ONE OF TEXAS' all-time greatest football players, Bobby Layne, died on Monday. Layne, who always thought he was the best at whatever he was doing, finally was a victim of life "in the fast lane."

If Layne had played his football in the 1970s or 1980s, with all of the television and media attention that is given to players in the National Football League, he would probably have been compared to Joe Namath, or Jim McMahon.

Layne was one of the most outstanding quarterbacks to have ever played the game. His best friend and high school teammate, Doak Walker, said 40 years ago "Bobby never lost a game. Sometimes, time just ran out on him."

Time ran out on Bobby Layne for the last time Monday at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital.

Layne and Walker sparked Dallas Highland Park to championship levels just as World War II was ending. They went on to set Southwest Conference records, but for different teams. Layne was All-American quarterback for the Texas Longhorns, and Walker was an All-American runningback for Southern Methodist University.

In one of their famous confrontations while in college, their teams met for the Southwest Conference championship, and Walker's SMU team handed Layne's Texas team its only loss of the season.

Dallas Cowboy coach Tom Landry, who was Layne's teammate at the University of Texas, says Layne was one of the best talents he ever saw. "He never believed in training, yet he always performed well on the field," Landry said.

Layne came along when the forward pass was something that many teams, especially the University of Texas, did not emphasize. However, he set some passing marks which for that day and time were really outstanding.

The long, tall Texan was a master of the jump pass, something modern-day fans may have never seen, unless they have watched the old black-and-white films this week of Layne in his heyday.

He also was an outstanding baseball pitcher at Texas U., and probably could have been a major league pitcher if he had wanted to go that route.

Following their college days, Layne and Walker were once again united, as both were signed by the Detroit Lions. They helped bring National Football League titles to Detroit in 1952 and 1953.

Walker retired after the 1956 season, and Layne led the Lions to another championship in 1957. However, he missed the championship game that year after having his jaw broken by the forearm of Chicago Bears' tackle Ed "Country" Meadows.

(So, you can see that this business of NFL quarterbacks being sidelined due to rough treatment by the defense is nothing new.)

Later on, Layne was traded by the Lions to the Pittsburgh Steelers. Pittsburgh was wallowing around in last place, and Layne turned the team into a title contender.

One of his longtime friends, William E. "Rooster" Andrews, said, "Bobby always loved a challenge, and he was just as competitive, whether it was football or baseball or betting horses or pitching washers or shooting marbles."

"He goes grocery shopping and thinks he's the best damned shopper in Safeway," Andrews says.

Project Xmas Card Begins

Signup period for the 1986 Project Christmas Card is now underway, and continues through December 15, it has been announced by Modern Study Club.

Project Christmas Card is being sponsored by the club, in conjunction with the Friona Star, for the 31st consecutive Christmas season.

Proceeds from the project will go to benefit Parmer County Community Hospital. Since its inception, Project Christmas Card has raised over \$70,000 for new hospital equipment. This is in addition to approximately \$7,800 worth of advertising space which has been donated to the project by the Friona Star in the past 30 years.

The proceeds from this year's drive will go to enable the hospital

to meet federal requirements regarding fire safety.

Elda Hart, hospital administrator, said that the hospital is being required to install new steel doors, and to put their fire alarm system on a battery-operated backup system. Other requirements include a new smoke alarm on the clinic side of the doors, and automatic closers for the doors.

"There was a death by fire at a hospital down in Aspermont. This was the first one in the entire state since we have been dealing with Medicare, and now the Department of Health is cracking down on their requirements," Ms. Hart said.

Donations to Project Christmas Card may be made at Friona State Bank, as well as at a number of businesses in town, where containers have been placed.

Hal D. Blackburn, a 1976 graduate of Friona High School, has published a book of black and white photographs.

Since graduating from Lubbock Christian College in 1980 with a Bachelor of Arts in Biblical Studies, Blackburn has worked as a youth minister with the Lakewood Church of Christ and as a photojournalist with Friends Youth Services, a youth outreach program which he and two associates operate.

His photographic studies have taken him to Texas Tech University, U.C.L.A. and Brooks Institute of Photography in Santa Barbara, California.

Vicky Moss Is Grid Champ

Vicky Moss came from three points behind on the final week to win the 1986 Friona Star football contest.

Mrs. Moss, whose overall score was 203 points, thus joins husband Tommy, Friona's head football coach, as one of two husband-wife combinations to win the annual football event. Moss was the champion in the 1984 contest.

The Mosses join former residents Thelma and Kenneth Watkins in the husband-wife winner list. Thelma Watkins won the contest in its third year, 1961, and Kenneth followed suit in 1963.

Mrs. Moss, who had been a weekly winner on one other occasion, made it a grand-slam by winning the final weekly contest as well. She and Bobby Wied led the field in the final week's contest with scores of 17.

Vicky took the weekly prize on the basis of the Kermit-Iowa Park score, missing it by just eight points. She picked Iowa Park, 28-14, and the Hawks downed the Yellowjackets, 36-14. Wied was 15 points off the score, picking Iowa Park, 21-14.

Jayn Looper, who had led the standings after the 12th week with a score of 189, had a score of 13 for the final week, and finished in second place with a score of 202.

Charlie Morgan finished third with a score of 201. They were the only contestants with scores over 200. Buford Hartwick, Phillip Johnson, Donita Martin and Jackie Morgan were all tied for

fourth place at 199.

The 1986 season apparently produced a tougher slate of games to pick for the contestants, judging by past scores. Jack Clark, the 1985 winner, had an overall score of 226, and when Moss won in 1984, his score was 216.

Since about mid-season, the slate of games seemed to be packed with upsets, causing the median score to dip to as low as 13 in three different weeks. Last year, a total of 42 contestants had scores of 200 or over.

In the weekly contest, Mitchell Smiley claimed third place with a score of 16. He missed the tie-breaker score by 11 points for the \$5.00 third prize.

