**Strawn Discovery Indicated At Test In NW Crockett**

Continental Oil Company has a gas-distillate discovery in prospect in Northwest Crockett County at No. 2-C Harris.

The prospector was drilled from 8,070 to 8,147 feet. Tool was open one hour. Gas surfaced in four minutes at the rate of 1,408,000 feet daily.

Recovery was 90 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud, 330 feet of distillate and 90 feet of oil and gas-cut mud.

Flowing pressure was 400 pounds and 15-minute shut-in pressure was 3,475 pounds.

Operator drilled to total depth of 8,187 feet where another drillstem test was underway.

No. 2-C Harris is 12 1/2 miles south of Tison and three-quarters of a mile southeast of a 9,210-foot Ellenburger failure. Exact location is 1,980 feet south and east from the most easterly southeast corner of section 4, block BB-2, Francis Borden survey.

**Deep Wildcat Test Is To Be Drilled In NE Hockley Sector**

Great Western Drilling Company and Carl Hobitzelle filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to drill a wildcat in Northeast Hockley County.

It is to be drilled as No. 1 A. R. Copeland.

Drillate is 960 feet from south and west lines of labor 11, league 709, state capitol lands survey.

It is three and one-half miles southwest of the town of Anton. It is to go to 10,500 feet, starting at once.

**Southern Union Completes Abo Opener In Lea**

Southern Union Gas Company No. 1 Parcel-Federal, wildcat in Southeast Lea County, New Mexico, has been completed as a flowing discovery from the Abo.

Operator reported a calculated daily flowing potential of 288 barrels of 37.1-gravity oil through a 3 1/4-inch choke. The potential is based on an actual flow of 130 barrels of oil in 10 hours.

Production is coming through perforations in casing at 7,300 to 7,492 feet. That section had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and fractured with 5,000 gallons.

Location is one and three-quarter miles east of the Hare field and 600 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 19-21-32e.

**Lawless Schedules Shallow Wildcat In NW Loving Sector**

Lawless Drilling Company of Odessa filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to drill a shallow wildcat in Northwest Loving County.

The project will be dug as No. 1-A TXL. Drillate is 330 feet from south and east lines of section 3, block 55, T&P survey and 10 miles northeast of Orva.

Operations to 4,200 feet are to start at once.

**Sinclair Will Drill Granite Wildcat In Central Floyd**

Four miles north of the town of Floydada and in Central Floyd County, Sinclair Oil & Gas Company spotted location for a granite wildcat.

It will be drilled as No. 1 J. M. Maasie.

Drillate is 960 feet from south and west lines of the northwest quarter of section 7, block 7, B&F survey.

The wildcat is to be drilled to 10,000 feet, or granite. Site is on a 160-acre lease.

Operations are to start at once.

**Strict Traffic Rules Adopted**

Midland had a brand-new Traffic Code Wednesday and it probably will have an immediate impact on a lot of city motorists, homeowners and merchants.

It is a bulky 125-page document, adopted as an emergency ordinance Tuesday night by the City Council, is effective immediately.

A large part of it is a mere repetition of traffic ordinances now in effect but there are numerous new provisions inserted after months of study by city officials.

Take the matter of offset parking, for instance.

When the city established parallel parking, a number of merchants provided what is known as offset parking. This was done by setting back the curb to the point where vehicles still could park diagonally without projecting into the lanes of traffic.

The new Traffic Code requires more than just that, however.

**Curb Set Back**

The new code provides that in offset parking areas, the curb must be set back 18 feet with an additional minimum of six feet of sidewalk.

Since most offset parking areas do not comply with those specifications, they are outlawed under the new code. They must be made to conform or vehicles must park parallel to the curb.

The new code specifically prohibits all-night parking on city streets.

**AS WEST TEXAS RANGES BURN — Regan Says 'Big-Timers' Seek To Halt Drouth Aid**

"Big operators" are seeking to stop federal aid for livestock raisers, says Rep. Ken Regan, now on a tour of West Texas to inspect the drouth and livestock situation.

The congressman, who will be in Midland briefly Thursday before continuing his tour, contends opposition is coming from national organizations which tend to speak for those big operators.

His statements followed close on the heels of appeals by Governor Shivers and Jack Porter, Texas Republican committeeman, for federal emergency aid in drouth-stricken West Texas.

Porter urged Secretary of Agriculture Benson to back a cattle slaughter program to salvage animals starving because of dried up ranges.

The White House Wednesday said Shivers' telegram had been referred to the Federal Civil Defense Administration for study.

That agency will determine whether the drouth regions should be designated major disaster areas, to qualify them for federal assistance.

Murray Snyder, assistant White House press secretary, said Shivers asked for no specific amount of federal money or other aid.

Shivers urged the President to invoke Public Law 878 to help ranchers and farmers in at least 128 counties.

"The western half of the state is now in the fourth year of drouth which has affected most seriously the economy of the state," the governor said. "Conditions continue to worsen and have now become so distressing that I am moved to request that you authorize the appropriate departments of the federal government to give still further assistance to local, state and private agencies in providing necessary relief."

He said he had received calls for drouth relief from "dozens of counties" in West Texas.

Porter said Benson made no commitment. Benson indicated he favored some definite action to relieve the distressed cattlemen.

Benson meets in Washington Friday with stockmen, farm credit agencies and retailers to discuss the drouth situation. Later that day, he will fly to Lubbock to address the American Cotton Congress Saturday.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson wrote Benson urging he spend more time in Texas so he can investigate the drouth personally. Senator Daniel said he told Benson "The Texas cattle situation needs rescue, not just relief."

Porter said he was backing the cattle slaughter program because "these are cattle now in the Southwest which are starving to death because of the drouth."

Porter said Southwestern cattlemen want the government to sell them some surplus livestock feed at reduced prices.

He said unless cattlemen in the

drouth areas get feed soon at prices in line with reduced cattle prices, they will start dumping animals on the market. The result might be another sharp break in cattle prices which have declined more than one-third in a year.

Rep. Bob Poage of Waco has urged a four million cut in the nation's cattle herd to get it more in balance with feed conditions.

**House Panel To Probe Oil Price Boosts**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House Commerce Committee will investigate recent rises in gasoline and oil prices.

Chairman Wolverton (R-N.J.) said Wednesday hearings will begin July 1. He said the purpose will be to determine "just what the situation may be and to attempt to develop the facts or conditions with reference to such price increases."

Wolverton said the committee has received "many protests relating to gasoline price increases which have been put into effect, particularly on the Eastern Seaboard."

"Our attention also has been called to the recent increase in the price of crude oil which has been initiated in the Southwest," he said. "These price increases follow a period of successive cutbacks in the amount of domestic production allowed, and come at the very time that stringent reduction of oil imports is being urged."

**500 New Street Lights Ordered**

**New Paving Program Meets Roadblocks On Twin Fronts**

A new 80-block street paving program was presented formally Tuesday night to the City Council but it immediately bumped into roadblocks on two fronts.

First—the entire program was referred to the city's Finance Advisory Commission, which will study the cost of the project in relation to the city's financial status.

Second—a delegation of taxpayers argued that the city or the state should pay for the paving of a five-block stretch of South Garfield Street since it will become a major artery carrying traffic from the Andrews Highway to the U. S. Highway 80 alternate route along North Front Street.

The program included 80 blocks which had been requested by property owners and 30 blocks which were initiated by the city itself.

The presentation of the program was the first step in the procedure which includes the gathering of engineering information, calling of formal hearings and assessment of costs against the affected property owners.

A 255-block program now is in the construction stage and more than 40 per cent of it already has been completed.

**Hints Coming Talks To Open New Channels**

SEOUL—(AP)—President Syngman Rhee said Wednesday impending conferences with a special emissary from Washington may "open new channels" which would make an armistice "more acceptable to us and perhaps more honorable to the U. S."

The statement contrasted sharply with Rhee's threat earlier Wednesday to fight on alone if a truce unacceptable to him is signed by his Allies.

The ROK government formed a committee of top cabinet members with Rhee as chairman to take over "defense" of the country immediately in the event of a cease-fire. Its duties were not explained.

As the bloody war ended its third year, these developments heightened the tension in this devastated Asian peninsula:

1. Assistant U. S. Secretary of State Walter S. Robertson, carrying a secret note to Rhee from Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, landed in Tokyo and was expected in the South Korean capital Thursday.
2. Rhee served official notice he would yank his 16-division Army from United Nations control if an armistice is signed on present terms.
3. The leader of an anti-Rhee political party, Dr. Chough Pyng Ok, was beaten severely after speaking out against the Korean President's defiant truce stand.
4. The biggest anti-truce demonstration in South Korea, with more than a million taking part, was expected to be touched off Thursday—third anniversary of the costly war.
5. Yoo Chi Yung, vice speaker of the ROK National Assembly and an outspoken Rhee supporter, insisted that his nation's armed forces "will not retreat even one step back" from the present battle line.

In an impassioned letter to Gen. Mark Clark, Rhee declared that under the terms of the present armistice agreement "I do not see how the ROK forces can remain under your command, however regrettable to us."

The letter, released Wednesday by Rhee, was dated Saturday—two days before Clark conferred with the defiant South Korean President in an apparently futile effort to win his approval of a truce.

Nothing was further from his intentions, Rhee said, than to "flout any request" from President Eisenhower to go along with an armistice.

**Air Force Cancels Kaiser's Contracts**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Air Force Wednesday cancelled all its contracts with the Kaiser Company for the production of transport aircraft.

The Air Force said the termination of the contracts involved C-119's, the Flying Boxcar, and C-123's at the Willow Run, Mich., plant operated by the Kaiser interests.

