WE WERE DISTRESSED to learn this week about the bad treatment that has been inflicted from time to time by those who rent the Friona Community Center.

We understand that considerable damage has been sustained at the restrooms of the facility. Holes have been knocked into the walls, and the lavatory in one of the restrooms was left hanging precariously.

When the local participants in the recent Christmas in November crafts bazaar went to set up for their show, they found the center in a deplorable mess (described in a letter to the editor elsewhere in this issue).

The Community Center's completion gave our residents an excellent facility for all the activities it has housed, including the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show, July 4th and Maize Days activities, Chamber of Commerce banquets and many other things.

Our community has a lot of time and money invested in the building. It took a big fund drive and a lot of labor to get the building in the first place, and with inflation, it will cost considerably more to replace or remodel due to damage.

Of course, everyone who uses the Community Center was not involved in the fund drive, and doesn't attend such functions as the Chamber banquet or stock show. Apparently their attitude in some cases is "We've rented this place for the night, and it's ours to treat as we see fit."

As a result of the recent damage, the City plans to go up on the rent it charges for the use of the Community Center, and also plans to double the amount of the deposit that is required, from \$125 to \$250.

By so doing, City Manager Beelee Goodwin hopes this will cut down on the damage.

As someone said, we sure would hate to go back to having our stock shows outdoors.

H. ROSS PEROT has been thrusting himself into the national limelight this past week.

Someone said old Ross must be pretty darned offensive, to cause General Motors to pay 700 million dollars to buy his shares in the company and be rid of the Texas computer magnate. GM paid more than twice the market value of the shares.

"Toyota City, not Detroit—that's the car capital of the world," Perot said.

The outspoken Texan has not endeared himself to school officials, due to the sweeping changes he proposed as a member of Governor White's committee on education.

At one of his appearances this week, Perot was asked if he planned to seek a high political office. He laughed and remarked, "And the current administration thinks it has problems!"

Pheasant Season Kicks Off

The 1986 pheasant season will kick off Saturday morning, December 13.

Once again the season will be two weeks in duration, spanning three weekends. Final day of the season will be Sunday, December 28.

Again this season it will be necessary for hunters to buy a hunting license if they plan to hunt anywhere other than on their own homestead. Game wardens will in all probability be checking for violators on this law.

A good hunting season is anticipated, although reports are that hunting may be light north of Friona toward Deaf Smith County and in the Rhea community. However, reports from other areas indicate that hunting may be at least "normal."

The bag limit will remain the same as in years past: two cocks per day and four in possession. Only the cock pheasants are legal game.

A large influx of hunters is expected for the opening weekend of the season next weekend.

A contest for the hunter turning in the longest tailfeather will be held sponsored by the Parmer County Game Management Association. Details on where to turn in the feather entries will be announced next week.

Texas followed the lead of its neighboring state, New Mexico, with the passage of House Bill 1421, which authorized the formation of Operation Game Thief. Concerned citizens may call a 24-hour toll-free number, 1-800-792-GAME, to report flagrant violations of Texas' wildlife and fish laws.

Since implementing its game thief program in 1976, New Mexico has collected over \$79,000 in fines and paid almost \$40,000 in rewards.

Trespassing laws have been stiffened with HB 717 upping criminal trespassing from a Class C to a Class B misdemeanor. In addition, if the offender carries a deadly weapon, he can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor.

Notice has to be present before a person can commit criminal trespassing. Notice is given in three ways: (1) Oral or written communication by owner of property; (2) Presence of fencing to exclude intruders or contain livestock, or (3) Sign posted on property indicating entry is forbidden.

Under the Texas penal code, a Class C misdemeanor carries a maximum \$200 fine. However, trespassers convicted under the new law, under a Class B misdemeanor, will face a possible \$1,000 fine and/or 180 days in jail.

If the offender carries a deadly weapon, and most hunters do, the Class A misdemeanor can cost up to \$2,000 in fines and up to a year in jail.

Monday Deadline To Join Project

Monday will be the final day to join "Project Christmas Card" for 1986.

Those wishing to donate to Parmer County Community Hospital and have their names included in the Christmas edition of the Friona Star must make their contribution at Friona State Bank before closing time on Monday.