Mrs. Moss's misses on the final week were Hereford-Cleburne, Arizona-Stanford, Alabama-Auburn, Southern Cal-Notre Dame, the L.A. Raiders-Philadelphia, Miami-Atlanta, and Giants-San Francisco.

Wied's wrong picks were Wink, Arizona, Alabama, B.Y.U., New York Jets, L.A. Raiders and Miami.

Smiley's misses were in picking Crane, Amarillo, Arizona, Alabama, B.Y.U., New York Jets, L.A. Raiders and Miami.

Patches Fleming, who had led the contest standings for most of the "stretch run" before falling two points behind going into the final week, continued his late-season bad luck by missing 14 games, and finished with a score of 197 in sixth place.

over 50 people and several organizations involved with this project," said Mrs. Smith.

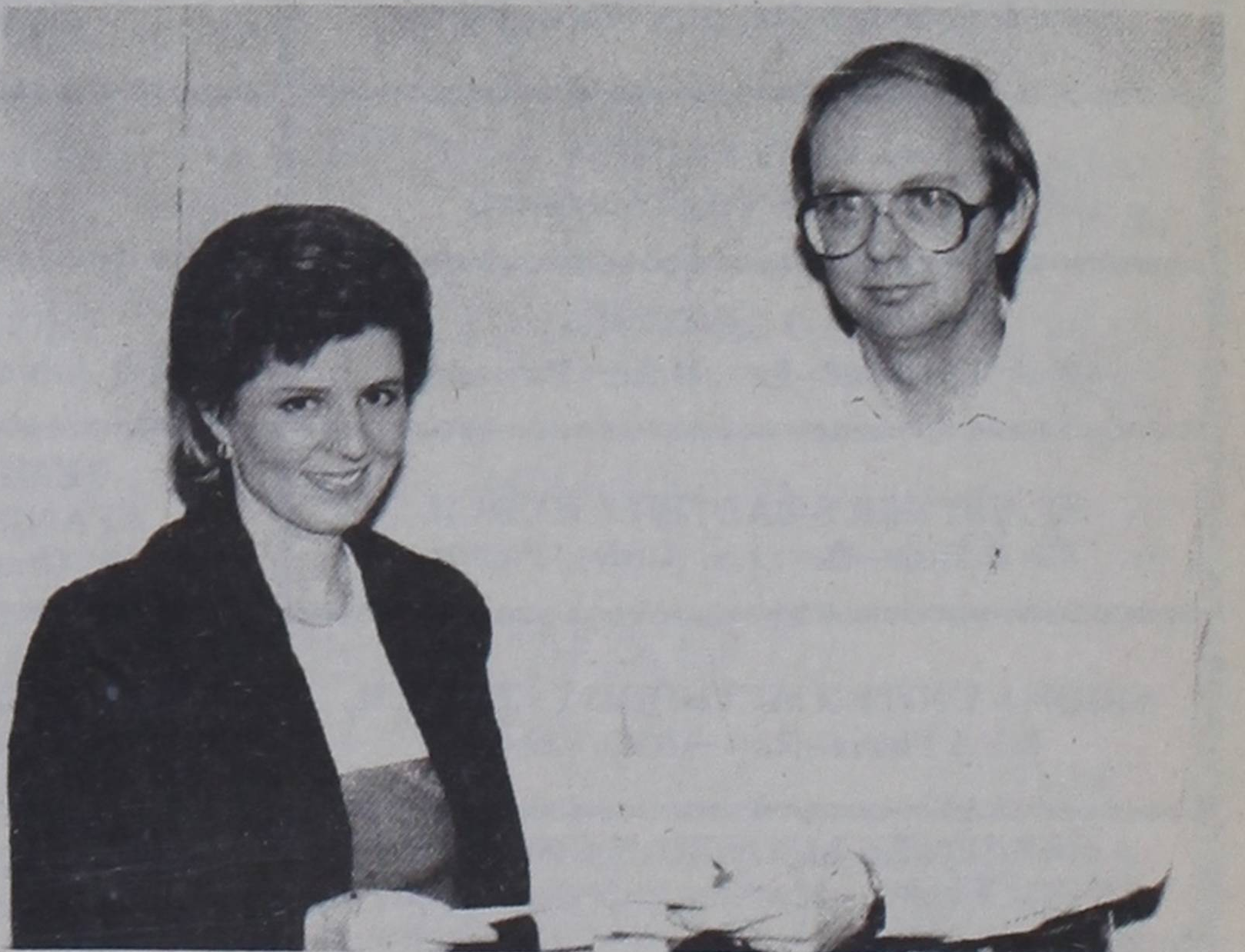
United Way Drive Hits 65 Per Cent

55 YEARS AGO--DEC. 4, 1931

The fire committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce met in the office of the water superintendent Wednesday morning. Howard G. Morris was chosen fire chief, and left him the duty of selecting a company of 16 men and determining the amount of extra equipment necessary to make its work effective.

50 YEARS AGO--DEC. 4, 1936

Lewis Barnett, who plays the cornet in the WT Buffalo Band, will leave with that organization Wednesday as it plays its way to the Texas Centennial during the Thanksgiving holidays.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 5, 1941

Friona's newest industry, the Malone Creamery and Produce Station, began operation last Friday with plans made for the installing of all equipment this week. Roy Vaughn, a former resident, is manager of the creamery, and will be in charge of purchase of eggs, cream, poultry and all kinds of produce.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1946

One of the biggest cattle feeding operations in this area is being carried out in Parmer County, by Triplett and Pringle, cattle feeders and buyers of Bovina. At the present time the firm has 7,000 head of cattle grazing on wheat fields in Parmer and Curry Counties.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1951

County commissioners stilled for the third time in recognizing the right of Precinct 1 to form its own independent road district, at its regular meeting Monday in Farwell. The commission indicated its desire to go before the state highway commission in Austin before making its final decision.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1956

A head-on collision at the outskirts of Friona claimed two lives and badly injured another man last Wednesday night. Killed instantly was Clarence Franklin Davis, 55, Hereford, and Otis

Deming, 21, of Clovis. Davis was driving a pickup, and Deming was a passenger in a 1956 Ford car.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 30, 1961

Jack Patterson, Rhea farmer, this week announced his candidacy for county commissioner of Precinct 2. His candidacy is subject to the action of the Democratic primary next May.

