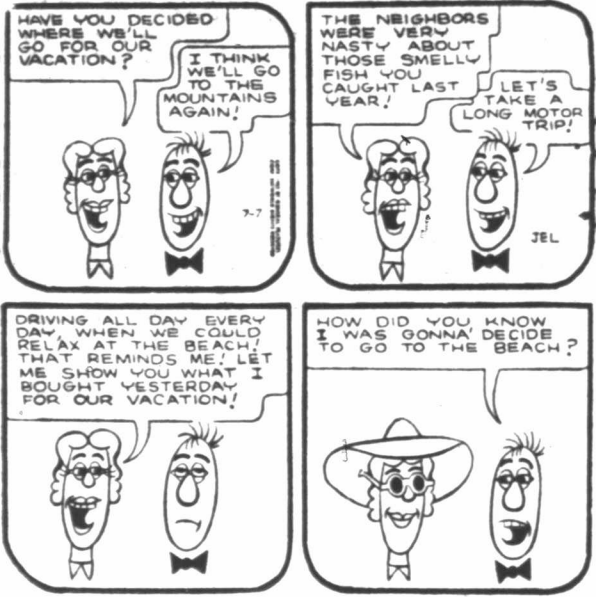

A recent Facts Forum debate on withdrawal from or continued support of the United Nations sparked a change in opinion. A poll of opinion before the discussion saw 10 per cent in favor of withdrawal, 30 per cent opposing the move and the remainder undecided.

Speakers favoring walking out of the UN saw that organization a Communist-inspired and controlled group which has worked more in favor of Soviets than Americans.

Execution Of 46 East German 'Peoples' Police' By Red Firing Squads Reported

BERLIN—(AP)—The West Berlin newspaper Telegraf said Tuesday 46 Communist German "Peoples' Police" have been executed by Russian firing squads for "disobeying orders and resisting the Red Army" during the June 17 workers revolt in East Germany.

people. They often refused to fire on rioters and sometimes even joined the rebels. Almost 500 have fled to West Berlin a month. Spurred by serious food shortages, the Communist East German government held out new promises to disgruntled farmers only to lure them into delivering quotas asked from the new grain harvest.

Dr. James Conant, U. S. high commissioner in Germany, came to West Berlin Tuesday to study the situation caused by the Russian martial law barricade dividing the four-power city.

At present, only persons working across the sector barrier and obtaining special passes from the Communists are allowed to cross. For the second successive night, gunfire rang along the Berlin sector borders. Peoples' police shot at two refugees trying to flee into the West. One escaped. The other was caught.

East Berlin's Red city government relaxed one of its nuisance restrictions Tuesday. It permitted West Berliners who own houses or gardens in East Berlin to appoint their own caretakers for the properties, which have been held under state trusteeship since last September.

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## German Importer Visits Texas To Learn About Cotton Output

ON SHIP CROSSING ENGLISH CHANNEL—Germany grows no cotton, so when someone like Alko Grashoff wants to learn about the product, he travels to Texas.

In Grashoff's case, he spent 18 months in Greenville just studying cotton.

His knowledge will be applied to the import business.

The German did what his father had done 27 years earlier.

In 1926, the senior Grashoff (missing in action on the Russian front in World War II) traveled to Waco, and lived here for one year—studying cotton to gain knowledge on the best imports.

"Since the war I have been trying to build up an import business of my own," the young German from Bremen (that's in North Germany) said.

He said Germany imports about 400,000 bales of cotton annually from the U. S., and that 80 per cent comes from the Texas-Louisiana-Mississippi region. The biggest import year was 1949, when 700,000 bales were brought in.

Two types are imported, he continued. The "rain-grown" from the Texas-Louisiana-Mississippi region, and the "irrigation" type from Cal-

ifornia, Arizona and New Mexico.

"Each has certain characteristics, and will react differently to certain tests and circumstances," Grashoff said, refusing to name the type he thought best under all circumstances.