All proceeds from the drive will go to help the hospital meet federal requirements in regard to fire safety.

Coach Vicki Hatton said that the Odessa team was involved in

re-districting, and had some last-minute dates to fill. "They were desperate for the game, and we had the date open, so it worked out fine," Miss Hatton said.

There will not be a boys' game, since the Chieftains were playing at Valley Friday night.

Next Tuesday, the teams visit River Road for games, and on Friday, the girls varsity and junior varsity will host Abernathy.

Jr. Bands Set Concert

The junior high school bands will be presenting a Christmas concert on Thursday, December 18. This year, due to the extended football season, the high school band will not present their seasonal concert.

The concert will be held at the Friona Junior High School

beginning at 7:30 p.m. December 18. A charge of \$1 per person will be made at the door.

Performing will be the fifth grade band, sixth grade band and junior high band. They will play a program of popular, serious and Christmas music.

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--DEC. 11, 1931

Friona has been in need of refuge for the unwary violator of the public peace, and owing to the fact that the city treasury has been depleted to the extent that no funds were available for the purpose, enough funds have been donated by various citizens to purchase the cage. This cage has been delivered, but no building is available in which to house it.

50 YEARS AGO--DEC. 11, 1936

A very disastrous occurrence took place on the farm of I.W. Barnhouse about 16 miles southeast of Friona on Thanksgiving Day, November 26, wherein Mr. Barnhouse's entire feed crop was destroyed by fire. The crew had just finished threshing the crop from about 200 acres of sudan and the straw was piled in one immense stack, when it was noticed that the top of the stack was on fire. By the time the thresher could be moved, the entire stack was ablaze, and was completely destroyed.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 12, 1941

Their many friends in Friona have learned with regret the planned move of Rev. and Mrs. C. Carl Dollar to Lannett, Alabama, where he will be pastor of the Congregational Christian Church. The Dollars have been most active both in church and civic work in Friona. Little excitement greeted the declaration of war on Thursday against Germany and Italy, certainly not the stunned silence of Monday when the United States answered the Japanese challenge. The country is settling into a grim determination to back up what the president terms the greatest challenge ever made to life, liberty and civilization.

40 YEARS AGO--DEC. 6, 1946

The modern age of aerial warfare is playing havoc with the ancient art of hunting. Local Nimrods, scouring the Plains lakes for duck and geese, have been loud in their complaints since the opening of the season that a few

airborne sportsmen are not only violating the game laws, but spoiling the sport for other hunters. Reports say that light planes are being used not only to scout the lakes for duck and geese, but in some cases in an effort to herd the flocks to certain spots.

35 YEARS AGO--DEC. 6, 1951

G.B. (Pete) Buske still is confined to the Parmer County Community Hospital, suffering from severe lacerations and broken bones in all fingers of his right hand as incurred in a roping accident last Saturday. It is not known yet if Buske will lose some of the fingers.

30 YEARS AGO--DEC. 6, 1956

History turned a page last weekend, when the City of Friona occupied its new quarters in the just-completed city hall adjoining the fire station on Main Street. The shift from the Legion Hall, which has been the city's home for years, was accomplished without fanfare.

Also moving last week was the Ethridge-Spring Agency, which moved one door south to the former post office location which has been remodeled for them. Johnny Nazworth of Friona Shoe Shop moved into Ethridge's former location.

25 YEARS AGO--DEC. 7, 1961

Friona's farm skill demonstration teams brought home first place banners from the state competition in Huntsville Saturday. Both the junior and senior teams were judged best of the ten teams competing in each division. Members of the senior team were Charles Bass, Ranza Boggess, Earl Crow and Max Reeve. The junior team was composed of Don Collier, Jimmy Snead, Milton Hargus and Dennis Howell. J.C. Lane and David McVey are instructors.

15 YEARS AGO--DEC. 9, 1971

Tony Perea, former super-star for the Friona Chieftains, has another banner year for the University of Texas at El Paso

Miners. Tony made first team all conference for the Miners as a middle linebacker, and also was chosen honorable mention on the Associated Press' All-American team announced recently.