20 YEARS AGO--DEC. 1, 1966

Two Friona students at Wayland Baptist College, who live "just down the hall" from each other have claimed the first and second grand prizes in the 1966 Friona Star football contest. Danny Murphree kept his two-point margin to win over another Wayland sophomore, Dennis Howell.

15 YEARS AGO--DEC. 2, 1971

Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) will go into effect in Friona at 6 a.m. Saturday, December 4, it has been announced by General Telephone Company of the Southwest. Friona telephone patrons will thus join those in the large metropolitan centers in being able to dial their own long distance telephone calls, without having to consult the operator.

10 YEARS AGO--DEC. 5, 1976

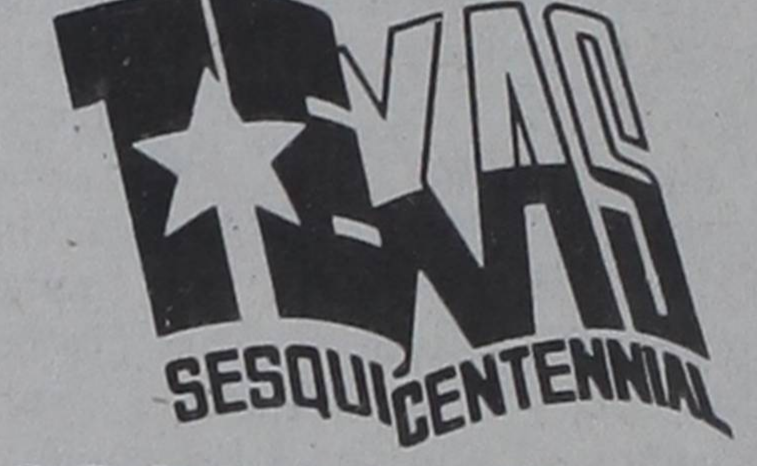

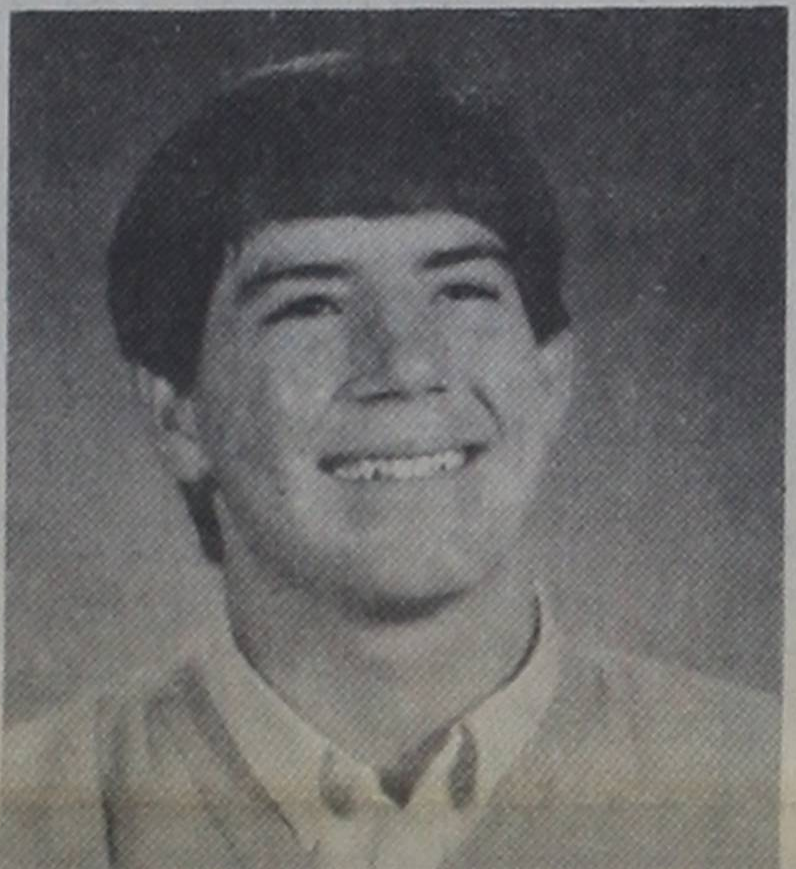
The Empty Stocking Fund was established to provide holiday-related assistance at the Christmas season for those who otherwise would not have a meaningful observance.