The firm will be permitted to complete planes now in final assembly stages. The Air Force said the cancellation was "completely independent of the present Senate hearings now in progress."

At these hearings, by a Senate Armed Services subcommittee, Chairman Bridges (R-NH) has protested that the Air Force has been paying Kaiser more than five times as much for a C-119 as the same plane costs at the Hagerstown, Md., plant of the Fairchild Aircraft Company. Fairchild developed the Flying Boxcar and the Air Force made Kaiser a secondary producer.

Henry Kaiser has testified the costs of the two plants are not comparable because Willow Run is a huge plant being operated at low capacity, and Fairchild at Hagerstown is a small plant in full operation.

The top Kaiser officials, Henry J. Kaiser and his son, Edgar, also have complained of troubles with subcontractors. For one thing, they said one subcontractor delivered 13 sets of defective aircraft wings.

# Eleanor Would Kill McCarthy Committee

**WASHINGTON**—(AP)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, widow of the late President, says she would like to see the Senate Investigations subcommittee headed by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) abolished.

She added in a McCall's magazine article she would advocate doing "everything possible . . . to strengthen the FBI in its functions."

She tackled also a question as to whether she would testify about the Communist Party background of a friend if she knew he now was a loyal American.

Ordinarily, she said, if she knew such a person she would—and "add that I knew he was now a loyal citizen."

But, she continued, "If I were dealing with such a hysterical situation that a statement of this kind would cost this man his chance to earn a living, and if I knew of no overriding reason for giving such testimony, I would refuse to give it."

# Mother Forgives Son Who Bet Life's Savings On Dancer

**NEW YORK**—(AP)—Henry Way, who lost his mother's \$13,000 life savings on the Kentucky Derby, escaped a trial for grand larceny Tuesday when the little 11-year-old woman forgave all.

Mrs. Lillian Way refused to press a complaint that her son took the money from a joint safe deposit box to bet on the Derby.

"I haven't long to live," she said. "I hope God will forgive my sins and I want to forgive my son's."

Way, 43, who has three children and one grandchild of his own, had bet the money on Derby favorite Native Dancer and lost by a head. A grand larceny indictment against him was dismissed.

Weeping, he told the judge, "I'll sign my house over to my mother and give her everything I've got. She can live with me for the rest of her life."

# Librarian Declares TV Renews Public Interest In Books

**LOS ANGELES**—(AP)—Television now is steering people back to public libraries, the American Library Association has been told.

Ruth Ruisen, head of the home reading service of the De Anza public library, told the ALA convention Tuesday the nation's reading habits are influenced by mass information media.

"TV is an excellent example," she said. "When it was new, librarians noted a falling off of readers. But as the novelty wore off, people began returning to the library to ask for books on subjects brought to their attention on the TV screen."

She said other media exerting strong influences on reading habits are newspapers, movies and radio.

LONDON—(AP)—The Polish sea captain who hauled fugitive Gerhart Eisler to a Communist haven was a refugee from the Reds Wednesday and Britain was expected to grant him political asylum.

The Pole, Capt. Jan Cwiklinski of the liner Batory, who was decorated by the Red Warsaw regime for his part in Eisler's escape from the U. S., stayed ashore with the ship's medical officer when the Batory sailed from Britain Saturday.

Officials, maintaining tight secrecy about the whole affair, said only that the asylum request was under study but responsible sources declared it undoubtedly would be granted.

London newspapers said both Cwiklinski and the medical officer, identified as a Dr. Takiaster, were being held at Durham Prison while the request was under consideration.

### Morrison Volume Describes Thrilling Anti-Sub Action

BOSTON—(AP)—From Adm. Ernest King, in Washington, came the message: "There'll always be an England in the United States Navy."

His accolade capped one of the great exploits of World War II—the fate of an American destroyer-escort named England which sank six Japanese submarines in 12 days.

This spectacular anti-submarine action is described in detail for the first time in Rear Adm. Samuel Eliot Morrison's eighth volume of his World War II naval history, published Thursday.

It also contains a thrilling account of the fabulous Mariana turkey shoot. In two days, the Japanese lost 476 planes and 445 aviators; the United States, 130 planes and 76 fliers.

Titled "New Guinea and the Marianas" Atlantic-Little Brown & Company, it covers the fury of the war in the Pacific from March to August, 1944. The Harvard history professor terms these "the most eventful months of the Pacific war."

In an interview, Morrison took a long look ahead toward the end of his 14-volume project when he said of Korean hostilities:

"General Bradley said at the end of the last war there would be no more amphibious operations but the Inchon landing was the most brilliant operation in this one."

Morrison said he was able to verify the England's performance partly through Japanese sources.

"They were extremely cooperative, fully accepting defeat," he said. "They were as curious to learn why they were defeated as we."

The England, commanded by Lt. Cmdr. W. B. Pendleton, was operating with three other destroyers when she chucked up her unparalleled score.

Although she was held back on some occasions to give her sisters an opportunity, the England eventually went in for the kill. After the sixth, the OTC officer tactical command aboard one of the other destroyers, signaled the England:

"Damn it, how do you do it?" "Personnel and equipment worked with the smoothness of well-oiled clockwork. As a result of our efforts, recording angel working overtime checking in Nip submarines joining honorable ancestors."

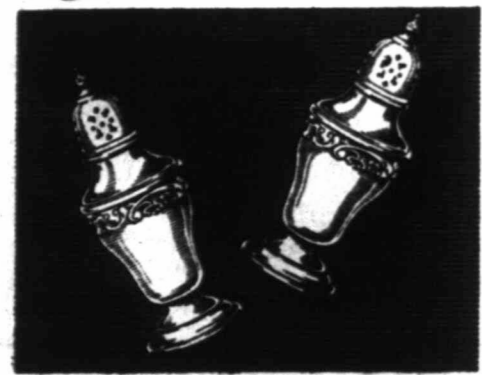

This spectacular anti-submarine action is described in detail for the first time in Rear Adm. Samuel Eliot Morrison's eighth volume of his World War II naval history, published Thursday.

It also contains a thrilling account of the fabulous Mariana turkey shoot. In two days, the Japanese lost 476 planes and 445 aviators; the United States, 130 planes and 78 fliers.

Titled "New Guinea and the Marianas" Atlantic-Little Brown & Company, it covers the fury of the war in the Pacific from March to August, 1944. The Harvard history professor terms these "the most eventful months of the Pacific war."

In an interview, Morrison took a long look ahead toward the end of his 14-volume project when he said of Korean hostilities:

"General Bradley said at the end of the last war there would be no more amphibious operations but the Inchon landing was the most brilliant operation in this one."

Morrison said he was able to verify the England's performance partly through Japanese sources.

"They were extremely cooperative, fully accepting defeat," he said. "They were as curious to learn why they were defeated as we."

The England, commanded by Lt. Cmdr. W. B. Pendleton, was operating with three other destroyers when she chucked up her unparalleled score. Although she was held back on some occasions to give her sisters an opportunity, the England eventually went in for the kill. After the sixth, the OTC officer tactical command aboard one of the other destroyers, signaled the England:

"Damn it, how do you do it?"

"Personal and equipment worked with the smoothness of well-oiled clockwork. As a result of our efforts, recording angel working overtime checking in Nip submarines joining honorable ancestors."

### 50 Convicts Suffer From Food Poisoning

SALEM, ORE. —(AP)—Warden Clarence T. Gladden reported Wednesday about 50 convicts at the state penitentiary here have become ill with food poisoning. All are expected to recover.

Samples of pork served last week were sent to the State Hygienic Laboratory in Portland for testing. Dr. Willard Stone, Marion County health officer, said the pork had not been cooked sufficiently.

## Britain Expected To Grant Political Asylum For Pole

LONDON —(AP)—The Polish sea captain who hauled fugitive Gerhart Eisler to a Communist haven was a refugee from the Reds Wednesday and Britain was expected to grant him political asylum.

The Pole, Capt. Jan Cwiklinski of the liner Batory, who was decorated by the Red Warsaw regime for his part in Eisler's escape from the U. S., stayed ashore with the ship's medical officer when the Batory sailed from Britain Saturday.

Officials, maintaining tight secrecy about the whole affair, said only that the asylum request was under study but responsible sources declared it undoubtedly would be granted.

London newspapers said both Cwiklinski and the medical officer, identified as Dr. Taklaster, were being held at Durham Prison while the request was under consideration. There was no official confirmation of this report.

Cwiklinski is married and has a son and daughter. It was not known here whether they had made their way out of Poland or were still in Odynia, the Batory's home port on the Baltic.

The 53-year-old captain reportedly left the Batory at Hebburn, four miles from the Tyne River port of South Shields, where the 14,287-ton pride of Red Poland's merchant marine had been refitted since May. The liner sailed Saturday for Gdynia with no set scheduled en route. A witness to her departure said the first officer was in charge of the vessel when she left.

The Batory is the ship on which Eisler, then a waiting deportation from the U. S. for making a false statement when he first entered that country, stowed away in 1949 and escaped to Europe.

A British court ruled that Eisler could not be forced back to the U. S. He later made his way to East Germany and became a Communist propaganda chief but lately has fallen into disfavor.

## Unemployed Truck Driver, Wife Die In Murder, Suicide

CHICAGO —(AP)—An unemployed truck driver shot and killed his wife, police said, seriously wounded his sister-in-law and then killed himself in his suburban Cicero home early Wednesday. Two of the couple's young sons were asleep in the bedroom where their mother was slain.

