mission of Texas requesting permission to continue drilling to 12,000 feet at No. 1 J. E. Parker, wildcat in Central Andrews County. The project originally started out

to go to 5.000 feet. Location is 1,873 feet from east and north lines of section 19, block A-44, psl survey and three and one-

quarter miles south of the town of Andrews.

### Sharp Finals Test From Devonian In **NE Andrews Sector**

J. R. Sharp, Inc., of Midland No 1-A University has been completed from the Devonian in Northeast Andrews County for a daily flow of 399 barrels of 45.6-gravity oil

It is one mile north and west of Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation and J. C. Barnes No. 1-E University, recently completed Devoniar discovery.

The Sharp project was completed through a one-quarter-inch choke and perforations at 12,466-12,510 feet. Pay was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

Gas-oil ratio was 529-1 and tubing pressure from 550 to 500 pounds. Pay was topped at 12,405 feet. elevation 2,996 feet. Total depth is 12.615 feet, plugged back. Seveninch casing is cemented at 12,660

Senate Panel Writes Broad New Measure WASHINGTON -(AP)- A multi-million dollar pro-

gram of government loans and aid for drouth-stricken ranchers and livestock operators in Texas and the Southwest was approved unanimously Tuesday by the Senate Agriculture Committee.

Chairman Aiken (R-Vt) said the legislation, similar to a broad-termed bill approved Monday by the House

More than 50 senators joined Aiken in introducing the emergency disaster bill. No fixed total was placed on the

loan funds but Aiken estimated that another \$100,000,000 or \$150,000,000

It voted to limit the disaster loans to "bona fide livestock producers in order to keep out speculators," Aiken said.

It also restricted the emergency livestock loans to "producers of cat-tle, sheep and goats," Aiken added, explaining loans are not needed for "producers of poultry, rabbits and alligators."

The Senate committee also knocked out a section that proposed liberal feed and seed loans in any major disaster area by any Agriculture Department agency.

"The department already has this uthority," Alken said.

The House bill included a seed and feed provision. #### **Temptation Wins** German Importer Visits Texas In Fountain Lure To Learn About Cotton Output ficials of Oklahoma A. & M. Col-

ON SHIP CROSSING ENGLISH CHANNEL-Germany grows no cotton, so when someone like Aiko Grashoff wants to learn about the product, he travels to Texas.

In Grashoff's case, he spent 18 months in Greenvill just studying cotton

His knowledge will be applied to the import business.

The German did what his father had done 27 years earlier.

In 1926, the senior Grashoff (missing in action on the Russian front in World War II) traveled to Waco, and lived here for one year-study ing cotton to gain knowledge on the best imports.

"Since the war I have been trying to build up an import business of my own," the young German from Bremon (that's in North Germany) said.

He said Germany imports about 400,000 bales of cotton annually from the U.S., and that 80 per cent comes from the Texas - Louisiana - Mississippi region. The biggest import year was 1949, when 700,000 bales were brought in.





### Annual Wheat Harvest Headache Is Migraine This Year

Faced with the largest stockpile of wheat in history and vastly insufficient storage space, frustrated farmers and state and federal agricultural officials fear they will end up on the psychiatrist's couch. Wheat storage has been an annual headache ever since the first billion-bushel crop in 1944. But this year, complications double the pain, with little aspirin on hand. It's like trying to pour a peck into a pint measure. Like this: take the estimated 1953 harvest of 1.132.000.000 bushels. Add to it 562,000,000-bushel carryover from 1952. Compare that with the country's total storage capacity, 521,000,000 bushels.



Map illustrates the abnormal conditions ruling this year's wheat As can be seen from comparative 1952-53 firm es, the great reduced harvest. In contrast, the eastern crop is expected greatly to exceed that of 1952.