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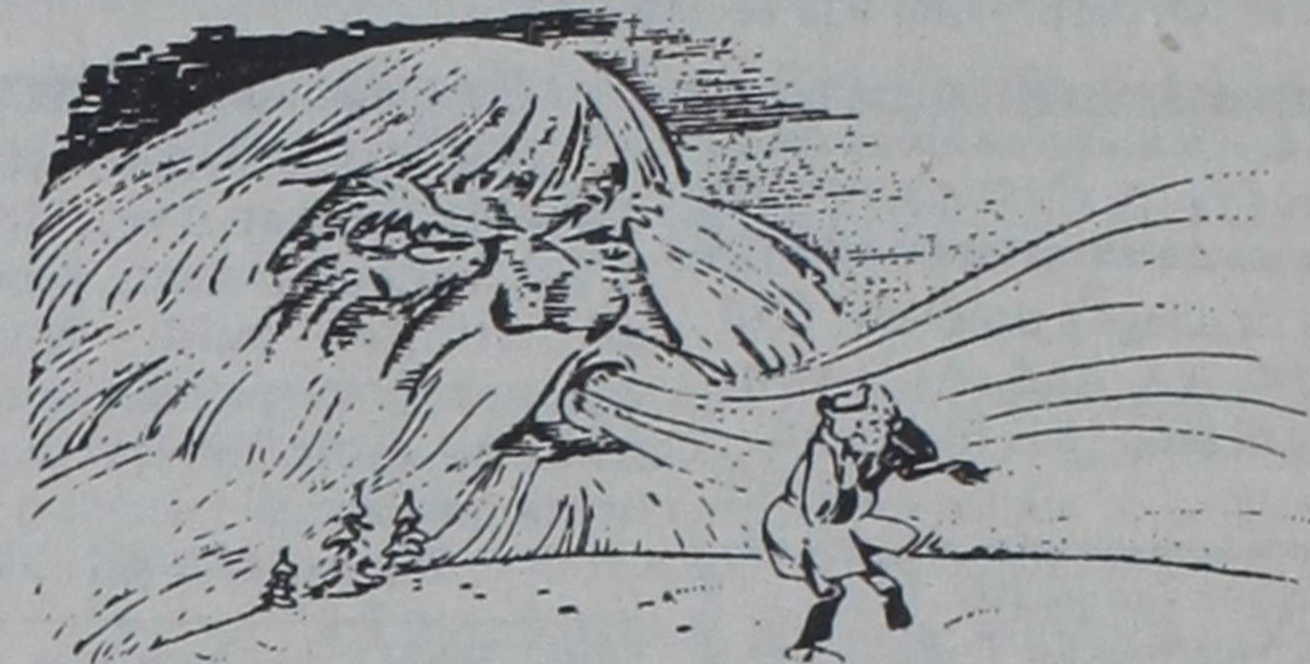

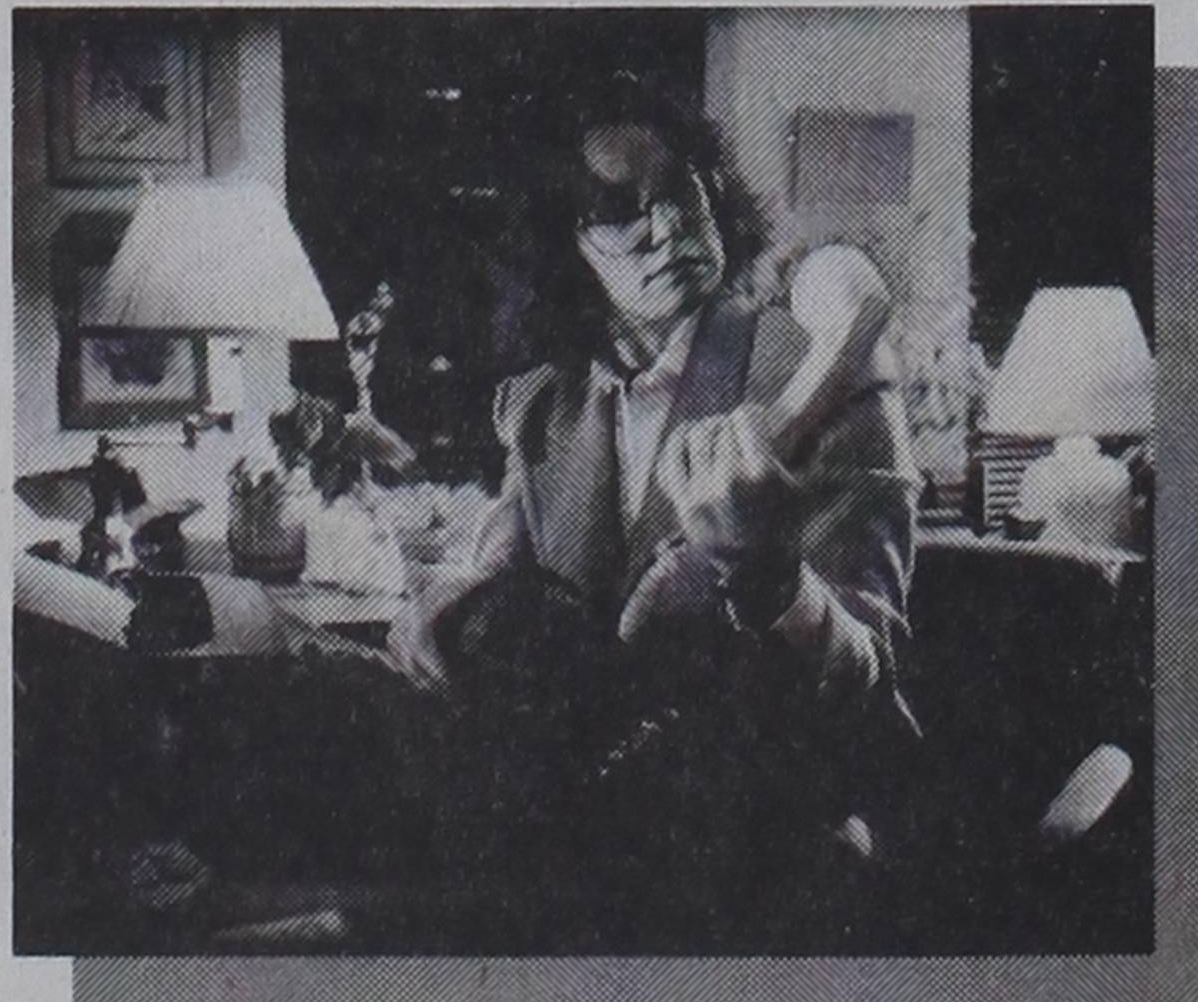

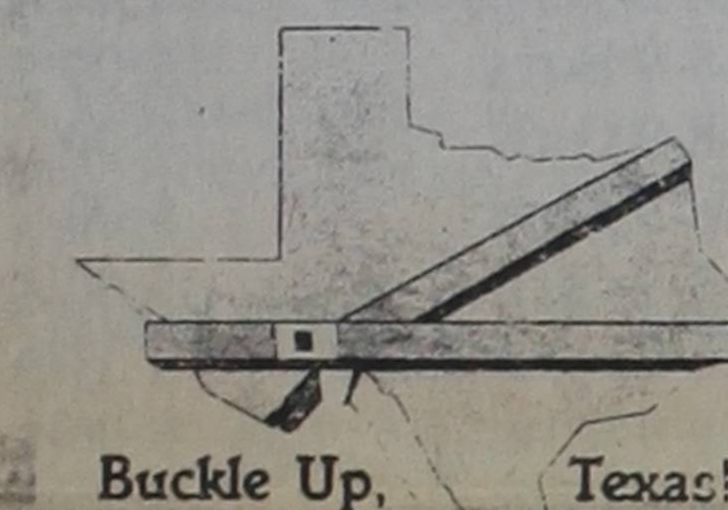

Survivors include his wife, Jessie Kyle, of the home in Weslaco; two sisters, Lois Tomme of San Antonio and Eula Martin of Albany.