10 YEARS AGO--DEC. 12, 1976

Friona High School's Farm Radio team won the district and area leadership contests, and then placed second in the state finals. Members of the team are Jody Lewellen, Tom Schilling, Danny Hand and Mike Hill.

Five members have been selected to the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture's board of directors. Elected to serve two-year terms on the local board were Gayle Warren, Tom Jarboe, John R. Cook, Ronald Smiley and JeDon Gallman.

5 YEARS AGO--DEC. 13, 1981

New members of the Friona Chamber of Commerce board of directors were welcomed at the Tuesday morning board meeting. Those elected were Ted Procter, Mike Hanes, D.L. Harguess, John Blackwell and Janet Buske.

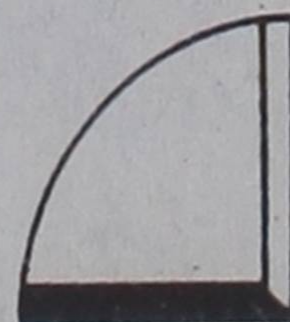

Chieftain Cagers Fall In Tourney

Friona Chieftain basketballers lost all three of their games at the Vega tournament last weekend.

The team fell to host Vega on Thursday, 92-49. Hot shooting Vega grabbed a 50-21 halftime lead and coasted for the win. Daniel Echols and Shy Burney each scored 11 points to pace the Chieftains.

On Friday, the team met Bovina but could not duplicate their performance of the previous Tuesday, as Bovina scored a 69-51 win.

The Chiefs got pairs of baskets from Echols, Burney and Jeff Dickson, as they stayed within a basket of Bovina, 18-16, in the first quarter.

The second quarter was a disaster for Friona, as they could manage only six points to 22 for the Mustangs, who went to halftime with a 40-22 lead.

The Chieftains outscored Bovina, 29-27 in the second half, but could not cut into the big lead. Shane Hand's 12 points and Burney's ten led the scoring.

Adrian scored a 70-62 win over the Chiefs on Saturday.

Adrian was off to a good start and held a 28-12 lead at the end of the first quarter. The Matadors led at the half, 47-26.

Friona had a good second half, particularly the last quarter, when they outscored the winners, 23-11. But they couldn't quite catch up.

Burney scored 19 points and Echols 11 to lead the scoring.

Squaws Score Hard-Fought Victory Over Happy Girls

Friona High School's Squaws scored a hard-fought, 28-25 win over the Happy Cowgirls in a non-conference game here Tuesday night.

The Squaws trailed the visitors, 25-23 in the low-scoring duel before rallying for the win.

Ronda Ratcliff made a pair of free throws to tie the game with 2:38 left, and then Mike Maddox stole the ball and drove the length of the court for the winning basket with 1:36 left to play.

The game mainly tested the defenses employed by the Squaws and the Cowgirls.

Glenda Ellis had a pair of jump shots in the first quarter, which ended with Happy holding a 9-8 lead.

The slow-moving game continued in the second quarter. Friona scored only three goals--by Miss Ratcliff, Lacye Osborn and Sindy Preston--but Happy managed only four points. That enabled Friona to hold a 14-13 lead at halftime.

Miss Ellis' shot gave Friona a 16-13 lead, and after Happy scored, Miss Maddox canned a jump shot to give Friona an 18-15 lead.

Happy got a field goal, and Miss Maddox countered for a 20-17 Friona lead.

However, the visitors got two goals by Marlana Cogburn in the final two minutes to take a 21-20 lead at the end of the third quarter.

(By point of comparison, Friona scored at least 20 points in each of three quarters in their previous game vs Adrian.)

Happy took a 23-20 lead to begin the final quarter, but Miss Maddox' free throw, and a jump shot with 3:25 remaining tied the game at 23-all.

Happy then scored for a 25-23 lead, and the possibility of a low-scoring loss loomed big.

But the Squaws worked the ball in, and Miss Ratcliff was fouled trying a layup shot. She made both free throws, which knotted the score at 25-all.

Then Miss Maddox made her interception, and made sure her layup was good at the 1:36 mark.

Miss Ratcliff made one of two from the line with 1:24 to play for Friona's final point, and Miss Ellis allowed the drama to continue by missing the front-end of a 1-1 free throw with 12 seconds left.

