

UNPRECEDENTED' ACTION---**Lone High Court Justice Stays Rosenberg Deaths**

WASHINGTON -(P)- Julius and Ethel Rosenberg won a stay of execution from a single Supreme Court justice Wednesday but the governmediately moved for a reversal by the full court.

Attorney General Brownell, announcing the appeal to the entire bench described as "unprecedented" the action of Justice Douglas in granting the indefinite stay to the atom spy team.

Just when the court will sit on the matter is something for Chief Justice Vinson to decide. The tribunal Monday ordered a recess until October, but Vinson

Attorneys asserted the Atomic Energy Act superseded the esplo-nage laws under which the Rosenbergs were convicted. The Atomic Energy Act passed in 1946. It provides that the death sentence can be imposed on-ly on the specific recommendation of the jury and when it has been found that the offense was made with an attempt to injure the Unitnd States.