Texas grows about one-fourth of all U. S. cotton—and formerly grew even more than that percentage-wise, the German said. "Now Texas has a lot of competition in cotton growing from the 'irrigation' states—California, Arizona and New Mexico.

Some cotton is imported from Egypt, "but it is very fine and soft, and used mostly for underwear," Grashoff said.

"The big problem in importing," the German said, "is that we have so few dollars. What I need is some product in Germany to sell America—in order to get dollars to buy cotton."

The problem for importers in Europe, the German pointed out, is that while European countries need American goods, "America has just about everything she needs."

He said his father had an arrangement a quarter of a century ago whereby he supplied materials for building bridges in exchange for cotton.

Later Recognition

Now in his early 20's, Grashoff said he could not be "recognized" in the import business in Europe for 10 or 20 years.

"Young men in America have a better chance of succeeding in business at an early age than Europeans. They don't think you know anything in Europe until you are about 40 or 50."

Grashoff added he liked the Amer-

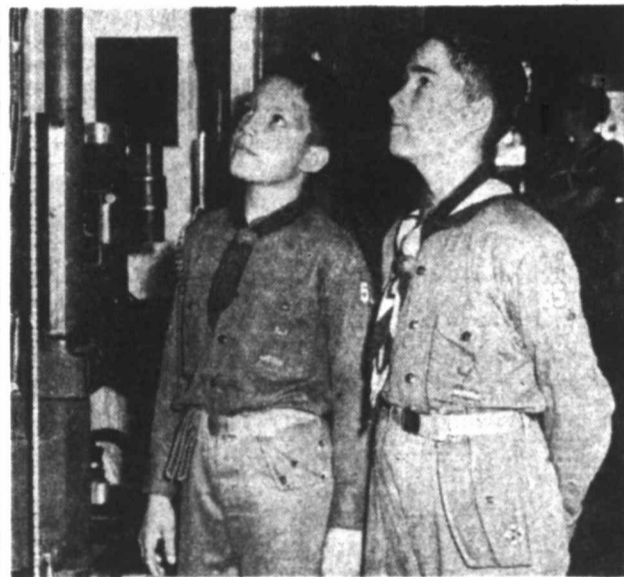
## Temptation Wins In Fountain Lure

## Army's 'Ready Reserve' Program Fails As Veterans Forego Post-Service Duty

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Army's program to maintain a ready reserve of trained men made up of former draftees is falling flat.

Only about 4.17 per cent of draftees who have finished two years of active service are participating in reserve training units—although the selective service law prescribes a military obligation in the reserves of five or six years after discharge from active duty.

The trouble, say Army officials, is this:

While the selective service law states that upon completion of two years' active duty a man shall be assigned to a reserve training unit, there is nothing in the law that compels him to train. The law has no punitive provision covering reserve duty, although it contains definite penalties for draft evasion.

The situation has concerned the Army for some time. Gen. J. Lawton Collins, retiring Army chief of staff, said several months ago he intended to recommend that the law be amended to cut in half the time of a man's reserve obligation if he would volunteer to join an organized reserve unit or the National Guard.

Leads To Punish

Draftees who were inducted prior to amendment of the selective service law in 1951 were obligated to five years of reserve status, those drafted after that date to six years.

Collins apparently prefers amending the law to induce a man to go into reserve training, rather than punishing him if he doesn't.

He told a congressional committee: "There is no punitive provision in the law, and we would be

very loathe to use one if Congress had included a penalty for non-conformists."

Instead he recommended cutting down the obligation time if a former draftee joins the guard or a reserve training unit, saying:

Told Of Obligation

"I think that will be fair to the individual. I think it will materially help—I hope it will help—if passed, both the National Guard units and our organized reserve units."

About 300,000 men now have been discharged from the Army after two years of duty. Since the start of

the Korean War, the Army has issued induction calls for more than 1,411,000 men.

As each man is discharged, his unit commander explains his remaining reserve obligation to him. The soldier signs a statement that he understands this obligation. His papers are forwarded to Army authorities in his home state, who also write him to call attention to his reserve status.

