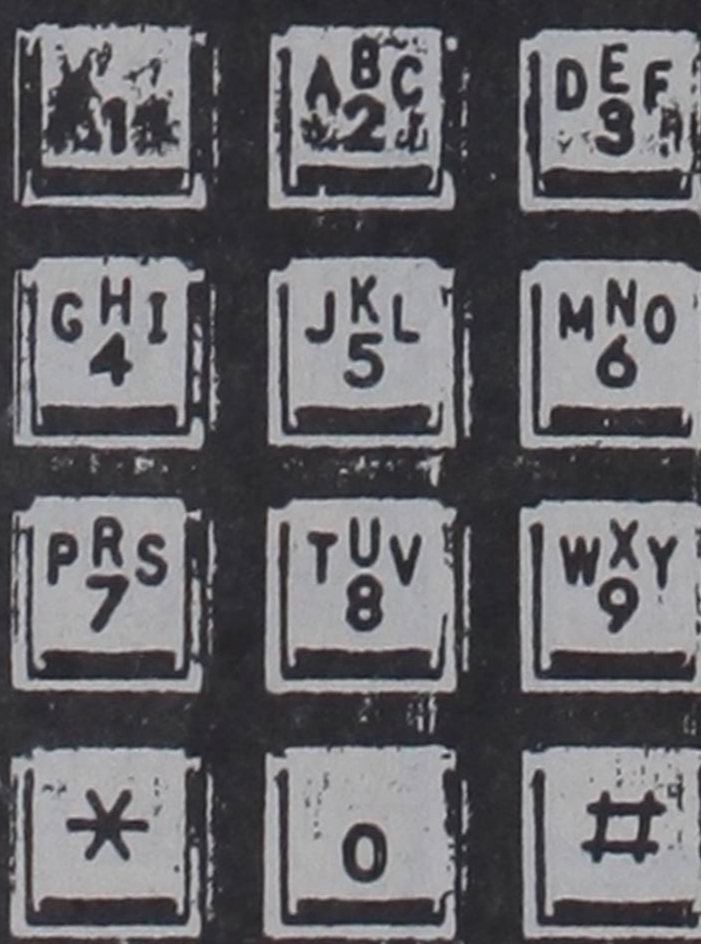

The Congregational Church will have its second annual Cookie Walk on Saturday, December 6 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. at the Congregational Church.