Police said George Nichols, 32, shot and killed his wife Mary, 30, following several hours of argument over his unemployment.

Anna Boyce, 29, Mrs. Nichols' sister, told police she was aroused from sleep by the sound of several shots and rushed into the kitchen where Nichols was waving a pistol. She said he fired several shots at her before turning the weapon on himself.

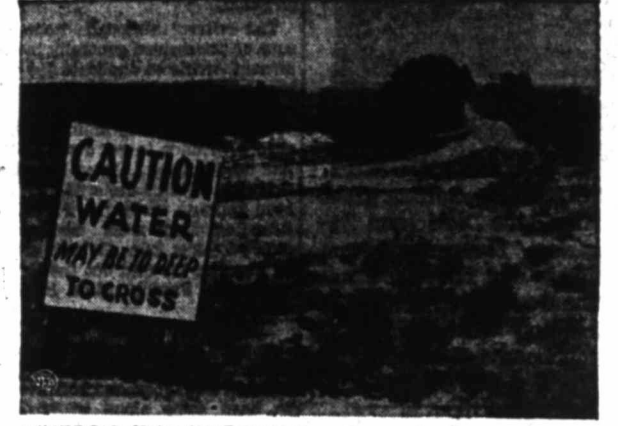
### 18-Year-Old Youth Confesses Slaying Of Crippled Woman

ATLANTA —(AP)—Eighteen-year-old David Gene Price admitted, police said, that he killed a crippled, near-door neighbor whose mutilated and mangled body was found in a suburban wooded section Monday. The youth then asked police to telephone his mother to bring him "some real scary murder comics and some hot dogs." Detective Supt. Glynn Cowan said the youth told him Tuesday with the choked Betty Bagby, 22, after having improper relations with her Saturday night, then dropped a stone upon her head. They had quarreled. Price told police, over taking a bus home instead of a taxi. He said he didn't have money enough for a cab. The young woman's left breast was almost severed. Cowan said Price told police he remembered nothing about the mutilation but added: "I could have done it." He was held on a charge of suspicion of murder.

## Congressional Leaders Asked To Back Ike On Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON —(AP)—President Eisenhower has asked congressional leaders to back his hand at the July Big Three conference with a foreign aid program approved without major cuts. Presidential lieutenants who have talked to legislative enclaves pictured Eisenhower as being anxious to give Britain and France not only his own but congressional assurance that the flow of military assistance to them will be continued. The House has voted a \$4,896,000,000 ceiling on foreign aid for the year beginning July 1. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee has approved a \$5,218,000,000 authorization bill. Chairman Wiley (R-Wis) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said he will sponsor an amendment to increase the President's authority to transfer funds from one area to another, perhaps more critically in need. Wiley's proposal represented something of a retreat from his suggestion Tuesday that the President be given unlimited authority to shift aid from one country to another or to withhold it entirely. Senator Taft of Ohio, the Republican leader, said any such discretionary authority would be "too broad." Sen. George (D-Ga) of the

foreign relations committee and Sen. Russell (D-Ga) of the armed services committee. Taft said he doesn't believe the Senate would agree to unlimited presidential authority. But he said he is willing to delegate to Eisenhower the decision on whether about a billion dollars in European aid should be withheld until Western European countries ratify the European Defense Community treaties for formation of a unified army. The House has voted to tie down such aid until the treaties are approved by France, Italy and three other nations, and Russell said he rather likes the House provision. "I think we waited long enough on the formation of Western European army and it is about time to take some drastic action," he said.

## Riley, 'Home' Of Cavalry, 100 Active Years Old Now

FORT RILEY, KAN. —This historic Army fort, established as an outpost to protect settlers and wagon trains against the Indians, will celebrate 100 years of service to the nation this week. Known as the "Home of the Cavalry" until well into World War II, Fort Riley plans a parade and pageant designed to show the long history of the post, military displays, shows and polo games. With the horse a thing of the past on most battle fronts, the fort no longer echoes to the thunder of drumming hooves and the clashing of sabres, but it still has 33 former cavalry horses, now honorably retired and taking it easy, all are more than 20 years old. The post, established June 27, 1853, broadened its activities in both World Wars I and II. In 1916 thousands of men were trained at sprawling Camp Funston. In World War II, Camp Funston and its companion camp, the Cavalry Replacement Training Center, sent fighting men to the far corners of the world. Today the 53,000-acre reservation is the home of the Army General School; the Tenth Infantry Division, a basic training unit; Camp Whiteside, an Army hospital; Marshall Field, the military airport; and the former CRTC, now Camp Forsyth, home of an Officer Candidate School, separation center and smaller military schools. Fort Riley boasts that many of

her sons have written their names high on the nation's roll of honor. Gen. Robert E. Lee and J. E. B. Stuart were at Riley before the Civil War. One of the fort's widely known officers was Gen. George A. Custer, who lost his life in the battle of the Little Big Horn. In World War I another cavalryman, Gen. John J. Pershing, led the Allied forces to victory. In World War II, cavalrymen distinguished themselves on many fronts. Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright directed the gallant defense of Bataan and Corregidor in the Philippines. In Europe, Gen. George Patton led his armored cavalry.

## King Of Cambodia Talks Withdrawal

SAIGON, INDOCHINA —(AP)—King Norodom Sihanouk of Cambodia has warned that his little Indochinese kingdom will withdraw from the French Union and wage open war against the French unless his demands for full independence are granted. The 31-year-old monarch's ultimatum was contained in a proclamation addressed to his people Wednesday. It declared: "We will not consider ourselves members of the French Union unless France recognizes the independence of Cambodia, at least in the same measure as that of Pakistan with relation to Great Britain. International opinion has been informed that if Cambodia does not obtain satisfaction by peaceful methods, she will take recourse in other means. For that she is ready to sacrifice even her existence." Cambodia is one of the three French-associated states of Indochina. The other two are Viet Nam and Laos. The French dominate the foreign affairs, defense and much of the economic policy of these

states while Pakistan's chief tie with Britain as a member of the British Commonwealth is her allegiance to the British crown. Norodom, who crossed back into Cambodia Sunday after a week's self-imposed exile in Thailand to dramatize his demands for freedom, reiterated that he would not return to his capital at Phnom Penh until his demands are met.

### Bridges Union Urges Trade With Red China

SAN FRANCISCO —(AP)—Harry Bridges' International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union urges resumption of unrestricted trade with Communist China immediately after a Korean armistice is signed. In a statement Tuesday, the ILWU declared trade with the Red mainland would be necessary to offset losses in shipping business due to the Korean War.

### Scientists Resume Effort To Analyze Glow Worm's Glow

BALTIMORE —(AP)—John Hopkins scientists have issued their annual call for fireflies. And they're offering cash rewards to youngsters who bring them in—alive and blinking. For years now, university researchers have been trying to learn what makes the glow worm glow, and how he turns his light on and off. They need a lot of bugs for the study. The 1953 goal is one million. Last year only 200,000 were collected in a poor season. The youngster catching the most gets a \$10 prize. The runner-up receives \$5. Dr. William D. McIlroy, director of the project, says research so far indicates the vitamins needed to make the firefly light up are the same as those used by animals to free energy for work. The glow probably results from release of five active compounds by a "very potent" enzyme, he says. When Italy's president, Luigi Einaudi was a professor of law, one of his pupils was Palmiro Togliatti who became head of the Communist Party in Italy.

### Indochina Reveals 100 Or More Dead In Railroad Blast

SAIGON, INDOCHINA —(AP)—Railway officials announced Wednesday that 100 or more persons were killed when a passenger train plunged 50 feet through a sabotaged viaduct Tuesday in East Indochina. Two locomotives and 18 cars of the train crashed down into a ravine at the Col des Nuages (Pass of the Clouds), a mountain pass on the route between the ancient Annamite capital of Hue and the port of Tourane. The pass has frequently been the scene of attacks by the Communist-led Vietminh rebels. Officials said a strong explosive charge went off just as the train arrived at the viaduct, tumbling a 25-foot span into the ravine.

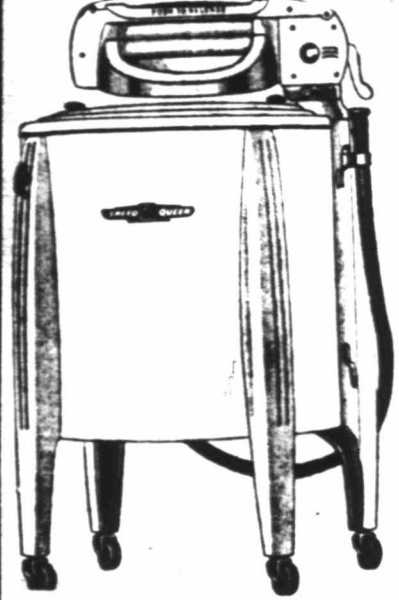

It finally got hot enough in St. Louis for the Cardinals to catch fire and the word is out to the rest of the National League to start looking for an extinguisher.  
The Cards, last senior-circuit club to win a World Series, have taken seven out of eight games since coming home a week ago Tuesday to be greeted by 100-degree temperatures.  
They roared through the Brooklyn Dodgers for three straight, added three out of four from Pittsburgh and Tuesday night greeted

the New York Giants with a seven-run barrage in the first inning that carried them to a 15-3 triumph.  
One of the happiest things from a St. Louis viewpoint about the winning spurge has been the heavy hitting of Stan (The Man) Musial.  
Hampered all Spring by his most prolonged slump since coming to the majors, Musial finally seems to have found his eye. He's blasted five doubles, a home run and seven singles in 30 times at bat for a .433 pace on the home stand.  
His over-all average has risen from a mere .351 to .374 and he has

batted in nine runs to increase his total from a puny 27 to an improving 38.  
Harvey Maddix went all the way on the mound Tuesday night for his ninth victory, even though the Giants got to him for 11 hits and eight runs.  
In winning the Cards moved within a half a game of the slumping second-place Brooklyn Dodgers, who lost, 5-2, to Cincinnati on Crady Hatton's pinch-hit home run, and to within 3 1/2 games of league-leading Milwaukee.  
The Braves got a beautiful two-hit pitching job from Warren Spahn but lost, 1-0, to the last-place Pittsburgh Pirates. Robin Roberts won his twelfth game as he pitched the Philadelphia Phillies to a 6-1 decision over Chicago.  
In the American League the first place New York Yankees increased their lead over Cleveland to 11 games although they lost 11-3 to Chicago in one of their worst showings of the year.