Salesman To Call

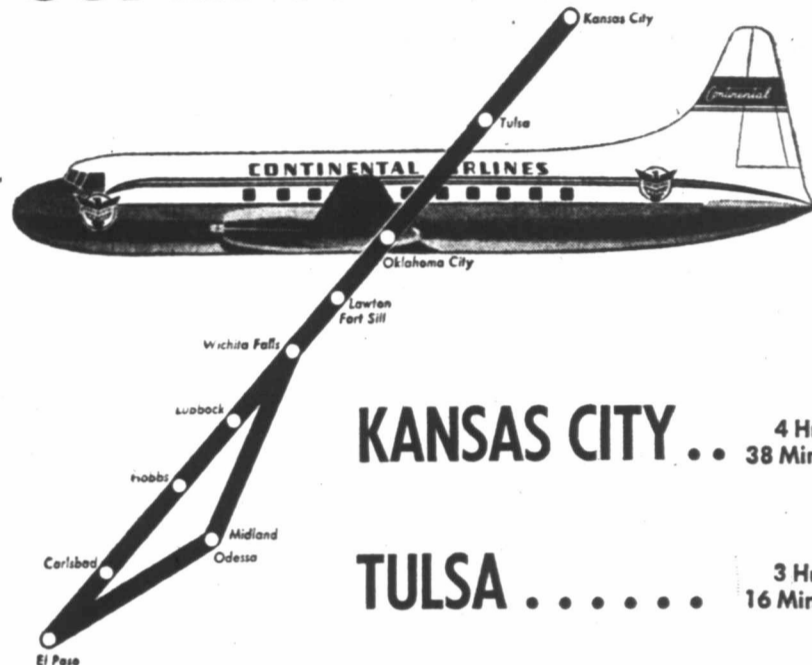
At the same time, the state Army official notifies an instructor of a reserve unit nearest the man's

home of the man's name and address. The unit instructor contacts the man. If there is no unit within reasonable distance, the man is told he can earn credits by correspondence course and by joining the unit in Summer camp training.

The Army recognizes that the lack of units in rural areas can make it difficult or impossible for men to train even if they want to. It estimates, on the basis of a study of urban and rural populations, that about 52 per cent of men with reserve obligations might be unable to join units because of this factor.

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**Price Goes Up, But Custom Of Serenading Still Lives**

MEXICO CITY —(AP)— The price of music has gone up, but the fine old romantic custom of serenading keeps on.

The strolling street musicians now demand 10 pesos — \$1.25 — a song. Whether they get it depends on just how long the prospective audience has been celebrating.

Before World War II the standard price was one peso, then 21 cents U. S. During the war it went up to one peso a song for each man in the group. This might range from two men, guitar and violin, to 10 to 12 including a marimba player. Now it is up again.

But the higher prices have not halted the early morning serenade to a sweetheart. Permanent residents can count on being awakened around 2 a.m. at least three or four times a year for an hour of music. If you have a lot of pretty girls in your block, you'll hear even more.

For some reason, you don't get mad when awakened by serenaders. For one thing, the music is good, soothing and not too loud. It blends into a dose very nicely.

The protocol of being serenaded is strict and seldom violated.

The girl never appears at her window.

**Canadian Mounties Go Modern, Trim Costs**

WINNIPEG —(AP)— The Royal Canadian Mounted Police has gone modern with a vengeance. Horses, which now appear only on ceremonial occasions, have been replaced by speeding patrol cars equipped with two-way radio. The sled dogs have given way to a monster on skis called a bombardier snowmobile which costs less to run than the huskies.

Trim cabin cruisers patrol the larger lakes and all branches are linked by radio to speed the work.

**Japan Goes Musical; Bands Still Growing**

TOKYO —(AP)— Western music, less than 100 years old in Japan, currently is played by five symphony orchestras and more than 500 jazz bands throughout the country.