Friona had stalled the ball most

of the final minute, until Miss Ellis was fouled to stop the clock.

Nine points don't usually win game-scoring honors, but they did for Miss Maddox this night. And five of them came in the final quarter, when they counted big.

Happy brought a 5-2 record into the game, and suffered only their third season loss.

Squaws Repeat In Vega Tourney

Friona High School's Squaws won the championship of the Vega Booster Club tournament last weekend, sweeping to wins in all three of their games.

The Squaws ran past Vega, Bovina and Adrian to take the tournament win, and ran their season record to 6-1. It was the second year in a row for Friona's girls to win the Vega tournament.

On Thursday, the team met host Vega, and scored a 45-33 win. The Squaws jumped ahead, 16-7 after the first quarter and held a 26-18 halftime lead.

Ronda Ratcliff scored 16 points to pace the Squaws' scoring. Lacye Osborn chipped in ten.

On Friday, the Squaws met Bovina for the second time in four days, and third time this season. Friona made it two straight over their county rivals 48-33, thanks to a great third quarter.

Miss Ratcliff's eight points had paced the team in its 21-all halftime score.

Friona came out in the third quarter and almost completely shut the Fillies down, while scoring 13 points to Bovina's three. Mika Maddox led the way with five points.

Miss Ratcliff was Friona's only player in double figures with 16 points. Sindy Preston came off the bench to score eight points.

In Saturday's final game, the Squaws scored their easiest win of the meet over Adrian, 73-43.

The Squaws jumped out to a 21-6 lead, and Coach Vicki Hatton was able to let her entire squad get a lot of playing time.

Nine players shared in the scoring, led by Miss Ratcliff's 21, Miss Preston's ten, and Trudy Reeve's 12.



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Rites Held Thurs. For Kay Kendrick

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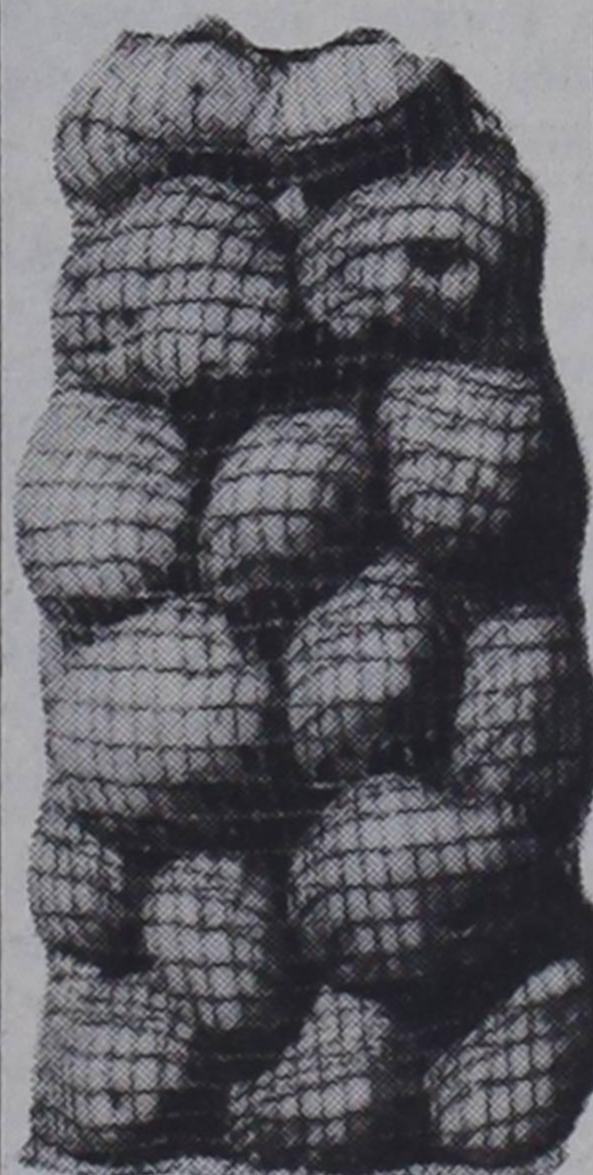