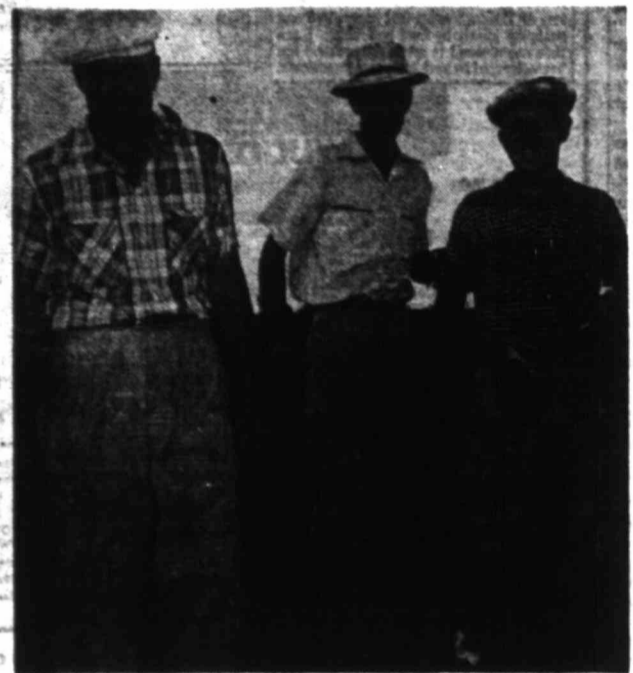

parkway within 12 feet of the curb line. Such trees or shrubs already in place can be ordered removed by the city traffic engineer if they are deemed traffic hazards.

Then, there is the problem of loading zones in the business district.

No curbs indicating such zones can be painted yellow except on application to the city engineer, stating in writing the reasons for the request. Such permits are good for only one year and must be renewed.

There was no announcement Wednesday as to the deadline for filing such applications on zones existing at the present time.

Unloading Curtailed

The Traffic Code also forbids any truck to back up to a curb for loading or unloading except when a special permit is issued by the traffic engineer.

The traffic engineer also is given authority to designate through routes for trucks and these vehicles must use such routes exclusively when proceeding through the city.

The code also prohibits left turns when making an entrance or an exit at any alley or private driveway in the business district.

# Lyon Nomination For Mines Bureau Chief Appears Dead

WASHINGTON —(P)—The nomination of Tom Lyon to head the Bureau of Mines appeared Wednesday to be dead, killed by Lyon's disclosure that he draws a \$5,000 pension from the Anaconda Copper Mining Company and dislikes the Federal Mine Safety Law.

Senator Watkins (R-Utah) was reported planning to ask President Eisenhower to withdraw the nomination. Lyon, 57, from Salt Lake City, and opposition from a home state senator customarily is enough to doom an appointment.

Senator Hugh Butler (R-Neb) cancelled a session of the Interior Committee called to consider the nomination, and said he did not think it would be necessary to call John L. Lewis, head of the United Mine Workers, to testify. Lewis, a bitter Lyon foe, had been on call for Wednesday.

Three Democratic members of the Interior Committee, Senators Anderson (NM), Jackson (Wash) and Clements (Ky) demanded in a letter to Secretary of the Interior McKay that the nomination be withdrawn. They cited both the pension and Lyon's expressed opposition to the safety law he would have to administer.

Lyon astonished members of the Senate Interior Committee at the start of his confirmation hearing Tuesday by disclosing he is getting an annual \$5,000 pension from

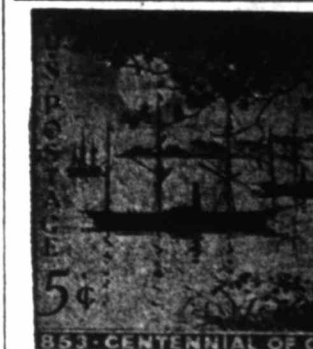
Mrs. Collyns had been at her mother's bedside the last two months.

# U. S. Economy Said Sound Despite Growing Debt Total

By SAM DAWSON

NEW YORK —(P)—Governmental, business and personal debt mounts. Another spurt is predicted in the coming six months.

Is its size becoming dangerous? Most bankers say, "Not yet." Can the nation's production and income support this debt? Most bankers say, "So far, yes." The Institute of Finance poses this question Wednesday.

"Rising debt is a normal accompaniment of expanding business activity, and plays a vital role in a high-production, high-consumption economy like ours. However, a volume of debt of the present size, amounting to \$4,000 for every person, would alone seem to call for caution."

Department of Commerce figures show that last year the gross debt rose an estimated \$40,000,000,000 to a total of \$640,000,000,000. This is 40 per cent higher than the war ended. It is almost three times the total owed when the war started.

Since the war, home mortgage debt and consumer credit have increased the most. Business indebtedness scarcely could be called lagging. Corporate debt since the war has almost doubled, soaring from \$85,000,000,000 to \$164,000,000,000.

Most money went into new plants and machinery.

Governmental debts are due for a big jump. State and local governments have been expanding their debt totals as service costs increase and as new schools, roads and public works multiply.

The U. S. Treasury will have to borrow \$30,000,000,000 in six months.

The federal debt, now more than \$266,000,000,000, possibly will go to the legal limit of \$175,000,000,000.

Defeat of the House amendment, 12 to 3, was a big victory for Senate Democrats. They had tried to prevent the upsetting of the 37-year-old tradition of equal party representation on the commission.

Nervously working his long fingers, Christie, 55, haltingly admitted garroting three more women—a total of seven, so far—as his murder trial progressed through its third day at London's Old Bailey Court. He admitted killing his wife and three other women Tuesday.

The wartime special constable said the seven victims are the ones he "remembers something about." He testified Tuesday he "may have" committed even more slayings than those he recounted in the witness box.

Christie is on trial only for the murder of his wife, Ethel, whose body was found under the floorboards of his house. His attorney says he is "guilty but insane."

The seven admitted victims also included three playmates whose bodies were found in a walled-up cubby-hole in the apartment, two other women whose skeletons were dug up from the garden, and the wife of a neighbor, Mrs. Beryl Evans.

Christie's testimony from the same witness box in 1950 helped send Mrs. Evans' young husband, Timothy, to the gallows for the strangling of their 14-month-old daughter. Evans was thought at the time also

The accident occurred at 7:30 a.m. Mrs. Winton was driving one car and Chapman the other.

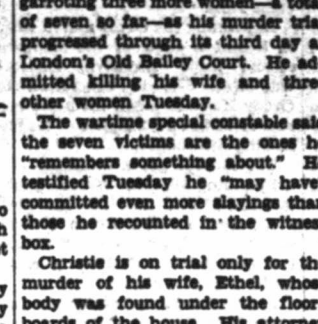
Mrs. Winton's husband, Gordon, 24, Electra, cafe owner, was injured, but not critically.

# One-Man Railroad Operates Over Two-Mile Illinois Line

MILLINGTON, ILL. —(P)—From Millington to Newark is a mile as the crow flies but the Illinois Midland is no crow.

The Illinois Midland is a two-mile-long railroad with one locomotive run by Engineer Bill Thoren of Newark. Thoren also is conductor, brakeman, yardmaster, freight clerk and repair crew.

It takes two miles to cover one because the right of way is laid through the lowlands between the two Kendall County villages. That's why Thoren frequently spends more time in repair crew than as engineer. The tracks run through quads and often spread, sending the engine on cars.

Coming to Millington from Newark isn't too bad a trip. It's the return run that's tough. Its uphill and Thoren has to keep a sharp eye for possible derailments.

Mechanics have been known to undermine the tracks in the nearby lowlands. In the Spring they frequently are flooded.

And there always are cattle straying from pastures to the tracks and making Thoren waste a lot of steam on his whistle.

Engineer Thoren already has gone through one locomotive. That was 39 years ago. The Newark Farmers Elevator Company, owner of the line, looked around and found a replacement, a little relic from a short line in Lee County that went out of business.

The little railroad is used to haul loaded grain cars from Newark to the Burlington connection in Millington. On return runs Thoren hauls coal oil, fertilizer and other products for the farm-ore company.

# Louisiana Ranches Harboring Smuggled Cattle Quarantined

BATON ROUGE —(AP)—Strict quarantines have been clamped on Louisiana ranches where breeders seized 60 head of a rare breed of cattle they say were smuggled from Mexico, across Texas, and into Louisiana.

Federal and state officials estimated Tuesday the cattle were worth \$600,000 and said they were saved they were driven across the Rio Grande into West Texas and trucked here.

Dr. F. B. Wheeler, state veterinarian of the Louisiana Livestock Sanitary Board, and E. E. Saulmon, veterinarian for the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry, said the cattle came from the state of Pueblo, south of Mexico City, where the dread foot and mouth disease and fever tick have been prevalent.