Four of the symphonies are in Tokyo and Osaka, the two largest cities and the fifth is a 20-piece wind and string aggregation at Takasaki, a small commercial center of about 100,000 which has no college or music academy.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

Drew Pearson says: Senators hold secret debate over communism among Protestant clergy; Secretary of Defense Wilson gets sour on senators; Two murders at the Pentagon.

WASHINGTON — A significant backstage battle over McCarthyism was staged Tuesday when the McCarthy committee was to meet behind closed doors to discuss its executive director, J. B. Matthews, and his statement that "the largest single group supporting the Communist apparatus in the United States today is composed of Protestant clergymen."

Matthews, formerly employed by the Hearst newspapers, recently has replaced fair-minded "Frip" Flanagan, who for many years directed the Senate government operations committee of which McCarthy now is chairman. But at the Tuesday meeting the committee will face a solid phalanx of three Democrats—Jackson of Washington, McClellan of Arkansas and Symington of Missouri—who will demand that Matthews be fired.

The three Democrats can be outvoted by the four Republicans, but the interesting question will be whether all the Republicans will line up together. For three of the four Republicans are Protestants: Mundt of South Dakota and Potter of Michigan are Methodists; Dirksen of Illinois is a Presbyterian. McCarthy, the chairman, is Catholic.

During the closed-door debate, the three Protestant Republicans will have to decide whether to go along with their chairman or with the protestant churches which have been attacked by Committee Director Matthews. Derision For Senators It won't make him popular on Capitol Hill, but Secretary of Defense Wilson has taken to using the term "senator" derisively.

For example, at an off-the-record meeting of aviation moguls at Williamsburg, Va., Wilson delivered a short, pleasant speech, then called for questions from the audience. He got a critical one from ex-Air Force General Joe McNarney, now president of consolidated Vultee Aircraft. "I don't know who the hell you are," snapped Wilson, "but you

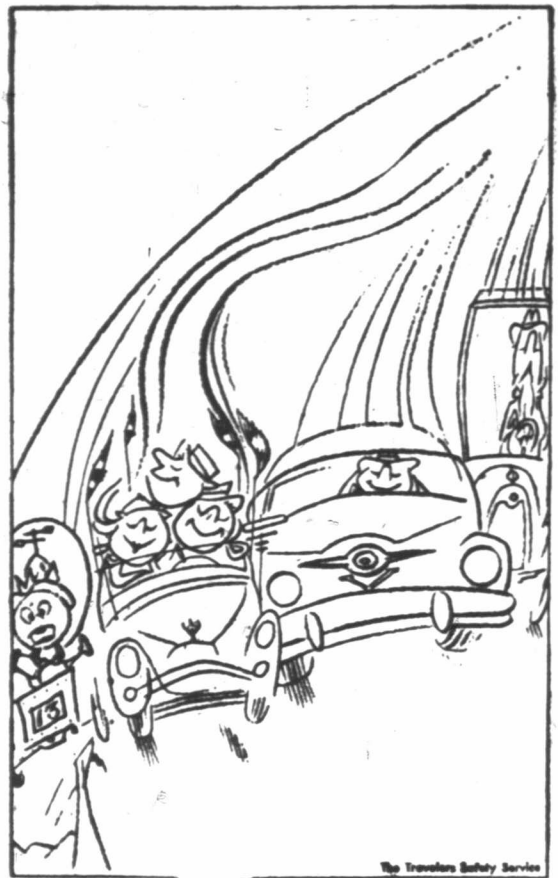

# Britishers Show Displeasure At Mundt's Shipping Charges

By LEON DENNEN

LONDON—(NEA)—British businessmen are raging mad at Sen. Karl Mundt's charge that 100 British ships did "a lush profit in blood" in recent months.

Britain must export to live, they retort. "Britain must export to earn dollars to buy essential goods in the U. S."

Since the end of the war, the British have based their trading policies on the belief that the U. S. would eventually agree to ease tariff barriers. They no longer have any illusions.

The Simpson Amendment to restrict President Eisenhower's power to negotiate changes in the U. S. tariff was a rude awakening for British economists and businessmen.