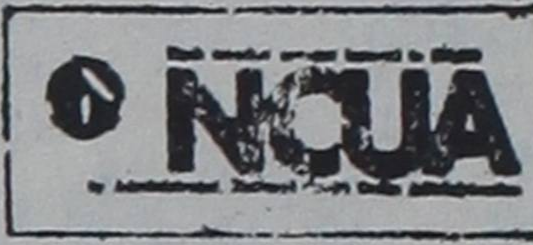

Three Chieftains Average 1,000 Yards

Three members of the Friona Chieftain backfield finished the season with a total of 2,793 yards--an average of 931 yards per man, according to a tabulation of the season statistics this week.

Lonnie Phillips was the leading ground-gainer with 1,156 yards on 196 carries. Jimmy Williams, with a great late-season surge, totalled 958 yards on 194 carries, and Daniel Echols had 679 yards on 109 carries.

This is the closest the Chieftains have ever come to having two players gain over 1,000 yards in a single season. Since district play began, Williams has gained 624 yards. He averaged 100 yards per game in six of the team's last seven games, and was the leading ground-gainer in the two playoff games.

Using total offense yards (rushing plus passing), the three top ground-gainers (Phillips, Williams and Echols) gained 3,044 yards, an average of 1,015 per man.

Phillips gained 122 yards in pass receiving, leading that department as well as individual rushing, giving him 1,278 all-purpose yards. Williams had 24 yards receiving, to give him 982 total yards.

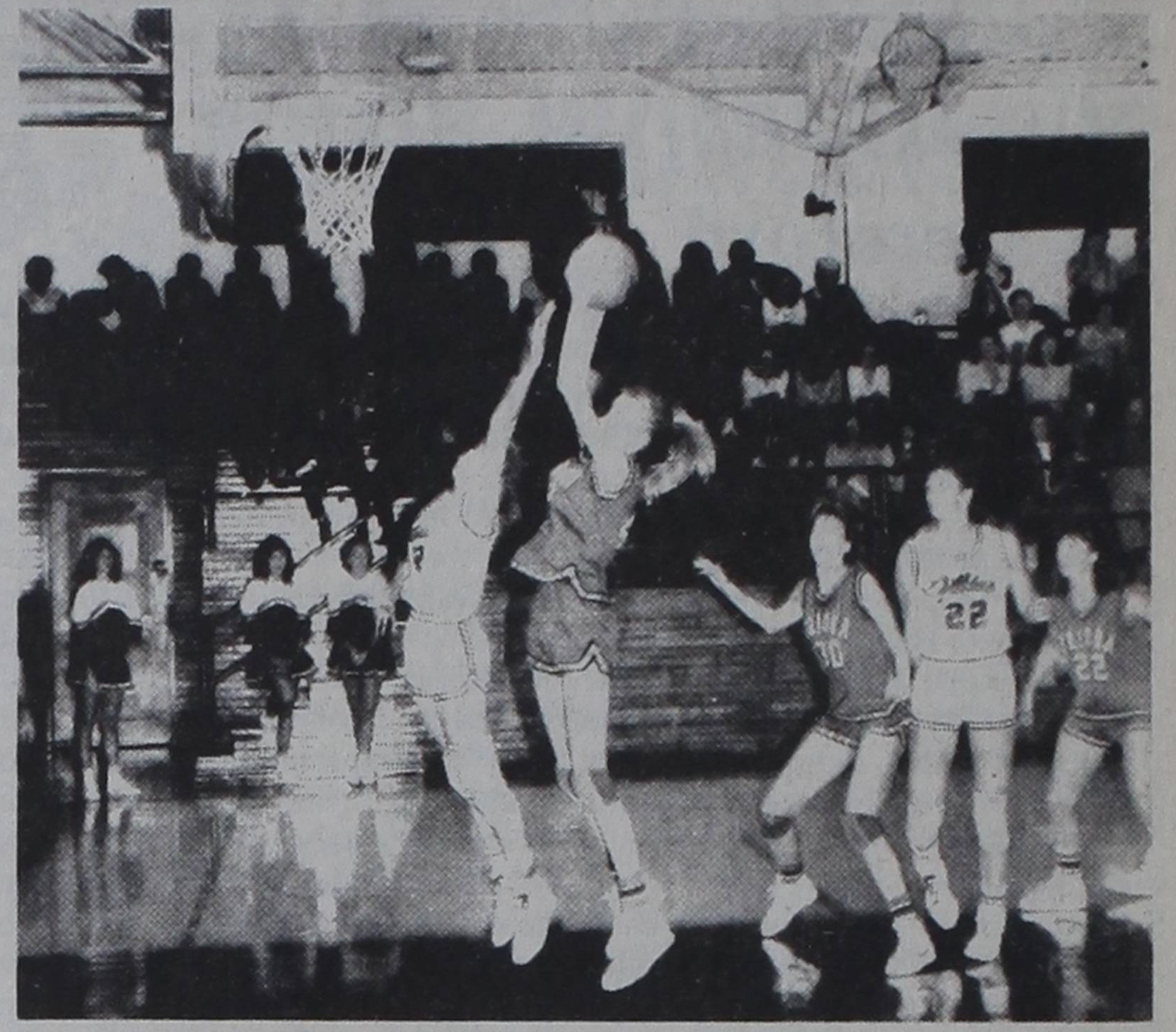
Echols led both kick return categories, and returned kicks an additional 362 yards.