The cattle were reported to be French-bred Charolaise breed of which fewer than 200 head are in the U. S.

Wheeler and Saulmon said U. S. Customs agents at El Paso originally uncovered the smuggling operation. One arrest has been made.

# Mother Sentenced For Child-Beating

GALVESTON —(AP)—Mrs. Francis Kelley, 38, a Texas city woman accused of beating her stepdaughter, was sentenced to two years and fined \$1,000 Tuesday.

She had been charged with assault to murder in the beating of Jewel Louise Kelley, 10, last April 6. A jury reduced the charge and convicted her of aggravated assault. Doctors testified the girl was in a hospital 10 days, had bruises, welts and cuts on her body, and had a brain injury that required an operation.

# U. S.-Spanish Pact On Naval, Air Bases Nears Final Stages

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The United States is reported nearing final agreement for use of Spanish naval and air bases in return for large-scale military and economic aid.

Top officials confidentially expect three separate agreements spelling out these Spanish-American ties will be signed sometime this summer.

Tentative plans call for the Eisenhower Administration to provide the Franco government with about 200 million dollars in military and economic assistance during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

As part of the deal being worked out in Madrid, the American government is reported ready to spend additional huge sums running into perhaps hundreds of millions of dollars to modernize and expand about half a dozen Spanish air and naval bases.

Spain would agree to lease these high strategic air and naval installations to the U. S. to help in the defense of Western Europe against communism.

Anderson Proposes Cotton Acreage Allotment Method

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Senator Anderson (D-NM) introduced a bill Tuesday which would revise the method of setting cotton acreage allotments within a state.

He told the Senate the bill resulted from a recent cotton meeting in Fort Worth.

The bill would provide for a one per cent national reserve of acreage allotments. This reserve would be used by state committees to adjust county acreage allotments, including those which have new and small farms. County allotments would be divided to farms on which cotton has been planted in any one of the immediately preceding years on the basis of acreage planted in those three years, with adjustments for abnormal conditions affecting plantings.

# U. S.-Spanish Pact On Naval, Air Bases Nears Final Stages

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The United States is reported nearing final agreement for use of Spanish naval and air bases in return for large-scale military and economic aid.

Top officials confidentially expect three separate agreements spelling out these Spanish-American ties will be signed sometime this summer.

Tentative plans call for the Eisenhower Administration to provide the Franco government with about 200 million dollars in military and economic assistance during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

As part of the deal being worked out in Madrid, the American government is reported ready to spend additional huge sums running into perhaps hundreds of millions of dollars to modernize and expand about half a dozen Spanish air and naval bases.

Spain would agree to lease these high strategic air and naval installations to the U. S. to help in the defense of Western Europe against communism.

Anderson Proposes Cotton Acreage Allotment Method

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Senator Anderson (D-NM) introduced a bill Tuesday which would revise the method of setting cotton acreage allotments within a state.

He told the Senate the bill resulted from a recent cotton meeting in Fort Worth.

The bill would provide for a one per cent national reserve of acreage allotments. This reserve would be used by state committees to adjust county acreage allotments, including those which have new and small farms. County allotments would be divided to farms on which cotton has been planted in any one of the immediately preceding years on the basis of acreage planted in those three years, with adjustments for abnormal conditions affecting plantings.

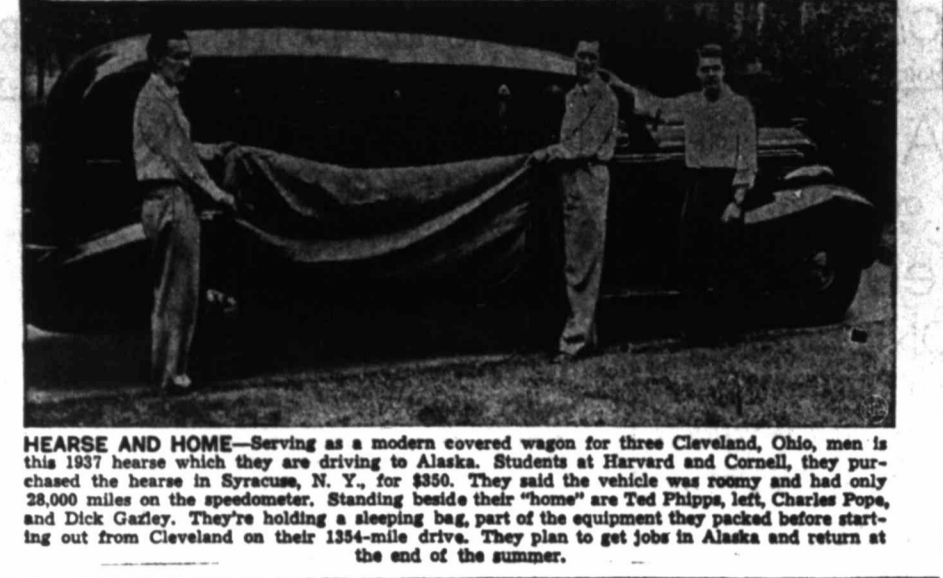

**East German Reds Trumpet Gabfests As Safety Valve**

BERLIN.—(AP)—East Germany's shaky Communist government invited its rebellious subjects Wednesday to air their grievances in Red-sponsored public discussions.

The new policy obviously was designed as a safety valve to keep the East from exploding again into open fighting, but the Reds' Radio Berlin commented that the discussion sessions also would give the government a chance to explain its "new course."

The Russians, however, gave no major sign of lifting their iron grip imposed after the open rebellion began a week ago. Martial law still prevailed and a wartime-type curfew emptied the streets nightly.

The Soviets made only a few minor concessions, letting East and West Berliners who work across the gun-ringed frontier cross at three special points, and releasing 800 West Berliners caught in the Soviet sector by the riots.

Those released said another 500 West Berliners still were being held in a former slaughterhouse for further checking.

Russian firing squads executed three of the picked East German Peoples' Police in East Berlin and shot two others in Gera for alleged complicity in the week of strikes and rioting. This brought to 27 the known total of Soviet executions in their drive to stem the tide of revolt.

**Douglas Proves Champ Dissenter**

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—The new champion dissenter of the Supreme Court is Justice Douglas, the jurist who got into the international spotlight most recently by granting a last-minute stay in the Rosenberg spy case.

Official figures released Wednesday show Douglas wrote 35 dissenting opinions in the court's regular and special terms just ended. He also cast 19 dissenting votes without writing explanatory opinions.

This gave him a total of 54 dissents for the nine months of court sessions—a one-year total of protesting votes greater than ever before recorded by a justice in the court's long history.

Douglas dissented in almost half of the 114 cases decided with formal opinions in the 1952-53 term. While he turned out the 35 dissenting opinions, he also wrote 12 majority opinions for the court.

Douglas had a dissent score of 53 at the close of the court's regular term on June 15. Then he granted the stay of execution to Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, resulting in the tribunal's special term last week.

When the court voted to override the stay, Douglas wrote another dissent and reached the peak of 54.

Nearest approach occurred in the court's 1944-45 term when Justice Owen J. Roberts cast 51 dissenting votes. An appointee of President Herbert Hoover in 1930, Roberts retired at the end of the 1944-45 term.

**Chinese Red Ship Enters Hong Kong**

HONG KONG.—(AP)—A heavy police guard barred newsmen Wednesday from the 7,600-ton Chinese Communist ship Nam Hai, here for engine repairs and believed the first Red Chinese ship to enter Hong Kong in almost two years.

The Nam Hai crept into the harbor Tuesday from Canton and anchored at a commercial buoy.

Shipping sources said the vessel came in ballast, for repairs she could not get in Canton.

## American Judge Serving European Area Commends Conduct Of Army Personnel

MUNICH, GERMANY. — "A good word for the behavior of Americans overseas was spoken here by a judge of the U. S. Court for Germany.

"On the whole I would say the conduct of Americans over here might be termed as good or better than the conduct of Americans

within the U. S. A.," the judge, Marvin B. Colbert of Brenham, Texas, stated.

The Texan is one of four judges of Area Five, which comprises half of Bavaria with jurisdiction over two and one-half million Germans — not counting the Americans in this largest of the German judicial areas.

Over a plate of Texas-style chili in Hitler's spacious "Haus der Kunst" here, Judge Colbert said there were two types of Americans overseas, however, which he wished he could do something about:

(1) The American who never has been west of New York—and thinks he knows and understands the U. S. A.

And (2) The American who comes overseas without knowing something for which his country stands.

The judge has no tolerance for those who don't practice their Americanism.

He has no forgiveness, either, for those who say they were "once Communists," believing that "if they have slipped once, they should not be entrusted with government jobs."

"Serve Good Purpose"

While he does not condone some of the methods of the investigating committees, he does think "they serve a good purpose."

As judge of the U. S. Court for Germany, the Texan is empowered to sit anywhere in the American zone, but the Munich area is his permanent seat. The area comprises 40 counties, is several times larger than the largest Texas district.

His duties may be compared with those of a U. S. district judge. As representative of the Occupying Power, the U. S. Court stands supreme with German courts beneath.

When the peace treaty is ratified and deposited, however, "we will fade out within six months," Judge Colbert stated.

The court responsibility then will shift to the Army.

"It will be up to them to set up some system for handling 'dependents,'" the judge said. Dependents are wives and children of service personnel.

At present, the American Court system here has jurisdiction over all Americans and over all natives—the exception being Americans who are part of the military.

Jurisdiction includes general criminal, civil matters, except domestic relations—such problems as divorce, alienation of affection and loss of one's reproductive powers.