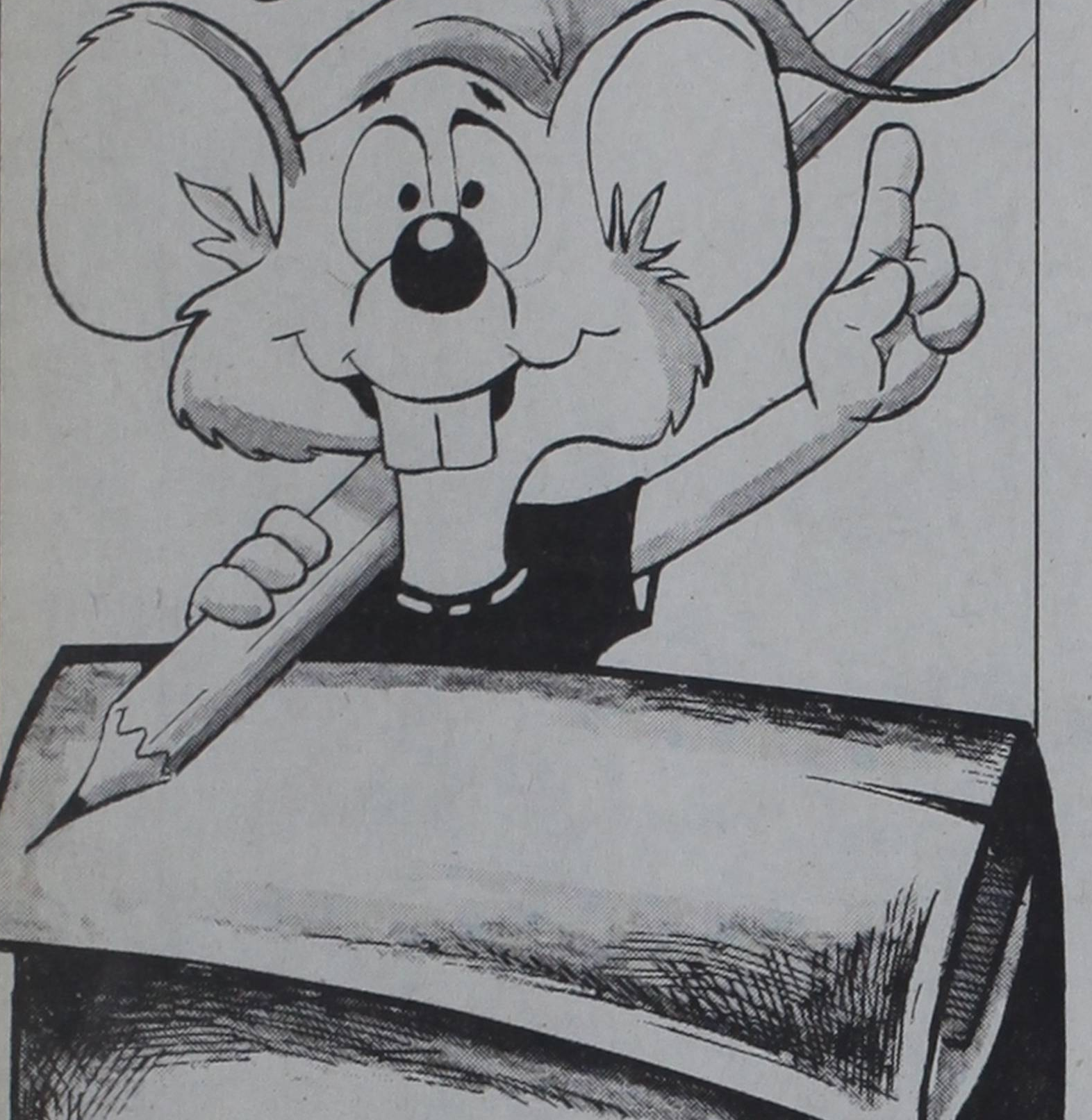

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



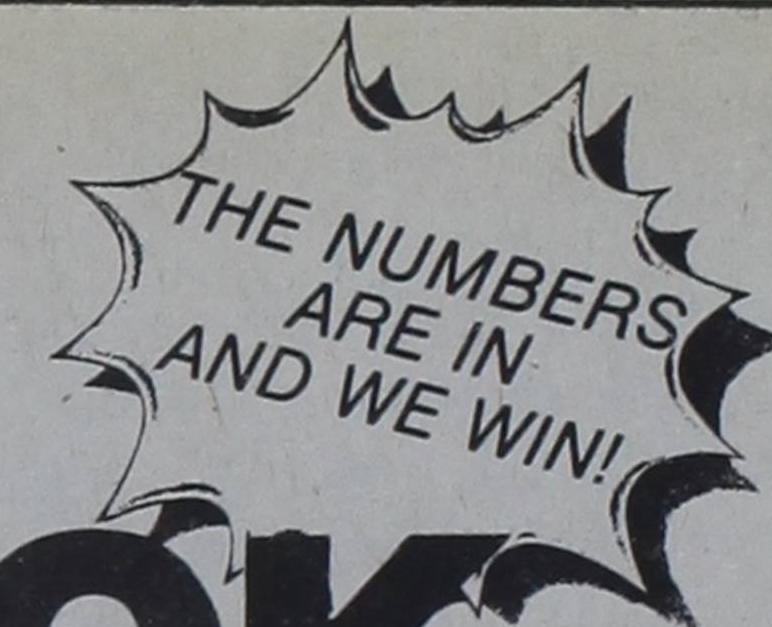
- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