In the scoring department, quarterback Daniel Echols led the balanced attack with 74 points. Echols edged teammate Phillips by

the margin of a two-point conversion, as Phillips had 72 points on 12 touchdowns.

Williams had nine touchdowns and 54 points, and kicker Sam Montoya booted 10 of 14 field goals (ending with ten consecutive good kicks), and 22 points--after for 52 points. Montoya's fourth-place total is better than 14 of FHS' leading point-scorers in the past 25 years, another indication of the scoring balance.

The winning field goal scored by Kermit in the area playoff game marked the first time in the last four games that any team had scored against the Chieftain defense in the fourth quarter. In fact, Kermit is the only one of those four teams to even score against Friona in the second half.

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Chief Cagers Score 73-69 Opening Win

Maybe their successful football season is going to carry over into basketball.

Maybe the fact that the team has some experienced senior leaders on the team is going to pay off.

Draw your own conclusions. The fact of the matter is that the Chieftain basketball team, which had posted only three wins in the past two years, raised some eyebrows by downing Bovina, 73-69 in their season opener Monday night at Bovina.

This was quite an accomplishment in light of the fact that the team had had less than a full week of workouts due to their late start, and played a team with two games under their belts.

With new coach T.J. Parks calling the shots in his first game, the team showed flashes of possible greatness in their opening game.

accustomed to losing basketball games, could have given up and lost the game by a good margin.

But they kept coming back, finally taking the lead and then protecting it like a hungry dog that had just discovered a waiting meal.

Bovina held the upper hand throughout the opening quarter. With Scott Scaff and Denver Riddle hitting, the Mustangs built an 8-2 lead with 4:31 left in the quarter.

Shy Burney sank a jump shot to trim the margin to 8-4, and then Bovina took its first eight-point lead on two straight baskets, for a 12-4 margin at the 3:40 mark.

Lonnie Phillips, Burney and Shane Hand scored to make the score 16-12, but Scaff answered with two straight baskets for a 20-12 Bovina lead with just 51 seconds left in the opening quarter.

That was the first time the Chieftains could have quit, but didn't. Burney made a driving layup and Daniel Echols got a layup after a steal with 12 seconds left.

Burney rebounded a Bovina missed shot with three seconds showing, turned and fired a shot from half court that ripped the nets cleanly as the buzzer sounded. That cut what had been an eight-point Bovina lead to 20-18.

Burney made a whirling layup to begin the second quarter, giving the Chiefs their first and only tie of the first half, 20-all, 20 seconds into the quarter.

Bovina responded by hitting four of six from the foul line as officials whistled the pressing Chieftains, to take a 24-20 lead. The hot-handed Burney sank a follow shot, a jump shot and a layup in quick succession, each time answering Bovina goals and keeping the Chieftains just a basket behind.

Then Scaff went on one of his scoring tears, to open up another eight-point edge for the home

team, 34-26 with 3:53 left before halftime.

Baskets by Burney, Hand, Brent Riethmayer and John Cass kept the Chiefs within four, but Bovina's Riddle scored with 12 seconds left to send the Mustangs to intermission with a 40-34 lead.

But Friona fans had seen a lot to cheer about, and they saw some more to start the second half. Jeff Dickson made a jump shot sandwiched around a pair of layups by Hand which tied the score, 40-all, after 1:13 of the third quarter.

Hand canned a pair of close-in shots for a 45-44 deficit, but Bovina took its longest lead of the game, 55-46 when Byron Neal sank a jump shot with 3:00 left in the quarter.

Then Burney, quiet after his remarkable 20-point first half, came alive with a tip shot, a long jumper and a layup, to cut the margin to 57-52 as the quarter ended.

Burney scored twice, around a layup by Dickson after a steal, for a 61-58 deficit at the 6:20 mark.

Friona went to the foul line for the first time with 6:07 left in the game. Echols made both shots to pull the Chieftains within a point at 61-60.

Dickson kept Friona within one on a follow shot, 64-63, and after Noah Villa made one of two free throws for Bovina, Burney scored on his patented driving layup to knot the score at 65-all, completing the Friona comeback with 4:10 left to play.

The Chieftains then worked the ball, and Hand made a follow shot for Friona's first lead, 67-65, with 3:05 to play in the game. A minute later Burney fed Hand for an easy layup and a 69-65 score at the 2:02 mark.

Scott Sudderth scored for Bovina to trim the Friona lead to 69-67 with a minute to play. Hand answered with a layup on a fast break for a 71-67 Chieftain lead with 48 seconds left.

Sudderth again cut it to two with a long shot at the 40-second mark, and appeared to have tied the game with a layup with 13 seconds left, but was called for travelling.