The latter, the judge pointed out, seemed to be cause for many law suits in Europe.

Case work is about 50 per cent criminal, 50 per cent civil.

Principal civil cases are tort and breach of contract, while the principal criminal cases are acts of violence against property and persons—such as theft, burglary, robbery, murder and assaults.

Principal cases are espionage cases—spies who admittedly are working to get information on American military disbursement in Germany," he stated.

The judge, who formerly was assistant attorney at Georgetown, says "One thing I don't understand about these spies—they all confess so easily. Much more readily than some of the criminals I dealt with in Texas."

Judge Colbert noted, also, that "there has been an increase here in dope traffic, particularly marijuana." He said apparently peddlers were not among the Germans but Asiatic peoples.

In Munich only two months after the shooting stopped in 1948, Colbert said his first assignment was property control officer. From 1948 until '48, he was with the War Crime Group on the prosecution

staff for the infamous Buchenwald concentration camp.

Judge Leo B. Goodman, chief presiding judge of Area Five, was chief of the council section, and one of the prosecutors was Robert L. Kunsig, now chief council for the House Un-American Activities Committee in Washington.

At present the chief U. S. attorney, American Zone of Germany, is Worth McCauley of the Oklahoma Bar, Judge Colbert pointed out.

Born in Brenham, county seat of Washington, the judge received his law degree in 1928 from the University of Texas. He and the former Mildred Lewis were married while both were university students.

During the first year after graduation, Colbert was with the Texas Game Commission and effected the first codification of the Texas Game and Fish laws.

Mrs. Colbert, a stately woman of beauty and dignity, finished NTAC in Arlington before going to the university. She also has done scholastic work at Southern Methodist University and at North Texas State College at Denton.

She has served as president of the influential German-American Club, and is second president of the Good Neighbor Committee, the president being Princess Tilar von Bayern.

Speaking admiringly of his wife's club work, the judge explained American women here are cementing better relations between Germans and Americans, and they are doing worthwhile endeavors of the heart.

"In some respects, I think her work will be more lasting than the judicial," he said.

Mrs. Colbert's mother is Mrs. S. O. Lewis of Arlington.

Mr. and Mrs. Colbert have a son, James Edward Colbert, of Lubbock, who is associated with an insurance agency there.

The Colberts think it will be only a matter of months before they will be returning to Texas.

They miss the state. As Mrs. Colbert explained: "You can't live as long as we did in Texas without leaving a big part of your heart there."

**Foreign Car Spree Ends Married Life**  
LONG BEACH, CALIF. —(P)—The road to a happily married life turned into a highway of foreign sports car buying—and therefore won an attractive Long Beach woman a divorce.

She told the court her husband preferred cars to furniture. She said he bought four foreign cars, including one costing \$4,200, since their 1950 marriage.

The only other property the couple had, she said, included a TV set and a tape recorder, "but not a chair to our name." The judge awarded the TV set to her, the recorder to her husband.

As for foreign cars, she said she has no objection. "I drive one myself."

Dr. Rhee's Bold Action

America and its UN allies in Korea apparently are paying the price of not having taken President Syngman Rhee seriously enough in his frequent public protests during the last two years over a "divided-Korea" truce.

The record indicates he made many statements indicating that any agreement would be unacceptable which left the nation cut in two and left North Korea under control of Communist armies.

Not until the controversial prisoner-exchange issue was settled, however, did Rhee translate his objections into official protests to the United States government. Having got little satisfaction for that effort, he now has gone a long step farther and forced American and UN hands by releasing all anti-Red prisoners held in Allied stockades south of the 38th Parallel.

This is a bold effort to block a truce and compel UN forces to continue the war until it can be terminated on Rhee's terms—complete ouster of the Reds clear to the Yalu River border.

No one can gauge so soon what the final result will be of this disruptive move, but neither Washington nor Allied capitals abroad are optimistic over truce prospects. The release of the prisoners makes it impossible—unless all 25,000 should be recaptured—for the UN to deliver on the prisoner agreement it made with the Communists.

Those who see a distinction between Rhee's frequent public declarations against major truce terms and his long-delayed formal protest to official governments regard the aged Korean's behavior as a mystery.

It could be, however, that he imagined no truce ever would be concluded, and felt therefore that he could avoid a formal rift by not carrying his objections to the very last stage. If that were so, the real imminence of a truce would be sufficient to account for his last-minute official outburst.

Some observers feel, too, that he coldly planned from the start to use his objections—fortified by public demonstrations—to force the U. S. into a commitment to protect South Korea, before any truce was signed.

If this were part of his aim, Rhee misjudged the American realities. There is no intent in this country to give him a defense pact so speedily. Many men feel it should and will come only after long debate, including consultation with our Western allies.

Perhaps his realization of this drove Rhee to turn loose Red prisoners and thus jeopardize the truce. If he now succeeds in doing that, he must bear the principal blame for having prolonged a stalemated war that can only reach real decision by becoming far bloodier and costlier, and more dangerous for the whole free world.

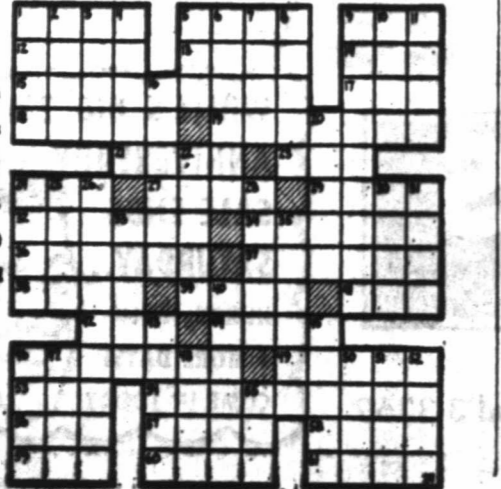

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

Draw Pearson says: Voice of America instructed not to broadcast Ike's book-burning speech at Dartmouth; GOP Secretary of Interior wanted to stamp on Democratic rug; Averell Harriman wants Dulles to resign.

WASHINGTON — This one is hard to believe. However, when President Eisenhower made his anti-book-burning speech at Dartmouth, the Voice of America was stopped from broadcasting it overseas.

Every speech by the President of the United States automatically is broadcast by the Voice. This is mere routine. In this case, however, there was a double reason for broadcasting it. There has been so much criticism of the U. S. A. for purging State Department libraries that Voice of America executives considered Ike's Dartmouth speech a natural.

Just as the Voice, which operates out of New York, was preparing the broadcast, however, word came from Washington not to use it. "Policy reasons" was the excuse.

There has been no further explanation, and State Department officials are still in the dark. Surmise is that Eisenhower got nervous about his speech, as was partly indicated at his press conference two days later when he hedged on his Dartmouth remarks.

Secretary of Interior McKay, visiting his old stamping ground in Portland, Oregon, dropped in at his favorite barber's. Naturally the boys crowded round to greet the home-town boy who had made good.

The Secretary of the Interior answered various questions as to how things were in Washington, and told about the fancy office he occupied in the Interior Department, which is almost as long as a bowling alley, has a special dining room, a bedroom and a shower.

This was a crushing blow. If East had played his low diamond, South could have won the first diamond trick and returned the suit to knock out East's ace. This would establish the rest of dummy's diamonds, with the ace of spades still in dummy as entry to the suit.

East's prompt action in putting up the ace of diamonds and returning a spade threatened to knock out the spade entry before the diamonds could be unblocked.

After some thought, South played a low spade from dummy, allowing West to hold the trick with the nine of spades. Now West made the fatal blunder of continuing the spades. Dummy won with the ace of spades, and South triumphantly discarded the blocking king of diamonds from his hand!

It was now a simple matter for declarer to cash the rest of dummy's diamonds, making his contract and an overtrick.

CARD Sense

Q—With both sides vulnerable, the bidding has been: North East South West 1 Heart 2 Diamonds ? You, South, hold: Spades Q-4-2, Hearts 8-7-3, Diamonds A-Q, Clubs K-Q-J-9-4. What do you do?

A—Bid two no trump. This shows 13 to 15 points, two probable stoppers in the enemy's suit, and balance distribution. It indicates a short powerful holding in diamonds, for with diamond length you would double.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

Search Is Fruitless For Reds' Motives In Newest Flip-Flop

WASHINGTON — While American public interest has been focused on Korean truce possibilities, recent developments in the Soviet zone of East Germany have been no less significant.

They are highlighted by the latest case in which East German authorities relaxed a production speedup after 20,000 building-trades workers had protested in East Berlin. The mere fact that anybody under a Communist government control can protest against any decree is surprising enough in itself. But the fact that the workers had their demands met positively is sensational.

It is possible that the long-repressed workers, taking this concession as a sign of weakness, were inspired to the widespread riots that brought out Russian tanks and machine guns and resulted in martial law being declared.

Before this, over the last couple of weeks, West Berlin and West German authorities have been assailed by these other events:

- 1. A change from a Russian military commander to a civilian high commissioner.
2. A halt on expansion of the collectivized farm system.
3. An offer of state bank credits to private businessmen to reopen shops and factories that had been closed down because they offered competition to state industries.
4. A promise of amnesty and return of property to refugees who would return to East Germany.
5. A relaxation of controls over the churches, church property, clergymen and church organizations such as youth groups.
6. Issuance of ration cards to all East Germans, regardless of whether they had Communist Party political connections or not.
Intense Sovietization

The suddenness with which these reforms have been put into effect in this latest turnaround of Communist policy of course has sent all non-Communist government officials searching for motives.