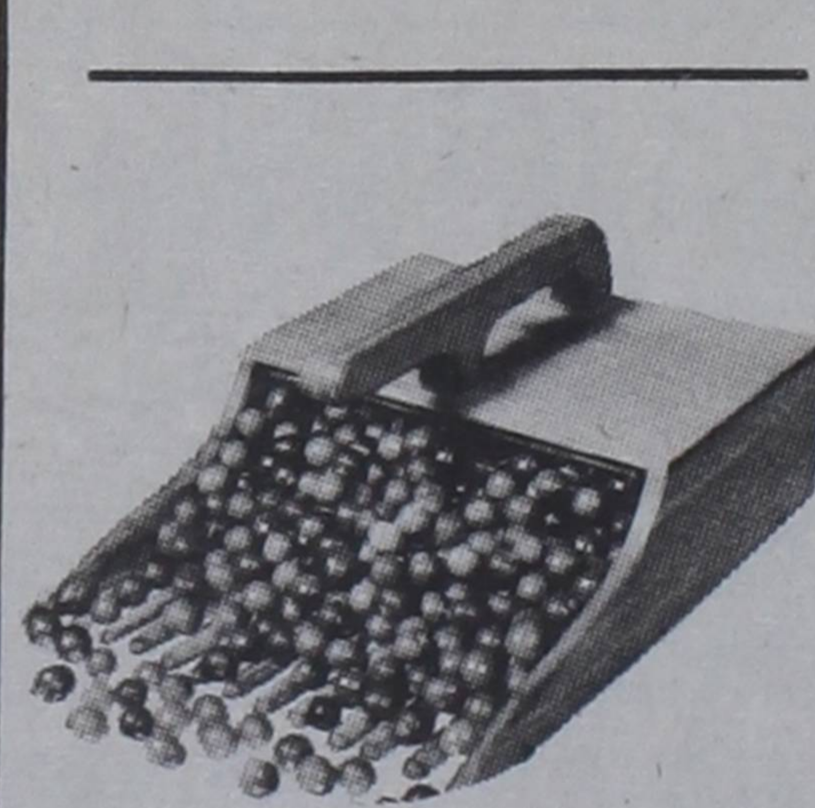

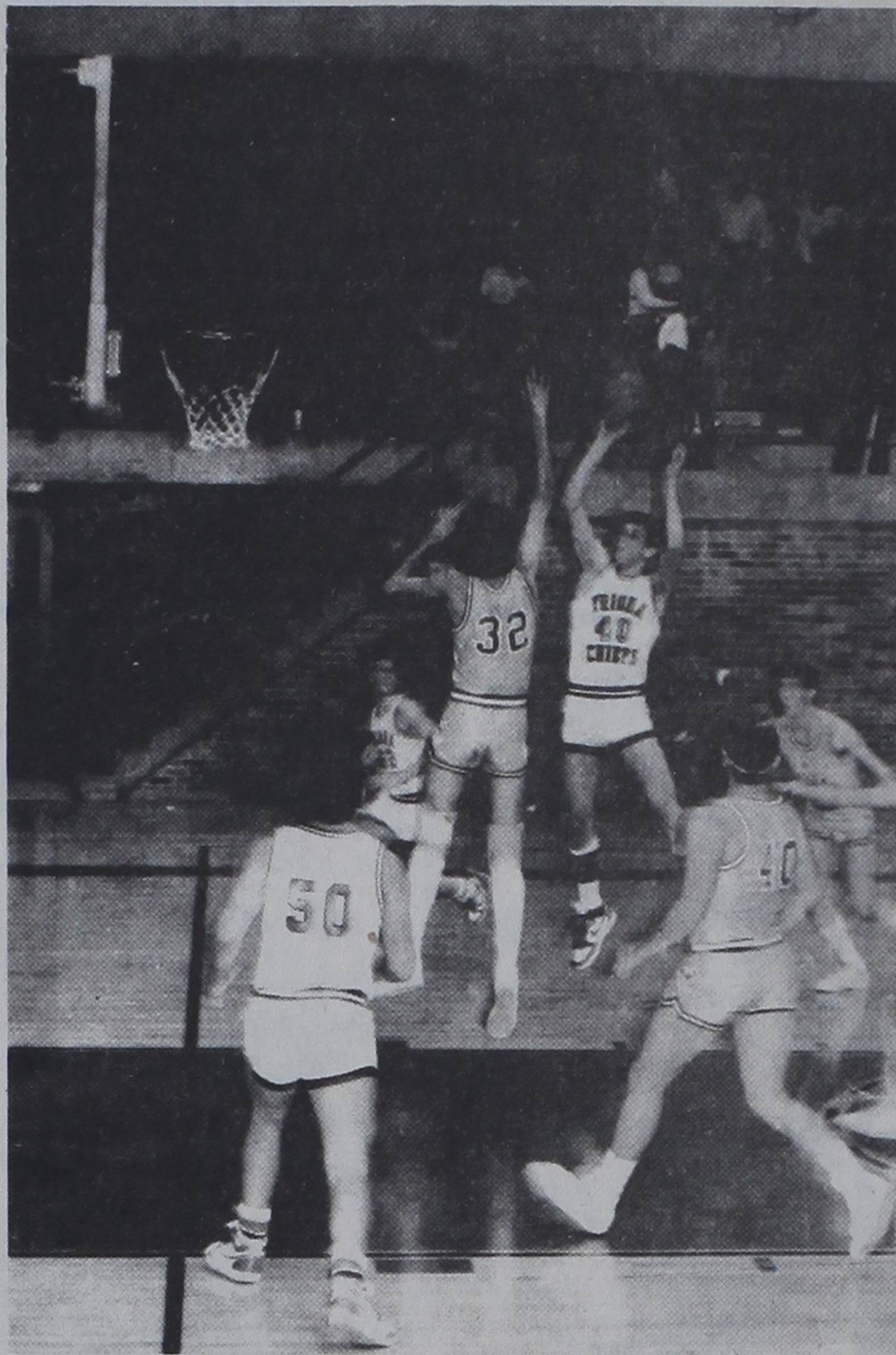

Parmer Farmer In 'Chapter 12'

A Parmer County farmer has filed the first official petition for Chapter 12 reorganization in the Amarillo division of the Northern District of the Texas Bankruptcy Court.

The petition was filed Wednesday, November 26.

Lawrance Kriegel, 41, of Bovina, said he filed the petition in an attempt to hold on to the fruit of more than ten years of labor.

If he did not own his farm, he said he would have liquidated and walked away, instead of entering the limelight by petitioning for Chapter 12 reorganization.

The new chapter became effective November 26, a month after President Reagan signed a farm bankruptcy bill co-written by Rep. Mike Synar, D-Okla., and Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa.

Proponents of Chapter 12 hope the plan will allow financially troubled farmers to stay in business until agricultural commodities reach higher prices.

Under Chapter 12, farmers and ranchers with secured debts of up to \$1.5 million may petition the federal Bankruptcy Court for protection if they earned half of their income from agricultural endeavors, and if 80 per cent of their secured debt came from that operation, according to the Texas Family Farm and Ranch Advisory Committee.

In addition to filing, Kriegel presented a written statement to local media representatives in which he asked the press to make people aware of the plight of farmers.

The statement also blasted farm policy which Kriegel said prevents farmers from changing from one crop program to another to best suit their needs.

Kriegel said tampering with target and loan prices, in addition to manipulation of carryover crop stocks, has depressed commodity prices further.

The Bovina farmer said his reorganization plan will add corn to the crops he now grows, for a potentially higher price.

Without the Chapter 12, Kriegel said he probably would have waited to see how long it took for creditors to foreclose on his 320-acre farm.

The Texas Department of Agriculture said 86,816 agricultural bankruptcies occurred nationwide last year. Texas farms and ranches accounted for 6,808 of those failures, the TDA said.

"Since this is available, I've been thinking about it a lot, I decided to go ahead and try reorganization," he said.

"I've never been in a bankruptcy case before, so I don't know all of the little details. My attorneys feel they can make my case work. But it is shaky ground for me, because it is something I haven't been in before."

Kriegel said he would pay his attorneys a straight fee, but that the new reorganization chapter was designed to cut back court time and expenses.

If U.S. District Judge John C. Akard approves the plan, a trustee will be appointed to oversee financial management of the farm.