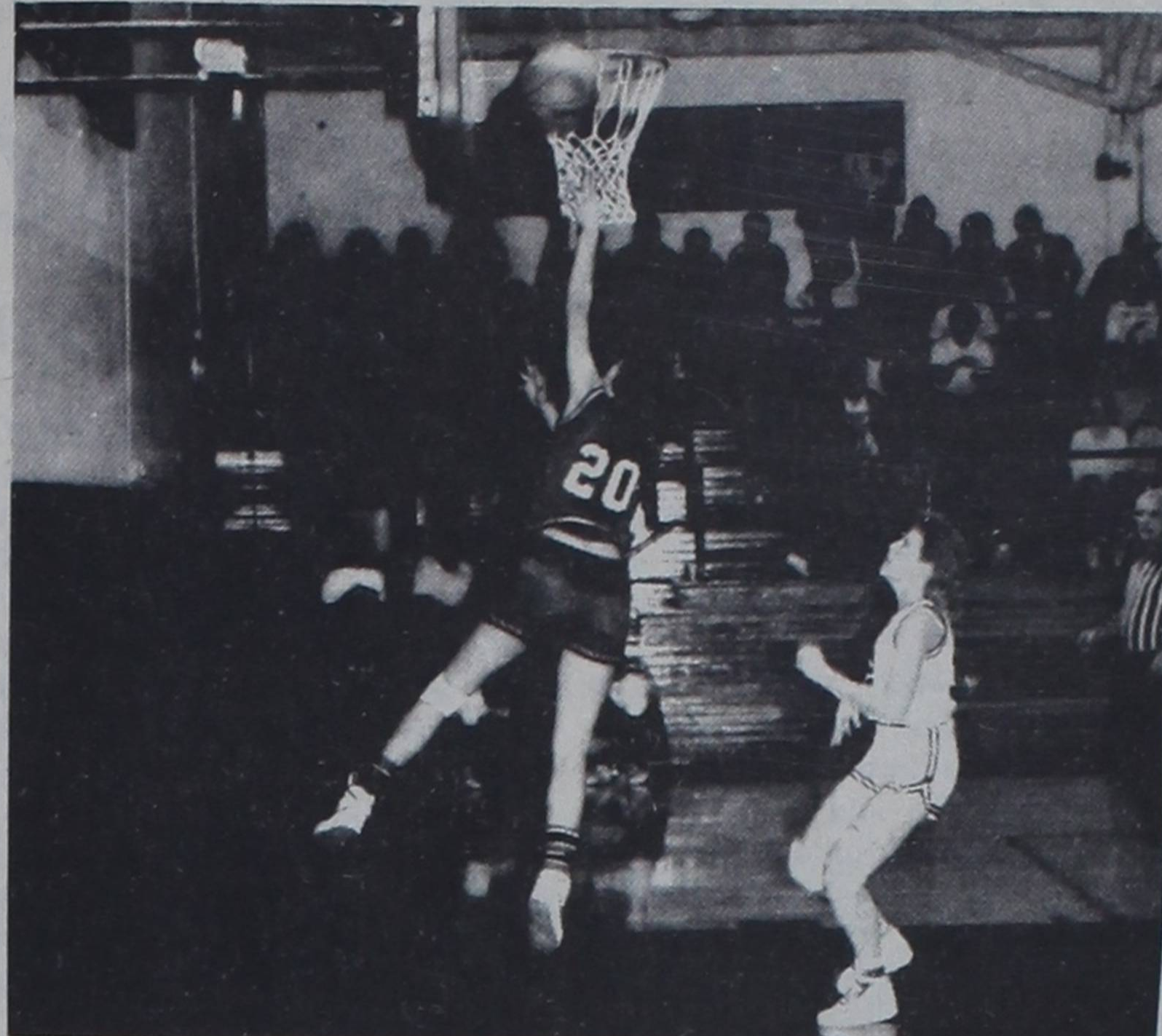
Friona worked the ball upcourt, where Echols was intentionally fouled. Echols made both shots with four seconds left to bring about the final margin of 73-69.