When the U. S. High Commissioner to Germany, former Harvard President James B. Conant, returned to Washington early in June to testify before congressional committees, he made one radio appearance in which he laid great stress on the completeness of the separation between East and West Germany.

He emphasized that this sovietization of East Germany had been intensified over the last year. From the very day on which the new "contractual agreement" peace treaty had been signed last May between West Germany and the Western allied powers, the Communists began to tighten their hold on East Germany.

The border had been closed at all points except the autobahn and the railroad into Berlin. Collectivization of farms was stepped up. More private industries were closed down. Production quotas on farms and factories were raised to levels impossible to meet.

The result was that the number of refugees fleeing from East Germany to West Germany increased. When West Berlin's Mayor Ernst Reuter was in Washington last March, he reported the refugee stream approaching 60,000 a month. Although Berlin had camps capable of handling 65,000 refugees at a time, the capacity was being increased by 25,000.

#### Hard Labors, Not Miracles Are Behind 'Miracle Drugs'

In the not-too-distant past strange herbs, crushed beetles and all sorts of loathsome mixtures were given to people who were ill. The cures often were considered "miraculous." Naturally, those who recovered were in a better position to boast of their cures than those who did not.

Actually, nature was doubtless responsible, both for the recoveries and the deaths. The fact that so many of these patients lived was in spite of the treatment, rather than because of it.  
Nowadays, there are other cures which are quite similar. Again wishful thinking and the strength of the human body usually is responsible for recovery in those patients who do survive.  
But a different type of treatment sometimes is referred to as a "miracle cure." Many of the newer discoveries of preparations like insulin for diabetes, or penicillin, have been referred to as miracle drugs. Actually, this is most unfortunate, since there is nothing miraculous about them.  
The discovery of insulin, for example, was based on careful laboratory studies and animal experiments in many parts of the world. When it finally became possible to use in-

### German Guide Spent Happy Time In Texas POW Camp

BERCHTESGADEN, GERMANY —It probably seems strange, Hans-Georg Zabel is willing to admit, but some of the happiest days of his life were his prisoner-of-war days in Texas.  
"I was two years at the camp at Mexia," he told me between his lectures to Americans on Hitler's old Summer home here.  
"I really loved Texas—and wish I could go back there," the former POW stated.

He recalled the time when the German prisoners were taken off the train at Mexia, and the townspeople gathered "and stared at us like we had just come from the moon."  
After the starting period, "some of them talked with us and we exchanged souvenirs, coins and small trinkets," he said.  
With his eight years of school English behind him, Hans-Georg became company interpreter at the camp. "Every kind of sport you can imagine was offered us—tennis, German football and table tennis," he recalled.  
"Hot in Texas"  
The big adjustment was in getting

acustomed to the Texas sun. "You know it gets hot in Texas in July," the German said in a convinced tone to this Texan.  
He liked the people of the state, and learned to appreciate wide open spaces. "I can never forget the Texas sky," he said. "There is no other sky like it. And the sunsets in Texas, when the sky burns all red—the most beautiful sunsets in the world are in Texas," the ex-POW believes.  
Zabel, known to his friends as Hans, Georg or Hans-Georg, now is supervisor of tours for the Americans at the Berchtesgaden Recreational Service.  
Tours which he supervises include trips to Obersalsberg, the area where Hitler and Eva Braun lived and where he summoned the heads of many great European nations, including Chamberlain, for historic pre-World War II conferences; to the Salt Mines, subterranean salt chambers 400 years old visited on miniature electric trams; to Wittelsbach castle, Summer residence of the Bavarian royal family, and to Salzburg, and the city's historical churches, dating back to 813 A.D., and its castles and antique shops.  
Zabel says most American tourists are interested in Hitler's home here, but are confused about it.  
Hitler's Tea Room  
"They have the idea he lived in the 'Eagle's Nest,'" he explained. Actually, the 'Nest' is a tea room and was only visited by Hitler on four occasions.  
His summer home, half-way down the mountain, was called "Berghof" and was bombed, and in recent months demolished by the Allies, to prevent Germans making "shrines" out of the historic shambles.  
Although hundreds of Americans take the Obersalsberg trip, they can see no remains of Hitler's house—only the spot where it once stood.  
The guide supervisor says he gets many Texans on his tours.  
In a recent group he took to Obersalsberg were Lt. Col. and Mrs. J. H. Hokerson of Dallas. Stationed in Wiesbaden, Colonel Hokerson formerly was general counsel for the Texas Republican party.  
Today, only about 13 per cent of U. S. automobiles sold are painted black although it formerly was a favorite color for cars and as late as 1948 was used on 26 per cent of the new cars.

## Rioting East Germans Deal Propaganda Blow

WASHINGTON —(P)—Rioting East Germans have dealt their Russian Communist masters major damage if only in the field of propaganda. At the same time they have complicated matters for the Western Allies.  
Shifting tactics after Stalin's death, the Russians talked of peace and indicated they might relax their iron-handed grip here and there. They even appeared to be moving in that direction by shifting their occupation control in East Germany from military to civilian hands. But the discontent of the East Germans had long been plain. Refugees Offer Proof  
The steady flow of refugees into West Germany was proof to that. And, with less publicity, the Russians held the screws tight on the East Germans.  
Last week's rebels demanded lower work quotas, lower consumer goods prices, freedom for political prisoners, free elections, and reunification of East and West Germany.

Since Russian suppression of the revolt with troops, tanks and firing squads was testimony only to their power and not to their persuasiveness, the cause of the revolt remains: fierce hatred in East Germany of the Russians.  
And it was the greatest demonstration against Russian control of the satellites since the war. It was encouragement to other satellite peoples to do the same, if they dared.  
This week for the Allies, making head of Russian claims for the winners of communism, nevertheless created a serious problem for the Western Allies on the question of reunifying Germany.

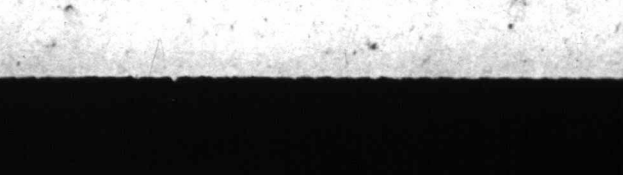

# Understand Rhee, Then You Know Turn Of Korea Events

**By DON WHITEHEAD**  
 WASHINGTON—(AP)—Tough and willful old Syngman Rhee has been striking matches and tossing them around in the world's powder keg, Korea.

Defiantly, he has slapped his friends because they are willing to stop the fighting and then seek unification of Korea through negotiations with the Reds, rather than at the point of a bayonet.

The major Allied powers want to sit at a conference table and decide the future of this little country so torn and ravaged by war—perhaps later to reach an agreement on all Asia. And Rhee is struggling against them with an all-or-nothing defiance that some regard as fanaticism.

You may damn this old man for his unyielding opposition to compromise with the Communists at a time when peace in Asia seems at stake. But for any understanding of what is happening, you must understand Rhee.

**Dream-Slipper Away**  
 He is a strong-willed man as he has demonstrated—strong-willed perhaps to the point of recklessness. A united, independent Korea is a dream for which he has fought many, many years. And obviously in his thinking he is seeing this dream slip from his grasp.

When Rhee was a youth, Korea had a King. Even at 19, Rhee was active in politics. He became a force in an organization which was urging democratic reforms under the monarchy and elimination of Japanese influence in the government.

He was jailed, tortured and hounded, but he had a stubborn streak that would not bend. Then in 1910 the Japanese deposed Korea's King and seized his country. They forced Rhee into exile and he went to Hawaii. But he helped encourage an underground resistance in Korea.

Delegates met secretly in Seoul to elect Rhee head of a provisional government. But the Japanese learned about it, broke up the meeting and punished the ringleaders.

In 1920, Rhee was in Shanghai helping to organize and direct guerrilla activity, always pleading the cause of an independent Korea.

After World War II, Rhee returned to a divided country to become president of the Republic of Korea. His desire for unity of his

country was so fierce that American authorities feared he might use the South Korean Army to attack North Korea.

**Chinese Enter War**  
 But it was the North Koreans who attacked. For a time, when the invaders were hurled back and retreating pell-mell, it appeared that Rhee had at last achieved victory. But the Chinese entered the war and the stalemate developed roughly along the 38th Parallel, still Korea's general dividing line.

More than two years ago, Rhee told an Associated Press writer his people would oppose bitterly any settlement leaving Korea divided. He argued nothing less than a campaign to drive the Reds all the way across the Yalu would be acceptable. He hasn't changed his view.

The real danger has been that Rhee would create situations where South Korean armed forces would be at gunpoint against their UN allies. Such a monstrous tragedy could very well imperil the freedom that has been saved for South Korea and Rhee by the Allies he now defies.

## ODM To Stockpile Executive Talents

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Office of Defense Mobilization plans to stockpile executive talent, as well as war materials, for any future war emergency.

Director Arthur S. Flemming expects to obtain, from key officials he is "borrowing" temporarily from industry, promises that they will come back to Washington when and if the nation mobilizes.

Flemming hopes to obtain from the men and their companies assurances that:

1. Having served six months or a year in ODM, they will return to Washington periodically for brief "refresher" tours of duty, perhaps as consultants on special defense problems.
  2. They will keep up to date the information in their personal loyalty-security files here.
- The latter assurance is not being requested because of any fear that the industry talent will suddenly turn subversive. It is a matter of saving time if the experts are recalled in a crisis.
- Officials have learned by experience that, in emergency periods, the Federal Bureau of Investigation can fall 60 to 90 days behind in its task of completing security checks on the flood of new appointees. In the meantime, the men are unable to function in many jobs involving national security.
- Officials said Flemming is sold on the policy of rotating appointees. His six top men, assistant directors who will handle the ODM's major divisions, and a number of other important subordinates will

work on this basis. When they go home, other industry men will replace them.