They now believe that the Republicans will even tighten tariff regulations if they win the Congressional elections in 1954.

Butler is Gloomy  
R. A. Butler, Britain's Chancellor of the Exchequer, is especially gloomy over the prospect of Anglo-American trade relations.

iff advocates—would like the British to embargo all trade with Russia's satellites, in line with American policy.

Moscow is, of course, aware of Britain's economic troubles. The Russians seem to believe that they have found the real weak link in the Western coalition.

Profitable trade deals with Britain—and with the rest of Western Europe—is Premier Malenkov's bait for a Big Four conference.

Sir Winston Churchill is expected to use all his prestige and powers of persuasion at Bermuda to get President Eisenhower to agree to an early top level meeting with the Russians.

He will plug for the admission of Red China into the UN—though fully aware that the U. S. Senate voted unanimously for a resolution opposing the concession.

The French likely will back the British on both issues. But West Germany—though not a member of the Bermuda conference—will side with the U. S.

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer is carrying on a historic fight to bring Germany back into the Western

community of nations. He fears that Britain will try to make a deal with the Russians at the expense of West Germany.

U. S. observers in Britain believe that the U. S. will be against an early meeting with Russia and will oppose the seating of Red China in the UN as a condition to a Korean peace settlement. The Korean

agreement, in their view, is as yet no proof that the Kremlin is prepared to back up words with deeds—since the war in Korea has long been a hot potato for Russia and Red China.

The State Department is not likely to be pressured into a meeting with Moscow without knowing whether the Russians are really ready to make reasonable concessions.

And there are many influential leaders in Congress, opposed to a new "Munich" and a policy of appeasement, who believe that the Kremlin rulers are only playing for time.

A Big Four meeting may become inevitable, however. President Eisenhower may not be able to resist for long European pressure for a conference with Premier Malenkov.

Only the U. S. would prefer to postpone the meeting and wait for further proof of Russia's real desire for peace.

Nevertheless, Sir Winston is said to be of the view that the Bermuda talks will strengthen rather than weaken Western unity—especially Anglo-American unity.

Competent observers in London do not share the Prime Minister's optimism. It will take enormous tact, understanding and good will for the Anglo-American partnership to reach the wartime level.

Well-meaning people on both sides of the Atlantic have long tried to base Anglo-American partnership on family "cousinship" and the common English tongue.

Sir Winston himself has been plugging this line. But this is like building on sand.

The U. S. and Britain are countries with varying national interests, and contrasted historical backgrounds. A London Cockney and a Cleveland Pole or a Chicago Czech are not "cousins." They hardly speak the same language.

What will ultimately compel the U. S. and Britain to cooperate—as they cooperated during the war—is the fact that their interests overlap in every quarter of the globe.

That, and the realization that if they do not stand together the whole structure of the free, non-Communist world will go to pieces.

Only Russia could gain from continued Anglo-American disunity.

# Songwriter Whiting's Daughter Says Dad's Film Story Will Be Real McCoy

HOLLYWOOD—(P)—Here's one song writer whose film biography will be the real McCoy—Richard Whiting.

Or so says songstress Margaret Whiting, the late composer's daughter. In discussing plans to film his life story, she said the picture would avoid the pitfalls of other musical biographies.

"None of them has been true to life," she remarked. "None has presented the real picture of what the song writers were like. I know, because I knew them all through my father."

The Gus Kahn biography, "I'll See You in My Dreams," failed to capture his humorous nature, she said, even though comic Danny Thomas played the role. Nor did "Words and Music" do right by Richard Rodgers and Larry Hart, she added.

"Larry was a wonderful character who would help newcomers with their careers," she commented. "But in the picture he was played as just another Mickey Rooney role."

Kern Epic Misfires  
She claimed the Bert Kalmar and Harry Ruby biog, "Three Little Words," misfired and so did the Jerome Kern epic, "Till the Clouds Roll By." As for the picture of George Gershwin in "Rhapsody in Blue"—"they didn't show him as he was, a man with driving ambition; instead, they threw in some romances that never happened."

