Jack Patterson, spokesman for the Parmer County Game Assn., plenty of birds," he says. said that in the Rhea area, the pheasant crop does not look good at all.

"It's the fewest pheasants we've had since we started hunting them," said Patterson, adding that he was at a loss to know the reason why, except that the hatch of new birds in the past two or three years appears to have been much less than normal.

Game warden Chuck Cosper of Hereford indicates that northern Parmer County and Deaf Smith County have a lot less pheasants than normal. On the other hand, Cosper says that southern Parmer County and Castro County may have closer to an average population of pheasants.

Cosper says that the difference in the number of birds is the fact that the southern areas had more rain in the spring, and this The northern areas did not have the spring rain enjoyed by the other sections.

"I'm afraid a lot of people may be disappointed with the pheasant season," Patterson says. "I have 480 acres, and I'll bet you couldn't find three cocks on the whole place," he says.

Patterson said that in some past years it has not been uncommon to see the pheasant hens with numerous small chicks following after them. This year, he said, when you saw the hens, they were more apt to have only three or four chicks in their brood.






Moss praised the Chieftains for their great comeback drive that spanned most of the third quarter and into the fourth quarter.