Kriegel described his farm as small and said he began farming in 1972, prior to the wheat market skyrocketing on the eve of massive grain purchases by the Soviets.

The first years were profitable for Kriegel. Currently, however, he reports debts totalling \$400,000, accumulated primarily during the last two years.

Kriegel is a third generation farmer and is the second generation farmer to work the land he now owns.

"It is hard to know the family's total reaction (to filing the petition). I know they're concerned," he said. "I've been playing with FmHA for two years now, so I guess they've known there would be a day when I had to leave or file bankruptcy."


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Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

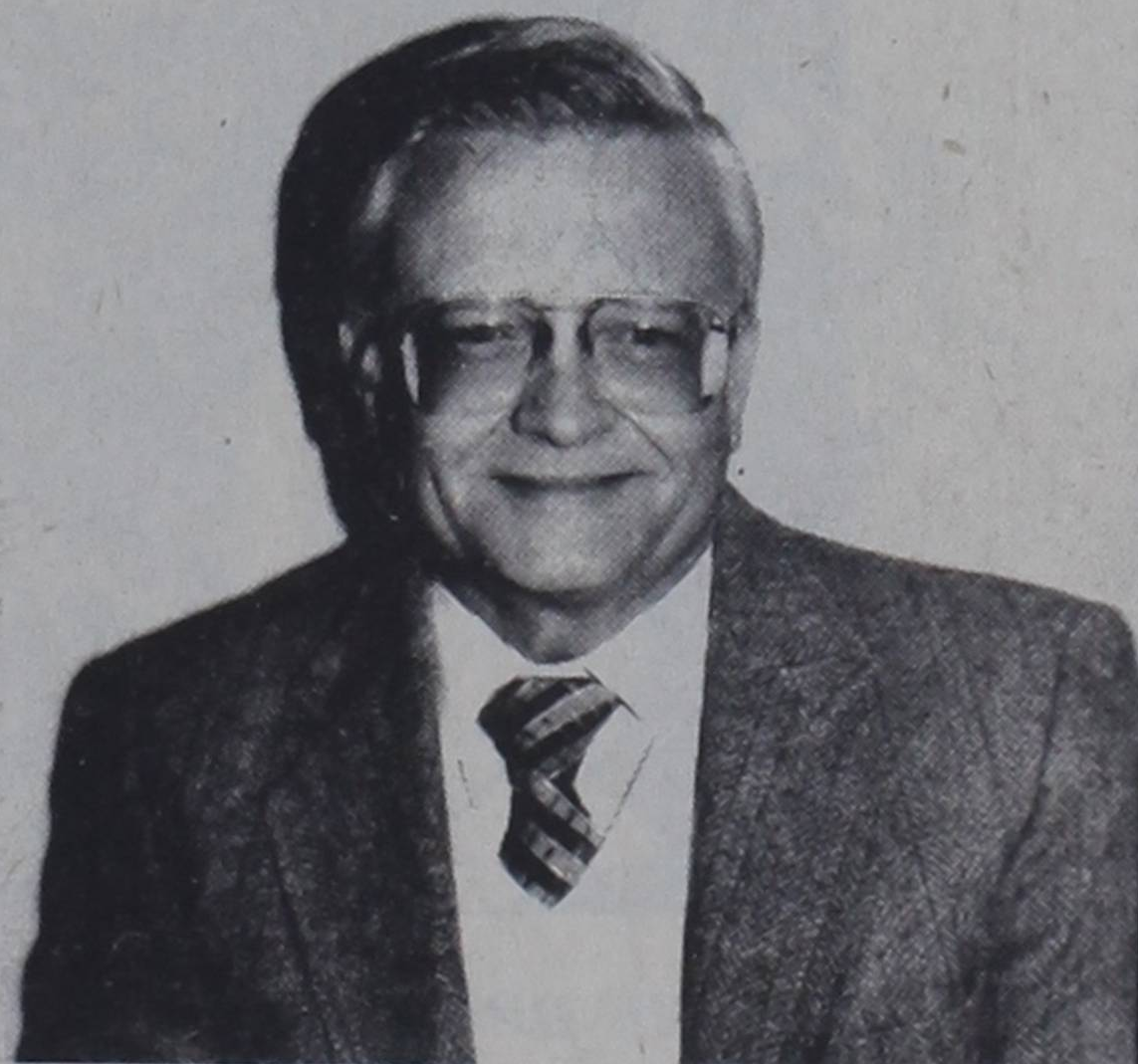

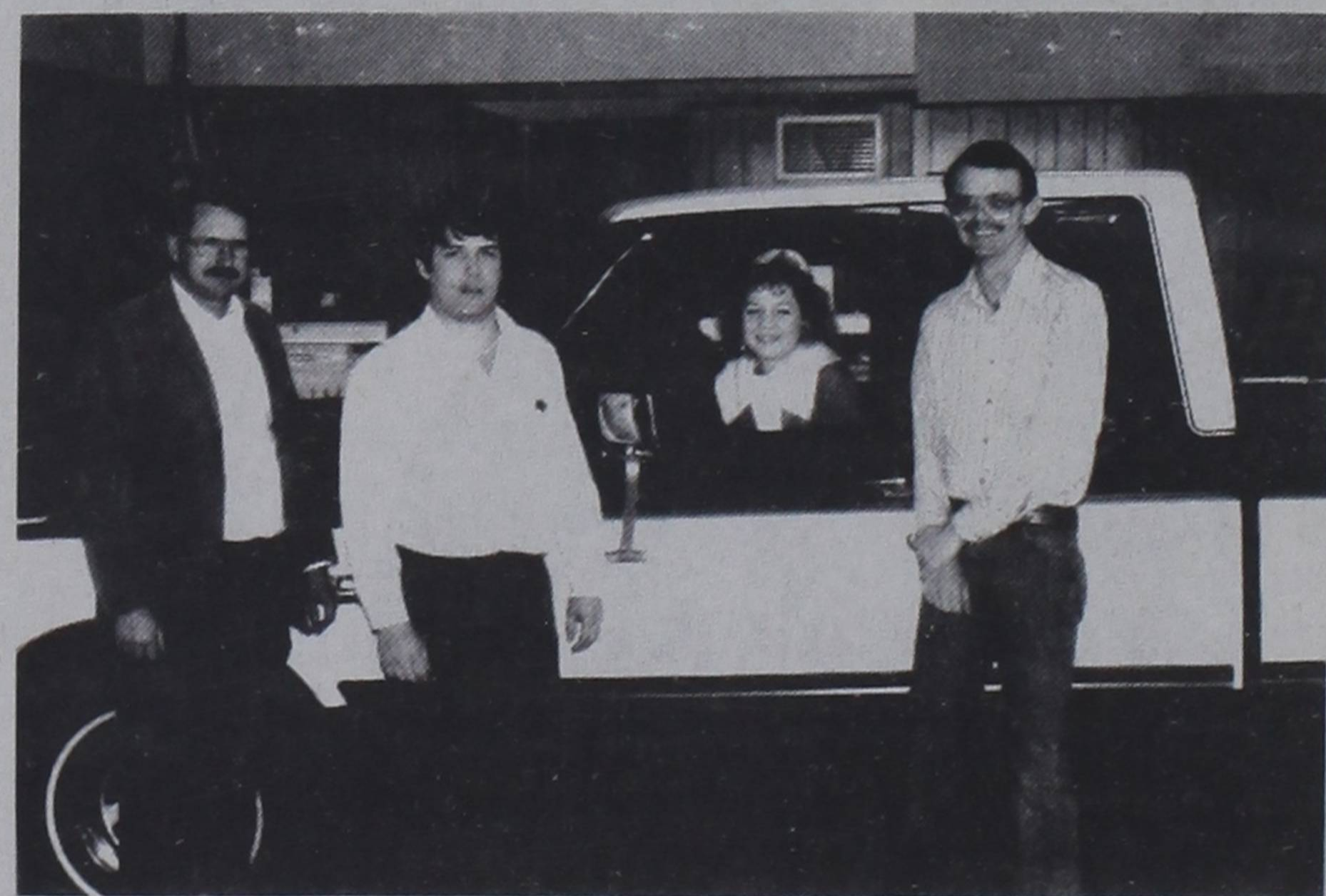