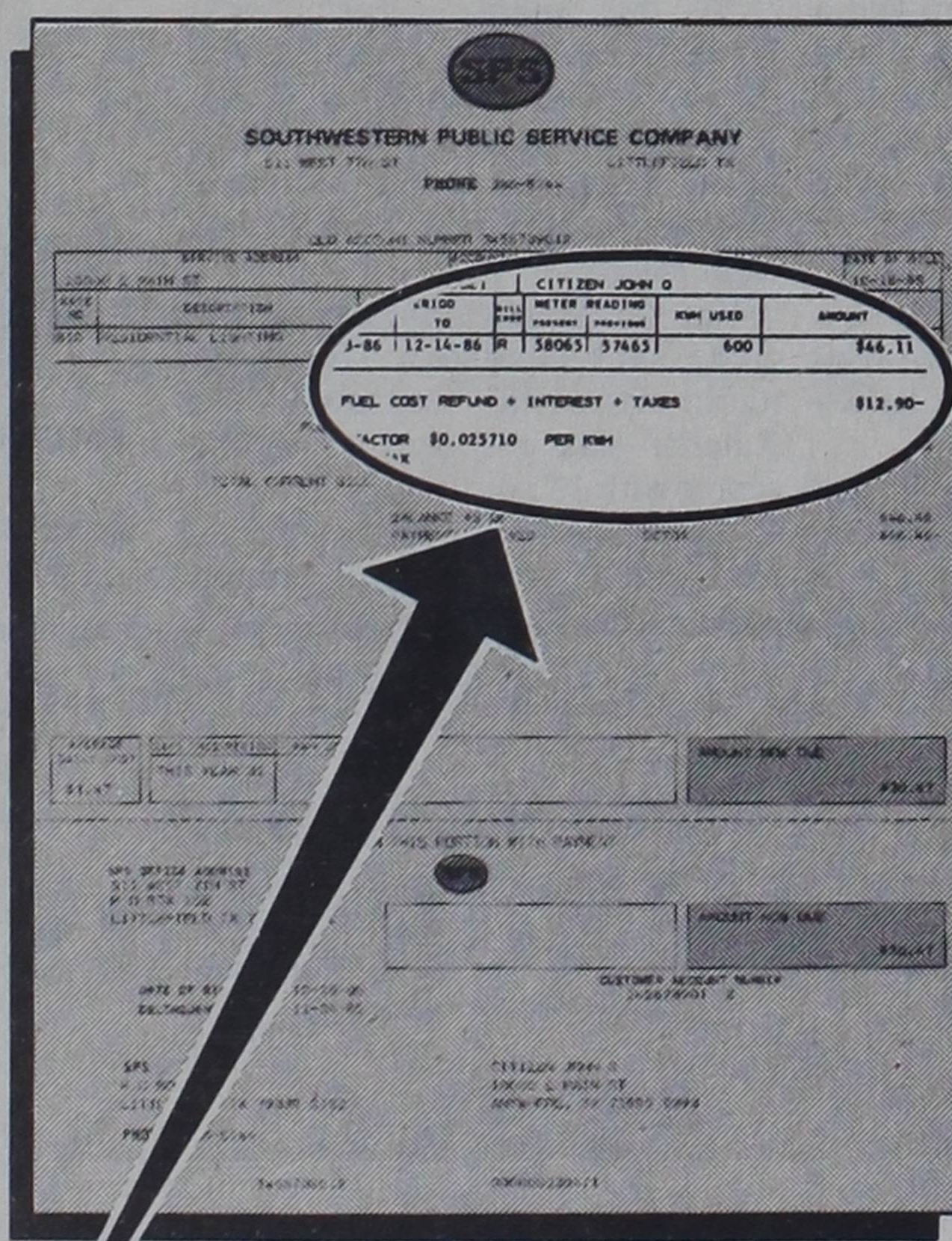

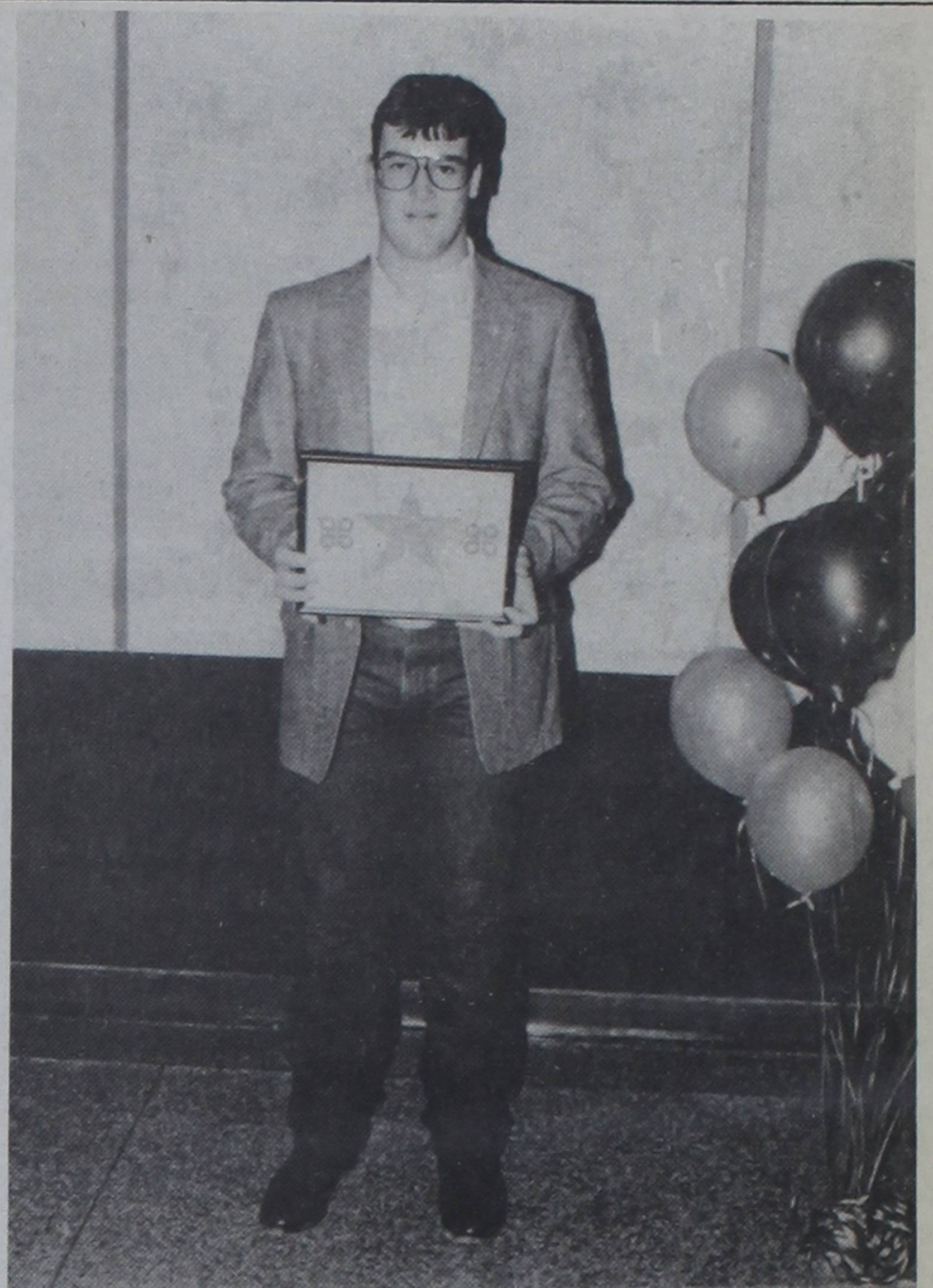

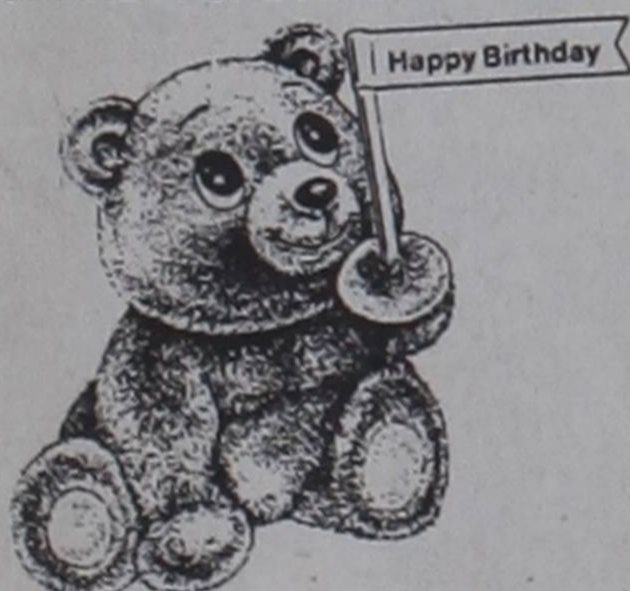