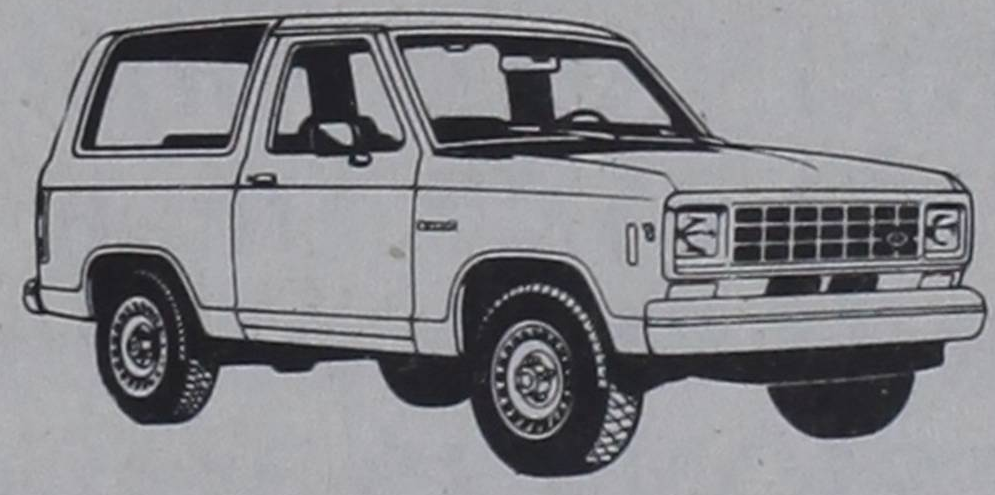

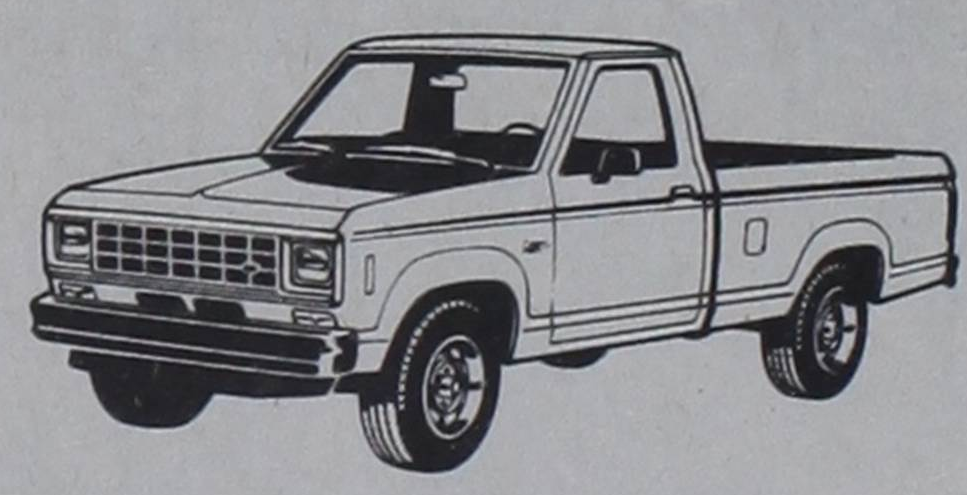
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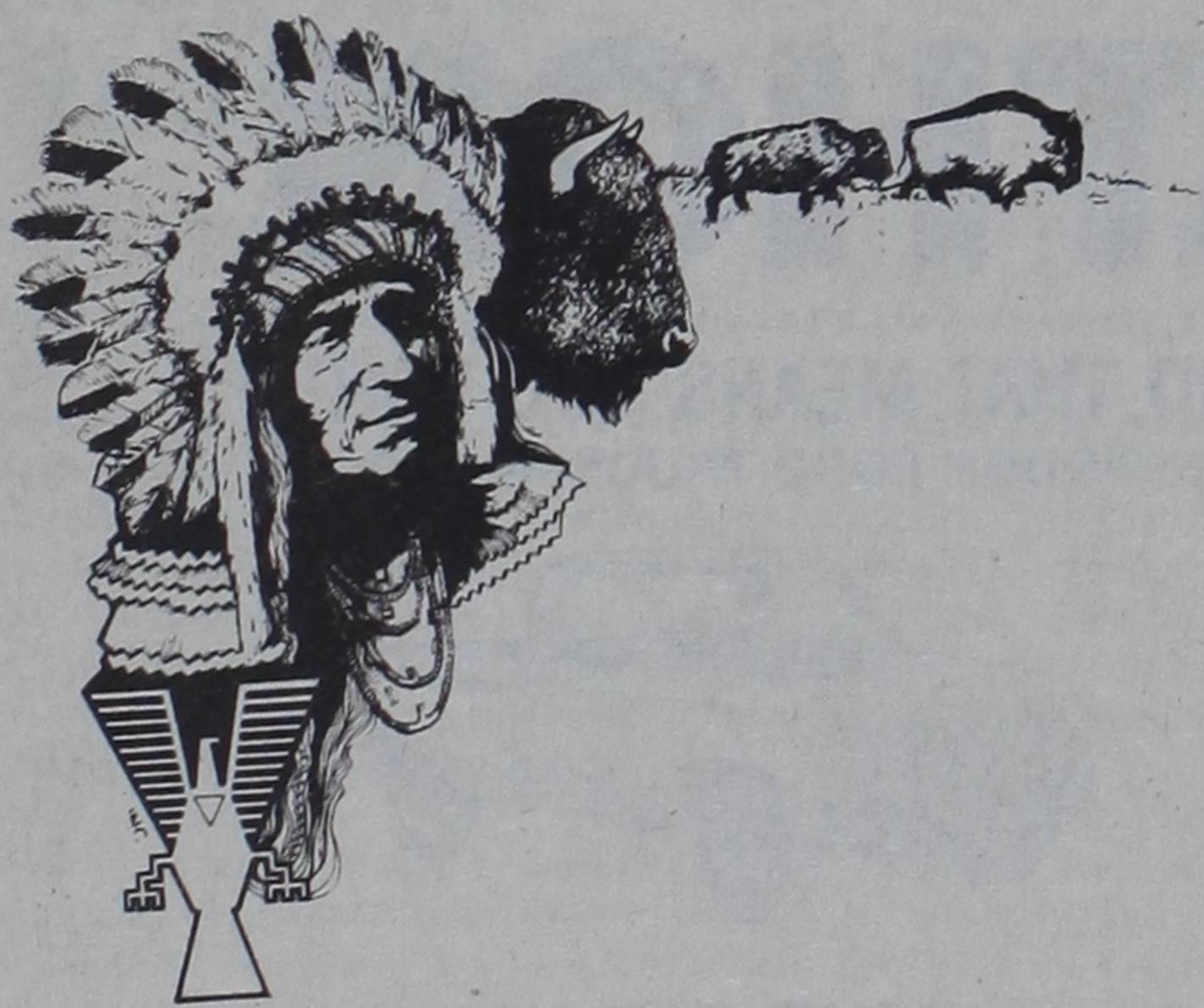