An ODM reorganization, undertaken since the agency gained permanent status a week ago, also provides that each division have a permanent deputy from the regular career government service. Flemming believes this will serve to provide continuity in policy and operations.

## Air Search Helps In Finding Uranium

PHOENIX, ARIZ.—(AP)—Search for uranium in Arizona is being aided by an air survey of prospective uranium fields. The survey is being made by light aircraft equipped with devices which detect radiation as high as 100 feet.

Almost 3,000 square miles of Coconino County in northern Arizona have been surveyed and mapped. The map is brought up to date on the fifteenth of each month. The work is being done by field geologists of the Atomic Energy Commission.

## They Couldn't Find A Better Occasion

NORMAN, OKLA.—(AP)—A group of University of Oklahoma engineering students finally gave in to the long-suppressed desire to duck an instructor before the start of final examinations.

The students gave an engagement shower for Edwin Jackson, student instructor in engineering—and just as the last gift was being presented they grabbed Jackson, carried him to the University's Mirror Pool and dumped him in.

They recovered quickly, returned to the Baptist Student Center, scene of the shower, grabbed a garden hose and turned it on his tormentors.

## Toy Library Newest Aid To Youngsters

GLENDALE, CALIF.—(AP)—Youngsters of Glendale now boast of a mobile toy lending library and a "toyarian" to manage it.

The Tuesday Afternoon Club Juniors bought a trailer, renovated and decorated it, and youngsters of 23 elementary schools contributed 2,500 toys for the library.

The young set have regular borrower's cards, are graded on their treatment of the toys and they can graduate to bigger, more expensive toys, or even long term period to use them.

# Mexico Bush Pilot 'Smells' Way In Mountainous Flights

 NEW YORK—(AP)—Took a 'plane ride with a bush pilot in Mexico, a while back.

He had a little yellow bug with props about as long as the span of a tall man's arms.

There was no radio in the ship, but then, in the region this pilot covers, it would have been simply excess baggage. There is no place to radio to.

Our boy flies jungle and mountains, exclusively. He probably would not feel at home riding a radio beam, or even putting down on a concrete runway. Any old strip of reasonably level and uncluttered ground is okay with him.

So he was just the man to take me to Palenque in Southeastern Mexico, not far from Guatemala.

First, there was the weigh-in—which meant the passengers, not their baggage. You can't take anything except a lightweight toothbrush.

There were some seats bolted to the floor. You have to sit up near the cockpit on the takeoff and landing. There was no door on the cockpit, which permitted an excellent view of a first-class pilot.

Well, we got off the ground, played tag with a couple mountain tops, and headed northeast. Presently, we were over solid clouds.

Our flight was to have taken about 30 minutes.

Sure enough, some 45 minutes after takeoff, the captain nosed the bug down into the clouds. As usual, it was flying through a bowl of milk—except that nobody was below to calmly radio data and directions for a ground controlled approach landing.

Some 30 seconds later, he turned her nose up again, and burst out above the clouds. He kept on his northeasterly course.

From time to time, he glanced at his watch. Once or twice, he flipped the switches on the fuel indicators. The needles were not encouraging.

Finally, he went into the clouds again. This time, he kept going, and presently broke through. We were over a plain, and all he had to find was a level stretch to put down on. He picked an avenue between some trees that looked about as wide as a bowling alley. And there we were.

In that type of flying, he said, you must more or less smell your way through the mountains. The first time he started down through the clouds, things didn't smell right.

Next time, on that run, I ride with Jimmy Durante.

## TB Victims Purposely Seek Prison Sentences

# SPPs: U. S. Army's Elite (and Brainy) GIs 'Fit Square Pegs In Square Holes'

ARMY CHEMICAL CENTER,  
EDGEWOOD, MD.—(NEA)—The U. S. Army at last has found a way to put square pegs in square holes. Several thousand, anyway.

And the results are burning out fine, although with a few disconcerting twists.

For instance the other day a frantic phone call from the Pentagon ordered the officer-in-charge of some super-secret laboratory project at Edgewood sent to Washington pronto to appear before a Senate committee.

The colonel at this end of the line stammered a little and finally had to admit to the Pentagon general that the man in charge of said program was a private first class—an "SPP."

The upshot was that a colonel appeared before the Senate committee, but with the private at his elbow to whisper the answers into his ear.

**MA Degree Required**

The SPPs are a group of very brainy young enlisted men known officially as Scientific and Professional Personnel.

As of now, to qualify for an SPP job, you've got to have a masters degree in some science or scientific field. When the program first got under way more than a year ago an ordinary degree was good enough. And with the present crop of double domes getting tighter they may drop the bar back down a degree.

Here's the way the program works:

A few weeks after basic training starts, draftees with real scientific savvy, are given the chance to ask for SPP duty. That means a shortened basic course and quick assignment to one of the Army's many research and development outfits.

It also means no chance to become an officer, a very difficult chance even to get an enlisted promotion, and no chance to win medals or overseas ribbons.

**Experience Valuable**

In exchange, however, the SPP gets to spend his period of service in his own field of scientific work and gets out of the Army with valuable experience under his belt. The Army may lose a good general duty officer and field leadership material, but it gets the use of a lot of scientific brain-power which it can't buy on the civilian market today.

There are close to 1,000 of these master-minds in the current Chemical Corps SPP program, the biggest one in the Army. They hold down key jobs in the labs and get all kinds of complicated, technical assignments.

One officer estimates that the SPPs do close to one-third of all of the scientific and technical work they do is so important the details of it are classified.

That doesn't keep Pvt. Paul O. Nielson of Detroit from speaking out on what he thinks about the program, however.

**Skepticism Expressed**

"I must admit that I was skeptical about the idea at first," he says, "having heard so much about Army methods. But it really has amazed me how well the thing works. My job has been a constant challenge to me. I've learned more than I think I could have in private industry, in fact. And I think I've been able to make a real contribution to the project I'm on."

Nielson, according to his commanding officer, is a brilliant chemical engineer. He was graduated from the University of Michigan last year and worked for an oil company while finishing his graduate studies before he was drafted.

The SPPs have their own club and they constitute most of the GI force on this large base. There's no guard house because there's no discipline problem.

Their club bridge team is rated the best in the East. They've set up a job-placement office, which is constantly hounded by personnel officials from the biggest corporations.

**Scholarship Planned**

And they've started a scholarship fund to send the outstanding high school graduate of adjoining Harford County to college.

About one-third of the present SPP crop has indicated a desire to stay on here as civilian scientists.

SPPs have participated. "It would be hard to overestimate the tremendous contribution these men have made to our research and development program," says Lt. Col. Walter W. Kuehler, head of one of the jobs.

The same sentiment is echoed by everyone who has had anything to do with the SPP program.

## Change In Proposed Routing Of Railway Sought By Garland

DALLAS —(P)—Garland became the second city to seek changes in proposed routing of a shortline railway track the Santa Fe Railroad plans to build from Sanger into Dallas.

"There has been some talk about trying to get the track routed through Garland," said Jim Stewart, manager of the Garland chamber of commerce. "It certainly would be good to have the route through Garland."

The new line, as announced by the Santa Fe Saturday, would run about three miles south of Garland. Denton has started a campaign to get the proposed shortline routed through Denton and has sought the assistance of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce in its request.

Ben Wooten, president of the Dallas chamber, said he thinks Denton has a right to expect service from the proposed railway track.

## Rogers, Jr., Family Represents Ideal

The wife of Will Rogers, Jr., loves cowboys and Indians.

That makes everything fine and dandy, since she is married to a man who is a cowboy at heart. Two of their three sons are Indians.

The Rogers family, in fact, represents the ideal of most small American boys. Pop is a fine hand with a bucking bronco, the boys (except little Carl, one) are given a free hand with horses and lassos and the whole family spends vacations on the Navajo reservation in New Mexico.

All three Rogers boys are adopted, and Rogers says this was the best idea he and his wife, Collier, ever had. Randy, now 18, is a Cherokee; Clem, 15, is a Navajo. Little Carl is a paleface. The two older boys accompanied their father on his current trip East.

Since it was their first trip to New York, Pop planned the full sightseeing treatment for them, including the Empire State Building, the sightseeing trip around Manhattan and tickets to top shows. Says young Rogers ruefully:

"Know what they said when I outlined the plans? They'd rather stay in the hotel room and watch TV."

Rogers is one of the leading champions of the rights of the red man. He is president of the National Congress of American Indians, and came to New York primarily to officiate at the opening of the new Fifth Avenue headquarters of the group and join a parade in which New York state Indians re-enacted the sale of Manhattan Island. Says he:

"You couldn't give New York back to the Indians now, however. They don't want it. Too crowded."

Rogers has just completed work on his second movie, "The Boy From Oklahoma." His first was "The Story of Will Rogers," in which he played his famous father.

It still is a surprise to young Rogers to find himself a movie actor. As a newspaper publisher and Congressman, he had no theatrical ambitions when he was first approached with the suggestion that he star in the movie biography of his father. Says he:

"Both my mother and I turned

the idea down. We agreed it would be much better for a professional actor to play the role. But for some reason the possibilities, such as Jimmy Stewart, were otherwise occupied every time the question came up.

"The thing dragged on for years. Finally, it looked as if the picture never would be made unless I took the part. So I did."