Perhaps the most fanciful was the Cole Porter film, "Night and Day." The composer was born a millionaire and made many millions more. The studio was hard put to inject conflict in his story.

"And nobody can tell me that

Cole Porter wrote 'Night and Day' in a tent," Miss Whiting added.

She now is helping screen writers with the script of her father's life. She said they will stick to the facts.

"So many dramatic things happened in his life that we don't have to fabricate," she commented. "He liked to keep the common touch. Even after he had written songs that sold millions, he still played the piano in his publisher's office in Detroit. One day a young fellow came into the office looking for encouragement. My father liked his songs and helped him get ahead. The fellow's name was George Gershwin."

Discard His Jacket  
"Another story—My father had written a song with another writer but he was unhappy with it. He threw it away. A secretary picked it out of the waste basket and entered it in a song contest held by one of the big Detroit theaters. It won the prize and people started clamoring for the song. It was 'Till We Meet

Again,' which has since sold more sheet music than any other song including 'Stardust' and 'The Lord's Prayer.'"

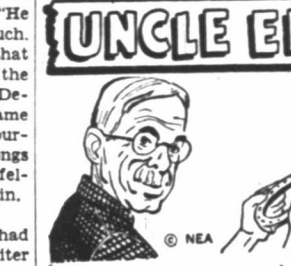
The story has a good romance too, she said. Her father originally

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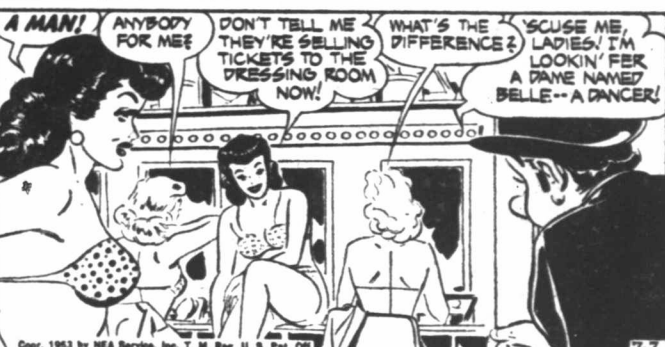
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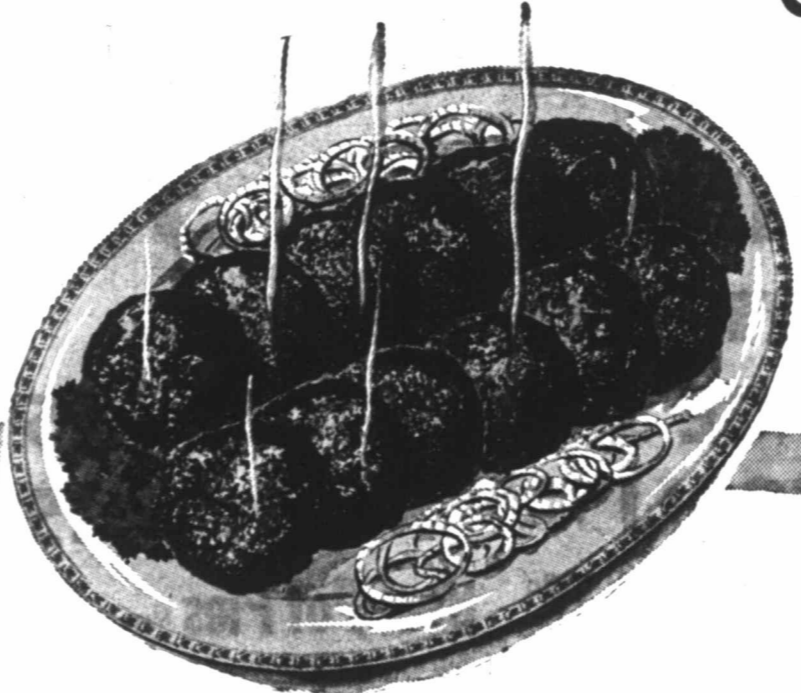
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
